Tax Collections For October

The City of Iuka reported a total of \$4,977.84 in Tax Collections during the month of October, showing a slight increase in comparison with last year's figure of \$4,451.01.

Belmont, operating on the one half percent rate, showed a total of \$1,444.69, a nice increase over last year's figure of \$1,372.

This report was taken from the November issue of the Mississippi Municipalities.

While other towns in the county showed increases, Tishomingo showed a decrease in collections from \$954.39 in October 1965 to \$740.90 this year.

Other nearby cities collecting on a 1 percent rate all showed nice increases: Baldwin collected \$4,343.82; Booneville \$9,355.70; and Corinth, \$21,292.24. Ripley, operating on the one half percent rate, reported a total of \$3883.72.

Cucumber Dollars Are Offered Area Farmers

"A Tishomingo County farmer can make as much as \$250 to \$300 or more gross from a good acre of cucumbers with a relatively small production cost," according to Percie Stricklen, Tishomingo County Agent.

The area project of growing cucumbers for pickles is being

introduced in Tishomingo county with Atkins Pickle Co. of Atkins, Arkansas acting as buyer. The company has been operating in several Northcentral Mississippi counties for the past two years and is seeking expansion to include Tishomingo County and 5 to 7 other northern counties in 1967.

"We would need a minimum of 100 to 150 acres in this county as a start for the 1967 season," the county agent continued. "The project is especially good for small families of 3 to 5 people. If you are interested, please come by the extension office in Iuka for more details. This is a good opportunity to pick up a little extra cash during the summer," he concluded.

Victory For Conservatives

By their voting November 8, Americans accomplished a stunning rollback of the Johnson administration's Great Society. The Republican Party, which picked up 47 seats and 8 governorships, is now in better shape than it has been for years. This is not to say, of course, that the conservative struggle has been won. What's happened is that conservatives have achieved victory in a very important battle. But there are many key battles still ahead, chiefly the presidential contest of 1968.

Nevertheless with heavily augmented strength in Congress, the Conservatives will be able to apply the brakes to the Johnson administration's wasteful programs. It is unlikely, for example, that the Great Society planners will be able to extend the rent subsidy program or increase outlays for the War on Poverty. The 90th Congress should be able to implement constructive opposition.

The Johnson administration also is likely to encounter effective congressional opposition if it seeks again to enact new "civil rights" legislation which benefits one privileged class of Americans while denying the vast majority of Americans their genuine civil rights to law and order in the streets. Furthermore, the Johnson administration may realize that it cannot take extreme positions on foreign affairs, such as aiding the Afro-Asian bloc in the United Nations in its demands for an extension of U. N. authority in Africa. The new Congress certainly is not likely to approve the spending of vast sums for U. N. adventures anywhere in the world.

In the 89th Congress, conservatives were stymied. The big liberal sweep in the 1964 election reduced conservative numbers until they could voice protests but not block dangerous legislation. This situation has been changed. Half the liberals elected in 1964 were defeated at the polls.

In this connection, it is important to note that supporters of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy lost as heavily as Johnson administration supporters. Sen. Kennedy,

who hoped to develop a bloc of satellite governors and senators in preparation for 1968 or 1972, suffered a severe setback.

The markedly conservative temper of the electorate may force Sen. Kennedy to revise his racial pronouncements. The 1968 situation will be complicated for him, inasmuch as many Viet Nam war veterans will be home and voting, and no doubt remembering Sen. Kennedy's talk about sending blood & medical supplies to the aid of the Communist Viet Cong.

In geographical terms, conservatives scored remarkable upsets. A Great Society supporter lost the Alaska governorship, for instance, even though Alaska was thought to be in the bag for Washington. At the other end of the country, in Florida, conservative Claude Kirk, Jr., created an historical precedent by becoming the first GOP governor of that state in modern times.

It was a bi-partisan victory for conservatives. In Virginia, for example, Sen. Harry F. Byrd Jr. — who bears a famous name in Old Dominion political annals — easily won reelection. Thus a proud tradition of statesmanship will be carried on.

Perhaps the most important election was in California, the nation's most populous state, where Ronald Reagan won with a margin of nearly a million votes, or 58% of the total. Mr. Reagan, a Republican conservative, ousted Gov. Edmund (Pat) Brown, who has been entrenched in California since he defeated former U. S. Senator William Knowland in 1958. The special significance of Mr. Reagan's victory at the polls is that the Republican delegation to the GOP nominating convention in 1968 will be a conservative delegation. It also will be the largest delegation on hand.

The country will not be safe until the Congress is steered by responsible forces and the execution of national policy, thru the executive branch of the federal government, is in the hands of people who believe fully in national sovereignty, states rights and conservation of the financial resources of the citizen.



THE GOLDEN YEARS

HOUSEBREAKING A HUSBAND
— THE KEY TO GOLDEN YEARS

The class on "How To Housebreak a Retired Husband" will now come to order:

Your first step, about a week before your husband comes home in retirement, is to secretly appoint yourself Chairman of the Board — your husband is going to be pretty bored for a few months. Then, as Chairman, set the policy for your house. This policy should include — but not be confined to — the following:

"My Beloved Husband — As of 24 hours following your retirement, the policies stated below will be in effect: "1. You will wear your shoes at all times except when you are in bed. Occasionally, you may kick them off at 10 P.M. while watching television. "2. You yourself will empty all ashtrays dirtied in the daytime. I will continue emptying them in the evening and on weekends.

"3. You will not — repeat NOT — ever appear in the living room in your undershirt.

"4. You will stay out of my kitchen (as I will stay out of your workshop) unless invited, or unless you have chores there that have been previously agreed on.

"5. You may try to cook from time to time, and I will clean up your messes. But under no condition will you cook within two hours before or after mealtime.

"6. You will help me make the bed daily. Not to save half my time, but three-fourths of my time. So efficient is four-hand bed-making that two people can do it in a fourth the time it takes one.

"7. You will shave daily, except in exceptional cases.

"8. You will stop any dirty job you are doing at least 30 minutes before any meal, and make yourself presentable to come to the table. One night each week you will wear a shirt, tie, and jacket at dinner. Once each month you will take me out to dinner — if only to a drive-in hamburger stand.

"9. You will be allowed to complain only two days about

any ailment you have, after which you go to a doctor.

"10. You will be allowed to act like a juvenile-out-of-school for two weeks after you retire, then fall into deep gloom for three weeks thereafter. Then, you snap out of it and start living.

"Your Devoted Wife"

Within the framework of this policy, you wives should lure your retired husbands into sharing the housework. Because it's fair, but also because they will actually like it. You should let them subscribe to two newspapers, so they'll have something to talk about except themselves, and watch daytime TV so they'll stay out of your hair. You should take afternoon naps with them . . . for a while . . . if they want to. You should use all your social wiles to help them make friends because they're going to need some. You should demand that both husband and wife have three hours a day free of each other, to pursue personal affairs.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER

Q: Why do Negroes want to integrate with white people, Dr. Garrett; what is at the root of all this?

A: Generally, the Negro thinks his lot will be better if he integrates with White people. He intuitively, there is something inherently inferior in being a Negro in a White culture. So, he wants to be a White man. Unfortunately, there is nothing he can do about it except to change the culture of the Negro.

In evidence of the Negro's true feelings, recognized social phenomenon that Negroes, themselves, base their social scale on color. For mulattoes and near-Whites look down on Negroes, shun them.

In short, Negroes recognize—whether they want to or not—that within a White culture, they are superior to Negro people and understand many don't like it. But, as I say, they cannot change the facts of life. They can change the culture of miscegenation (mixed breeding) but, then, it would be a White culture.

The answer to the problem lies—and we must have this—in equal facilities and equal opportunities, separate facilities, separate opportunities, but separate.

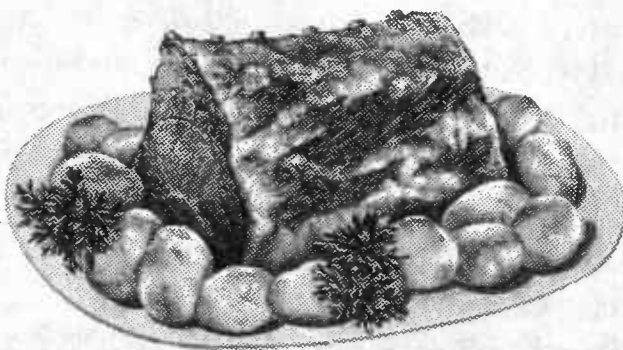

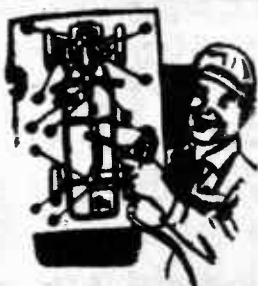

Christmas Seal Campaign Opens

Proceeds of the campaign will be used by the Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association to combat tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases.

Mrs. Leon Phillips, chairman, said that millions of lives have been saved since the first contribution was made for a Christmas Seal. "The saving of lives must be continued," she added. "Your tuberculosis association is waging a relentless fight against the suffering, tragedy and loss of time and money that result from tuberculosis and other diseases that affect breathing. Many of these other respiratory diseases are not only gravely harmful in themselves, but increase susceptibility to tuberculosis."

"Last year in Mississippi there were 1,244 new cases of tuberculosis discovered. Already this year, through September, there have been 740 new cases of tuberculosis." We must continue to expand our efforts to find hidden cases of tuberculosis in our community. Christmas Seal contributions are used throughout the year in programs of education, case-finding, treatment, patient services, rehabilitation, medical education and research."

"Of every dollar contributed, 93c remains in Tishomingo County and in Mississippi. Seven cents goes to support the work of the National Tubercu-

sis Association in research and other phases of tuberculosis control programs."

Members of the Lucy Rowe Study Club have spent untold hours preparing the Christmas Seal letters for mailing in an effort to give every citizen a chance to contribute in the battle against tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases. We hope that the citizens of Tishomingo County will give their generous support during the campaign so that our program of tuberculosis control can be continued and expanded in the coming year."

Notes of County Home Economist

Homemaking Hints

To reduce wrinkles in articles of manmade fibers, set your automatic dryer on "medium" or "low" if it doesn't have a "wash-and-wear" cycle. After the articles are dry, tumble them for 10 minutes without heat. Remove immediately and hang up. This last step is important because wash-and-wear items left in a dryer may acquire new wrinkles.

Cook vegetables the shortest time possible for the best in color, texture and flavor. Most vegetables have a sweet, mild flavor when cooked just right. Overcooking causes strong, undesirable flavors to develop.

Tired of your bathroom curtains? Try the towel trick. Sew bright brass rings to pretty new bath towels in your favorite pattern or color and hang them from an ordinary curtain rod. They absorb bathroom steam without wilting. When you decide to change the bathroom curtains, the towel-curtains can go into the linen closet for your family's use.

A pork roast with a thin fat covering can be roasted in a shorter time than one with a thick fat covering, a study showed.

If your carpet is crushed down by furniture or walking, use a hot iron over a damp cloth or a steam iron to raise it. Be careful not to press down on the iron. Brush up the spots gently after treating them. Try the same treatment on the front and back of carpet corners that curl.

Store Pesticides Safely

Have you stored your pesticides for the winter? If so, do you have the comfortable feeling that they are safely out of reach of children? Are you secure in the knowledge that the pesticides will not spill and contaminate other items?

Children have a way of plundering, and perhaps blundering, into places they do not belong. Often enough these places are dangerous, or contain harmful objects. So why not anticipate their wanderings and safely lock your pesticides in a storeroom, cabinet or chest?

Then they will have the comfortable and secure feeling that you have protected your children from an avoidable accident. Remember, pesticides are beneficial if used and stored in the proper manner—but dangerous if used or stored carelessly. And, preventing any accident is easier than living with the consequences.

A few reports have been heard of pesticide containers, especially sacks, splitting or spilling and contaminating food products. Pesticides must never be stored close to edible items.

It is also important to store pesticides in the original containers. A poison stored in a pop bottle is an open invitation to many children. Scientists tell us that the appearance of the bottle and the lingering smell of its former contents often convince a youngster that what the bottle now contains is also good to drink.

Removing Yellow Deposits

White polyester and cotton blend fabrics have an affinity for body oils that show up as yellow deposits on the neck, underarm and sleeve sections of clothes. Although these yellowed areas are difficult to remove don't give up such garments for lost.

Try the following steps in your automatic washer: 1) fill the machine with extremely hot water. 2) Add recommended a-

mount of detergent. 3) Agitate the garments five minutes at regular speed. 4) Add one cup of liquid chlorine bleach diluted in one quart of hot water. 5) Let washer complete the cycle.

Second-Day Mashed Potatoes

Yes, second-day mashed potatoes can be appetizing fare, too.

For example, mashed potato balls are tasty. Season leftover potatoes with onion, salt and pepper and deep fat fry until golden brown.

Reheat and re-fluff mashed potatoes with enough milk to restore them to a just-whipped consistency. Serve as mashed potato cups filled with creamed turkey, chicken or tuna, or perhaps with beef stew, chop suey or beef and gravy.

Alternate layers of mashed potatoes and cooked pork sausage in a casserole or baking dish. Top with grated cheese and bake in a moderate oven until golden brown.

Dairy Notes

Some rules for better breeding of dairy cattle include: Wait at least 60 days after calving before attempting to re-breed the cow. This time should be increased if the cow had calving trouble. Waiting the 60 days is about the easiest thing you can do and helps conception as much as anything you can do.

Breed the cow to the best bulls available. This is usually through the artificial breeding program.

Do not breed a dairy cow to a beef bull. You will need good replacements and there will be a great demand for young dairy animals from other dairymen.

Breed the cow during the last part of the heat period. A cow stays in heat 12 to 18 hours. If you first notice the cow in heat in the morning at milking, breed her that afternoon. If you first notice her at evening milking, breed her the next morning.

Watch the cow closely for 17 to 24 days after breeding. If the cow did not conceive, she will be back in heat in this time. If after three services the cow did not conceive, check with a veterinarian.

Keep in mind that some of the cows you are milking three years from now will reflect the type of breeding program you follow today.

Frosted Sorghum

Do not turn livestock in to graze frosted fields of second growth sorghum or sudan-sorghum crosses until the plants have dried out.

This does not mean just the

dew dried off. It means until the complete plant has dried out. There is no danger after the plants have dried.

Good silage can be made from grain sorghum or other sorghum

after frost. Do not let it stand in the field too long after frost or it will get too dry.

Cattle Lice

For lice control on beef cattle, there are several routes that

you can take. You can keep your back rubbers or dusting sacks fully charged and do a pretty good job of holding down infestation.

You can use co-ral as a pour-

on and reduce numbers (ruehene is not recommended after November 1).

For an effective one-shot control, ronel or malathion as a

spray should give control.

When using any chemicals, or any other material, always read the label and follow the directions.

SEX — GUNS — LEGAL CONTROL

The laws of any nation, any state or any county are designed for the convenience of that area in and for which the law is instituted.

For instance, our nation has a law concerning guns or firearms, weapons, or whatever name you prefer to call them. Anyway, the law includes pistols, shotguns, rifles, and certain types of pneumatic rifles. The law, simply, is that you can possess a gun (any one of your choice). You may carry that gun wherever you choose as long as it is not concealed. Now, we all realize and practice these laws concerning guns. If the law is violated, then the person committing the violation is prosecuted. But guns ARE legal, and yet, they are implements that, when wrongly used, will kill or cripple people.

Another example of a law that is intended as a convenience for the people of the whole world is a law that deals with our very existence. It is the law relating to sex.

Sex is a problem of the human race. It has been in existence since Eve ate of the forbidden fruit in the Garden of Eden. Immediately after Eve and Adam ate the fruit, they became ashamed of their nakedness and covered themselves with leaves. . . . With the advance of time and civilization, marriage laws have been designed & passed that gives men and women the right to legally live together and to legally bring children into the world and raise a family. Our marriage laws are the very foundation of our family units and home-life as we know it in our great nation today.

Certainly, there are cases where the marriage laws are violated; and needless to say, there are sex acts promiscuously committed. But there are also other civil and moral laws whereby the violator can be punished. Marriage laws remove the sex act from the dark back alleys out of the bushes, and from the back seats of automobiles, into respectable homes and makes respectable citizens out of what ordinarily are respectable people.

Would you want to do away with our marriage laws?

Alcohol is a commodity that has been used by all peoples since the beginning of civilization; it is a commodity that shall always be in demand by all people in all places. Since its demand is universal, it naturally stands to reason that laws for its control are essential. Admittedly, it is a major problem. And the only way to handle any problem is to get it out from under the table, up on top in the light, where everyone can see and know what the problem is. Then, with proper education in its use, many of the ills of alcohol can be cured. It is only through education and training that complete control of anything can be fully realized. You can't train men, women, or children in the use of a gun, or proper behavior, or in the use of alcohol by keeping them in the back alleys, under the table, or hidden anywhere, or by making them illegal to possess or use.

Mississippi's Liquor Laws are intended to give the greatest amount of protection to the greatest number of people and only those counties that have legal control of liquor can derive the greatest benefits from the State's Liquor Laws.

APO Mail To Get Special Attention Says Postmaster

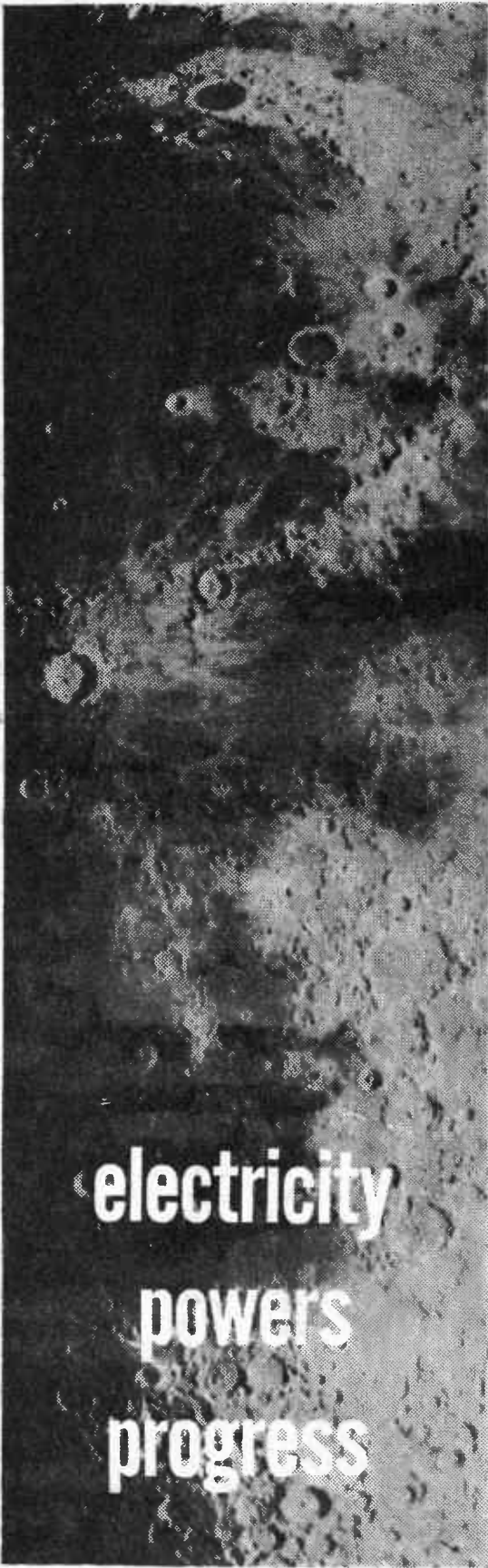
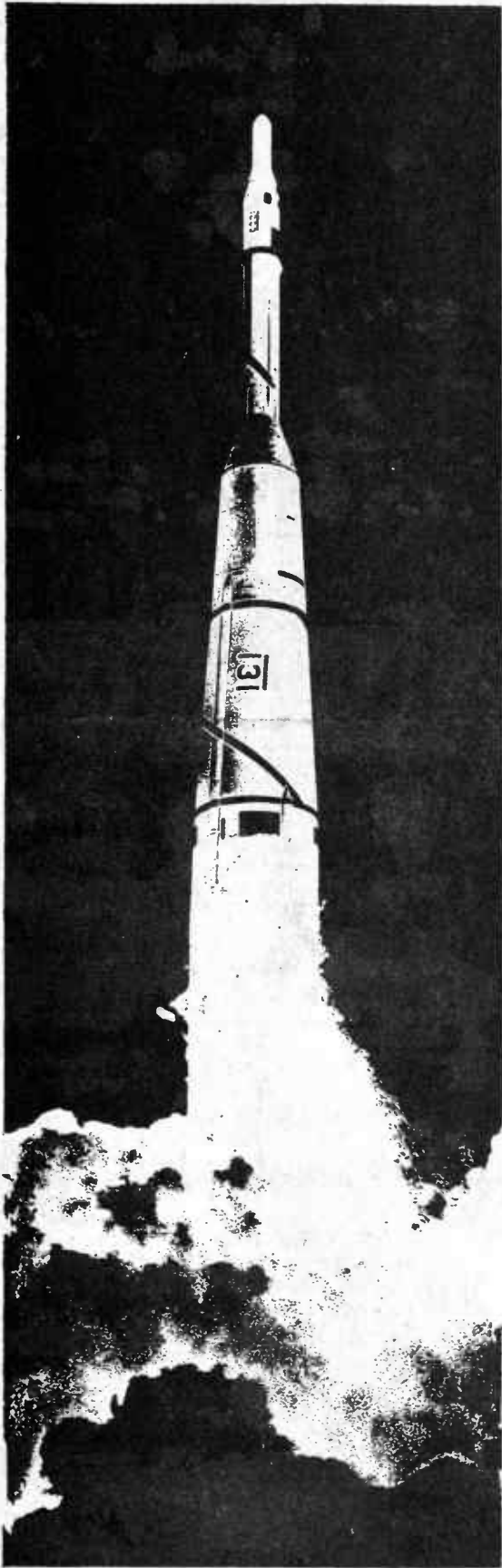
Postmaster Harold T. Lome-
nick of Iuka today announces
that henceforth all first class
mail, personal sound recordings
(voice letters, and parcels weigh-
ing 5 pounds or less and measur-
ing not more than 60 inches in
length and girth combined, will
be airlifted on a space available
basis between the United States
and all military post offices ov-
erseas.
Also, under Public Law 89-725
The Dulski Military Mail Act—
which was signed by President
Johnson on November 2, 1966,
second class publications such as
newspapers and magazines pub-
lished weekly or more often,

and featuring current news of
interest to the military, will be
airlifted from San Francisco to
the armed forces serving in Viet
Nam.
Postmaster Lomenick explain-
ed that parcels weighing 5 lbs.
or less and not exceeding 60 ins.
in length and girth combined,
paid at surface rates, will be
moved by surface transportation
within the United States from
the points of mailing to the port
of embarkation.
To speed up separation and
delivery of these smaller parcels
falling within this category,
Postmaster General Lawrence F.
O'Brien directed that all parcels
be clearly marked upon accept-
ance at the post office with the
letters SAM (surface airlift mail).
Postmaster Lomenick also re-
minded mailers that Christmas
parcels weighing 5 pounds and
under, though they are given
airlift priority from San Fran-

cisco to Viet Nam on a space
available basis, should be mail-
ed no later than December 1.
Airlift, he said, should be sent
no later than December 10.

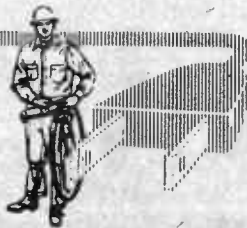
