Fifth St. Baptist Church To Begin Revival Soon

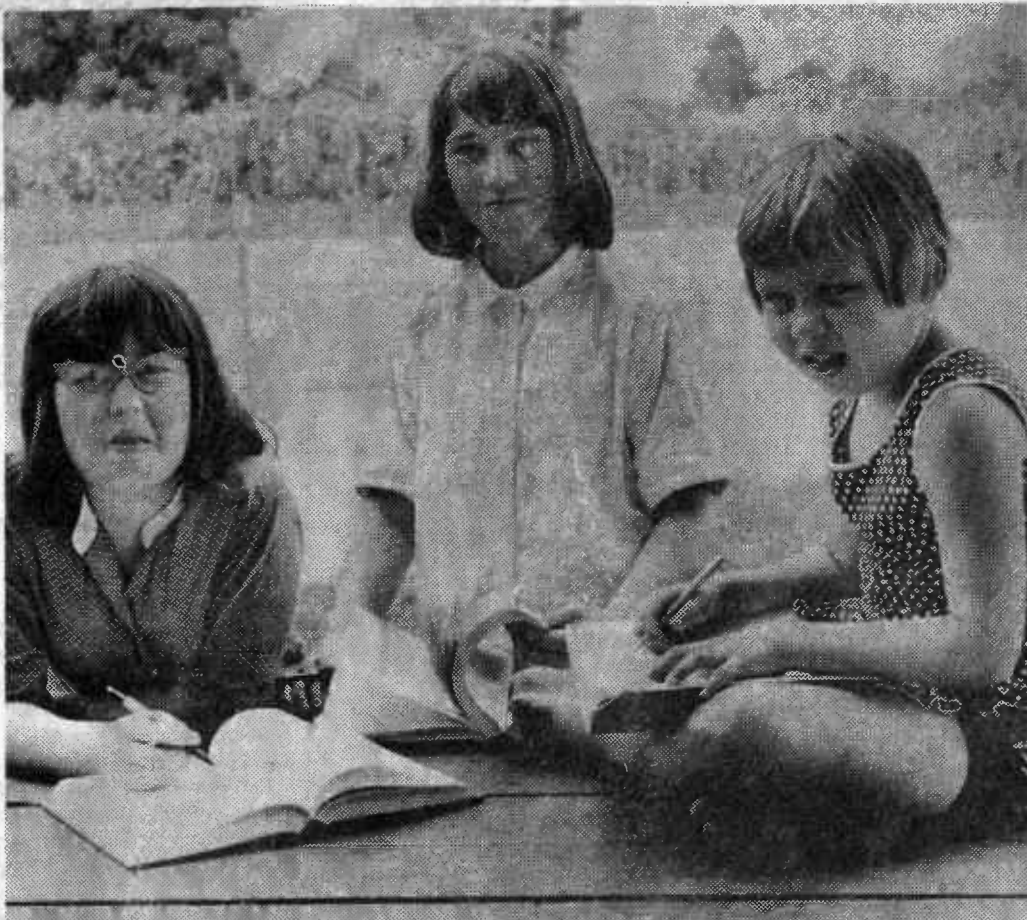

Countians are preparing for the Fourteenth Annual Tishomingo County Fair and Livestock Show which opens August 29 at the fairgrounds in Iuka.

This will mark the first birthday of the new fairgrounds which were opened to the public for last summer's event. Since that time the Women's Building, the main building of grounds, has proven to be a valuable meeting house for all sorts of county-wide and area functions.

The latest addition to the fair grounds is the fence-enclosed outside arena with bleachers. The annual Tishomingo County Fair Horse Show will be held in the arena as well as several other of the night events planned.

According to extension workers, there are a number of Fair Catalogs available to the public at the offices in the Farm Co-Op Building.

Three Men Arrested Here In Copper Wire Theft

Out On Bond Awaiting Preliminary
Hearing Scheduled For August 8

Three men have been arrested and charged with stealing copper wire from the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association lines. They are Carol Ed Sanders, Sammy Gibson and Kenneth Larry Bunyard, all of Iuka.

According to Sheriff James H. Bishop, a preliminary hearing has been set for Monday, August 8.

The theft was revealed Friday July 9 by the power association

following a thorough investigation by Sam Allen's Investigative Service of Tupelo.

W. J. Brinkley, general manager and Ben F. McRae, assistant manager, stated that the association has suffered a loss of approximately \$4,000 which includes the loss of the wire and the labor and cost of re-installation. The association serves all of Tishomingo County and parts of Alcorn, Prentiss and Itawamba. The loss involved the theft of wire principally in Tishomingo County.

The investigation revealed that approximately 10,000 feet of wire was cut from operating transmission lines on or about July 19, in an area south of Iuka and near Tishomingo. On July 23, Sam Allen — retired Special Agent of the FBI and formerly of Iuka — and Elmer L. Adkins, of the Sheffield, Alabama Police Department, located approximately 471 pounds of copper wire at Reid's Salvage in Sheffield.

Information was furnished that the copper wire had been sold to the salvage company by an unknown individual from Iuka.

Mr. Brinkley, Mr. McRae and Mr. Allen complimented area officers for the "splendid cooperation in this case."

Those assisting, in addition to those already mentioned, were Robert Skinner, deputy sheriff of Iuka; the Highway Safety Patrol of both Iuka and Belmont; special agent of the GM & N Railroad; and the police department of Tishomingo.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, TO ISSUE NEGOTIABLE NOTES OF THE SAID CITY IN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) TO RAISE MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE COST OF IMPROVING STREETS IN SAID CITY.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, having made due investigation, find, determine, and declare that it is necessary to improve streets in said City; that the estimated cost thereof is Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000); and that there are at this time no funds available in the treasury of said City for the payment of such costs; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary and advisable in the public

interest that the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) required for the aforesaid purpose be obtained through the issuance of notes of said City as hereinafter proposed; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said City do further find and declare that the assessed valuation of taxable property within said City of Iuka, according to the last completed assessment, is One Million Four Hundred Eighteen Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$1,418,035.50) and that the total general obligation bonded indebtedness exclusive of Water Works Bonds of said City at this time is Fifty Two Thousand Dollars (\$52,000); and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued, namely Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), when added to the aforesaid outstanding indebtedness of said City will not exceed ten per centum (10%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said City; and

WHEREAS, the amount of notes hereinafter proposed to be issued does not exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) or five per centum (5%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation of taxable property within said City; and

WHEREAS, the amount of said notes, when added to the aforesaid outstanding indebtedness, including outstanding general obligation water works bonds in the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), will not exceed fifteen per centum (15%) of the aforesaid assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Iuka has not, within a period of twelve (12) months from the date of this resolution, heretofore issued bonds or notes without an election, under the provisions of Section 7, Chapter 493, Laws of Mississippi 1950:

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF IUKA, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Iuka, Mississippi, do hereby declare their intention to issue notes of said City in the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to raise money for the purpose of paying the cost of improving streets in said City.

SECTION 2. That the issuance of the said notes will be authorized at a meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of said City to be held at the City Hall in the City of Iuka, Mississippi, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock P.M. on Friday, the 26th day of August, 1966, unless twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said City shall file a written protest against the issuance of said notes on or before said

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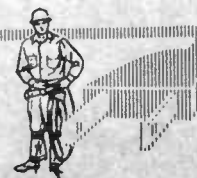

Winfield Mfg. Plant Shows Marked Growth

In Operation 2 Years At Golden School Location; B. Martin, Mgr.

Winfield Manufacturing Company in Golden will be starting its third year beginning August 17. The plant opened in 1964 with 33 men and women of the 5th District employed. The company is owned and operated by Milton Weinstein of Birmingham, Alabama and manufactures

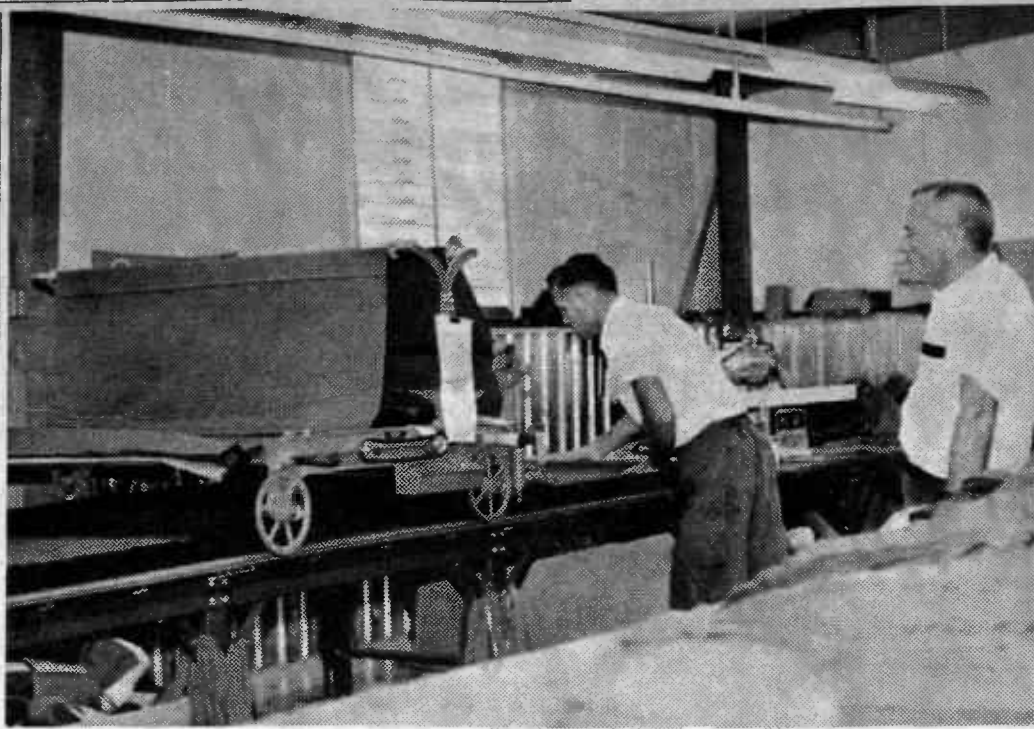
utility-type clothing for the government.

Billy Martin, general manager and a native of the 5th District, notes that after only 6 months of operation the payroll had advanced to the \$30,000 mark with a total employment rise to 145.

Now, going into its third year of business, the employment number has reached just over 400 and a vacation period was observed during the first of July, states local manager, Jack Byram.

In the beginning, local residents helped to remodel the school building in which the plant is housed. Regular work days were held to clean the grounds and contractors of the area generously contributed their labor.

Roofing and paint materials were acquired by businessmen of the 5th District who signed a note with the money to be repaid from rent payments made by the plant operator. The lease for the school building was granted by the County Board of Education to the Board of Supervisors for the 5th District for 99 years with an option to purchase.

The pep gridiron season is just around the corner. And it should be a big one, too. Filled with excitement, thrills, and big crowds. One can remember that

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not too many years ago such a statement could not be made. But football has come a long way during the last few years. There was a time when football, for most schools, was a strain on the budget. Now-a-days however, it usually supplements the budget rather than depleting it. With support from the fans such as Iuka's Chieftains get, the program should be on solid ground. New equipment, which every athletic department must have every year, shouldn't be a problem with most schools today. Schools now usually have an athletic department budget from which to operate. This gives the coach the funds to purchase the equipment that is necessary each fall to properly outfit the youngsters. In many schools a certain amount of the

gate receipts goes into the athletic fund. A school the size of Iuka would usually put about half of it's profit back into the athletic fund. And this is good sound procedure, too. It means proper equipment for the boys on the field, good conditioning equipment, and an overall better program for all concerned. It also saves the old routine of asking the board, waiting to see, and hoping that you can get what you need.

Gone, or at least they should be, are the days when boys would hit the field ill-equipped and ill-conditioned. Gone, at least they should be, are the days when a coach had to practically beg for any decent equipment for his boys and then have to make out with second-rate material. This means better coaching, too. It just naturally takes something out of a man who is coaching when he knows that his boys are not equipped properly nor conditioned as they could be because of lack of equipment. It is a good thing that in ev-

ery high school where sound administrative procedure is followed that there is an adequate athletic budget from which the coach can operate without adding this to all his other worries. Very few are high schools where they still operate on the old hazardous way of running the athletic program. Giving coaches adequate finances to equip his club means better football on field, better prepared players and a better game for spectators. That, sport fans, get us all.

Resurfacing Bid Awarded To Birmingham Co.

The Mississippi State Highway Commission awarded a contract Tuesday, July 26, for resurfacing work on a seven mile section of Mississippi Highway No. 25 in Tishomingo County, according to Northern District Highway Commissioner Roy C. Adams of Tupelo.

This new Tishomingo county highway project begins at the intersection of Mississippi Highway No. 25 and US Highway No. 72 in Iuka and extends in a northerly direction for approximately seven miles.

Commissioner Adams said that work under the provisions of this new contract would include widening intermittent sections of the existing pavement from 20 feet to 22 feet and resurfacing the entire seven mile segment with two and one-half inches of hot plant mix asphalt. Some sections of this segment of highway are already 22 feet wide. There are 75 working days allotted for the completion of this important highway project.

He added that this major improvement project is being financed with 100 percent State Construction funds and when completed this section of Highway 25 will have the strength to carry today's heavy loads as well as providing a smoother and safer riding surface for the traveling public.

Williams Asphalt Company, Inc. of Birmingham, Alabama, submitted the low bid of \$144,947.01 for this resurfacing work.
