Records Show 3,339 Now Enrolled In Schools

County-wide Figure Includes Iuka School, Co. Schools & Pre-School

Total enrollment of students in school throughout Tishomingo County has reached the 3,339 figure and is still climbing as late enrollees continue to register.

The breakdown begins with Iuka Separate School where Principal Joe E. Brown quotes a round figure of 1,000 students in school.

"Actually, we have 480 registered in grades 7-12 with Mrs. Louise Johnston, elementary school principal, reporting a total of 520 registered in grades 1-6. This makes our total of 1,000 but it is expected to exceed this mark by several more before the month ends," he reports.

Also, in addition to those instructors listed in a previous report, it is noted that Mrs. Lloyd Murrah is now instructor of physical education classes at Iuka High School. "This is a new program for us and we are working now to get it thoroughly organized for both boys and girls in grades 7-12," Mr. Brown stated.

ted. Bryson Mann will be in charge of the boys' classes.

Also included on the faculty list for this year is Mrs. Sam Daniel, elementary school teacher; Jim Burns, physics and general science; and Alver Belue, junior high English.

County Schools

According to B. L. Mercer, County Supt. of Education, the breakdown for the county Schools is as follows: Burnsville School, 777 students enrolled. Belmont School has 767 students enrolled and Tishomingo has 590 students enrolled. At Carter there are 111 youngsters in grades 1-6 only.

"In addition to regular 1-12 grades, we have pre-school children enrolled at three of these schools. Belmont reports a total of 45 in kindergarten; Tishomingo has 33 in kindergarten, and Carter has a total of 16," he said.

In respect to teachers, "we have a total of 81 regular instructors with 14 teachers under Title I and 3 aids, that's for the County Schools only," Mr. Mercer noted.

Teachers Meet

"There will be a county-wide Teacher's Meeting on Friday, September 16, beginning at 2 o'clock at Belmont," Mr. Mercer stated. "We need full attendance because we will be electing officers for the new term."

County Schools will dismiss around 12 noon on Friday in order that the teachers may attend the meeting.

1st Cotton Sample Received From Tish. County

The first cotton sample of the 1966 season from Tishomingo County was classed on September 12 by the Memphis Classing Office, USDA. The bale belonged to G. A. Butler and was ginned on September 7 by Belmont Gin Co. Last year the first bale from Tishomingo County was classed on September 7.

Tishomingo County farmers submitted 9,869 samples for Smith-Doxey or "Green Card" classification last year. The Memphis Classing Office also provides mike reading and market news services to cotton farmers.

It Should Remain In The Voter's Hands

Voters all over the State of Mississippi will be asked to cast ballots on constitutional amendments in the November 8 General Election. One of the amendments will be to authorize the Legislature, on two-thirds vote of the membership in each branch, to consolidate counties. That power rests in the hands of the voters in the individual counties.

And we believe that right should remain where it is. Taking the voting right from the people and placing too much authority in the hands of the legislators will be following the line of centralized government as is being practiced too much in Washington on a national basis. There are many, many decisions handed down from Washington which we believe the states should have the right to decide on themselves — each state should know its problems best.

And in the same line of thinking, we believe each county in the state understands its problems and can arrive at a better solution of them than the State Legislature. We are a firm believer in home rule and the more of our rights we give up, the less we can have to say about our own communities and counties.

Already, a "Big Brother" attitude is developing in the reapportionment plans of the legislature. Some of the small counties probably will have to be combined with others to equalize the representation. This we may have to accept.

However, we do not think we should give the legislature the right to abolish a county and combine it with another without the expressed consent of the people in that county that is to be abolished — and that consent should come by means of the ballot.

When, and if, counties are consolidated, someone loses a courthouse and what ordinarily are local officials, (supervisors, justices of the peace, etc.) cease to be local inasmuch as they would be representing larger areas and greater numbers in population.

Home rule is the best. Nobody understands the problems in a given area better than those people who live in that area and we believe those people should have the right to work out and to decide their own problems.

We urge that you cast your ballot against the constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to abolish or combine counties. That right should remain where it now is — in the hands of the voters.

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WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Doesn't an advantaged child have the edge over a disadvantaged child?

A: Certainly. Given a certain intellectual level, the child who enjoys a superior environment—lives "better"—will often test higher than his opposite number who doesn't live so well. This, of course, is true of every living creature, from a mule to your household pet. However, given equal opportunity, the child with the higher intelligence will perform at a higher level. Moreover, if you enrich equally the environment of intellectually-unequal children, the difference between them will be increased, not diminished. For example, if the numbers 5 and 10 are multiplied by two, the difference between the numbers increases from five to 10.

"I REMEMBER"
BY THE OLD TIMER

From Onie Mae Hicks, Leesburg, Florida: I remember when I was a little girl that wildlife was plentiful in the woods. My father would go out at daylight and return with a limit of squirrels before breakfast. He hardly left the back yard. He also killed two tom turkeys with one shot.

When I was old enough, I ran the cotton planter. I also planted corn and peanuts by hand, and hoed in the cotton fields. I remember that I had to be so careful not to skin the cotton stalks.

There was a pit in the barn for hay. Father would make three or four banks for sweet potatoes and there was always plenty of good home-smoked meat and sausages. Mother would cook backbones and spareribs together and then pack them in lard. Livers were cooked, ground, seasoned and stuffed before being hung on sticks with the sausage. The sausage and liver were smoked at the same time as the bacon.

I washed dishes from the time I was eight years old. I also did the family laundry, boiling clothes in the old iron pot, using lye soap and rubbing clothes on a wooden scrub board. This was my life as a child — and I loved it very much.

It's All Know-How!

Have trouble with crumbs getting mixed in the frosting when icing a cake? Crumb the cake first, that is by brushing off the loose crumbs before you sweep the icing on with a spatula.

Cream won't whip? Chill the cream, bowl and beaters before you start, especially if it's warm.

Gelatin won't unhold? The container should have been wiped lightly with salad oil. If possible, run a knife around the edge when removing and give the mold a bit of a shake.

Bits of this and that to heat for supper? Get a sectioned skillet which will heat three different foods at one. It's nice for baby foods, too.

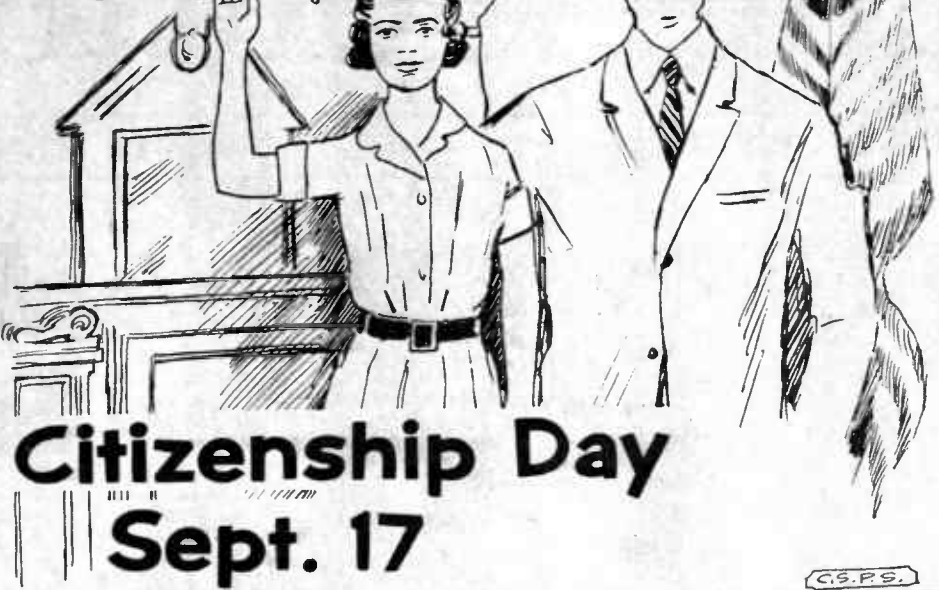
Quick frosting for cake? While the cake is still warm, let semi-sweet chocolate bits melt on it, then spread smooth with a knife.

Reheating mashed potatoes? They won't burn if you reheat in the top of a double boiler or a saucepan placed over hot water.

Prime First

Before painting heating ducts, radiators and heating pipes, coat them with a metal primer especially formulated for this purpose. They can be coated with aluminum, rubber-based enamel, semi-gloss, or flat paints.

HOW A WIFE MIGHT COLLECT
ON HER HUSBAND'S PENSION

Nearly all pension plans are different. But, in general, working men are given several choices as to the manner in which their pensions will be paid to them... or to their wives.

These choices, in a typical situation, would be about as follows, according to the Institute of Life Insurance, which keeps tab on such things:

STRAIGHT LIFE INCOME — The husband lets nature take its course, takes no action himself, and starts drawing his full pension for life following his retirement.

JOINT AND SURVIVOR PENSION — The husband applies to his employer for a split in his pension that will provide both him and his wife a lifetime income. In an average situation, the husband would be, say, 65 and his wife, 62. He would be entitled to a full pension of \$100 a month. Under this plan his pension would be reduced about one-third, and a check for about \$67 a month would be coming into the house until both husband and wife died.

JOINT AND TWO-THIRDS SURVIVOR PENSION — The husband applies for a different kind of split in his pension. Again he is 65, his wife is 62, and his full pension would be \$100. He elects to take a one-fifth cut in this pension, or \$80 a month, and a check for this sum will come into the house as long as both the husband and wife live. Then when either dies the survivor would get two-thirds of the \$80 for life, or about \$53 a month.

The Waste of Welfarism

The word in Washington these days is that the Johnson administration is planning an increase in personal and corporate income taxes after the elections are over. Mr. Johnson apparently is afraid to take this step before the election, inasmuch as an aroused electorate might retaliate at the polls.

The public certainly would be justified in its indignation. Income taxes already are sky-high and a terrible burden on our citizenry. To be sure, if a tax increase were the only way to obtain money for the defense effort, then the American people would go along with an increase. Time and again in the past the American people have displayed a willingness to make any financial sacrifice necessary to defend the freedom and security of the United States.

But an income tax increase would be unfair and outrageous without elimination of the waste in the current federal budget. Foreign aid is still a staggering burden on the American people. The U. S. is also maintaining large forces in Europe, while the Europeans seem disinterested in their own defense. Perhaps a cutback in American forces in Europe would be a timely reminder to the Europeans that they will have to practice self-reliance.

Then the public may well question the wisdom of spending so much on the space race. Certainly space research is important. But whether a crash program to land a man on the moon is as important as it has been described should be examined by Congress. It might be better, for instance, to concentrate on military applications of space research, which can afford this nation greater security, and hold back spending on some of the less pressing projects.

Lastly, an income tax increase would be absolutely wrong so long as federal funds are flowing into welfare programs like a giant river. Arthur Krock, the distinguished observer of the national scene, recently cited the fact that domestic welfare state programs constitute the "prime source" of current inflation in the United States. Every time millions of dollars are pumped into a Watts District, or similar nests of anti-social activity, there is waste that adds to the inflationary bonfire. Yet both the Johnson and Kennedy wings of the Democratic Party repeatedly stress determination to maintain and expand welfare state services.

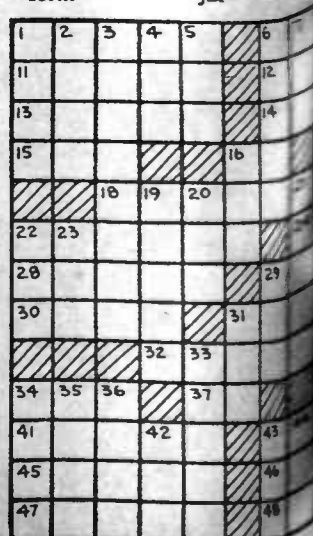

State's Available Pulpwood Is Growing Rapidly

Pulpwood trucks are streaming down the highways in ever increasing numbers. In such

large concentration, in fact, that they often must wait in line to be unloaded.

Pulpwood yards, previously geared for part-time or off-and-on production, are nowadays finding it hard to secure enough space or enough rail cars to handle the flow of pulpwood that is rolling in on them.

This happy state of affairs didn't just happen. Mississippi had to first produce a raw material supply which the pulp and paper industry could rely on to keep its giant mills in operation for the duration.

The build-up of available pulpwood size timber in the state has reached tremendous heights. Yes, the picture is a bright one.

Cotton Harvest Picked Up Some In North Miss.

The cotton harvest picked up slowly in North Mississippi this week, reports Marcus P. Talbot, Jr., Officer in Charge of the USDA Cotton Division Classing Office, Consumer and Marketing Service in Memphis. Cotton hastened toward maturity, aided by warm, sunny weather. A small number of hand-picked bales were ginned in some of the earlier sections of the territory. Fair Entries Reveal Sunshine State Exports More Than Orange Juice

The Mid-South Fair and the National Guernsey Show September 23-October 1, has attracted entries from the far corners of the United States.

Th first entries came from New England, then from the Mid-West, Far West, and now from deep in the heart of Florida's citrus belt comes not only orange juice, but also golden Guernsey milk.

The outstanding herd of the Lay Laine Guernsey Farm, Asta-tula, Florida, has 520 head of registered Guernsey cattle. Carroll L. Ward, Jr., will bring 16 descendants of the famous bull Mulhucaway Butterfat Dorian, a bull summarized by the American Guernsey Cattle Club and rated 14th of all Guernsey bulls on record for milk production.

Mr. and Mrs. Ward, Barbara, Linda, Frederick, and Clara are the team workers on this successful Guernsey farm. Mr. Ward's father started in the dairy business in Florida in 1905.

In 1965 the Ward herd achieved the honor of being second highest in milk production of Guernsey herds of over 100 in the United States. Several cows are classified as excellent, and three hold national records in milk production.

All the family works at their dairy business. Barbara, the oldest daughter, a sophomore at the University of Tennessee majoring in home economics, has received the highest 4-H Awards offered in dairy work in Florida.

Now is a good time to apply lime on land, needing it, that is not planted to row crops.

Anytime the land is dry enough for a limespreader to be used is the proper time to apply lime. The reason for this is that agricultural lime reacts slowly in the soil and remains for a long time. It benefits the soil for three or more years.

A field that is to be planted to row crops next spring could be limed now resulting in real benefit to next year's crop. Pastures may benefit immediately. Lime is a plant food, and it also conditions the soil so that phosphate and other fertilizers are more beneficial.

Consider applying lime to your land now.

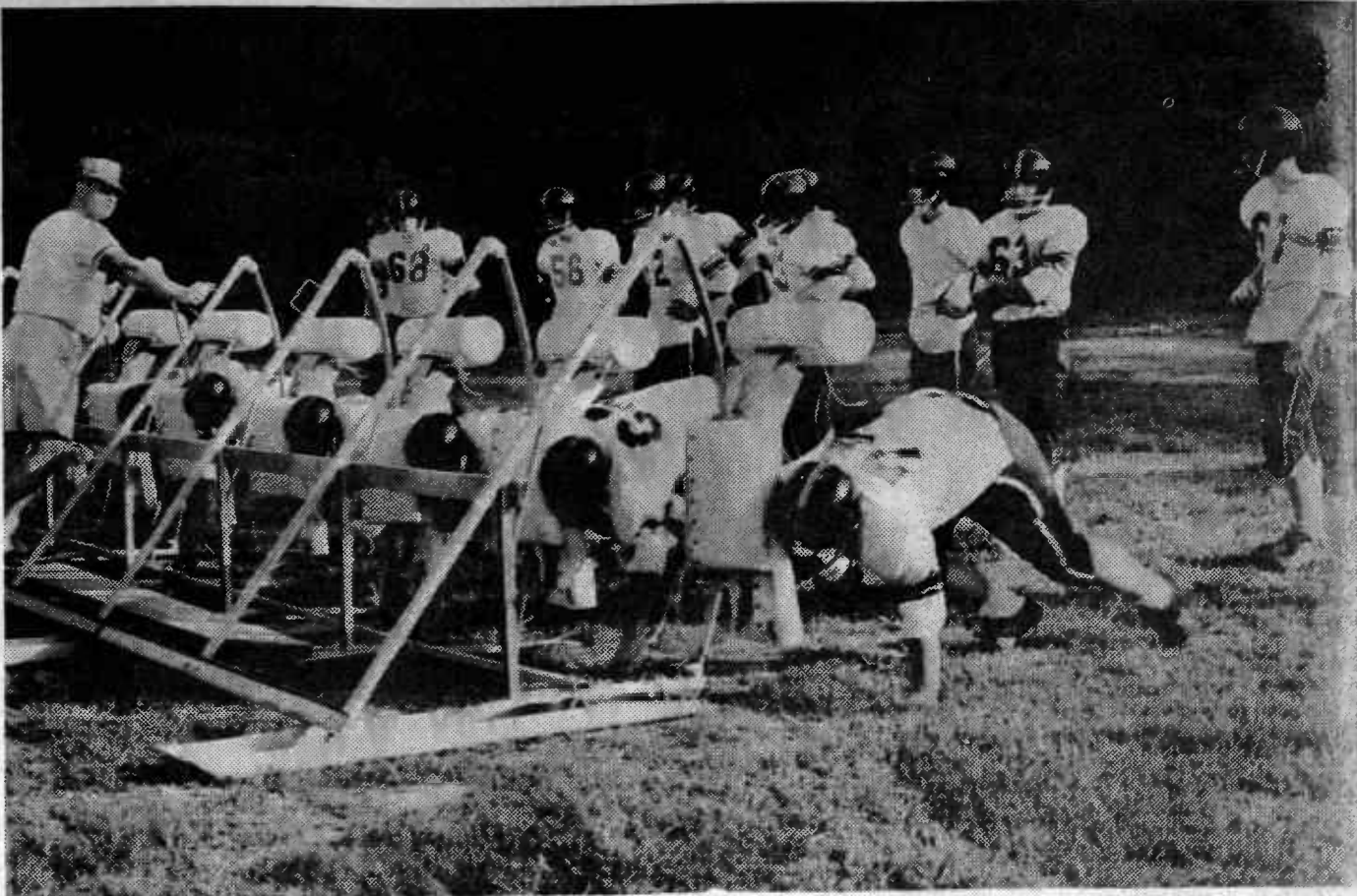
