Bldg. Code Adopted By City Board

Septic Tank Inspection Ordered

A series of ordinances affect-
ing the building of buildings
and related constructions in the
city of Iuka have been passed by
the Mayor and Board of Alder-
men.

Of far-reaching effect will be
the ordinance creating a build-
ing code for the City. The
Board adopted the "Southern
Standard Building Code" which
relates to any construction, re-
construction or other work of
a building nature within the
corporate limits of the city. In-
cluded in the code is plumbing.

Mayor George Wm. Cutshall
states that reason for the build-
ing code is for the protection of
property owners and to insure
a higher standard workmanship
and higher quality of materials
in new structures within the
city. The Mayor further stated
that, in order to reduce the in-
surance rates in the city, adop-
tion of the building code was
mandatory by the State Ratings
Bureau.

Among other ordinances pass-
ed by the Mayor and Board of
Aldermen is an ordinance re-
quiring that all persons con-
structing a septic tank must
have the facility inspected by
the State Health Department be-
fore putting the septic tank in-
to use.

Violation of either of the
two ordinances shall be a mis-
demeanor and shall be punish-
able by either a jail sentence or
a fine.

Shelby Counce Chosen For New Position Recently

Shelby Counce, former resi-
dent of Iuka, has been promoted
to co-ordinator of instruction of
the Memphis School System.

The director of secondary ed-
ucation accepted the newly cre-
ated post which raised his sal-
ary from \$12,288 annually to
\$15,000. The announcement was
made by E. C. Stimbert, Super-
intendent of Schools.

In a recent interview by Clay-
ton Braddock, Mr. Counce said
his new post will allow an over-
all look at the citywide school
program, grades 1-12 with a spe-
cial effort on the junior high
grades beginning in the fall.

"I plan to appoint a commit-
tee of principals to completely
study the junior high program,
focusing on the different tran-
sition from elementary to jun-
ior high grades," he stated.

Local Guard Unit Leaves Sunday For Encampment

7,000 To Participate In Annual Summer Training For Dixie Divs.

Sixty-eight men of Company
"C", 2nd Battalion, 155th Infan-
try in Iuka will leave Sunday
morning for Camp Shelby, Miss.,
for the annual summer field
training of the 31st Infantry Di-
vision, July 17-31.

According to Sgt. Waco Par-
sons the 15-day training period
will be the third consecutive
year that the entire "Dixie" Di-
vision has trained together as

a single unit at the National
Guard training facility at Camp
Shelby.

Sgt. Parsons states that roll
Call Sunday morning will be
held promptly at 2:30 and the
group will depart at 3:30 a.m.

The approximately 7,000 of-
ficers and men attending sum-
mer training will participate in
exercises pertaining to their
various branches — Infantry,
Armor and Artillery — while
undergoing tests from the squad
to battalion level and fire wea-
pons organic to today's combat
soldier.

A highlight of the field train-
ing will be demonstrations and
instruction of the principles and
techniques of counter guerrilla
warfare with emphasis on les-
sons learned by US troops in
Viet Nam.

Eighty-eight hours of actual
training will be scheduled for
the two-week program.

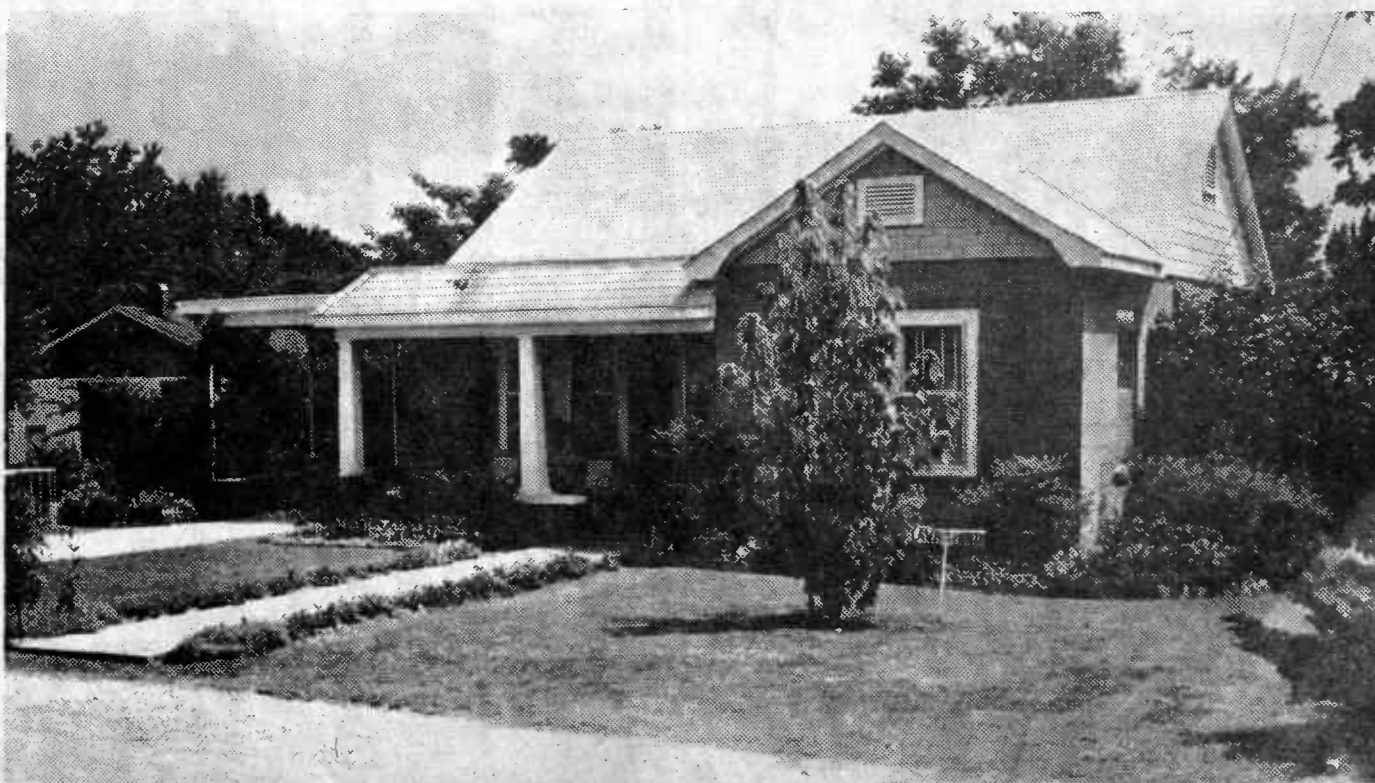

Local Home Buyers Eye Costlier Houses

With the prime home-buying season at hand and with many Tishomingo County families in the market, the question arises: How much can they afford to spend?

The kind of home a family can afford to buy depends upon various factors, but especially upon income. That is what sets the limit on the purchase price and on the monthly carrying costs.

How much may the average Tishomingo County family, with average local earnings, safely spend for a house?

The experts say the cost should not be much more than twice annual income, before taxes, for those in the middle brackets. The ratio varies somewhat for those in the lower brackets as well as for families with high incomes.

As for the monthly expenses for taxes, mortgage and insurance, they should not add up to more than one week's wages, after taxes.

The recommendations come from the American Bankers Association and the Federal Housing Administration.

Using their scale, the average-income family locally can afford a house costing about \$9,200. The controlling factor is its gross income of \$4,510 which includes, frequently, the earnings of two or more members of the household.

This is a bigger investment than families in many other parts of the country could consider, under the guidelines, because their incomes are lower.

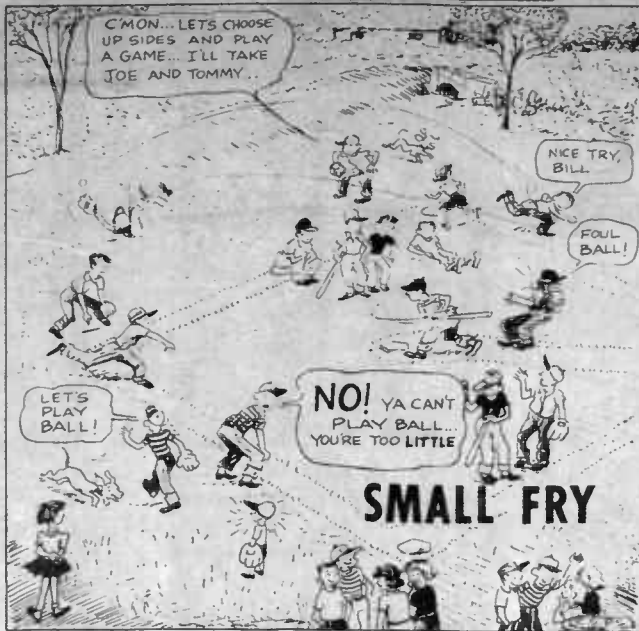
Tishomingo County families with above-average incomes available to them usually spend considerably more for their homes but require smaller proportions of their income for the purpose.

Those in the \$15,000-a-year bracket, before taxes, may go as high as \$30,500 for a home, under the formula, and those earning \$5,500, as high as \$11,150.

FHA officials point out that there are great differences, even within a particular income bracket, in how much a family can afford to spend for a home.

A couple with no dependents, for example, can spend more money than one with several children to educate and an elderly parent to support.

As to current housing costs, prospective home buyers are finding that prices are somewhat higher than a year ago. Inflation has had its effect, apparently, on the housing market.

'Win' Policy Essential

U. S. aerial attacks against communist oil depots near Hanoi and Haiphong, North Viet Nam, were a long overdue response to increasing communist aggression against South Viet Nam.

It is fortunate for the U. S. that President Johnson disregarded the fear and smear campaign waged by Democratic Senators J. W. Fulbright and Wayne Morse, who have endeavored to present the American Republic as a warmonger. The bombing raids on the communist heartland were necessary to prevent a further acceleration of American and allied casualties. Had the air raids been conducted months ago, the lives of many Americans would have been saved. Fuel from North Viet Nam has enabled communists to truck great quantities of war material and reinforcements to South Viet Nam.

While the President is to be congratulated on making the right decision in the interest of U. S. security, the public should not forget that it was the conservative wings of both political parties that have urged stepped-up warfare against communist aggressors in Asia. The conservatives initially advanced the idea of the air raids, and the conservatives prepared the public for stern action.

Indeed leading conservatives in both parties have worked day and night for years to convince the American people and government that a "win" policy is essential if the communist threat to U. S. security ever is to be ended. It has been a terrific struggle to counter the defeat-

ism and appeasement of the "no win" theorists. The struggle is not yet over.

Mr. Johnson rightly declared in a speech at Omaha, Neb., that American fighting men won't fail this nation; the danger is that the people at home will fail to support an essential struggle.

Much of the influential intelligentsia in the universities, one is sad to say, are full of haste to accept a settlement with communism — a settlement that amounts to surrender to the foes of liberty.

The aerial attacks on Hanoi and Haiphong mark only the beginning of what is needed. Conservative leaders also have pointed to the importance of blockading the ports of North Viet Nam and striking at the dike system on the Red River — a system vital to North Viet Nam's economy.

Nor can the American people ignore the increasing danger of Red China becoming a nuclear threat to the United States. Unless Red China is curbed now,

the U. S. may discover two, three or five years hence that it is menaced by Peking madmen who will have no hesitancy to launch atomic rockets at the United States. The Chinese, if anything are even more fanatical than the Russians in their belief that they can destroy the capitalist world — the strongest nation of which is the United States.

Some naive people in the United States imagine that the cold war is over. They think that permanent peace can be achieved by admitting Peking into the United Nations organization and talking with the Chinese. For several years, the U. S. has held talks with the Red Chinese, at the ambassadorial level, in Warsaw, Poland. But nothing has come of these talks. The communists regard negotiation only as a route to victory. If they entered the U. N., they certainly would use it as a base for subversion of the United States as well as a means of dividing and paralyzing the West.

Many liberals say that the U. S. can't contain Red China. But that kind of defeatism makes no sense. Containing a plague is difficult, but it also is possible. Communism is the worst plague ever to strike the world. It contains the germs of intellectual and moral disease that condemn men to lives of slavery and cruelty.

The kind of free enterprise system the U. S. possesses, a system which creates the conditions for personal liberty and community prosperity, cannot survive in a world that constantly gives in before the advancing forces of communism. The truth is that communism has to be stopped. The U. S. has to win a cold war victory if the American way of life is to survive and flourish. This is the central fact that all Americans must understand in viewing the news from Viet Nam.

Vacation Care

You can make a small "greenhouse" to keep your houseplants humid and healthy while you're on vacation. Simply tie a plastic sheet or bag over your plants and fasten it securely to the sides of the clay pot. Soak the entire plant and clay pot in water before fastening the plastic cover. This method should keep your plants moist for two or three weeks.

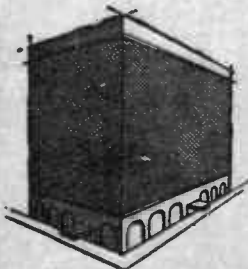

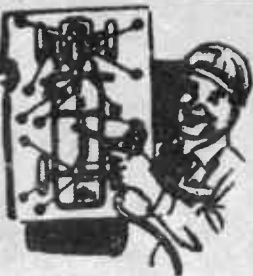

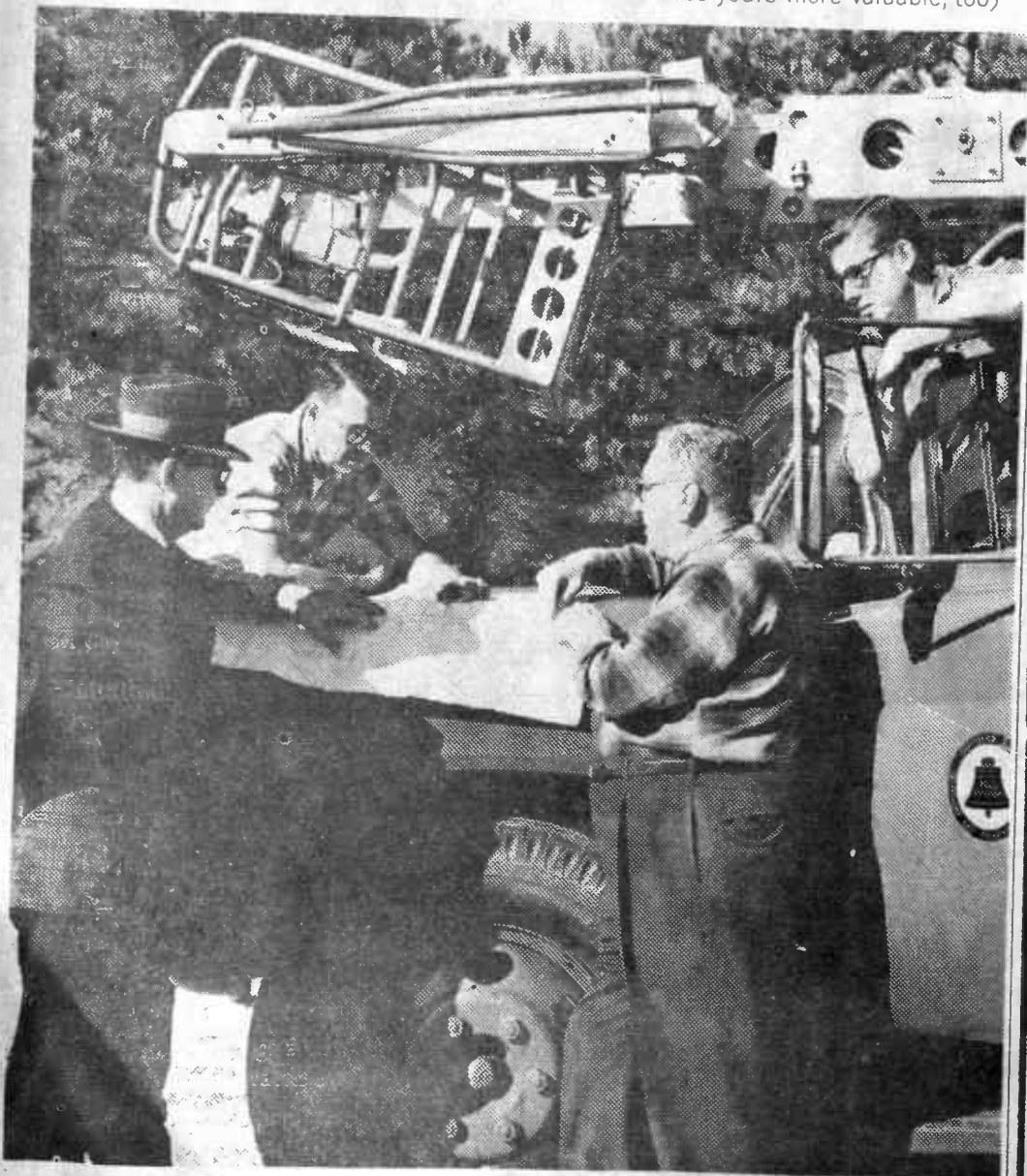

in the near future. All this
brings to mind the ever chang-
ing situation of conference at-
tachment in sports. Most of us
can recall when the only prep
conferences in the neighborhood
were the Big Eight and the
Little Ten. Then in the early
fifties the Tombigbee entered
the scene. A decade later the
Highland came along and this
year the Tippamingo will enter
the scene.

All these conferences were
the direct result of schools ad-
ding football to their program.
And since these conferences
began, there has been several
changes from one league to an-
other. Tupelo and Corinth were
originally in the Little Ten and
stepped in the Big Eight. Gren-
ada was in the Little Ten till
a few years back and then
switched to the Delta Valley.
Okolona checked out of the

Little Ten into the Tombigbee
and Bruce joined the Little Ten
after years as an independent.
Iuka was originally in the Tom-
bigbee but elected to go with
the Highland at its formation.
Vardaman was in the Tombig-
bee but went to the Big Black.
And the turn over continues.

Several reasons for all the
changing can be cited. The
main one is the ability to com-
pete. The perennial weaker
clubs in any conference are al-
ways hunting for greener pas-
tures. Another factor involved
is geographical location. Travel
is always a factor, and it is
hard to build interest in a club
that you know little about. An-
other factor is the continual ad-
dition of football to so many of
the school's programs. The Tip-
pamingo is a direct result of
this factor.

Look for even more changes
in the future in conference
structure. The Highland can ex-
pect to lose two or more schools
in the next few years due to con-
solidation. The Tippamingo will
grow in the next few years due

to the same reason and added
activity.

A good soil and water conser-
vation plant worth considering
by landowners in Tishomingo
County is Arrowleaf Clover.

This re-seeding annual clover
was introduced in Italy in 1956.
Since that time this clover has
been under observation and in
test programs in Mississippi,
Alabama and Georgia.

A number of field trial plant-

ings have been made from N.
Mississippi to S. Mississippi and
it appears that this plant is suit-
ed to a wide range of soils. It
does best on well-drained soils.

In the spring of 1965, D. Paul
Adams planted Arrowleaf Clo-
ver on his farm north of Iuka
near the mouth of the Indian
Creek. On May 7th it measured
over knee high.

Under favorable conditions Ar-
rowleaf Clover produces up to
four (4) tons of hay per acre.
It is a good soil and water con-
servation practice worth think-
ing about.

Notes Of Home Economist

It's true, isn't it, that wherever a woman lives — whether it's an apartment, a dormitory room, a trailer or a house — she makes a home. And whether she is married or not. Since this is true, young women need to be as well-prepared for homemaking as for a job as a secretary or teacher. No conscientious girl expects an employer to hire her if she has not made an effort to be skillful at her job, yet too many girls think they can be home makers "by ear." The best place to learn the art of homemaking is in home, by sharing tasks of housecleaning, laundering and cooking as well as marketing, budgeting and entertaining. So mother don't say "it's easier to do it myself than to get Mary Jane to help me." Get her started early on the road to learning to be a skillful homemaker.

Banana Popsicles. See how the children like banana popsicles for a summer treat. To make them, cut firm, ripe bananas in half crosswise. Insert a popsicle stick into the cut surface. Roll bananas in honey until well-coated, then roll in chopped salted peanuts. Place on cookie sheet and freeze until solid. Store in covered freezer container until serving time.

Clean Gloves
Once you have rinsed the suds out of your fabric gloves, try re-shaping them under running warm water. Let the water flow through each glove to inflate the fingers and hand cavities. The water pressure will smooth the fabric and straighten the fingers so you need not finger-press them after they drip-dry.

Use Your Refrigerator
You can help the summertime strain off your refrigerator just by following a few points of advice. At the same time you will be helping the refrigerator to do a better job. Is your refrigerator level? Check and be sure. It matters

in its performance. Don't open the door more than necessary. And don't slam the door. It's hard to overload a refrigerator, but it's possible and to be avoided for best performance. Dry off foods before you put them in the refrigerator. Let foods cool before you store them. Store foods in the correct place — meats in the coldest part of the refrigerator, vegetables in the storage drawers. Set yourself a regular schedule for defrosting. Clean often as needed.

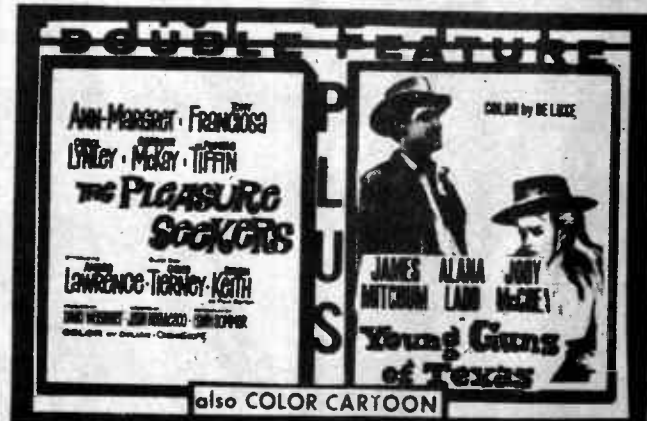

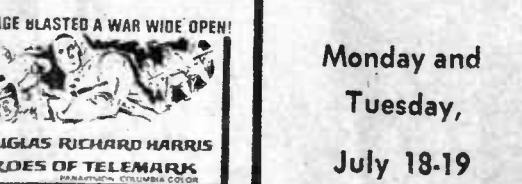
