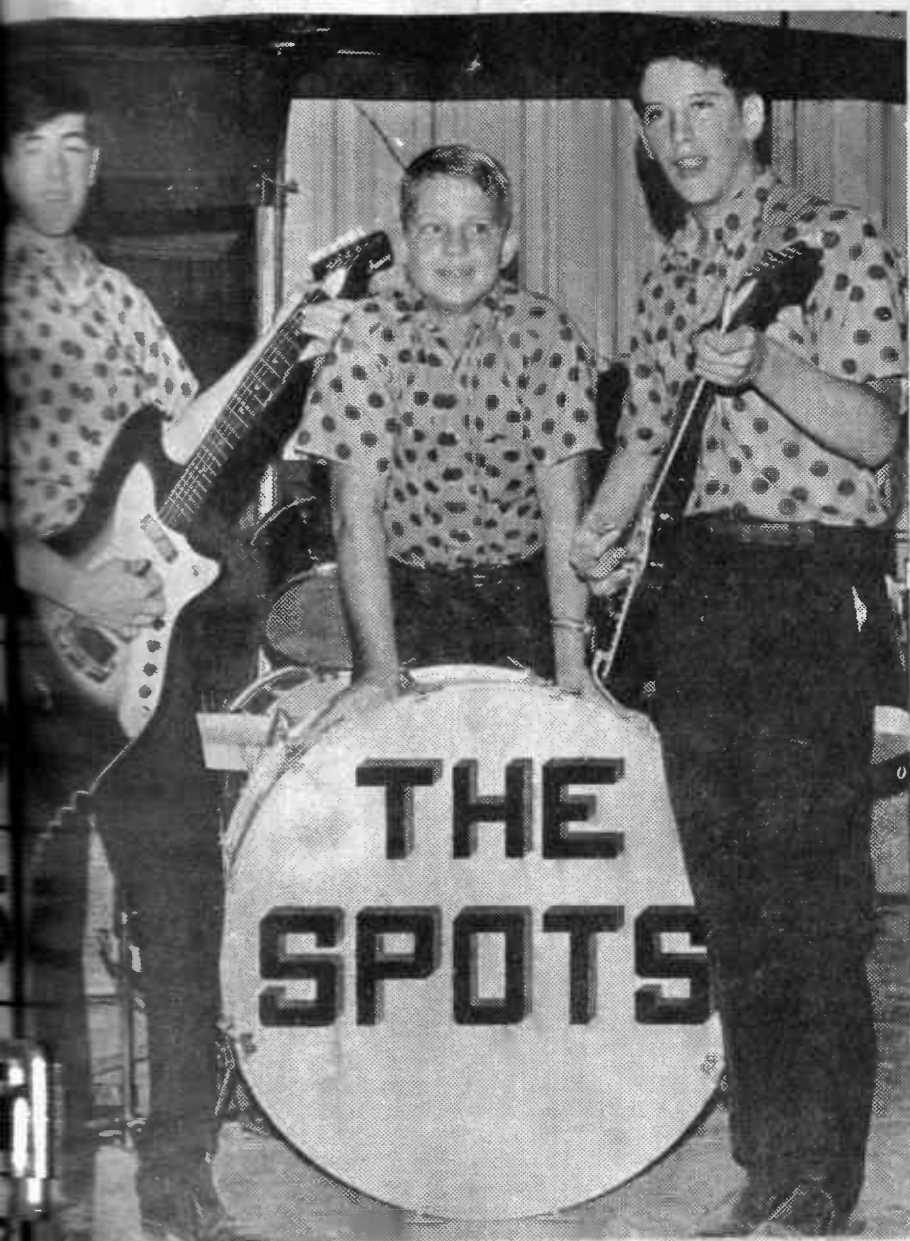

Increase Noted

An increase in business activity in Iuka was noted in July with the City taking in a total of \$4,796.63 in sales tax collections during the month. This figure is slightly above the \$4,426.19 reported for July of 1965.

\$2,321.83 was the figure Belmont tallied in with in July, showing a marked increase over its a-year-ago figure of \$1,742.80. Belmont collects sales tax on the one-half of one percent rate.

In Tishomingo collections totaled \$715.25 as compared to \$614.54 in July '65.

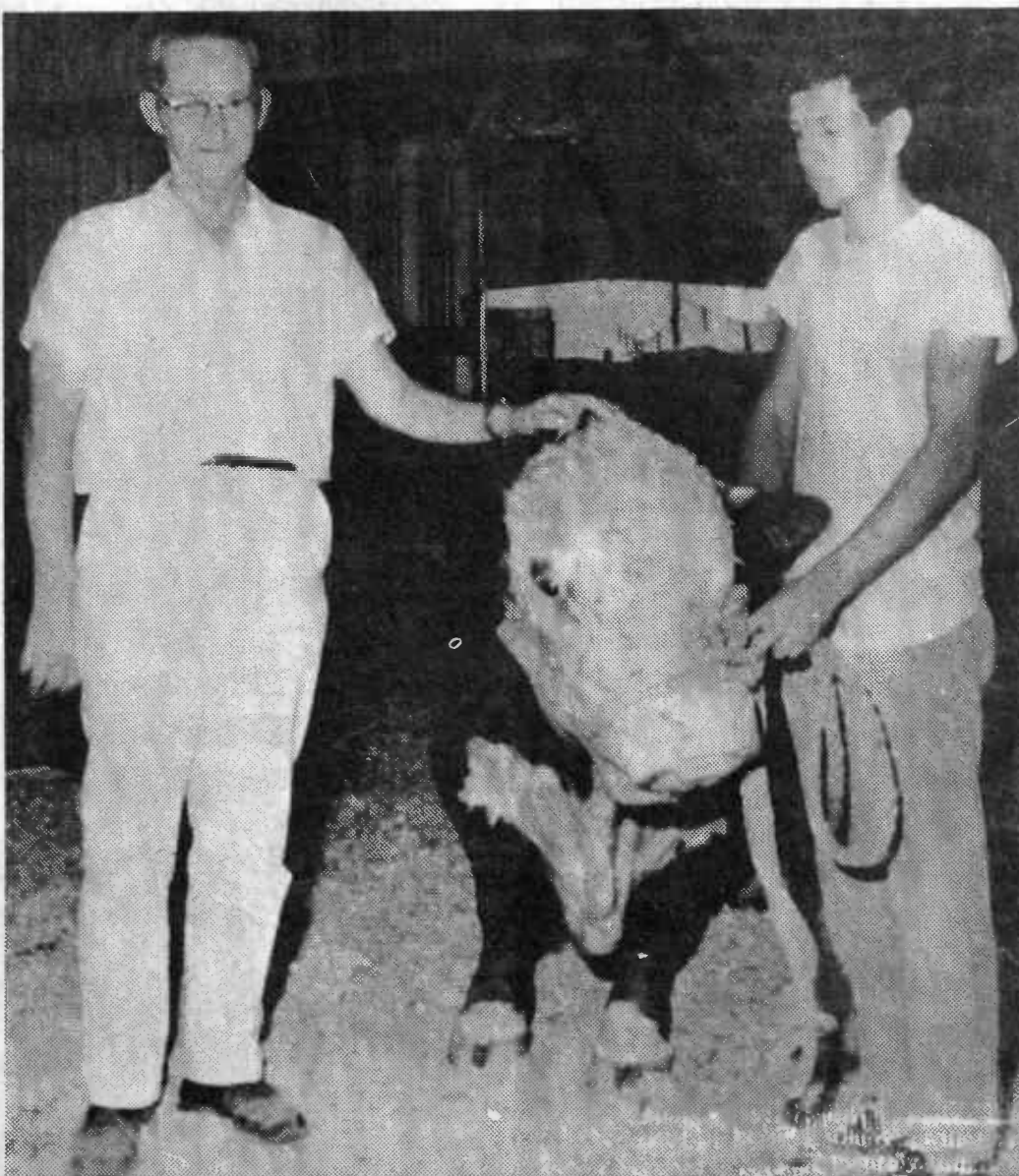
These facts were taken from a recent issue of the magazine Mississippi Municipalities.

Other nearby towns showed the following figures for July 1966 with corresponding figures for July 1965: Baldwin a total of \$3,933.67, last year \$3,579.85; Booneville collected \$7,958.28 this year and \$7,346.39 in '65; Corinth's figure of \$17,203.47 declined from July last year's figure of \$19,751.86; and Fulton reported \$5,431.96 this year, \$4,170.15 last year.

It is interesting to note that every town with the exception of Corinth showed an increase over the July 1965 collections.

Mississippi's Alcoholic Beverage Control Law Permit Applications

Part III of three parts

Earlier articles described the various liquor permits, especially for package stores and by-the-drink sales.

A permit has a term of one year, and while it is not a vested right, it can be renewed if the applicant still meets the initial qualifying standards, some of which are: good moral character; reputation as a peaceable, law-abiding citizen; at least 21 years old and a resident of the state for at least five years; never convicted of a felony; literate in English; not physically or mentally incapacitated; not in a habit of drinking excessively; no criminal record exists for applicant or any employee.

Besides a \$25.00 application fee, annual permit costs are: \$1,800 for a package store; \$900 per each \$5,000 or fraction thereof of liquor purchased from the Commission for an on-premises license; \$450 per each \$5,000 or fraction thereof of liquor purchased from the Commission for a club on-premises permit; \$120 for a common carrier.

An applicant for any type permit must publish a notice for two consecutive issues in a newspaper circulated in the place of the proposed place of business stating the intention to seek a permit. The notice must show the exact location of the proposed store, and it must disclose the name of the applicant, names of all owners if a trade name is to be used, or the names of the officers if a corporation is the applicant.

The application must show the names of all persons owning an interest in the business. Several application forms are required, including one calling for information relative to the applicant's personal qualifications to hold a permit, financial information and other data to indicate whether the standards for a permit have been met. An applicant can submit recommendations from local public officials.

The law disqualifies an applicant who has been convicted of a state or federal felony or who has a criminal record or who has an employee with a criminal record. However, the application form only requires the applicant to disclose whether within the past ten years he has been convicted of a felony or a violation of the new liquor law. Fingerprints and a photograph must be submitted, allowing the Commission to make a partial check of the existence of a criminal record.

The applicant must also make a \$10,000 bond conditioned upon compliance with the state law and with the Commissions' regulations. The bond must be executed by a surety company authorized to do business in the state. A violation of the law could result in forfeiture of the full amount of the bond. The annual premium on the bond is \$120.00. Directives from some of the bonding companies indicate a cautious screening of bond applicants, especially for their financial position. Inability to obtain the bond will stymie an applicant, and threat of forfeiture will make the bond an effective compliance device.

After a public hearing, the Commission can revoke or suspend a permit for violation of the law or regulations. The Commission's decision can be appealed to the chancery court of the permit holder's county.

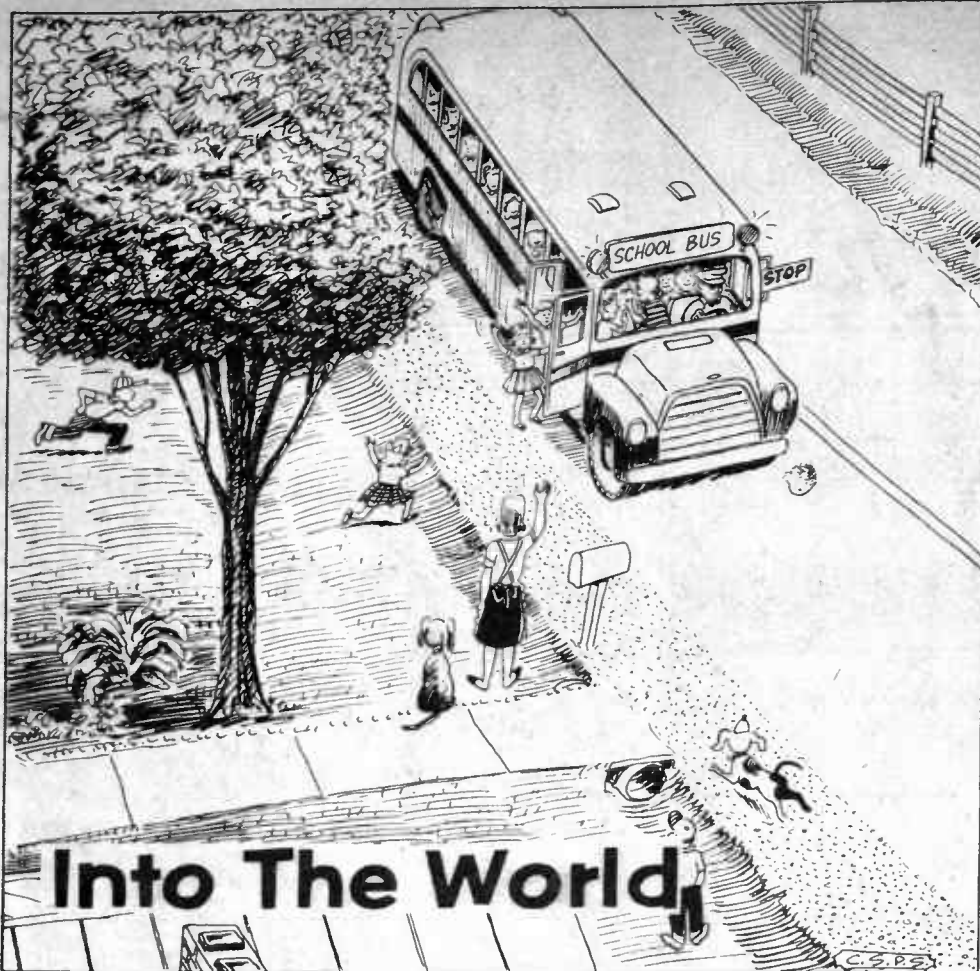

THE GOLDEN YEARS

YOUR RETIREMENT SAVINGS HAVE RUN INTO A DILEMMA

Some of you of retirement age seem to be moving your savings around in a wheelbarrow. In the last two months millions of dollars have been switched from savings & loan accounts paying 4 1/2 per cent return to banks paying 5, from bank accounts paying 4 per cent to savings & loans paying 5 1/2.

And with the Stock Market falling, many of you have been unloading your stocks and looking for something safer.

All of which may be all right. But so much switching is going on, and in all directions, that it seems time to get down to some facts on just what retired people should do with the \$800 or \$8,000 they have salted away.

As this is written, the situation on money, in general, is this:

Some savings & loan associations, usually on the West Coast, are paying up to 5.75 per cent return on savings left up to three years. This is probably the highest return you can get on small savings.

Some banks, usually in and around the large cities, are paying up to 5.5 per cent return on "Certificates of Deposit" and other "bonus" savings plans. Most of these banks are looking for the big money... \$200,000 or so. But some are offering such a return on deposits of less than \$1,000. Which is taking so much money out of savings & loans that the Government is threatening to blow the whistle.

Savings & loan associations, except for those along the West Coast, have been paying 4.25 or so. Many have recently gone to 4.50 in an effort to stop the flow of money to the banks' "bonus" savings plans. Many of you seem to think the effort is too little and a little late because the flow is continuing.

Banks, in general, are paying 4 per cent on regular passbook

'Tight Money' For Whom?

Americans are currently hearing a great deal about "tight money." Not only are they hearing about it, but they are feeling its effects. A year ago, a citizen with a respectable job had no difficulty going to his bank or savings and loan institution and obtaining a mortgage loan for a new home. But things are very different now.

Today, lending institutions simply don't have much money to lend for home construction. The federal government has decreed a "tight money" policy which has dried up funds for new construction. The pinch caused by this "tight money" policy is being felt by many occupations and types of enterprise.

Now money policy is a complex subject, on which there can be legitimate disagreement. But Americans who are being discomforted or hurt by the Johnson administration's "tight money" policies have a right to inquire whether the administration is applying it uniformly.

The first thing a citizen discovers, if he looks into the situation, is that "tight money" hasn't been heard of insofar as federal giveaway programs are concerned. Financial outlays for the War on Poverty, for example, are as big as ever. Thus "tight money" isn't a problem for the anti-poverty warriors, who believe that "culturally deprived" children should be exposed to ballet at public expense. Nor is "tight money" a problem for the federal agencies that distribute free food to India, the United Arab Republic and other countries that spout criticism of the USA.

The U. S. Commissioner of Education also doesn't have to concern himself about "tight money." He has ample funds to hire snoopers to pry into the affairs of local school boards and to employ bureaucrats who believe they have a warrant to act like the Gestapo in quizzing school superintendents, school boards.

Wherever one looks, one finds evidence that the Great Society isn't applying "tight money" policies to its own highly political programs designed to get votes.

Then consider the wage settlements approved by the Johnson administration. Some advocates of "tight money" have indicated this policy would indirectly hold down wages. As a matter of fact, for many construction workers it not only has held down wages but eliminated them completely. But favored union groups don't have to be troubled about "tight money." The International Association of Machinists, who won a whopping inflationary

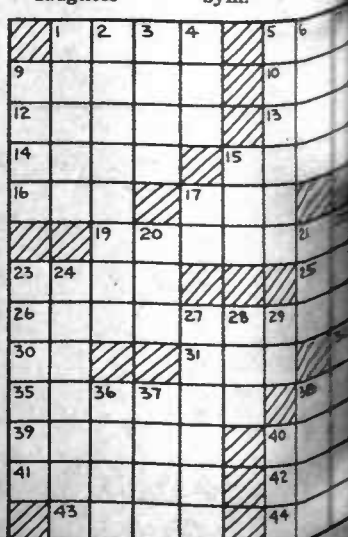

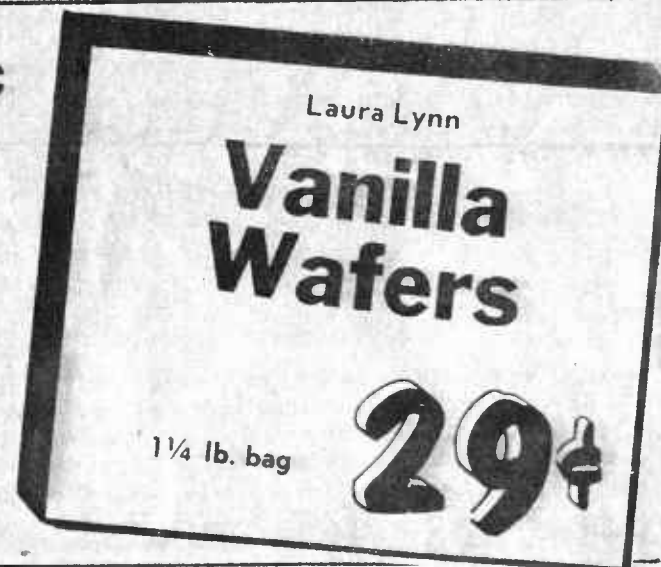

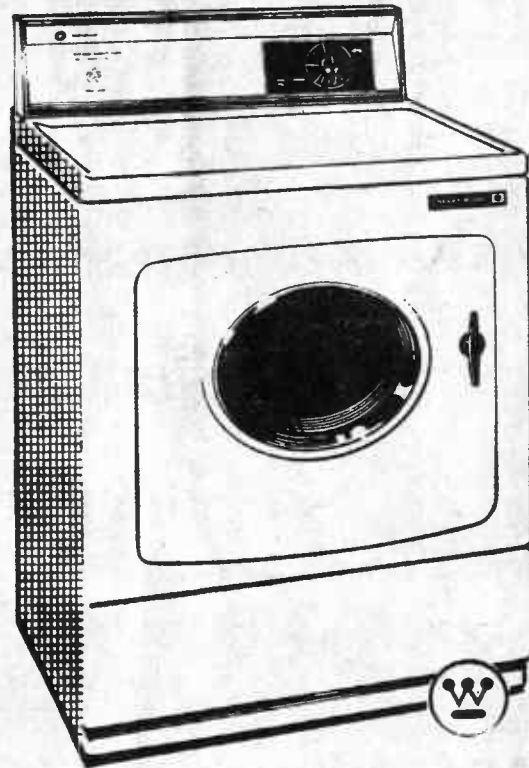

ing. It is like having hay that did not have to be cut, baled and put in the barn. It is grass left on the land in a field for the cows to eat.

It is best to have more than one area. Two or three small areas that can be grazed in the early fall is better than one large area. An electric fence can be used to a good advantage to determine the size of the plot to be grazed.

If Bahia grass is to be used in this way, be sure it is grazed down fairly low before heavy freezing sets in, otherwise there is real danger that the Bahia grass will freeze out.

If you have a separate pasture that is not badly needed now, permit the grass to grow from now until frost and use it for early fall grazing. You may like it. I'm sure the cows will.

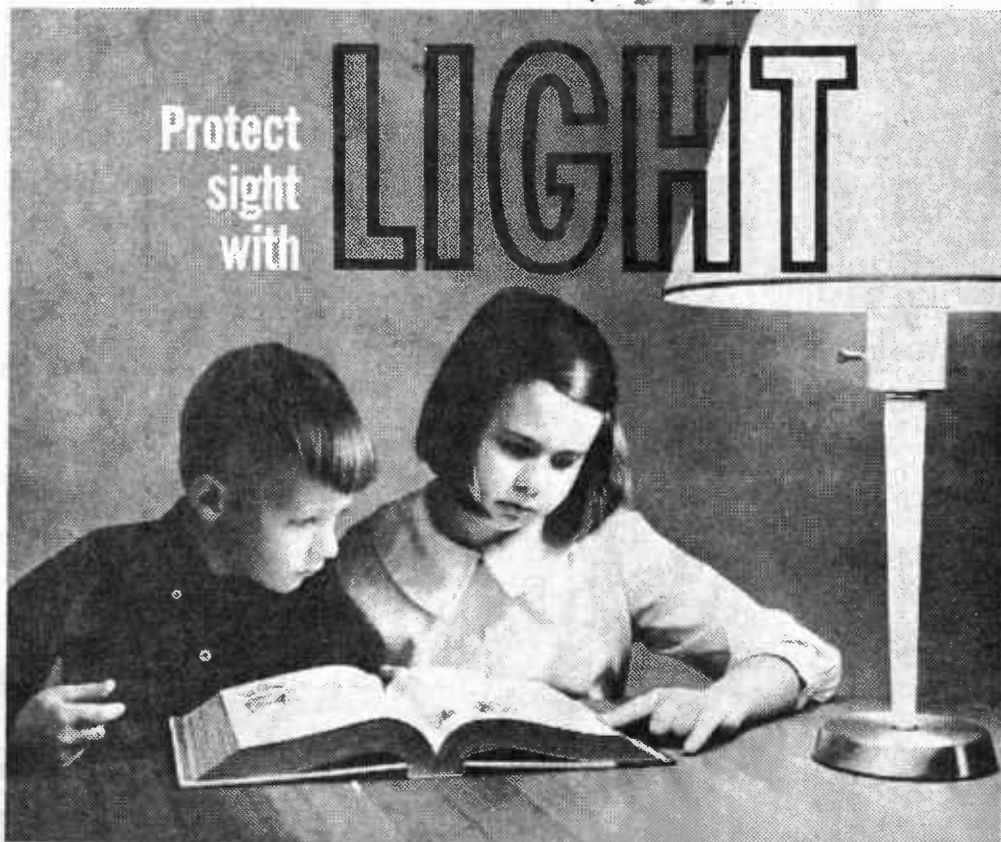

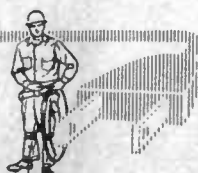

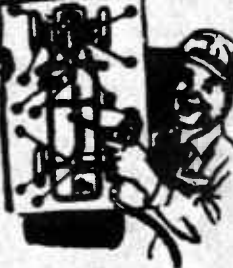

Reynolds Joins Language Program, Duty With Military Intelligence

L/Corp. David L. Reynolds has been selected to study the Vietnamese language, the purpose to become an expert in the language and gain a knowledge of the people and customs in Viet Nam.

Following the 47 week course at the Defense Language Institute in Washington, Reynolds will become an interrogator and interpreter in Vietnam. "Actually, I will be a member of Military Intelligence with my duties

falling in this category," L/Corp Reynolds stated.

"I'm very excited over the entire program. As a matter of fact, I was selected to report to Officer's Candidate School, the first of October, but after learning of the language program, I began work toward this end. This included numerous aptitude tests.

"There were only five of us selected to take the Army Language Aptitude Test. My final

score was 47 out of a possible 50," he added.

In L/Corp. Reynolds' orders, Maj. Gen. Ormond R. Simpson at Camp LeJeune, N. C., stated "... because of your previous record and experience you have been specifically selected for this assignment. The purpose of this memorandum is to remind you of the obligation and responsibility you will carry on your new assignment.

"You will, of course, be a representative of the Marine Corp ... Your purpose is to learn, to evaluate, and to add to your professional knowledge."

L/Corp. Reynolds is at home on leave visiting with relatives and friends before leaving for Washington, September 15.

David is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Reynolds of Iuka, and is a 1960 graduate of Iuka High School. He attended school at the University of Mississippi and Millsaps in Jackson. He is well known there and in Northeast Mississippi where he was active in the Methodist Ministry before entering the service.

Notes of County Home Economist

Where does Sally study? On the floor in front of the TV. At the dining room table or the breakfast bar?

Don't you think she could concentrate better, learn better study habits and do better school work if she had a definite permanent place of her own to study? A place where she can spread out and store her school books and papers.

In her study area she needs a desk or table about 24 inches wide and 36 inches long. It should be the proper height for her to work comfortably. With the desk she needs a chair in which she can sit erect with her feet on the floor. The best selection is a straight-backed, armless chair that is not upholstered.

Don't let the desk face the window: It's better to have it facing a light-colored wall. The finish on the top of the desk is better if it is light-colored, too, and not glossy.

Of great importance is the lighting. You will want to provide a good quality lamp that provides plenty of light — 150 watts is the minimum. You can get more information about lamp selection and placement from your home economist's office.

We've been talking about a study spot for Sally. But don't forget young Tommy. He needs

one too, as does every school boy and girl.

Washable Woolens

It seems that woolen garments are about to join other fabrics in your washer. Both the U. S. Department of Agriculture and commercial firms have developed several chemicals that can be applied during the manufacture of woven or knit wool yardage to give it the same launderability as "man made" fibers.

These new treatments will permit you to machine-wash wool garments without those bugaboos of shrinkage, pulling and matting.

Some manufacturers are already using the chemically treated yardage for sweaters, shirts, dresses and socks. Since the chemical is not visible to the eye or to the feel, be sure you read the labels carefully when you buy fall and winter garments that are made of wool.

Mexican Stuffed Green Peppers

6 large green sweet peppers, 2 tablespoons olive oil or salad oil, ½ cup tomato paste, 2 cloves garlic, minced, 2 pounds ground beef, 2½ teaspoons salt, 2 tablespoons chili powder, ½ cup finely chopped peanuts or almonds, 1 cup fine soft bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine.

Parboil clean and hollowed peppers for 2 minutes in boiling salted water. Set peppers aside to cool. Heat oil in a 9 or 10-inch skillet. Add next 6 ingredients and stir and cook 5 minutes over low heat. Spoon into cavities of peppers. Sprinkle tops with bread crumbs. Dot with butter and bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Serves 6 generously.

4-H DAIRY SHOW

THE 4-H girl or boy who holds the ribbon or receives a trophy for a dairy animal at the fair has put in hundreds of hours caring for the animal. They usually start with a calf from the farm herd or a calf they have purchased with money earned from 4-H projects.

A visit to the 4-H division of the fair and a talk with the 4-H'ers will reveal that they have not only worked hard to make the main event, but have learned a lot in the process. Preparing an animal for the show ring, they say, takes a lot of skill, time and patience.

The 4-H dairy project also is the training ground for cattle judges. Club members making



the judging team travel to county and state fairs and to the large regional and national shows as well.

The medals, plus state and national awards will be provided for the 10th straight year by the Oliver Corporation, sponsor of the national 4-H Dairy program.

Belmont and Iuka came away with opening night victories as Burnsville and Tishomingo suffered setbacks around the county last week. Belmont got a 29 point scoring effort from quarterback Larry Fancher to check Algoma 41-0. Iuka put together two quick td's in their 13-0 conquest of Mantachie in the other county victory. Burnsville be-

came the first victim of a Tippamingo Conference athletic contest of any type as they fell to Falkner 19-7. David McMeans picked up the Mustang td. Tishomingo, in their first prep pigskin contest in over twenty years, fell before Vina, Alabama, 30-8.

Belmont & Iuka thus entered the thick of the race for the Highland Conference crown and Burnsville went to the cellar of the Tippamingo Conference. For Belmont, it was their 17th consecutive contest without defeat, only a single tie marring the otherwise perfect record. Iuka was the last club to defeat the Cardinals, that coming midway during the 1964 season.
