\$429,000 Rise In Living Costs In County

To what extent has the rising cost of living affected residents of Tishomingo County?

How much does a local family have to spend now for the standard market basket of goods and services as compared with a year ago?

According to the latest government reports, prices in the regional area, as in most other parts of the country, have recently been moving upward at an uncomfortable rate.

A calculation based on the overall figures shows that an additional \$429,000 a year must be spent by Tishomingo County residents to purchase the same amount of goods and services that they bought in 1965.

A little inflation each year, the creeping kind, has come to be accepted by the public as normal. It has been taking place regularly, for many years. It has been looked upon, in fact, as beneficial by many economists. They contend that it makes for busier factories, more employment and larger profits.

The 1965-66 rise in the consumer price index, which has averaged more than 2.8 percent nationally, is causing concern, however. The pace is faster than in any year in the last ten.

Because of it, basic living costs in the local area are approximately \$102 higher per family than they were in 1965 at this time.

That is the extent to which it has affected families in Tishomingo County that have an after-tax income of \$3,925, the local average.

For families at the \$12,000 level, the loss in buying power amounts to \$312 a year. Those with net incomes of \$4,000, on the other hand, have a drop of only \$104, but the squeeze on them is greater.

Can local families spend that much more and will they do so? The indications, on the strength of past performance, are yes. Most of them are able to take the price increases in stride because their incomes have been rising at a much greater rate.

People on pensions or on other fixed income, however, are being hurt as inflation eats into their purchasing power. Except for occasional increases in their social security benefits, they have no means of coping with the higher living costs.

Ozment Takes Lives Of 2, Wounds Two, Kills Self

Viet Veterans Eligible For AL Membership Now

On Thursday, September 1, 1966, President Johnson signed a bill which amended the National Charter of The American Legion to make Viet Nam Veterans eligible for membership.

Along with the World War I veterans, World War II veterans and the Korean War veterans, any person who has served on active duty in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Air Force of the United States at any time on or since August 5, 1964, may now be accepted for membership in the American Legion, provided his period of active duty has been terminated under honorable conditions.

"The present period of eligibility will end with the cessation of hostilities as determined by the government of the United States," stated Justin B. Patterson, County Service Officer.

Tragedy Occurred At Osborne Home Near Iuka, September 14

Raymond L. (Jack) Ozment, age 35, of Iuka, shot and killed his mother-in-law and a sister-in-law, and wounded his wife, Gene Osborne Ozment, and his brother-in-law, Lloyd McBride, Wednesday night, September 14, before taking his own life with a high-powered rifle.

Dead on arrival at the Tishomingo County Hospital were Mrs. Mable Nancy Osborne, age 61; Mrs. Sue Ann Osborne Hendrix, 24; and Raymond Leroy (Jack) Ozment. Treated for superficial wounds was McBride and Ozment's wife who received a scalp wound and suffered severe shock.

According to an account as related by Mrs. Ozment, she and her sister, Mrs. Sue Ann Osborne Hendrix, were in the kitchen of the Osborne home Wednesday night when they heard a shot. Not knowing where it was, they went to investigate. They did not immediately discover where the shot had been fired and Mrs. Hendrix, in returning to the kitchen, spied Ozment as he entered a door at the front of the house. She immediately warned her sister ((Mrs. Ozment) to "run, here comes Jack." Mrs. Hendrix (Sue) then rushed to the telephone to call for help while Mrs. Ozment (Gene) went to her bedroom and locked the door.

Mrs. Gene Ozment related that her three children were in the bedroom and after she went in there with them she heard a gun fire in the living room and she knew that Sue Ann had been shot. She could then hear Ozment as he made his way to Mrs. Mable Osborne's bedroom and heard the single shot that killed her. Then, she related, "I heard him as he left my mother's bedroom and as he entered the hall calling: 'Gene, where are you? Come on out.'"

"He shot the lock off my bedroom door and entered the room. In my fear I covered my head with a pillow, all the time begging him not to kill me. He fired one shot, the bullet barely grazing my head. After that I must have blacked out," she said.

After Mrs. Ozment regained consciousness she went to her mother's room and saw that she was dead. She then discovered her sister, Sue Ann, dead on the small porch at the side of the house. "I don't know how Sue got out there," she said. "I understand she was shot twice, but all these things are not clear in my mind."

"I remember hearing a shot at the back of the house and I am sure that is when Jack shot himself. After that, I took my children and attempted to go for help," she concluded.

Meanwhile, McBride who lived in the lower part of the Osborne house with his wife the former Margaret Osborne, upon hearing all the shooting, went outside to investigate. He encountered Ozment as he (Ozment) was coming outside after the shootings inside. Ozment fired at McBride. The bullet, striking the corner of the house, showered McBride's face with splinters of metal. Ozment evidently continued on his way to the back of the house where he took his own life. McBride went

to the jail to obtain help. Jack Ozment was a Korean veteran, having served in the United States Marine Corps in that conflict. He was twice decorated with the Purple Heart with the Gold Star and was honorably discharged after serving the required time for his country.

"Jack was a good provider," Mrs. Gene Ozment said. "He worked at one place, except for a very short while, after he came back from Korea. He owned a barber shop in Tusculumbia and had a good business," she said.

However for the past three years, the Ozments have had troubles. "Lots of nights, Jack could not sleep. He would walk the floor all night. One of his wounds during the Korean War was on his head and it is possible this bothered him," she said.

From all indications, Ozment planned the tragedy as it happened. Possibly the only slip-up was when he thought he had killed his wife while all he did was wound her.

Proof of Ozment's plan was the fact that he left a two-page letter, telling his mother that he loved his family and hated to give them up. The letter also stated that he had \$76.00 in money in his pocket and that he had a small amount of money in an Iuka bank. And among other things, it gave instructions for his mother to care for his children.

Joint funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock for Mrs. Osborne and her daughter, Mrs. Hendrix.

Officiating at the services, held at the Iuka Gospel Assembly Church, were Bro. G. V. Garretson and Bro. Zolan Zeh. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Mrs. Osborne leaves two daughters, Mrs. Charlotte McBride and Mrs. Gene Ozment, both of Iuka; a son, J. D. Osborne of Almdsted, Ill.; 7 grandchildren, two sisters and two brothers.

Mrs. Hendrix leaves her husband, Kenneth; a son, Kenneth Edward; a daughter, Nancy Lee; two sisters, Mrs. Charlotte McBride and Mrs. Gene Ozment of Iuka; and one brother, J. D. Osborne, of Almdsted.

Cutshall Funeral Home of Iuka was in charge of arrangements.

Funeral services for Raymond L. (Jack) Ozment, were held Saturday afternoon in Mound, Illinois, under the direction of Ryan Funeral Home.

Ozment leaves his wife, Gene, and three children, Brenda, 7 years old, Connie, 4 years old, and Raymond, Jr., 8 months old.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

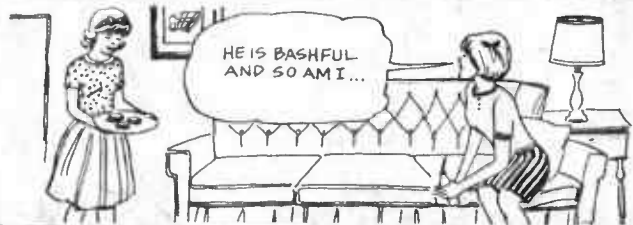
Q: What governs a person's intellectual potential? Why is mixed schooling bad?

A: The intellectual potential of a person is not governed by his height or weight, by the money in his pocket or by the stability of his home life. Rather, a person's intelligence—his mental potential—is governed by his genes, the determiners he receives from his forbears. On the average, the Negro child's IQ is 20 points below the White child of the same age, i.e., 80 vs 100. IQ predicts academic promise, and hence mixed schooling is unfair to both Negro and White.

OUR REPLY: A "bashful" boy is not nice to his mother and his sisters? Are you sure that it is not your opinion that has changed and not the boy's?

It is quite possible that you were mistaken in your first impression that he was "nasty" to his mother and sisters. You became friends with one of the sisters and were perhaps influenced by some things she said.

There is a certain amount of "argufying" that goes on among children in the happiest of families.

You have no reason to be bashful. You can certainly be friendly to a boy who lives in the neighborhood without being forward. And, if you were wrong, in your first impression of the boy, you will certainly not make him mad if you tell him that you were.

WEDDING BELLS AFTER 65 —
HERE'S HOW TO RING THEM

Here's a blueprint for marriage after you're 65 years old. Don't laugh now—the U. S. Government reports that more than 35,000 couples past age 65 are now marrying every year, and that the number is growing. Five years ago many of these people had spouses, sitting on the sofa next to them as your spouse may be sitting now.

The blueprint comes from John Y. Watson, 68, a widower for four years, and his bride of five months, Eugenia Watson, 66, a widow for five years. Both owned homes at the time of their marriage. Both have now sold them. They live in a trailer parked in a tree-shrouded park in the Southland.

Mr. and Mrs. Watson obviously are happy. But they aren't silly about it. They have a quiet, pleasant, companionable marriage. Not a cute one.

Out of their experience together they have formulated the following points which they believe will make a good retirement marriage.

1. The older couple must understand that for them marriage is not a Something-Borrowed—Something-Blue affair. It is for companionship, which means both somebody to talk to and the security a house companion gives you, and it is foreconomy.

"Together, we are living for about 60 per cent of what the two of us spent living separately," according to Mr. Watson.

2. The older couple should have a wedding ceremony and invite all their friends. Not to solicit gifts, not for their own vanity. But for the friends. Who will love it. And who will remember it from here on with parties and letters.

3. The older couple, before marrying, should go to their individual doctors, tell their plans, and get a full report on their physical condition. Thereupon they should tell each other what the doctors said, so that a case of arthritis or a backache some midnight won't come as a shock.

4. The older couple should deal very carefully, but firmly, with any children each might have. "You mustn't ask the children," says Mrs. Watson. "You must tell them. There's nothing dishonorable in older people marrying. There's nothing disrespectful to the children's deceased Mother or Father if older people want companionship again. It may be necessary to point this out, but it is unwise to get into a discussion over whether the marriage is right or wrong. This is your decision, not the children's."

5. With regard to the children, it is wise to give them some reassurance that somebody is still marrying you to get "Daddy's Money" or "The money Mother helped you make."

6. The older couple, before marrying, should check every form of income they have to make sure it will not be endangered by a remarriage. Women are penalized somewhat on Social Security if they remarry, but can lose everything on some pension and some life insurance benefits.

7. The older couple should agree, before marriage, that each will contribute, from each's income, a proportionate amount of it to the household budget. But that each will have the same sum for personal spending money.

Count your friends and you may find some indication therein of the measure of your own character. It is not enough to count "best friends" and then count "good friends" and "just friends". These are categories within your own mind and you can never be sure you are placing a friend in the category he would place himself.

You might take another approach. Count the people you believe look upon you as a friend. If you do this honestly, you will have another measure of your own character.

"I REMEMBER"
BY THE OLD TIMER

From Rosa Baker, Atoka, Oklahoma: I remember when there were log schoolhouses all over the country. Men and boys cut the logs for the walls. They cut large trees and hauled them to saw mills to make flooring, benches and windows.

Women wore long dresses, to their ankles, long sleeves, and no low-cut fashions.

We bought green coffee beans, roasted them in the wood stove oven. People who owned no stove roasted them in a big iron oven set on top of hot coals.

People would take the bark of a slippery elm tree, soak it in a glass of water, add a tablespoon of quinine and take it to break chills and fever. It slipped down so quickly you could hardly taste the quinine.

On cold days, sweet potatoes were baked in front of the fireplace. They were first covered with cold ashes, then heaped with hot coals.

Tallow was used to grease boots and shoes in winter. Beeswax was used to rub over thread to sew shoes and other leather things.

Quick Treats
For cold days when the folks like hearty eating, saute an onion in butter until golden, then add two cans of frozen potato soup and a pound of cooked, cleaned shrimp. Top with grated American cheese and chopped parsley.

A package of beef-vegetable soup makes a whole meal if you add to it a package of cooked, mixed vegetables, a can of drained kidney beans and a half pound of thinly sliced salami.

Like to dress up canned luncheon meat? It will look pretty and taste good when spread with orange marmalade and baked for 20 to 25 minutes or until heated through.

Mocha Cream Frosting is ideal for Angel Food or Sponge Cake. Whip one cup of cream and sweeten with 3 tablespoons sugar, then flavor with 1 teaspoon instant coffee and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Plenty of garden tomatoes? Scoop them out, fill with roast beef or corned beef hash, bake through and serve with cheese or mushroom sauce.

Scrape corn off the cob of those which are leftover and make into corn pudding. Serve this with chicken, roast pork, Canadian-style bacon or sausage patties.

Broiled Chicken
(4 servings)
1/4 cup salad oil
1/4 cup lemon juice
3 tablespoons soy sauce
1 teaspoon oregano
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
2-pound chickens, split and cleaned
Combine all ingredients except chicken. Pour over chicken halves and let marinate in refrigerator for 4 to 5 hours. Place on a rack about 7 inches from heat and broil about 20 minutes on each side or until done, turning once or twice.

Recession and Recovery

Within recent weeks, economists and financial writers have begun to voice deep concern about the economic outlook, saying that a recession is possible if not actually likely. Across the Atlantic, Prime Minister Harold Wilson of England went further. He warned that a world-wide depression, with widespread unemployment, could occur.

At home, President Johnson announced what he termed a broad attack on rising inflation. In a special message to Congress he proposed a 16-month suspension of the 7 per cent tax credit for corporate investment in new plants and equipment. He also asked for a similar rollback of the accelerated tax write-off for depreciation of industrial and commercial buildings.

Now, let's look at the situation and at the President's proposed remedy. The outlook is disturbing, for investors clearly are gloomy about the immediate future. A jittery stock market is the result, with major corporate securities suffering heavy losses in value. Meanwhile, the general public is becoming increasingly apprehensive as prices increase for necessary commodities.

If a recession takes place, it will be the most unnecessary recession in history. The American people are hard-working, energetic and progressive in outlook. They supply a tremendous demand for the new goods and services developed by U. S. free enterprise. Young people now in college—where they are acquiring valuable skills for the age of automation—will want new homes, new cars, new appliances. This demand should provide a great deal of prosperity in the years ahead. The educated youth of America form a highly productive segment of our society. Their drive and imagination should further enrich the American way of life.

But this isn't the entire story. The productive groups and forces in American life are not dominant on the political scene. There are, one is sad to say, counter-productive groups and forces. A segment of American voters—and they are highly organized, militant and demanding—is crying out for more federal welfareism. This segment of our society wants to be carried along at taxpayer expense, instead of helping support the government.

To be specific, there is a tremendous demand from the slum areas that the federal government spend billions of dollars in reconstructing urban areas where the residents—as a

point of fact—wanting to abide by standards of residential "decency." In Chicago, so-called "slum lords" have been getting into the act. But the way affairs. Tenants are being asked to assume responsibilities on their part.

Tigrett Announces 1st Payment On Medicare Premiums Being Received

Firs premium payments for
the doctor bill insurance part
of medicare are being received
on schedule, Hugh Tigrett, Dis-
trict Manager, Social Security
Administration, announced to-
day.

"It is encouraging," he noted,
"that more than 9 out of 10
have already sent in their pay-
ments."

Tigrett explained that most of
the elderly people who have
signed up for the voluntary me-
dical insurance part of medicare
are having their premium pay-
ments deducted from their mon-
thly social security, railroad, or
civil service retirement cash
benefits. Timely premium pay-
ments are therefore made auto-
matically for them. The remain-
ing elderly people are billed di-
rectly by the Social Security
Administration.

The response to the first pre-
mium notices has been gratify-
ing, Tigrett said, but pointed
out that those who have not yet
sent in their premiums will lose
their doctor bill insurance pro-
tection if they delay beyond
September 30. Premium remind-
er notices that time is running
out were mailed out last week
notifying those who have not
yet sent in their payments. Prac-
tically everyone 65 or over is
eligible for basic hospital insur-
ance under medicare, Tigrett
said, financed out of social se-
curity tax contributions. The
doctor bill insurance is financed
out of the \$3 monthly premiums
of those who are enrolled for
this supplementary protection,
and a matching \$3 for each per-
son enrolled, paid out of gen-
eral Federal revenues.

First premium notices were
mailed out in June, the District
Manager said, requesting a \$9
payment for the months of Ju-

ly, August, and September.

Premium payments are due
on the first day of each month
of coverage. The protection is
terminated if no payment has
been made for three consecutive
months, and the elderly person
may not sign up again until the
next open period, October 1 to
December 31, 1967, with the
protection not starting until Ju-
ly 1, 1968 — and at a 10 percent
higher premium rate.

The District Manager urged
any older people who are having
difficulty making their doctor
bill insurance premium pay-

ments, or who have questions,
to get in touch with the Social
Security Administration without
delay.

Arrangements can be made to
pay premiums in monthly in-
stallments of \$3 each, instead of
\$9 quarterly," Tigrett said. "The
people in the Social Security Of-
fice will be glad to help them
get their premium payments on
record so that they will retain
their protection." Anyone living
in Tishomingo County may con-
tact the Social Security repre-
sentative who visits the City
Hall in Iuka each Monday mor-
ning.

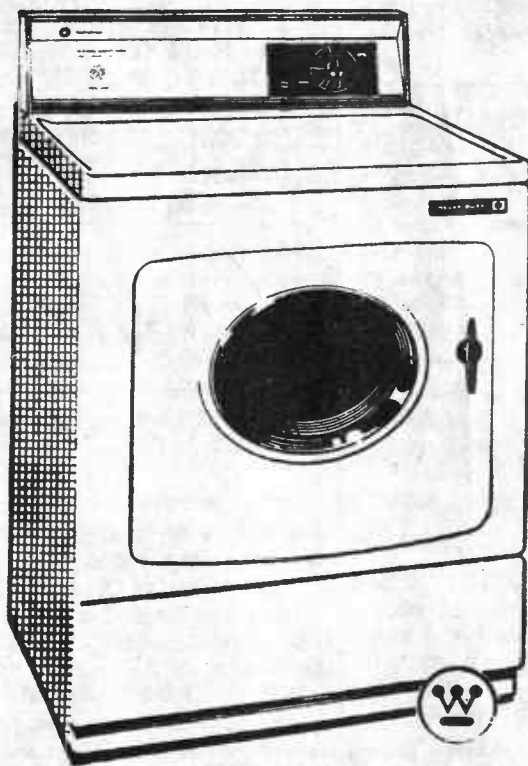

Mirrors for Decoration

If you choose the right mirror, it can be decorative and also reflect enough of the room to make it look larger.

You can use small mirrors alone or in groups of two, three or more for unusual effects. For example, a wall can be dramatized by hanging three long, slim mirrors close together. This group might be particularly attractive over a sofa or a chest, or even over a bed headboard. Unframed mirrors are appropriate for such an arrangement.

Many well-designed mirrors are inexpensive enough to make a large decorating splash for much less than other wall treatments.

Tenderizing Meat

Proper cooking is the most effective way of tenderizing the less tender cuts of meat. Available at your home economist's office is a folder telling how to buy, store and cook the different cuts of beef. Ask for a copy of Publication 560.

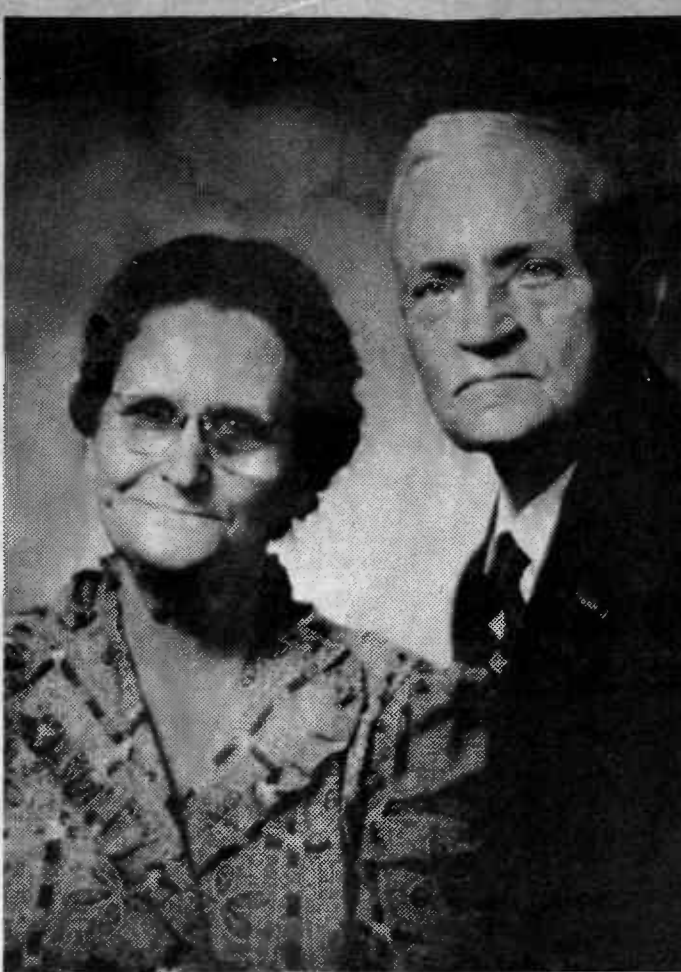
You may choose to use a commercial tenderizer. This product that contains papain, an enzyme from the papaya plant, is effective in softening the structural parts of beef.

But you will find the tenderizer does not penetrate deep into the meat when you apply it to the surface only. Forking in is one suggested way of getting more even tenderizing.

Research shows that the tenderizing effect takes place during cooking, so the practice of applying tenderizer and letting meat stand before cooking is unnecessary.
