There Is No Question

During recent days we have read and heard a great deal about a foolish statement made by John Lennon, a member of the London, England, Beatles, a rock and roll singing group. Possibly all have heard the statement which was to the effect that they (the Beatles) were more popular than Jesus.

Naturally the statement is asinine. It would take an egotistical fool to say such a thing—a naive person so full of conceit and so self-centered that he, in his foolishness, fails to see the importance and greatness of others much less the greatness of Jesus Christ.

John Lennon, with his screaming heinous, long haired, mop-headed crew, has had a devastating influence on youngsters the world over. In their pseudo popularity they have effected the appearance of others and have further encouraged the beatnik-like ways of hundreds of our own youngsters. The Beatles should have, long ago, been barred from public appearances. Their pictures should have been refused public printing and their music (some question it being music) should never have been permitted to be heard. They and their shenanigans should have been banned before they ever got started.

However, they have gained a prominence high in popularity in which we cannot concur. In contrast to these foreign hoodlums who claim so great a popularity, we present here a fine-worded description that partly tells of the greatness of Jesus Christ. It follows:

"I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched and all the navies that were ever built and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth so powerfully as has that one solitary life."

If mop-headed Beatnik John Lennon thinks he can live up to the greatness of this One Solitary Life then there is no further need for Christianity. There is no question about it. The Beatnik Beatles are only a low form of humanity and shall go the way of all human life.

Buses Will Run Usual Routes,
Full Days Begin On Monday

Both Tishomingo and Burns-ville schools will conduct registration periods beginning about 8 o'clock Friday morning.

R. C. Strickland, principal at Tishomingo, states that only students in grades 7 through 12 will report Friday. On Monday, all 12 grades will attend for the full day's activities. The lunchroom will also be open beginning Monday.

"It will not be necessary for parents of the students to at-

tend school with their children except, of course, in the case of the very young enrolling in primary grades," Mr. Strickland noted.

He also added that special pre-school age classes will begin on Monday, August 22.

Principal Melvin Phifer will call the Burns-ville students together on Friday morning at approximately the same time.

Grades 1 through 12 will all register Friday morning and will be dismissed as soon as possible. The first full day's activity will be on Monday.

GIVE MONEY TO CHILDREN? . . .
WHY RETIRED PARENTS CAN'T

This man, as most of them who start off this way, doesn't want advice. He is looking for approval of what he has already decided to do. Read on:

"My wife and I, while aware of the warnings that retired parents should hold to what they have, think the warnings fail to take into account the peculiar affection of older couples for their children. We want our children to have what we can give them as soon as they can get it. We want to see them enjoy it while we still are around. We want, certainly, to avoid the percentage that lawyers and probate courts will take if we draw wills and leave our money behind in a conventional way.

"My wife and I have a comfortable income, for as long as either of us lives. In fact we are saving better than \$110 a month out of the income, simply because there is nothing we want to spend it for. In investments we have about \$24,000. In the bank we have another \$8,000. And we own our home, worth \$18,000. I have a \$10,000 life insurance policy that is paid up.

"Why shouldn't we split up the investments, and later the bank account, and let the children have the money now? Company ties weaken after retirement, and old friends fade away. Our children are eventually all we have left to love . . ."

Parents who come up to retirement with a hunk of money have the right to do what they jolly-well please with it. But except for a few dollars dropped now and then — always unexpectedly — they should not pass on any major portion of what they have to their children until after they are dead. The reasons:

— Children of retirement-age parents are moving about as no generations of Americans ever did. Their careers take them to this city this year and that continent the next. They are seldom around for long for the parents to see them enjoy any gifts.

— Children of 1966 who are grown and married can, and

do, dispose of \$10,000 or so in two weeks . . . to settle a mortgage, buy a car, pay off debts, or send their own kiddies to private schools. Once the older parents give them money there is almost no chance of ever getting it back.

— Parents giving money to married children are giving it in each case to two people, not one — to the child and a spouse. This is an age of divorce and separation. Half of any gift to any child may go off to Nevada while the parents watch.

— Retired parents cannot possibly know what the financial turns in the future will be. Those holding blue chip stocks have lost between 8 and 15 percent on them since February of this year. Others, in 1962, lost 30 percent. Some, in 1929, lost everything. Such fluctuations in money markets, even if the retired parents own no stock, are a warning of what can happen to money.

— Retired parents cannot possibly know what demands may come up later for money they have already given away.

— Grown children of retired parents, being imperfect human beings like the rest of us, cannot bring themselves to be grateful for long for what came to them free. Cannot regard \$5,000 made with blood and sweat in the 1930's and 1940's as a big deal in the 1960's. Cannot be too interested in a Santa Claus who has already dumped his bag and won't be coming down the chimney again.

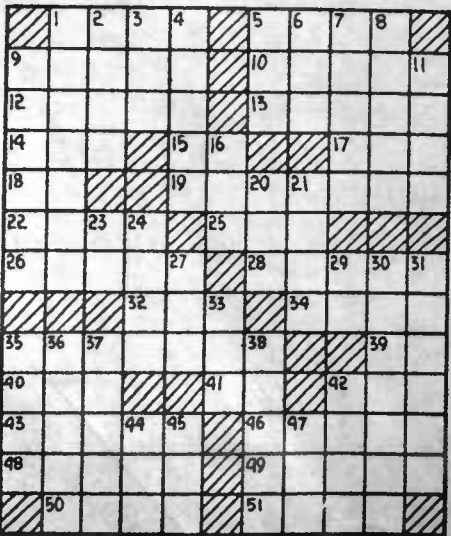
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

A New Mood Develops

When the summer began, it seemed as though the American people had almost given up the fight for principle. The conservative cause was virtually written off as a lost cause. It was anticipated in many quarters that U. S. citizens would not rebel if Big Government decreed that they wear new iron collars and accept new regulations. But the summer is turning out different from what many of the pundits expected.

A new spirit of resistance is in the air. First of all, it is clear that the American people are getting mighty sick of demonstrators and marchers. Waves of looting and arson in Chicago, Omaha, Cleveland and other Northern cities have created a marked backlash in the North against the so-called 'civil rights' movement. Whereas community leaders a year or so ago were quick to blame Southern public officials in their handling of demonstrations, now there is understanding of the new revolution that Southern towns and cities faced. Paul Harvey, a prominent broadcaster in Chicago, recently wrote a lengthy "apology" to Southerners for his region's misunderstanding of the South's difficulties.

When the summer began, the

Johnson administration thought it would not have any difficulty ramming through a bill that would make sale of one's home subject to federal regulation. But the backlash also has been felt in Congress. It has been glaringly apparent, especially in the metropolis of Chicago, that the people are not in any mood to have government officials tell them to whom they may rent or sell.

In the South, local educators are stiffening their resistance to federal "guidelines" in changing public school system. School districts have made an honest effort to comply with the law, but they are discovering that extra-legal government regulations are impossible. It now seems that federal "guidelines" may be ignored until they can be tested in the courts.

If the voters can't immediately end the arrogance of appointive officials who are disrupting education, they can at least act at the polls. In this connection, there is evidence of a boiling voter reaction to the ideas and plans of both President Johnson and Senator Robert F. Kennedy. In Georgia, for example, the press reports a surge of anti-Great Society-New Frontier politics. With every demonstration

and every instance of Johnson-Kennedy appeasement of demonstrators, the reality of a two-party South grows.

The voters also seem to be aware of the Kennedy forces who are building a power bloc of their own in Congress and governors' mansions. The Kennedy political empire seems determined to elect satellite senators and governors who will be in position to influence events in 1968 or 1972.

The various items of evidence that are at hand indicate the pundits were in error when they decided that conservatism had died out of the U. S. electorate with Barry Goldwater's defeat in 1964. The report of the conservative movement's demise was clearly premature.

Anyone who has studied American history should have known that a reaction to extreme liberalism was bound to occur. The American people are more steady in their judgment than they are sometimes imagined to be. The excesses of the New Deal continued for a long time. The Dealer rule of Washington was strong and hard to remove. But the day came when the American people decided that they had had enough. They elected Dwight Eisenhower in a desire for a period of stability.

It is fashionable now to scoff at the Eisenhower era. But the ordinary American who lived through the 1950s surely must now be looking back on that era as an era of good feeling. There was no revolution in the streets nor major war abroad. The Cabinet contained numerous businessmen, and inflation was under control. Americans harassed by inflation surely

wouldn't mind another round of businessmen's government in the United States.

The New Frontier and the Great Society were supposed to initiate a proud new era of abundance. But today they can be seen to mark a period of bitter strife, open violence, war, and inflation. It is no wonder that one finds on the American scene this summer evidence of a new mood among the voters and a desire for a change.

For a dime: 14 acts of vaudeville at Chicago's Great Northern Hippodrome, if you caught the afternoon and evening shows in sequence . . . not to forget the nickel shows and the Penny Arcade . . . beer from the brewery at 85¢ a case of 24 12-oz. bottles and on Saturdays they came to my neighborhood with a wagon load.

Remember the penny postcard? The stick of licorice and the all-day sucker? When the newspaper cost a penny weekdays and 5¢ on Sunday? When you could get a half-dozen sweet rolls for a nickel. For a nickel, you could get a cup of coffee and two donuts; a glass of beer, (with lunch free); a half-pound of candy or salted peanuts at the dime store; a ride on the merry-go-round, with a free ride for the brass ring; a phone call; quart of milk or a loaf of bread.

Remember when the ice wagon made its rounds, the driver looking for cards displayed in the windows?

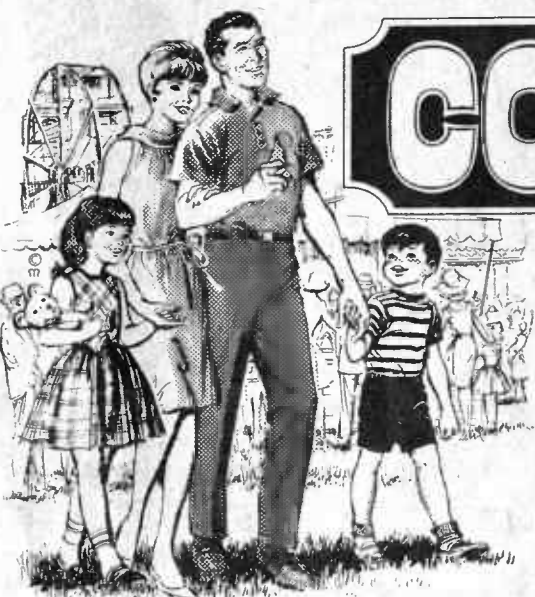

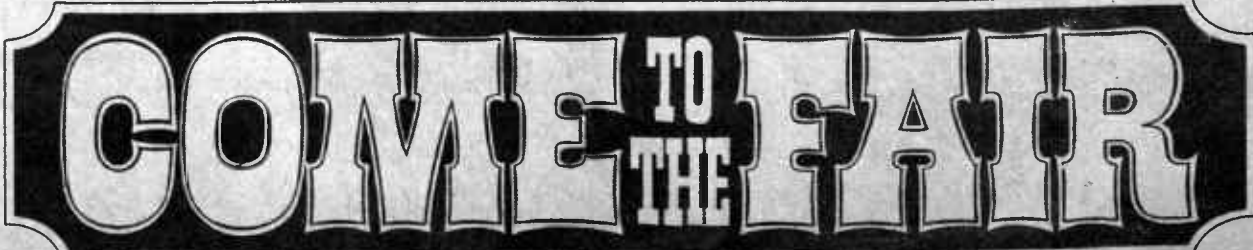

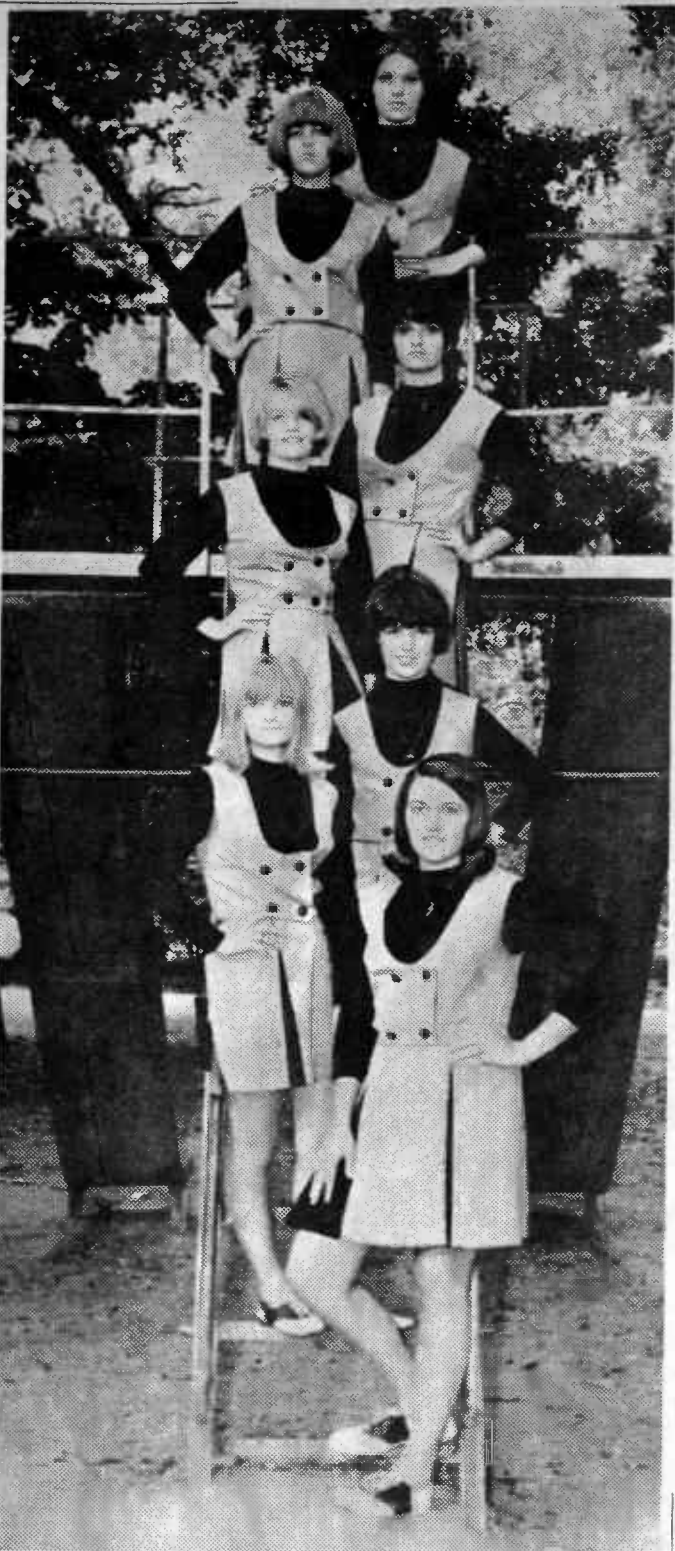
High School Athletic Association. They are knocking this week, however. And the knocking will continue from now on. Look for a good game on opening night, September 2, against Mantachie here

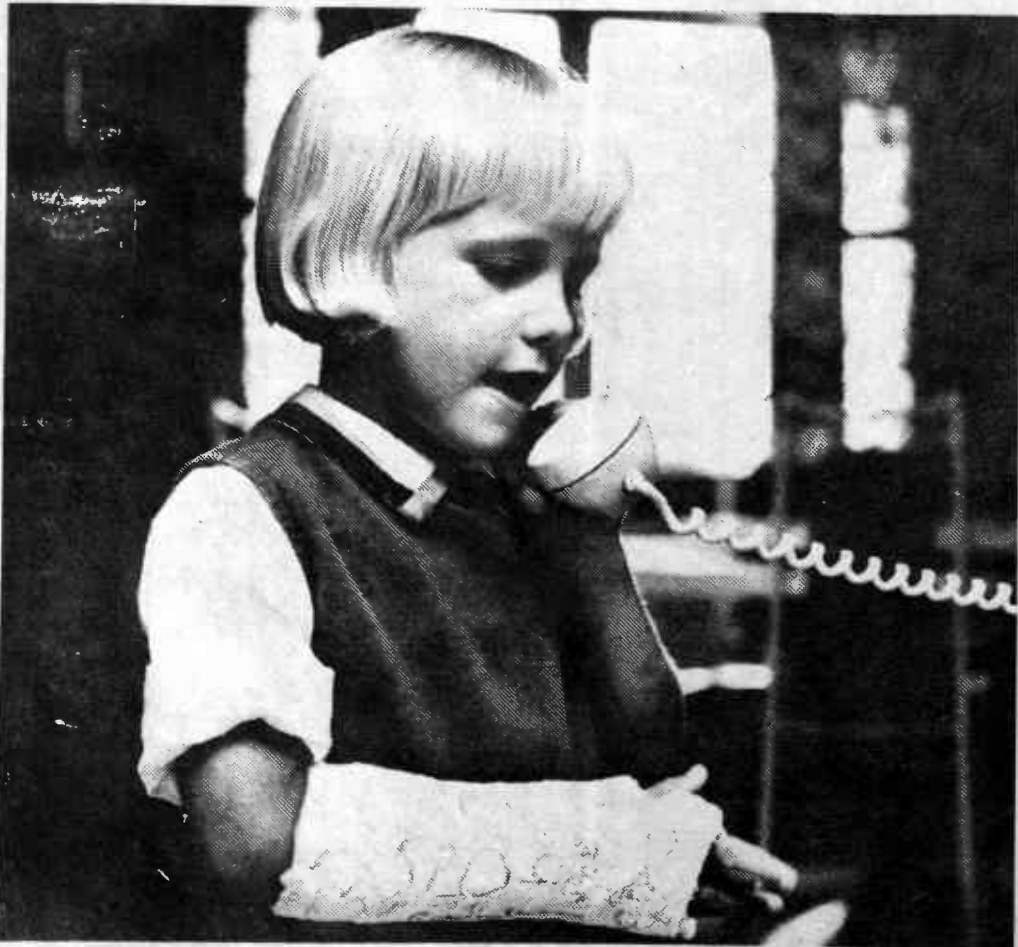

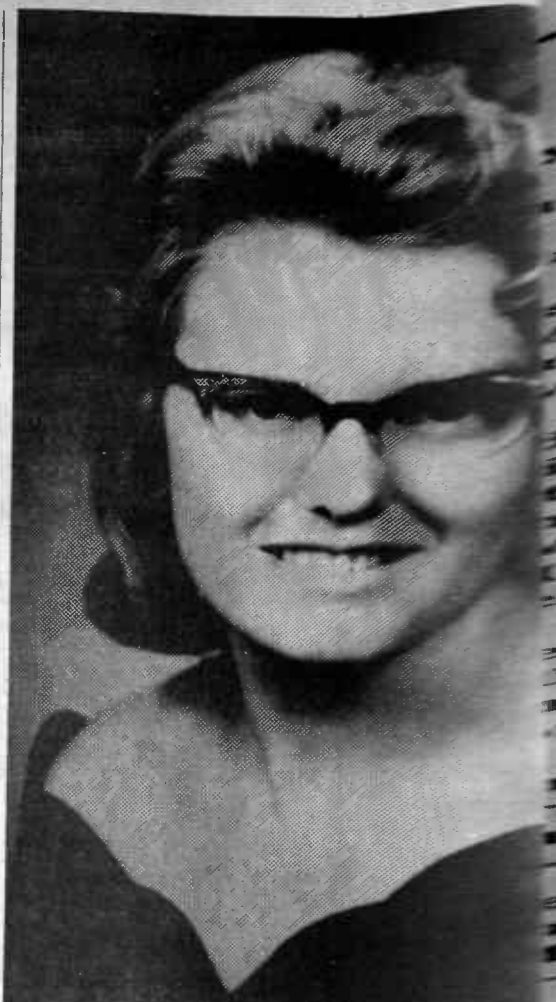

IMPORTANT NOTICE

TO USERS OF Tractor Fuel Kerosene & Diesel Fuel

Under House Bill 60, recently enacted by the State Legislature, diesel fuel and kerosene is presumed to be, and is taxed as, gasoline use fuels at the rate of ten cents (10c) per gallon.

According to Walter D. May, Executive Director, Mississippi Tax Commission, the changes in the State's method of taxing fuel and kerosene are significant and of immediate consequence. Exempt users of these fuels. Persons expecting to purchase exempted fuels after September 1, should write to the Motor Fuel Comptroller, State Office Building, Jackson, Mississippi for qualifying forms. A qualified exempt user, will be issued Exemption Certificates to be given distributors of Diesel Fuel and Kerosene at point of sale, thereby relieving nine cents (9c) of the ten cent tax.

If you use Tractor Fuel, Kerosene Fuel or Diesel Fuel in the operation of your farm, the home, or the operation of a business, then you must have the Exemption Certificate in order to keep from paying nine cents per gallon tax on your fuels.

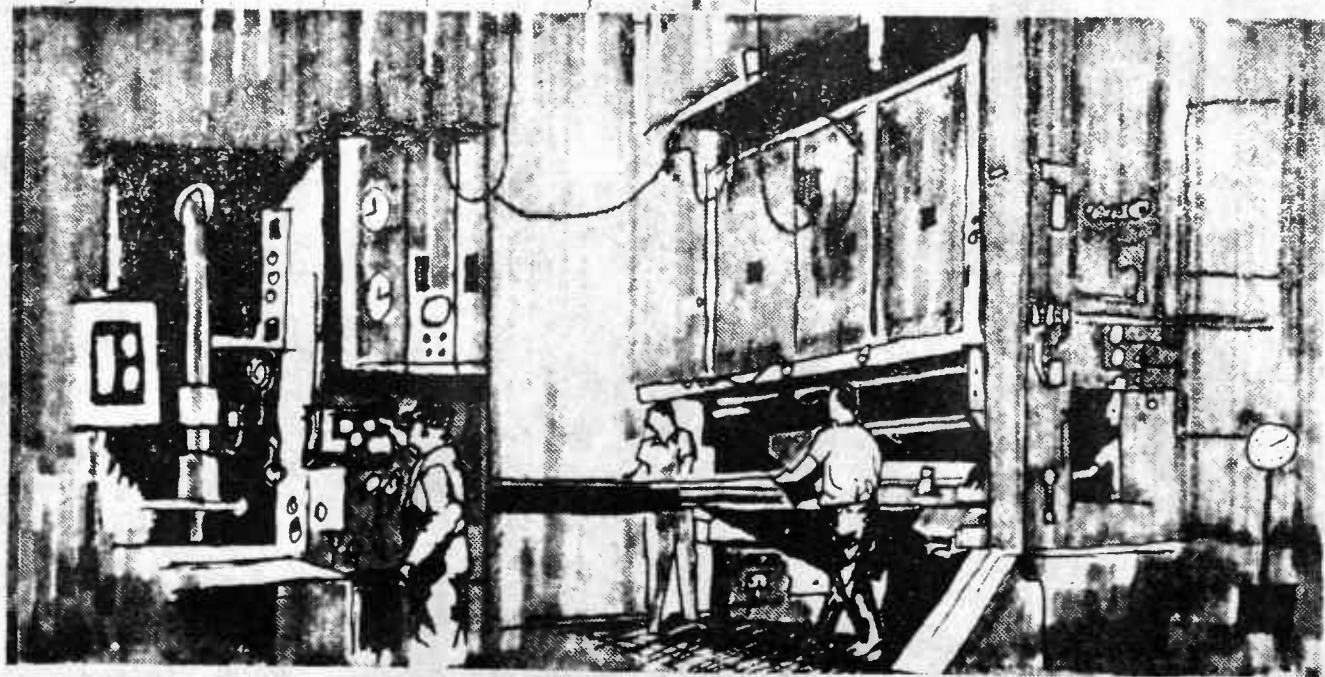

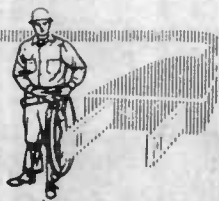

Tishomingo County Farms Now Total Less In U. S. Census Report

CENSUS TAKEN IN '59 WITH OF 1281 GIVEN FOR TIME

size in the county was 105.4 acres and that the average value of the county's farms (land and buildings) in 1964 was \$10,408.

Other important county statistics in the report are:

1. Value of all farm products sold by farms in the county in 1964, \$3,871,314; and in 1959, \$2,668,903.

2. Value of all crops sold by county farms in 1964, \$2,139,852; in 1959, \$1,536,838.

3. Value of all livestock and livestock products sold by county farms in 1964, \$1,729,185; in 1959, \$1,132,065.

Information obtained for the first time in an agricultural census included the amount of income received by the county's farmers (\$2,277) from recreational services as well as data on the use of pest control chemicals in the county in 1964.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every 5 years ending in "4" and "9" to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. The data are needed to make decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. The 1964 farm census was the 18th in a series that began in 1840.

The preliminary report for the county contains more than 500 facts about agriculture in the county. Among additional facts it contains are the number of farms by size, type, and economic class; the number of farm operators by method of tenure, age, color, off-farm work, and number of school years completed; land in farms by use and by land-use practices; data on equipment and facilities; farm expenditures; number of hired workers; and number of farms reporting poultry and livestock production and those reporting crop production by acres and quantities as well as sales.

Single copies are available for 10 cents from the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C. 20233 or from any field office of the Department of Commerce. These are located in major cities.

\$10,000 Spent Weekly By Tourists, Campers in County Recreation Spots

A survey conducted in June and July of the recreation spots in the Tishomingo county area, shows that approximately \$10,000.00 is spent each week in the county by tourists and campers. The survey was conducted by the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority in cooperation with Oak Ridge Associated Universities and the Tennessee Valley Authority.

The survey further reveals that the majority of users of recreational facilities in the area are family units and that the average number of miles traveled by each unit to get here was 152.

A breakdown of the expenses reveals that the single item costing the greatest expense is the auto. Boating expense was

second and refreshments was third.

Over fifty percent of the people coming to recreation spots in this area make from 5 to 15 visits here per year.

Improvements most needed in the camping areas, according to the survey, are: 1. water systems; 2. paved access roads; and 3. picnic tables.

Recreation spots where the survey was conducted were Eastport, Mill Creek, Goat Island, J. P. Coleman park, and others. Information obtained from the survey will be used by the Watershed Authority, the Mississippi Park Service, and the Tennessee Valley Authority in planning and developing recreation sites in the Pickwick lake area.

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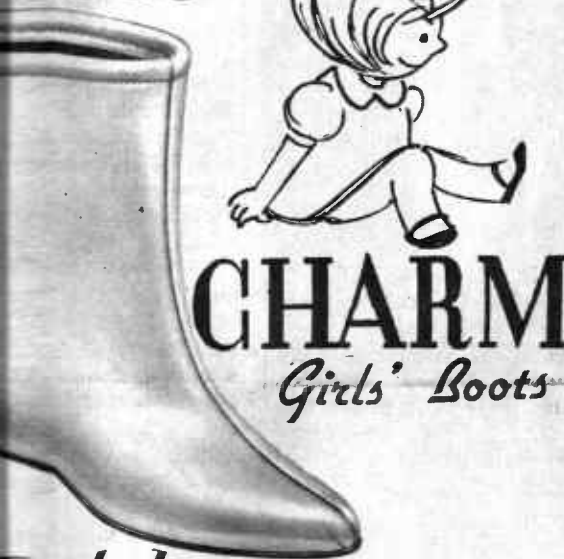

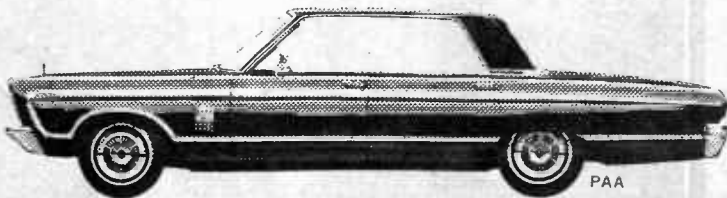
