Our Library Facilities

Have you, by any chance, visited the Iuka Library recently? To be a little more specific and to the point, let me ask, have you been in the library during or immediately after a heavy rain? If you have, then you know the deplorable condition that exists. If you haven't, may I pass this information along to you?

During and after a rain, water covers the floor up to an inch in depth. Seepage from Front street on the higher ground continues to pour water into the library long after the rain stops. Needless to say, with this continuous saturation, books are becoming damaged to the extent of uselessness.

Fortunately, there is a group of interested citizens, headed by Dr. Kelly Segars, that is attempting to do something to improve these conditions.

Dr. Segars met with the Iuka Mayor and Board of Aldermen at their regular meeting this month and was given assurance that money will be appropriated to help build a new library. In the meantime, the library will be moved to the Selective Service building next to the Episcopal Church on Eastport street.

Dr. Segars states that matching funds from the Federal government are available to build new libraries with local participation being 40 percent to 60 percent furnished by the Federal agency.

"I deeply appreciate the cooperation and willingness of the Iuka Board of Aldermen in this effort," Dr. Segars stated. "They are approaching this library problem in the same forward and progressive manner they have done a number of other improvements in our town. I wish to commend them on their successes in moving the garbage dump, in opening up new streets, in creating new parking areas, and in building new sidewalks and a new sewage disposal system. All of these are wonderful improvements and I am certain that, by working together, we can build a new library," the doctor concluded.

A suitable location will be sought for this new facility. Meanwhile, everyone is urged to give this project their very serious consideration.

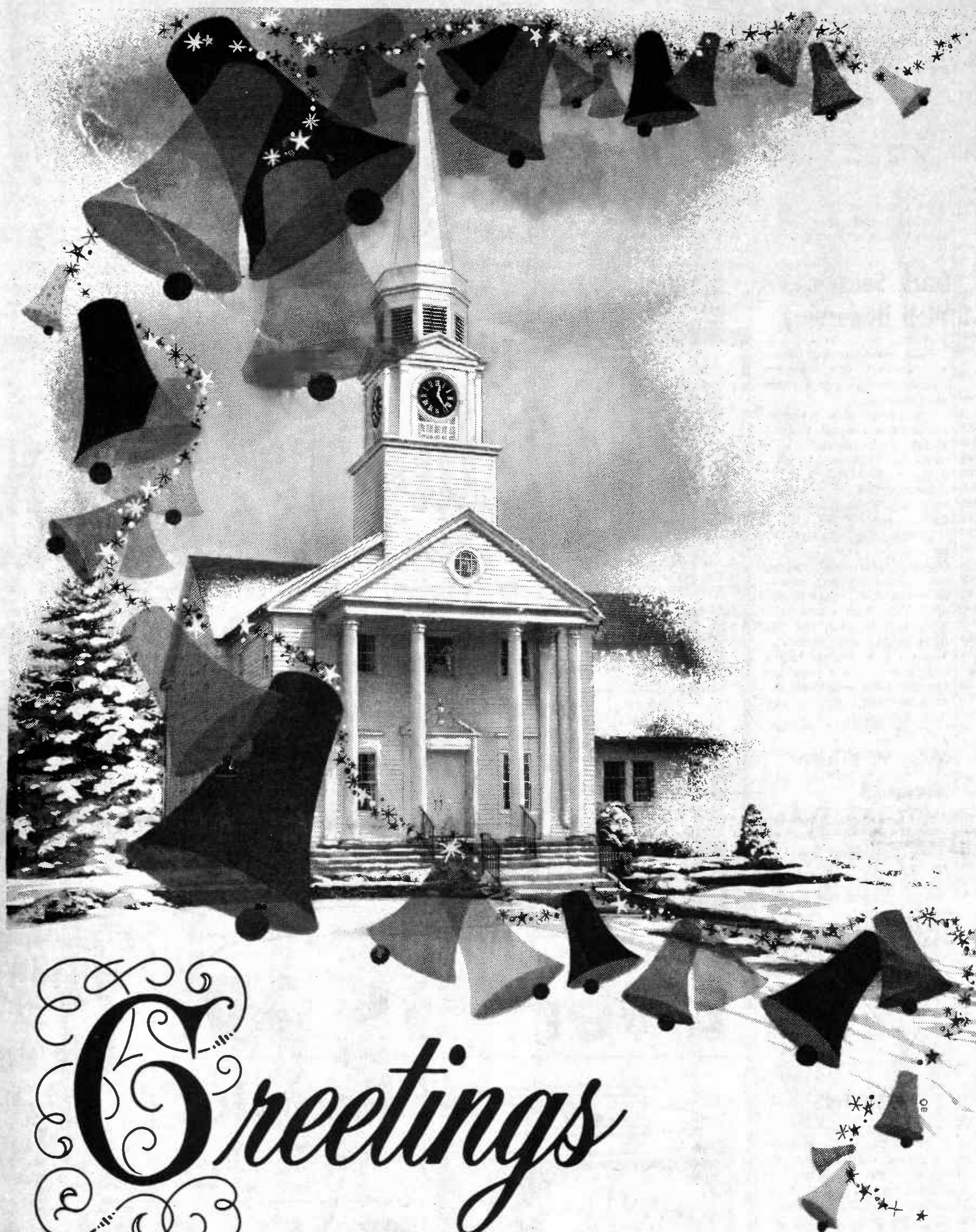
John P. Scruggs

Duck Season Is Well Underway

Duck Season is well underway; and with this year's fine crop, hunters are enjoying some good shooting.

The season will be open until January 8, with a daily bag limit of four ducks — total 2 — of these may be mallards; 2 wood ducks; or 2 canvasbacks. The possession limit is 8. Shooting hours extend from ½ hour before sunrise to sunset daily.

There's plenty of public land for hunting these high-flying travelers. Three state management areas list ducks among the game available: Sunflower Wma near Holly Bluff; Red Creek WMA near Wiggins; and Wolf River WMA, near Poplarville. There is also excellent hunting near most of our reservoirs. Look for ducks near Sardis, Grenada, Arkabutla, Pickwick, and Ross R. Barnett.

FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS and other Respiratory Diseases

Annual Health Check-Up Is One Big Safeguard Against Dreaded Disease

"Every individual has within his reach one big safeguard against cancer," said Dr. John G. Archer, Greenville, president of the American Cancer Society, Mississippi Division. "That safeguard is the annual health check-up."

"In no other life situation does the saying 'an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure' carry more significance," he stated.

In stressing the importance of having a regular health check-up by a physician at least once a year, Dr. Archer said that a complete physical examination can detect many different signs that might mean cancer. A physician needs only his eyes, ears, hands and a few simple instruments to perform this examination.

"As a general rule," said Dr. Archer, "the examining physician checks the heart, lungs and blood pressure. He takes sam-

ples of blood and urine for microscopic study. He inspects the body surfaces and easily accessible areas for swellings or lesions and examines areas where there are lymph nodes. A chest x-ray is also a desirable part of the routine checkup," he stated.

Dr. Archer stressed that it is extremely important to go to a physician immediately if any of the following seven warning signals are present and persist for as long as two weeks:

1. Unusual bleeding or discharge.
 2. A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere.
 3. A sore that does not heal.
 4. Change in bowel or bladder habits.
 5. Hoarseness or cough.
 6. Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing.
 7. Change in a wart or mole.
- "While it is very hopeful indeed that there are now 1,400,000 Americans alive who have

been cured of cancer," Dr. Archer, "all people responsible about cancer — half of those who die of cancer today. We are now aware of three. The urging everyone to get a regular health check-up is a warning signal. It could be concluded.

"Whatsoever Things"

The sixth Beatitude is this, "How blest are those whose hearts are pure, for they shall see God" (NEB).

It is a marvelous age that you and I are living in. Science has developed many new and exciting helps for us. Among the newest and certainly among the most beneficial helps that have been developed recently is the plastic heart. We have heard a lot about it and it's use lately, but there is another story behind the plastic heart that is more important than the heart itself. That is the story of the man who has worked hard to make this one-time dream a reality, Dr. Michael DeBakey.

Recently the newspapers carried this story about Michael DeBakey that will tell us an awful lot about the man. "Dr. Michael DeBakey, renowned heart specialist from Houston, Texas, gave this assurance to seven-year-old Linda Criggs of Pittsburg. The second grader wrote to DeBakey recently when coal miner Marcel DeRudder, in who a partial plastic heart had been inserted, died suddenly seven days after the operation. She said, 'We are sorry that the man died and hope the next person will live longer.' Then she asked: 'Does a plastic heart have love in it?' 'A plastic heart does have love in it, a very great deal of love,' Dr. DeBakey wrote back. 'It isn't the kind of love you're thinking of. It isn't Mr. DeRudder's love. His own heart had that kind of love in it. Your heart and my heart have that kind of love in them. The love in the plastic heart is the love of many people who love other people & don't want them to die just because their hearts are not strong enough to keep beating. So these people worked

all day and often all night to build a heart that will help people live longer. They work hard and they worry. If you can think of how much love there would be in hundreds of hearts, then that is how much love there is in a plastic heart.' DeBakey concluded: 'When you grow up you will understand how very much love that is.' "

One cannot read that news release without having his heart moved with tenderness. Dr. DeBakey himself is a man who works 18-20 hours a day helping other people. To know that there are people like him who are dedicated to the healing science renews one's trust in humanity.

Neither can you think along these lines without your mind going back nearly two thousand years and picturing Jesus standing on the mountain teaching. We hear Him say, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." And the pure in heart have been seeing God ever since that day. No, we do not see Him with our physical eye, but we can see Him and His love manifest in such people who give themselves to the healing of the suffering of mankind. Sometimes we aren't as kind or as thoughtful as we should be to those men of the medical profession who work tirelessly relieving the suffering of others. We kinda take them for granted, as we do the grocer, banker and merchant. And we miss a chance to really be genuine when we do.

We need to show our appreciation more toward the medical profession. Jesus was Himself so closely allied with it that He got Himself nicknamed "The Great Physician." He Himself was constantly healing the

hurts of men, not only the spiritual hurts but the actual physical hurts also. The doctor is a dedicated man, and we humans have a much better life because of his dedication. It gives us a sense of the Divine to be around the dedicated doctor who has trained himself over a long period of time to relieve suffering. "Blessed are the pure in heart." "Yes, the plastic heart has love in it." Wouldn't it be grand if all our hearts had as much love in them?

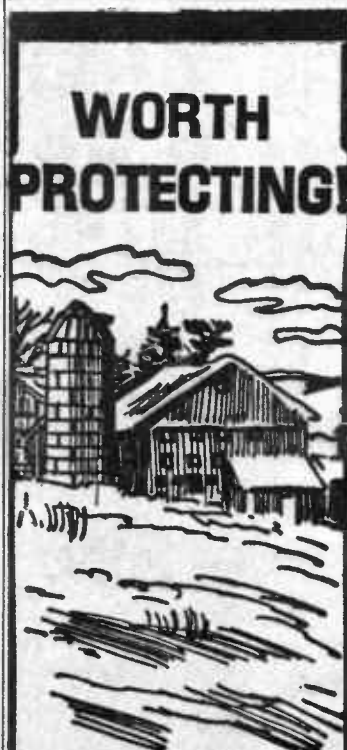

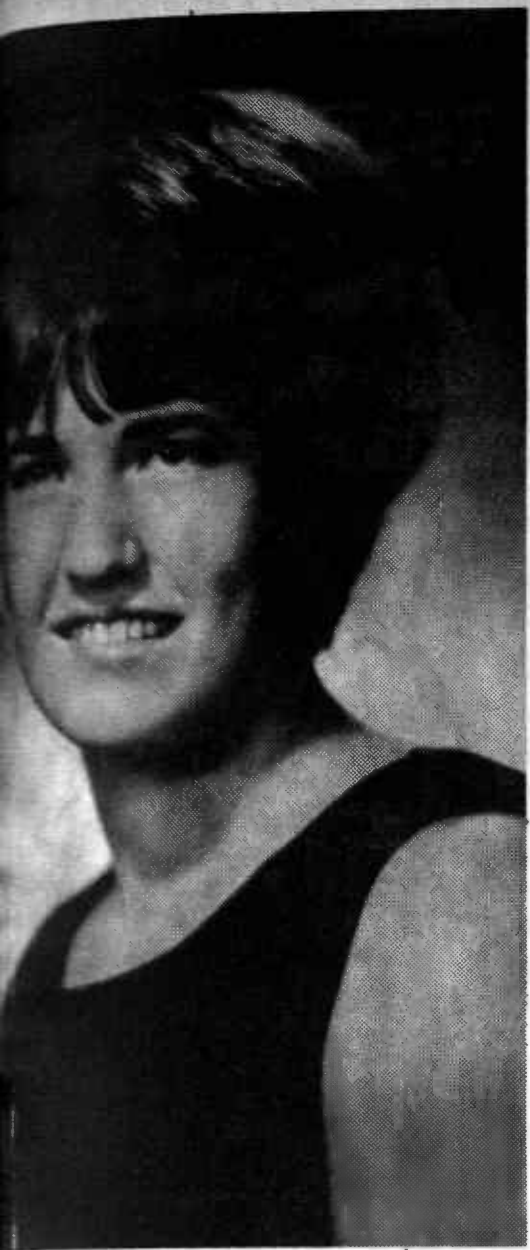

Notes Of County Home Economist

By all means, go ahead and consider an electric knife for that special person on your Christmas shopping list. It can be used to slice many types of food, such as bread, cake, fruit and vegetables, as well as meat and turkey or chicken.

You will find electric carving knives that come in plug-in and cordless (battery) models. They consist of a handle that holds the motor or batteries, stainless steel serrated blades (usually two), cord, cases, and possibly a recharging storage rack.

These knives slice quickly and easily with only the effort of holding and guiding the knife.

As you choose a knife, select a handle that is easy to grip and hold in a cutting position. If you can conveniently do so, let the person who will be using it most often, select the handle that is most comfortable to his hand.

Other points to consider as you select the knife include: Are the blades easy to attach? Does it have controls that must be held on "on" position to slice? It should. Does it have a locked "off" position?

If you want to use the knife in several locations, the cordless model is the best selection. Check for a storage holder or recharging rack that will fit conveniently in your kitchen.

Plentiful Foods

As you do your December grocery shopping, watch for favorable prices on broiler-fryers, grapes, winter pears, raisins, pork and canned salmon. All these foods are on the plentiful foods list for this month.

Shop for Safe Toys

Part of choosing toys is remembering the age of the child who will play with it. What is

safe for the six-year-old may be very dangerous in the hands of the less experienced, less dexterous three-year-old.

Electrical toys should bear the Underwriters' Laboratories label. Toy movie projectors should be equipped with safety film. Toys for the very small should have a non-poisonous paint job, smooth edges and no small parts that could be pulled off and swallowed.

Particularly dangerous is the removable eye that is stuck into a stuffed animal by a screw about a half inch long. If a child swallows it or gets it into his lungs, it can obstruct breathing or perforate organs, causing severe infection or death. Mother, remove these kind of eyes

and embroider in new eyes on stuffed animals.

Certain types of plastic will burst into flame even at some distance from a fire. Others break into razor sharp, jagged pieces that may cut the child. Even the doctor and nurse kit may be dangerous if you are not careful that the child does not refill his play bottles with

real medicines.

If your youngster receives his first electric train, give him careful safety instructions in just how to operate his new toy.

Supervision and example are important if children are to form the safety habits that will protect them as they use their Christmas toys throughout the year.

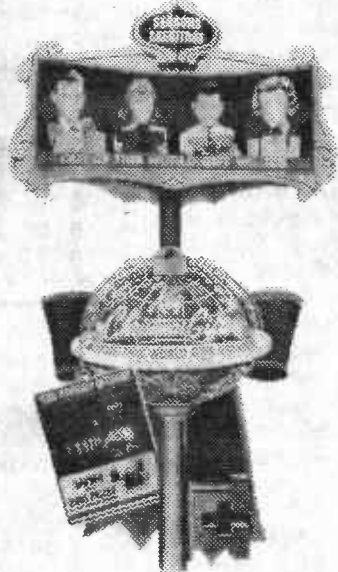

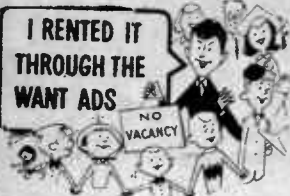

CORINTH MANUFACTURING TO BUILD NEW PLANT

Plans have been announced by G. A. Valerius, manager of Corinth Manufacturing Company, for the construction of a new 41,250 square-foot plant in Corinth's Industrial Park. Valerius emphasized that the new plant would operate in addition to the present plant at Corinth. He said the combined employment of the two buildings would reach upwards of 400 when complete operation is reached. The company, a division of Salant Corporation, in New York City, manufactures men's outer wear. The employment will be divided equally between the present plant where some 150 are now working and the new plant.

Nov. Records Show Average Is High For Rainfall

November rainfall averaged 3.7 inches across the Tennessee Valley, a quarter-inch above normal, TVA reports.

This was the fifth straight month of above-normal Tennessee Valley rainfall, after a long period through most of 1965 and early 1966 when unusually dry weather prevailed. Throughout this past five months the heaviest rains generally have been in the upper half of the Valley (east of Chattanooga), where they averaged 4.5 inches in November.

Highest total for November on the TVA network of gages was 9.90 inches at Haw Knob, Tenn., followed by 8.70 at Clingman's Dome, 8.50 at Rosman, and 8.18 at Highlands, all in North Carolina.

Lowest November totals were 1.50 inches at Belgreen, Ala., 1.60 at Bon Cave, Ala., 1.80 at Cavvia, Tenn., and 1.84 at Pickwick Dam, Tenn.

Vehicle Inspection Reminder For 1967

New Year's resolutions are not made by many people any more, but one thing still remains that motorists have to do anew each year — motor vehicle inspection. Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong expects the 1967 program to be the biggest yet. "The licensed stations have inspected almost on million automobiles and motorcycles this year," he said, "and we are planning for an increase of as many as 50,000 vehicles for 1967."

R. L. Morgan, director of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division of the Highway Patrol, reports that there are 1250 repair shops and garages presently licensed to conduct the annual safety checks. Under his supervision are thirteen agents throughout the state to aid the inspection points in their service to Mississippi motorists. "In 1967 we will check the same safety items as this year," Morgan stated, "which includes brakes, lights, steering, tires, windshield wipers on the driver's side, horn and glass." The color scheme of the new stickers is to be black lettering on a magenta background.

The inspection fee is still \$1.25, plus the cost of any needed repairs for the vehicle to pass the examination. General Birdsong is urging motorists to prepare their cars early. The items to be checked are necessary to the safety of drivers as well as passengers.

The inspection points will average checking almost 12,000 cars per day throughout the state. This figure will rise sharply if motorists continue to wait until near the end of the inspection period. "We hope that the people will take advantage of the ninety day opportunity and avoid the last minute rush. The stations are dispersed over the

state so that everyone has ample time. All of us want to see cars we drive sound," concludes Birdsong.

Keys To Higher Dairy Profits

Higher production per cow is the first consideration in building higher dairy profits. To get this higher production, it is going to take better breeding, better feeding, better records and an adjustment in herd size to fit feed and labor available.

First, breed every cow that is worth milking to a bull of the same breed and raise all normal

heifer calves. Good replacements are hard to find and when available, are high priced.

Second, feed every cow to her highest efficient production. Begin with home grown forage. Records show that dairymen feeding silage made more money than those relying on hay as the only stored roughage.

For better records, enroll the herd in DHIA and use the records for better management.

For greatest efficiency, the herd size must be balanced with labor and feed available. A small, well-managed herd is economically competitive today. The small or large herd poorly managed is not now competitive and never will be.

Winter Grazing Care

Good care will pay off in fence and winter grazing areas. Don't neglect them!

Two things ruin many areas of winter grazing. These are overgrazing and bogging.

When the growth is grazed off take the cows off. If there is growth still on the area, but the land is wet, keep the cows off until the land dries out.

Hog Lice and Mange

Hog lice pierce the animals' skin and suck blood, causing the skin to become thick, cracked, tender and sore. Injury is most severe during the winter.

Common mange of hogs is caused by a tiny mite that burrows under the skin making thread-like tunnels up to one inch long. Mange caused the hogs to rub and scratch. The skin around eyes, ears and along the top of the neck and back becomes scurfy, inflamed, scabby, raw and cracked.

Mange is highly contagious and may spread rapidly through a herd. Both lice and mange can be easily controlled with lindane. Treatment is inexpensive

County Agent Percie Stricklen reports that efforts are being made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture Plant Pest Control to locate possible imported fire ant infestation in this county.

The imported fire ant is a serious pest to cattlemen and farmers as well as a nuisance to the general public. Anyone who possibly thinks that he has found fire ants is asked to report this to the county agent's office and he in turn will contact Plant Pest Control personnel. Suspected fire ant mounds will be checked by USDA workers and if fire ants are present, they will be destroyed without cost to the land owner.
