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Jacinto Political Rally

Supreme Court dge Claude Clayton will pre over the dedication ceremony of the restoration of the old Jacinto Courthouse, Saturday, July 15, in conjunction with a big political rally hting state and district candidates.

Sponsor of the event is the Jacinto AC Club who invite voters and political candidates from the ld "state of Tishomingo" t attend the big even. The Jacinto Courthouse was the hub of activity in the early days of he state. Located in Alcorn County, it formerly included jurisdiction over what is now Alcorn, Tishomingo and Prentiss counties.

Invitations have been accepted by former Mississippi governor Ross Barnett, John Bell Williams and William Winter, all gubernatorial candidates. In addition to these, state candidates for other offices and the district candidates will be speaking to the crowds. If time permits, local candidates will be allowed to speak.

According to O. T. Holder, Jr., president of the Jacinto Foundation, concession stands will be operated by the Jacinto ACDC with 50% of the profits being contributed to the Foundation. This will apply to all other booths from the other counties concerned in the event. He noted that Rural Community Development Clubs from Tishomingo and Prentiss Counties would be conducting concession stands.

W. B. Depoyster, a member of the steering committee, and local postal employee at the Iuka Post Office, urges residents of the area to attend this important event. A special effort is being made by the Jacinto residents to make the day a big success. In addition to the political attraction, the historical value of the event will provide a major interest to the crowds attending.

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WHY WALLACE
CAN WIN IN '68

Some weeks ago, constant readers will recall, I gazed deeply into my crystal ball and foresaw the possibility of George Wallace being elected President. That set off a number of contrary-minded writers, Evetts Haley, Jr., among them; Haley being the managing editor of The Fort Smith (Ark.) Advertiser. His words, as those of the others, were brave enough but his article, as most of those I have seen, seemed to carry a plaintive overtone, much like the kid who pled with old Shoeless Joe Jackson, following the Black Sox scandal. "Say it ain't so, Joe."

Ah, but it is so, Evetts: George Wallace can win and unless the Republican party does precisely as you say it must, "comes up with some stirring new music", George Wallace may win.

But to expect stirring music from the Republican party is to expect an aria from a corpse. Who is to sing the hymn of inspiration, may I ask?

As I recall, I went to some pains to detail the rise of the Republican party and how its rise might be likened to the rise of Wallace. Some read into that my likening Wallace to Lincoln — and that didn't sit well, not with Republicans.

If what I wrote gave that impression, it wasn't what I had in mind. I wrote, plainly, I thought, that the burgeoning emotional issue, in 1860, was with Lincoln. Today, in a reverse flow of emotion, it is with the man from Alabama. That is all I meant, though, since the subject has been opened, there is a striking similarity between the Little Judge and the Rail Splitter. Both gained popularity as "men of the people"; the principal appeal of Wallace is, as it was with Lincoln, to "the common man".

But none of that is the heart of the matter. The core lies in Wallace's ability — as I am glad to see more and more of his critics concede — to throw the election into the House of Representatives.

Conceding that, their argument then contends the House will give his chances because, in the House, "men like Wilbur Mills and O. Albert ... prevail".

Poppycock. In the House, Republicans prevail.

Mark this. If the 1968 Presidential election is settled by the House of Representatives it will be, in the doing, settled by an

unfettered organization. That is so for two reasons.

First, our political parties for too long, as is generally acknowledged, have not been representative of the people. What is a Democrat? A Republican? There is no ideologically acceptable definition for either party and there has been none since 1952, when Taft was decapitated. The sham — and it is a sham — is maintained by the in-power party because it owes its dominant position to the way things are presently constituted. That party's well being is served by maintaining the status quo, so it is maintained. This attitude prevails no matter which party is in The White House. That party, being in power, having the power, keeps it so.

But once it becomes certain that neither major party can cast a majority vote in the Electoral College, today's artificial lines, those that serve the "in" party, will lose their reason for being. By the inability of either party to name a president, neither party will have decisive power, and the House will be without a master. It will be an unorganized mess, much as would be an army if all the enlistments expired on the same day.

Mills and Albert would be the first to tell you, in such a case, they would have no control over the members. Old allegiances would have been nullified. The King is dead, long live the King.

The other reason lies in political payoff. When Hamilton, in 1800, agreed to use his influence with House members to elect Jefferson and defeat Burr, Hamilton did so only after Jefferson, his mortal enemy, had agreed to every demand Hamilton made upon him.

Once the election gets into the House, believe me, the presidency will be up for grabs. Any of the three eligible nominees may come home with the bacon. Who promises the most — not party lines — will be the determining factor. If Wallace's forces are forced to vote for a Republican nominee — that is a coalition but not necessary in that order — they will do so only after being promised a slice of Southern goodies, the impeachment of Earl Warren, say. And that, all of it, is a consummation devoutly to be wished for.

AFTER THE SUMMIT

The summit meeting between President Johnson and Premier Kosygin of the Soviet Union already is being hailed by some people as a forward step in easing the cold war tensions of recent weeks. This, clearly, is an optimistic view for which there is no real supporting evidence.

It is true, to be sure, that it is better for the two superpowers to talk than to fight. But the American public should not imagine that the full, complete story of the highlevel talks in a small New Jersey college town will be revealed. No one can tell what deals or secret understandings may have been arrived at by Messrs. Johnson and Kosygin.

Generally speaking, summit talks have not been good for the United States. President Roosevelt held a summit meeting with Dictator Stalin at Yalta, and the tragedy flowing from that meeting is still affecting the lives of millions of people. Eastern Europe — half of the historic civilization from whence Americans came — was included in the Russian political empire because of Roosevelt's giveaway at Yalta.

No doubt Mr. Johnson, who has a reputation as a tough wheeler-dealer, is a much better negotiator than Mr. Roosevelt. Nevertheless, the possibility of secret agreements is frightening. The traditional American position with respect to international agreements is that the U. S. believes in open agreements openly arrived at. A summit meeting, however, is a closed meeting. The public statements issued in its wake surely gives no one any information concerning what was discussed or agreed upon.

Another danger of a summit meeting is that it produces in the United States a state of euphoria — a feeling of well-being, that is. Serious conversations between heads of state carry the suggestion of reasonableness, whereas the records show the Russians are anything but reasonable. Communists don't regard negotiations as a series of straightforward discussions but as an opportunity for militant advance toward their goals. Communists, after all, don't even believe in telling the truth. For them, "truth" is simply a handmaiden of communist interests.

The American people would be wise to bear in mind, in the post-summit era, that the pattern of Soviet behavior is settled. This October, the Soviet Union will celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the October revolution. The government of the USSR is made up of revolutionaries. Kosygin, at age 15, joined the Red Army & fought in the revolutionary war. In the 1930s and 1940s, he was a faithful servant of Dictator Stalin and was made a member of the Communist Party's all-powerful Central Committee. In short Kosygin, like the other members of Russia's ruling team, remains a dedicated communist warrior against the capitalist world. These men no doubt hope to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the October Revolution with a spectacular political victory over the United States, which is the symbol and

heartland of modern capitalism. Americans should never forget they live in an era of communist challenge and that the enemy is stern and ruthless. For the last several years, liberals have been saying that communism has mellowed and that peaceful accommodation should be reached with the Kremlin. The troubles in the Middle East show that the Russian bear is the same as before. The Soviets continue to foment strife and work for disorder. They still are trying to deny the West, the energy resources of the oil-rich Middle Eastern countries.

No, the cold war isn't over. The liberals have been wrong, as usual. From the Middle East to the Far East, the Russians are trying, as Krushchev said some years ago, to "bury" us.

This Soviet goal won't be set aside by some parlor talk in a New Jersey College town or by an exchange of toasts. News of the latest summit should not be allowed, moreover, to deter conservative, realistic citizens from exposing the follies of liberal programs, such as recognition of Red China or trade therewith.

The Russian-inspired conflict in the Middle East should be held up as a true and faithful indication of the real aims and methods of the communists in the seventh decade of the 20th century.

Serve Brisket Hot or Cold In Sandwiches

Cook corned beef and you'll have wonderful meat for several meals. Beef brisket, cuts from

the round and other cuts may be corned. Corned beef can be served hot as an entree with vegetables or as a sandwich. Chilled, it goes well with potato or macaroni salad, as an accent for cold meat platters or again, as a sandwich. Some meat processors are making corned brisket so tender

it can be roasted, maintains Reba Staggs, meat authority. However, much of the corned beef is still of the less-tender type which must be covered with water and simmered until tender. Add no salt to corned beef when simmering in water, for "corned" means cured in brine, a salt solution. Simmering temperature is 185° F. which is below boiling. Corned beef usually comes in sizes of four to six pounds. The time per pound for cooking is 40 to 50 minutes or a total of 3 to 4 hours when cooking in water. Keeping the temperature below boiling will cause less shrinkage and make carving easier. Cooling the corned beef in the cooking liquid makes the meat more juicy.

Hot Weather--- Hazards To Health Now

Winter is commonly the time for colds and flu and sneezes, but there are some diseases and accidents that do their worst in hot weather.

The American Medical Association points out that some of these are obvious. Sun strokes and heat strokes are more likely to occur in July and August than in January. Too much exposure and too much exercise in the hot sun may produce sun stroke. Prolonged excessive heat, either in or out of doors, can cause heat stroke. The symptoms are the same and in either case it is important to keep the victim cool and call a physician at once. Heat prostration also is caused by getting overheated, but instead of developing a high fever, the victim becomes cold and clammy. Prompt medical attention and keeping the patient as warm as possible are important.

Sunburn has hospitalized many a vacationer. Everyone should know that gradual exposure to the sun, beginning with a few minutes a day, is the recommended course. But many of us forget to watch the clock and to take precautions against sunburn in the excitement of the first day at camp or at the seashore.

The bacteria that cause diarrhea multiply much faster in lukewarm foods, and it's important to keep cold foods in refrigeration and to keep hot foods hot.

Swimming is fine exercise and also is good for cooling off on a hot day. Those with sinus or ear troubles should be careful about swimming. Swimmers should make certain that the water is safe from pollution. A clear mountain stream may look attractive. It also may be loaded with germs. And there still are cases of typhoid and dysentery from drinking untreated water. Campers can disinfect water by boiling or by commercial disinfectant tablets.

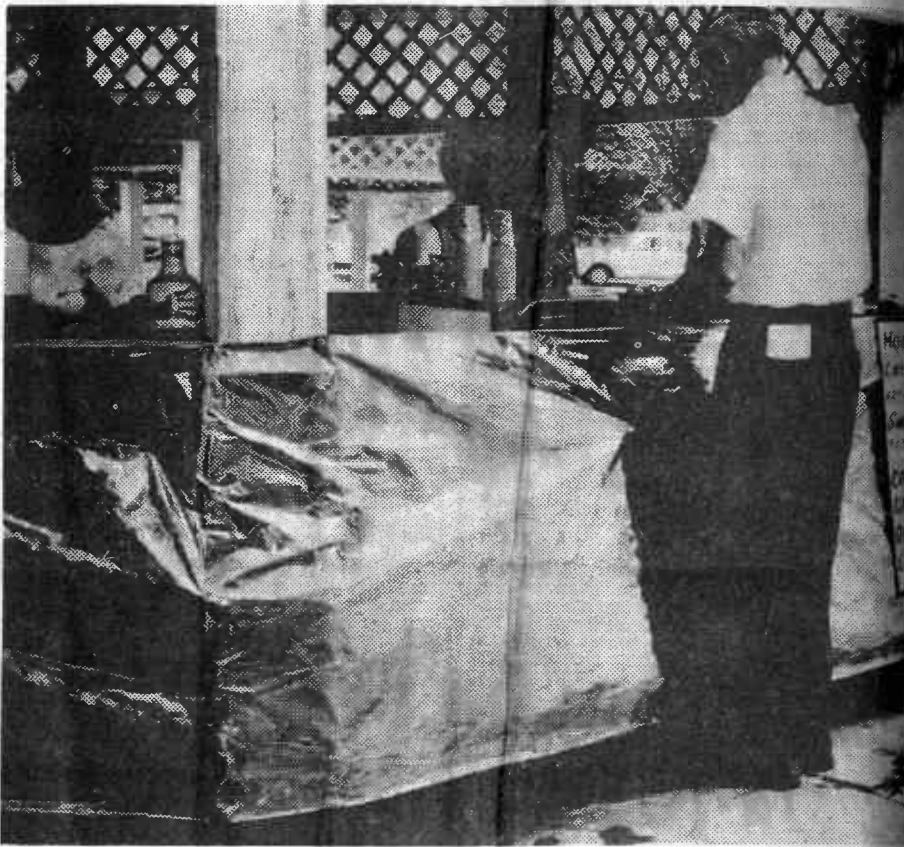
If there are horses or cows around, there is likely to be tetanus. Tetanus (lockjaw) is very serious. It can be prevented by injections of tetanus toxoid. If your family hasn't had tetanus boosters recently, get your shots before going to the country.

Flies, roaches, mosquitoes and ticks are troublesome in the hot months. Insecticides and screens usually can keep them under control. In tick country it is essential to make a close examination after disrobing to remove all ticks.

Notes Of County Home Economist

by Nellie R. Horton

How you take care of your clothing in the summertime can make a lot of difference in your summertime comfort. Cleanliness and regular care can make your clothes more comfortable, and make them last longer.

Heavy, humid air makes clothes feel damp and clammy if you wear them more than once without laundering. If it is not clean, lingerie and other apparel can't absorb perspiration, which serves to "air-condition" the body as it evaporates. As new perspiration remains on the skin instead of being blotted by your clothes, it leaves a sticky feeling. So, it is never worthwhile to wear something "just once more."

Launder your perspiration-stained washable cottons promptly after wear. If the fabric is discolored, sponge it with a diluted solution of vinegar and water to help restore the original color. Rinse well and then launder the entire garment.

Give special attention to stains caused by suntan lotion, insect repellent and other seasonal cosmetics and chemicals. Rubbing such stains with thick suds before laundering will remove more of them, especially

if you treat them promptly. Scrub grass and foliage stains with hot water and suds. If necessary, use a mild bleach on white fabric. Then wash promptly.

When fabric gloves get very dirty, wet them, rub soap or detergent into all soiled spots and roll each glove up tightly. Start rolling from the fingertips. Let them set for an hour or so, so the suds can loosen the soil. Then wash.

For washable leather gloves, work lukewarm suds over the surface with your fingertips. Don't rub. Rinse well and dry flat on a towel. While still slightly damp, massage the gloves to soften the leather. If they are slightly stiff, moisten your fingertips and work the gloves on our hands.

CAUTION: If you want washable leather gloves to remain washable, keep them clean by laundering right from the start. Dry clean-in fluid dissolves and removes their washable finish.

For a subtle aura of coolness and fragrance, add a few drops of cologne to the last rinse water after sudsing lingerie.

Keep a few ice cubes handy when you press freshly laundered cottons or linens. To prevent wrinkles, ease a cube over dried-out spots to redampen them during the ironing.

Wash often scarves that catch summer dust and absorb

hair oil and lacquer. Try the paste up trick with scarves and handkerchiefs. After washing, press the wet piece against a tile wall, mirror or over the side of a bathtub and spread it

flat with your palms. White touches on your clothing should be detachable, so you can launder them after each wearing. It will save you time in the long run

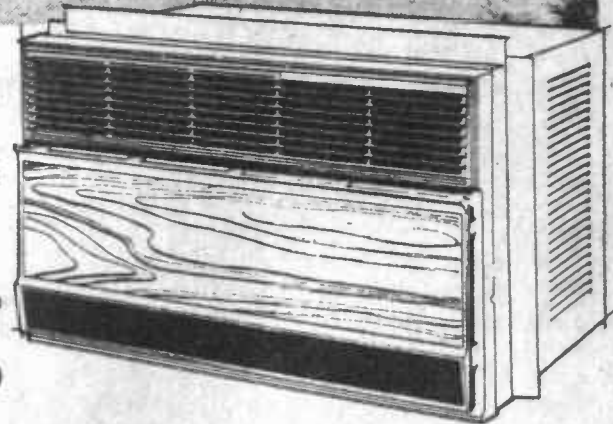

Clovers

Pick out the pasture area now where you want clovers to grow this fall. They are going to need some special attention.

Grass these areas heavily and when September 1 comes, clip off what growth the cows have not grazed off. Then spread lime. If soil is heavy, renovate.

Good stands of clovers and other legumes will use the highest rates of phosphate and potash of any other pasture crop. A recommendation for good growth is 100 pounds of each to the acre. This fertilizer can be applied anytime during the summer.

Many pastures have lost their clover and other legumes because phosphate and potash are

low. Don't let this happen to your pastures.

Another recommendation going along with fertilization is renovation, or getting the heavy sod off so that the clover can survive.

Lime

Liming soils that need the lime to correct acidity is the foundation for a sound fertility program. Where acid soils exist, yields are reduced as are profits.

You cannot look at land and tell how much lime is needed to bring the pH to a desirable level. To take the guesswork out of your liming and fertilizing programs, take soil samples and send them to the State Soils Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University for analysis and recommendations.

Dairy Breeding

Here are some breeding suggestions to help you dairymen make money.

Breed cows and heifers to the best dairy bulls available. Normally this means using the bulls offered through artificial insemination.

Make sure that you use dairy

bulls on all dairy animals, including first calf heifers. The first calf is not inferior to calves born later to the same cow. Also, the size of the calf is influenced more by the dam than by the sire.

Breed your heifers so that they will have the first calf when around 24 to 26 months of age. Make an attempt to have each cow calving every 12 months. A cow is more profitable if she calves once a year. Milk her 305 days and give her a 60-day rest.

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Hwy. No. 365 Of County To Get Construction

The Mississippi State Highway Commission awarded a contract Tuesday, June 27 for construction and paving on a section of Mississippi Highway No. 365 in Tishomingo county, according to an announcement made by Northern District Highway Commissioner Roy C. Adams of Tupelo.

This important new Tishomingo county highway project begins at a point on Highway 365 about one mile south of Burnsville and extends in a northerly direction for approximately two and one-half miles through Burnsville to tie-back into present Highway 365.

Work under the provision of this new contract includes grading, drainage, culverts, base, paving, bridge construction and erosion control items. There are 175 working days allotted for the completion of this project.

One of the bridges to be built is to carry Highway 365 over US Highway 72 at Burnsville and the other is to carry the new section of Highway 365 over the Southern Railroad.

Worham Brothers Construction Company of Corinth submitted the low bid of \$813,228.92 for this highway construction work.

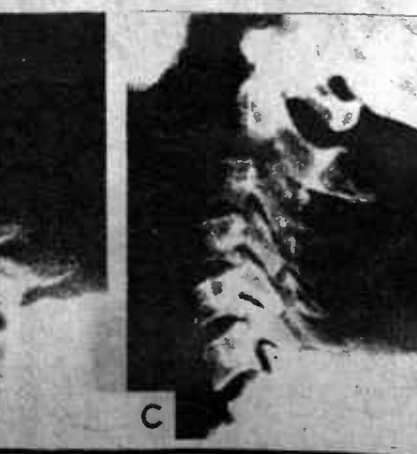
