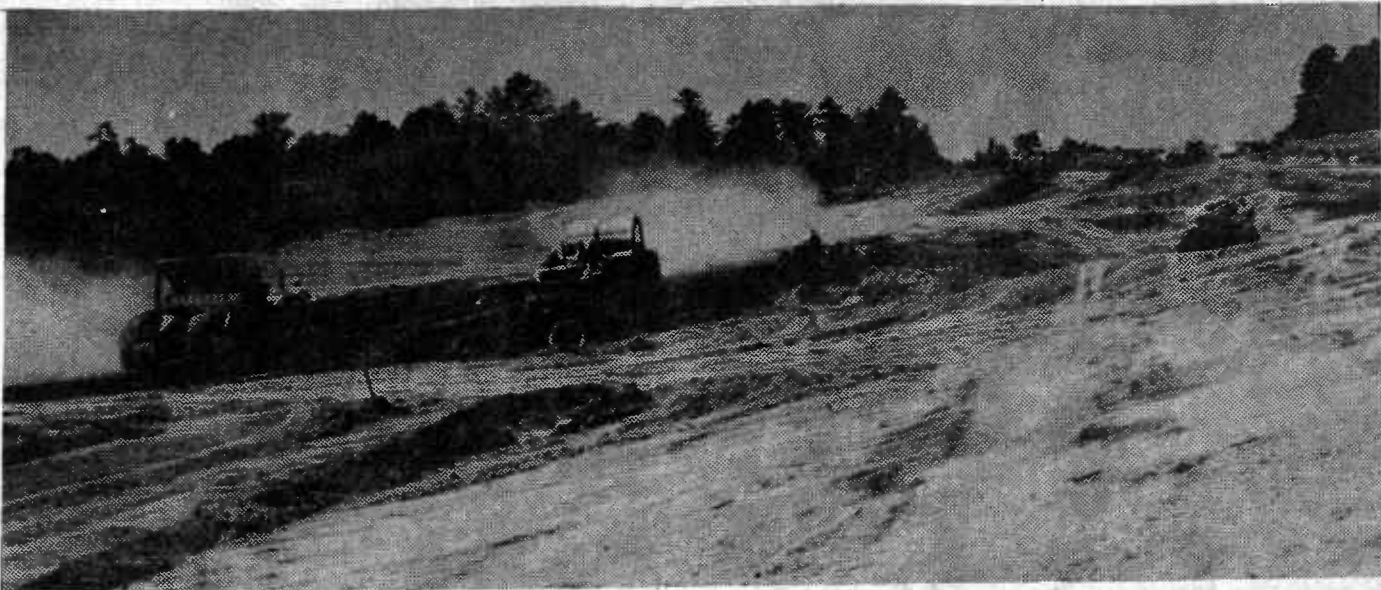

Tishomingo County To Be Represented In Big Game

**R. Thorne & B. Tidwell To Coach;
Larry Durham With All Stars**

Tishomingo county will be well represented at Jackson this Saturday when they play the Mississippi High School All-Star games. They will play the basketball games on Saturday afternoon and the football contest will follow on Saturday night. On Saturday afternoon there will be a coach-player combination from Tishomingo county in the round-ball game. Coach Billy Tidwell of Tishomingo and Larry Durham, his All-Stater for two years running, will be involved in the contest. Tidwell will serve as one of the

North coaches while Durham, who has inked a contract with the Northeast Mississippi Junior College Tigers, will be on the North All-Star squad. Durham will be on a squad that includes Tupelo's 6-7 Johnny Guyton, 6-8 Tom Butler of Meridian and Tom Mauney of Alcorn Central among others.

Tidwell will be serving with Ken Fortenberry of Neshoba Central as the two North coaches. This is Tidwell's first All-Star coaching situation and it comes on the heels of an outstanding record from his last year's team.

On Saturday night at the Mississippi Memorial Stadium they will play the All-Star football game and one of the coaches on the North squad will be Richard Thorne, the head coach for Iuka's Chieftains.

Coach Thorne has compiled an amazing 28-1 record in the last three years and this merits recognition in the expert's book. Coach Thorne will serve as one of three assistants for the North team.

They will play the girls basketball game at 1:30 P. M. and the boys game will follow for those fans of you who plan to make the trip. And if you want to stay over and watch the gridiron action it will get underway at 8:00 P. M. Would advise you to get there early for the basketball games for a good seat. Don't figure any will be turned away, however, since they will play it in the 10,000 seat Mississippi Coliseum. The football contest will have room for some 50,000 fans.

It is quite an honor for these two coaches and young Durham to be associated with the All-Star contests. This is a privilege reserved only for the elite. So Tishomingo county, more specifically Tishomingo and Iuka High Schools, can be justly proud of those who represent them.

Here's hoping that all of those who will participate will come home with the taste of victory. And even if this should elude them, there is the satisfaction that comes from the knowledge that you have had the honor. That counts, too.

Tree Seedlings Being Offered To Landowners

Fourteen species of tree seedlings are now being offered to Mississippi landowners by the Mississippi Forestry Commission for the 1966-67 planting season, according to Tishomingo County Area Forester, B. K. Killebrew.

The Forestry Commission began taking orders for seedlings on July 1. The sale continues until October 15. Shipment of seedlings will begin about December 15, with orders being filled on a first-come-first serve basis.

Area Forester Killebrew said that the following species are available: Loblolly, Slash, Longleaf and Shortleaf Pines; small amounts of Yellow Poplar, Sweetgum, Sycamore, Baldcypress, Black Locust, Green Ash, Red Cedar, Cherrybark Oak, Nuttall Oak and Cottonwood.

Airport Is Nearing Completion

\$100,000 Construction Should Be In Use In Very Near Future

A beehive of activity is taking place southeast of town where construction is well underway on the new Iuka Airport. The new facilities are located approximately 2 miles from the city limits on the old airport road.

Runways and taxi strips are being brought to life by giant machinery as they mold the land into shape in preparation for the paving which will begin within the next month. Construction work was started in mid-May by Bowyer & Johnson of Jackson, Tennessee.

Funds in the amount of \$100,000.00 were allocated for the building of the airport. According to Auston Curtis, chief of the Iuka Airport Commission, the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Districts furnished \$40,000.00; the city of Iuka, \$2,000.00; and the State, \$8,000.00.

The Federal Aviation Agency matched these funds with \$50,000.00 which make a total of \$100,000.00 to be used in the construction.

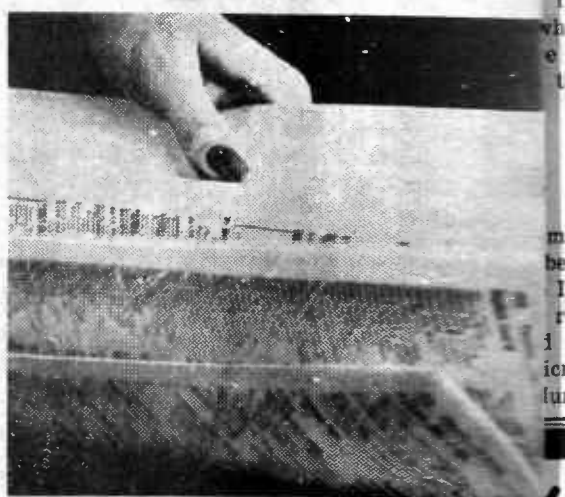

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE NEGOTIABLE NOTES OF THE SAID CITY IN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COST OF IMPROVING STREETS IN SAID CITY.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, having made due investigation, find, determine, and declare that it is necessary to improve streets in said City; that the estimated cost thereof is Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000); and that there are at this time no funds available in the treasury of said City for the payment of such costs; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and advisable and in the public interest that the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) required for the aforesaid purpose be obtained through the issuance of notes of said City as hereinafter proposed; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said City do further find and declare that the assessed valuation of taxable property within said City of Iuka, according to the last completed assessment, is One Million Four Hundred Eighty Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$1,418,035.50) and that the total general obligation bonded indebtedness exclusive of Water Works Bonds of said City at this time is Fifty Two Thousand Dollars (\$52,000); and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued, namely Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), when added to the aforesaid outstanding indebtedness of said City will not exceed ten per centum (10%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said City; and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued does not exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) or five per centum (5%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said City; and

WHEREAS, the amount of said notes, when added to the aforesaid outstanding indebtedness, including outstanding general obligation water works bonds in the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), and will not exceed fifteen per centum (15%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Iuka has not, within a period of twelve (12) months from the date of this resolution, heretofore issued bonds or notes without an election, under the provisions of Section 7, Chapter 493, Laws of Mississippi 1950:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, do hereby declare their intention to issue notes of said City in the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to raise money for the purpose of paying the cost of improving streets in said City.

SECTION 2. That the issuance of the said notes will be authorized at a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said City to be held at the City Hall in the City of Iuka, Mississippi, at the hour of 7:30 P. M. on Friday, the 8th day of July, 1966, unless twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said City shall file a written protest against the issuance of said notes on or before said date and hour.

SECTION 3. That notice be hereby given that a written protest against the issuance of said notes may be filed with the City Clerk of the City of Iuka at or prior to the above named date and hour, and that if such protest be filed and signed by twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said City, then an election on the question of the issuance of said notes shall be called and held as is provided by law. If no such protest be filed, the said notes may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance of said notes.

SECTION 4. That the City Clerk be and she is hereby authorized and directed to cause this resolution to be published in The Vidette, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Iuka and which is eligible under the provisions of Chapter 427, Laws of Mississippi, 1948, and that the said resolution be so published once a week for at least three consecutive weeks, the first publication to be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date fixed for the issuance of said notes and the last publication to be not more than seven (7) days prior to said date.

Alderman Charles Daugherty seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and, the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

Alderman T. E. Curtis voted Yes
Alderman Johnny Biggs voted Yes
Alderman Charles Daugherty voted Yes
Alderman R. K. Thorne (absent)

The motion having received the affirmative vote of all the members of the Board of Aldermen present, the Mayor declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted, this 19th day of July, 1966.

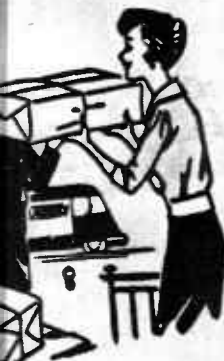

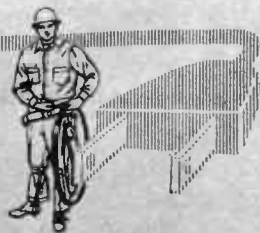
