Fall's Here — Cotton Is Opening

It never fails — a sure sign of Fall is when cotton starts opening. Sometimes it's early and sometimes it's late. But this year seems to be one of the early ones. J. S. Kimbrough of Glen Route One, sent us a sample of two fully-opened bolls this Tuesday.

M. T. Waters was the messenger who brought the open cotton bolls into us. He had been inspecting some of the farms in that area. County Agent Percie Stricklen reports prospects for this year's crop as being short due to the leasing of 30% of the cotton acreage to the government and also due to dry weather during the growing season. The corn crop will also be short, he said.

However, there is a brighter side. Soybeans are looking good and the price is good. And livestock, both hogs and cattle, are in good supply and the demand is high with better prices than usual.

Fall is here — as the cool weather indicates — and cotton is opening. But, it'll be different this year. Most cotton will be picked by mechanical pickers and the schools won't vacate for the cotton season as they have been doing heretofore.

Twenty-Six True Bills Returned by Grand Jury

Aug. Term Of Circuit Court Will End Friday; Some Cases Heard

The Grand Jury, during this August term of Circuit Court, has returned 26 indictments, some of the cases already having been heard and disposed of by Circuit Judge N. S. (Soggy) Sweat, Jr.

Some of the indictments handed down by the Grand Jury included:

James Moore of Iuka, charged with leaving the scene of an accident. Moore is out on \$100.00 bond. The accident involved an auto and a motorbike on highway 25 north of Iuka.

The Grand Jury returned 3 indictments each against Carol Ed Sanders, Sammy Joe Gibson and Larry Kenneth Bunyard. These three are charged with grand larceny and burglary of copper wire taken from the

Tishomingo County Electric Power Association lines. The cases were continued until the January term of court.

Ralph Butler and Jimmy Reeves of Belmont are both in jail charged with burglary and grand larceny of Jala's drive-in theatre in Belmont. Their bonds are set at \$1,500.00 each and the cases have been continued to the January term of court.

Willard Tom Reno of Tishomingo is charged with forgery; the passing of a bad check to the Drs. Senter and Ratliff clinic in Belmont.

Vernon Crane is charged with grand larceny and burglary of Jala's drive-in theatre and with passing forged checks to R. Q. South and L. E. Griffin.

Charles Wilson and Clarence Walls are charged with stealing and selling a \$118.00 short wave radio from Harold Bethune. This case was continued to the January term.

An indictment was returned against Low Ree Fair and Lester Kennedy charging them with adultery.

The case of Joseph A. Bolton, charged with a hit-and-run traffic violation, was heard in which Bolton was found guilty and sentenced to 30 days in jail with 20 days being suspended upon his good behavior, and payment of a \$100.00 fine and all court costs. Bolton was charged with hitting Price Twitty with an automobile.

The complete Grand Jury report for this term of court follows:

Final Grand Jury Report

"NOW COMES your grand jury for the August, 1966, term of the Circuit Court of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, and begs leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session 3 days, have examined 47 witnesses, and have returned into open court 26 true bills.

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all factories of the county, the movie theater, the tax collector's books, and the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home to be in good condition and its inmates properly provided for and looked after.

"We find the county jail to be in such a poor state of repair that it seems improbable it could be renovated without the expenditure of a great amount of money. It is recommended that consideration be given to the construction of both a new courthouse and a new jail for Tishomingo County, Mississippi.

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good, safe condition, equipped properly with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law, and properly marked.

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's appear to be neat, well kept and in balance.

"And now having concluded our labors, we respectfully request to be finally discharged."

The report was signed by the Grand Jury Foreman, S. B. Hargett.

NEW PROCESS PERMITS SHIPMENT OF FOOD ITEMS WITHOUT SPOILAGE

A process for shipping perishables — such as produce, meat, fish, vegetables and flowers — without deterioration has been developed by Occidental Petroleum Corporation.

The process, called "Oxytrol," involves the displacement of oxygen from a railroad car or other conveyance and its replacement with pure nitrogen gas. With control of oxygen levels to very close tolerances during transit, perishables can be shipped without deterioration.

The process has been proven during more than four years of testing, with shipments of up to six weeks.

"The effect of replacing the normal oxygen atmosphere with an atmosphere of nitrogen is to sharply reduce the respiration processes of produce and cut flowers as well as the degenerative effects of oxygen upon meat and fish," the spokesman said. Asparagus, for example, continues its growth during regular shipment. With the process, growth ceases and color, tenderness and sweetness are retained. Tomatoes which are shipped are picked ripe rather than green.

"In conventional shipments of refrigerated meats, there is a shrinkage of up to three per cent which is substantially eliminated with this process. In addition, Oxytrol preserves the surface appearance of the meat and eliminates aging. Considerable savings and wider geographic penetration can result with the shipment of fresh fish even without ice," it was said. "Negotiations with major meatpackers for use of the system are under way."

According to the firm, use of the process is expected to widen the markets of agricultural regions whose distances from major consumption areas made shipment of fresh produce impractical. It was revealed that recently for the first time a number of shipments of ripened tomatoes from Mexico's coastal areas have been marketed in New York.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: How can you say IQ scores are valid when you know they are based on White culture and therefore put the Negro at a disadvantage?

A: Ours is a White culture. For good or evil, that is what it is, the product of White thought. Intelligence tests seek to determine the intellectual capacity (abstract intelligence) of individuals living within this culture.

The American Negro is such a person. He is native to it. He was born and reared in this country. He speaks English, thinks in English, and associates with English-speaking, English-speaking people. Therefore, if there were no innate differences between the Negro and other races, the Negro would have no more difficulty with such "culture-bound" tests than, say, native-born Orientals who have no more trouble than native-born Whites.

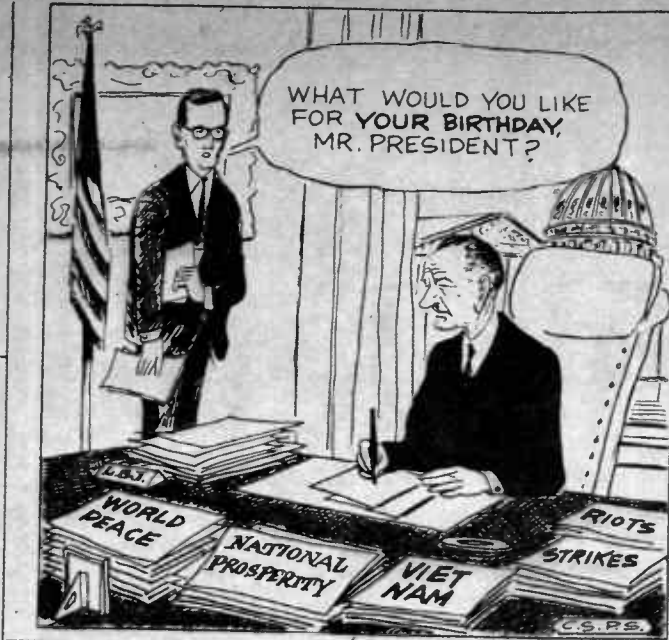
That the Negro does have greater difficulty than do others does not condemn the tests. Rather, it confirms their validity for American culture and, indirectly, their validity for the study of race differences.

THE GOLDEN YEARS
LEAVING MONEY TO HEIRS? HERE'S A WARNING FOR YOU

You are of retirement age and have an estate of, say, \$24,000. It is neatly wrapped up in a good will for your children, which means they will get \$8,000 each.

When a decent interval after the funeral has passed they can drop by the lawyer's office and pick up their bonanza.

If this is the way you are figuring things — which is about the way most retired people seem to be figuring them — you are living in a dream world.

This week a 40-year-old man, who will be called Whitmore, revealed just what had happened to the estate of his retired father. The estate amounted to roughly \$75,000. As of this week, about \$12,000 of this, or nearly one dollar out of every six, has gone up in smoke. And the five children still haven't gotten their hands on any money, though the funeral of the father was nearly a year-and-a-half ago.

These are Mr. Whitmore's figures (and as you read them keep in mind that the administration of the estate has been of very high caliber and the integrity of the attorney and courts involved is beyond reproach):

State inheritance tax	\$6,884
(This would vary in each state.)	
Attorney expense	1,600
Administration expense	1,200
Funeral expenses for father	1,022
Federal estate tax	692
Court costs	191

Then there were bonding costs for the administrator, federal and state income taxes owed by the father, and a few other odds and ends.

The five children probably will get all their money in about two years after the father died, and instead of getting the \$15,000 each the father had expected will wind up with about \$12,000 each.

What can you who plan to leave your \$24,000 at \$8,000 each to your three children do about this matter?

1. You can figure in advance, or right now, that they aren't going to let you out of the cemetery, once they get you there, to come pound on your lawyer's desk. Which is one reason why the legal profession has been getting by with so much nonsense on estate matters;

2. You can figure, also now, that you have to pay taxes to die as well as to live, and that state and federal governments, no matter what, will probably take a cut out of whatever pot you leave;

3. You can figure, now, that it is an effort for anybody to unravel an estate, especially one involving real estate, and that the attorneys and administrators doing the job are entitled to be paid;

4. You can make certain that you have an honorable lawyer ... but also a knowledgeable one who knows how costs and taxes can be reduced on an estate. You also can talk to a trust officer in your bank to see if any sort of trust arrangement

might be better for your heirs than a will;

5. You can tell your children you don't have as much money as they think you have — you won't have after you die. And remind them they won't get it next Tuesday, and unless they're lucky won't get it even next year.

SENSING THE NEWS

Time For Economic Logic

If anything is clear this summer, it is that the Johnson administration's economic policies are a failure. The economic "guidelines" established by President Johnson are in disarray and seem destined for complete collapse in the near future.

In addition, there is ominous talk of the Johnson administration wanting to raise taxes. Now the American people need another federal tax increase like they need a hole in the head. The money should be left in the hands of the taxpayers to meet the increasing cost of living. What isn't needed for that purpose, the taxpayers may save; the government never will.

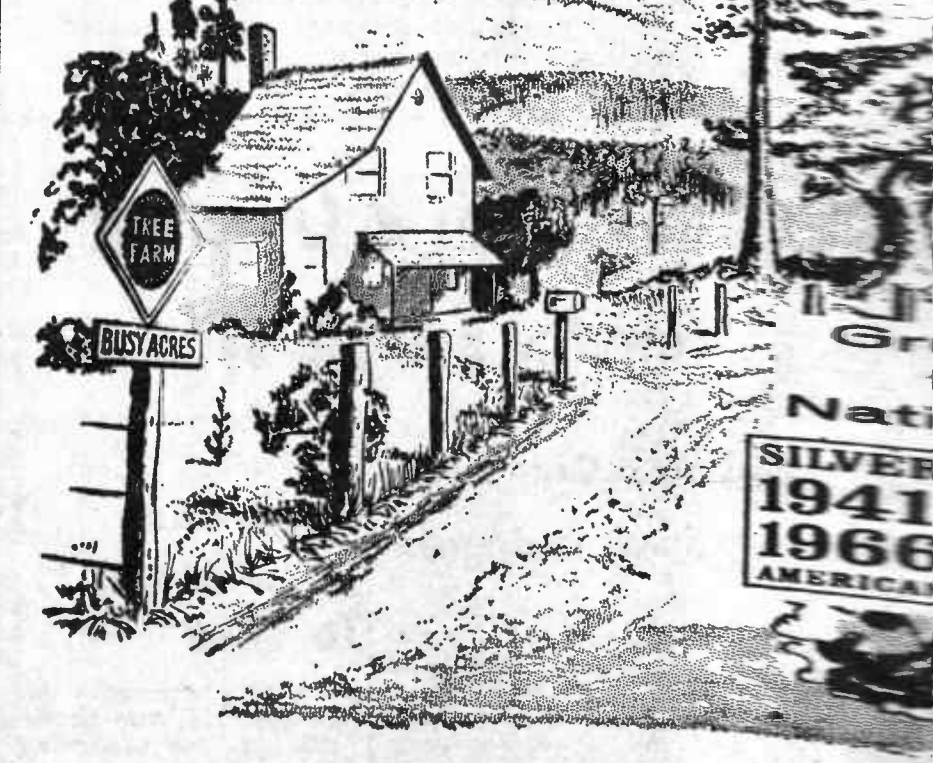
A federal tax increase at this time would be a severe blow to an economy that already is facing bad weather ahead. What is needed is for Big Government to stop spending money at the present fantastic rate. Unfortunately, the Johnson administration apparently has no interest in saving money. When Mr. Johnson first moved into the White House, there was talk of turning off the lights to save money. But the administration doesn't talk that way these days. "Saving" is a taboo word, especially in an election year filled with promises of government goodies.

But the American people certainly are interested in an end to waste that is eating into their prosperity. Talk of the terrible effects of inflation is being heard in all parts of the country. This talk — and the conviction on which it is based — may lead to the election of a savings-minded Congress this fall. At long last, the American people apparently are beginning to realize that every increase in inflation is like a cut in wages. Inflation is a direct assault on the American standard of living. Housewives, who have to buy the family groceries, are keenly aware these days of what inflation is doing when they pick out a week's food supplies at the supermarket.

Americans need to think hard about inflation between now and the November 8 elections. The meaning of inflation was recently explained with great skill by James Daniel, writing in the Reader's Digest. He gave this analysis of inflation.

"Inflation begins when the government runs a deficit in the national budget and covers this by 'creating' new dollars — either paper bills or bank credit. Through a chain reaction or 'multiplier' process, these new dollars become part of the banking system's reserves, supporting a much larger volume of loans ... As inflation continues and accelerates, more and more of the new money simply bids up prices."

That is what's happening today, and it is very alarming. Unhappily, the Johnson administration is persisting in an inflationary policy by recommending massive public spending. Programs such as the War on Poverty are directly inflationary. New paper money has to be printed to cover the anti-poverty programs, and no goods are created in the process. Or consider the enormous gifts of foods to countries such as India. They cost the taxpayers money, and nothing is gained. For years, conservatives have

American Bankers Association, Mr. McRee reported that at the beginning of 1966, Mississippi banks were helping farmers with \$156 million in loans, 12 per cent more than a year previous. This total included \$76 million production loans \$80 million in farm mortgages. At the same time, \$150 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies: \$72 million by the Federal Land Banks; \$46 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$17 million in non-real estate loans, plus \$42 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 55 per cent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Mississippi farmers came from banks.

Mr. McRee said that "bankers in Mississippi are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers."

The increased use of credit by farmers, according to Mr. McRee, has been accompanied by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm families. Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity po-

sition of farmers contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm families have \$212 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 84 per cent of the total capital requirements of farmers.

Mr. McRee stressed the importance of farmers and bankers working closely together to improve farm financial arrangements. He reported that nine out of ten insured banks through out the country had agricultural loans outstanding, with nearly 99 per cent of the banks in Mississippi extending credit to farm people.

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Back Pay Figures For 1966 Fiscal Year Announced

Sterling Williams, WHPC regional director, Birmingham, said that back pay figures found for the four-state area in which he administers the act reached \$8,698,479 for the 1966 fiscal year.

He reported that 20,093 work-

ers in Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, and Mississippi were due \$4,048,829 in minimum wages; 25,514 were underpaid \$4,615,548 for overtime hours; and 303 were due \$34,102 under the equal pay provisions.

Williams also reported that investigators assigned to the eight Wage-Hour offices in the region found 1,282 minors employed in violation of the child labor provisions of the FLSA in non-agricultural investigations.

Publications explaining all the phases of FLSA, including minimum wage, overtime pay, child labor, hazardous occupations, and the Equal Pay Act, are available without cost from the address listed above.

Pesticide Safety

What do you do with your empty containers of insecticide? Some folks have accidentally killed livestock by re-using the containers as watering cans or for mixing livestock sprays. It is mighty hard to get rid of all the residue in a so-called "empty" insecticide drum!

Best thing to do with the "empty" drums is to flatten them out and bury them!

Don't just stack them up or throw them out where drainage

from them may run into streams or farm ponds.

Check with your local county agent for the best recommendations on how to dispose of these containers. Also, be sure to read and follow the label instructions before using any farm chemical.

Cotton Insect Control

Sharp increases in boll weevil numbers have been reported from many areas of the state. Showery weather could result in a further increase.

Bollworms are also on the increase and eggs are present in many fields.

Weekly applications of recommended insecticides will not control these heavy infestations of these two pests. Close the interval between poisonings to 4 or 5 days and make two or more applications.

You are now making your cotton crop. Don't let insects get ahead of you. Check with the local county agent for detailed control recommendations.

Social Security

Don't wait too long to apply for medicare. If you are already 65 years old or will become 65 within three months, get in touch with your social security office.

Even if you are still employed and do not plan an early retirement, you still need to enroll to become eligible for medicare.

Apply now, and when you do, bring with you the oldest record of birth that you have. If you have no proof of your age, call anyway at the social security office three months before your 65th birthday.

Weed Control

Don't let weeds come in and take over your row crops — especially cotton and soybeans. Late summer weeds can cost 20 to 25 percent of the production and a big loss in quality and harvesting.

Chemicals are available to control these late weeds. Use them and harvest clean crops.

Notes of County Home Economist

Accidents kill more children from 1 to 14 years old than any disease. And motor vehicle accidents involving children lead the list.

If you are taking the children on a late summer vacation before school starts, be sure you are doing your part to protect your child's life. Safeguards suggested by the National Safety Council to use whenever the car is in motion include:

Have the children ride in the back seat. There's more padding back there and less chance of injury in a sudden stop. Small babies are best off in a bassinet or basket placed parallel with the car's length.

Lock rear doors or install safety latches to prevent accidental fall out. It's best to provide harnesses for the toddlers and seat belts for older youngsters.

Treating Perspiration Stains
No matter how careful you

and all members of your family are to use a deodorant each day, there are occasions when perspiration causes stains and color changes.

To treat a washable garment on which the fabric color has changed but on which the stain is still fresh, sponge with diluted ammonia. Sponge an old stain with vinegar. Or moisten the stained area with water and hold it over an open bottle of ammonia; sometimes just the fumes will restore the color. Then rinse the garment and launder as usual.

If the perspiration stain is stubborn, dampen and sprinkle it with pepsin, which you can buy at drug stores. After an hour, brush the powder off and launder the garment as usual. Treat persistent odor by sponging the area with a colorless mouthwash, then relaunder.

Stains caused by some cream, stick or spray deodorants can

be removed with warm suds. Wash with a bon tetrachloride warm suds.

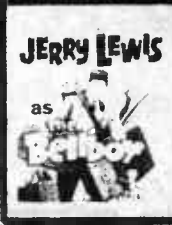

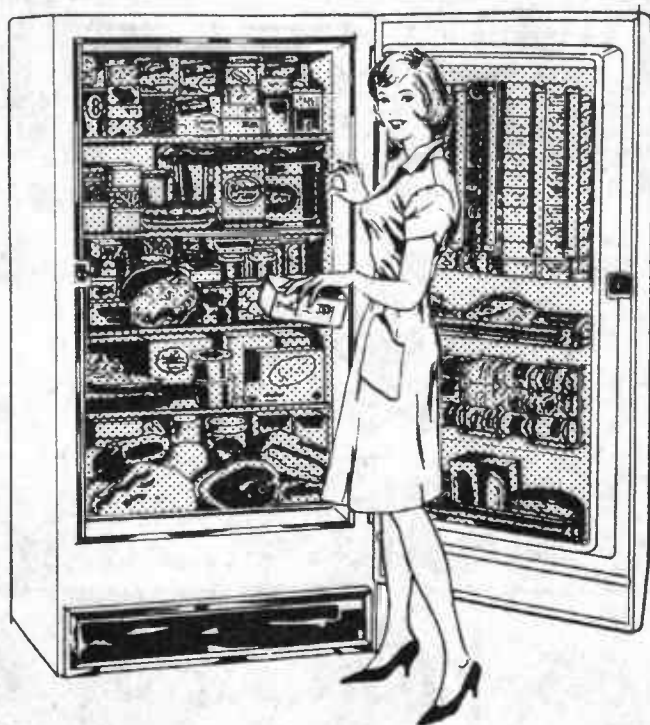

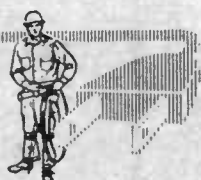

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Marlar Retires From Force After 26 Years With Hwy. Patrol

Strength Of Patrol Increase
From Only 53 To 475 Officers

Marlar retired from Highway Patrol August 1. He served with the force for 26 years. He is now an investigator in the Mississippi Alcoholic Control Division.

In 1938, the legislature of Mississippi passed a bill creating the Highway Safety Patrol. Applicants for the position were interviewed at Camp Shelby, selected to attend the training school at the patrol. Mr. Marlar was one of the first graduates of Burnsville, Mississippi, and was assigned to serve on the force on August 8, 1940. He has since the length of the patrol force from 53 men to 475.

Mr. Marlar was issued a Highway Patrol motorcycle and patrol car which were used in the early days of the patrol. He recalls in the early days of the patrol work there was no communication system. Patrol cars are now equipped with two-way radio systems for communication.

Mr. Marlar has been led to believe that there is little more to do in the patrol. He has been leisurely along the highway for the last few years. This is not quite a routine day. "My job has been too numerous," he states. "Accidents, violation of traffic laws, motor vehicle escorts, message delivery, stranded motorists, road construction, road work, riot control and more tasks must be

After 26 years of service, Mr. Marlar has traveled over one million miles on state highways and has been on duty for 77 of the 82 counties in the state. During World War II he served in the U. S. Army in the Pacific Theatre. He has been in the administration of the state for 8 years. He was the administrative assistant to the governor and 8 years of public safety. The late Governor Paul B. Johnson, who was the first executive of the state, employed him. He was the administrative assistant to the governor, Paul B. Johnson.

Mr. Marlar states "When I first started in the patrol, I was with a feeling of relief. A greater man has traveled and guided my way. I have safe through the years I have encountered. I have been a co-worker and sorrow. I have the privilege of assisting who have needed a hand. My duties have been for firm enforcement of the law. I have involved unpleasant situations. My family and I have accepted many of the fact that an officer is a target for criticism, gossip. I am happy that my family has strengthened. My family ties. My opinion, the law enforcement officer has a greater responsibility now than ever before in the history of America. The trend of disregard and disrespect for the officer is sweeping the country. If I could leave a word of advice derived from my many years of law enforcement, I would appeal to the parents of our young generation. Do not condemn the officer who corrects your child. This is handing him the key to future trouble and heartache. Youngsters who are allowed to operate a vehicle without a license are a source of a great concern for our officers."

Mr. Marlar is married to the former Jane Holleman of Pickens. They have four children, Kim, Annette, A. B. and Cherry. He is a Baptist and attends Harmony Hill Baptist Church where he teaches an adult Sunday School Class and is choir director. He is a mason and a shiner.

Several years ago his wife, Jane, wrote an article "The Inside Story of a Patrolman's Life." She received national recognition after her story was published in a national magazine for highway safety officers. Many states requested copies for their wives of officers. Her story is presented to each Mississippi patrolman upon his completion of his recruit training.

servatives stand together and wage a continuing fight for constitutional government.

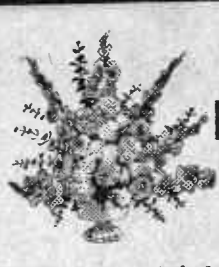

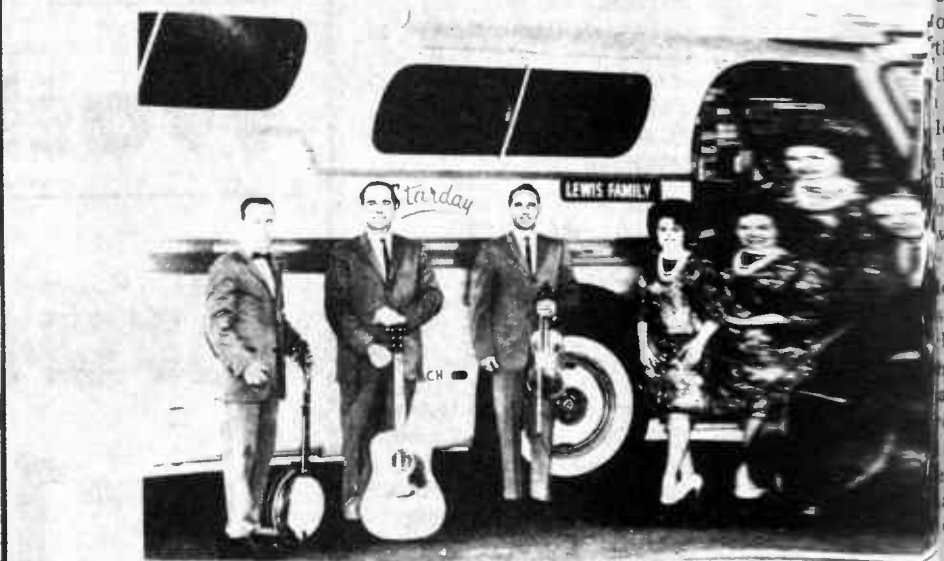

New Lodge At J. P. Coleman State Park Nears Completion; Open Soon

Three-Story Construction Provides Rustic Atmosphere And Comfort

The new lodge at J. P. Coleman State Park is nearing completion.

A. V. Lindsey, state park director, states that an Open House and Dedication Service are being planned with visitors to attend from over the State. The exact date for the event has not been set definitely but it is hoped that it will be around September 15.

Work began on the three-story structure in the early summer by Kimberly Construction Company. The money for the construction was appropriated thru a special legislative act which provided funds for various developments and improvements in a number of the State Parks throughout Mississippi.

Mr. Lindsey, his wife, daughter Pam and her friend Dolly Ann Pigot, all of Brandon, were the first to spend a week at the new lodge. They stayed in the recently completed apartment which is located at one end of the top floor. Other facilities on this floor are single rooms for guests who may rent them either by the night or as long as they wish.

The center floor, which is entered from the back at ground level, will house the restaurant. "At present we are working to complete the cooking facilities. Just this week the large stove and grill hood was installed,"

Mr. Lindsey stated.

The restaurant is paneled in rich, dark wood. The other three walls are glass which will provide all diners with a view of the lake and the surrounding wooded hills. This view will be just as spectacular at night. "Right now plans are in the making to order fishnet draperies for the restaurant which

will add to the atmosphere," the park director added.

On the first floor a special partition will be constructed to provide a private dining room for club meetings, reunions, staff meetings, etc. The other half of the area will be furnished with indoor recreational equipment such as ping pong tables and perhaps a record player.

"This is one of the nicest accommodations for the public offered by any State Park in the south. It will soon come to be one of the most popular gathering spots for people from all through the Tri-State area in addition to Tishomingo County and North Mississippi," Mr. Lindsey added.

Mississippi's Alcoholic Beverage Control Law The Administering Agency

(Part I of three parts)

The laws enacted in 1966 by the Mississippi Legislature for the control of alcoholic beverages first reannounce the state's policy favoring prohibition. Then the law provides a method of making liquor legal by county referendum. Within 60 days after receiving a petition signed by 20% or 1,500, whichever is lesser, of the qualified voters requesting an election, the county board of supervisors must set and hold an election on the question of "coming out from under the dry laws."

Elections may be held no more frequently than every two years, and an election can put a county which has previously voted wet back under the prohibition laws. The election question is decided by the majority vote. If a county has two judicial districts, each district is a separate voting unit.

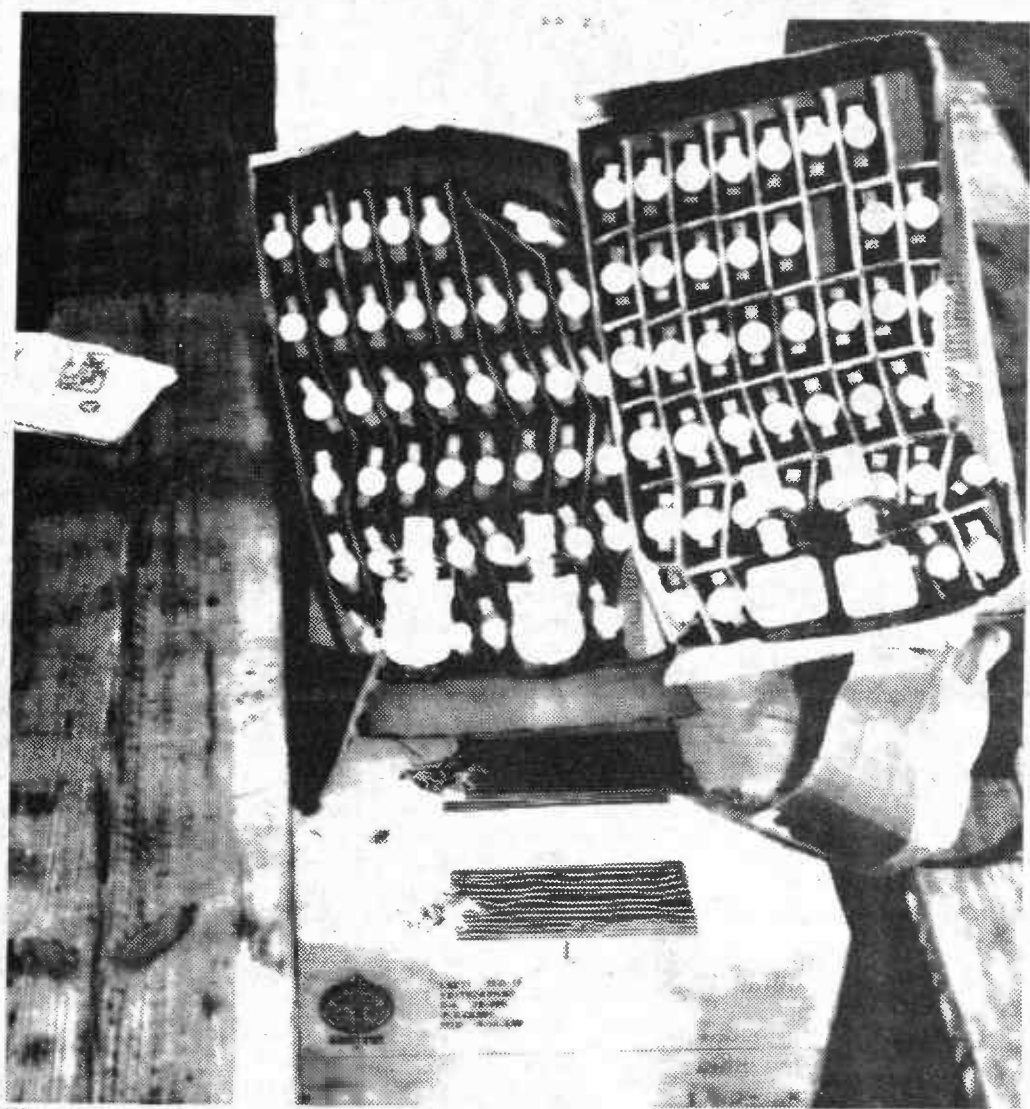
The Alcoholic Beverage Control Division of the State Tax Commission administers the law. The Commission, through the Division, purchases liquor and sells it at wholesale; issues the permits which are necessary to authorize package stores and bars; collects privilege and other liquor taxes; issues regulations governing many facets of the liquor business not specifically covered by the law; and has investigatory and enforcement duties.

The Commission is the only wholesaler of liquor in the state, and the only legal liquor sold in the state is that sold by the commission to permit holders and then to retail customers. The Commission is required to buy from the manufacturer except that foreign brands can be obtained from importers, and in order to take advantage of an unusual saving, purchases can be made from wholesalers or brokers. The Commission has authority to sell beer with more than 4% alcohol content but is not doing so and has indicated no plan to do so.

The Commission has refused to give a price list to one who does not hold a permit. Its position is that because of the nature of the business, it should operate for this purpose like a private business rather than as a public agency. This requires one to expend \$1,800 for a permit plus a not insubstantial sum for preparing and filing the application before he knows the cost of the goods he hopes to sell.

The Commission's prices must be uniform over the state. The Commission gives no quantity discounts and gives no hauling allowances, as all sales are on a delivered basis. The deliveries are now being made by truck lines. All sales are for cash with the order. The Commission's prices must be designed to yield a reasonable profit and be competitive with neighboring states. Each retailer sets his own price, but there can be no price fixing among retailers.

6.687 Miles Of Eastport Road To Be Improved

The State Aid Road Division has announced its approval of a State-County contract agreement with the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, providing for the improvement of the Iuka-Eastport Road by County Forces. The announcement was made by Frank T. Moore, State Aid Engineer.
