Inventory Time

Most businesses at this season of year take time out to determine an inventory of merchandise on hand to ascertain whether or not a profit or loss was made during the year past and for tax purposes.

In a like manner, we think it fitting that we take a "community inventory" to note the progress made and to see whether or not there are more assets than were on hand a year ago.

We believe the first assets to be counted should be the expansions of Blue Bell, Inc., in Belmont, and the Winfield Manufacturing Company at Golden. With these two plant enlargements in the Fifth District, we believe the assets of the county and area have been greatly increased and many, many people will derive benefits from the payroll dollars that are to be paid out in future years.

While industrial expansions were in the making in the Fifth District, enlargements of other facilities in various parts of the county were also going on. Announcement was made of the formation of the Golden Water District in which a system is created that will serve over 100 families with running water under pressure in their homes. And while civic leaders in Golden were working out plans for their water system, the same thing was going on in Burnsville, where a \$150,000.00 bond issue was passed to create a public water supply. Since water was an important subject in Tishomingo County in 1965, Iuka also saw improvement in its water system with many miles of new lines being laid and an entirely new sewage disposal system put into use.

Among other main assets created in 1965 was the construction of the Sears warehouse on highway 25 in Iuka from which Sears-Roebuck distributes shirts to all parts of the world.

Additional facilities for caring for the health of residents of the area were provided with new assets in expansion of the Tishomingo county hospital and opening of the new Tishomingo County Health Department near the hospital. New gymnasiums were built at the Burnsville, Belmont and Iuka schools and a new football field was opened at the Iuka school.

Religion in the county came in for a fair share of added assets with the completion of the beautiful new Liberty Church of Christ at Dennis, the starting of the massive new Baptist Church in Iuka and the rebuilding of the Mt. Gilead Baptist Church after it was destroyed by fire.

And another item that added greatly to the assets of the county was the building of the new Tishomingo county fair grounds.

While all these public assets were coming into being, meetings were held and the first plans made to build a riverport on the Yellow Creek embayment of Pickwick lake. This project is in the making and the year 1966 should see advancement of the overall plans started in 1965 for this facility that will decrease freight rates in the area.

Many private businesses in the county made changes, improvements and expansions during 1965. Among them were: opening of the drive-in branch of the Iuka Guaranty Bank at the intersection of highways 72 and 25 in Iuka, and the opening of the Burnsville branch of the First National Bank of Iuka. Cornelius Lumber company opened a new business on highway 25 south, Paul Nichols opened a new coin-operated launderette on Eastport Street and Huffman's Cafeteria opened for business on highway 72-W.

A new gimmick, coin-operated car wash opened with a service station combined, and the new "Season's Four" flower shop opened late in the year for business.

Jim Kirk bought the Texaco service station from Noel Monroe, Harold Enlow bought the Iuka Department store from the E. E. Murrah's, and Jack Suddath came in as manager at Vail & Baddour's replacing Travis McGaughy. The Iuka Flower Shop got located in a new building and Mrs. Alois D. McCune came back to her old location in the Ledbetter building west of Iuka.

The Lucy-Fae Shop had a general remodeling, the Westbrook children's shop was added at the W. S. Brown store. And The Vidette and Belmont Tri-County News went to offset printing.

Among personalities in the news: Harold Lomenick and Larry Parker were named to the all-star football team for the Highland Conference, Charlie Counce was elected president of the state association of the Future Business Leaders of America and W. E. Ludlam was named Iuka's outstanding man of the year.

With this massive array of accomplishments in new assets, all created and done in Tishomingo county in 1965, we believe that few other counties our size in population and economic potential can match them.

We challenge every resident of Tishomingo County to "think BIG" and plan now to do more, so that 1966 will show a greater gain in assets.

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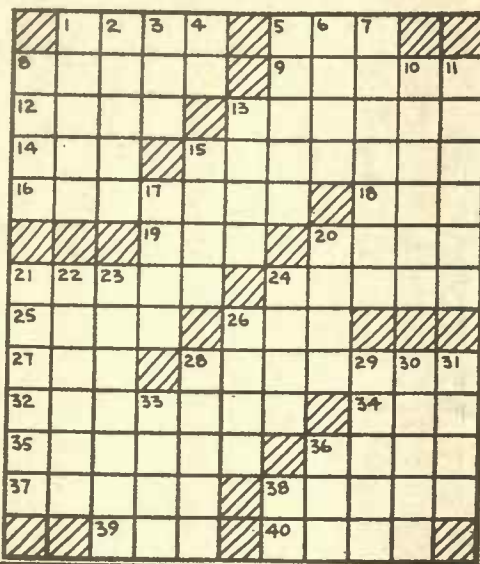
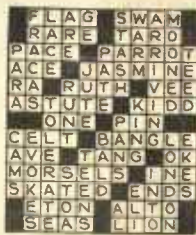

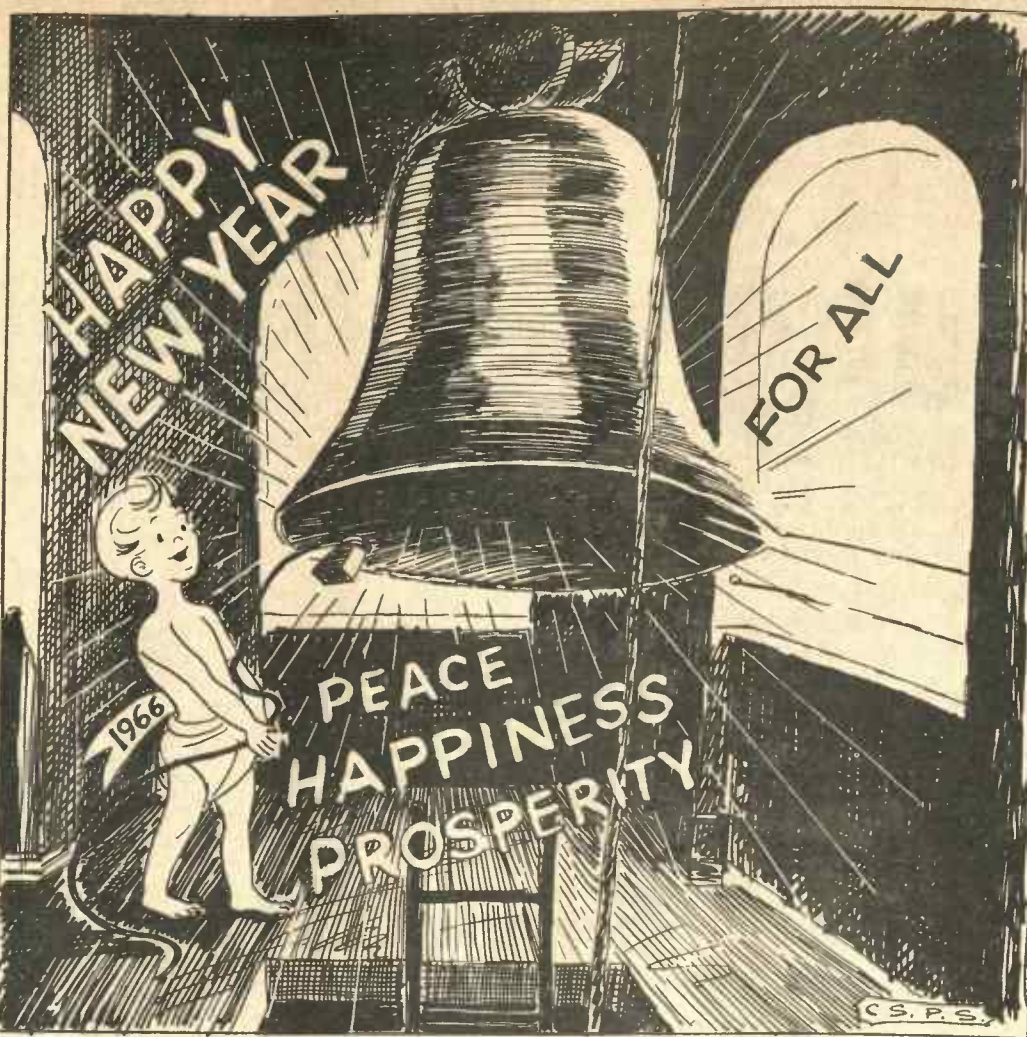

THE GOLDEN YEARS

WIDOW PUTS \$100 A MONTH INTO A NEW LEASE ON LIFE

She was 69, and a widow. Her children were married and far away. Old friends were passing from the scene.

Her health was failing, and as she tried to cope with her loneliness and the old home her husband had left her she was largely unnoticed.

In a period of five months this widow has made over her life, apparently regained her health, and is now virtually a queen who is referred to as "Miss Bless-You."

She did it by spending a little of her money.

Miss Bless-You, whose actual name is Mrs. W. R. Blessing, changed her life without planning to. Her existence had finally become so miserable that, in complete resignation, she sold her house and moved into a small retirement home where she could be taken care of.

She made a \$7,500 down-payment to the home under a plan which required her to pay a further \$94 a month for life care. Lifetime income left to her by her husband was sufficient for that. Money from the sale of her house and from her husband's savings took care of the \$7,500 down-payment and there was \$18,000 left.

Mrs. Blessing, once she was settled in the home, started giving the \$18,000 away to the 51 other residents at the rate of \$100 a month.

This is how a friend describes the development:

"She came into the home with all of her small personal possessions — jewelry, handkerchiefs, scarves, etc. She began passing

some of these to other woman residents as gifts.

"The reaction of the women, most of whom had virtually nothing, was surprising to Mrs. Blessing. And very gratifying. She continued giving, and as her personal items diminished she began ordering small gifts from the stores . . ."

Out of all this Mrs. Blessing got the idea of establishing a monthly "Gift Day" at the home. She set it for the 12th day of each month, which was the date of the month her husband died. She decided to buy \$100 worth of gifts for each "Gift Day." She figured that to continue this for five years would cost her a third of her savings, or \$6,000, and in the process she would have given out more than 3,000 gifts if she lived that long.

"She worked out an unusual plan," the friend continues. "Each month she would give 45 residents a \$1 gift, then would choose six gifts with the remaining \$55 for special cases in the home. She made arrangements with a department store to send a clerk to her room once a month with gift suggestions . . ."

Miss Bless-You made her first distribution of "Gift Day" presents from her bed in her room. She made the second by riding down the halls in her wheel chair. She made the third by walking from room to room.

She has 51 people praying for her health.

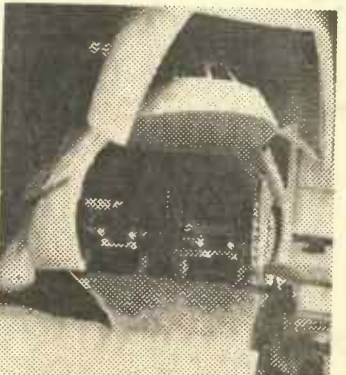
RESOLUTIONS

FAMILY POT LUCK

Special Garnishes

Someone in the family prefer pie to cake? Serve it for the birthday or special dinner, placing candles in holders on top of the pie, just as with cake.

Use a dipper for placing small scoops of sherbet to float on top of punch to make it especially festive. For instance, a combination of cranberry punch and gingerale takes nicely to lemon or pineapple sherbet.

For that sweet tidbit, melt in top of double boiler 2 packages (6 ounces each) semi-sweet chocolate pieces, then stir in 4 cups wheat flakes. Drop by spoonfuls onto waxed paper; let dry in refrigerator. This makes about 36 tidbits or "cookies."

For different potato chips, sprinkle with onion salt or grated cheese, heat and eat!

Wrap sticks of American cheese in dried beef, fasten with a wooden pick and broil until cheese melts slightly. Serve hot on the picks.

Supper Spread

(Serves 6-8)

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons fat
- 1 can chicken gumbo soup
- 2 tablespoons catsup
- 2 tablespoons prepared mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Brown meat and onion in fat, cooking until onion is golden. Pour off drippings. Add remaining ingredients and simmer over low heat for about 20 to 25 minutes. Serve on hamburger buns.

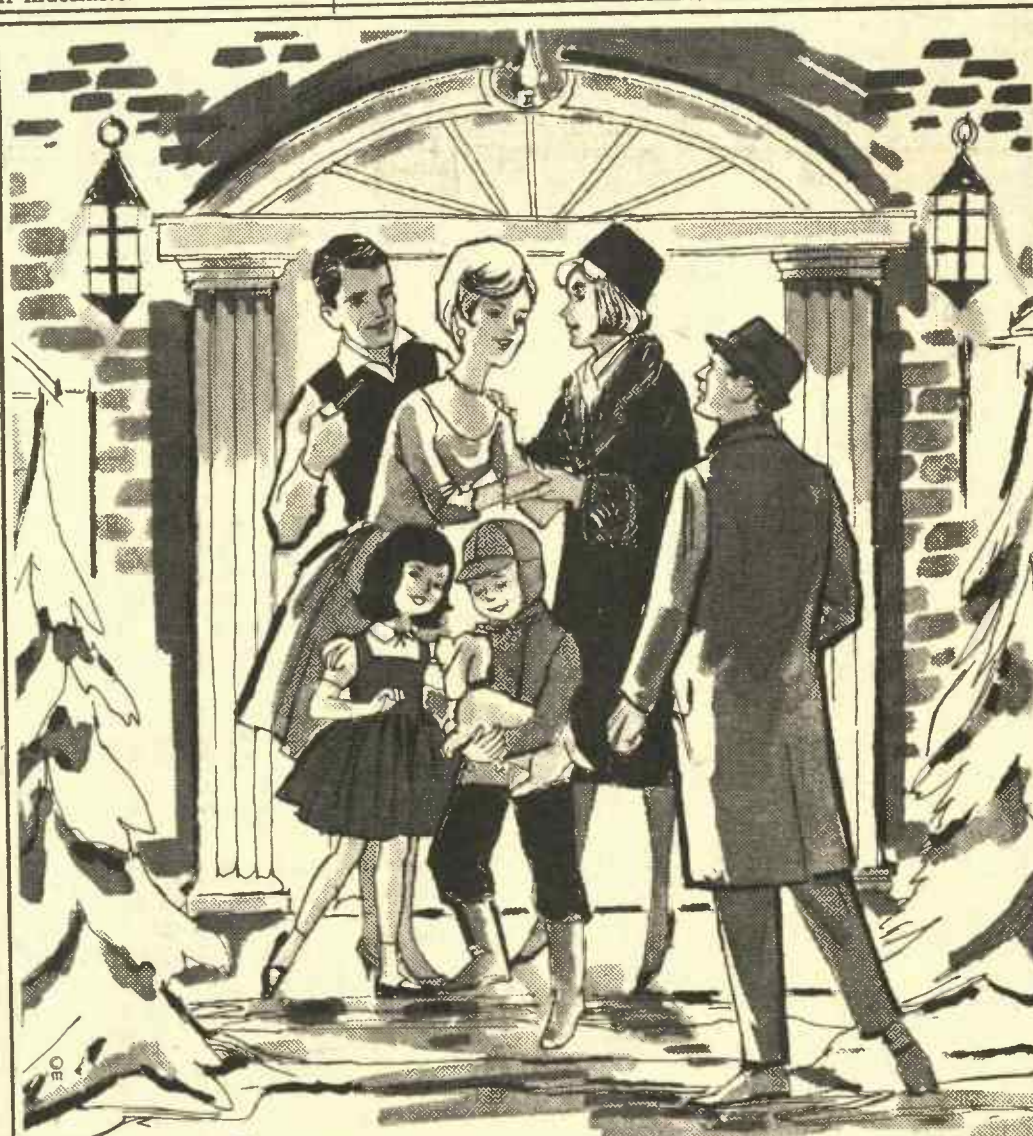

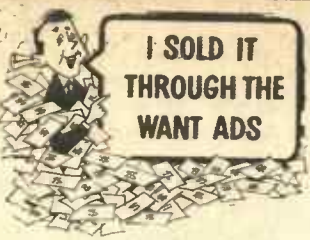

Next Saturday, we begin a brand New Year. Old calendars will be taken down and new ones for 1966 will be put up. Most of us will have some difficulty in dating checks, bills and letters. We will still want to date them 1965. After Friday, 1965 will be gone.

It is time for all of us to look ahead. If mistakes were made in 1965, let us try not to make these same mistakes in the New Year.

Now is the time to apply needed practices to the land to keep our soil good and our landscape beautiful. This is the time to do things we should have done and could have done last year but we neglected to do it.

We have all the land we will ever have. We had better take care of it. The year 1966 is a good time to do a better job of soil and water conservation.

MORE PROFIT

Everybody knows that we must have more profit from farming. The way to get it is to lower production costs and to increase yields!

Fertilization and weed control are two of the most important practices to use in increasing profits and cutting costs.

But with a high fertilization program, there must also be a liming program—on most farms in the state.

We'll never reach our goal of 1.5 billion dollars in farm income by 1975 if we try to do it on low lime land. This just won't work!

Start now and lime all land that has a pH of below 5. This will make it possible to get full benefit from fertilizer applied next year. The time to apply the lime is any time trucks can get over the fields — like now!

To find out for sure whether or not your land needs lime, have your soil tested.

FERTILIZER PLACEMENT

The most effective placement of fertilizer for row crops is in the band. This improves the efficiency of all fertilizer nutrients, especially phosphate.

Band placement is especially important on soils that test low in phosphate and potash.

There is a trend among some farmers to broadcast application of mixed fertilizers. This improves the efficiency of all fertilizer nutrients, especially phosphate.

There is a trend among some farmers to broadcast application of mixed fertilizers. This does have some advantages where P and K levels are low or above. Here are the advantages:

It increases the speed of application; custom services are usually available for application; less equipment is needed for fertilizer application; it reduces interference with other jobs during rush seasons, and there is a reduced chance of injury to plants.

When fertilizer is broadcast, rates should be increased. Increase nitrogen by 20 per cent on mixed clay or heavy clay soils. Increase potash and phosphate by 50 per cent on all soils except those testing very low. On these soils, double the rate.

MOVE BROOMSEDGE

If you have a lot of broomsedge on your pastures, the pastures are not going to return much profit. Move it out. Replace it with good grasses and legumes.

Right now is the time to start the broomsedge on the way out. Do it by applying lime and fertilizer. Lime and fertilizer can be applied and left on top of the ground and still get full benefit.

If you want to do a faster, but a bit more costly, job of moving the broomsedge, apply lime and fertilizer then plow it under. Next Spring reseed the pasture or set Coastal bermuda sprigs.

What most women probably need most is a plan for housekeeping. Haphazard methods accomplish so much less in so much more time!

In addition to organizing work, you also need the right equipment. Are your mops and brushes and sponges the right size and shape. Are the handles long enough to let you work in a relaxed position. Do you carry two pails with suds and rinse water when one 2-section pail would serve the purpose. Do you mop up spills and splashes as soon as they occur to prevent stains and accidents. Do you make good use of your washer before slipcovers and curtains get so soiled that it becomes a major project to get them clean.

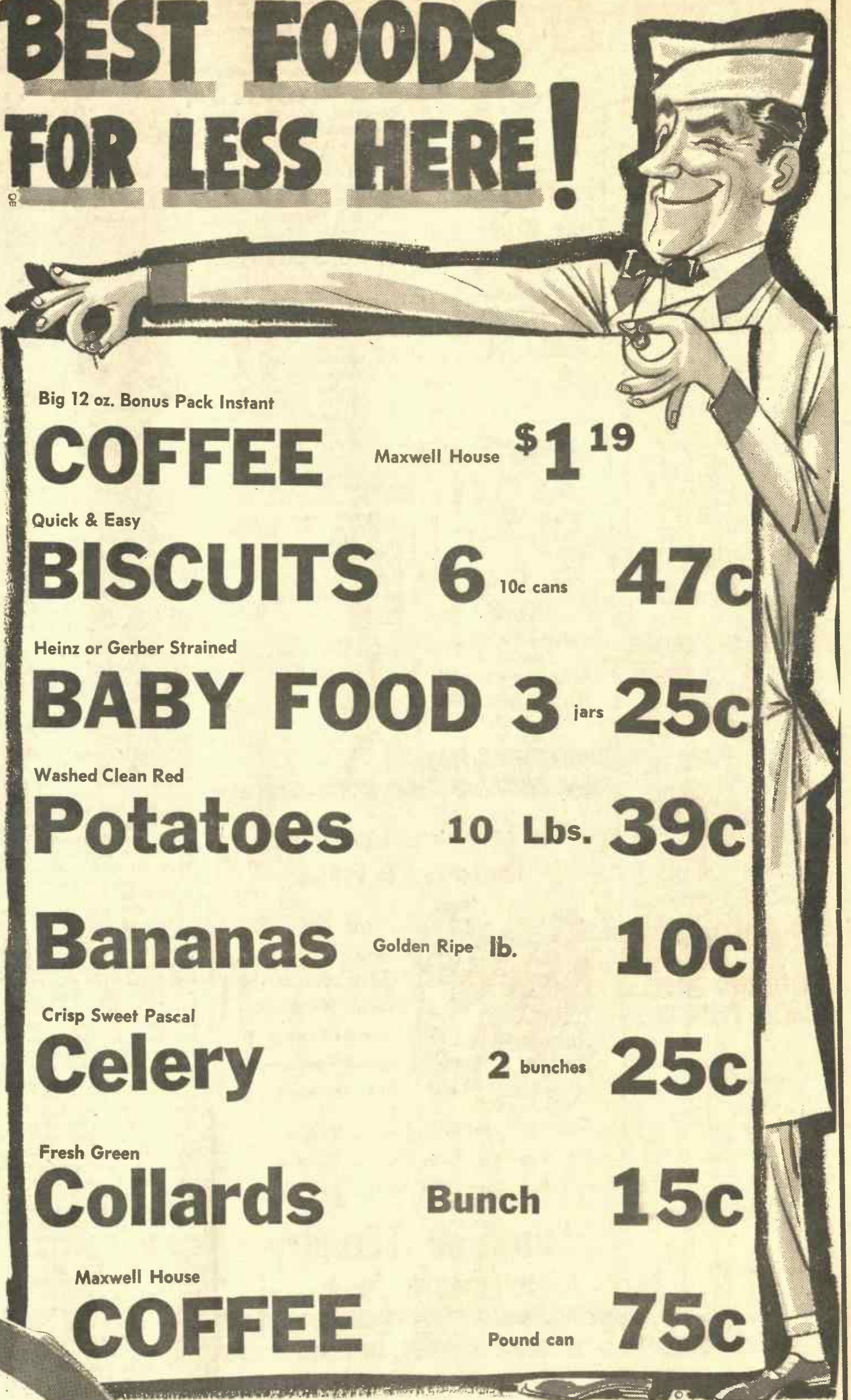

Just how far they will go depends a great deal on the efforts of a 5' 5", 14 year old freshman by the name of Laticia Berryman.
