Auto Accident Claims Lives Of Two In Early Sunday Morning Tragedy

Judith Lane Gamble Leumann, age 23, and William Ronald Roberts, age 19, were victims of an automobile accident which occurred at approximately 1 a.m. Sunday morning, November 13.

The two cousins were apparently on their way to Cherokee from Iuka when their car veered out of control and crashed into a tree near the State Line Hill on Highway 72. Both were from Cherokee.

Mrs. Neumann was the wife of Robert Neumann, presently serving in the Army and stationed at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. She was killed instantly.

Young Roberts, who is believed to have been the driver of the car, was carried by Cutshall Ambulance Service of Iuka to the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis where he died Monday from injuries received in the accident.

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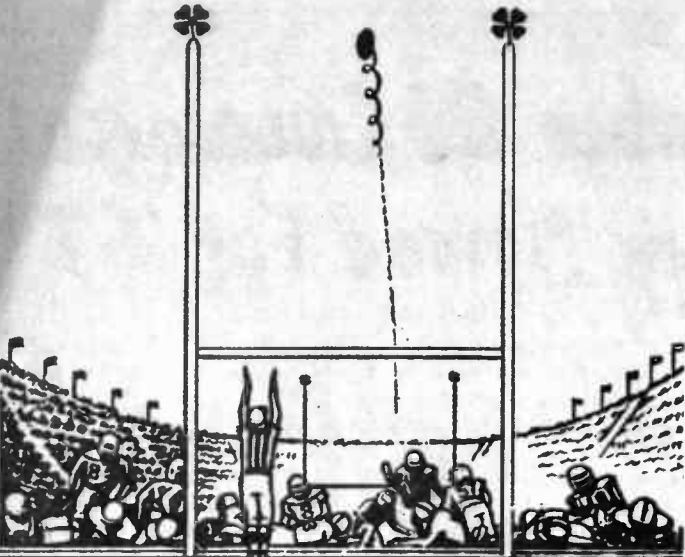

2 1/4 MILLION 4-H'ers SCORE WITH 8 MILLION PROJECTS



MORE than 2 1/4 million 4-H boys and girls are expected to complete 8 million individual projects this year, an average of about four projects per member.

The statistics, supplied by the Cooperative Extension Service, represent a lot of ingenuity and initiative. All 4-H projects, meetings and events must be worked in among school, church, home chores and part-time jobs.

There are a possible 100 different projects or activities available to youngsters between 9 and 19 years old from coast to coast, depending on where they live, their needs, resources and interests. Most center around specific projects in foods, home improvement, safety, health, livestock, clothing, home and farm management, leadership and community service. Certain standards and goals have to be reached.

To group overall accomplishments into one recognition program, the Extension Service developed the national 4-H Achievement program. In this program, one boy and girl from each state is selected annually for having the most outstanding 4-H record.

Fifty win trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago the first week of December. Twelve will receive national \$500 scholarships, and nearly 10,000 are expected to earn county achievement medals.

Sponsor of the achievement awards for the last 15 years is the Ford Motor Company Fund. During the 4-H Congress, Ford will host a luncheon and entertainment for the entire delegation of 2,300 delegates and guests.

Highlights of two 1965 winners' accomplishments are examples of what can be expected from the top 1966 records.

An 18-year-old Alabama girl excelled in more than a dozen projects including food preservation, sewing, cooking, home improvement, dairy animals, demonstrations and exhibits.

She is now a sophomore at the University of Alabama. Her future goal is a medical career.

A Colorado college student joined 4-H when he was 9. His first project was rabbits. By 1965 he had 15 steers in the feed lot, won top state honors in the field crops program and reserve champion beef showmanship award at the Intermountain Stock show.

Working with livestock influenced his desire to become a veterinarian.

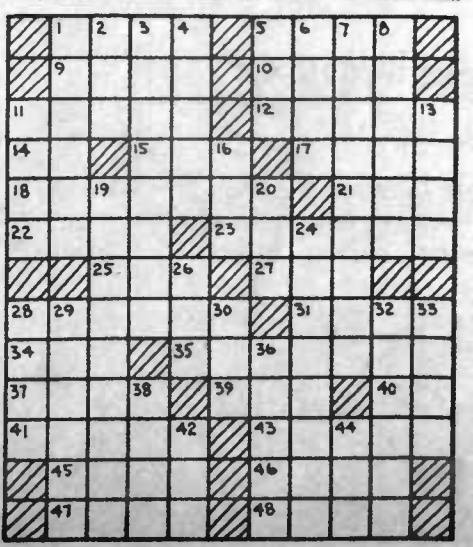

YOUR HEALTH IN RETIREMENT: SEE A MEDIC, THEN FORGET IT

You who are of retirement age are prone to worry about your health.

Usually in the afternoon, because in the morning you have to worry about money.

It's a good idea to worry about your health. You don't have as much of it after you pass age 60. And it's natural. But there's a medical man around, who won't let his name be used, but who thinks you should cut your worrying down. Say, to the 10th and 25th of every month.

According to this man, you should choose a permanent doctor around retirement age, if you don't have one. And you should do the following:

1. Have a "conversation session" with the doctor, telling him your medical history, what physical and mental exertions you had on the job and what exertions you plan for retirement, and what smoking, drinking, and eating habits you have.
2. Have the doctor give you a complete medical examination, in order to correct what ails you now but of equal importance to get into his files a full report on how your heart, liver, etc. are behaving so he can tell later on if they're acting up. (This is the great value of choosing one doctor and sticking with him — he will have a file on you.)
3. Ask the doctor whether he'll drag his feet when and if it comes to certifying you for Medicare.
4. Ask him how often you should come in for periodic checkups. Then determine to do what he says.
5. Tell him — the full truth now — just how much you have been spending per month for what kind of vitamin pills, and for bottles of Uncle Jack's Liver Tonic, and for Super-Miracle Youth Yoghurt. After age 50 or so many people start using all sorts of patent medicines as a crutch... and simply don't need them.
6. Choose a drugstore, and stick with it. So it'll deliver your medicine when it's raining.
7. Stop thinking sick, which many retired people do out of frustration with idleness or in a bid to get attention. Enough of this and somebody will have you lying on a psychiatrist's couch.
8. Now get the whole thing

off your mind. Most retired people never have a disastrous illness that kills them before their time.

From Kate B. McNulty, Pasadena, California: I remember, seventy-five years ago, going with my father to the little town of Washington, eight miles from our frame house on the Kansas prairie.

In the morning the faithful horses were hitched to the wagon, which had been loaded with corn we were taking to market. We also had two half gallon crocks of butter and a basket of eggs.

I climbed up beside my father on the spring seat and we were off. So many sights were exciting — beautiful wild flowers on the prairie, ground squirrels, rabbits, a bull snake crawling beside the road. There were cherry greetings from farmers along the way. They would have liked father to stop and talk, but the precious butter had to be delivered and we had no refrigerated car.

We reached town, delivered our produce, unloaded the corn, and sat in the shade of the grain elevator to eat the lunch mother had given us — dried beef sandwiches on thick slices of homemade bread, green onions, early radishes and ginger cookies.

THE WEEK'S LETTER: Do you think a fourteen year old could go riding with a boy? Sit at the movies with him? If you love a boy and your mother doesn't want you to go with him, what do you do? We want to know what you think, not what our mothers think. If you love a boy, how do you tell him? Do you think a girl should date when she is fourteen, fifteen or sixteen? Should a girl who is fourteen go with a boy who is eighteen? If a boy doesn't like you, how can you tell he doesn't like you? Why does a boy let a girl think he likes her when he doesn't? Why is it a boy will kiss a girl when he doesn't like her?

OUR REPLY: A girl of fourteen is not old enough to date freely and to go riding in cars

and to movies with boys. Your mother is adult, experienced, and knows that a girl of fourteen is apt to get into trouble if she is permitted to date — particularly to date older boys. You shouldn't tell a boy you love him — not if you are but fourteen years old. Say you like him. A girl of fourteen is only asking for trouble and heartache by going with a boy who is four years older. Some boys are being polite when they won't let you know they don't like them; others pretend they do so they can boast to their friends they have another girl crazy about them.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER

Q: Social objections to one side, is there any for denying Negro teachers the privilege of teaching White youngsters, and vice versa?

A: By "vice versa", I suppose you mean White teaching Negro youngsters. If so, the answer queries is, yes, there is a valid objection.

The learning process of White people is that of Negroes. Negroes learn best by the process, through colors, pictures, etc. White people, on the other hand, work better in the abstract, with words and ideas.

So, it follows, White teachers teach their own mental make-up, with emphasis on thought, and White children learn best from teachers.

Negro teachers, in following their natural objectivity and thereby impart greater knowledge to those who think as they think, i.e., other Negroes.

Dr. J. C. Carothers, who advanced the theory of a lazy frontal lobe in African Negroes, is the only one for this. Dr. Carothers spent many years as a British civil servant, working with Negroes. In his studies he concluded that the Negro learns by concrete thought and very little by abstract process.

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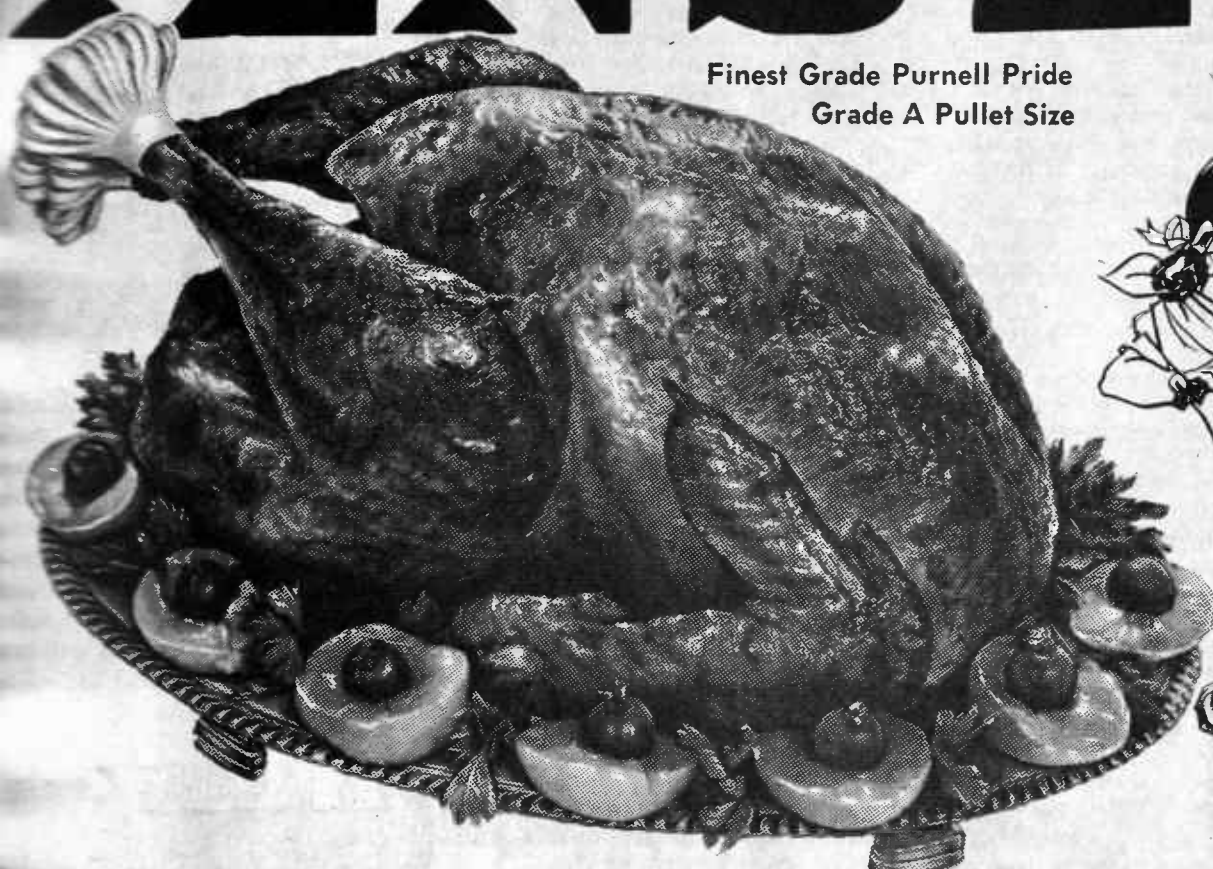

Farm Ponds And Good Land Use

by Hiram A. Jones
Work Unit Conservationist

Livestock need water. Where there are no natural streams to provide water for livestock, farm ponds are necessary if the land is to be used for pasture.

The construction of farm ponds has made it possible to use land that is too steep for crops for pasture. More than 500 ponds have been constructed in Tishomingo County.

Often more than one pond is needed in a large pasture to insure the best use of the pasture plants. Cattle should not be required to walk great distances

to get water. It should always be nearby. If so, animals will graze the pasture more uniformly.

The Soil Conservation Service furnishes technical assistance to farmers who wish to construct farm ponds.

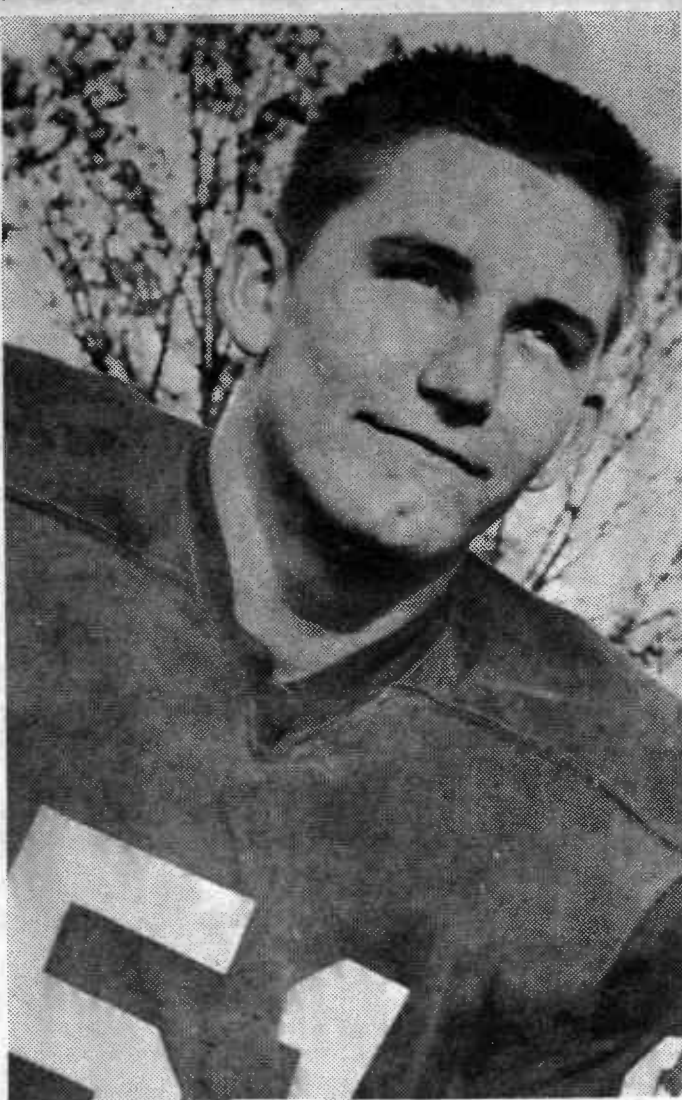

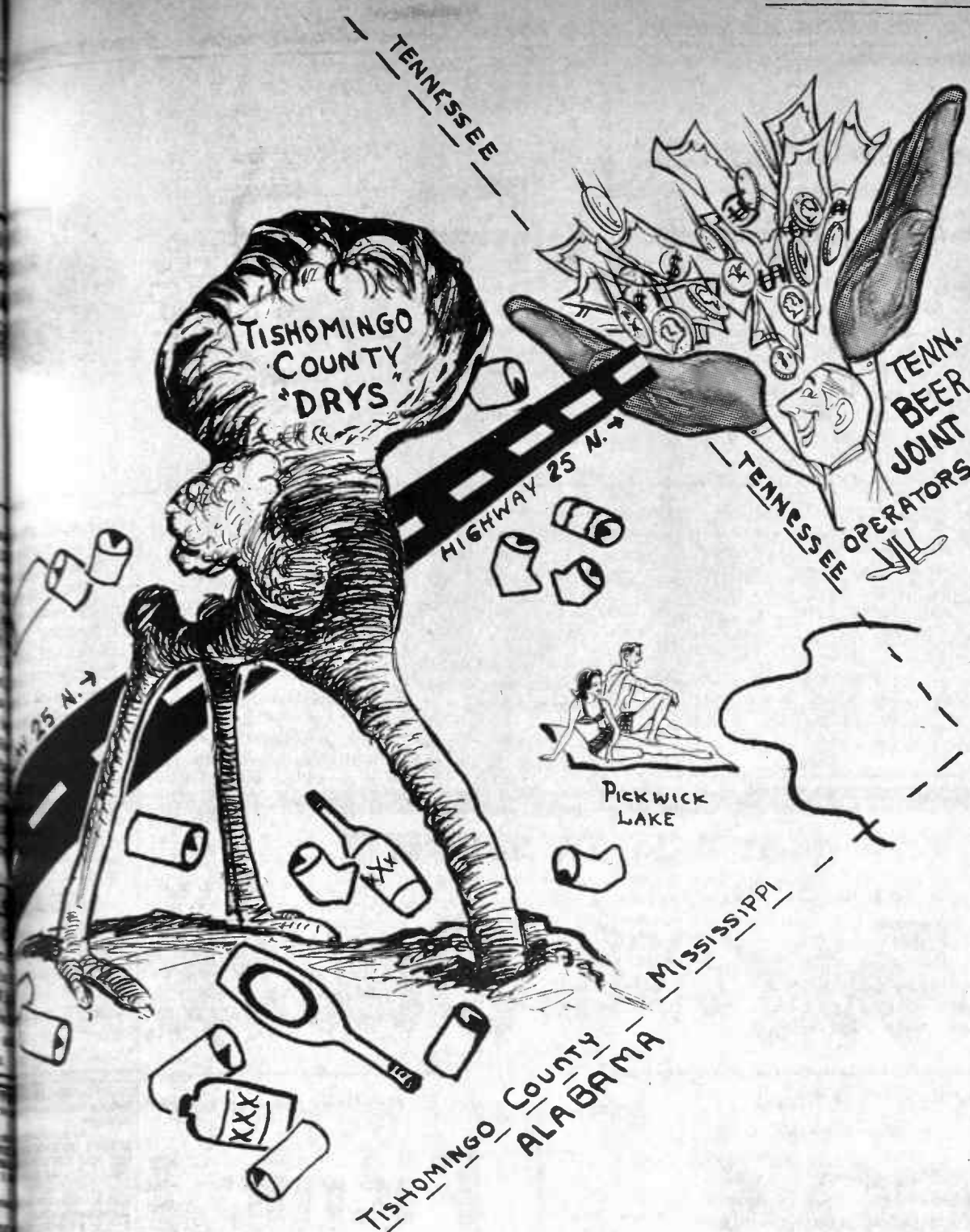

Hunters Prepare Season Nov. 19th

The open season on deer in Tishomingo County begins November 19th.

E. C. Holland, Tishomingo County Game Warden, said that hunters are required to have a State Resident Combination Hunting and Fishing License or State Resident Hunting License.

Persons under 16 and over 65 must have State Resident Except Hunter Deer and Turkey Tags, costing fifty cents, before hunting deer and turkeys. No other license is required for those persons.

Deer Tagging: All deer shall be tagged immediately after kill and before transporting or removing the carcass in any manner from the place where it was killed. The appropriate tag obtained with license shall be attached securely and information required entered on the tag before it is attached. Any one tag may be used only once. Any part of a deer subdivided among 2 or more persons shall have the name, address, and the tag number of the person killing the same attached to the part or package enclosing the part or parts. Failure to tag deer or to identify parts is a violation and may result in forfeiture or seizure.

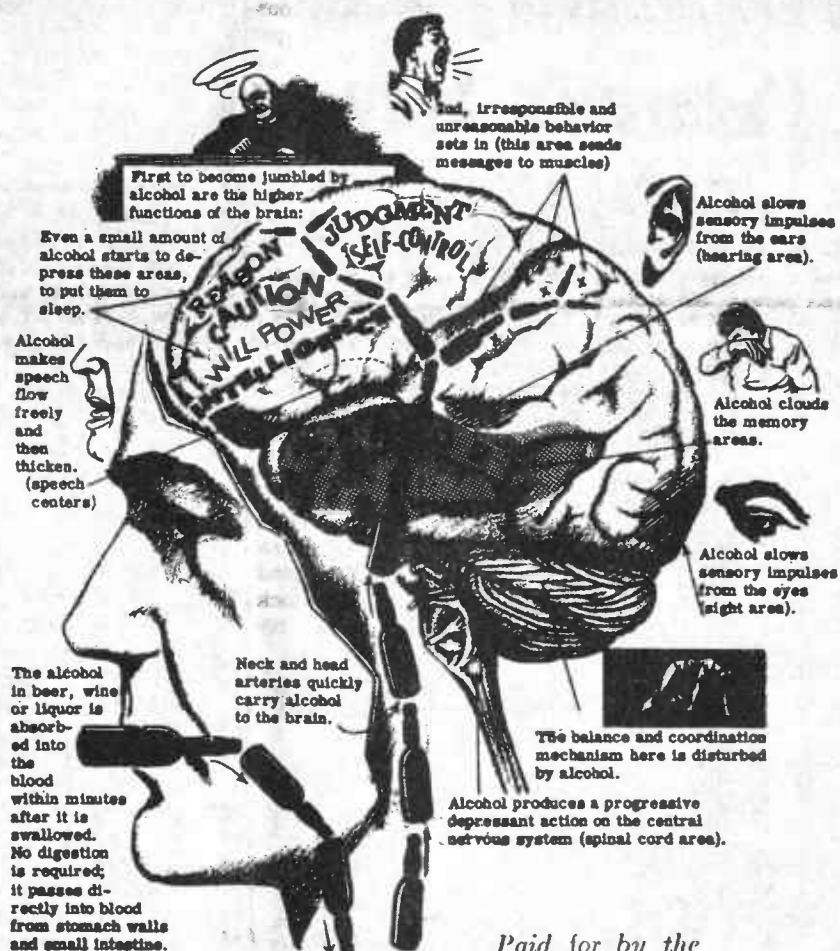

Miss Mimi Gaines, daughter of Mrs. O. T. Gaines of Iuka, is among the cast of 27 to be featured in the presentation.

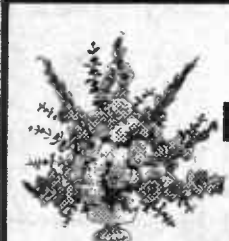
