County Fair Is In Full Swing: 3 Days Left

Youth Talent Contest Scheduled For Tonight Beginning At 7:30

The big Youth-Talent Contest will be held tonight beginning at 7:30 p.m. at the Tishomingo County Fair & Livestock Show.

The overall winner of the contest will receive \$25 and will participate in the Talent Contest at the Mid-South Fair in Memphis. The winner will also appear on Channel 3 television while there.

A representative of the Mid-South Youth-Talent Contest will be on hand to view the local contest. He will have the privilege of inviting contestants, in addition to the winner, to participate in the area-wide event.

Contestants must be between the ages of 10 and 20, whether

in school or not. The different divisions are as follows: vocal solo, classical and popular; dancing solo; instrumental solo; vocal group with 2 or more; novelty with one or more; dancing group with 2 or more and instrumental group with 2 or more.

An individual may appear in the contest only twice, either in a group number and an individual number or two individual numbers.

"Contestants may still enter the event simply by telephoning their names to one of the committee members or one of the extension workers," stated Percie Stricklin, county agent.

Committee members are Billy Stephens, John Denson in the south end of the county; Hubert Rhay Robinson in Burnsville; Julian Long in Iuka and Mrs. Ava Hill in Tishomingo.

YOU CONSUMED 11 CHICKENS WEIGHING 40 POUNDS IN 1965

The production of commercial broilers last year in 23 major producing states was sufficient to provide each American with more than 11 chickens, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Total poundage was equivalent to about 40 pounds per consumer. This compared with about 37 pounds in 1964.

An Agriculture Department report said the 1965 gross income of broiler producers in these states was \$1.163 million, compared with \$1.018 million in 1964. Georgia was the major producing state with a gross income of \$199 million.

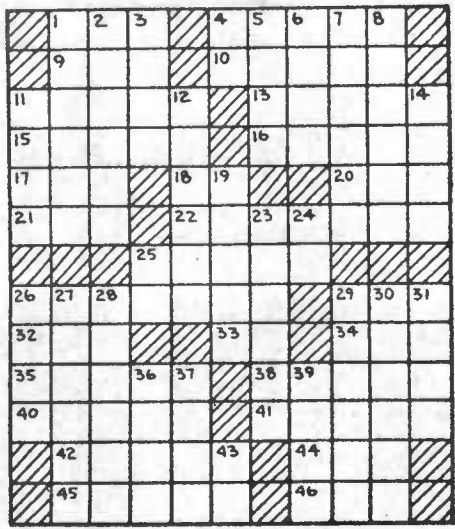

Without A Fight

The death of the once great New York Herald Tribune has caused concern far beyond the metropolis of New York City where it was published.

A few months ago, 'The Trib' was read by more than a million persons a day. The company that published it gave employment to hundreds of people — editors, reporters, advertising men, printers and a variety of clerical help. Today the Trib is no more.

The commonplace saying is that it was killed by a strike. So it was, in an immediate sense. Strikers, with no sense of moderation, made demands that ultimately destroyed a famous newspaper. For many decades, the New York newspaper had been considered one of the leading dailies in the United States. But there was more to The New York Herald Tribune's death than the final, fatal strike.

The Trib died not simply of

one labor dispute but of the climate of opinion which permits a union to silence the press in the nation's largest city and to paralyze other types of essential industry. New York is a city ruled by strikers. Longshoremen can call a strike, and the entire New York waterfront becomes like a ghost town. A comparative handful of subway workers walk off the job, and the metropolis is deprived of vital transporta-

tion.

The nation — and New York State — for that matter — has not been without individual leaders and organizations striving to wake the American people to the terrible danger posed by monopoly unionism. But The New York Herald Tribune, which was nominally Republican, gave no support in recent years to the conservative movement. It scorned Barry Goldwater when he ran for President. Its most recent hero was John Lindsay, the "liberal" congressman turned mayor of the Big City.

Mr. Lindsay was opposed to state right to work laws. He bragged that New York City was a "union" city. Yet he received the active support of The Trib. One wonders: didn't the owners of The Tribune realize what was coming? Didn't they know that their property couldn't survive with "liberalism" and big unionism dominant in city and state? Why weren't they working for their paper's survival by the best possible way — supporting the conservative cause, that is? And, why, at the last, did The Trib supinely abandon the fight for its own existence and fold without trying to publish in defiance of the unions?

Other papers have fought the unions, and some of them have won. The public can understand a newspaper being besieged by union bosses. It can realize that there is more than one way to gag the press. But the readers of The Trib were never given a chance to rally around in a time of crisis. The Tribune gave up without a struggle.

But then it had given up the fight against Big Government years ago. Its praise was reserved for those who want to make government bigger, who wanted to restrict the states and communities. It criticized communities threatened by practitioners of civil disobediences. It jumped on the liberal bandwagon. But now The New York Herald Tribune is gone. Its "liberalism" didn't save it in the end; it helped kill it.

There's a lesson here. Some people in our society look at the power of the "liberals" and say: "If I can't lick them, I will join them." But it doesn't work.

A newspaper that turns its back on conservative principles is turning its back on its own well-being. Companies that are fearful of having their officers join conservative groups or that are unwilling to support conservative business groups aren't sparing themselves in the long run. On the contrary, they are weakening the overall defenses of free enterprise in the United States. They also are leaving themselves exposed to the increasingly arrogant demands of

the union bosses.

In this life, it doesn't pay to run away from struggle or to abandon sound principles for what seems momentary gain. This is the real lesson of the now defunct New York Herald Tribune. Had it become the press voice of real conservatism in New York City, it would not have surrendered without a struggle. Loyal conservatives would have bent every effort to keep it alive and on the streets. Indeed, had The Trib chosen conservatism instead of "liberalism," New York City today might have a conservative mayor.

THE GOLDEN YEARS

WHAT SINGLE WOMEN FACE WHEN RETIREMENT COMES

It is suggested that all of you single women of retirement age who read this read it in the same way you used to read "Forever Amber" — out of sight.

As a single woman you might tentatively place your retirement in the following brackets, which you can expand or modify according to your particular case:

AGE

At long last you've got to tell the truth about it. You can't dodge it, unless you're going to cheat yourself. So, if retirement is still in front of you, go to your boss or your personnel officer and confess. He won't tell. And he'll tell you how to set matters straight.

Retire, if you can, at least a month or so before your retirement date. It will enable you for the rest of your life to say you retired early and prevent anybody from pegging your age.

HOUSING

You'll usually be a misfit in a home community of couples and kids, and foursomes at bridge. An apartment, for you, is a better bet.

None is waiting for you, except among other single retired women. So make some by becoming an enthusiastic expert in some one field — art, bridge,

antiques, state history, rose culture, book collecting — but I wouldn't bother with bird-watching and hiking clubs. Pick one thing and stick by it.

That word — "togetherness" — does not mean "everyone must come to breakfast and to dinner." It has a deeper and more demanding significance.

Marriage would be your best companionship. If this interests you then go where eligible men of your age (widowers always, never bachelors) are likely to go.

MONEY

Single women are living in retirement with dignity on as little as \$150 a month. But not with Cadillacs. If you have any substantial money keep two things in mind: (1) Single older women are regarded as soft touches by professional fund raisers, for playgrounds, church projects, welfare programs and such. So misplace your check-book when a smooth-talking man comes around. (2) Single women have more cause than any other older people to leave their money behind to some cause that will memorialize their name, such as "The Mary Jones Home for Retired Career Women." Married people have children to carry on the memory of them. Single women have mainly nieces and nephews... who forget.

JOBS

The U.S. Government Poverty Program and the country's current education boom have opened up many jobs for older single women, particularly those who can teach or lead. Ask your Congressman and your State Legislator.

counter by a 20-6 margin.

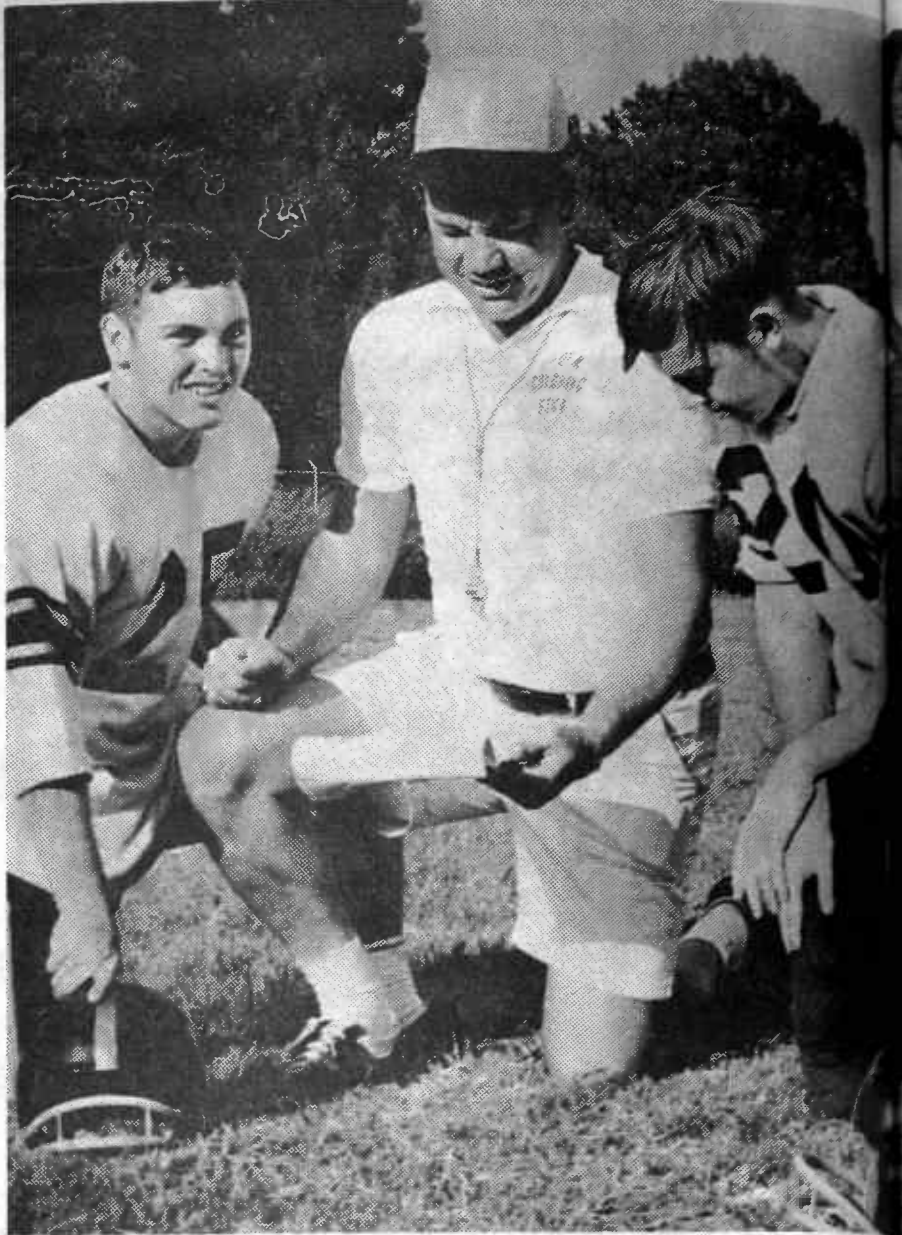

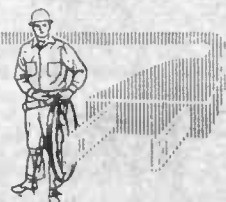

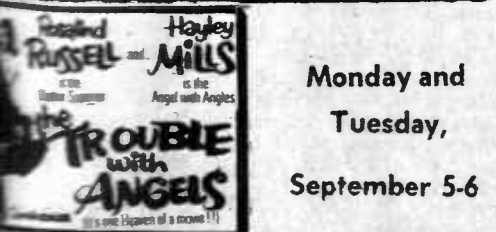

Mississippi's Alcoholic Beverage Control Law Permits For Retailers

(Part II of III Parts)

The State Tax Commission, acting through the Alcohol Beverage Control Division, issues various types of permits for liquor business, including permits for distilleries and wineries.

Common carriers (trains and buses) can, after obtaining a permit, sell liquor by the drink but not while the vehicle is stopped in a dry county.

An on-premises retailer's permit authorizes the sale of liquor for consumption on the licensed premises. This allows by-the-drink liquor sales in restaurants, hotel dining rooms, clubs, and "such establishments as it (Commission) deems proper." Under the latter category bars may be licensed.

Hotels and restaurants inside the municipal limits or in a qualified resort area can obtain permits to sell liquor by the drink. Liquor can be sold by the drink in a licensed club regardless of its being located in town or in a resort area. Open bars, other than in a hotel dining room or restaurant, are allowed only in a qualified resort area.

A resort area is defined in the law as an area outside a municipality which is regularly visited by tourists, transients and vacationists. In an apparent conflict between sections of the law, a resort area is later referred to as being either inside or outside a municipality. The Commission presently approves resort areas within cities, acting upon a ruling by the Attorney General.

Open bars are permitted in resort areas, and the Commission must designate a resort area. This is done upon application from the supervisors and mayors in the area affected. The applications must show that a legal notice has been published in an area newspaper for two weeks stating that the resort area classification will be sought and that approval will permit bars. Public responses to the proposed application must be submitted with the application. The Commission then approves or disapproves the locality as a resort area.

To qualify for a bar permit, a hotel must have at least 20 adequate rooms for overnight accommodations. If it is in a town of 25,000 population or more, the room requirement is 50. Also the hotel must have a dining room "constantly frequented by customers each day". A restaurant must derive at least 50% of its revenues from food sales to be eligible for a bar permit, and it must serve regular meals, not just sandwiches, etc.

A package retailers permit allows the operation of a store to sell liquor in its original container. No liquor may be consumed in or around the store, and the store can sell nothing except packaged liquor. Package stores must be in a town or resort area.

By regulation, the Commission has limited package store permits to one person, firm or corporation. This limitation is designed to prevent chain package stores. There is no similar limitation on by-the-drink permits, but the Commission is authorized to adopt such a restriction. Also by regulation, no person will be allowed to hold a package store permit and a by-the-drink permit at the same time. The number of permits issued cannot be limited by the population of an area.

There can be no liquor advertising by radio, television,

newspaper, billboard, word of mouth, or other.

A package store is limited to an outside, eight inches high showing the name of the store, permit number, and the fact that package liquor is sold. Neither liquor nor liquor advertising can be from outside the premises. A by-the-drink store can have no outside sign indicating that liquor is inside.

Liquor cannot be sold within 400 feet of a school, or funeral home except that in a business commercial zone the restriction is only 100 feet. The measurement is by the most direct route between the points of the buildings.

No deliveries can be made by retailers, and stores are prohibited, as there can be only one permit. Package stores cannot sell before 10 p.m., but bars have no time limits.

Liquor not be sold or consumed at a public school Sunday and election day sales in package stores as are all sales to minors, dope addicts, and insane person. The Commission, because of a by one's family or employer, can prohibit a person buying liquor, and sales to that person by one of the Commission of its action are illegal.

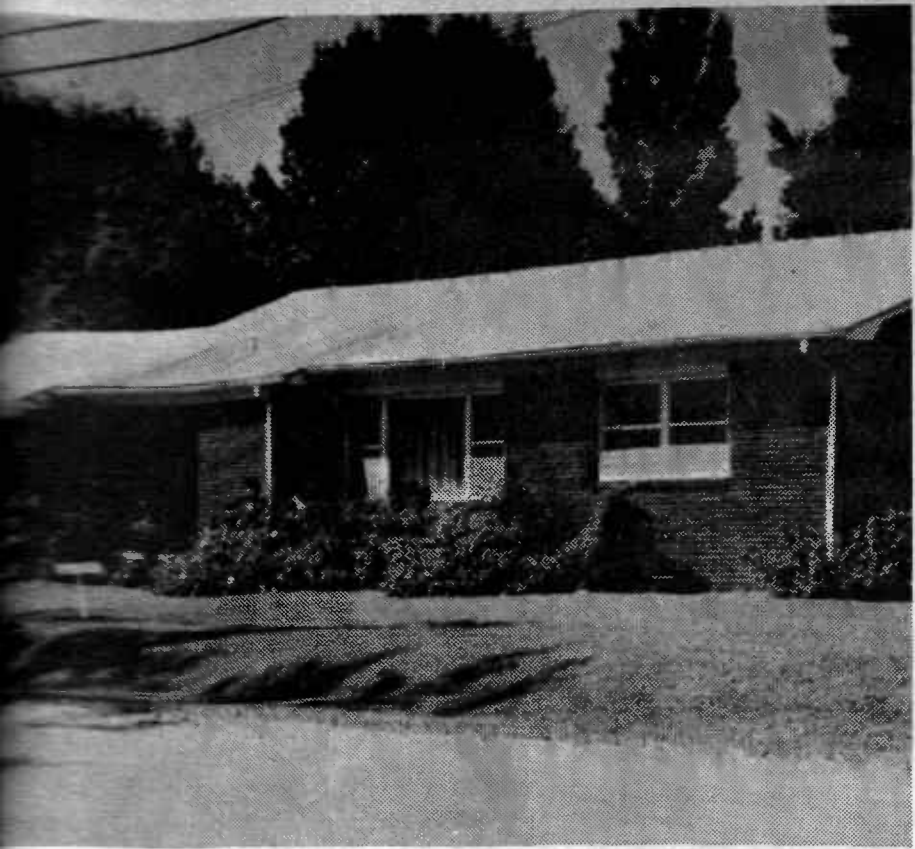

Plant Fescue For Pasture

by Hiram A. Jones
Work Unit Conservationist

Take advantage of the moisture now in the ground and

lime, fertilize and prepare it for seeding to fescue and Ladino Clover as soon as you can.

Contact the ASCS office (Mr. Allen's office) to see if you can get any assistance in the way of fertilizer and seed.

Be sure to apply some nitrogen about the equivalent of 200 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre.

Prepare a good seedbed, apply lime, if needed, and use a balanced fertilizer that contains nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium, or buy these plant foods separately and apply them at a rate of 60 pounds of each of these elements per acre.

Sow plenty of fescue seed about 25 pounds per acre. But not so many pounds of Ladino Clover Seed. Three (3) pounds of this seed per acre should be enough. Be sure to inoculate the clover seed before planting.

Get your fescue planted as soon as you can so it can get off to a good start, growing before cold weather sets in.

Fescue is a soil conserving crop as well as a good grazing crop.

Defoliation
can help you produce quality cotton, but be done properly at the right time.

Advantages of defoliation include: rank growth, color and grade are improved, and fiber strength is increased after defoliation.

Defoliate more quickly on wet land, less on dry land. Defoliate in less moist soil. Defoliate in seedling stage of the gin. This prevents excessive drying and preserves fiber.

Defoliate is that when done too soon, the cotton is immature and the fibers in the cotton are weak. They break in the gin or mill process more readily and the cotton is of lower quality.

Good defoliation is done it and how, and your local county agent can help you.

Time to make that fall of oats, wheat or corn fall and win.

There is plenty of fertilizer time. Do not let the stand to rot. If you do not, around two weeks before any oats seed are treated for leaf disease, treatment is

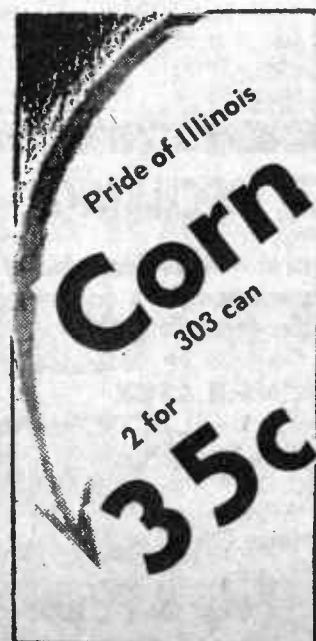

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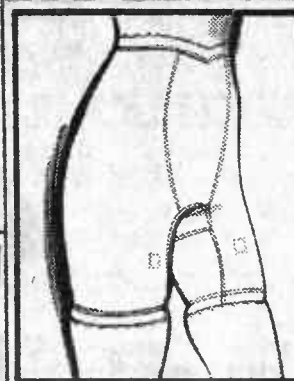
