James H. Bishop reported that crosses were burned in Iuka Tuesday night. The crosses were burned in front of the old gymnasium at the Iuka school, another one at the bridge on highway 72 near Spring Park, one near the veterans hut on 72 east and one in the outskirts of Iuka just off the airport road.

Sheriff Bishop stated that the same automobile involved in the cross-burning Tuesday night was also identified as being the one in a cross-burning in the county about three months ago. The men were charged with switching car tags and carrying a concealed weapon. They ranged in age from 29 to 33 years and are reportedly employed at a plastics plant in Corinth.

POLITICALLY, THE NEXT FOUR YEARS

Want to know what type of government, at the local, county and state levels, Mississippi will have during the next four years?

The answer can't be given right now, but if you'll wait just a little until all candidates announce, you can pretty well figure it out. Just take a cross-section of the type of candidates who offer for public office, and you will get a cross-section of the type of government leadership you can expect during the next four years.

Public servants will be chosen from the list of those offering to serve. This is another way of saying that it is vitally important that good men offer to serve if citizens are to have good government.

Right now, many are making up their minds as to whether they should "run" for office. This thinking is taking place in the minds of men considering offices from constable to governor.

Far too few citizens are asking themselves the question, "Am I the best qualified to serve my district or county or state in an elective office during this coming term?" They may want good government, but they want someone else to do the serving.

Citizens have the responsibility to see that good citizens offer for public office. Sound businessmen are generally conceded to be reluctant to offer for a public office — yet they become quite vocal when government is not run on sound business principles.

If you sincerely believe you have the best qualifications for an office, you owe it to yourself and to your fellow citizens to offer for office.

The time to work for good government in a representative democracy is before the candidates announce for office, as well as before and after the election.

Feasibility Report Due Within 30 Days; Endorsed By Gov't Agencies

A number of state and area agencies were represented in a meeting held Tuesday afternoon at the Tupelo hotel in that city.

Highlight of the meeting was the proposed riverport that is to be constructed on Yellow Creek where the Tenn. - Tombigbee Waterway will join the Tennessee river.

Dr. Guy Peden, Jr. of Mississippi State University revealed that an economic feasibility report on construction of a port facility near Iuka will be ready in about thirty days.

This port, he pointed out, would go far toward making the area desirable for heavy industry, particularly if the Tombigbee Inland Waterway is constructed as hoped.

Congressman Jamie Whitten and Glover Wilkins, administrator of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Authority, expressed confidence that the Army Corps of Engineers will this autumn return a favorable report on the economic feasibility of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway.

Once this report is made, the Engineers are expected to be given prompt congressional authority by Chairman Mike Kirwan of the House Public Works Committee to complete pre-construction planning with funds already approved.

Mike Foster from the TVA office in Knoxville, who gave assurance of support of the Tennessee Valley Authority for the Iuka port, pointed out that the twenty percent of the nation's counties which have water trans-

portation have fifty-nine per cent of the nation's industry.

And inland counties which have water transportation have double their share of industry when compared with counties which do not have water transportation, he pointed out.

TVA, he said, is reserving a large acreage on Pickwick Lake near Iuka for use as industrial sites when and if the river port is built.

Thompson Pound, executive director of the Tombigbee Water Management District, reported that a visit to a new river port project at Calvert, Ky., had shown him the excellent development that could be expected from construction of the proposed river port at Iuka. That town of 2,600 people now has \$159 million in industrial investment, he said.

W. M. Bost, head of the Extension Service at Mississippi State University, pointed out the advantages to Mississippi agriculture to be gained from the Iuka port and the proposed inland waterway.

"Without water transportation, we are handicapped by high feed costs in trying to feed out beef and hogs for market," he explained.

W. C. Hamilton of Iuka reported on progress of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority in promoting industrial and recreational activities in the area.

Among local people attending the Tupelo meeting were Paul Edmondson, chairman of the steering committee for the proposed river port, Supervisors Herbert Biggs, Russell Bonds, Lunceford Stormont and Steve South, Senator Cecil Sumners, W. C. Hamilton, L. E. Deaton, president of the Belmont Chamber of Commerce, P. O. Beard, president of Iuka Chamber of Commerce, Harold Blunt, president of the Tishomingo Chamber of Commerce, Editor E. C. Holtsford, Carlton Woodley, and Iuka Mayor George William Cutshall.

Representatives were also in attendance from Corinth and the Alcorn County Board of Supervisors, from the State Highway Department, and others.

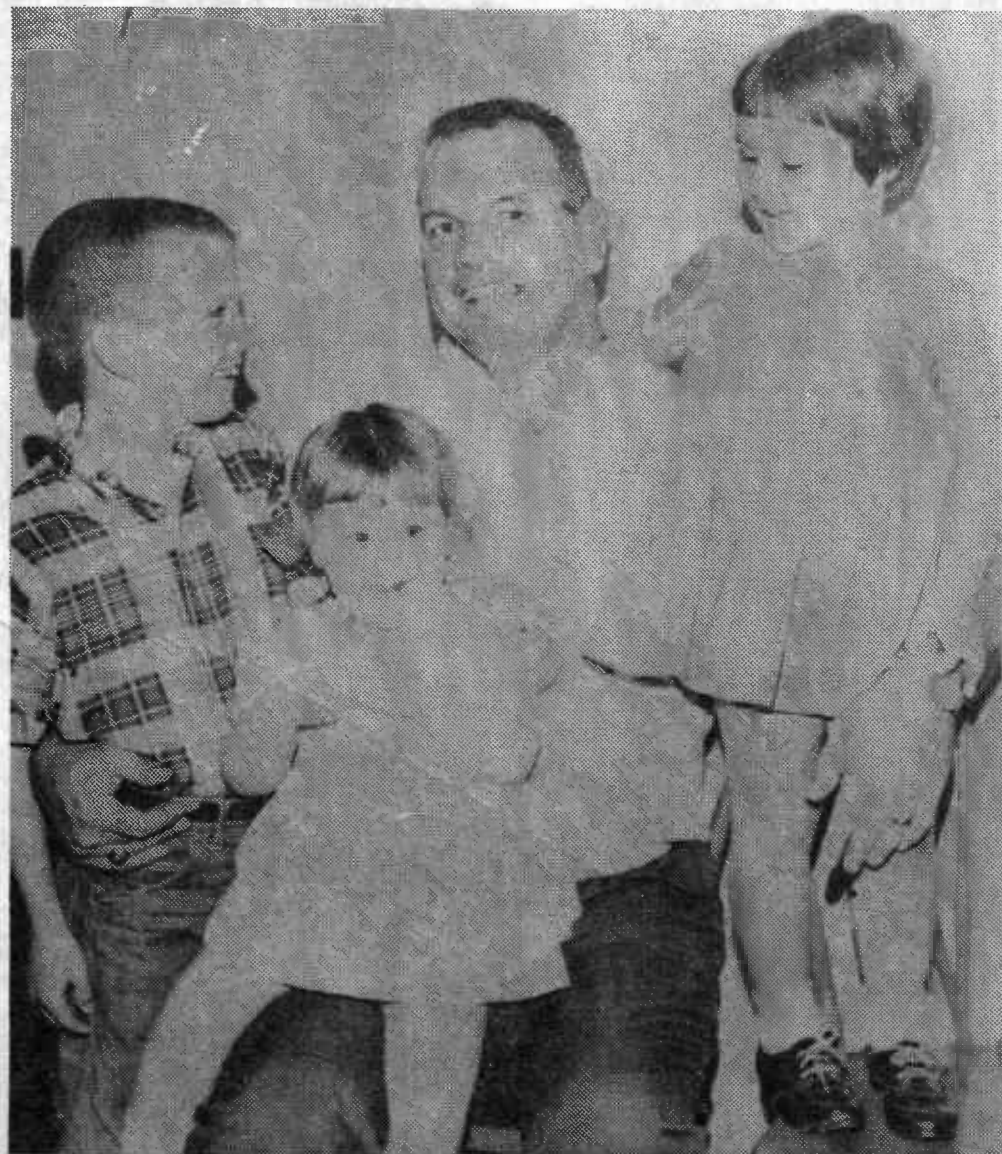
Co - Ordinating Council Will Meet Oct. 3

TCEPA Explains Cause Of Recent Power Failures On Asso. System

Rep. From State Veterans Affairs Here October 5

The Veterans Service Center has arranged with the State Veterans Affairs Commission to have one of their representatives meet at the Iuka Court House with Justin B. Patterson, your Veterans' Service Officer. James M. Stevens, an Assistant Commissioner from the State Veterans Affairs Commission will be here from 8:30 until noon Wednesday, October 5.

Anyone desiring information relative to the benefits to be received from the Veterans Administration or relative to his claim should arrange with the County Service Officer for an appointment with Mr. Stevens while he is in town.

Many questions arise concerning veterans claims and it would be wise to contact your Service Officer so he can have your case records with him as you go before the Assistant Commissioner. Also, many questions have arisen concerning the Veterans Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966 as well as other veterans' benefits under Public Law 89-358.

Mr. Patterson states that he will be glad to work with you in every way he can.

Officials of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association have been deeply concerned over recent power failures which have caused considerable inconvenience to customers in two areas of their system.

The areas affected are, first, generally north of Iuka along old and new Highways 25 from Roy Ballard's store to the Tennessee state line, including the communities around Rocky Springs, Patrick and Bethel Churches. The second area is generally south of Iuka along old and new Highways 25 from the Iuka TV Cable Co. tower to Midway.

Responsible for the recent in-

terruptions are two electronically-controlled, three-phase reclosers, or circuit breakers, purchased at a cost of \$2500 each from one of the nation's oldest and most experienced manufacturers of equipment designed to protect power transmission lines against interruption from lightning, broken wires or any other cause.

The north unit located at Ballard's Store failed first causing several interruptions, including one particularly inconvenient outage on Labor Day week end. Then on Saturday and Sunday nights, September 17 and 18, the recloser located at the TV tower failed causing interruptions both nights in the south area.

Factory representatives have made numerous trips here and are confident they have found and corrected the trouble in the north recloser as of September 12 and the south as of September 21.

In spite of manufacturer's guarantees, local power officials believe the electronic controls for the reclosers were placed on the market before they were fully tested.

A check with neighboring power distributors reveals similar problems in their systems with this type of recloser.

The supplier is being given an opportunity to perfect the operation of the recloser or the units will be replaced with another brand.

Milk Price Hike Causes Concern

Senator Cecil L. Sumners left today for Jackson to determine why the price of Milk will go up at least one cent per quart October 1st.

He stated that the Milk Industry is dangerously close to pricing themselves out of a consumers market. According to the Senator "milk is a basic item that poor people and babies use and any increase seriously affects them. It seems that the dairy farmers are not going to receive all of the proposed price increase, and if that is the case, an increase in the price of milk is not justified.

AUTO OWNERS:

1967 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

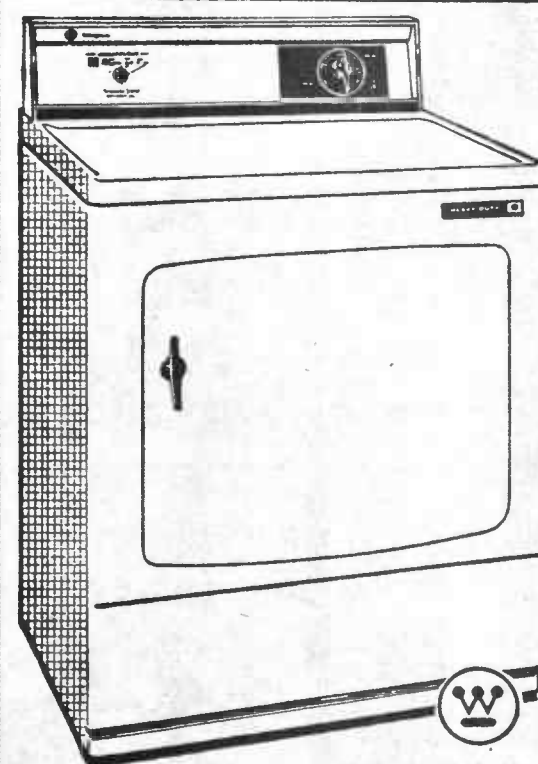
If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

potatoes should be dug before frost.

After frost kills the tops back on established asparagus plants, cut the tops and mulch the bed with adequate barnyard manure or compost.

Start now preparing the garden for early planting next year. If the garden is ready for planting, you can get an extra early start on some English peas, Irish potatoes and similar vegetables in January or February.

Federal Gas Tax

Some changes have been made in the manner in which you request federal gas tax refunds.

Refund Claim Form 2240 will not be used this year, and September 30 is no longer the deadline for claiming the refund.

This time, you will request the refund at the time the 1966 Federal Income Tax refund is prepared. This year the claim for refund will cover farm used gasoline for the period July, 1965, through December, 1966 — an 18-month period. In future years, the period will be for the calendar year or the income tax year.

Because of this change, farmers will not receive Form 2240, Claim for Refund of Federal Gasoline Taxes used on the farm.

Full instructions for claiming gas tax refund on your Federal Income Tax return will be in the 1967 "Farmer's Tax Guide."

Soil Testing

Take the guesswork out of your fertilizer program. Don't lose money through using too much or too little fertilizer. Soil testing will indicate just how much of what kinds of fertilizer you need to make the top profit dollars from all of your crops. For details, see your local county agent.

Winter Grazing

Top dress your old, established fescue with 30 pounds of nitrogen and 100 pounds each of phosphate and potash per acre now. Then later in the fall, add more nitrogen. Do not graze the fescue until around November 1. This grass is for late fall and spring grazing.

For new plantings of fescue, drill 10 pounds of seed per acre in rows, or broadcast 20 lbs. Apply at least 30 pounds of nitrogen and 80 pounds each of phosphate and potash per acre.

ryegrass out on top of the ground for late winter and early spring grazing. Crimson clover can also be sown on top of the ground now through October.

Sod seeding can be done all through October and November. Oats, wheat and ryegrass are good sod seeding crops.

Fall Armyworms

Watch small grain fields closely for signs of fall armyworm damage.

Heavy infestations of these worms can almost totally destroy a field of winter grazing.

Check with your local county agent for control methods when needed.

Many of the hired hands are not capable of setting these precision pieces of equipment and must be given good supervision in order to do a good harvesting job.

Now, during and after harvest, is also a good time to take a good close look at all fields and see how they are performing. If you have problem areas, find out what is causing the problem and correct it before next year's crop.

Some other timely jobs include land leveling, filling of pot holes in fields, lime application and stalk destruction.

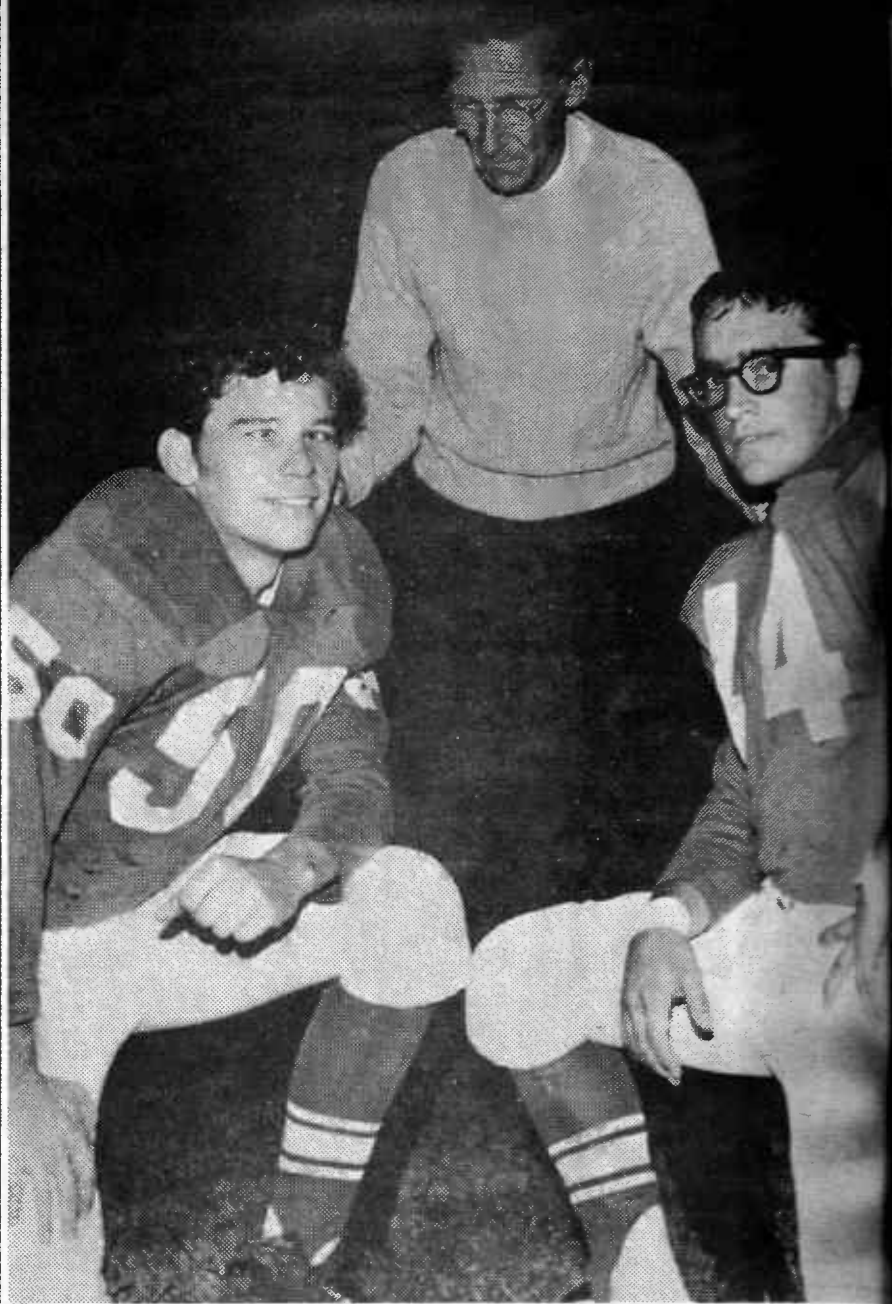

"October begins a new year in 4-H work," she continued, "and now would be a good time to organize a 4-H Club in your community if there is not an active group there."

"To start a new 4-H Club in your community, simply get several other boys and girls and their parents interested. Discuss it with your county extension agents. We will provide you with necessary information and material to organize the club," she added.

Roy Doss, associate county agent active with the boys' work, states that "4-H Club work is directed in Mississippi by the Cooperative Extension Service of the United States Department of Agriculture and Mississippi State University. County Extension agents have charge of it in each county. Local Clubs are organized and directed by volunteer adult leaders with the assistance of junior leaders."

"4-H Clubs are groups of young people who carry on a wide variety of farming, homemaking, personal improvement and community service projects and activities."

"Any boy or girl may join by agreeing to follow 4-H ideals and standards. There are no membership dues. The main requirement is a willingness to 'learn by doing,' which is the Club slogan, and 'to make the best better,' which is the motto. Character development and good citizenship are long-range goals. The four H's stand for the equal development of the Head, Hands, Heart and Health," Mr. Doss concluded.

"If you are between 9 and 19 years of age, wherever you live — farm, town or city — you may join a 4-H Club. You will enjoy taking part in the many activities and events that are held in 4-H. They will give you new experiences and knowledge and help develop special skills and interests," Miss Horton stated.

"Make the month of October count for you. Join your community 4-H Club and become an active member. If there is no 4-H Club in your community, begin now to work up interest and get one organized," they urged.

Spirit High as Big Conference Game Near

Chieftains & Cardinals Prepare Strategy For Friday Night, Here

An Indian and a bird will meet Friday night at Chieftain Stadium with some feathers expected to fly from either the war bonnet or wing of each. Iuka's Chieftains will host defending Highland Conference champion Belmont's Cardinals in the clash that is expected to go a long way toward settling the championship for this year. Each club is undefeated with the Cards 4-0 for the year and the Chiefs 3-0. All the victories have come at the expense of

conference opposition. Belmont will enter the game as something of a favorite, although all records will go out the window when these two meet. The Cards find themselves in much the same situation that Iuka was in this time a year ago. They have won 19 victories in the last 20 games, with only a 0-0 dogfight with Red Bay last season marring an otherwise perfect record. The last Cardinal defeat was suffered at the hands of the Chieftains, while

strangely enough the last Chieftain defeat was administered by the Cards. Fact is that one would have to go way back in to the record books to find a defeat on either of these club records by another club.

Iuka was picked to finish second behind Saltillo in the conference race, while the coaches tabbed Belmont for third place. Hamilton stung Saltillo 24-0 early in the season to put the Chiefs and Cards in the drivers seat at this point in the chase. The Cardinals will be starting an all-senior line-up for the second year running, while the Chiefs lost only three men from last season's squad. Belmont will have a slight weight advantage with a backfield that averages over 165 pounds per man and a line with an average of more than 180 pounds per man. The overall team average is over 170 pounds per man. The Chiefs can counter with a backfield average of 161 and a line that averages 180, with an overall average of more than 173. Those are pretty good averages for a couple of prep gridiron clubs.

The Chiefs main problem will be stopping quarterback Larry Fancher. Fancher, a 165 pound senior co-captain, is rewriting all records for the Cards and the Highland Conference with a scoring average of over 18 points per game. Fancher has tallied 74 points in four games. Most of these points have come on break-away runs from good yardage out. He is also a dangerous passer, with several TD strikes to his credit for the year.

Iuka had a week-off last week in preparation for the Cardinals while Belmont was flying over

Hatley 44-7. This is the same Hatley club that Iuka nipped 12-7 a week earlier.

It should be a top-notch affair with both clubs expected to have some surprises to throw in. Kickoff is set for 8:00 P. M. with a full house expected.

son serving as a parent, or any student, in the exercise of a choice, or favor or penalize any person because of a choice made. Information concerning individual choices made or schools to which individual students are assigned shall not be made public.

III. New Students

Regardless of the grade in which they are eligible for enrollment, pupils transferring into the defendants' school system for the school year 1966-1967 who did not attend school in the public schools of Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District during the previous school year shall be assigned to schools without regard to race or color on a freedom of choice basis.

IV. Transfers

As it affects the present

school year (1966-1967), any student entering a grade to which the choice provisions of this decree do not yet apply shall have the right to transfer to any school from which he would otherwise be excluded on account of his race or color.

V. Services, Facilities, Activities and Programs

No student shall be segregated or discriminated against on account of race or color in any service, facility, activity or program (including transportation, athletics, or other extra-curricular activity) that may be conducted or sponsored by or affiliated with, the school in which he is enrolled.

VI. Faculty and Staff

An adequate start shall be made toward elimination of race as a basis for the employment

and allocation of teachers, administrators, and other personnel for the 1967-1968 school year; and, thereafter, race shall not be a factor in the hiring, assignment, reassignment, promotion, demotion or dismissal of teachers and other professional staff members.

VII. Reports To The Court

With respect to the 1966-1967 school year the defendants shall serve upon the opposing parties and file with the Clerk of the Court on month following entry of this order a report tabulating by race the number of choice applications received for enrollment in each grade in each school in the system, and the number of choices granted, and the number denied in each grade of each school. The report shall also state any reasons relied upon in denying choice and shall tabulate, by school and by race of student, the number of

choices denied for each such reason.

2) THAT jurisdiction of this cause shall be, and the same hereby is, retained for all purposes, and especially for the purpose of entering any and all further orders which may become necessary for the purpose of enforcing or modifying this order, either or both;

3) THAT the Clerk of this Court shall be, and he hereby is, directed to mail certified copies of this order, by certified mail, to all counsel of record and to note such mailings on the docket.
