Notes Of Home Economist

During these days when the children are in and out of the kitchen for meals and snacks, you may decide that your kitchen needs a bar or a counter to serve as an eating area.

If you plan such an addition, remember you should allow 20

inches for leg room at a bar or counter. The counter space should, of course, be wider. You will want to have the counter 30 inches high, if you plan to use a standard chair. Allow at least 21 inches elbow room for each person.

Fresh-Cooked Vegetables

If Dad and the children have been complaining about warmed over vegetables, here is more strength for their arguments against them. Vegetables cooked one day, then reheated and served the next, lose some of their food value.

The vitamin C losses are especially noticeable. Vegetables will have only three-fourths as much vitamin C after one day in the refrigerator as when freshly cooked, according to nutritionists.

After two days, the vitamin C content drops to two-thirds. And after three days, it's down to one half or less of its original value.

To get top nutritive value from your vegetables, prepare them daily.

Slow Moving Vehicle Emblem
As you and the children tra-

vel about the country-side during the summertime, be on the watch for the bright triangular Slow Moving Vehicle Emblem.

This emblem was designed specifically to identify slow moving vehicles, as tractors, trailers and other farm and highway machinery. Tests have shown that it can be seen and identified at 500 feet or more under practically all driving conditions — day, dusk and night.

The emblem is made of fluorescent yellow-orange, the most visible color in daylight, and reflective red material that is highly visible in headlight beams at night.

These emblems are easy to mount, are not expensive and are durable. They are available in this county. Ask at your Extension agents' office for more information on where you can obtain the emblem.

Summertime Favorite Ice Cream

Ice Cream is a summertime favorite for desserts and snacks. You can keep a supply on hand in the freezing compartment of your refrigerator for 2 to 3 weeks. You can store satisfacto-

rily in your home freezer for 2 months. To make the ice cream from your freezer soft enough to serve, put the carton in the refrigerator for not more than 30 minutes. This is long enough to make it soft, but not long enough for the ice cream to melt.

When you put the carton back in the freezer, press a piece of foil or plastic wrap over the exposed surface before you replace the top to the carton. This covering will keep out refrigerator odors and prevent a hard crust and crystals from forming.

July Meetings

Here is a list of some meetings that you may want to attend. At each, you will get some real timely management information:

At Mississippi State University, July 14 will be an Agricultural Engineering Field Day. It will highlight "Soil and Water Conservation Research for Agriculture."

The summer meeting of the Mississippi Section of the American Society of Agronomy will take place July 21 at the Coastal Plains Branch Experiment Station at Newton. More information on "1.5 by '75" will be a highlight.

The annual Junior Hereford field day will be held at the N-Bar Ranch near Shuqualak on July 20.

At Mississippi State University on July 26 will be a beef cattle clinic, featuring Dr. Jon Bonsma of the University of Pretoria in South Africa. He is well known for his ability to detect reproductive efficiency of beef cattle by visual appraisal.

Cotton Insect Control

Ultra-low volume applications, whether by ground or air, are not recommended in Mississippi this year. When sufficient research has been completed, the

use of low volume applications will be considered by the state committee.

Only malathion has received a Federal label to be used as a special concentration in ultra low volume, less than one gallon per acre.

If you use insecticides in concentrates in small amounts that do not have Federal registration, there are possibilities of excess residues and they could be phytotoxic to the cotton plants.

Cocklebur in Soybeans

You can control cocklebur in soybeans with an amine salt formulation of 2,4-DB, sold as Butoxone SB and Butyrac 175. Apply it as a broadcast spray over the top of the crop at 2 (two tenths) pounds active material per acre in 10 to 20 gallons of water.

Treat from two weeks before early bloom until mid-bloom. Best control is obtained when cocklebur plants have elongated and are as tall or taller than the soybeans.

Do not use the material when soybeans are growing in very dry soil or water-logged soil. You should apply 2,4-DB only to soybeans and cockleburs that are growing vigorously.

Herbicides may be used on land which is not planted to row crops in order to maintain small dragline ditches. 2,4-DB properly applied will kill most wooded vegetation that grows on the ditch banks. This should be eliminated since it tends to fill the ditch up and therefore defeat its purpose.

Information on herbicides to use may be obtained from the County Agricultural Agent.

However there is one big Don't. Do Not use herbicides near row crops. Certain chemicals will kill cotton and other row crops.

The wise landowner will recognize the great value of the use of herbicides, applied correctly to receive the most effectiveness in maintaining small drag-line ditches.

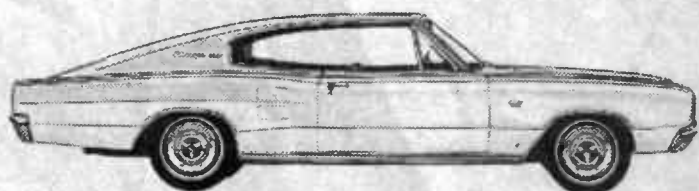

AN ORDINANCE CREATING A PLANNING COMMISSION, PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT AND TERMS OF OFFICE OF THE MEMBERS THEREOF, DEFINING THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF SAID COMMISSION, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH AND DECLARING DATE OF EFFECT.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI:

SECTION 1. PLANNING COMMISSION CREATED. There is hereby created a Planning Commission of the City of Iuka, Mississippi. Said Commission shall be composed of eight members, all of whom shall be residents of the City of Iuka, nominated by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. The Mayor and City Engineer shall be ex-officio members of the Commission. Each appointed member shall hold office for a period of three years, or until his successor takes office, except that in the first instance one third (1/3) shall be appointed for three years, one third (1/3) for two years, and one-third (1/3) for one year. The appointed members of said Commission shall be nominated and appointed solely with reference to their fitness and without reference to party affiliation and shall serve without compensation. Members may be removed by the Mayor or the City Council only for inefficiency, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in office. Vacancies occurring otherwise than through the expiration of term shall be filled only for the unexpired term by the Mayor with confirmation by the City Council. Ex-officio members shall receive no compensation for their work on the Planning Commission other than the fixed salary of their office.

SECTION 2. QUORUM. Five members of the Planning Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; providing, however, that no action shall be taken which is binding upon said Planning Commission unless concurred in by not less than a majority of all members comprising the Planning Commission.

SECTION 3. ORGANIZATION AND RULES. The Commission shall elect a chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary and may create and fill such other offices as it may deem necessary. The term of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary shall be one year with eligibility for re-election. The Planning Commission shall hold at least one regular meeting each month. The Planning Commission shall adopt rules for the transaction of business and shall keep a record of its regulations, transactions, findings and determinations, which record shall be a public record.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CITY PLANNING STUDIES

That the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board be, and is hereby, requested to assist the City of Iuka, Mississippi, in obtaining federal funds to supplement monies to be budgeted by this City for such planning work for the fiscal year 1966; and that the City of Iuka, Mississippi through duly authorized officers, enter into a contract with the said Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board for the development of a comprehensive city plan by some competent agency in the field of city planning, which agency shall be mutually agreeable to both parties to such contract, such planning work to be performed under the administration and supervision of the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board.
