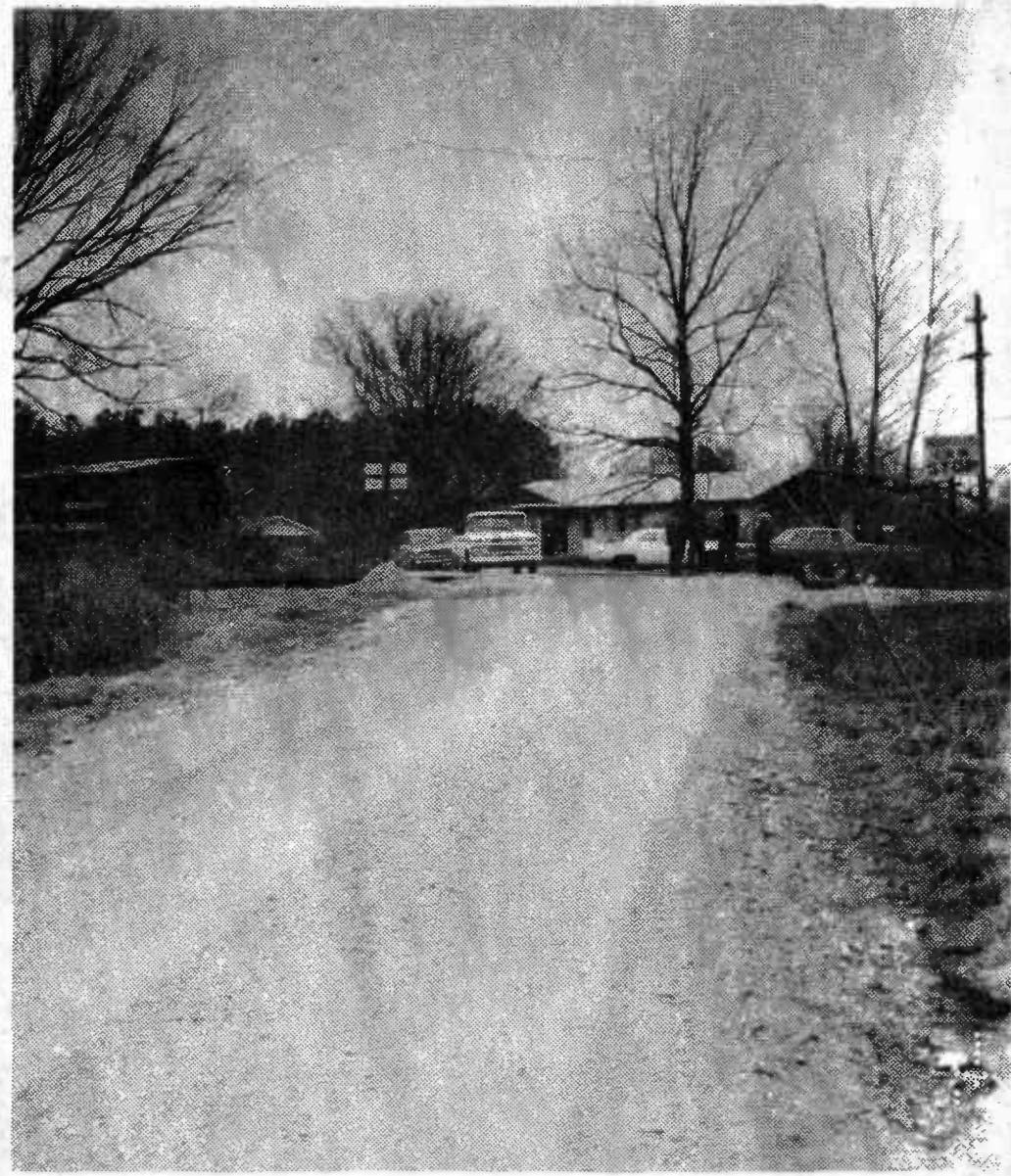


THIS IS THE PICK UP TRUCK Travis Letson was driving Monday morning when it was struck by a Southern Rail-

Fatal Accident at Walker Switch

Travis Letson, age 45, of Iuka, was fatally injured Monday when his pickup truck was struck by a freight train.

The crash occurred at mid-morning at Walker Switch about a mile east of Burnsville. Mr. Letson was alone in the vehicle.

Mr. Letson was foreman of a work crew that was doing clearing for Frank Brinkley on farm property immediately north of the scene of the accident. Others in the work crew were N. C. (Red) South and Ozene Phifer.

Mr. Letson had already been on the job but was returning to Iuka to pick tools to make repairs on a tractor. He was driving his truck but at the time of the accident, it was on lease to Mr. Brinkley.

Exactly what happened to cause the tragedy is not known. However, trainmen reportedly speculate that Mr. Letson was

close to the track when he looked up and saw the approaching train. It is supposed that he applied the brakes, causing the truck to skid about three feet, stopping on the tracks. He had gotten out of the truck and was attempting to run from the tracks when the train made impact. The pickup was dragged about 75 feet.

Funeral services for Mr. Letson were held Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Cutshall Funeral Home with Bro. Jones of Jackson, Tennessee and Bro. Sidney Whitehead of Iuka officiating. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Travis Letson was a four-year veteran of the Army, having done combat duty during World War II. In that time he was decorated with four battle stars and was holder of the Medal of Honor.

Military rites were held at the graveside with a 12-man rifle team from Columbus Air Force base honoring Mr. Letson with a 21-gun salute. The military ritual was complete with the sounding of taps and the folding of the American flag which was presented to the deceased's widow.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Azeline Letson and three daughters, Paulette, Janice Sue, and Barbara Ann of the home at Route 3, Iuka; one sister, Mrs. Marie Sharp and one brother, Charlie Letson, both of Paden.

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LEAN DAYS FOR THE CIVIL RIGHTEOUS

When the Civil Rights Bill of 1966 was defeated, the Negro Revolution crested. That is, the Negro Revolution as we have known it. Since then, so the Negroes themselves tell us, there has been a definite slow down in financial support by White liberals. As a result, the rioting has stopped.

What is going on, now, it seems to me, is a regrouping, a reassessment, but not really a lessening of intent or interest; that overt militancy has run its course is no harbinger of better times. Hardly. Those who are behind this thing are never convinced and they never give up. Today's peace in the streets, therefore, may be more properly likened to the quiet of a hurricane's eye than to waning strength.

They will strike again, I am convinced of that, because their objective—massive race mixing—has not been achieved and to achieve it they must continue the fight. White people will never mix, voluntarily. Moreover, ideology aside, the movement won't be allowed to die because there are too many people involved who have a vested interest in its survival. It is their bread-and-butter; they won't quit, they never had it so good.

Even so, their ranks, indisputably, are in disarray. People send me things that tell the story.

For instance, I have at hand a begging letter, dated November 15, that was broadsided by the NAACP Legal Defense Fund. It is a lulu. See how it begins: "Alabama threatens to penalize its poor. Overwhelmingly they are Negro." Those two eye-watering sentences comprise the letter's opening paragraph. It goes on from there, telling how George Wallace, in refusing to sign a peremptory "statement of compliance" issued by HEW, will, in that refusal, penalize the colored folks of Alabama. And won't you please send money—"generous" money—so that the NAACP may continue its "court battles".

What an invaluable property to their cause is George Wallace. They dangle his scarified figure as they might a bogey man and, Lord, how the money rolls in. Or did.

And here is another letter. This one from the Black Power boy, himself, Stokely Carmichael. Stokely doesn't date his epistle and that makes a person believe he is going to crank it out, week after week, until the law of diminishing returns sets in.

Stokely says his outfit, SNCC,

is being attacked from all quarters" and asks the question: "Why have so many powerful forces in white (sic) America joined to drive SNCC out of existence?"

Should I tell him?

In any event, Stokely says he wants you to send a contribution, today. There is a note of urgency in Stokely's appeal and nothing—despite his advocacy of Black Power—to indicate he would look askance at receiving money from the white devils.

And the third evidence, here in my hand, is a news clipping, dated Nov. 22. This one embodies a plaintive cry from James Meredith. James says he has been banned from speaking at a "Mississippi Day" rally to be held in Columbus, Ohio. (If it isn't "Alabama", it has got to be "Mississippi").

And who banned James? James says it was Roy Wilkins, he of the NAACP. James says the situation is "intolerable". James says, for the past three-and-a-half years, whenever he had a speech scheduled, Roy had set up committees "to call people and tell them not to come".

And that, you know very well, is dirty pool.

And Roy? Roy Boy, when he was told of James' complaint, at first said he had no comment to make on anything James had to say. Then, as word got around, he seemed to have a change of heart. At press time, Roy Boy had lifted the ban.

So, having overplayed their hand, they are beginning to hack at one another. As the shekels and kopeks fall off, they lose their pompous dignity—and further weaken their case. Good.

But, as I say, I believe it to be a temporary situation. The Negroes, themselves—the Carnichaels, the Wilkins, the McKessicks, the Kings, and such—have never been the masters in their own houses. The NAACP, for instance, has always been headed by a "white" person, never a Negro. Such "white" people are the brains of these outfits and though their puppets, since the defeat of the civil-rights bill, have lost their cool, the puppets, in time, will pull themselves together. They will or they will be replaced.

And I think that to be the probability. I expect a new organization to emerge, one with a different emphasis, a new front with new faces, but with the same old rallying cry: Two, four, six, eight—everybody integrate.

The war will go on.

Need For Objectivity On TV

As Americans look back over the November elections, they may find themselves considerably disturbed by the character of television "reporting" on election night. This reporting already has caused much discussion.

Indeed there is much evidence to indicate that electronic journalism has a long way to go in matching the objectivity of printed journalism in the United States. In the November 8 television coverage, some candidates were declared winners while people were still going to the polls. The abundance of computer predictions, not all of them correct, proved confusing to the public.

Aside from this aspect of the situation, many viewers felt that a number of television commentators displayed considerable personal bias in their comments on the returns. As usual, the conservative candidates took a beating from the commentators. Some commentators indicated by their words that they regard the election of conservatives as a dark day for the United States. Other commentators resorted to mournful or sneering facial expressions to convey the same message.

It is very unfortunate that news coverage on television cannot be strictly impartial. If a station wants to issue a broadcast editorial, it is free to do so in a comment frankly labeled an "editorial." But the networks should refrain from mixing news and opinion on programs that are supposed to be objective news presentations.

This has been a problem for a number of years. The Southern States have taken an especially hard beating in an unfair manner. Though hundreds of splendid schools have been built in the South in the last 20 years, the networks have a habit of showing Southern schools at their worst. In any part of the country, it is possible to find public officials who are deficient in grammar or personal style. Yet the networks seem to have a penchant for finding Southerners who make a bad appearance.

It is not just Southerners who have suffered from slanted video coverage. The television coverage of the Viet Nam war almost seems designed to please Sen. J. W. Fulbright and other bleeding hearts. Many of news programs on Viet Nam present American soldiers as brutal. The horrors committed by the Communists aren't brought home in sufficient detail. The pro-Communist Buddhist monks, who set fire to themselves, were presented virtually as religious and national heroes, whereas in fact

many were fanatics who had been doped.

This is not to say that many broadcasting executives don't strive for objectivity. Individual station owners often are dissatisfied with the network news fare they must serve. Yet the station owner or manager has a hard time insisting on higher standards of electronic journalism. A handful of "big name" commentators have a free-wheeling role, and ride their political hobby horses as they please. Nor is it a question of balance between conservatives and liberals for conservatives never have been welcomed on the networks. The result is that television news commentary has been a single outlook field.

A good case can be made, however, that the networks have everything to gain and nothing to lose from eliminating political bias from video news. The liberal commentators have had great freedom to air their bias on broadcasts, but the public these days is too well educated to buy the liberal line whenever it is offered. Indeed, the abuse heaped on conservative public figures seems to have backfired. It did no good, for example, for liberal commentators to keep referring to Ronald Reagan, now governor-elect of California, as an actor. The voters of that state were not in a mood to dismiss an intelligent candidate simply because of the type of work he engaged in a decade or more ago. News sources in the U. S. are varied, and printed journalism gave the public the record of Mr. Reagan's views on public issues. Then the voters made up their minds.

The American people, sophisticated in the ways of opinion-shaping, have developed a powerful resistance to liberal brainwashing, as the Nov. 8 elections made clear. If the brainwashing attempts are not eliminated in the near future, the results could be even greater gains for conservatives in 1968. Nevertheless, it is disturbing to see an important freedom—the freedom enjoyed by television broadcasters—used without an adequate sense of responsibility. If printed journalism can maintain high standards of responsibilities, the networks should be able to do the same thing. But the proof of the pudding will be the curbing of the liberal commentators who substitute opinion for news.

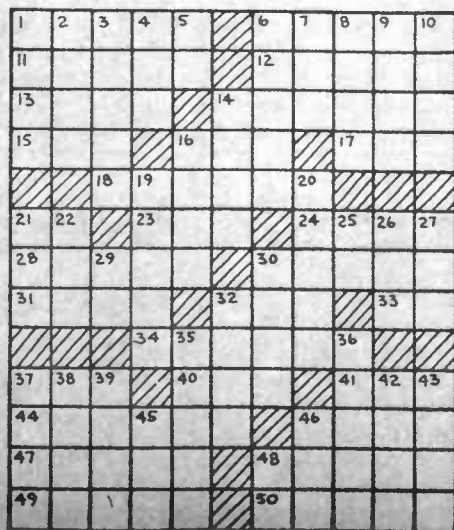

"The Challenge of Change" was the theme. They studied their present and future responsibilities and opportunities as educators in agriculture and fa-

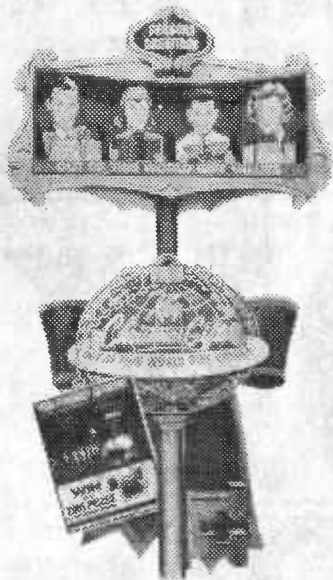
mily living, according to W. M. Bost, Extension director at Mississippi State University.

Following a short prayer by Kirk Brown, a delicious dinner of pork barbecue was served, Bert Goodloe style.

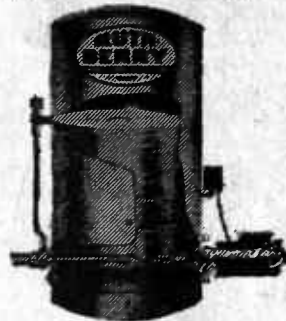

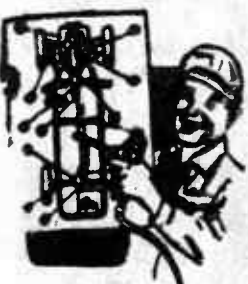

1967 Cotton Quota Vote Will Be By Mail

The cotton quota vote this year is the 1st time cotton growers have voted by mail. Carl A. Sartain, Chairman, Fishington Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation County Committee, said today:

Ballots were mailed from the ASCS Office in Iuka Friday, December 2nd. The voted ballots must be returned by mail or in person by Friday, December 9.

Instructions were enclosed with the ballot telling how to handle the ballot after having voted it. It is very important that these instructions be followed if the vote is to count.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum vote yes for the 1967 upland cotton crop, growers who agree to reduce their cotton acreage below the effective farm allotment will have available a program that offers loans, price support payments and diversion payments. Marketing Quota penalties will apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm. On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the Quotas, then there will be no penalties applicable to the 1967 upland cotton crop, no domestic allotment program providing price support and diversion payments. Only price support loans to farmers who do not exceed their acreage allotment will be available at 50% of parity. Acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the 50% price support.

Cotton Research and Promotion Order

Cotton producers will receive two ballots to be marked and

mailed to the ASCS County Office during the period December 5 through December 9.

On ballot (a blue ballot) is on Marketing Quotas for the 1967 upland cotton crop and the other ballot (green ballot) is to determine whether a research and promotion order should be issued for Upland Cotton. The two ballots are entirely separate although both ballots will be mailed back in the same envelope.

The program will be financed through assessments of \$1.00 per bale from Upland Cotton producers to be collected by cotton handlers designated by the Cotton Board. Collections from any producer who did not wish to contribute would be refunded upon written request. Assessments would start at the beginning of the ginning season for the 1967 crop.
