Thanksgiving Closing Schedule Given, Activities Announced

Special Worship Service To Be Held In School Auditorium

The observance of Thanksgiving holidays begins Thursday in Iuka with the closing of businesses and plants throughout the area.

Locally, closing schedules for the larger industries have been announced by plant managers and superintendents.

At the Tishomingo Shoe Plant, Don Jordan, Personnel Manager, states that their holiday will begin at closing time

Wednesday afternoon and will end when work resumes Friday morning at 7, thus giving the employees Thanksgiving Day free.

Also, on Tuesday, plant managers and plant plant Superintendent Sanders James conducted a company-wide drawing for Thanksgiving turkeys. The turkeys were given away in the various departments, that afternoon with the drawing determined by the employees' clock numbers.

Troy D. Holtsford, manager of the Iuka Shirt Plant, announces that his employees will receive a long holiday week end beginning Wednesday afternoon at closing time. Production will be resumed at 7 o'clock Monday morning, November 29.

ONE OUT OF TWO BRIDES WILL BE UNDER 20; ½ OF TEENAGE MARRIAGES WON'T WORK

Teen-agers are flocking to the altar by the hundreds of thousands. One out of two brides this year will be under 20. The same ratio will end up in separation or divorce, according to Changing Times reporting on "What happens to teen-age marriages?"

The chance of success for a teen-age marriage in the U. S. is about a third as good as for marriages of those in their twenties. The fact is that today more girls marry at age 18 than at any other age and this tendency to marry young is one that is peculiar to the United States.

It's not just the women either; nearly half of all American young men are married by the time they are 25, compared with only a quarter in most of Europe and as few as a tenth in Norway and Ireland. Only in Asia do you find a marry-young pattern comparable to that of the U. S.

To improve the chance of success of thousands of marrying teens, the following guideline are offered:

The young married—particularly the groom—must understand the necessity of completing high school and, if possible, going on to college or other advanced training.

More needs to be done to help teen-agers understand what marriage entails—realistic education on what marriage is like, what obstacles must be overcome, why money is important.

More help is needed for married couples in trouble in family counseling, baby care, supplementary education, and general encouragement in making the best of the situation.

And, parents must not cringe at prospects of a teen-age crisis. Wise parents can accept what is and give every support they can.

Here's what happens to Teen-Age Marriages. If your teen-ager wants to marry... tell her or him these facts:

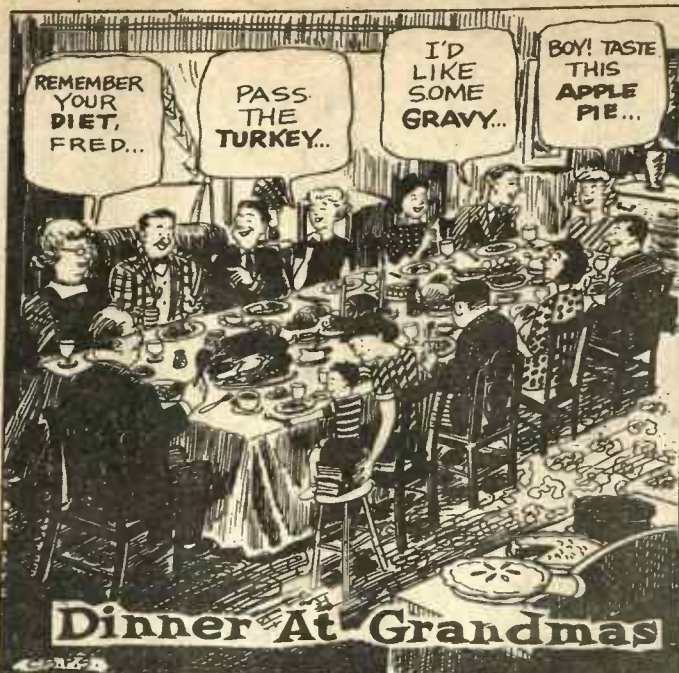
- One out of two teen-age marriages ends in divorce and separation.
- Teens who drops out of school to marry rarely go back.
- Pregnancy occurs early for most teen brides—ending hopes of career or more education.
- Teen husbands average a little over \$2,000 a year, but most families need two or three times that to get by.
- For teen husbands with limited education, job advancement is almost impossible.
- Most teens are overwhelmed by the emotional and psychological trials of marriage.
- A few years of waiting is the best assurance of a life time of married happiness.

WORRIED ABOUT WEATHER? YOU CAN FORGET IT AT 65

"Well, the hurricanes have finally done it!"

"For two years I opposed my husband's plans to set up our retirement home in Panama City, Fla. I couldn't change his mind. I gave up. Then when the storms began building up in the Caribbean in September he grew concerned. He said maybe I had been right all along, and he would be willing now to move where I might choose."

"So I am somewhat on the spot. Can you suggest an area where we can be free of the awful whims of nature?"

The best answer to this, probably, is for the lady to contact the rocket boys at that giant NASA center down in Houston, Tex., and ask how are things on the moon. So far as is known, there is no place in North America where nature hasn't been slapping people around. Or won't tomorrow.

Weather continues to be one of the great issues of people going into retirement... right up there alongside Motherhood, Social Security, and the Flag. It doesn't belong there. In the first place it doesn't matter much to retired people after a while. In the second, they can't do anything about it, anywhere.

Nelson P. Foster, who was going to whip weather when he retired three years ago — and

didn't — has made quite a study of the matter.

"Just look at what would have happened in 1965 alone to anybody who is afraid of nature's violence, as I was," he says.

"There were some terrible floods that swept down from Minnesota, through Iowa and Illinois. There was the severe water shortage in New York and New Jersey, which is not exactly violence but is hardly fun. There were those floods out in the Northwest. There were hurricanes. And do you remember those tornadoes that swept across from Kansas to Michigan, killing and destroying all the way?"

According to Mr. Foster, a couple looking for safe weather for retirement had better not read the daily news reports on weather across the continent. "If they do they'll wind up climbing into a hole. There simply is no area where violent weather hasn't hit, or probably won't hit if you'll wait long enough."

He mentions that weather forecasts have greatly improved. "All that means is that you have two days to worry about what's going to hit you, instead of two hours as formerly."

To Plant Or Wait For Natural Re-Seeding

The two methods of regeneration generally used in established a stand of trees are (1) natural reseedling from parent trees on or near an area, or sprouts from the previous stand; or (2) artificially restocking the area by planting seed or seedlings. The decision as to the best method to use should be based on several factors. These include (1) the availability of seed trees or desirable species for natural regeneration (2) the time required to obtain a new stand under natural regeneration; and (3) the costs of establishing a good stand by natural regeneration in comparison with planting with seedling.

If the area in question is lacking in seed trees of a desirable species, then the owner has no alternative but to plant the area with seed or seedlings. Many areas lack adequate seed trees due in part to past cutting practice and fire history.

Naturally regeneration may occur within 1 or 2 years after removal of the stand, or it may not be established for as long as ten years or more. Most tree species do not have an abundant seed crop every year. Areas without desirable reproduction for extended periods frequently become covered with brush and less desirable trees. Because of these situations, natural reseedling may result in costly delay in the establishment of the new stand of trees. The market for pulpwood is growing rapidly, and the additional costs in planting the forest may be more than repayed through thinnings at from 15 to 20 years. A delay of five years

could result in a loss of from 5 to 10 cords of wood.

Natural reseedling has the disadvantages of leaving to nature the kind of tree, the time, the number, and the distribution. Artificial methods have the advantage of controlling these factors. However, one method may be used to supplement the other on the same area, thereby reducing the time of establishment while also controlling distribution of stocking and getting ahead of competing brush and undesirable species.

Whether by natural reseedling or planting, trees, like any crop, depend upon the soil for anchorage, moisture, and nutrients. The trick in farm management is to use every acre to best advantage

FALL CLOVER GRAZING

Before starting to graze clo-

established.

Graze off this early growth
before mid-winter. If not the

winter freezes.

After grazing off the early
clover growth, move the live-
stock as trampling will damage
the clover.

Where potash and phosphate
have not yet been applied this
fall, do the job now. All hill
areas and foothills of the state
need phosphate and potash for
good clover growth.

Work Unit Conservationist

To grow properly, pine trees
need plenty of elbow space.
Without this space, many will
die and surviving trees will be-
come stagnated and scarcely
grow at all.

Of extreme importance is the
thinning out of crooked trees,
double trees, and trees of poor
quality. The value of this can
hardly be overestimated.

Many landowners follow the
practice of cutting and selling
for pulpwood, trees from every
other row in a planted area as
soon as trees are large enough.
Other SCD Cooperators secure
the services of a skilled forester
to mark the trees to be cut.

But whatever method you use
in selecting pulpwood from
your trees, remember finer,
larger, and better pine trees
are those that had ample space
for growing.

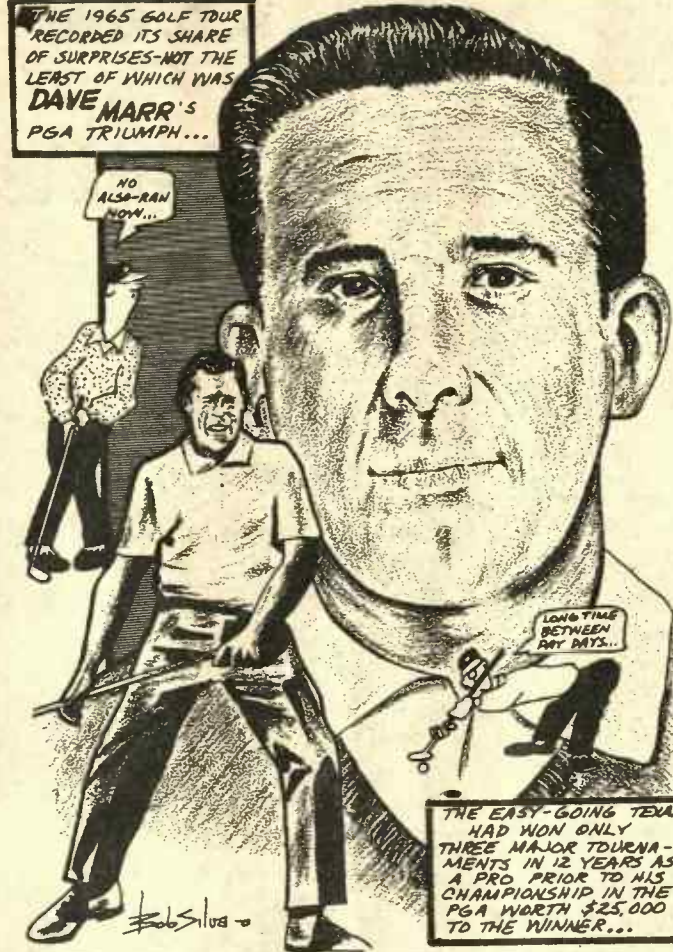
