Property Taxes

Real estate property taxes come due on the first day of January each year, and they become delinquent as of February first. Failure to pay taxes on real estate and personal property will result in a tax sale later in the year and, ultimately, the complete loss of the property if the sale is not redeemed.

If taxes are not paid on real estate and personal property during the specified time, additional charges are usually added for each month the taxes remain unpaid. If taxes remain unpaid at the time of the annual sale, which is always in September in this county, the property is sold at public auction. Real estate sold for taxes may be redeemed up to two years after date of the sale. After the passing of two years, sale of the property becomes final and therefore complete loss of the property by the person who failed to pay his taxes.

Right, now, this month, people all over Mississippi are faced with paying taxes on their automobiles and trucks. There are complaints, as there always has been, about the high taxes on autos, and it is true some residents are paying more than they ever have. But this is due to the increased valuation of the cars they own and not in the tax rate. An investigation of the millage assessment in each district shows that Tishomingo county residents will actually pay less taxes this year than they have in some past years. For instance, the millage assessment in the First District is 83 1/4 mills which is less than it was last year. Second and Third District millage rate is 75 1/4 mills each and Fourth and Fifth District millage rate is 82 1/4 mills.

Even though our tax rate is lower this year than it has been in some previous years, we are still paying more than we should on our real estate, personal property and autos. There are other ways of levying taxes that will allow more people to bear their fair share of the tax load. For instance, there is the sales tax. A large percent of our population does not own real property but they do earn money, use the highways, send their children to school, and get many, many other benefits from tax dollars. Not owning real estate property, they pay, through the sales tax, a portion of the money needed to operate the schools and government.

We believe the sales tax as we have it in Mississippi and in the towns here in Tishomingo county, is a fair and equitable tax. If a person spends money, he pays taxes; if he doesn't spend money, he doesn't pay taxes.

But there is still another way that Tishomingo county residents can make the tax load lighter on real estate and personal property. If all Tishomingo county residents would do more of their trading at home, they would not leave so many sales tax dollars in Tennessee and other out-of-state stores.

There are hundreds of Tishomingo countians who make big purchases in clothing, alcoholic beverages, building supplies, furniture, and numerous other items on which tax dollars remain in that county or other state in which the purchases are made. An unfortunate situation is the fact that some commodities demanded by local county residents are not available here in the county. Users of these items, therefore are required to go elsewhere to buy their needs and, when they buy these items, some of which carry extremely high tax rates, they leave those tax dollars in that Tennessee city in which they make their purchase.

Tishomingo Countians can change this situation and make the tax load lighter on real estate and autos. The more people who share in the burdensome expense of government, the lighter it is on each. Therefore, by passing laws that make more commodities available to purchase locally, more tax money will flow into the towns' and the county tax coffers and thereby make better roads and schools possible without additional millage assessments on real estate, autos and personal property.

Our Chambers Of Commerce

Community advancement and economic progress are only two of the many objectives constantly pursued by the various Chambers of Commerce in Tishomingo County. The communities of Iuka, Belmont and Tishomingo are and have been most fortunate in having energetic, dedicated leadership in these key organizations.

The philosophy of these volunteer service groups calls for the banding together of many men to build better communities and thereby a better county, accomplishing goals that cannot be attained by individuals working alone.

A chamber of commerce is usually the cohesion of businessmen having the mind of business and the goal of better business. However, better business carries with it the responsibility of creating a more productive, peaceful and prosperous environment for those even yet unborn.

We look to our Chambers of Commerce for leadership and direction in community projects. Good leadership is ineffective without good followers. Therefore, it behooves us to support our Chambers of Commerce in their undertakings. Support them with the faith that all efforts are directed toward constant improvement.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Are IQ tests valid?

A: A child's IQ, as determined from the Stanford-Binet or the Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children, is our best (most valid) measure of "abstract intelligence", namely, of the ability to manipulate symbols—words, diagrams, numbers and the like—in solving problems. The IQ is the most accurate indicator of academic promise.

The IQ does not measure social adaptability, nor does it assay personality and character traits (except by indirection), nor mechanical skill. It measures only intellectual ability—the rarest and most highly valued human trait because it is essential to modern civilization. For the vast number of children growing up in an average American culture, the IQ is valid and comparable.

Cooperation is a word that many people use only when they are seeking help or assistance. How often has someone contacted you with the words, "We'd like to have your cooperation?" Certainly, more often than you have been contacted by someone who heard you had a job that needed doing and was ready with assistance.

RETIRED MAN'S SWAN SONG
MAKES HIM A TOWN HERO

It wouldn't be nice if all the retired people around started filling up the town's parks with ducks.

However, if you are retired, and if you want to have some fun, here's an idea you might use:

In one of the more pleasant of the Southland towns (which is already having trouble enough without seeing its name publicized) things had gone along peacefully for years. Until a fellow named Walter J. Gregory, who had been a peaceful citizen for years, retired.

The town hasn't been the same since.

Mr. Gregory, with nothing much to do except sit in the town's major park, came to the conclusion that the small lake in the park ought to have a swan. He talked to City Hall about it, said he'd buy the swan and donate it to the park. City Hall wasn't exactly panting to become nursemaid to any swan. It gave Mr. Gregory the brush-off. He tried twice more. The same results.

"So I went ahead and bought my swan," he says. "And I marched down to the lake and put him in. I resolved that his name would be 'Pension'."

Then, every morning and every evening Mr. Gregory walked over to the lake to feed his pet. But in less than a week

he was being shouldered aside by other citizens who had discovered the beautiful bird and were also bringing food.

There was some commotion now around the lake. People were talking. Somebody at City Hall remembered a nut named Gregory who wanted to give it a swan.

A policeman came calling on Mr. Gregory. What did he think he was doing? Mr. Gregory allowed he was doing what he wanted to do. There were words. The policeman declared he'd give Mr. Gregory a ticket. Mr. Gregory wanted to know what for. Which was a good question. The policeman finally decided it was for "Defacing Public Property."

"The next morning I wrote City Hall that I was employing a lawyer, that I would demand a jury trial on the charge against me. And that somebody was going to look pretty silly when they tried to argue a beautiful swan was defacing a town lake."

Mr. Gregory then told his local newspaper, which printed his story in detail. Then came the television news crews. Then the next Sunday about a thousand citizens to see the swan that was going to put Mr. Gregory on trial.

So a second campaign is under way to build a small island in the lake to give the swans secluded quarters. City Hall thinks it will be able to build the island.

NO VICTORY GOAL

With more than 300,000 fighting men stationed in Viet Nam and with the conflict costing billions of dollars, the American people have a right to expect that the Johnson administration will pursue the struggle to a victorious conclusion.

Despite the existence of this right, the U. S. public has not received proper assurances from Mr. Johnson that this is what he intends to do. And some of the news concerning the patterns of warfare in Viet Nam contain disturbing evidence that victory over the communists is not the administration's goal despite the colossal American investment in men and national treasure.

To be specific, foreign correspondents report that the North Vietnamese recently have received large numbers of new, high-performance MIG-21 fighters from the Soviet Union, together with numbers of trained pilots and adequate supplies of jet fuel. The reported doubling of number of modern MIGs in communist hands is very alarming. American airmen in the skies over North Viet Nam already face formidable threats in the form of surface-to-air missiles (SAMs) and tremendous concentrations of conventional anti-aircraft guns. If the communists have access to many new interceptor aircraft, American casualties are likely to rise sharply in the months ahead. There already have been reports of markedly increased aerial contacts with the MIGs.

What is especially dismaying in connection with these reports is the news that U. S. Navy and Air Force commanders are denied permission to attack the airfields in North Viet Nam on which the MIGs are based. It seems that these jet fields remain in the category of privileged sanctuary for the communist enemy.

The United States cannot afford to grant such privileged sanctuaries to the enemy. As September came to an end, U. S. casualties soared to a new weekly high, with 970 men killed, wounded or missing. The death toll of American dead in the Viet Nam war reached 6,400 by Sept. 17. The Americans who have given their lives or suffered wounds have gone all out for their country. They have not stinted themselves in courage or sacrifice.

Consider the air war alone. Jet Pilots taking off from carriers or airfields ashore risk their lives every time they penetrate enemy air space. A missile or anti-aircraft shell can knock them from the skies, and this frequently happens. Such sacrifice, such heroism, is just

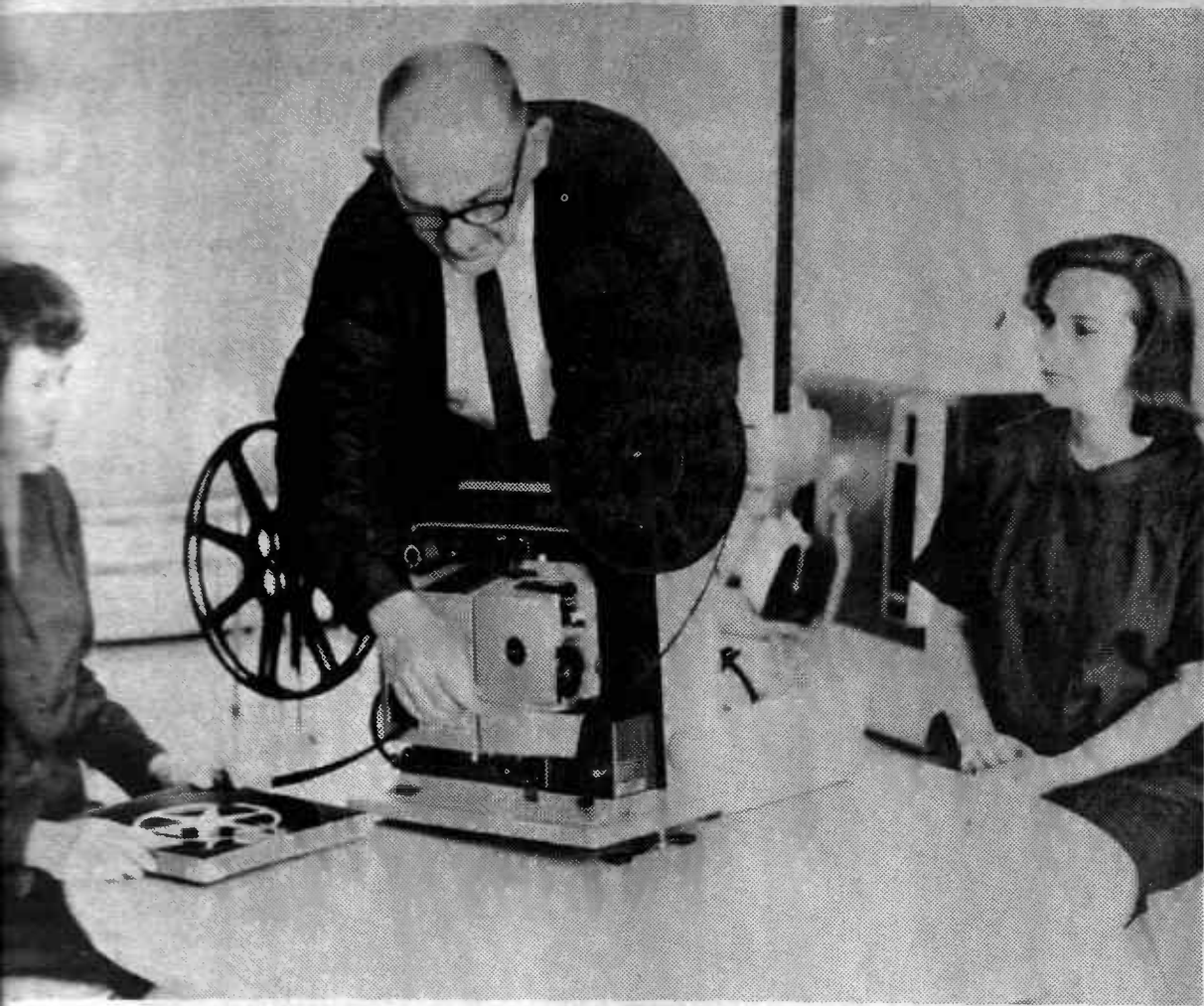

Deer, Turkey Must Be Tagged Upon Possession

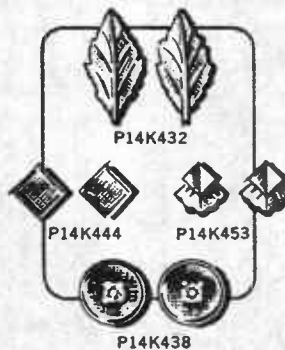
All deer and wild turkeys shall be tagged immediately upon reduction to possession and, in any event, before transporting or removing the carcass in any manner from the place where it was killed, by attaching thereto a tag obtained as prescribed by the Game and Fish Commission, but in all cases prior to consuming or dismembering the meat. Upon killing a deer or wild turkey, the information required by the Commission shall be entered on the tag before said tag is affixed to the carcass. Any one tag may be used only once.

Any part of the deer or wild turkey subdivided among a group of two (2) or more persons shall have affixed thereto the name, address, and tag number of the person killing the deer or wild turkey. This information shall be legibly written in pen or pencil on any piece of paper or cardboard or any material which is attached or secured to or enclosing the part or parts.

Each and every failure to have said tag or the prescribed information attached to the animal or part or parts thereof, as herein provided, and every act by which such animal or any part or parts thereof are removed or transported in any manner without the said tag or prescribed information being attached thereto shall constitute a separate violation of the law and shall be punishable as provided by law.

Any deer or wild turkeys or parts thereof found in the possession of any person which are not tagged or identified, as herein provided, shall be for-

WHISTLING DIXIE:
WALLACE IN 1968

JOHN J. SYNON

By 1967, the Southern tier of States will have developed a solid phalanx of Wallace-supporting governors: Mattox in Georgia; Barnett in Mississippi; Lurline Wallace in Alabama; McKeithen in Louisiana; and Johnson in Arkansas—Jim Johnson, that is, no kith, no kin, no nothing like the other one.

Given that linked-arm contingent, when the time comes for the Democratic primaries, 18 months from now, you may look for George Wallace to declare himself a contender for the Presidency.

Wallace will announce as a Democrat and, thereafter, will enter a number of selected primaries, probably those of Maryland, Wisconsin, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and, perhaps, California. Events, organization and money available will be the deciding factors, of course, but as of now, those States seem to be the likely ones, States outside the South that hold the most promise for the Little Judge from Alabama.

Moreover, once Wallace begins to stir, you may look for Bobby Kennedy to re-evaluate his recent disclaimer for, with Wallace pulling Conservative-Democratic primary votes, Lyndon Johnson will become vulnerable to an attack from both Right and Left, it is possible that LBJ, in 1968, would not win a majority in a single primary election; not one.

That is not to imply the block of delegates Wallace will carry into the Democratic convention will win him the nomination. It will not. George Wallace cannot win the Democratic nomination. But it does mean Wallace, by winning a number of Northern primaries, and undergirded by five powerful Southern States delegations, will have a spectacular platform from which to speak his piece and, subsequently, to walk out of the Democratic convention—into an independent campaign of his own.

And then the fun will really begin. If the Republicans prove wise enough to put up a candidate with sufficient appeal to carry nominally Republican areas—someone like California's Ronald Reagan, say—with Wallace running, the Democrats will be hard put to garner the 270 Electoral-College votes needed to win. It would be almost impossible.

See how it would go. Count, first, the Electoral-College votes Wallace, as an Independent, has a good chance of winning (pre-supposing next summer to be as hot as was this past summer): Alabama (10); Arkansas (6); Flor-

ida (14); Georgia (12); Louisiana (10); Mississippi (7); South Carolina (8). The electoral votes of those seven States total 67 votes. Now count those states Wallace has a nominal chance of winning (come another hot summer): Delaware (3); Illinois (26); Indiana (13); Maryland (10); and Wisconsin (12). Those five States hold 64 votes. Total, 131 Electoral-College votes.

North Carolina, Virginia, Tennessee, and Kentucky, totaling 45 votes, are not included in that roster because there is no reason, at this time, to believe George Wallace can carry any of them; none that I know of. It is probable they all will go Republican, given Reagan.

Even without those four, Wallace would do all right. As noted, it takes 270 votes to win in the Electoral College, a majority of 538 votes. And if the temper of the times is such that it allows George Wallace to gather 131 Electoral-College votes, it is likely the Republicans, with a bit of wisdom, will get the 140 additional votes needed to deny a Democratic majority.

That being the case, if the Democrats and the Republicans, both, fail of a majority, the election would go into the House of Representatives, as has happened three times in our history. There, each State would have one vote and the South would hold the balance of power. For, neither party, in such an atmosphere and without the South, would control the 26 congressional delegations needed to elect.

Then what? There isn't any answer. The House can elect as President any one of the top three contenders but none other (12th Amendment). Which one would get the nod depends upon too many imponderables to make an informed guess. One thing is certain. The South's votes would come high; there would be a stop to all of the screwball Johnsonisms we have known. And that would be the least of it. Once the dicker got under way, it is entirely possible a realignment of parties—the realignment we have needed for more than 30 years—would emerge. Old labels—Democratic and Republican—would be buried and new ones—Conservative and Liberal?—would emerge. And we could get this country back on the Constitutional track.

In any event, that is how the crystal ball reads at this time, still smoky from the long, hot summer we have known.

Tigrett Urges Disabled To File Claims Early

"People in this area are reluctant to admit they are disabled," Social Security District Manager, Hugh Tigrett, announced today. "They keep telling themselves that they'll be back to work soon and there is no point in filing a claim for social security disability benefits, or they just keep putting off coming in to see us. Months later they finally admit that it may be some time before they'll be back to work so they come in to file their claims for benefits." "By then," he said, "It takes longer to process their claims and it is more difficult for doctors, hospitals, and other medical sources to furnish evidence than if the claims had been filed soon after the disability began."

Mr. Tigrett went on to explain the three requirements that a person must meet to qualify

for social security disability benefits. Briefly, these requirements are: a person must be expected to be unable to work for 12 months or more, have worked 5 years under social security out of the last 10 years, and file a claim with the Social Security Administration.

The present Social Security Disability law is designed to encourage beneficiaries to return to work, according to Mr. Tigrett. There is a "trial work period" during which benefits continue and many people who qualify for benefits do recover and return to work. The law is no longer designed just for those who will be permanently disabled.

"To receive your benefits on time and to make the whole process easier for you, file your claim with Social Security as

soon as possible after you become disabled," Mr. Tigrett urged.

Chiefs Bring Home Seminole Wampum

Score Is 18-0 In Game At Smithville Friday Night

Iuka's football express, temporarily derailed for the past 2 weeks, got back on the winning track at Smithville last Friday night with an 18-0 victory over the Seminoles. The Chiefs kept the fans guessing till the last quarter, when they punched across three touchdowns to bring home the victory. For the Chiefs it was win number five against a pair of setbacks. For the Seminoles it meant defeat number

six, with a couple of victories to their credit. Fullback Merle Smith tallied two of the Chief scores from 3 and 8 yards away. Quarterback Fred Rutherford galloped over and through the Seminoles for 50 yards and the final tally. All three of the extra point attempts failed. The Chiefs, picked by the coaches to finish second in the conference in the pre-season

poll, found their biggest obstacle to be a sputtering offense rather than a stingy Seminole. The first three periods found the Chiefs without a score and the three last quarter counters sure looked good to the visitors. Merle Smith, the consistent fullback of the Chiefs, ate up the offensive yardage with three and four and six yard rushing attempts. Sidney Robinson gave the Seminoles some anxious moments at his defensive guard position, making tackle after tackle.

Iuka worked the off-tackle for good offensive yardage as the Smithville eleven threw an eight man line against the Chiefs. Iuka's air attack again failed to materialize in this one and it was left up to the ground troops. The Chiefs defense stood the test of fire as it has done throughout the season, holding the Seminoles without a tally and thus providing the margin of victory.

The victory put Iuka in fourth place in the conference, one notch above arch-rival Belmont. The Chiefs still must face Randolph, Saitillo, and Algoma in the home stretch and will have to handle all three to finish as high as second.

Iuka came away with only the normal bruises and bumps and

are all set physically to tackle Randolph at Chieftain Stadium this Friday night. The Ramblers hold the only blemish on an otherwise perfect record Hamilton club, defeating them 24-19 in the season opener. They started the season like a house afire with four straight victories, but have lost the last four starts in a row to mediocre opposition. Their latest defeat came at the hands of Hatley 39-12.



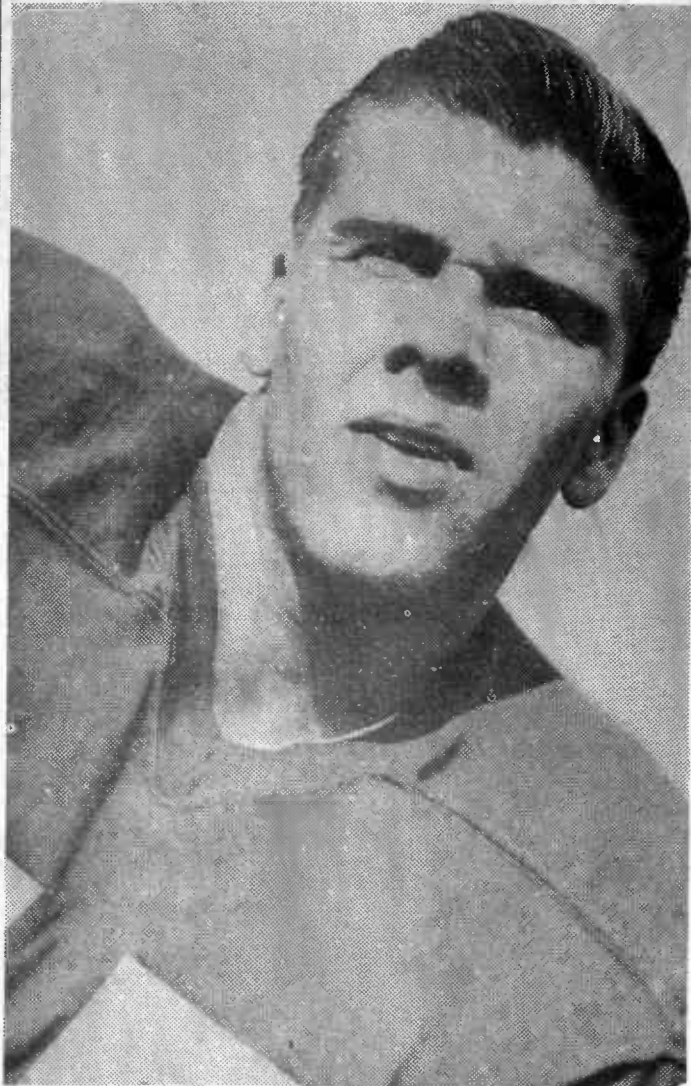

Manage Winter Pastures

At this time of year, management means a lot to all kinds of pastures, but especially to planted winter grazing.

One of the top items is to hold off grazing while the young plants are trying to become established. Regardless of whether you are grazing dairy cows or beef cattle, turn them in for an hour or two each day — just long enough to get a fill. Then

put them back on permanent pasture.

Winter grazing that was put in for steers or light calves should be left to grow until it is eight to ten inches tall. Normally this is in late November or early December.

It is too early to begin grazing fescue. Fescue should be grazed from around December 1 until you have to take off in the winter after growth stops. It can be grazed again in the spring.

Established clover grass should not be grazed until the plants get four to six inches tall. Clover established this fall should not be grazed unless it gets some extra growth. Let it get well established.

Right now is a good time to get heavy sod growth off permanent pastures where you want clovers to come back. If the sod is left much longer, the clover

will germinate and will be choked out.

Another way to get clover back is to renovate the area with a heavy disk or renovator. You do not injure the sod by renovating. You open the sod up so clovers can grow and the grass too will be better next year.

Tree Planting

Time is almost here for planting pecan trees, fruit trees and grape vines.

Right now is a good time to select a planting site. Place your order with a reliable nursery early so that you can be sure of getting the variety and size of trees that you want.

Planting in early winter from late November through December is generally better than later planting as the soil has more time to thoroughly settle around the roots.

Dairy Outlook

Recent increases in the class

price of milk both to dairymen and processors indicate a strengthening all along the line in the dairy industry.

The price increases were necessary to help offset price increases of items that are necessary in producing milk — labor, machinery, feed, buildings, interest, etc.

Dairymen who have adequate stored feed or enough winter grazing to properly feed their cows should be in better shape next spring than in several years.
