Health Dept. Moves To New Location In Iuka Modern Facility Houses Various Services Of Health Needs For Area

Tishomingo County
Health Department has opened
new offices on Highway 72
near the Tishomingo
Hospital.
The \$47,600.00 construc-
tion of modern facilities
is meant to better serve
the needs of the area residents.
The new building is modern with the
interior devoted to waiting
rooms. This area features
ceiling with tinted

glass walls at either end. The
room is white with large globe
lights hanging from the ceiling.
At either side of the waiting
room are the offices for the
County Health Nurse, Mrs.
Wayne Yow, and clerical and
administration offices to be oc-
cupied by Gayle McQuilliams
and Luther Kinard. At the other
end are rooms for x-rays, exami-
nations, and the medication
room.

The completely air-condition-
ed building is located on the
north side of the highway with
the front facing north. The pur-
pose in paving the facility face
north is a plan for the future
since growth of the town will
open up more streets and lots to
construction in that area.
Therefore, the offices will be
facing the street with the park-
ing space located toward the
direction of the highway.

Mr. Kinard states that all
business is now being carried
on in the new offices even
though it will be a few more
days before things are com-
pletely in order.

He further added that the of-
fices would be closed next week
Wednesday, December 8, thru-
out the following weekend.
Work will be resumed the fol-
lowing Monday, December 13,
at the usual time. Representa-
tives from the office will be at-
tending the Mississippi Public
Health Association meeting in
Jackson.

Extensive Damage Done In IC Train Wreck At Paden

Thirty-nine freight cars were
derailed and 800 feet of track
were torn up in a train wreck
at Paden early Wednesday
morning.

The wreck occurred shortly
after midnight and involved a
long freight engineered by Hu-
bert Finley, Sr., of Haleyville,
Ala. The freight was traveling

south on a run from Chicago
to Birmingham. There were no
injuries reported.

Cause of the wreck could not
be immediately determined. E.
L. Parker, Illinois Central's St.
Louis Division trainmaster, said
that all cars would have to be
moved before the exact cause
could be known.

The train was heavily loaded,
having several freight cars of
new automobiles. Other freight
included carloads of stick car-
dy, cement, fertilizer and hun-
dreds of other items.

Damage to the track was esti-
mated at \$10,000, but destruc-
tion to freight cars and mer-
chandise could not be estimated
early Wednesday.

Wrecker crews were called
in and work was started on
both ends of the wreckage. Mr.
Parker stated that he hoped a
new track would be laid and in
operation by midnight Wednes-
day or early this morning. IC
trains were re-routed over
tracks from Corinth to Tupelo.

Other damage done at the
wreck was to telephone lines
that served Tishomingo and
Belmont. Long distance service
was out for a few hours. The
wreck occurred in Paden, a few
hundred yards north of high-
way 30 viaduct.

THE GOLDEN YEARS

YOU CAN GET A JOB AT 65 —
IF YOU'LL USE YOUR WITS

"I think I want another job after I retire."

"I'm not sure of this. My pension and Social Security, plus some modest savings, should see me through if what you and everybody else say about retirement expenses is true. But I have some worries. My job has been my staff of life for 42 years. It's a little frightening to think of being without a job. I think no amount of pension could ever quite stop this fear."

"Can you tell me, frankly and without platitudes, whether a 65-year-old retired man can get a job?"

The man who wrote this sums up rather neatly the thoughts going through the heads of many people now coming up to retirement. And the answer to his question is:

A 65-year-old retired man can get a job... there are thousands of them waiting for him, and some of them carry secretaries and mahogany desks.

But a retired person has to use his or her wits more than any other age group ever uses them. He or she must get away from the usual job-getting pattern. For example:

This column in the last year has come across a man who contributed \$2,500 of his 11,000 savings to a charitable organization, and got the job as its executive secretary at \$7,000 a year; two men — one an Army Colonel and the other a retail man — who got jobs in the "Development" programs of community colleges which are now sprouting all over the land; one man who appealed

to the general manager of his company just before he retired and landed a job as "Sales Advisor" with a firm that was selling his company \$150,000 worth of merchandise a year; a woman school teacher who got a job as a "consultant" with an Eastern publisher of school textbooks who enjoyed the inside track in selling books to her school; an insurance man who got an executive job in a private university's fund-raising program — a salesman, you see.

Apart from such cases as these, where a person applies his or her wits to a particular situation to get a certain job, there are "agency" routes to gainful employment:

The Federal Government is using retired people in the Peace Corps. At more glory than money, to be sure, but it's a job. (See your congressman.)

The Federal Government is about to hire more than 15,000 elderly people to help out in its Anti-Poverty program. (See your congressman.)

Part-time employment agencies, such as Kelly Girl Service and Manpower, Inc., which have offices in most of the major cities of the country.

Conventional employment agencies are placing retired people in fitting jobs, though not all of them accept applicants above certain ages. Go see a couple of them, and ask.

FOR THE FAMILY MANAGER

ITEM: The cloudy or discolored look of ceramic tile around bathtubs and shower stalls probably is caused by hard water and soap film. If it does not disappear after washing with a detergent and water solution, make a solution of one cup of packaged water conditioner mixed with half a pail of water. Rinse with

clear water and dry.

ITEM: The smoother the piece of wood, the finer finish it will take. Therefore, it is especially important that all furniture be sanded as smooth as possible before applying a durable and decorative furniture finish.

ITEM: Round bowls, cake pans, or pie pans may be used for molds instead of the regular salad molds. Cut the jellied salad into squares or wedges

Notice To The Owners Of HOUSE TRAILER IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY

We call your attention to the following laws regarding the assessment and collection of taxes on house trailers. We expect your cooperation . . . and call your attention to the fact that all taxes on house trailers which are not paid before November 30th will be considered delinquent.

H. B. NO. 747 — LAWS OF 1962

All such house trailers shall be registered not later than November each year then current year — such registration may also be made earlier during the month of November if it is desired to do so.

Before a registration certificate for a house trailer may be issued by the sheriff, he shall have collected all ad valorem taxes due under this act for the current fiscal year on the vehicle, plus a registration fee of two dollars and fifty (\$2.50) cents. In issuing the registration labels, the sheriff shall begin with the lowest numbered label and corresponding number assigned to his county. The sheriff shall also at the proper places on the label, in indelible ink (ballpoint pen) the number of his county, and the length, in feet, of the trailer.

After all taxes imposed by this act have been paid on a house trailer, the label shall be attached to the subject vehicle by the taxpayer on the outside of the vehicle near the right hand corner of the drawbar end of the trailer, after such portion has been cleaned and dried. The failure to display a registration label on a house trailer as defined in this act shall be prima facie evidence that the taxes imposed by this act have not been paid.

Any person who buys a house trailer from a dealer or causes one to be brought into this State after the beginning of the fiscal year will be required to pay ad valorem taxes on the vehicle for only the remaining portion of the fiscal year. The registration fee will not be refunded, however. The owner of a house trailer brought into this state, on which the taxes have been paid in another, shall have 30 days in which to pay such taxes in this state. If the taxes shall be calculated, however, as of the first day of the month in which the trailer was brought into this State.

Taxes due at any time during a month shall be calculated as of the first day of the month.

If the sheriff has been directed to collect ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles for a municipality then he shall also collect for such municipality ad valorem taxes imposed by this act.

The assessed value of house trailers, for the proper years, as shown by the assessment schedule authorized by Chapter 588, Laws of 1958, shall be used in assessing and collecting the taxes imposed by this act. No taxing agency may either reduce or increase the value of house trailers from that shown by the aforesaid assessment schedule in collecting ad valorem taxes under authority of this act.

In issuing a road and bridge privilege license for a house trailer after the tax on the trailer has already been paid, the payment of additional ad valorem taxes for such year shall not be required.

H. B. NO. 761—LAWS OF 1964

A house trailer located on land which is owned by the same person owning and operating the said house trailer shall also be exempt from the taxes authorized by this act if the wheels of said house trailer have been detached and the trailer is placed on a concrete type foundation. Such trailers shall be assessed and taxed along with the land on which the trailer is assessed and taxed.

Forest Grove Hunters Enjoy Deer Stew

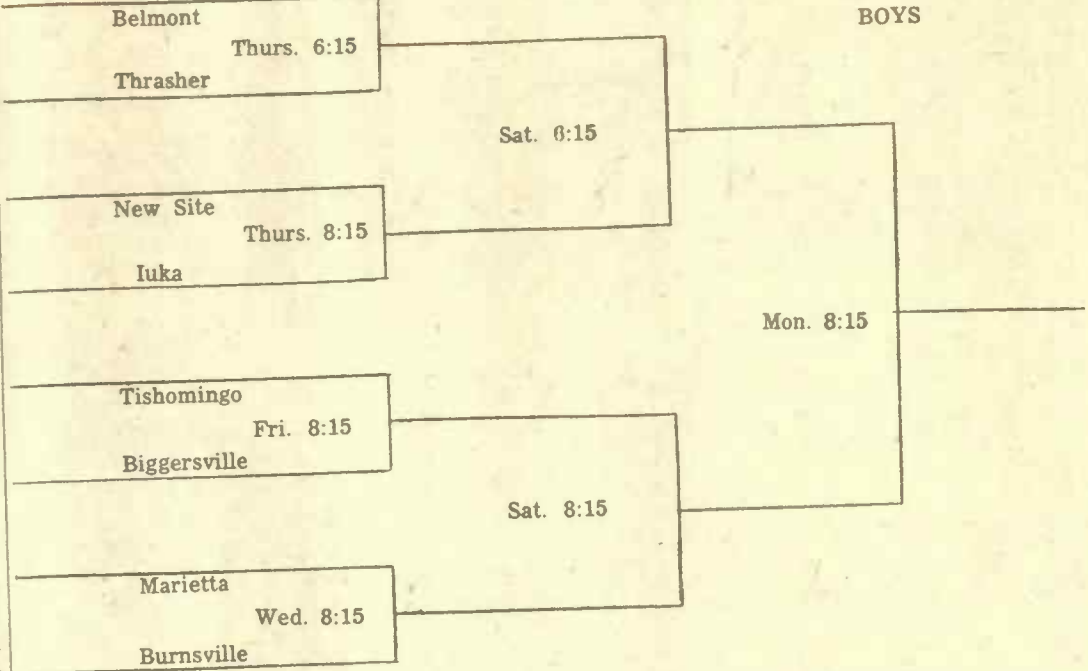
The deer hunters of the For-

ing around 240 pounds.

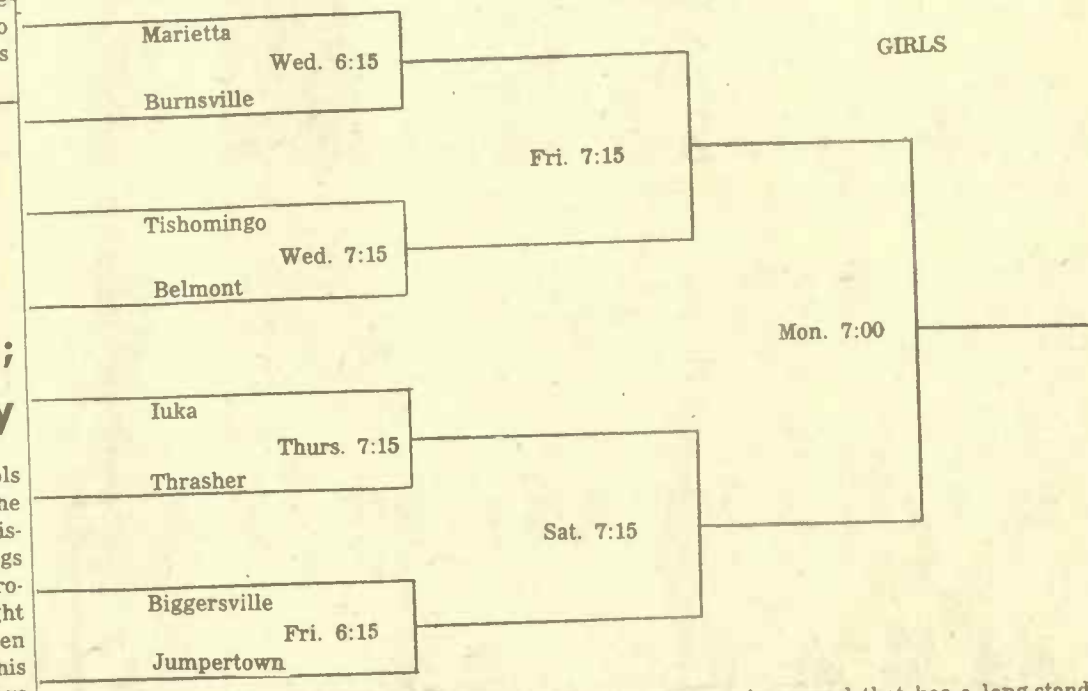
Belmont, Tishomingo, Iuka,
