From: C. William Hunsberger, Souderton, Pa.: Do you remember the time when the annual Sunday School picnic was the social highlight of your small town when you were a child? Sometimes it was called a Strawberry and Ice Cream Festival or a Peach and Ice Cream Festival. The "social" as it was often referred to by many folks usually took place in the Summer in the midst of the strawberry or peach season.

The ladies of the Sunday School plus other neighborhood women would gather on a Saturday morning or sometimes in the afternoon and clean the fruit so that it would be fresh and juicy when the serving took place usually around the supper hour or afterwards till the late hour of 9:00 p.m.

How we as children delighted to partake of the generous scoops of ice cream heaped high with strawberries or peaches dripping

with the succulent juices. Twice as good as a drugstore sundae! Then, too, there were the five cent hot dogs... hamburgers were hardly known in those days and they were a delicacy at 10c each. The orange drink or chocolate milk was a rare treat at 5c a half-pint.

The big thrill at the Festivals for children was the fishing pond. What surprises and cherished gifts were concealed in the plain brown paper bags which we fished for at the cost of a nickel.

Sometimes there was music at the Festival supplied by a local fiddler to add to the gaiety. Once-in-a-while there might even be two or three musicians to liven the affair.

Our fast-paced society today doesn't have time to slow down for such an old-fashioned picnic. It's become another part of the "I Remember" file.

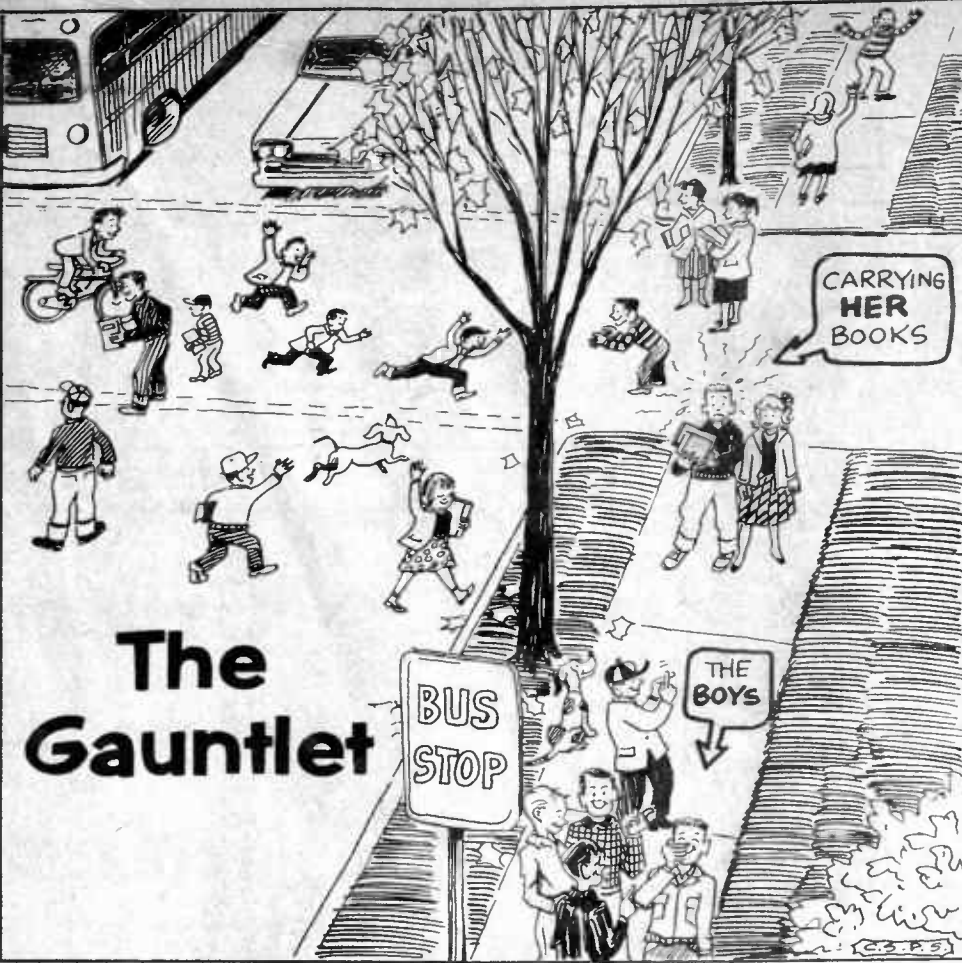

CITY WIFE SINGS A MELODY ABOUT RETIRING TO A FARM

Dear Golden Years:
I do not often write letters to newspapers, but I feel you are going to let some retired people miss their bus because they are standing on the wrong corner. And I must speak my piece.

You have been writing about "the mistake" people make in moving to a country place when they retire... how they work themselves to death with no promise except another day's work tomorrow. I feel so sorry for them.

My husband and I retired three years ago. We lived in the city and both had jobs in the middle-pay bracket. We had worked hard all our lives and, being in the city, had saved very little money. We retired on one small check—my husband's Social Security. I'm not old enough for mine yet.

On this one small check we could not cover the expenses of city living. Anyway, we didn't like city life. All that we wanted most was what a country place had to offer.

So we moved onto an old run-

down farm of about 100 acres. The land was grown up in trees and brush. The house had no windows and little foundation. But two little creeks ran merrily past the old house, and a large lilac tree in the yard was full of bloom. An old apple orchard in the front was also in bloom, at least that part of it still living.

We had fallen in love with the place at first sight, and had bought it shortly afterwards. The next morning we were on the site in overalls and with rolled-up sleeves. Some of our rural neighbors dropped by to help. But we weren't fooled—they really came to tell us what fools we were to buy the place. But they stayed to chop brush.

Three years have now gone by since we took over the place. We have the prettiest little two-bedroom house in these parts. Our yard is an acre of mowed weeds (they look like a lawn) and flower beds. We have a vegetable garden from which I have canned over 2,000 jars of food for our winter use.

Our woods are a haven for small game, and my husband and our two beagles love to hunt there. Sometimes with friends from the city. There's a river for fishing not far away.

My personal interests are genealogy and flowers, and when the long winter evenings come I read my genealogy papers, make quilts, do fancy needlework, and all the other such things I had always wanted to do if there were time. Now I've got the time.

After living in the city for so long we didn't want close neighbors. We wanted space. Here, our nearest neighbor is over half a mile down a country road. So, instead of the noise of humans we listen to the songs of the birds and the music of our two creeks.

I would never take another city job to supplement our income. We have adjusted to what we have. And, in fact, we have just about as much leftover each month now as we had when we got two weekly pay checks.

A Nation With Courage

On November 11 of this year the people of Rhodesia will celebrate their first year of independence. They have truly made history. Though subjected to cruel economic pressure, including an oil embargo such as the Western nations never dared apply against Communist Cuba, the Rhodesians have carried on in the great tradition of Anglo-Saxon peoples struggling against tyranny.

Though the Johnson administration has chosen to support the position taken by Britain's socialist government for reasons not worthy of a great nation, many Americans are mindful of the parallel between Rhodesia's declaration of independence and the American declaration of independence of July 4, 1776. Ironically, the U. S. Department of State, voicing the political view taken by the Johnson administration, asserts that "Southern Rhodesia remains a British colony." The irony is in the fact that it was in precisely these terms that Lord North's government described independent America in 1776.

The Johnson administration is guilty of poor historical understanding. Since 1923, Rhodesians have been self-governing. They paid all their bills for more than 40 years, without financial assistance from the mother country. In World War II Rhodesians—including Prime Minister Ian Smith—fought bravely against the Nazis. They have had a poor reward from the socialist government of Prime Minister Harold Wilson.

Rhodesia has won sympathy among the American people, if not the Johnson administration, because they have refused to be stamped into a surrender of their country.

The "no win" thinkers in Washington, London and elsewhere mistook the temper of the Rhodesians. They thought they could be intimidated or bought off. But the Rhodesians refused to let their country take the road to primitivism and one-party dictatorship simply because liberal pundits and politicians declared that "winds of change" were blowing in Africa. They held on. They have stuck it out, and thereby provided a living example of the Dunkirk spirit that animated English-speaking people a generation ago.

To be sure, no one can tell

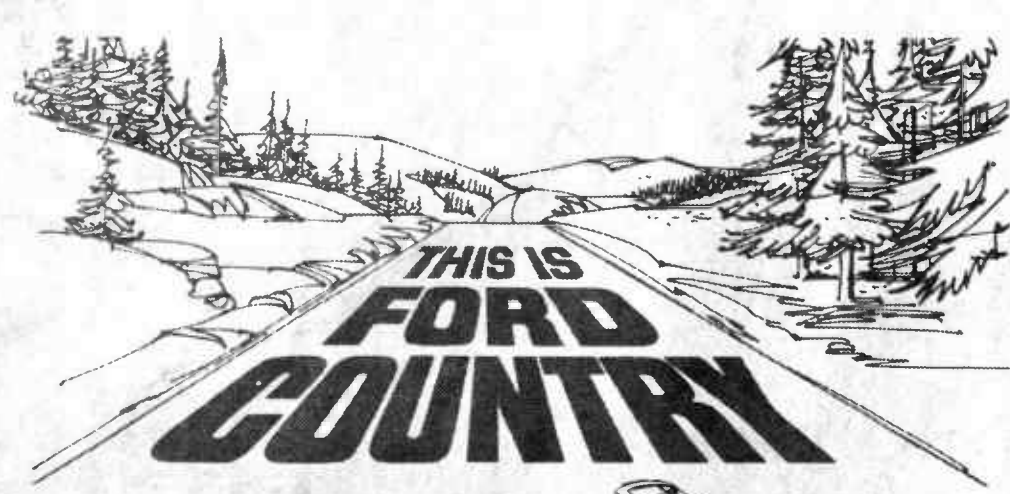
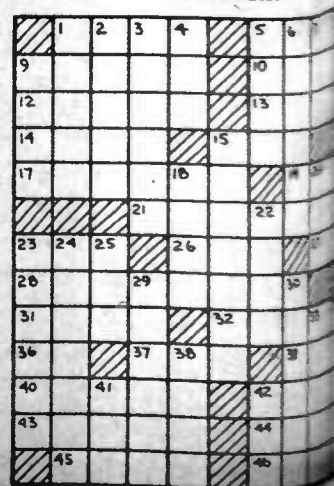

GOP Runners Seek Dixie Negro Votes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two freshmen congressmen, seeking as Republicans to wrest the governorships of Alabama and Georgia from longtime Democratic control, said Sunday they hope for substantial Negro support.

The two, James B. Martin of Alabama and Howard H. Callaway of Georgia, said they did not think their votes against civil rights measures would hurt them with Negro voters.

"The Republican party is going to get the Negro vote," declared Callaway in response to a question on the NRC.

"I am running against a very gracious lady," he said. "However, she is a standin for her husband."

Martin predicted that Wallace would run for President in 1968, but said he feared the governor would attract votes that "would guarantee the re-election of Johnson and Humphrey."

WANTS LBJ OUT

"I want to see the administration of Johnson and Humphrey defeated," he added.

Ike Republicans Demand GOP Woo Dixie Negroes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans were urged Tuesday night by two organizations calling themselves progressives to grab the "torch of reform" and to go after the Negro vote in the South.

Republicans for Progress, a citizens organization built around the former Dwight D. Eisenhower administration officials, and Republican Advance, a Yale University group, joined in demanding national committee action to erase any segregation practices in Southern GOP party organizations.

URGE NEGRO DRIVE
They proposed revival of the committee's lapsed minorities division, a massive drive to register Negroes as Republicans, election of Negro candidates for office, and campaigns to enlist volunteers on Negro college campuses.

The two groups argued that the GOP should base its appeal in the South to whites who are moderate on the racial issue, and to Negroes seeking not only equality but action to improve their economic lot.

"The Republican party, as the 'out' party throughout the South, can establish itself as the bearer of the torch of reform. It can demand better education, better health facilities, and fairer enforcement of the law," they said.

CITES ARKANSAS
"The Republican party in Arkansas, a notoriously one-party state, has adopted this approach of emphasizing the need for reform on the state level. The Arkansas Republican party has attracted to its banner a number of young

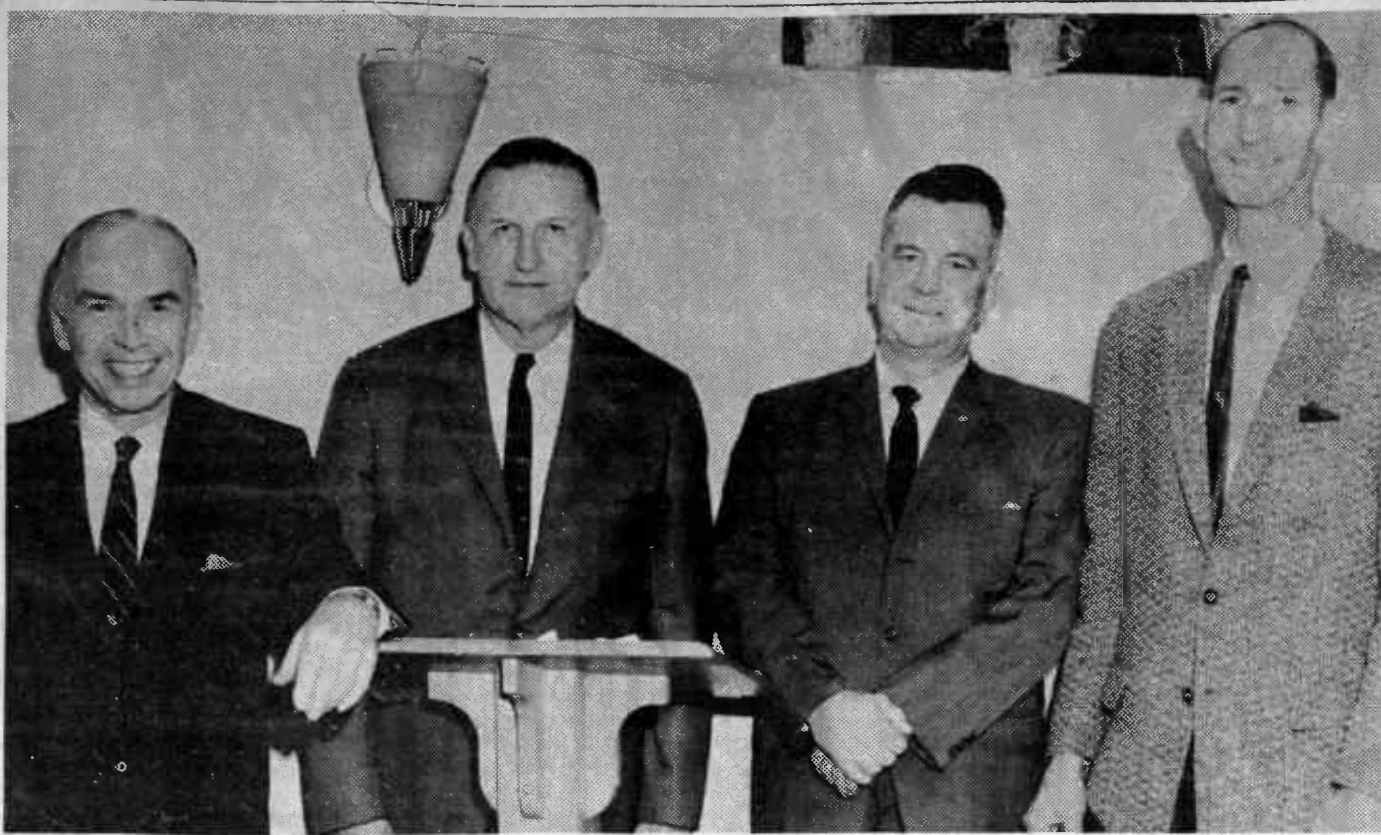

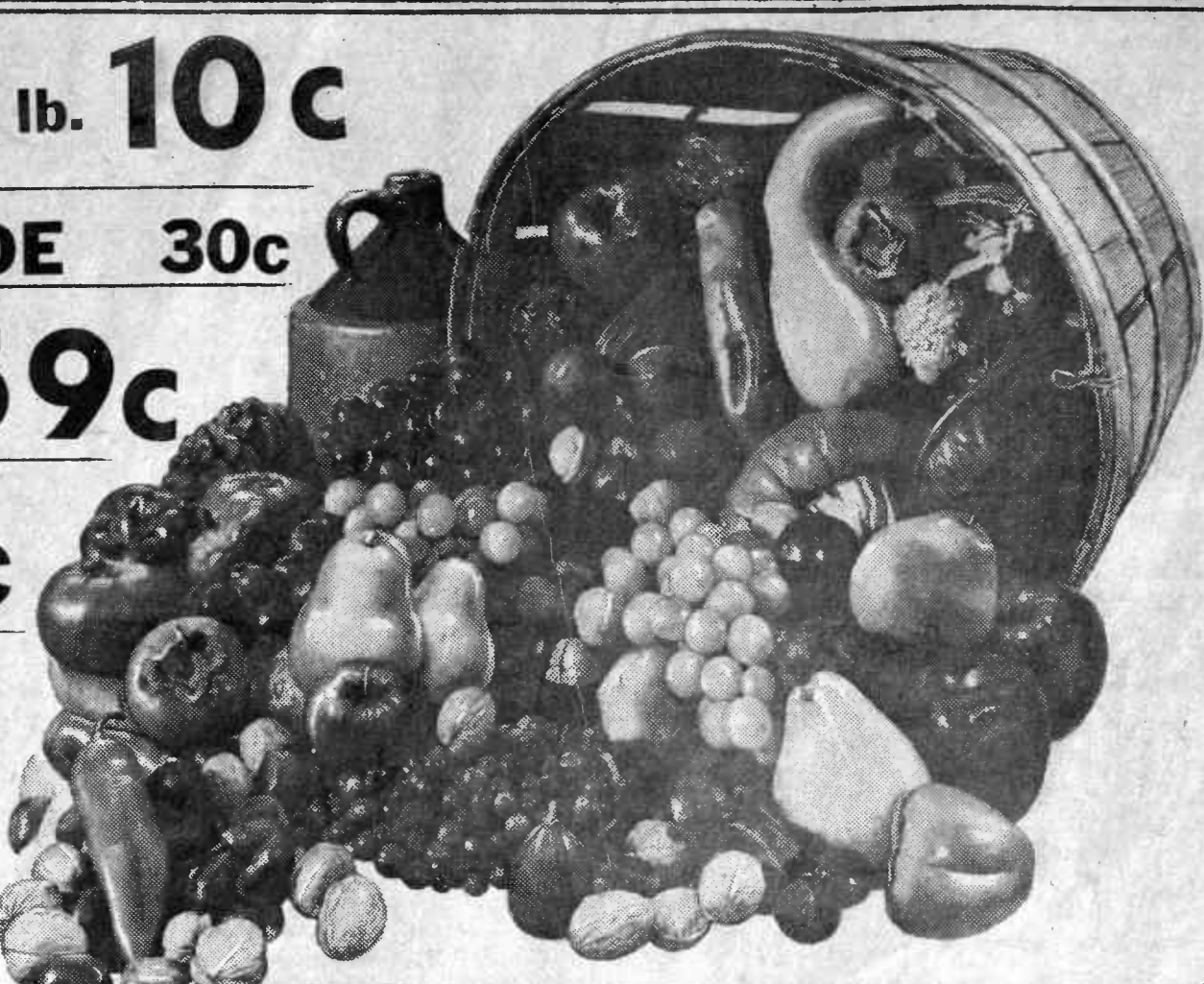

Floating Dock Installed At Goat Island In Yellow Creek

With the opening of early spring and a new camping and fishing season next year, sportsmen will have a new 'playground' in Tishomingo County with the opening of a fishing and camp site at Goat Island. A prefabricated floating steel and styrofoam dock has been constructed at the Goat Island

site. The fishing pier, in conjunction with the camping site, is the beginning of a project to test an idea presented by the TVA Fish and Wildlife Branch and the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority. It is believed that with platforms or piers extending out from the bank into deeper wa-

ter, bank fishing will increase and flourish with more opportunities and success.

The dock has been installed in the Goat Island section of Yellow Creek embayment on Pickwick Reservoir, in northeast Mississippi about 10 miles south of Pickwick Dam and north of Iuka, according to W. C. Hamilton, Executive director of YCWA.

As part of TVA's Tributary Area Development program, the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority will operate and maintain the dock through the next fishing season.

The T-shaped dock is 108 ft. long with a 40 foot section at the end of the "T." A connecting ramp extends the platform 108 feet out from the bank. A railing extends around the entire dock. Cost of the floating dock is \$7,000.

The dock eventually will be lighted for night fishing. Brush and other fish-attracting materials will be placed underneath. Permits will be required of all fishermen, and catch records will be maintained to check the dock's usefulness. This facility is for use by bank fishermen, and fishermen in boats will not be permitted to tie up to the dock.

With this dock as an example, YCWA hopes to interest state and county parks and other recreational interests in installing similar facilities

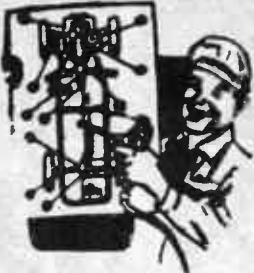

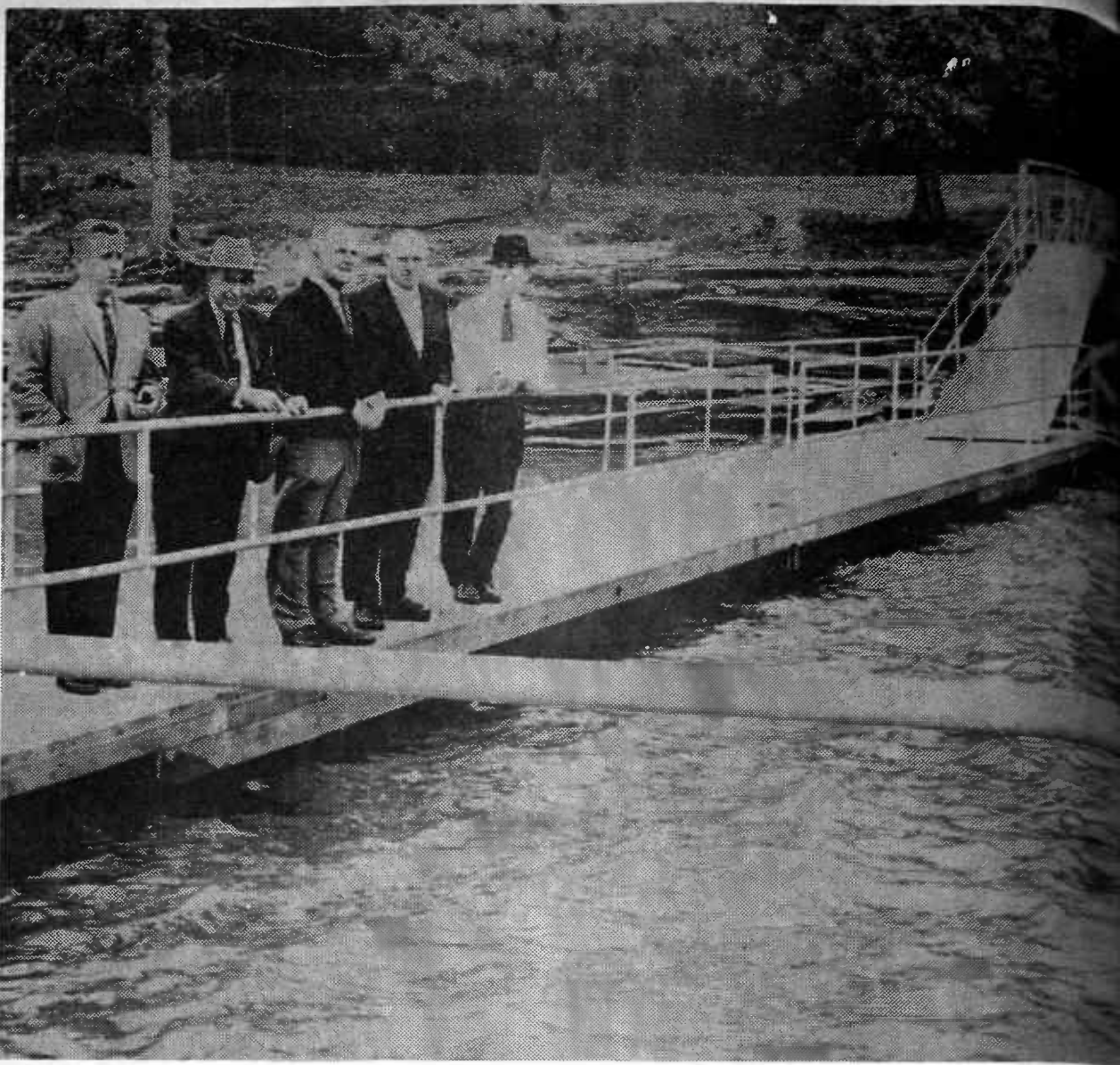
1967 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

The Chiefs came back like a cat out of a cage to push across their tally in just 12 plays, again aided by a 15 yard penalty.

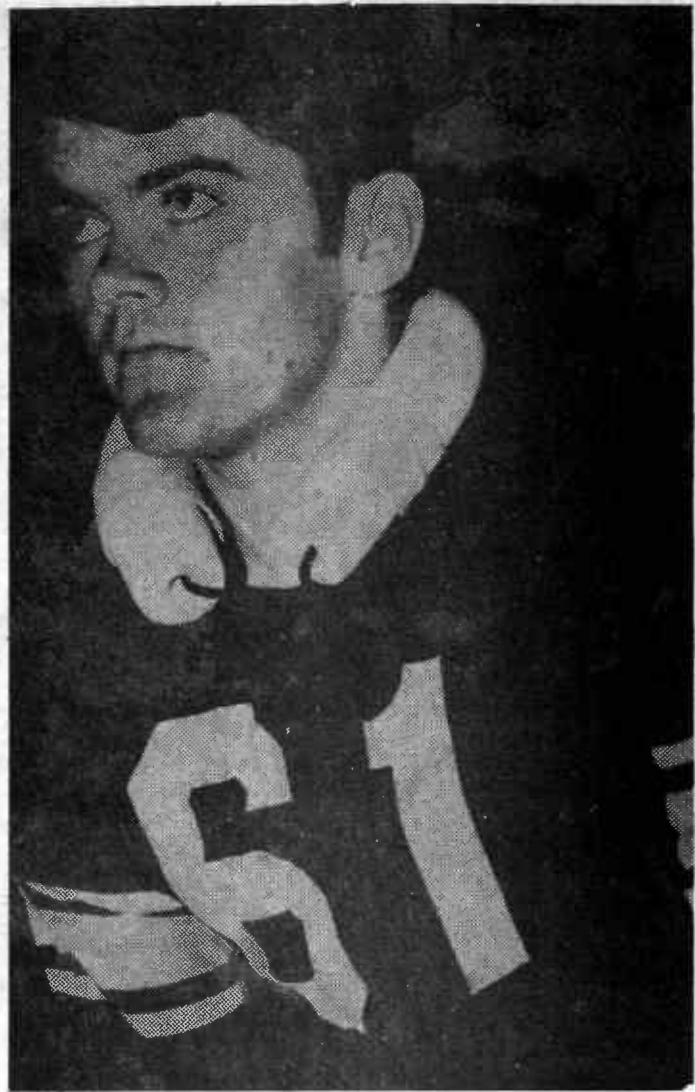

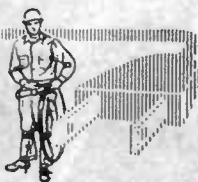

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 36

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION TO AMEND SECTION 271 OF THE MISSISSIPPI CONSTITUTION OF 1890 SO AS TO PROVIDE THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY PROVIDE FOR THE CONSOLIDATION OF EXISTING COUNTIES OF THE STATE.

WHEREAS, the industrial development of the State of Mississippi has progressed at a phenomenal rate and modern highways and improved industrial facilities have made possible, practicable and desirable the enlargement of governmental subdivisions and, in the light of such developments, economical conditions of the State would be facilitated by the consolidation of certain counties within the State: NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MISSISSIPPI, TWO-THIRDS (2/3) OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, viz:

Amend Section 271 of the Constitution of Mississippi so as to read as follows:

"Section 271. The Legislature may provide by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of the House of Representatives and of the Senate for the consolidation of existing counties of the State, provided, however, that such counties combined must be adjoining."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Secretary of State is hereby directed to give public notice of said election for at least thirty (30) days preceding same.

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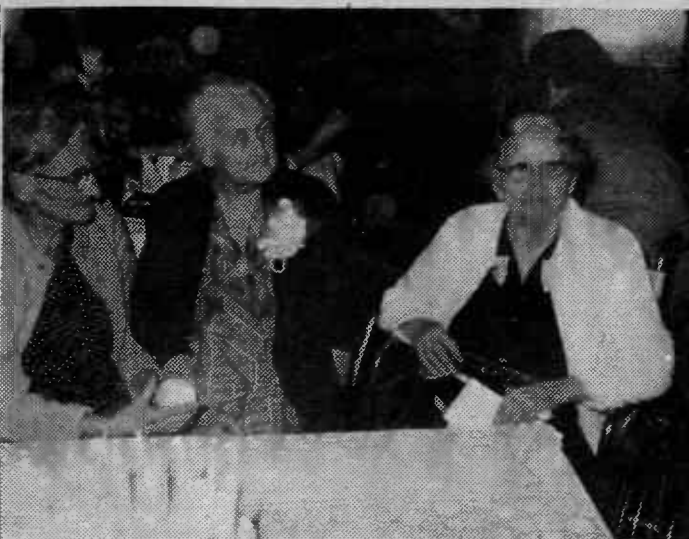

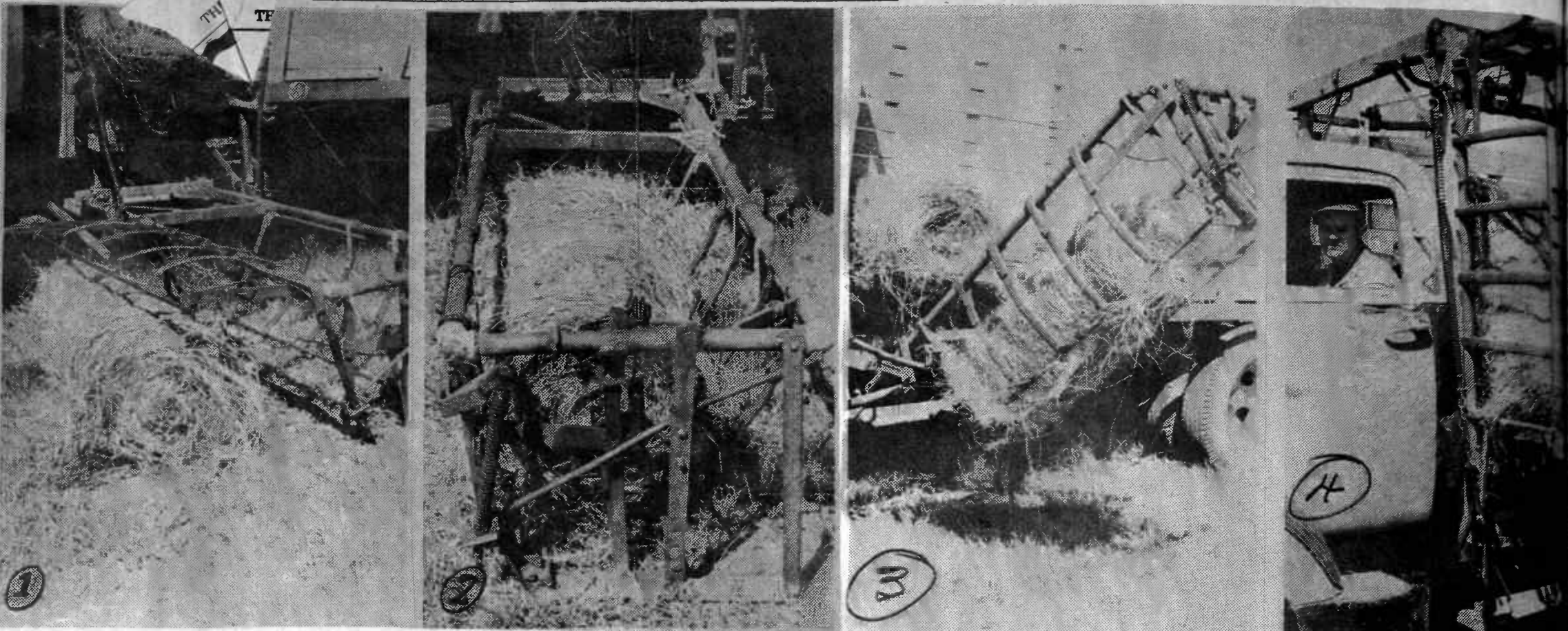

HAY LOADER DESIGNED AND BUILT BY TISHOMINGO COUNTY FARM

HAY LOADER DESIGNED AND BUILT BY TISHOMINGO COUNTY MAN—Orville McNutt who lives in the Midway community in Tishomingo county has designed and built a hay loading machine that replaces two men and in addition loads hay faster than four men can throw the bales on a truck. Built mostly of scrap parts, the loader is mounted

on the side of a 2½-ton truck and is so designed that one man operates the entire machine from the cab of the truck. Only one needed is the truck driver who also operates the hay loader, and two men on the bed of the truck to stack the bales as they are put aboard. Power for the loader is furnished by the power take-off on the truck

which, by belts, operates a rear auto axle. Two steel cables are attached to the ends of the axle in such a manner so that when the cable unwinds on one end it is winding up on the other. The cables open and close the "gate" of the loader and also raise and lower the loader from the truck bed to the ground. Fall of the loader to the

ground is cushioned by the use of shock absorbers. Hinged to the side of the truck, the loader, when in the "up" position, is partially concealed and does not tick out far enough to create a traffic hazard and therefore may be

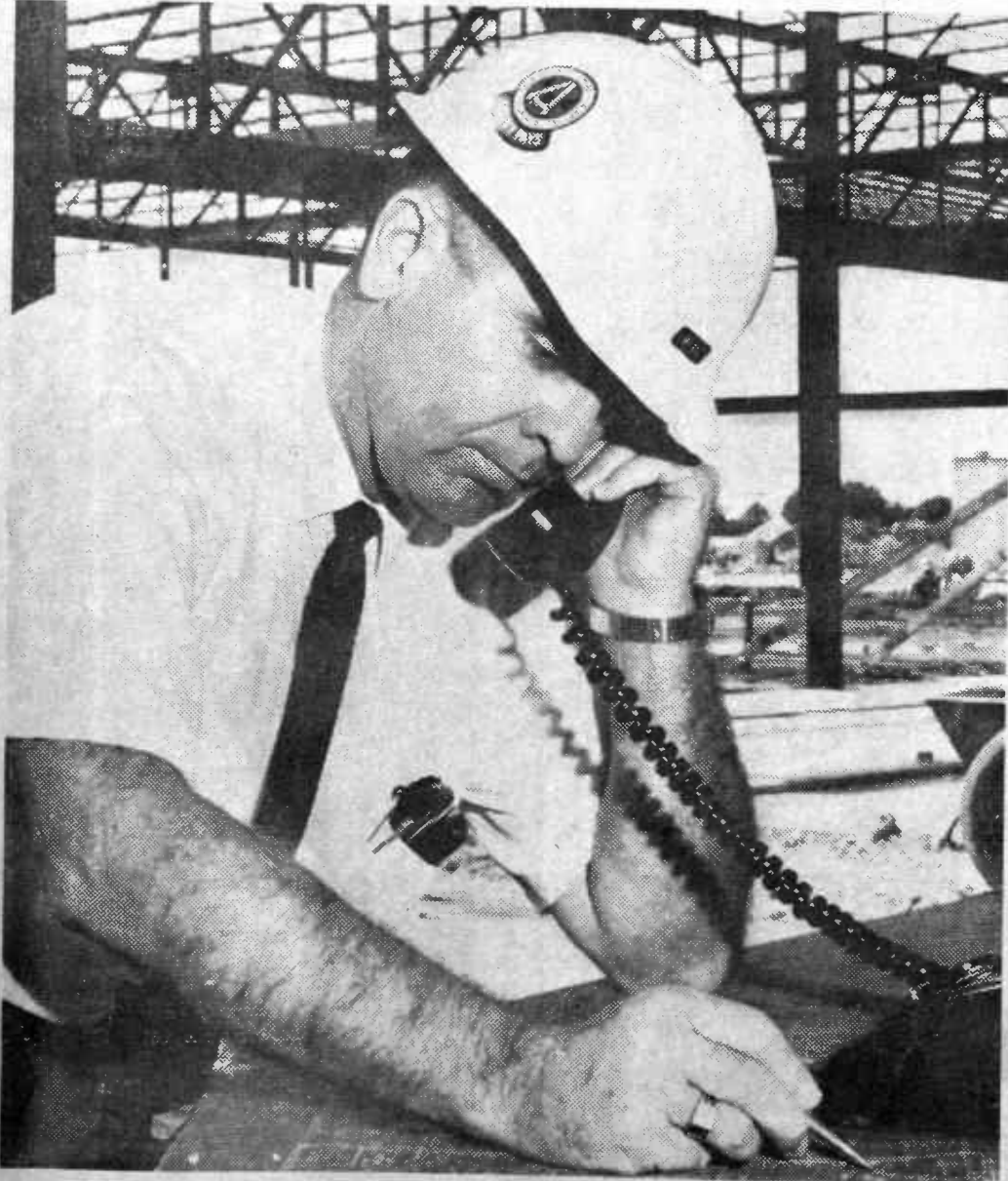
kept on the truck for regular farm hauling on or off the highways. Picture 1 shows the loader as it approaches a bale of hay with the gate open or "up." Picture 2 shows the bale inside the loader with gate down, ready for the lift onto

the truck. Picture 3 shows the bale being raised to the truck bed and Picture 4 shows the bale as it falls over onto the truck. Also shown in Picture 4 is Orville McNutt as he operates the truck and the hayloader. The loader can put five

bales a minute on the truck. It is designed for use only, which, the farmer says, is what most farmers need these days.

Forest Products Week

October 16-22 has been designated as National Forest Products Week. It is a time to call attention to the one-half billion dollars that the forest industry contributes to Mississippi's economy each year.

October, Cooperative Month

October has been set aside as the month to give special recognition to cooperatives.

Cooperatives provide employment. They supply electric power. They contribute toward orderly marketing. They are a vi-

tal part of Mississippi's economy.

Renovating Old Sods

Many Mississippi pastures are sod bound. Old bermuda and bahia sods especially may need to be renovated to make them grow better next year and to get clover back in the pastures. Renovated using a spring tooth harrow, heavy disk or sod seed-

If plantings of ryegrass or cereal are made at the time of renovation, the cost of renovation will be paid back in extra grazing.

Cattle Lice

Cattle, heavily infested with lice, don't make too much money. You don't have to give your profits to the lice... they can be controlled.

A big step toward control will be made if the cattle go into cool weather relatively free from lice. Keeping back rubber or dusting sacks well charged with insecticide will help with this.

Your county agent can give you specific information on materials to use, when and how to use them for controlling cattle lice.

Soybean Harvesting

You only get paid for the soybeans you take to market. Why lose part of your crop by improper harvesting?

Proper settings of the combine are vital. Some of the best information on this can be found in the operator's manual. It does not take many beans

lost to cut your yields substantially. To lose a bushel per acre we only have to leave on the ground 36 to 40 beans per square yard.

If you cut the soybeans high enough to leave five or six pods per foot of row, you also lose a bushel per acre. Some farmers each year leave as much as 3 to five bushels in the fields. You can't afford this loss.
