Voters Go To Polls Again Saturday

Issue Is Legal Control Of Alcoholic Beverages

After a hard-fought battle, two opposing factions will go to the polls this Saturday and decide the fate of legal control of alcoholic beverages in Tishomingo county.

Basis for the election is the new "Local Option Alcoholic Beverage Control Law" of the State of Mississippi passed in regular session of the Legislature. The law, House Bill No. 112, went into effect July 1, this year.

The offensive in the campaign started with the presentation of a petition to the county Board

of Supervisors calling for an election on Saturday, December 3. The petition, presented to the Board of Supervisors by the Tishomingo County Foundation for Legal Control, had in excess of 1,600 signers asking that the election be called. First act of the Legal Control crowd was the public distribution of a pamphlet entitled "The Christian Position Concerning Legal Control" which was a sermon by The Rev. W. Fred Gates, Jr., presiding Bishop for the Episcopal Churches of the State of Tennessee with headquarters in Memphis. The proponents of Legal Control carried the attack further by citing portions of a speech by Gov. Paul Johnson calling for "positive action" in dealing with the liquor situation.

The United Drys of Tishomingo County retaliated by citing Bible references condemning alcohol in all its forms. The ministers and their churches rose up in a united effort opposing the legal control of alcoholic beverages. Numerous religious organizations in the county went to work raising funds and planning their campaign.

Extensive use of radio advertising was first used by the United Drys in presenting preachers and laymen with messages opposing the issue.

As the campaign advanced, the Foundation for Legal Control continued the attack by presentation of points of the new law that, they claimed, would bring more tax revenue into the county for schools, roads, etc., while affording more strict control of the sale and use of alcohol.

The United Drys continued defense of the prohibition laws to stay as they are by holding county-wide rallies and with a stepped-up tempo of radio and newspaper advertising pointing out the evils of the issue.

According to some of the old-timers in the area, this campaign on legal control of alcoholic beverages has been the hardest fought of any in the history of the county. "This has been a fight with no holds barred, and it has really been thought provoking," one said. While another observed that, "issues of controversy are good for us. They give everyone a chance to speak their mind and they find out that you can speak up and say what you think and believe."

Polls will open at 7 o'clock Saturday morning and shall remain open until 6 P. M. No poll tax receipt will be required to vote in this election. Only requirement is that the voter be properly registered in the precinct where he lives.

Whichever way the election goes, the issue can be brought before the voters again in two years.

New Garbage Truck On Order For City

A bid for Iuka's new garbage truck was awarded to Honeycutt Motor Company of Iuka recently for a Dodge truck which will be equipped by Scruggs Equipment Company of Memphis, according to John H. Biggs, chairman of the city's Sanitation Department.

Alderman Biggs noted that the "Mark III" by Colectomatic

refuse collection unit would be adapted to the Dodge truck. The unit is designed by the Heil Company of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and offers fast cycling, highest compaction, and ejection unloading. It is one of the most imitated units on the market.

"With this modern sanitation equipment, our department will be the most up-to-date and efficient crew in the county," Mr. Biggs stated. "It is our intention to have this vehicle in operation just after the first of the year. It is one of the most notable steps in automatic refuse collection ever put into practice in Iuka," he concluded.

Iuka Airport Is Credited With Quick Delivery

Plant officials at the Tishomingo Shoe Company expressed their appreciation recently of the new Iuka Airport which enabled them to get badly needed parts to repair a machinery breakdown within less than two hours.

The recent breakdown called for necessary parts from Nashville and the GENESCO headquarters. A plane from the central office rushed the parts to the Iuka Airport in one hour.

During holiday shopping from now to December 31, the Iuka Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the city leaders, have declared Free Parking for town shoppers.

We urge all merchants, businessmen and store employees to leave the street parking spaces for shoppers. It has been agreed that parking tickets will be given to those vehicles belonging to the business people during the regular work day if they are found parked in these designated spaces," he explained.

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BOBBY BAKER
AND "JUSTICE"

Bobby Baker is scheduled to be tried on nine counts, come January. If he is convicted on a single one, it will be the surprise of my life.

This is why:
 The Baker case had its genesis, so the story goes, in 1960, at the Los Angeles convention, when Jack Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson were jostling each other.

At that time, Baker was to Johnson what Bobby Kennedy was to his brother, Jack. For years, Baker had been Johnson's man-of-all-work, Johnson's creature, doing what he was told to do, and doing it well. Whatever else he was doing has become the point of some discussion, to be resolved, so the docket has it, this January.

In any event, it is believed a deep and bitter enmity developed between the Johnson and Kennedy factions as a result of the 1960 dust-up, enmity that roils to this day. For, in that Johnson won anything, there in LA, was a stinging defeat for the Kennedys. And defeat, with the icy-eyed Irish Mafia, isn't taken well. But what to do with the inteloper? That was the question.

Dump him, was the quick answer, of course. But, how? How, without losing votes?

Well, if Johnson could be discredited, made to appear to have been connected with Baker's hanky-panky, that would do it, but how do you go about doing that?

Who knows for sure if the Kennedys decided to "do" anything about Johnson? But this we do know: In 1962, Bobby Kennedy was Attorney General. The FBI is an agency of that department and, in 1962, at Bobby Kennedy's direction, the FBI tapped the phones of a man named Fred Black, listed as a "business" associate of Baker's. Sometime later, in 1963, the Baker case broke and the protege of the Vice President was painted the deepest hue of anyone since Benedict Arnold.

What "luck": If Bobby Baker were guilty of the heinous things attributed to him, surely Lyndon would be compromised, and that would be the end of the Kennedy's problem, so far as LBJ was concerned. So, with the papers playing the case in scare-head type, folks sat and awaited the unwinding of the Baker string, the discrediting of the Vice President and his subsequent replacement on the Democratic ticket of 1964.

But the plans of mice and men, as another Bobby said, aft gang aglay. The Baker case had hardly gotten up a head of steam when John F. Kennedy was assassinated. With that, LBJ, the man who had been tippy-toeing the back corridors of the capital, became the all-powerful President of the United States. And the hunted became the hunter.

I do declare, there is something poetic in it. What appeared to be a fool-proof case, a classic example of guilt-by-association if nothing more, turned into an embarrassing fizzle for all concerned.

Following the initial disclosures, you will recall, there came the Senate hearings, and out of those hearings grew the nine indictments Baker is scheduled to face, next January.

And that is where I would be willing to bet a dollar. I will bet Baker is not tried on any of them, let alone convicted. For, you see, though Baker's name is on the indictments, it isn't he, at all, who is slated for trial. In the public's mind, it is Johnson, himself.

So, what do you do about that? You can't just drop the charges; the case is too hot a potato for that. What, then?

Well, you could have the Attorney General's office admit that its agency, the FBI, had broken the law when it tapped those lines and though — mea culpa — it will never do so again, the evidence gathered has nothing to do with the evidence against Baker, and the trial should go on. You could say that, and you could take the indictments on to court and let the judge snort and say, what do you mean, has nothing to do with the case? It has everything to do with the case and since this court does not try people on illegally-gathered evidence, the indictments are no good and the case, therefore, is thrown out.

And then you could have the assistant attorney general issue a pious statement to the effect he will have to start over, justice will be done, and that will be that.

Makes a person wonder how old J. Edgar Hoover feels, having his FBI made a patsy. Makes a person wonder why Hoover doesn't speak up.

But there is no wonder about the Bobby Baker case.
 You can forget it.



THE GOLDEN YEARS

SHOULD RETIRED MAN PAY FOR GRANDSON'S COLLEGE?

You are of retirement age, and you have some savings you don't expect to need. You have a grandson, 18, who bears your name. He has entered college.

But the boy's parents (your son and his wife) are talking about the financial burden college has placed on them. They are saying they may not be able to keep up the payments after the current semester. The boy's mother keeps mentioning Viet Nam and the possibility that the boy will be drafted if he drops out of college.

So do you dig into the savings and solve the problem?

1. The education of a boy is the responsibility of his parents, not his grandparents. This is pretty well established. Did your Grandpa help educate YOU? If you're like most men retiring in 1966 your Grandpa probably wanted you yanked out of high school in the 10th grade to help Pa on the farm.

2. Almost any kid who has the will and the ability to get a college education can get it nowadays without aid from grandparents, or even his parents. Scholarships, grants, and loans abound, as any college administrator will tell you.

3. The college money a boy gets from his parents is sacrifice money, or duty money. The money he gets from Grandpa is different. It's a free gift.

4. A college boy, being a human being first and a beloved grandson second, will be inclined to take for granted what he gets for free, and after a while expect it as a right.

5. Parents of a college boy, being human beings first and parents second, are very likely to get into the habit of accepting any handout from a grandparent... and to expect it. It is doubtful that any grandparent who started contributing to the education of a college freshman would get out from under the gun for four years.

6. It is doubtful, really, that a grandparent could get free of the handout for six years, because a boy who had been getting money for four years could put up a powerful argument for a subsidy for the two years while he gets established in a career.

7. College boys get married these days. Then they have babies. If Grandpa were paying \$2,000 a year to keep the boy in college would he stop now?

Or sweeten the pot to \$3,000? 8. The 1966 college boy can spend happily in six months as much money as the 1966 retired man worked grimly for six years to save. Not because the kid is bad but because times change.

What has been said here does not seek to keep a grandfather from enriching a grandson's life instead of enriching his own. Not much.

TIME FOR RESTRAINT

With the congressional elections now decided, the country will be giving much thought to the economic policies that will be followed in the next two years. The last year has been characterized by disturbing economic signs, and many citizens fear the coming of a recession.

Clearly, it will take a great deal of restraint all around for the country to navigate successfully through the difficult period that lies ahead. One fear that is current is the nation might find itself encountering a situation where there was both a recession in business and inflation in prices.

If the country is to ride out the troublesome period ahead, there will be special need for restraint on the part of the labor unions. The unions, if they fail to show some responsibility, could trigger a real breakdown of the economy. It should not be forgotten that the airline machinists who went on strike last summer won a wage increase that was sharply inflationary. In the pre-election period, the unions were generally careful in their demands so as not to arouse the voting public.

But now that the elections are history, many unions may be tempted to seek wage increases in line with what the machinists obtained. If they do, the effect on the nation's economy could be crippling.

Union leaders may ask: "Why should unions be restrained in their demands?" The answer is that American business has been notably restrained in a period of pressure and difficulty. The "Indiana Business Review," published by Indiana University, cited

this fact in its October issue. Said the "Review": "Although tight money hurts, bankers and corporate executives are being remarkably statesmanlike in accepting this uncomfortable situation."

"It's costing them both money in the short run. Yet, they are also interested in the long-run position of their own organizations. Therefore, business and banking leaders in the main have been supporters of the monetary restraint needed to achieve or maintain an acceptable degree of balance in the economy."

This is a factual report of the statesmanship which American business has practiced in a difficult year. The slowdown in mortgage credit has been hurtful to many businesses. Yet businessmen have been aware of the need to contain inflation, and they have acted responsibly on this awareness.

The economy of the United States, however, cannot be kept on an even keel by the action of business alone. The unions today represent a major power center. They may not be a constructive force in the economy, but they certainly have the capacity to

create havoc by demands that the economy not meet.

If the unions go for higher wages, up the price of promoting inflation, other wage earners follow. At the same time, the market, the demand for goods, is slowing production, creating a recession.

For many years, the union has sought to attain its goals without appreciating the overall needs of the time. The union has known nothing of the United States. The United States has a public interest, which has been protected with goods and services, which has preceded the union's impossible, however, the barons of the union — the bosses — persist in public be damned.

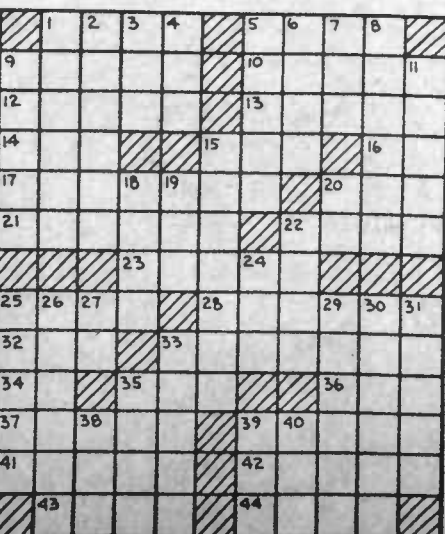

DON'T BE HOODWINKED

Isn't it strange that those who are trying desperately to "hoodwink" the people of Tishomingo County would give this advice? Not exactly, they are merely trying to confuse the issue.

It is not a matter of "Legal Control," but whether we have Legal whiskey "bootleg" or just the "bootleg." Make no mistake about it — legalization does stop "bootlegging." In fact there are more "bootleggers" in a "wet" state than there are in a "dry" state, on a population basis.

Let us look at the real facts. When alcoholic beverages are legalized, consumption of the same is increased. Crime, such as murder, rape, aggravated assault, and many others also increase. This does not include the broken homes, hungry children, and broken hearts. Then there is the increase in traffic fatalities, more orders, and etc. There is also more lost time from jobs due to drunkenness and increase in on-the-job accidents.

What about the revenue received? There is always more additional money received from increased law enforcement, enlarged mental institutions, expanded prison facilities, plus additional expenditures for the "Beverage Control" Board and warehousing facilities, than has ever been received in taxes levied on sale of the same.

Please check the statistics of the other 49 states on this. The fine Governor of Oklahoma warned our present Governor of these things before the "Local Option" was signed into law.

It has been implied by some that Highway 25 between Pickwick and Belmont to be resurfaced because of people in the south end of the county driving to Tennessee to buy Alcoholic beverages. It was noted that the same highway between Belmont and Fulton was not resurfaced. True, there are some who drive to Tennessee to buy their "Booze." However, it was not mentioned that the highway between Pickwick and Belmont was first paved long before the section of highway between Belmont and Fulton. Furthermore, there was nothing said about the many trucks heavily loaded with pulpwood, using the section of highway that was resurfaced. Of these trucks come out of Alabama thru Red Bay and do not travel on the section of highway mentioned.

It was further stated that teenagers could buy beer and whiskey in Tishomingo County. Granted that this is true, legalization will not end this, in fact it will make it easier for them to get it.

There has been further implication that the highways in our county are filled with beer cans and whisky bottles because of prohibition. Just two weeks ago we traveled through a "wet" county in another state and within a distance of 5 miles we saw other side of a legal liquor store, such as those that are advocated by the proponents of "Legal Control." I saw more beer cans than I have ever seen on the highways of Tishomingo County at one time.

Concerning dents in mailboxes and similar matters, I dare say that no one has ever done these things because he was sober.

The answer — after 58 years of prohibition we still have these things — legalize liquor. Not at all. We have had laws against murder, rape, and other crimes more than that — and we still have people who commit these crimes, (and we always have these people with us.) Let's legalize these crimes and collect taxes on them. Absurd; You say. Surely, but no more so than trying to control liquor by legalizing it.

We have a new "dry" law in effect now, if we will only vote to keep it, and the same enforcement officers to enforce it that we would have to enforce so-called "Legal Control."

Then there is the booklet titled, "The Christian Position Concerning Legalization of Liquor." The only scripture references given had to do with wine. From these, no assumptions were made. There was no reference made in these scriptures to whiskey. What does the scripture say concerning the use of wine? "And be not filled with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit;" (Eph. 5:18) Then in verses 2:1 "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived by it is not wise."

Those who advocate "legal control" have certainly been deceived. I have been ridiculed by them, their ilk & kin than to be called a fool by God's Holy Spirit.

Won't you take your stand with me for God and right and vote against "Legal Control."

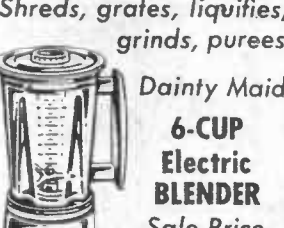

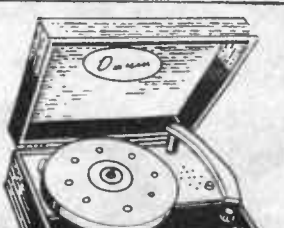

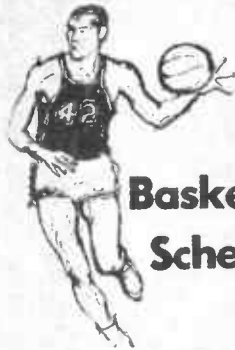

Notes of County Home Economist

Yes, you can wash your sweaters, whether they are all man-made fibers or woolen. It does take time and patience. All man-made fibers can be done at home and many homemakers prefer to launder woolen sweaters to having them dry cleaned.

First find the labels that came with the garment and follow any laundering instructions. If you can't find the instructions or none came with the garment, resolve to be a better shopper next time and buy a garment with instructions and keep them.

Some points to help you launder your sweaters in your washing machine are:

1. Draw the shape of the sweater on paper.
2. Pretreat any soiled area by gently rubbing with a light duty detergent. You may use cold water soap.
3. Use warm or cold water and add detergent. Some laundering specialists prefer cold water. Subtract amount used for pre-treating. Usually one-fourth to one-third cup in plenty.
4. Wash only one or two sweaters at the time, but be sure they do not fade. Fill machine to normal level.
5. Soak without agitation for 5 to 10 minutes.
6. Agitate about 2 minutes and let washer complete cycle. Water softener may be added to the rinse waters, and a fabric softener added to the last rinse water helps.
7. Hand block wool sweaters to original size on a flat surface and let dry.
8. Dry sweaters of manmade fibers on regular fabric setting. Be sure to remove the sweater before it is completely dry. Finish drying on a flat surface.

TB Seal Letters Cause Questions; Health Dept. Skin Tests Available

The 1966 Christmas Seal letters mailed recently by the Lucy Rowe Study Club have caused much concern in Tishomingo County, according to Mrs. Leon Phillips, chairman.

Volunteers of the Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Association have received numerous questions in reaction to the Seal Letter stating that "TB" was still Mississippi's number one communicable disease, with 1,266 new cases discovered in 1965.

In an attempt to answer these many questions, the Lucy Rowe Study Club, sponsors of the annual event in the county, relate the following most common inquiries.

QUESTION: Do we still have tuberculosis in Tishomingo county and how much?

ANSWER: Yes! There are 27 cases of tuberculosis patients, and several suspects on the tuberculosis case register of the county health department. This

number may seem small in comparison, but the danger of only one person spreading the disease to many other people is a major threat to our citizens.

QUESTION: Is TB contagious and can the disease kill you?

ANSWER: Yes! Tuberculosis is America's number one preventable communicable disease. A new case of TB is discovered every ten minutes in the United States, making a total of over 50,000 new cases each year. Universally, TB is a leading killer. In the United States, over 10,000 deaths are caused by tuberculosis each year. Over 600,000 people still require attention, because they have at one time been threatened by active tuberculosis.

QUESTION: What can the citizens of Tishomingo County do in order to detect TB?

ANSWER: Get a chest x-ray or tuberculin test every year. Ward off a respiratory illness,

such as the common cold, and consult a physician if respiratory symptoms persist.

"For those who missed the x-ray bus, skin tests are available each Wednesday at the Health Department in Iuka from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and on Fridays from 10:00 a.m. to 2 p.m. in Belmont," Mrs. Phillips stated.

"Help in the research and fighting of this dread disease by sending in your contribution in answer to your Christmas Seal letters today," she concluded.

"Sniffer" Completes Job; Work For Crews

Three crews are now engaged in repairing gas leaks throughout the city following an extensive survey by Heath Survey Consultants, Inc., conducted locally by Mr. and Mrs. Michael Froney of Michigan.

Mayor George W. Cutshall states that 279 leaks were found during the survey, most of which were minor ones around meter connections.

"Actually, these leaks were graded A, B and C, with the C's being the bad ones," the mayor explained. "Of the 279 leaks found, only about 40 were considered bad enough to be in the C category."

The survey was under the direction of T. E. "Eff" Curtis, city alderman, head of the utilities division, and Cecil Phifer, co-worker with Mr. Curtis in utilities.

Mr. and Mrs. Froney complet-

ed the survey on Friday of last week. The three repair crews began work immediately, starting with the C category.

"It is impossible to estimate when the repair work will be completed since the extent of all of the pipe damage in the C class is not yet known. However, these leaks are not dangerous to the safety of the residents, but still must be repaired as quickly as possible to stop the unnecessary loss of gas," Mayor Cutshall added.

Combine 1 tablespoon of melted butter or margarine, 1 tablespoon mayonnaise or salad dressing and 1 tablespoon grated cheddar cheese. Insert 1 teaspoon cheese mixture into each cut. Bake in a greased shallow pan in a hot oven (400 degrees F) for 12 minutes. Serve immediately.

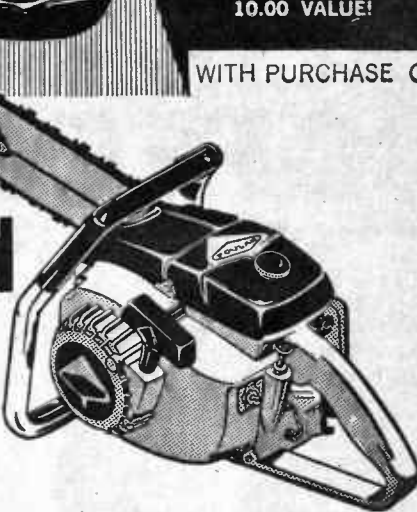

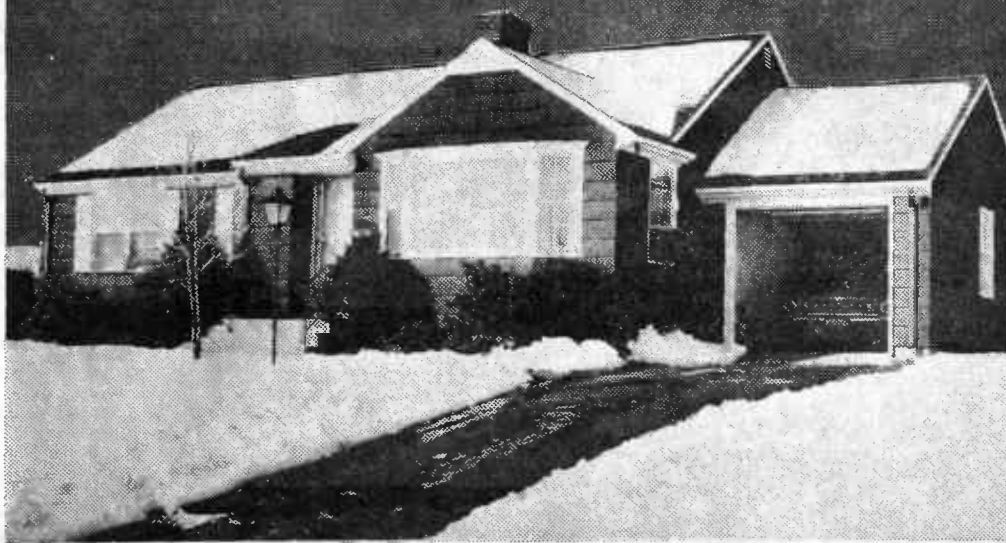

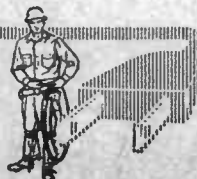
