NOTES OF HOME ECONOMIST

To be sure the Christmas shirts you select are favorite gifts with the men on your shopping list, you must choose them not only for color and style but also for fit.

An ill-fitting color — one that is too tight or too loose — can spoil a man's appearance and make him uncomfortable.

Be sure the sleeve length is right, too. A shirt cuff should show about an inch below the coat sleeve.

Shirt collar size and sleeve length are marked in the back of the collarband with two numbers, for example, 15-33, means collar size 15 inches and sleeve length 33 inches. You can also

find half sizes in collars.

If the man for whom you are buying the shirt is slender around the middle, investigate the tapered or slimline shirts. They are cut with less fullness at and below the waistline, resulting in a trim, neat fit.

For features that swell comfortable fit, check the body, sleeve, collar and front of the shirt. You want the body of the shirt to have neatly sloped shoulders and be roomy enough to prevent strain and allow free movement. The top of the sleeve should fold straight with the grain of material to prevent twisting. It should be wide at armholes for freedom, gradually taper toward cuff and be long enough to cover wrists.

The collar points should be sharp, perfectly matched in length and should stay down. The shirt front should lie flat,

due to expert tailoring at armholes, permitting free movement of arms and body.

Check the stitching, buttonholes, buttons and fullness of cut, too. For easier ironing and increased durability, stitches along cuff edges and front panel should be closely spaced to avoid bunching up when shirt is laundered. No chain stitching. No knots.

Stitches around buttonholes should be close and firm to prevent fraying. Look for secure back-stitching across each end. Buttonholes should slip easily and securely over buttons. Look for clear, smooth buttons of uniform thickness.

There should be a generous width allowance everywhere. Look for back fullness gathered to an upcurved yoke and the yoke double-thick to absorb strain.

WHAT IS CASHMERE

Cashmere — long called the queen of sweater yarns — is wool spun from the downy fleece of the Cashmere goat that is a native of Central Asia. Top quality cashmere is very soft and luxurious, while less expensive versions contain some of the coarse outer hairs of the goat that do not dye as evenly as the fleece. There are also moderately priced sweaters made of cashmere combined with other wools.

Pretty Clothes and Pretty 4-H Girls Go To

PRETTY clothes on pretty girls are a common sight in 4-H circles, particularly among the more than three-quarter million girls from 9 to 19 enrolled in the national 4-H Clothing program, observes Miss Mamie Hardy, head of educational field activities for Coats & Clark Inc., sponsor for 25 years of the clothing program.

Sketched here are some of the fashions that 4-H girls are putting into their fall and winter wardrobes. In their clothing projects they learn how to sew on and care for new fabrics, and to choose color, line and design. The "learning-by-doing" is guided by local volunteer clothing leaders and extension home economists.

Miss Hardy conducts numerous workshops for extension personnel. Her newest is called "The Shape of Things" which teaches how to get different

shapes in garments by use of various interfacings, backings and linings.

"Several generations ago," said Miss Hardy, "stiffeners used in garment construction gave exaggerated shaping and made the garment uncomfortable. Today's inner fabrics have changed to keep pace with the many new types of outer fabrics designed for contemporary living."

"The secret of good lines is knowing which type to use to achieve a softer and more comfortable effect," Miss Hardy added.

Workshop techniques will in turn reach local 4-H leaders who will pass them on to the girls.

Patience, persistence and pride in workmanship are three essential requisites for getting ahead in the clothing project, according to the 4-H'ers.

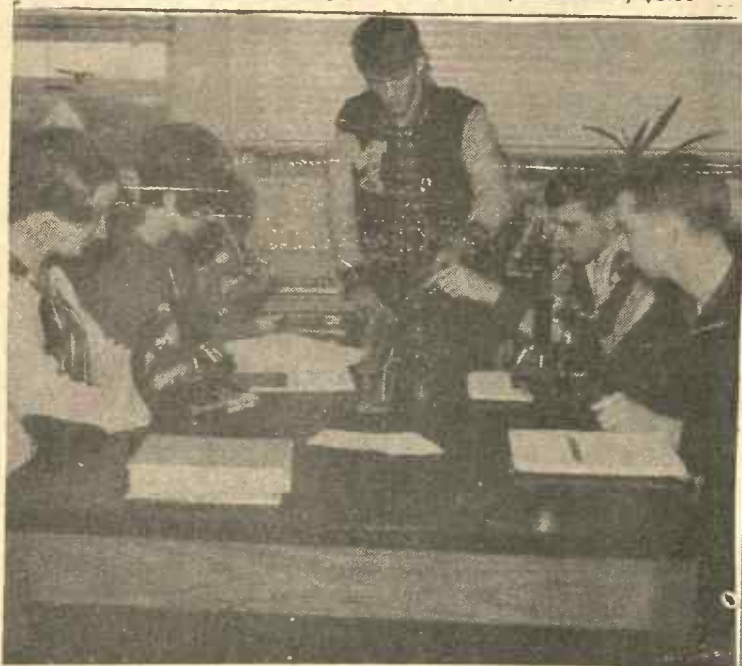

Telephone customers in Iuka and Belmont will get the full benefit when the federal excise tax on telephone service is reduced on January 1, W. G. Hardin, Southern Bell Manager, said today.

In Mississippi as a whole. Southern Bell customers pay \$6,218,676 a year, or about \$17.26 on the average, in Federal Excise Tax on telephone service.

Haroin explained that a number of excise taxes have been or will be removed under the Excise Tax Revision Law passed this past summer, and the tax on local and long distance telephone service is one of the major ones.

The excise tax on telephone service will be reduced from 10 per cent to three per cent on January 1. The remaining three per cent will be reduced at one per cent a year until the whole tax is eliminated on January 1, 1969.

Hardin explained that a num-
excise tax is a tax on telephone
customers, not on the Tele-
phone Company. The Company
has merely collected the tax
and passed it on to the U. S.
Government.

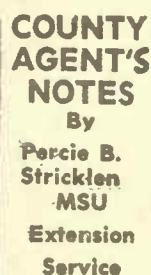
If your basic telephone bill in a month is \$12.00, including long distance calls, then you have been paying another \$1.20 for federal excise tax. Starting January 1, you would pay the \$12.00 plus only 36 cents tax and three years from now, you will pay no tax.

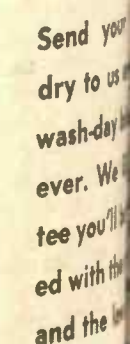
Bringing your records up to date right now will likely save you some money when income tax reporting time arrives.

If your farm production was high this year, you may want to wait until after January 1 to sell some of the products. This would put the income in the next year.

You may pay reasonable wages to your children for farm work actually done as long as there is a true employee-employer relationship. The children should be assigned regular responsible jobs and should be paid regularly as any other employee.

Wages paid by parents to children are not subject to social security tax until the child reaches 21 years of age. A child under 19 who is still in school or one who is enrolled in an accredited on-farm training program may earn over \$600 a year and the parents still get an exemption as a dependent so long as the parent provides more than half of the child's support.

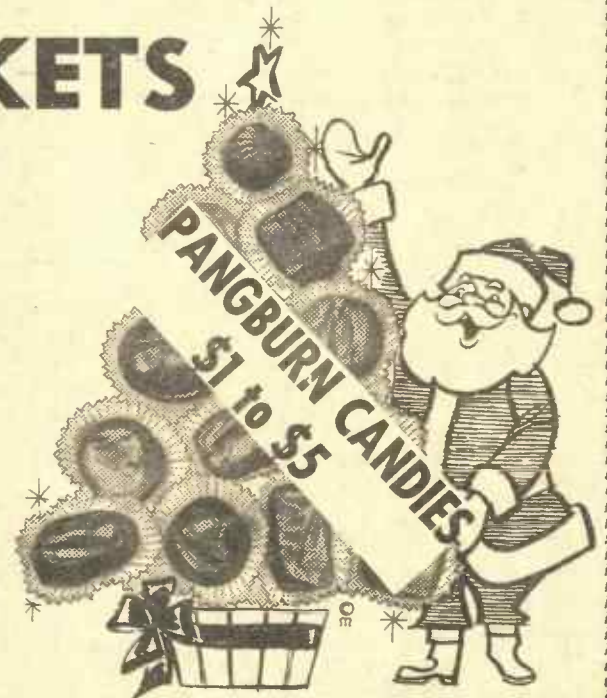
