A Robust Market, Survey Shows

Tishomingo County gets a high rating as a market based upon its figures for the past year.

According to a national study of business activity, significant gains were registered in the local area as consumers, armed with better incomes, indulged in large-scale buying of goods and services.

The findings are presented in a copyrighted report, called Survey of Buying Power, prepared and released by Sales Management. It gives data on income and spending for communities in every part of the country.

In Tishomingo County, it shows, the amount of disposable cash in the hands of local residents was above average.

Total net income, locally, after payment of personal taxes, came to \$16,484,000, compared with the previous year's \$15,903,000.

What it boiled down to, on a family basis, was determined by dividing the income figure by the number of households in the area. Per household, it amounted to \$3,925. In 1964, it was \$3,879.

With that much money available to them for discretionary spending and with all signs pointing to a continuation of the boom, local residents were more expansive than usual in their shopping.

As a result, they made the year a good one for retail merchants in Tishomingo County. The sales volume reached a total of \$14,502,000 bettering the previous year's \$12,569,000.

The rise, 15.3 percent, compares with a 8.5 percent rise in the United States and 11.0 percent in the State of Mississippi.

The figures show that people are not only spending much more than in other years but that they are spending it in different ways. Their tastes and wants have changed.

With a smaller share of the paycheck earmarked for the basic necessities — food, clothing and shelter — there is more of it left for the luxuries of life.

Larger and more modern homes with central heating and air-conditioning systems added tremendously to the more luxurious living and greater expenditures for insurance of all kinds reflected the prosperity of the county.

Only a continued drive by county merchants to hold the spending of local incomes within the county and the constant increase of industrial jobs will bring about a gain of 1966 over 1965.

Bus Shop To Be Constructed At Midway School

B. L. Mercer, Supt. of Education, states that arrangements are now underway for the construction of a bus shop to be located on the old school grounds at Midway.

The bus shop will be used solely for the maintenance and repair of the county school buses to keep them all in good running order. "It is hoped that this much-needed facility will be completed and a manager in charge by mid-term of this school year," Supt. Mercer stated.

The three are charged with stealing wire from the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association lines.

The negro shooting scheduled to come before the Grand Jury involves an incident in which

Elmer Hodge is charged with the fatal shooting of his son, Leroy Hodge, on Wednesday morning, July 20.

Health Records Being Changed At Iuka Separate School This Year

The attention of the patrons of the Iuka School system is called to a change in procedure in the matter of health records required for a pupil's beginning a school year, according to H. L. Shook, superintendent.

The Tishomingo County Health Department, upon completion of the required immunizations, will issue to each child an Immunization Certificate, which must be presented to school authorities at registration as a condition of admittance. The State Board of Health has modified its basic criteria with the following standards now to be met:

Vaccination for smallpox must be administered every five years. If it is due on or before registration it must be secured now. If a child had the polio a booster must be taken before beginning school. If no polio immunization has been had at all,

the series must be begun at once. Those above the age of six who completed immunization by the sugar method are considered immune.

D-WT has been reduced to DT. If the DT Series has not been administered at all, it must be done before the child enters school; a booster is required every two years. If the booster has not been taken since August 30, 1964 one is required before entering school.

All patrons are urged to give proper attention to these matters at once. Any questions will be gladly explained by Mrs. Ann Yow, County Health Nurse. Failure to secure the Certificate will delay the final registration of the child.

Mrs. Yow states that a special date, Tuesday, August 16, has been set up at the County Health office for Iuka children. This day will be devoted exclusively to the immunization of children in the Iuka District. The office is regularly open on Wednesdays for this service.

Trigger Creek Rd. To Be Improved

The State Aid Road Division has announced its approval of a contract awarded on July 26, by the Tishomingo County Board of Supervisors, providing for the improvement of the Trigger Creek Road. The announcement was made by Frank T. Moore, State Aid Engineer.

The contract, designated as Project No. SAP 71 (16), provides for 3.248 miles of grading, drainage, bridge, and gravel surface, and was awarded to D. F. and H. W. Frederick of Iuka, the low bidder, in the amount of \$62,046.49.

Bids on this project were also submitted by Worsham Brothers of Corinth and Bowyer & Johnson Construction Company of Jackson, Tennessee.

This project is located in the districts of Supervisors A. C. Ryan and W. L. Stormont. Engineering supervision will be handled by T. O. Mabry, Jr., County Engineer.

Near Million Dollars To Be Paid Farmers

Local ASCS Office Prepares To Issue 2nd Payment Checks In '66

Approximately \$975,000 will be paid to Tishomingo County farmers within the next few weeks.

This 3/4 million dollars will go to farmers participating in the 1966 Feed Grain and Cotton price support programs. This constitutes the second such payment to be made, according to E. N. Allen, office manager of the Tishomingo County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"In the spring of this year farmers received half of their diversion payments. Now certifications are being signed to qualify these men to receive the second half of the diversion payments plus the price support on planted cotton or corn, which ever the case may be," Mr. Allen stated.

"All land owners or operators of farms will be required to sign certification of performance before the payment may be made. Tenants on farms will not be required, however, to sign for this second payment. Farmers are requested to

at once and sign these applications. No applications may be carried out for signatures. If any farmer is unable to visit the office personally, they must request that their application be mailed for signature," the office manager added.

After complete and proper certification, the checks will be mailed to the farmers.

Decline Noted In Iuka, Ripley; Communities Show Increases

THREAT TO THE HOME

For centuries, law in the Anglo-Saxon world has regarded a man's home as his castle. Long experience with tyrannical rulers taught English-speaking people that a home is deserving of special protection in the eyes of the law. It is at the threshold of one's home that tyranny must be resisted. This has been the reasonable conclusion of millions of freedom-loving people over many generations.

But if the Johnson administration has its way, a man's home will be just another unit of housing subject to federal supervision and regulation. To be sure, to some Americans it may sound right to have a law that bans discrimination in the sale or the rental of private homes. Filled with the synthetic idealism created by the "civil rights" movement, they may conclude that government can and must make the ultimate decisions governing private property. But people who have this idea, in effect are proposing that cherished ideals of personal freedom be abandoned in an effort to conduct a social crusade.

Americans have a right to conduct personal crusades for causes, no matter how unwise they may be. But it is wrong for the public to countenance the sacrifice of fundamental freedoms in the advancement of these fashionable political causes.

The sale or rental of a home is a very personal decision. For most people, their home is a cherished possession. They may have spent many years building and improving it. They don't, therefore, want to sell or rent to just anyone. In seeking a buyer or a tenant, the homeowner may have one of a hundred different ideas as to who is the ideal person to rent to or sell their property.

The owner of a piece of residential property may feel that he has an obligation to his neighbors. Many neighborhoods are close-knit affairs. People living near each other on a street may have developed the friendships over the years. They may be united in an effort to improve their neighborhood, to

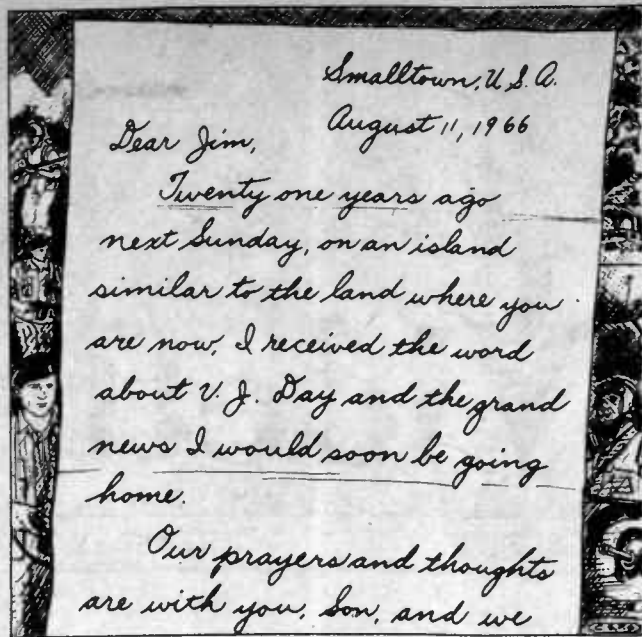
keep it free of undesirable citizens who lack a sense of responsibility. When these owners rent or sell, they want to be sure that the people who occupy their home will fit into the neighborhood and contribute to the happiness and well-being of old friends.

But the Johnson administration shows no concern for these legitimate desires and real concerns of American homeowners. The Great Society cares not a whit for the feelings of people in such a situation. A home is just a unit of housing to the federal planners. And the home owners' interests are to be treated with the contempt that is customary in the handling of the ordinary citizen by the entrenched bureaucrat and social planner.

The Johnson administration plan for regulating the sale and rental of private property is more than thoughtless and inconsiderate, however. It is a fundamental invasion of historic rights. Sen. Everett Dirksen (R-Ill.) has termed the plan unconstitutional. So it is. Certainly, the American design of government makes no allowance for a system of federal inspectors charged with ruling on a homeowner's action in selling or renting his property.

This housing provision of the Johnson administration's "Civil Rights" legislation could be enforced only through the exercise of injustice. Why is that? Because federal inspectors or appraisers of sale and rental transactions would have to read a motive into every refusal to sell or rent. The federal bureaucracy is powerful all right, but it has no competence in searching the hearts of people. No official in truth can determine whether Mr. X declined to rent or sell to Mr. Y because of this or that reason.

It is time for the country to again recognize that property rights are human rights. If a man can't decide what he wants to do with his home, he hasn't any significant freedom. The Great Society's home sale and rental proposal simply doesn't belong in a free society.

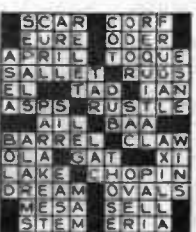

L-CPL Reynolds Tells Of Recent Viet Nam Duty

L/CPL R. J. Reynolds, in a recent interview, gave his views on the conflict in Viet Nam. L/CPL Reynolds has just recently returned from his second tour of duty in that area.

As a member of the "Tigers," Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 542, L/CPL Reynolds saw active duty from November to January of this year and again from February to July 27 when he returned to the United States.

"I was in actual combat and I saw close friends of mine wounded and killed. I guess I was just one of the lucky ones to make it through. I'm awfully happy to be home with my wife, Linda (Vaughn), and my ten-month-old son," the young ma-

rine commented. "Actually, this war is like none other that the Americans have been engaged in. For one thing you can't tell the North Vietnamese from the South Vietnamese because they don't wear uniforms. Both friend and foe look alike. That's why our boys are sometimes easily fooled.

"The Vietnamese farm by day as peaceful residents of the land and at night come alive in combat. You've got to remember too that they fight differently and our boys are just now really learning what their techniques are.

"Another thing that's hard on the men is the climate. The entire time I spent there (except in the monsoon season) the temperature was never under 110 degrees and the humidity was very high.

"One major improvement in this combat over that of other wars is the quick efficiency of medical evacuation and improve-

ment of needed supplies. When a man is injured, medics are at his side almost at a moment's notice, and if planes are shot

down a thorough search is begun immediately to find the surviving crew. If there is any hope at all, the men are saved; therefore the death rate is less in this respect.

"Right now we are winning, but who can say what will hap-

pen if Red China or Russia come in."

L/CPL Reynolds added, "I'll be reporting to Cherry Point, N. C. on September 10 for another year and a half duty before I leave the service. Chances are that I won't be sent back to Viet Nam."

The young marine is formerly of Bakersfield, California. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles W. Reynolds of that city. At present he and his wife and son are residing at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Vaughn in Iuka.

Solution To Premium Paying Suggested By SS

"Some older people enrolled in the medicare medical insurance (doctor bills) program under Medicare may be having difficulty paying the full \$9 quarterly premium," Hugh Tigrett, Social Security District Manager in Tupelo said today. Mr. Tigrett said that those persons having difficulty raising the entire \$9 may pay \$3 or \$6 amounts covering one or two month premiums. But, he said, a first

payment should be made as soon as possible.

Medicare beneficiaries who are receiving monthly social security or railroad retirement payments have the \$3 monthly premium deducted from their benefit checks.

Other Medicare beneficiaries received premium notices in June requesting them to mail a quarterly payment of \$9. According to Mr. Tigrett, payments may be made by check or money order mailed to the beneficiaries' Social Security District Office, P. O. Box 680, Tupelo, Miss.

Mr. Tigrett emphasized that the medical insurance program is separate and distinct from the hospital part of medicare. The

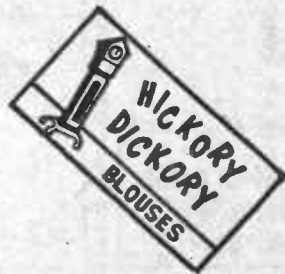

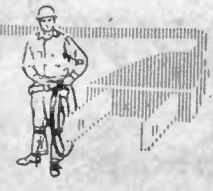

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES
By Percie B. Stricklen MSU Extension Service

Sheep Notes
The sheep business looks good both short range and long range. Anyone who will do a good job with sheep will be rewarded financially.

Lamb sales scheduled this fall include one at the Producers North Yards in Jackson October 17, and at the Tri-State Stockyards in Greenville October 18.

There is little money to be made in selling feeder lambs. If you have lambs that are not fat and can provide winter grazing and spring clover for them, they will surely make you money carried until spring and sold fat.

If you buy grazing lambs or use your own, both good money making propositions—shear them this summer and drench twice with a good dewormer 14 days apart.

Keep lambs free from parasites and put them on winter grazing when it is available. Shear them again 75 to 90 days before selling. This will improve them about 1 grade and cause them to gain around 10 extra

pounds, provided they are free from parasites.

Quality Cotton
Quality cotton should pay off big this year, especially with the drastically reduced acreage. Right now is the time to finish plans for eliminating grassy bales of cotton.

Last year Mississippi produced 110,363 grassy bales of cotton. Losses due to these cost Mississippi growers around \$13 million.

Clean turn-row would stop a lot of the grassy bales. Turn-rows can be scraped, mown, cultivated or sprayed with chemicals to get rid of the grass.

Soybean Insects
When to apply insecticide to soybeans for insect control is a question worrying many growers.

For leaf-feeding pests poisoning is recommended when 35 to 40 percent of the foliage is damaged.

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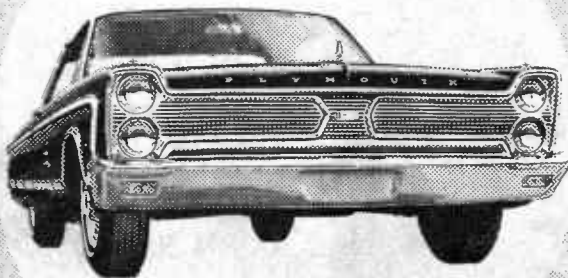
