Out-Of-State-Shoppers: BEWARE!

Information has been released to the effect
that the State Tax Commission is cracking down on
shoppers who have been buying in Memphis
and out-of-state cities. The report is that shop-
pers out-of-state stores face a personal account-
ing of their purchases covering the past five years.
The Tax Commission is looking for sales tax
on clothes and mostly on items mailed
from the Memphis stores.

It has been compiled and letters are going
out for an accounting — a mighty bad time
for a shopper for something like this to happen.
The way to avoid trouble like this is to trade at
home — keep your dollars where they
are the most good.

Commission Chairman Dexter Barr said:
"We are what one pays for a free American so-
ciety since most people want that but are dodg-
ing taxes, we are forced to do something about
it."

Barr disclosed that in 1964 the State collec-
ted \$1 billion dollars on out of state purchases to-
tal of \$1 billion dollars. He said about 25% of the
purchases were made in Memphis.

Tishomingo countians should heed this warn-
ing and do their shopping with their local stores. It
is embarrassing to some well-to-do people to
be asked to pay sales tax on purchases during the
holidays.

EXPANSION OF BLUE BELL ANNOUNCED

World's Largest Producer Of Work And Play Clothes Will Build New Addition In Belmont Immediately

Announcement is made today
that Blue Bell, Incorporated,
will expand its operations in
Tishomingo county with the
construction of a new manufac-
turing plant in Belmont.

The new plant will cost approx-
imately \$250,000 and will be a
2-story building with a total of
150,000 square floor feet of
working space.

Announcement of the expan-
sion is made jointly by Blue
Bell's L. K. Mann, vice presi-
dent in charge of manufactur-
ing, Dr. L. H. Ratliff, president
of the Belmont Chamber of
Commerce, and Belmont Mayor
Ralph Bowen.

In a meeting with Belmont
and Fifth District business and
civic leaders, Mr. Mann said,
"Our company has reached a
decision to enlarge our manu-

facturing facilities and since
we have long been in Belmont
and have realized good and con-
genial associations with the
fine people of this area, we have
reached the conclusion that
we'd like to add to our facilities
here."

Employment in the Blue Bell
Belmont Division is expected to
increase from 350 to 400 with
125 to 150 of this number being
men. Dewey Reed, superinten-
dent of the Belmont division,
states that the pressing, finish-
ing and shipping departments
will be moved to the new build-
ing.

The Belmont division consists
of plants at Tishomingo, Red
Bay and Fulton. Mr. Reed said
that these plants would increase
their sewing operations by mov-
ing all pressing to the Belmont
plant.

Tentative plans for location
of the new plant is on a 9 acre
tract of land immediately north
of Belmont on the east side of
the railroad and owned by the
Belmont Business and Profes-
sional Association. Mr. Reed
said that other sites were under
consideration but that the most
likely one is north of Belmont.

The expansion, according to
Dr. Ratliff, will be financed by
a bond issue. The Doctor said
that a definite decision has not
been reached by the Board of
Supervisors.

Construction is expected to
get underway by Feb. 15, with
occupancy date set for no later
than June 1. The building will
be of either pre-fabricated met-
al or of concrete block and mas-
onry, depending on prices sub-
mitted by bidders.

History of Blue Bell's opera-
tion in Tishomingo county dates
back to 1949 when first manu-
facturing was done in a small
building in Belmont. Blue Bell
in Tishomingo was constructed
with a BAWI bond issue in
1952, and in 1954, the plant in
Belmont was expanded. In 1958,
Blue Bell purchased a building
in Red Bay and now has a full
complement of employees in
that community.

Mr. Reid says that the Bel-
mont division has approximat-
ely 1050 employees and with the
completion of the expansion
will have over 1400 and will be
next to the largest division in
the Blue Bell corporation. It is
now in third place.

Blue Bell is a world-wide con-
cern with manufacturing plants
located in practically every
continent on the globe. "Our
sales are going faster than our
production," Mr. Reed said. In
1949, Blue Bell had \$35,000,000
in sales; in 1964, the sales were
in excess of \$112,000,000. Blue
Bell is recognized as the
world's largest manufacturer of
work and play clothes.

"We are extremely happy to
have such a fine company in
our community," Belmont's Ma-
yor Ralph Bowen said. Blue
Bell's key people have always
been interested in our civic and
governmental affairs, and the
company surely has been one of
our finest citizens. Much of
what Belmont is today is due to
this fine company being located
here. We are proud to join in
announcing the expansion of
this industry and we hasten to
add that we shall always give
every assistance that we possi-
bly can to these people who
want to create more jobs," the
Mayor concluded.

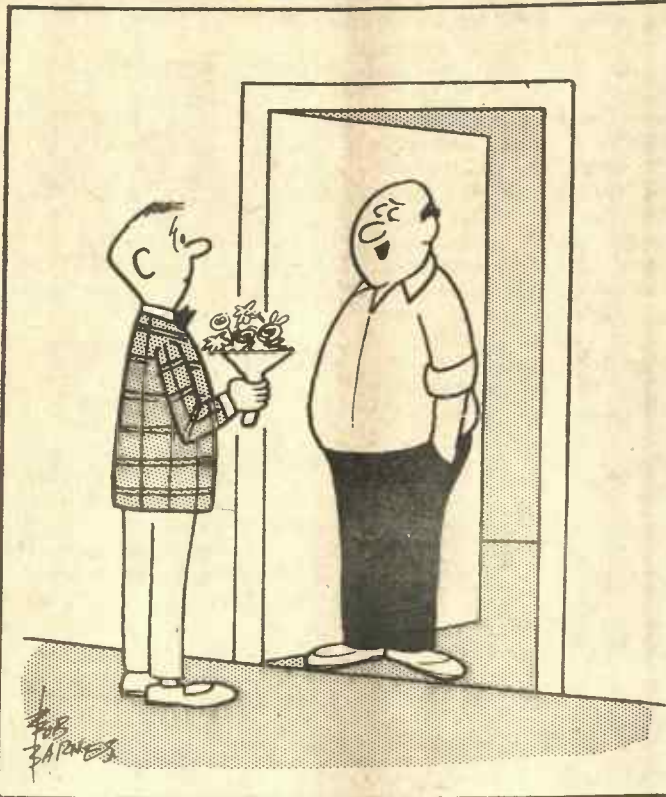

Hot and Hearty

Combine vegetable soup with tomato juice and heat until bubbling hot. Serve with buttered croutons.

Shape small meat balls out of ground beef and fry until brown. Add this with cooked whole kernel corn to beef-noodle soup for a satisfying soup main dish.

Pour canned chili with or without beans into a casserole, edge with hot cooked rice and heat in oven. If desired, sprinkle with grated American cheese.

Cream hard-cooked egg with mushrooms and serve over waffles for a hearty luncheon or supper.

Canned beans and ground beef in barbecue sauce make a wonderful stuffing for green peppers which have been seeded and par-boiled. When filled sprinkle with processed American cheese and bake until hot.

Add a tablespoon of ginger marmalade to leftover chicken in gravy, heat and serve over biscuits.

1 can (10 1/4 ounces) frozen condensed cream of potato soup

1/2 soup can milk

1/2 soup can water

1/4 cup shredded carrot

Soils And Men

by Hiram A. Jones
Work Unit Conservationist

Regardless of the Space Age,
and the astonishing achieve-
ments made in this field, man
is a creature bound to the soils
of the planet earth.

Man depends on the land. . .
and, when one stops to think
about it, the land, in a sense,
depends on the man.

In most instances, the man
who treats his land correctly
will have good land. If he mis-

treats the soil, allows it to erode
away and starves it of plant
food and minerals, his soil will
be poor. The high acre yields of
cotton, corn, hay and pasture
experienced by a number of
landowners of the area proves
that these particular men are
good farmers. They are giving
their land good treatment and
the soil is responding.

LOGGING

Only in one area are we put-
ting the practice of logging in-
to use. Our woodlands could be
better. Some landowners are do-
ing an excellent job with their
woodland, but many are not. It
is hoped that during the Calen-
dar Year of 1966, more Soil Con-
servation District cooperators
will apply needed practices to
their woodland.

Most of the land in Tishomin-
go County is in woods. Certain-
ly this is proper use of the land;
but are we getting the growth
and the income we should be
getting from our woodland. If
not, we are challenged to do
better.

ASCS News

Cotton farmers of Tishomin-
go County will be making
choices on the acreage of cotton
they will plant on their farms
under the new farm bill.

There are some very impor-
tant dates that cotton farmers
will be interested in. December
31, 1965 will be the final date a
cotton farmer may lease or sell
cotton acreage for 1966. Any
cotton farmer in Tishomingo
County who is not going to
plant his cotton allotment may
lease it to his neighbor for cash
or he may give it to him and
this acreage can be transferred
to the neighbor farm, also he
may sell his cotton allotment

to another farmer and have it
transferred to that farm. Any
transaction of this kind must be
done at the County Agricultural
Stabilization and Conservation
Office in Iuka. Also you must
remember this transfer of ac-
reage must be done by Decem-
ber 31, 1965. After this date no
transfers will be made.

The new Farm Program is de-
signed to reduce cotton ocreage
on a voluntary basis. All cotton
farmers will be paid direct pay-
ments, in the form of price sup-
port and diversion payment to
reduce their acreage. These
payments are as follows:

Price Support on 65% of the
farm allotment or 9.42c per lb.
times the farm projected yield
and also a diversion payment of
10.5c per pound times the pro-
jected yield for the acreage
you take out of production.

The farmer may choose whe-
ther he will divert (take out)
12.5%, 25% or 35% of his farm
allotment. The minimum acre-
age you may reduce (divert) is
12.5% and the maximum am-
ount you can reduce is 35%.

Payment to cotton farmers in
Tishomingo County will range
from \$18.84 to \$94.20 per acre
on price support and \$21.00 to
\$105.00 per acre on diversion
(or acres taken out). All pay-
ments will be based on each in-
dividual farm projected yield.
Farm projected yields will be,
mailed to all cotton farmers by
the end of this week. When you
receive the notice of your yield
you should contact the Agricul-
tural Stabilization Conservation
Office in Iuka or the County A-
gent, Percie B. Stricklen, or any
of his staff and let us explain
the program to you so you can
choose which plan you will take
that is, whether you will reduce
your cotton acreage by 12.5%,
25%, or 35%. Every cotton far-
mer must make a choice and
sign up with the ASCS Office
between the dates of February

1. 1965, through March 25, 1966.
Any farmer who fails to sign
up by the closing date March
25, 1966 will not receive any
payment.

All farmers with a cotton al-
lotment of 10 acres and below
will receive bonus payments for
reducing acreage. This is very
attractive and you should check
on this soon. Any cotton farmer
who has a cotton allotment of
10.1 acres to approximately 14.0
acres should find out at once
how the program operates, you
might want to lease acreage and
transfer to another farm in the
county down to 10 acres and re-

ceive this bonus payment.
Remember if you are interest-
ed in leasing or selling cotton
acreage, it must be done by De-
cember 31, 1965.
