Baptist Revival Nears Close With Only 2 Services

Homestead Tax Exemption

In 1940 the Mississippi legislature, in order to encourage home building and ownership and to give additional security to family groups, passed a Homestead Exemption Act. Under the provisions of this Act, residents of the state who are heads of families are exempt from certain real property taxes in an amount up to five thousand dollars of the assessed valuation.

Persons entitled to this exemption include married persons living together; unmarried persons who permanently maintain a home; a husband or wife living apart from the other, but not divorced, who has legal custody of one or more children; and an unmarried resident who maintains a home for the benefit of a person dependent upon him or her for support. The exemption applies to the house, other improvements, and the land used for purposes of a home. If building and land are used for business purposes or revenue is derived from it, it does not qualify for the exemption. However, if less than six rooms are rented, the property will qualify for one-half of the regular exemption.

In order to qualify for this exemption eligible persons must make a written application to the county tax assessor on or before the first day of April each year.

An applicant who makes a false or fraudulent claim or misrepresents any facts is subject to a fine of up to five hundred dollars or six months imprisonment. The tax assessor has form applications which to fill out for applicants or to assist the applicants in filling out.

It is now necessary to give the license plate number of any and all motor vehicles when application is made. If an out of state license is being used, under certain conditions the homestead exemption will be disapproved.

Owning a home in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, is far less costly than to own one in our neighboring State of Tennessee, which has no homestead exemption law. In fact, a resident of Tishomingo county can own a home AND an automobile for less money than he would pay in taxes for a home and auto of comparable size in Savannah, Tennessee.

In addition to high real estate taxes paid on homes, Hardin county and most Tennessee counties have another source of tax revenue which Tishomingo county does not have and that is the tax on alcoholic beverages. Residents of Mississippi counties contribute handsomely to the Tennessee Counties through this tax.

Even out-of-state owners of vacation cottages on Pickwick Lake realize an advantage in Tishomingo county's homestead exemption law and yet, at the same time, contribute to Hardin county's tax coffers when they make purchases in that county.

We are fond of Mississippi's Homestead Exemption Law for it is a great help to some of our elderly people whose income is limited. However, it is regrettable that so many of our residents make purchases out-of-state and thereby leave in that state many, many tax dollars that should, by rights, remain in our county.

The election of Community Committeemen who will take office December 1 to serve during the 1967 Program Year will cast their ballots by mail.

Ballots will be mailed out around November 1, and must be returned on or before November 14. Ballots received in envelopes postmarked by 12 midnight that date will be counted.

ASCS Community Boundaries have not been changed. Therefore, boundaries for the election

held in the fall of 1965 will be the same for the election to be held in 1966.

Each eligible voter will receive a ballot with a slate of nominees for each community. County maps delineated to designate the boundaries for each community are posted in the country stores and other public places so farmers can see what community they will be in.

The nominating committee will meet soon to finish preparing the slate of nominees, which will consist of eight eligible farmers. Although the nominating committee will provide a slate of nominees, petitions signed by six or more eligible voters nominating persons for membership on the community committee will be received at the County Office at any time on or before October 20. A separate petition is required for each person nominated. Eligible voters may sign as many petitions as they desire.

Persons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm, well qualified for committee work and should represent the various sections and types of agriculture in the community.

Persons nominated by a proper petition will be included in the slate of nominees if found eligible and willing to serve. If a person nominated by petition is ineligible he will be notified before the slate is completed. He may appeal the determination to the County Committee. Appeals must be filed with the County Committee as soon as possible but not later than 15 days from the date of notification.

The County Committee may make such addition nominations as are required to meet the minimum and or maximum number of nominees. Each farmer will receive further information on the Committee Election when ballots are mailed for voting.

Tishomingo PTA Meeting

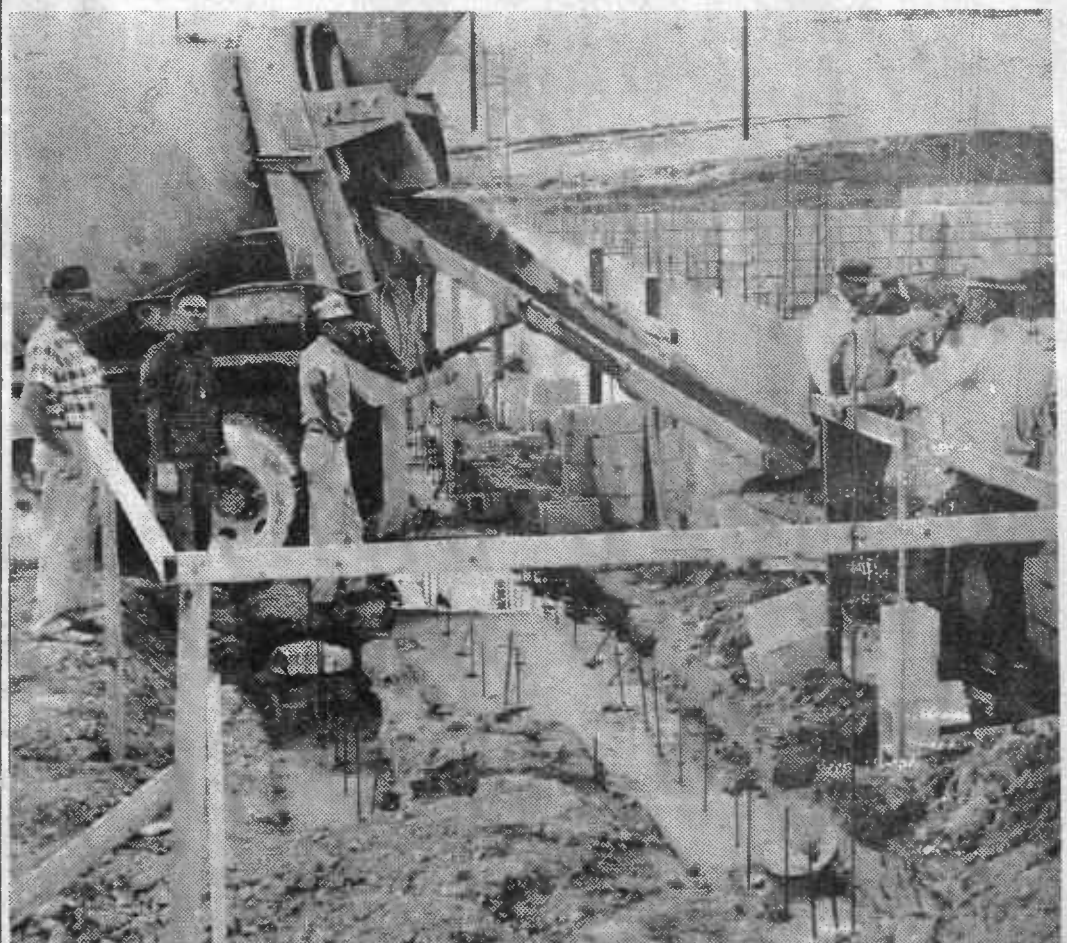
The Tishomingo PTA will meet Monday night October 17, in the school cafeteria at 7 o'clock. Children from the elementary grades will present a variety program.

Sunday afternoon fare was a hike through the countryside.

In our small town it was the custom in the Fall, especially, for the young people (plus any oldsters, too) to go hiking in the country for 10 or 15 miles. This was a spontaneous group and little pre-arrangement was necessary. If the weather was good you just knew the hiking was on. Sometimes as many as 20 or 30 of us made the hike. Even though we were born and raised in the country there was always a new and exciting place to be discovered.

Some of you people of retirement age are doing bizarre things with your money. And in some cases are endangering your lives in the process.

For instance:
"My husband has always kept our money in cash, and has always hidden it at home. Since retirement he has continued adding to his hoard and now has just over \$38,000. It is all in rumpled \$5, \$10, and \$20 bills — he says somebody could trace the serial numbers on new bills. It is all in metal boxes cemented into the foundation of the house."

"My husband says he doesn't distrust banks . . . just probate judges and lawyers. He says that if he dies the children and I can go get the money and have it free and clear, without the lawyers and courts and without taxes."

"This doesn't seem right to me . . ."
The wife tells me this. She must have told others. Which means a peril of robbery has been set up and with the robbery a possible peril to their lives.

"Our father retired with about \$12,000 in good investments, and then began selling them. He took the money and began depositing it in banks and savings & loans, but never putting more than \$1,000 in each institution. In our community and in neighboring towns he now has 12

accounts that we know of . . . maybe more. And he has been using four different signatures — John Smith Brown, John S. Brown, J. Smith Brown, and J. S. Brown. He apparently thinks he will keep anybody from knowing he ever had over \$1,000 because he hides his 12 account books in different places . . ."

At least the family is aware of what he's doing. Many families aren't . . . and thus lose forever what the father hid.

"My mother has always been peculiar about saving money. Since my father died six years ago she has grown even more peculiar, though she does not want for income. Her passion is to hoard silver coins. She has been at it for at least these six years and on occasion I have seen her secretly bringing into the house as much as \$20 in half-dollars and quarters."

"With the cooperation of an old family friend I made a search of the house while mother was at church to find where she was hiding the money. In fact, I made six searches before I found it — in the four large, hollow posts of an old brass bed she has in her bedroom. The posts were packed with coins, including silver dollars. And the bed had grown so heavy you couldn't budge it."

As the congressional and gubernatorial campaign season comes down to the final stretch it is increasingly clear that the voters intend to hand the Great Society a surprise on election day. From coast to coast, political observers report a ground swell of conservative backlash.

In California, the rioting in San Francisco is regarded as having moved the electorate even more in the direction of conservative reform. Many Californians are determined to restore the rule of law and order in their state. The working public in that state also seems very indignant over long-standing abuses of welfare.

The August Herald, for example, commented editorially that the people of Georgia "have become fed up with the social planning, unchecked spending, and experimentation of the national administration."

The "backlash," as the phenomenon is sometimes described, is a remarkable tribute to the principles and common sense of the American people. Since the Kennedy administration took over in Washington in 1961, the people of this nation have been subjected to an unparalleled bribery attempt. Both the Kennedy and Johnson administrations have sought to "buy" the American people with their own tax dollars. The officials of both administrations have offered large sums of federal aid to communities and states on the condition that they accept programs and adopt plans that the communities regard as wrong.

Parents who are quick to complain if they feel their children are not receiving the education they require at school, who insist their children attend church regularly, should ask themselves what they are doing

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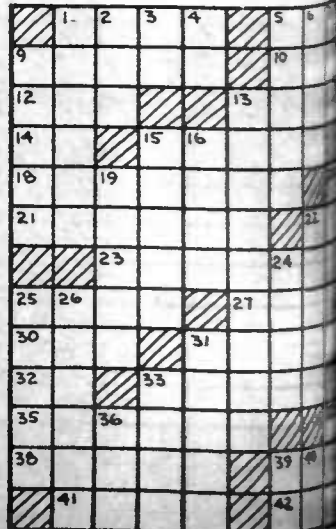

\$1,055.14 was the figure Belmont tallied in with in August, showing a marked decrease as compared with the previous month of \$2,321.83. Belmont collects sales tax on the one-half of one percent rate.

Tishomingo collections of \$795.20 showed a slight increase as compared to \$715.25 in July.

Other nearby towns showed the following figures for August 1966 with corresponding figures for July 1966: Baldwyn a total of \$4,959.96, last month, \$3,933.67; Booneville collected \$11,572.40, last month, \$7,958.28; Corinth's figure of \$27,377.85 showed a marked increase over last month's figure of \$17,203.47 and Fulton reports \$7,023.37 as compared with last month's total of \$5,431.96.

According to this report, all surrounding towns had definite increases over the month of July. Iuka shows a marked increase, Tishomingo a very slight increase, and Belmont, a definite decrease in its collections.

AUTO OWNERS:

1967 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

Crouched Tigers Pounce on Chieftain

Iuka Must Make Good In Homecoming Game Against Hamilton This Friday

An aroused and alert Ecru Tiger put its claws in the back of an Iuka Chief at Ecru last Friday night and sent the Chiefs rocking with a 13-0 defeat. Ecru thus became the first Highland Conference club other than Belmont to stun the Chiefs and the second in the history of the four

year old conference. They also threw the race for this year's championship into a frenzy with a five clubs in the running, each with a single defeat.

Ecru scored in the first half when Phil Sappington scored from the three-yard line following a Chief bobble. Ecru's place kicker, G. W. Ball, booted the

point after and it stood 7-0 at the half. In the second half, Tiger Thomas Wood picked up a wayward ball on a Chief punting situation and zoomed 35 yards for a score. The extra point failed and it ended that way, 13-0.

The Chiefs could never muster enough offensive thrust to penetrate the Tiger goal line in this one in what amounted to the difference.

For Ecru it meant their fifth consecutive victory since a narrow opening defeat at the hands of Saltillo. It was also their fifth consecutive shutout. It put them into a tie for first place with Hamilton, a half game ahead of Belmont, Saltillo and Iuka. For Iuka, it meant the snapping of a nine-game winning streak and loss of undisputed first place in the conference. It was the Chiefs second defeat in the last four years.

The outcome left the stage set for this Friday's game with Hamilton at Iuka. The Chiefs find themselves in a must situation if they are to remain in the running for the laurels.

The defeat was especially tough for the Chiefs, who just one week earlier had appeared to take a commanding lead in

the conference with a brilliant 25-12 victory over Belmont. Offense, or rather the lack of it, was the Chiefs downfall in this one. And the casual observer can tell you that you can't win them unless you cross the goal line or put it between the up-rights.

One thing this reversal did, however, and that is to make this year's trophy chase the most exciting in the history of the Highland Conference.

During the contest period, an excess of 600,000 accident free miles were driven by employees of Alabama-Tennessee.



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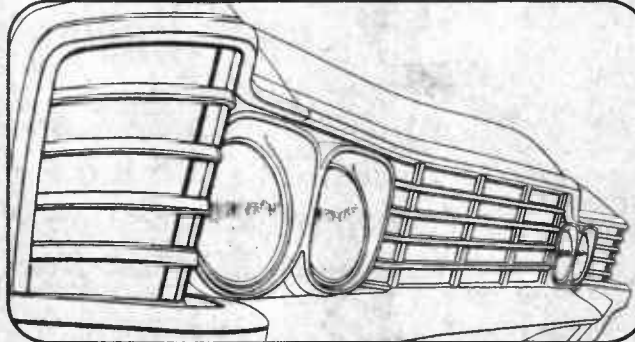
