ver to the Gulf of Mexico. The 253-mile waterway project was originally authorized by Congress in 1946.

The completed waterway will substantially shorten the distance between the industrialized areas of he Ohio and Tennessee Valleys and the Gulf of Mexico. Lower freight charges will be brought about and the tourist trade will boom. New opportunities to low employment areas along the waterway route will be created.

The tentative approval given by the Corp of Engineers will be subject to a 30-day waiting period to allow persons opposed to the project to present their views to the engineers. After the 30 days the report will be prepared for Congress.

The action by the Corps of Engineers bring the project under the procedure set up by Representative Whitten in the Public Works Appropriations report, whereby this project would be kept tied to the Lake Erie, Ohio project and preliminary plans and specifications could proceed from funds in this bill this year.

The actual request for construction funds will likely be requested for 1967. However, at the termination of the 30-day waiting period, the engineers will be notified to use available funds to do such advance planning during 1967 as possible.

Cotton Ginnings Report For Area Counties

A report released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for cotton ginned before October 1, shows a substantial decrease in the 1966 cotton crop when compared to the 1965 crop.

Among the counties reported on are Tishomingo, Prentiss, Alcorn and Itawamba counties in Mississippi, Colbert and Franklin Counties in Alabama, and Hardin county, Tennessee. County ginnings prior to October 1, from the 1966 crop were (1965 crop in parenthesis): Tishomingo county 515 (4,188); Prentiss County, 708 (6,674); Alcorn county, 462 (4,769); Itawamba county, 522 (3,944); Colbert county, 955 (12,368); Franklin county, 119 (4,135), and Hardin county, 564 (2,576).

It is to be noted that these figures are for cotton ginned before October 1. Farm Extension workers report the crop will be short, however, it is also late which makes it possible that the crop will not be as short as is indicated in the figures shown here.

U. S. Senator, Congressman, Three Judgeships, School Board Member & Amendments On Ballot

Tishomingo countians, along with other Mississippians, will go to the polls Tuesday, November 8, to elect important governmental officials and to vote on two constitutional amendments.

Election of most important local interest is that of a county school board member for the Fifth Supervisors District. Seeking this job is Travis Cain and W. H. Yarber Mr. Cain is the present member and is asking to be re-elected.

Considerable interest is also centered on the race for U. S.

Senator and for Second District Congressman. Democratic Sen. James O. Eastland is running for a sixth term. He is opposed by Republican Prentiss Walker who is currently serving as Congressman from the Fourth Mississippi District. Mr. Walker is from Mize, Mississippi. Only other candidate for U. S. Senator is Clifton R. Whitley who is running on the Independent ticket and is a newcomer to state politics.

In the race for Mississippi Second District Congressman, Hon. Jamie L. Whitten of Charleston is seeking re-election. He is opposed by S. B. (Bushy) Wise of Jonestown. Mr. Wise, running on the Republican ticket, is currently serving as State Senator representing the 11th Mississippi district in the Legislature.

Other offices on which Tishomingo county voters will cast ballots are three judgeships. For First District Circuit Judge, N. S. (Soggy) Sweat, Jr., is seeking re-election. Judge Sweat is from Corinth. For First District Chancery Judge, Fred P. Wright of Amory is looking for his first full term in that office. Judge Wright was named to fill the unexpired term of Judge William H. Inzer who was elected in 1965 to the Miss. Supreme Court bench.

L. A. Smith, Jr., is asking to be re-elected Supreme Court Judge from the Northern, (3rd) District.

None of the judgeship races are contested.

Also appearing on ballots all over Mississippi are two resolutions to amend the State Constitution. House Concurrent Resolution No. 38 is intended to change the Constitution so that the State Auditor may seek re-election to succeed himself in that office after serving one or more terms. Presently, the State Auditor cannot succeed himself.

House Concurrent Resolution No. 36 is an amendment designed to change the State Constitution so that the Legislature may combine two or more counties and thereby create one large county.

Polls will open at 7 o'clock in the morning and shall remain open until 6 o'clock in the evening. No Poll tax will be necessary, however, all voters must be duly registered in their proper voting precinct.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Why are Southerners so vocal in their objections to classroom integration?

A: Southerners? It is my observation objections to classroom integration are in direct ratio to the quantity of integration, North or South. And for the very same reason: The objection is to socializing.

Generally, the school building, besides being a center of learning, is also the center of social activities such as P-TA meetings, concerts, lectures, and dances. White people, with rare exception, would rather confine their social activities at such affairs to members of their own race. Negroes, left to their own devices, hold the same preference. It is only when ideologues, agitators, create tension that a demand is heard for racial integration. When Negroes are misled into believing they are being "held down" or "held back" because of segregation they object. Who wouldn't? The truth, of course, is the opposite. Negro students do best when educated in racially segregated schools. So do White children.

There is some particular formula that will make your retirement one of the splendid experiences of your life.

You'll find it under your grey hairs. Nowhere else. Not in a book, and certainly not in what somebody else is doing.

Recognize — and set down firmly — what your aspirations in retirement are. Then apply a little common sense about people and things as they are. And you've got it.

This week came the retirement story of a man named Watterson. He said: "I've been working since I was old enough to pick up a hoe. I'm tired. I'm going to retire, and I ain't going to do another lick of work for nobody as long as I live."

Mr. Watterson, a plant mechanic, will have a good retirement. You can bet on it. He needs only to find a cracker-barrel to sit on.

About a dozen miles from Mr. Watterson's plant another man was retiring this week. A Mr. Bristol, a company vice-

president. He said: "Mrs. Bristol and I plan to make our home at the Country Club. We're looking forward to bridge and, of course, golf. And I intend to do some sailing."

Mr. Bristol has fallen for "Rich Man's Plan No. 14-B." Unless there's a miracle his retirement will fail. Not dramatically, but month by month as the social life palls and as the chic young things who hang around country clubs nudge him and his wife into the background.

But along with these two stories, there came a third. And in it you may find a clue to your future. The story is from a man who has had a long career in the Federal Government.

"I will be eligible for retirement in about one year, at the age of 62," he says. "My wife and I both will get a retirement income, which will be adequate for our needs. We have a few thousands in savings. We will sell our home, which is worth about \$15,000."

Then they will move to Seattle, Wash.

"Our son lives in Seattle, and on his property he has a small two-bedroom house. It has a garage and a workshop. It will fit our needs very well. We will pay a nominal rent for it. And meanwhile will be available to look after our son's home while he is away, as he will look after ours when we are away. This will leave our savings intact.

"My chief interest to pursue in retirement is rock-hounding. My wife's chief interest is rug-making. I will equip the shop in our rented house for lapidary work, with grinder saws, polisher, racks, and display cases. Then during the summer months my wife and I will make field trips through Washington, Oregon, and Canada collecting stones. And occasionally pruning some gold and fishing."

THE WEEK'S LETTER: "I am 14 years old and I have a problem. Last summer I went to a party at a friend's house. The girls were supposed to invite boys. I didn't invite anyone. One of my friends invited a real cute boy to this party and we fell for each other. We like each other a lot and we are going steady now. But the girl who invited him to the party was my best friend. She wasn't going steady with him. She just liked him. Now she hates me and she has most of the girls at school after me. She says I stole her boyfriend. She is trying every way she can to break us up. She writes him letters and calls him on the telephone. What really presents a problem is that we have the same locker and classes at school. How can I get her to leave us alone? And, how can I get her to stop hating me and call off her dogs? After all she wasn't married to him."

OUR REPLY: If this boy "fell" for you at first sight and ignored the girl who asked him to that first party, your problem really started at that moment. Perhaps he apologized to the girl, if this was the case. Otherwise, she is the foolish one to continue to "pursue" him.

Planning To Retire? Apply For Benefits

"If you plan to retire at the end of the year, now is the time to apply for your Social Security Benefits," Tupelo Social Security District Manager, Hugh D. Tigrett announced today.

Getting retirement income started on time is one of the most important tasks to be accomplished when you are ready to retire. Social Security is a major part of retirement income for most people, and filing an application for benefits is something that must be done.

You can apply for Social Security benefits three months before you retire, and the Social Security Administration advises that you do. "Filing for Social Security ahead of time is particularly important for those who plan to retire at the end of the year," Mr. Tigrett explained, "because the first part of the

year is a busy time for us and for you. Your claim can be processed more rapidly now, and you'll have that much less to do at the end of the year, when you actually stop work."

Mr. Tigrett also emphasized that if a person wants the protection of the doctor bill insurance under Medicare and wants this protection to start with the month he will be 65, he must complete his application during one of the three months before his 65th birthday. Otherwise, he will have to wait from one to three months after he enrolls for his doctor bill insurance for it to become effective.

"If you apply now you'll know the exact amount of your check and the date it should be received."

THE 89TH CONGRESS

The end of the 89th Congress will begin a time of appraisal for the work of the legislative branch in the last two years. Whether its work was constructive or destructive will be fiercely debated, especially in the days remaining before the congressional elections.

Already various groups are giving it marks of one sort or another. "The New Republic," a liberal journal published in the nation's capital, says that Congress deserves a B plus mark for its efforts. A spokesman for "The New York Times," however — another liberal voice — gives it an even higher grade, saying that the Congress has initiated more liberal legislation than any since the first Roosevelt Congress. The weight of evidence seems to be on the side of The New York Times, namely that the 89th Congress has been a truly radical Congress.

For constitutionalists, the record of the 89th Congress is truly distressing. During the Kennedy years, the United States moved down the left side of the road at a brisk pace. But there has been a tremendous acceleration in a leftward direction during the period of the Johnson administration.

Indeed the 89th Congress should be called the Johnson Congress. It has been a rubber stamp for the legislation that Mr. Johnson has sought. Only in the case of repeal of section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act, which permits state right to work laws, did the Congress rebel against presidential dictation. On almost everything else, the 89th Congress went along in an ultra-liberal direction. Medicare was enacted. So was the drastic Civil Rights Act of 1964, and other measures which undermine the rights of the states and the self-reliance of the American people.

The Civil Rights Act of 1964 was the most radical legislation enacted by the Congress. It has done more to weaken the fabric of American constitutional government than any piece of legislation in years. What the Act does is give federal officials unprecedented power to pressure and to harass public school officials, school trustees, and hospital administrators. The freedom of doctors and hospital administrators to make orderly, efficient arrangement for patients has been threatened by federal inspectors who put political requirements ahead of the needs of the sick.

Nowhere is the impact of the Civil Rights Act felt strongly than in public education. In recent months, school boards have been reporting the ugly pressures exerted against them by the office of the U. S. Commis-

sioner of Education, Howard. They have given to them one phone so that no federal ruthlessness left to prove under the Johnson administration.

It is very clear that of this enactment the Congress is developing a ministry of education as exists in totalitarian countries. Local control of education of young people is a thing of the past. Ramblers Got Rambled By Chieftains Friday

Chieftains Out To Bag A Tiger At Saltillo, There; Top Flight Game

Iuka's Chieftains rambled over Randolph's Ramblers at Chieftain Stadium last week by a sweet tune of 32-7. It was victory number six for the Chiefs against

two losses. It was also the second victory in a row. Iuka put together first and second quarter touchdowns to build a 13-0 halftime lead and

then coasted in the second half. Randolph's lone score came late in the fourth quarter on a twenty year pass play. The Chief's grabbed the lead with only 5:59 left in the opening stanza when guard Sidney Robinson picked off a Rambler pass and returned 35 yards for paydirt. The point after attempt failed.

Iuka gained their second touchdown of the evening in the same manner when tackle Earl Solomon grabbed a wayward air bomb and scooted 20 yards into the Randolph endzone. Quarterback Fred Rutherford passed to halfback Ronnie Brown for the extra point and the Chiefs carried a 13-0 lead into the dressing room at the midway point.

Halfback Steve Wilson gave a dazzling second half show of speed as the shifty back scored three times, only to have two

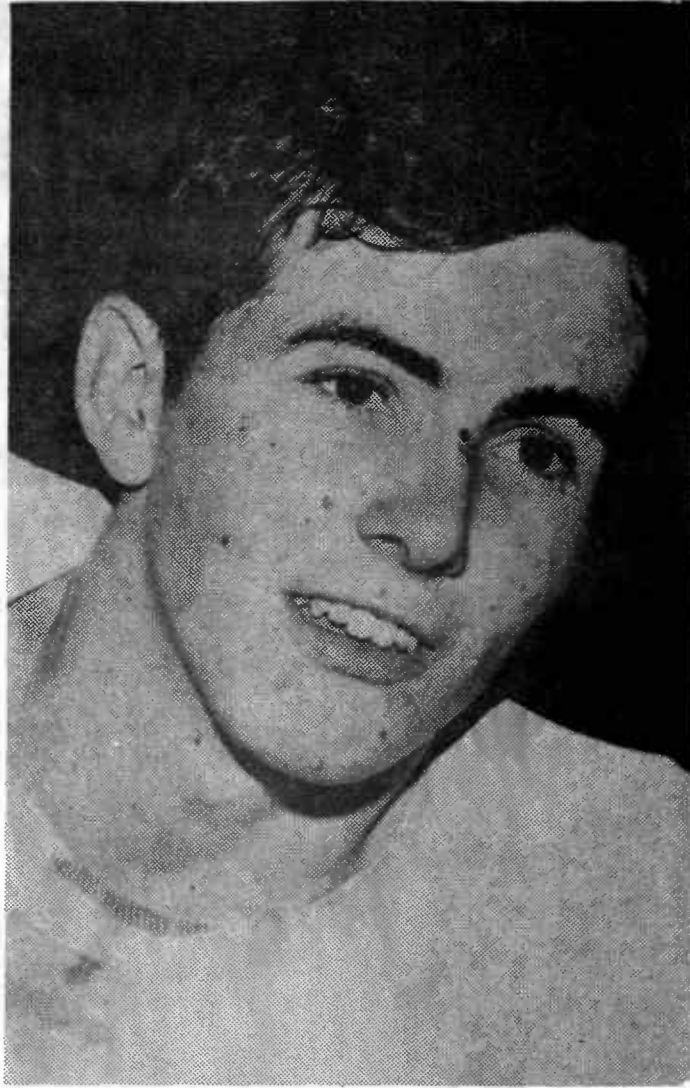
called back because of infraction of the rules. On the second play from scrimmage in the half, Wilson scattered 58 yards for a tally but a holding penalty nullified the play. Later in the same quarter Wilson again scooted 30 yards for pay dirt but a clipping infraction brought it back. Wilson finally was allowed to count one in the fourth quarter when he drove in from the ten on a third down situation. Tony Kent's conversion attempt failed.

Ronnie Brown scored for the Chiefs in the third quarter on a 5 yard burst through the Rambler secondary. Iuka's final tally came on a ten yard run by fullback Merle Smith with time running out. End Barney Hudson converted.

Randolph's score came with 4:56 left in the contest and came on a 20 yard pass from quarterback Mark Waldrop to end Ronnie Miller. A Waldrop pass to halfback Jerry Ritchie provided the point after.

The Rambler offered little resistance for the Chief. Randolph gave evidence of what could have been a potent passing attack, but it failed to materialize. Iuka's defense was again their strong point with the two touchdown interceptions breaking the camel's back. Wilson's running was probably the highlight of the contest, but guard Sidney Robinson gave evidence of a hidden talent in returning several punts and kickoffs for some good yardage.

The Tigers are currently tied with Ecu for first place in the conference and must win both of it's remaining games against Iuka and Belmont if it hopes to get a share of first place.

The Chiefs will be seeking to upset the appcart and give all the fruit to Ecu against the Tigers. Saltillo has a 7-1 conference record and hasn't lost since early in the season when Hamilton turned the tables 24-0. Included among the Tigers victims is Ecu in an opening night affair 21-13.

The Chiefs have a two game winning streak in the works and will be going for victory number seven. They still have an outside chance at the crown, but it is a long shot at the best. Their main incentive will be stopping Saltillo from sharing the crown with Ecu, a club that took the

Chiefs 13-0. Elsewhere in the Highland this week, it will be Belmont at Randolph as the Cardinals seek to improve their 55-3 conference slate. Hatley will go to Algoma in an attempt to move into first division in the conference. Mooreville will be at Mantachie in a cross county fude. Smithville will travel to Ecu with an upset in mind and Hamilton has an open date from conference wars. This race has been the most exciting in the four year history of the Highland and it is conceivable that it could end in a four way tie at the top. Most observers feel, however, that Ecu cannot be stopped at this stage and Saltillo will have their hands full against Iuka and Belmont.

The Iuka-Saltillo contest will probably be played before a full house as the Tiger fans are anxious to see a Chief scapped for the first time. This one should prove to be another of the top-flight games that have marked the conference race thus far this season.

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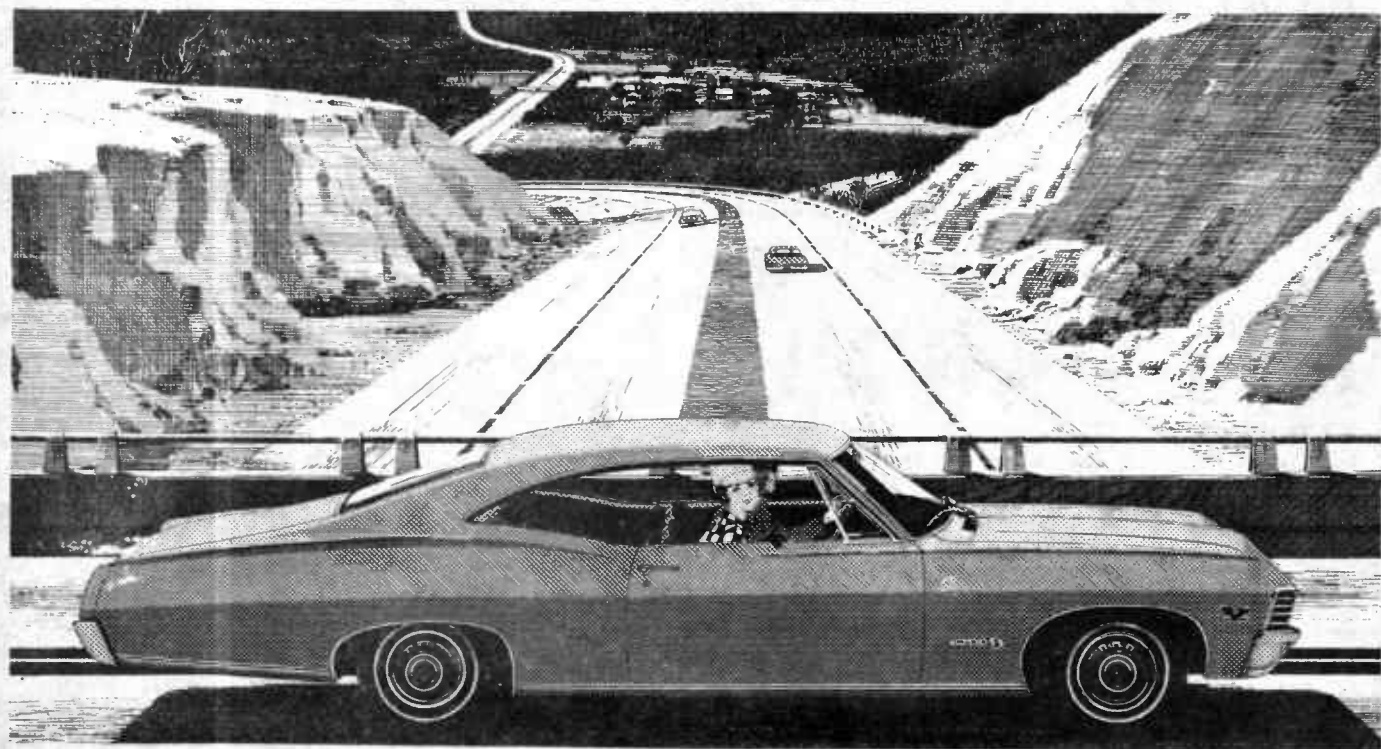

Violators are guilty of a **FELONY** punishable by a maximum fine of **\$1,000.00** and or imprisonment for up to one year. In addition any one selling illegal fireworks is held responsible for all injuries and property damage caused by the use of the illegal fireworks.

Parents are urged to check carefully all fireworks purchased by or for their children to insure their having only "I. C. C. CLASS C" Fireworks. Any possession or sale of illegal fireworks should be reported immediately to the Sheriff's Office.

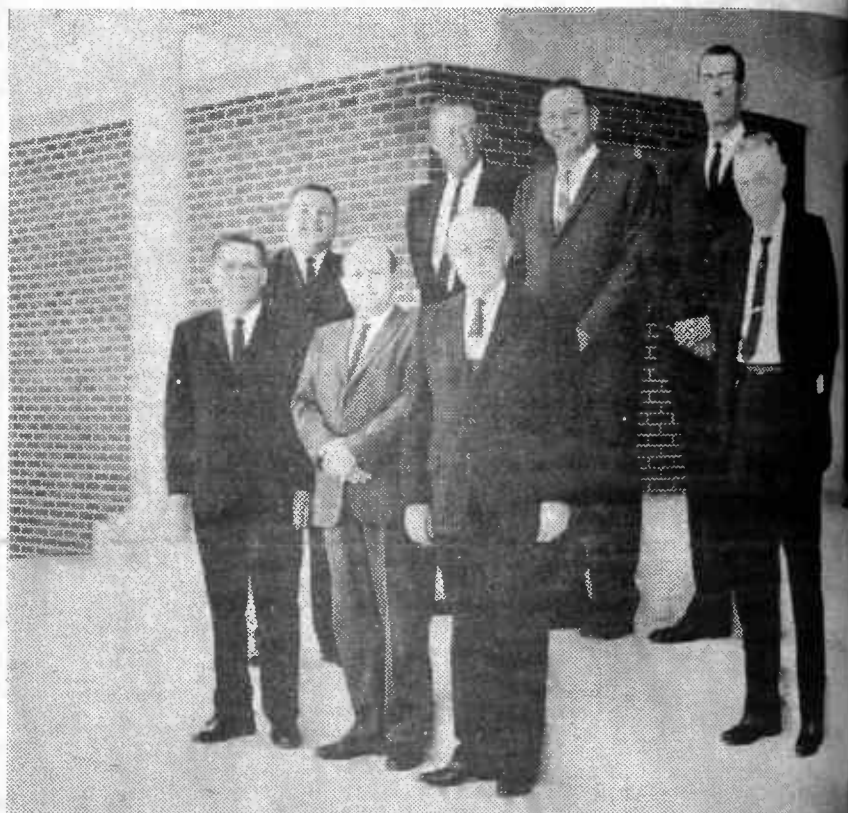

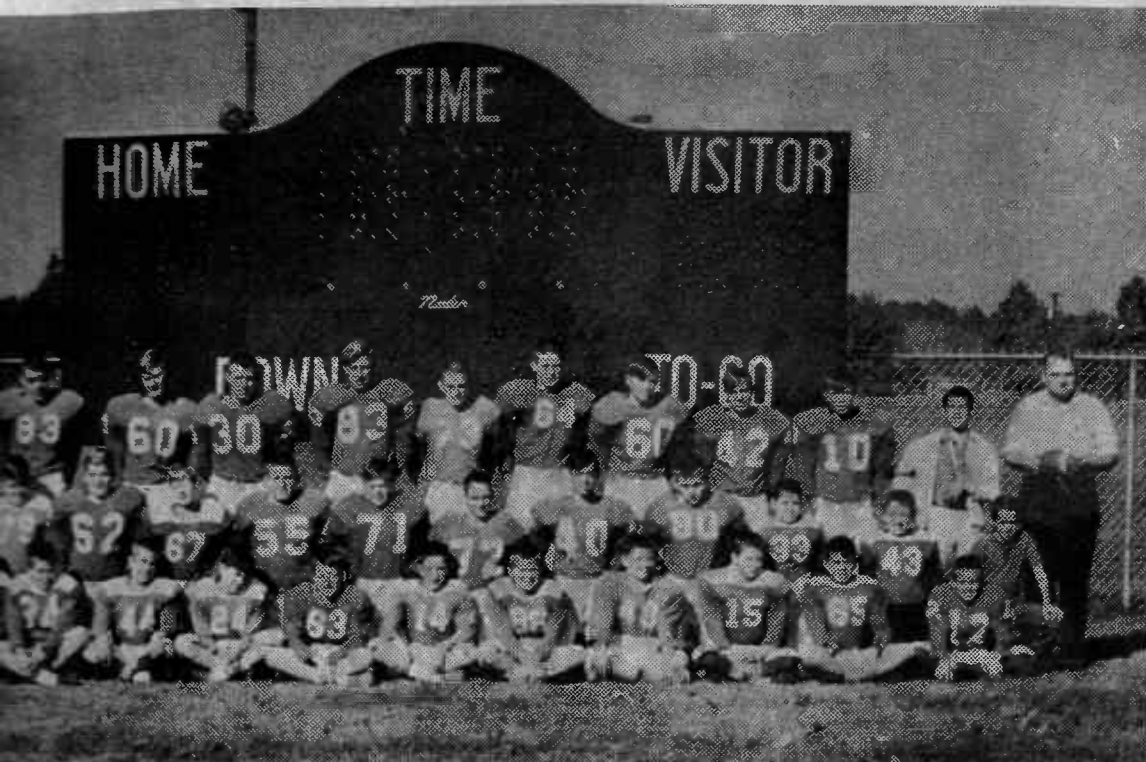

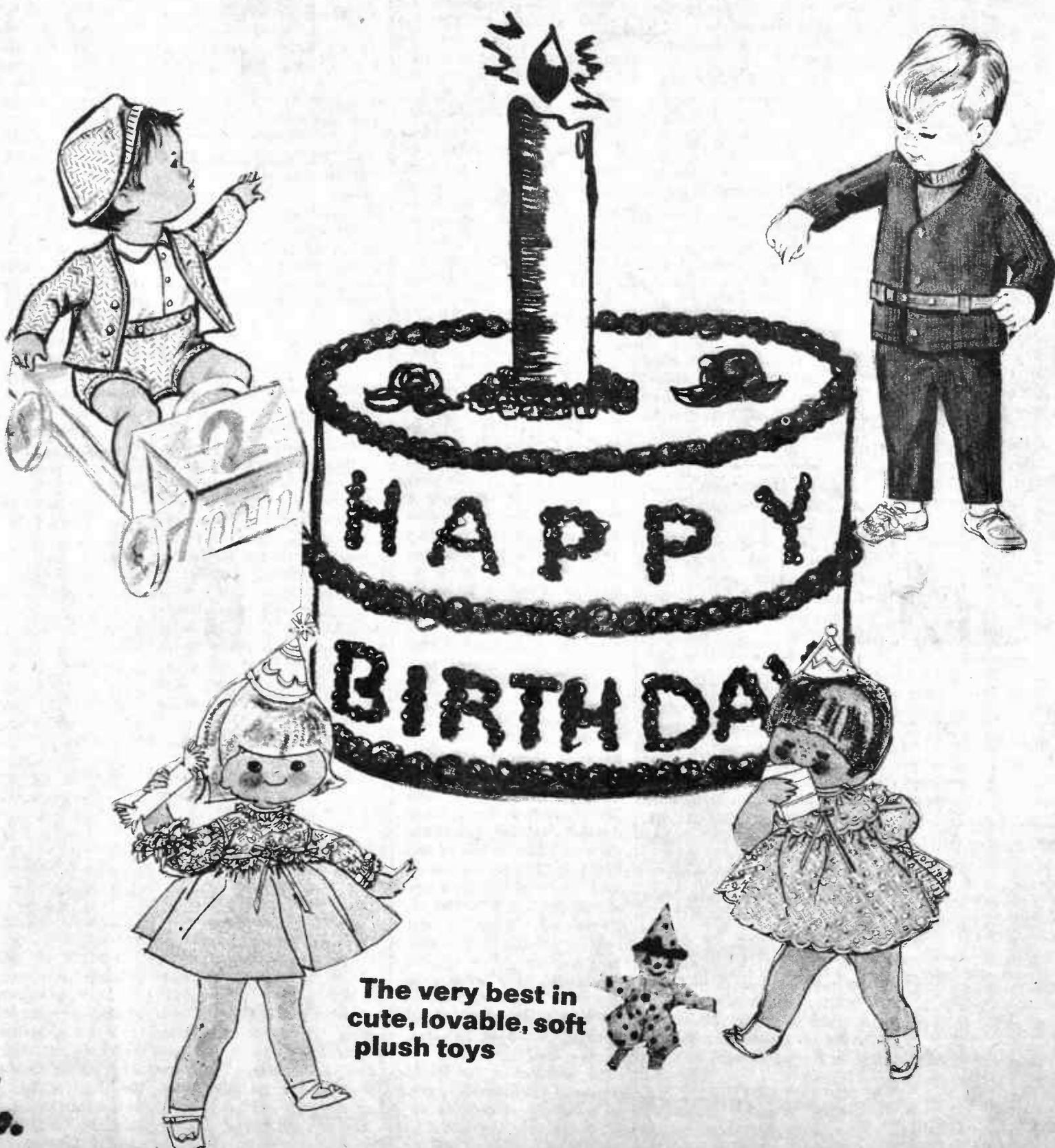

Some Light Shed On Controversial House Bill 60 Concerning Kerosene

State motor vehicle comptroller, Walter M. Hester, says that much of the confusion concerning controversial House Bill 60 has been cleared up.

Hester stated that a majority of the gasoline and oil distributors in the State have qualified to sell kerosene, tax exempt, for lamps, stoves, heaters, or other domestic purposes. Being qualified for this purpose, a distributor may sell tax exempt kerosene to mobile homes without the individual owner having to qualify. The distributor may exempt 9c per gallon at the time of the sale when sold for these purposes;

and may sell kerosene direct to anyone for use in lamps, stoves, heaters or for domestic purposes in any quantity.

Discussing the procedure by which a distributor may qualify to sell kerosene, the Comptroller said that all gasoline and oil distributors within the State of Mississippi have been mailed applications and instructions as to how diesel fuel and kerosene is to be handled. Moreover, in areas where distributors have failed to qualify, additional applications have been mailed.

Hester further stated that gasoline and oil distributors presently qualified to do business in this State are already bonded, and that, in most cases, this bond will be sufficient to cover diesel fuel and kerosene sales. All trucks, tanks and bulk storage tanks used for tax exempt kerosene purposes by distributors should be lettered with each letter not being less than 4 inches in height — "Tax Exempt Kerosene."
