\$486,000 GOES FOR SODA POP LOCALLY

Residents of Tishomingo County have de-
veloped a big thirst — for soda pop, that is.
As a result, the fizz biz has become big biz lo-
cally.

More pop is being consumed and more
money is being spent in that direction than ever
before.

In the past year, according to the latest
estimate, local residents put away soft drinks
at the record rate of 354 bottles (8-ounce) per
capita.

They went for the works — cola drinks,
ginger ale, root beer, sparkling mixes and the
wide variety of fruit pops and other beverages.

On an overall basis, some 4,956,000 bottles
were consumed in the year by the local popula-
tion. This was in addition to the unbottled
drinks served in drug stores, at vending ma-
chines and the like.

By way of comparison, the figures show
that total consumption locally in 1960 amount-
ed to 3,642,000 bottles. The increase for the
five-year period was 36 per cent.

The details of the soft drink business and
its operations come from the Department of
Commerce and from industry reports. Data is
given covering every state.

The tabulations reveal that it now takes
more than 50 billion (yes, billion) bottles of so-
da pop per year to quench America's thirst for
soft drinks.

As to cost, the American public is spend-
ing close to \$5 billion a year for soft drinks, the
figures show.

Among residents of Tishomingo County,
the bill came to approximately \$486,000 in the
past year. It was well above the 1960 outlay of
\$346,000.

Which drink is the most popular? That
depends upon what part of the country one is
talking about. In the Southeast and South Cen-
tral States, for instance, cola drinks are the big
favorite. In some other areas it is lemon-lime
or ginger ale or one of the many other flavors.

The figures used here do not include un-
accountable quantities of booze bought out of
state and transported into Tishomingo county.

General Election Is Set For November 8

A versatile ballot, offering
decisions on various offices
and constitutional amendments
will be presented to qualified
voters in the November 8 Gen-
eral Election.

Of most interest to Tishom-
ingo Countians will be the selec-
tion of a member from the 5th
District to fill a chair on the
County School Board.

According to B. L. Mercer,
County Supt. of Education, the
deadline to qualify for the
election is this Saturday, Octo-
ber 8. At present Travis Cain
of the 5th District is the only
qualifying contender.

Board members serve a per-

iod of 6 years, rotating every 2
years with the election of a
new member.

Included on the ballot will
be the selection of a represen-
tative for the Second Congres-
sional District. Congressman
Jamie Whitten seeks re-elec-
tion. His opponent is republi-
can candidate, Sen. S. B. Wise
of Jones.

Congressman Jamie Whitten
began serving the people of
Tishomingo County following
the re-apportionment of the
State Congressional Districts.
District 2 includes Tishomingo,
Alcorn, and Prentiss counties
along with others in the north-
east corner. Tishomingo Coun-
ty was previously in the 1st
Congressional District served
by Thomas G. Abernethy.

State Senator James O. East-
land seeks re-election in the
November 8 General Election.
His opponent is Rep. Prentiss
Walker who is now serving as
congressman from the 4th
Congressional District.

Voters will also be asked to
decide upon several constitu-
tional amendments which will
round out the complete ballot.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Why do IQ tests vary?

A: Several factors may cause an IQ to vary from one time to another. For one thing, like every measurement (mental and physical), the IQ is subject to experimental error. Thus, a child's IQ on a second test may vary up or down by as much as five points—do solely to experimental errors. Again, if a child is ill or frightened or hostile, or if the test administrator is unskilled, IQs very probably will be inaccurate. Finally, if a child's environment is drastically restrictive, if stimulation is meager, or the child neglected, his IQ will be depressed, as every clinical psychologist knows. For the vast number of children growing up in an average American culture, however, the IQ is valid and comparable.

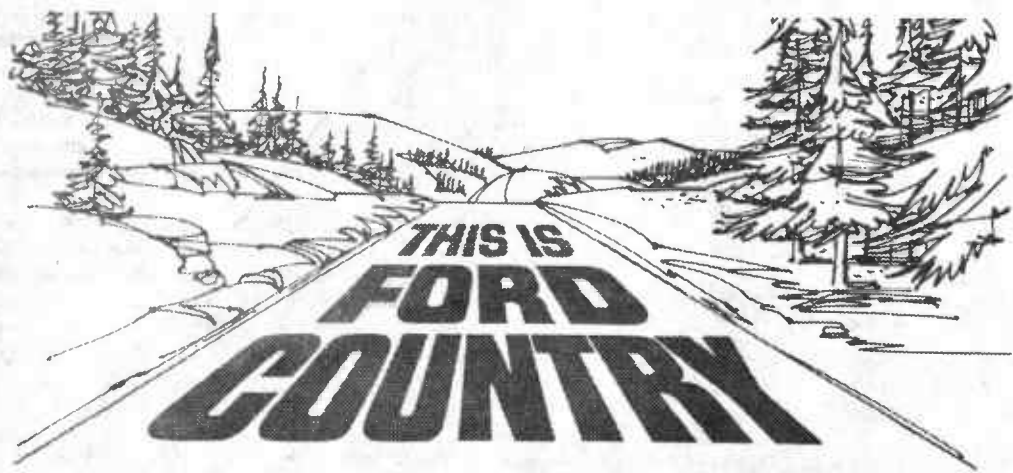

How strong do you hold to a principle? What is your price? Can you hold to a purpose, cling to a belief, deny recognition or profit merely because conscience tells you it is the thing to do? If, indeed, "every man has his price," for some men the price must be justice, fair play — and truth. These things the skeptic may refer to as "ideals." But they are realities. The man who has learned to struggle with his conscience has also learned that peace of mind and happiness are not for sale at any price in the public market places.

In the final analysis, the best of life is not what you have and not what you claim to be; it is what you are.

YOUR NEIGHBOR ACTS RICH AT 65? — HE'S KIDDING YOU

"All the retired people in my neighborhood — except me — must be stealing from the grocery store," the man said.

"I know about how much income they're getting, which is about what I'm getting. Yet all the time they are doing things and buying things my wife and I can't afford. How come?"

"Maybe if you would come up with a good, average budget for a retired couple I could figure out whether they are really stealing or whether I am mismanaging..."

This man's neighbors probably aren't stealing, and he may not be mismanaging. Most likely his neighbors are just more careful than he in making a little money look like a lot. Neighbors are good at this.

Be that as it may, here is an average budget for a couple over 65, as offered by the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. It is for an income of \$2,983 a year, or just over \$248 a month.

Naturally, you see things wrong with it. So do I. But it's a budget, and the U.S. Government is about as authoritative on this sort of thing as you can get. The main trouble with it is that any retirement budget is cockeyed before it starts — there's too much variance in what peo-

ple eat and how they live. And especially in what they want, because in retirement people are prone to do what they want instead of what they're expected to do.

Any neighbor you suspect of having your same income, but who seems to be living higher, may be eating corn bread and turnip greens, resoling his own shoes, and taking aspirin instead of \$10 prescriptions. How could you know without peeping through the window?

As for the income, nobody ever knows exactly what a neighbor is getting. Maybe he has some stock shares hidden away. Maybe his children are sending a few dollars. Maybe some old greenbacks are cached in the basement and being pulled out on special occasions.

But in the main, your neighbor doesn't have much more money than you think he has. Roughly 75 per cent of all couples over 65 have incomes under \$5,000, according to U.S. Census figures.

SENSING THE NE

Katzenbach At State

President Johnson's nomination of Atty. Gen. Nicholas deB. Katzenbach as No. 2 man in the State Department is likely to produce a further decline in public confidence in the administration's handling of foreign policy.

Mr. Katzenbach was first brought into government by Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, at the time the latter was Attorney General. First as assistant to Bobby Kennedy and later as Attorney General under the Johnson administration, he has used his powers to ride roughshod over the rights of the states. Moreover, Mr. Katzenbach has failed to take any decisive action against the communist front groups that have been active in opposing the war in Viet Nam. The communists have been waging a virtual war on the home front, but Mr. Katzenbach has not attempted to root out the Reds involved in the protests or masterminding the demonstrations.

During this past summer, there also has been a virtual war directed at American cities in the Middle West. Terrorist groups have been behind many of the outbreaks of arson, looting and sniper action.

In Cleveland, Ohio, a grand jury submitted a report that left-wing insurgents were behind the riots in that city. But Mr. Katzenbach dismissed the grand jury report. He blamed the riots on general social ills and said the community had to do more to help those whom he depicted as downtrodden. In short, Mr. Katzenbach sees no evil on the city riot front or on the anti-Viet Nam demonstration front. Such a man, Americans may legitimately conclude is unfitted to occupy the second ranking post in the U. S. State Department.

Can Mr. Katzenbach be trusted to take a hard line against communists in Europe or Asia when he has a record of being disinclined to take a tough stand against communists in the cities and protest groups of America? The answer has to be in the negative.

Indeed the public cannot forget Mr. Katzenbach's long and close association with the Kennedys. Sen. Robert F. Kennedy is a critic of the armed struggle against communism in Viet Nam. Every time the U. S. takes a tough action against communist North Viet Nam, Sen. Kennedy finds fault with American toughness. The U. S. public would be naive indeed if it did not conclude that Mr. Katzenbach will be influenced by the Kennedy line on international affairs.

At the same time that Mr.

Johnson announced the nomination of Mr. deB. Katzenbach as No. 2 man in the State Department, he disclosed that Mr. Rostow, former Yale University far-out liberal, would become of State for Prof. Rostow's brother, Walter Rostow, already man of the power department Policy Council. 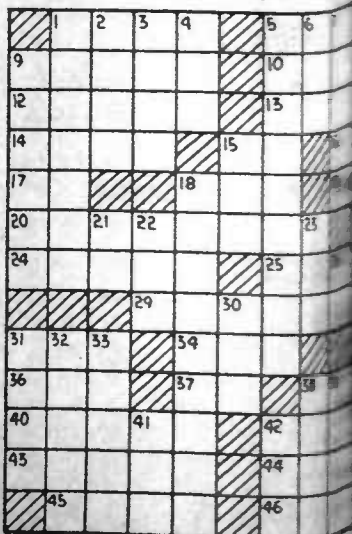

\$127,577.88 was paid for road machinery and equipment during the year under review, of which \$78,086.27 was borrowed on interest-bearing notes. Payments made on these or similar equipment notes during the year amounted to \$10,921.28, and interest paid on such notes amounted to \$499.74.

In addition to purchases noted above, repairs to such equipment, including tires and tubes and grader blades, accounted for disbursements totaling \$81,393.11, as shown in the receipts and disbursements statement for road and bridge funds.

OTHER COMMENTS

Several transactions occurred in connection with the operations of the Tishomingo County Economic Development Fund account which appeared to be quite irregular. The explanation of the Board of Supervisors for these irregularities is that the county needed to move fast in order to avoid losing the Consolidated Aluminum Company plant which was subsequently located in the county, and that no one has profited improperly. On the contrary, they have saved money for the county, according to their assertions, in moving 200,000 yards of dirt at the site of their plant at a cost to the county of approximately \$27,000, while estimates of the cost of moving this amount of dirt ranged as high as \$72,000.

Since this office has no reason to doubt that the statements of the Supervisors are incorrect, no exception is being taken to the apparently irregular expenditures at this time, but interested citizens and taxpayers are entitled to know the circumstances, in our opinion.

Payments were made to Dalrymple Equipment Company of Amory, Mississippi, in the amount of \$4,000.00 from the fund, for the rental of a used Allis-Chalmers Motor Grader from October 29, 1963 through December 29, 1963. Examination of the records of the equipment company revealed that a similar motor scraper, with the same serial number had been invoiced by the company to Mr. Russell Bonds, Burnsville, Mississippi on November 11, 1963, indicating on the invoice that the grader had been delivered to Mr. Bond on October 29, 1963. The \$4,000 paid by the county to Dalrymple had been credited on Dalrymple's books, to Mr. Bond's account with them, the county receiving credit also through a journal entry.

Another transaction of this fund was a warrant in May, 1964, to Bill Burleson for equipment hire in the amount of \$4,179.25. Mr. Burleson, a respected equipment salesman from an adjoining county, does not ordinarily engage in the business of renting equipment himself. It developed that he had written a check on May 5, 1964, for \$4,150. to Thomas Bond, who is understood to be a brother of Russell Bond. This check indicated that it was for equipment rental. The second endorsement below that of Thomas Bond, was that of Russell Bond.

Without much question, there have been violations of the letter of the law and of the state constitution which might make the members of the board of supervisors liable for some illegal expenditures, but unless more evidence becomes available to indicate that the county's taxpayers have not obtained full values for the money expended or that one or more public officials have actually profited from some of the transactions in question, the Department of Audit does not expect to make demand for refund to the county treasury or to file suit in connection therewith.

While it is not relevant to this particular situation, it does not appear out of order to say here that Road District Two, of which Mr. Russell Bond is supervisor, appeared to be, at September 30, 1964, one of the two districts in the county in excellent financial condition. Road revenue, except for ad valorem taxes and homestead exemption reimbursement has been divided equally among the five districts.

Another group of transactions which appears to be in violation of Section 109 of the State Constitution is presented in this report as Appendix 3. These consist of payments made to D. F. Frederick, for machinery hire and grading work, from the Economic Development Fund referred to above and from various road funds of the county. Mr. Frederick was in partnership with Mr. O. F. Wade, Supervisor of Road District Three, and the partnership has had equipment assessed on the personal property tax rolls of the county. Two of the warrants listed had been endorsed by Mr. Wade, in addition to Mr. Frederick's endorsement. According to county records, the partnership was not dissolved until April 4, 1964.

It appears probable that legal liability in these cases, if there is one, would be that of all members of the board not recorded as voting against the allowances since the partnership was a fact known to the general public. Any further action in connection with these transactions is being held in abeyance, pending consultation with the Attorney-General of the State of Mississippi, and with the Board of Supervisors and the attorney therefor.

The board minutes reflect orders to advertise for the purchase of equipment and supplies, in accordance with Section 9027, Code of 1942, Recomplied, and other related laws.

If any further information is desired concerning the financial operation of the county during the year of 1964 the same may be obtained from the audit report on file in the office of the chancery clerk.

No Peace Pipe At Pow Wow; Chiefs Scal

"Pigskin Preview" Predictions Ring True With Conference Game Outcome

Whack! Sock! Pow! No, it wasn't another Batman show. What it was was football and those sounds were coming from the leather popping on the gridiron. And pop they did! When the knocking was all over and the field had been washed clean by the annual flash flood that goes with the Chief-Card game, Iuka had shot down the highest flying Cardinal in Belmont history 25-12. It was sweet revenge for the Chiefs as they put an end to 20 games without defeat for the Cards and won their 32nd game in the last 33 outings, and their 9th in a row. It also meant the clearance of a major hurdle in the Chiefs quest of another Highland Conference championship, their third in four years.

Defense was the name of this game. The Chiefs managed to get those 25 points despite the fact that they had only 2 first downs in the entire contest and a net of 123 yards gained. Belmont, by contrast, managed to gain 6 first downs but ended the game with a net loss of 18 yards rushing. The Cards did manage to get two passes com-

pleted for 29 yards to give them a net of 11 yards gained. In the course of the game, however, Iuka picked off two Card passes and blocked two Card punts.

This contest wasn't far into the first quarter until it gave evidence that it was destined to be a stem-winder. With less than two minutes gone in the game, Belmont quarterback Larry Fancher took a Chief punt on his 45 and cut to the left behind good blocking and crossed the pay line all alone. The conversion attempt was fumbled and it stood 6-0 Cards with 10:31 remaining in the first quarter.

Halfback Ronnie Brown did not waste any time putting the Chiefs back into the contest when he took the ensuing kickoff, cut left, got a couple of key blocks and outraced the Belmont secondary for 90 yards of glory. It took just 14 seconds for a tie game again. Fullback Merle Smith was stopped short on the extra point try and it was 6-6 with 10:17 to go in the third quarter.

Belmont hit paydirt again late in the second quarter

when Cardinal Bob White recovered a Chieftain fumble at the Chief 15 and then went 8 yards for pay dirt a couple of plays later. The conversion was again fumbled and it was 12-6 at the half.

The first half was mostly Belmont. The second half was all Iuka. It was just two minutes old when end Darryl Ramsey blocked a Card punt and guard Paul Barnett recovered in the end zone to make it 12-12. Halfback Steve Wilson pushed in the point after and the Cards were ahead to stay 13-12.

Wilson, a driving speedster, broke the Cards back in the early stages of the 4th quarter with a 51 yard burst for the endzone. The point after was short and it stood 19-12. Quarterback Fred Rutherford added an insurance TD from a yard out with 2:33 remaining to make it 25-12. The point attempt failed and it stood that way when the gun sounded.

From beginning to end, it was a team effort all the way. Iuka's line kept Fancher in the hole all night with their rushes and the Cardinal running backs found little room up the mid-

dle. Brown and Wilson were especially outstanding on offense, while Barnett, Earl Solomon, Ramsey, Kenneth Smith, Kerry Sewell, Ronnie LeBlanc, and Cliff Daniel led the defensive effort. But it was team play all the way.

AUTO OWNERS:

1967 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

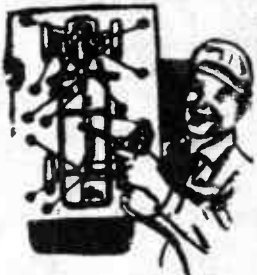

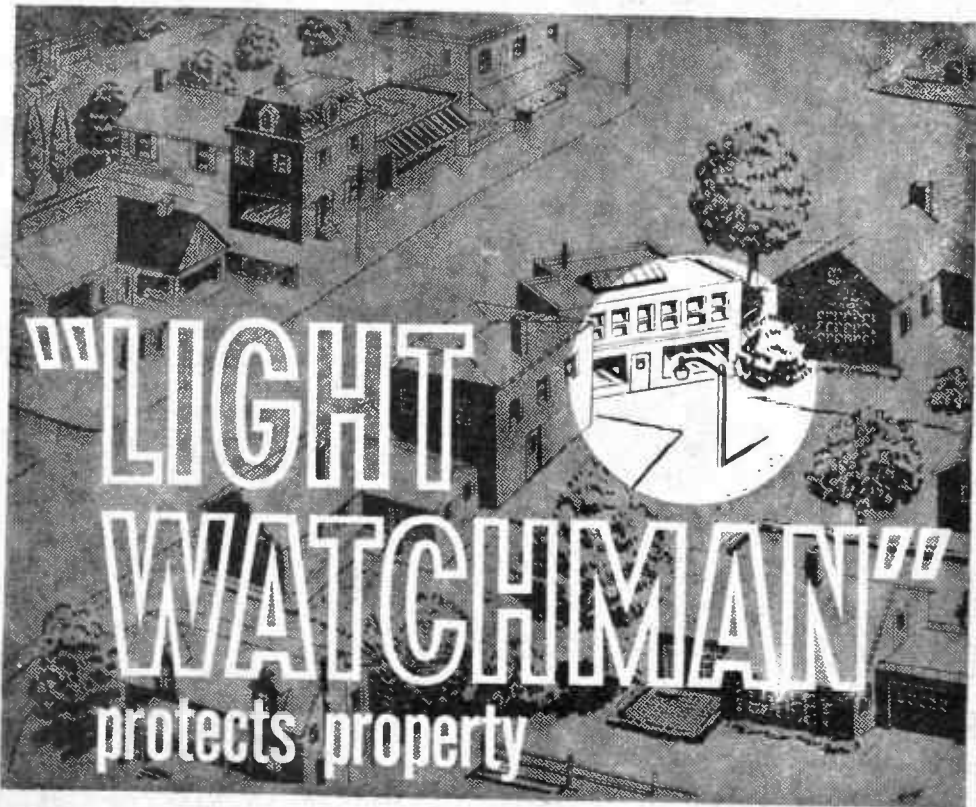

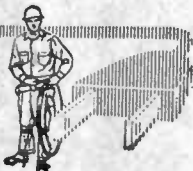

Cut Cotton Stalks with bush-hog as soon after cotton is harvested as convenient.

These cotton stalks and corn stalks left on top of the land, where a mechanical corn picker is used, help prevent soil

erosion during Fall and Winter. Each bit of stalk acts as a tiny dam to slow down the runoff of water during Fall and Winter rains. Too, these stalks, cut and scattered over the land surface absorb moisture and rot. In the spring when the field is prepared for planting, there will be very little trash to hinder proper planting.

Not only is the cutting of cotton and corn stalks as soon after harvest as convenient a good soil and water conservation practice, it is a job every farmer has to do before preparing his land for another crop, and the sooner it is done, the less trash and litter he will have to hinder good seedbed preparation and proper planting.

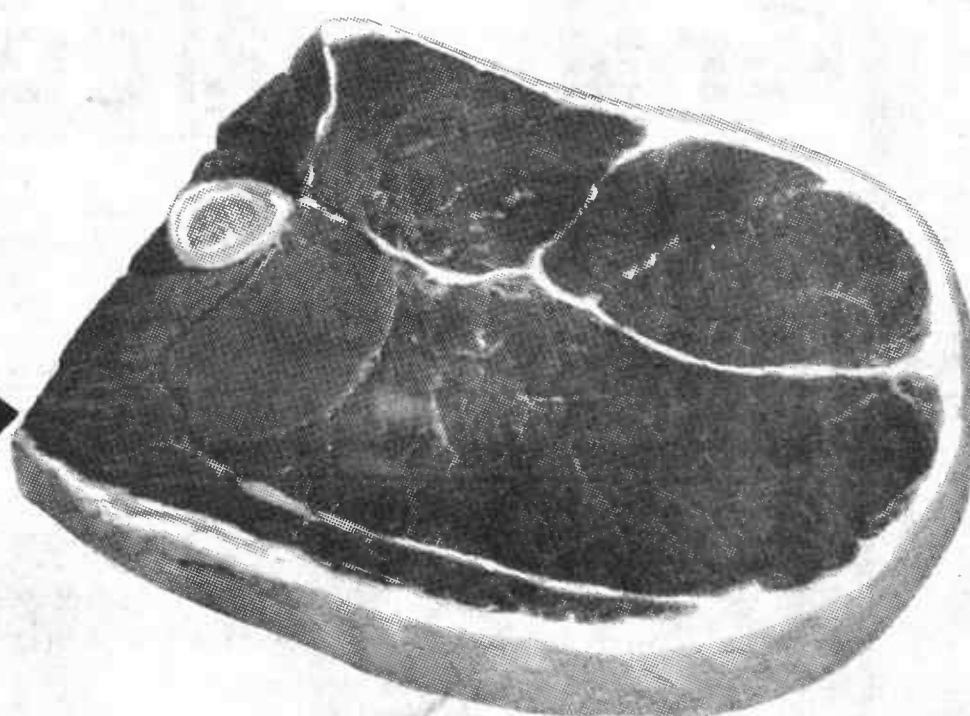

Rules Given For Correct License Tag Displaying

Don't try to hide it (your license tag, that is). General T. B. Birdsong, Commissioner of Public Safety, reminds motorists that too many vehicle owners are not properly displaying their license tags. Many automobiles have the tag partially covered by trailer hitches. Pick up truck owners sometimes have a heavy duty bumper on the rear of the truck and put their tag behind the bumper.

General Birdsong says the statute requires that license tags be "fastened immovably twelve inches or more above the ground at the rear of the vehicle." The tag must be in upright position with the numerals plainly visible and legible at all times. The tag must further be near enough to the rear light to be visible and legible at night for a distance of not less than sixty feet. The same basic requirements for tag display also apply to all trailers, semi-trailers, and motorcycles.

The Commissioner warns that the Highway Patrol has been instructed to enforce these provisions in the law strictly. He further quotes the law as stating that, "unless fastened as provided, the vehicle shall be regarded as operating without a license tag and the owner or operator shall be liable for penalties herein provided."

Now that tag buying time is upon us again, make a "resolution" for the new tag year and be sure that your license plate is displayed properly.

Dove Season Ends; Squirrel Season Opens

The first of three dove seasons drew to a close Sunday, October 2, at sundown. The second season will open October 22, and will run until November 6.

Saturday, October 8, will see the opening of squirrel season on a statewide basis. The bushy tails may be hunted through January 8 of '67. There's a bag limit of 8 per day, with 16 in possession.

Hunters are asked to buy

their '66-'67 hunting licenses, to ask permission of landowners before going into their woods, and to Be Careful With Fire.

Qualification Test For Deferment Set

Colonel James L. Davis, State Director of Selective Service for Mississippi, announces that a Selective Service College Qualification Test will be administered November 18 and 19, to give college students the opportunity to establish eligibility for deferment.

All Selective Service registrants who have not previously taken the test are eligible to apply. Application must be made and postmarked no later than Friday, October 21. Colonel Davis emphasized that all eligible registrants who wish to take the test should apply immediately. Bulletins of information, application cards, and tickets of admission are available at all local board offices and may be picked up by the student from any local board, regardless of the Selective Service Local Board with whom he is registered. There is a Selective Service Local Board in every county site of the state, and near most of the junior and senior colleges.

Colonel Davis further stated that the examination will be given in Cleveland, Hattiesburg, Jackson, Natchez, Starkville and University on Friday and Saturday, November 18 & 19.

Colonel Davis reminds the student that, to be considered for student deferment, he must be in the required standing of his class along with other male students or have made a score of 70 or higher on the College Qualification Test. He also reminds the student that taking this test will not in any way jeopardize his standing with draft board. In other words, a student will not be penalized if he takes this test and fails. If the student has already ta-

that the patient's doctor and the administrator of the hospital can make room assignments without regard to the Civil Rights Act of 1964 if complying with the act would adversely affect the patient's physical or mental welfare. "I do not want the matter left to HEW inspectors, even if they are medical men," Stennis said, and then stated that "without the amendment, HEW inspectors would have the power and authority to overrule a patient's physician and the chief medical officer of the hospital.

The patient is entitled to some protection in the law, and the hospitals should not be held accountable for violating some arbitrary regulation simply because they attempted to protect the health of a patient."

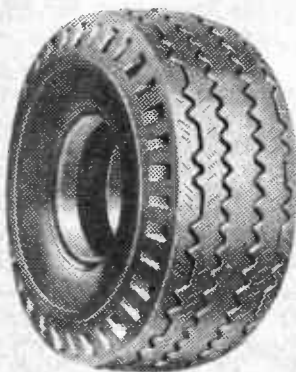
