Shooting Near Alabama Line Early Wednesday

Leroy Hodge, 27-year-old negro, was shot and killed early Wednesday morning by his father, Elmer Hodge, 48, just west of the Alabama line in Tishomingo County, 300 yards north of the Cosby Road.

The victim was shot in the upper groin with slugs from a 12 gauge shotgun.

Investigation by Sheriff James H. Bishop and county law authorities revealed that Leroy Hodge was a passenger with Jessie Mae Hodge, 25-year-old wife of Elmer Hodge; Rena Mae Bennett, 43-year-old woman and G. C. Haley, 42-year-old male—all negroes—in the Haley car.

The shooting occurred in the back seat of the '58 Pontiac when Elmer Hodge came upon them from the back after tracking them on foot for several miles.

The body was carried to Thompson & Sons Funeral Home in Tusculumbia, Alabama, by Bruce Thompson.

Contract Let To Improve Salem Road

Frederick of Iuka Are Low Bidders

The State Aid Road Division has announced its approval of a contract awarded on July 6 by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, providing for the improvement of the Mississippi 25-Salem Church Road. The announcement was made by Frank T. Moore, State Aid Engineer.

The contract, designated as Project No. SAP 71 (15), provides for 2.176 miles of base and double bituminous surface treatment, and was awarded to D. F. and H. W. Frederick of Iuka, the low bidder, in the amount of \$33,911.87.

Worsham Brothers of Corinth, and Bowyer & Johnson Construction Company of Jackson, Tennessee, also submitted bids on this project.

The project is located in Supervisor A. C. Ryan's district. Engineering supervision will be handled by T. O. Mabry, Jr., County Engineer.

SENSING THE NEWS

INTOLERABLE STRIFE

Addressing the 19th annual convention of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters in Miami recently, President James R. Hoffa denounced newspapermen, radio and television, saying that they "put out filth and lies in your papers." Actually, of course, if Jimmy Hoffa had anything good to say for the news media, the media would have to wonder where they went astray. For Hoffa is a symbol of all that is wrong with the union movement in the United States.

Perhaps Hoffa calls it "filth," but the fact is that he has been convicted on charges of mail fraud and jury tampering — and the news media have so recorded. Indeed if Jimmy Hoffa goes to jail, it will be in good measure because determined reporters and courageous editors have dug out the story of Hoffa's activities.

The Hoffa story is by no means finished, however. If the boss of the Teamsters goes to jail, there is the possibility that he may attempt to run the union from a jail cell through a president who is a front man. This would be a matter of real concern to the American people, for the Teamsters Union holds a powerful grip on American commerce.

Teamster ambitions to tighten that grip also were revealed by Hoffa at the Miami meeting. He called for common expiration dates of all union contracts, saying that the only answer labor can give "is to combine the strength of all the various unions." In these remarks is the implied threat of a general strike, which is a weapon against the overwhelming majority of people in this country. Labor organization is allowed under law, but it would quickly become intolerable if small groups or organized, militant labor extremists attempted to paralyze the business life of the United States.

In Medieval times, robber barons roamed the highways and byways of Europe. People were not free to travel and do business except as they paid tribute to these robber barons. The Hoffas of the United States pose a similar threat. They would

hold up the commerce of a great nation except as business paid tribute to union officials. Labor unions have no such mandate under the laws or customs of America. The general strike is the ultimate weapon of a ruthless organization devoted to civic paralysis. Even if a strike is not general in character, when it is conducted on a wide scale through a single form of activity — as in the case of a maritime strike — it threatens the well-being and safety of the entire public. This summer we have seen what the shipping strike did to Great Britain. If ever there was a crime against the public, it was this strike that cost an economically weak nation loss of foreign exchange — its vital life blood.

The time has come when no free country — certainly not the United States — can afford to have a handful of labor bosses strike a savage blow at the nation's economy.

Speaking at Miami, Hoffa said that in all communities outside highly industrialized metropolitan cities it is already "impossible to win a strike because management has aligned itself with the newspapers, TV, radio, the courts, and the police and can break the union's strikes."

It is simply not true that the forces of responsibility and law and order can overwhelm the forces of union disorder. Every responsible voice in New York City has been shocked and dismayed at the newspaper strike, which deprives the people of needed news and business of the vital advertising medium. Nevertheless, the unionists prevailed. There is perhaps — one certainly would hope so — a growing consensus among thoughtful citizens that old-style, roughshod unionism has no place in a free, productive economy. The thought among such citizens is that economic paralysis, through the action of a handful of willful and often lawless men, cannot be tolerated. Every time Jimmy Hoffa publicly reveals his arrogant, brutal policy towards the public, the days come closer when Big Unionism will be curbed by public action.

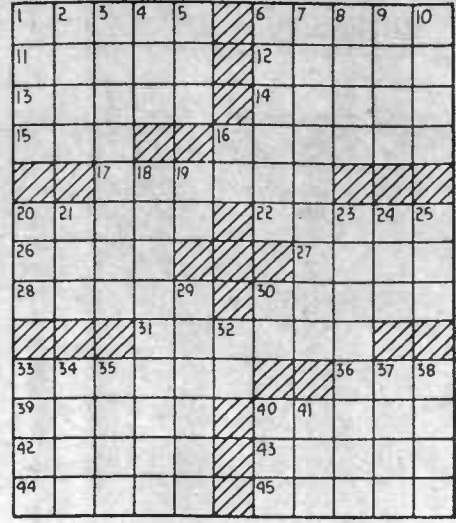

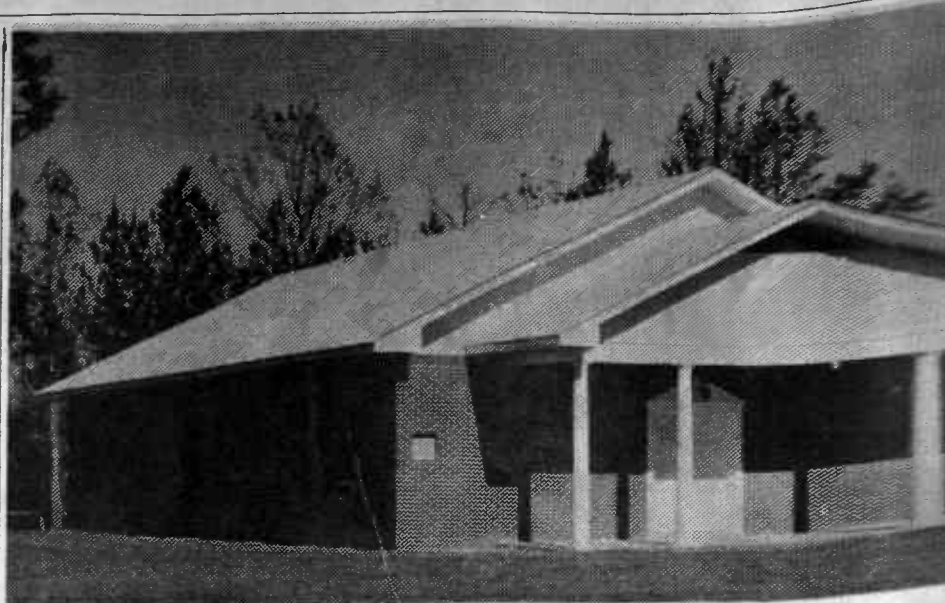

SUPER EDMONDSON MARKET

Old Newspaper Reveals Life In Busy Town Of Eastport In 1854

"The North Mississippi Union" a weekly newspaper printed when Eastport, Mississippi was a busy, thriving town on the Tennessee River, gives some interesting facts about the people and the atmosphere in which they lived in 1854.

The newspaper, in photostat form, was brought home to what is now Eastport by Ben Kitchens, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bryce Kitchens of Eastport Dock. Ben is a med student at the University of Mississippi Medical

School in Jackson. He discovered the paper while doing research for one of his courses and he brought the photostatic copy to his parents.

This particular edition was printed May 20, 1854 by the editor and publisher, M. G. Lewis. The subscription rate for one year was \$3.00.

At that time the market showed cotton selling at 4½c to 7½c, bacon, 7c to 9c a pound, star candles 28c, Rio coffee 14c, corn 75c a bushel, flour \$9 a barrel,

lard 10c, sugar 6c to 8c, mackerel \$20 a barrel, nails 8½c a pound, powder \$6.50, squirrel shot \$2.25, and buckshot \$2.75.

H. A. Brown had just received a new steamer shipment of fall and winter stock goods. The selection was good because it had been picked out by the owner himself. It sold 'very low' for cash or cotton.

It was noted that M. F. Word had been elected constable of Eastport on the previous Thursday and that the Tennessee River had risen several feet.

According to a Masonic Notice, at a regular meeting of the Eastport Lodge No. 94, held at their Hall on the evening of April 13, 1954, it was unanimously resolved that A. B. Emberson be expelled for 'gross unmasonic conduct.'

John Johnson of Eastport offered a \$100 reward for the recovery of two slaves named Jack and Manus. The description stated "Jack is about 45 years old, can read and is a preacher; very black. About 5' 10" with the end of one of his forefingers off. His right collar bone was recently broken and nearly

well when he left. Manus is a copper-colored man of 33 years, full 6 feet; quick spoken, slight speech impediment. Both boys intelligent and well acquainted with Tennessee, Ohio and Mississippi Rivers."

"The North Mississippi Union", in four pages, gave schedules of steamships leaving, their names, rates and cargo. In addition were numerous advertisements printed by druggists selling such wares as "essence of tar" and numerous other cures. There were also notices printed by doctors assuring the public 'expert services' if they would bring them their business. Hotels, and Town Houses also gave their rates for travelers who arrived daily.

Other news was concerned with speeches made in Congress and editorial comments pertaining to the state of the nation, rather than of local interest.

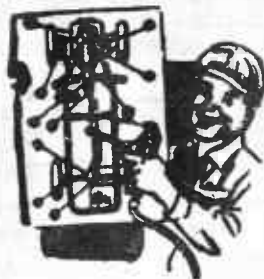
