\$200,000 Allotted By State For Park Improvements In County

A total of \$200,000 has been allotted to improvements of J. P. Coleman and Tishomingo State Parks, both situated in Tishomingo county. This sum of money furnished by the state is expected to be matched, dollar for dollar, by the federal government.

To expedite the improvements and to review the proposed expenditures of the allocations, a group of legislators

visited Tishomingo and Coleman parks Monday. Among the visitors were George Payne Cossar, chairman of the parks subcommittee of the State Building Commission and representative of Tallahatchie county; E. J. Yelverton, secretary of State Building Commission, Robert Foster, comptroller of the State Park System; and Charley E. McCoy, representative of Prentiss county. Added to this

group were Senator Cecil L. Summers and State Representative Cleston Scruggs.

Improvements at Coleman Park will include a new camping area with approximately 60 campsites, and roads and drives to accommodate campers. Other improvements will be a new boat ramp and additional boat dock facilities. Two new comfort stations will be built, one of which will include clothes washers and dryers for the convenience of campers. The new camping area will have an underground electrical system as well as a number of water outlets throughout. Each campsite will have an individual picnic table and barbecue grill. Additional improvements will include a new large picnic shelter and general landscaping of the park grounds.

Improvements at Tishomingo State Park will include a new 40-site campground area with completely modern sites, a concession building, a new picnic shelter in the Haynes lake area and a new comfort station with all modern conveniences.

Each park has been allocated \$100,000 apiece by the State. More improvements are also under consideration for the state parks in Tishomingo county.

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THE TRAGEDY
OF APPOMATTOX

There is a phrase of Shakespeare's that plays in my mind: "The evil that men do lives after them."

I write of the tragedy that was Appomattox.

And however unfashionable it may be to recall that mournful day, the fact stands: It would have been better - perhaps, for both sides - had The South won its independence.

Appomattox was more than a matter of physical exhaustion. That sort of thing can be, as it has been, overcome. What went with the wind when Lee said goodbye was the Southern way of life - and that can never be recaptured. Therein lies the tragedy.

The 19th Century North, be it remembered, measured an individual's worth by money earned or owned. It gave little value to things of the mind; recall Lincoln's social position. The few intellectuals clustered around Boston represented nearly all there was in the way of culture, north of the Mason-Dixon.

That this is so is seen in what grew out of the muscular vigor of the industrial, mercantile section of the nation. Its 19th Century personality is remembered by the phrase, Robber Barons. Such were the people who marked the land, who made of Chicago the hog butcher to the world, and of Wall Street the repository of the nation's wealth: Armour, Cooke, Vanderbilt, Carnegie, Morgan, Rockefeller, Drew, Huntington, Hill, and Harriman - and a host of others. They set the tenor of the times, the Robber Barons. The one thing that made Northern men different, one from the other, was money. One's position in life was governed so, by one's "success".

None of which is to say the South was an Athens-like land of erudition. It was not. The bulk of Southern people, in the 19th Century, as the bulk of 19th Century Northern people were poor and unlettered.

That isn't the point. It is this: In the ante-bellum South, a person's position in life, his rung, was determined not by his money but by his "breeding", and his breeding was not confined - as is the literal definition of the word - to the identification of his forebears. Jefferson Davis, as true an intellectual as this nation ever produced, came from a so-so family. Judah Benjamin, "the brains of the Confederacy", was a Jewish immigrant who, following his escape to England, became the foremost attorney in the British Isles. Edgar Allen Poe was the son of an itinerant actor. No, position in the South was

due to cultural attainment. The libraries of the great planters, those still extant, bear testimony to that. That of William Byrd, a 4,000-volume collection, was the largest in the colonies. But learning, per se, was only part of it. Equal stress was laid on honor, fidelity and virtue, on manners and beliefs. It was the combination of all these factors that made the Southern "gentleman".

And as one way of life served as the incubus out of which grew the wealthiest nation in the world, so the other was serving as an incubus full of promise of a level of cultural attainment greater than the world has ever known - and it was destroyed.

As I say, therein lies tragedy. True, out of this nation's wealth has grown a culture, one of sorts. Even so, what impresses us, today, about a painting by Cezanne or an Epstein bust is not so much the turn of the artist's hand as the price the object brings at Soothby's. The American culture, true son of its father, has money as its life's blood.

What I would say is this: Life in these United States, since 1865, has been dominated by the dollar. Out of the dollar has come what we are, a degenerating nation: Dollars, we are now learning, cannot solve spiritual, ethical, or moral problems.

Had the South won its independence, the flourishing cultural bud that was Dixie, today, would be as dominant in the land of Lee as the dollar remains north of the Potomac. As culture grew out of the dollar, in the North, so, it is reasonable to believe, wealth would have grown from Southern manners. And a land grown great on spiritual, ethical, and moral values might, in this time of uncertainty, serve as a guiding hand - North and South, alike.

As it is, the remnant of the Southern way of life that still exists, as flax among thistles, is lampooned by the philistines who have no understanding of the worth of manners or morals, or very little. They have even less appreciation of the meaning deep in the phrase, he-is-a-man-of-honor. They abjure the common civility inherent in "sir" and "m'am", and look upon a vibrant love of country and a fear of God as somehow square, even subversive.

It is a sad thing. How well Shakespeare knew the world.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Dr. Garrett, I am the Mother of an unruly teen-ager. True, he isn't a mental giant - but he isn't stupid, either. I can tell you our home is as "normal" as most. Why, then, these periodic outbreaks of delinquency?

A: The roots of delinquency are often complex but there are three major factors, one or all of which will be found in most cases. The first is bad heredity. The second is lack of home training, and the third is lack of discipline in school. If I may rule out the first two as not being applicable in the case of your youngster, that leaves the third reason. You may find your answer in the following:

The USA is the only country that has tried to educate all children as though they all had the same potential. They do not have. We know that 15-20 per cent of school children are "slow" - as you indicate your boy may be - and are incapable of learning materials beyond the elementary school. Only about 30 per cent can do really acceptable high school work, as the high schools are presently organized. And a much smaller per cent can comprehend the more difficult college courses. Yet, we treat all alike, and parents blame the school, the teachers, or the child's laziness for his failure.

The slow child will soon discover he cannot learn like the others and may retreat into himself or, as you imply is the case with your boy, the youngster may seek attention by boisterous behavior, rudeness and sullenness. The remedy, here, is a different type of school - a recognition that one's child is not "cut out" for geometry and foreign languages.



From Mrs. Jane Pippin, Kansas City, Kansas: I remember my father was a blacksmith, and a very good one. I have seen him make horseshoes, buggy wheels. I watched him shoe horses, with the forge belching black smoke as he heated them with tongs and put them quickly into the water for tempering.

CONTROL OF THE CAPE

A beneficial by-product of the closing of the Suez Canal is a renewed awareness of the importance of the sea route around the Cape of Good Hope and of the Republic of South Africa which serves as the sentinel of the West at the southern tip of the continent.

Less than a year ago, the U. N. glass palace on New York's East River rang with the angry words of Afro-Asian delegates demanding a crackdown against South Africa and its friendly neighbor to the north, the new independent nation of Rhodesia. The Johnson administration, to the distress of Americans concerned with strategic interests of the U. S., added its weight to pressures applied against the two progressive African states which are under European leadership.

Today, that same Afro-Asian majority in the United Nations is too busy railing at Israel to devote any attention to South Africa and Rhodesia. And both the United States and England are deeply concerned about the continuing flow of Middle East oil, in which South Africa plays an important role which should not be forgotten a year or two hence.

No sooner had the Suez Canal been closed than oil tankers and merchantmen loading in the Middle East were diverted around the Cape of Good Hope. Immediately, 20 British tankers were scheduled to put into Cape Town, South Africa, for refueling and replenishing. This initial group of ships however, was only the beginning of a vast movement of merchant vessels around the Cape, with hundreds scheduled to drop anchor in the South African ports of Durban, East London, Port Elizabeth and Cape Town. Approximately 1,500 ships regularly use the Suez route, and now will be using the Cape Town route. Many of these ships will need fuel, stores and

repairs at South African ports. There is a lesson here that the Western maritime nations should never forget: namely that South Africa's harbors are vital to the free world in peace and war. Imagine the results if South Africa's ports were closed to Western tankers and freighters! Many of the tankers employed in the Suez route are not equipped for the long voyage to England and Europe, without stopping en route.

And what would happen to those ships which, though capable of an uninterrupted journey, suffered mechanical breakdown? South Africa has the only major drydock on the African continent - a drydock large enough to accommodate an American cruiser or light aircraft carrier. Obviously, closure of South Africa's ports would be a disaster for the West.

The liberals in power in Washington and London should have thought of this several years ago when they began campaign of abuse against a loyal wartime ally. These liberals have attempted to promote revolutionary regimes throughout Southern Africa, thereby ignoring the strategic interests of the U. S. and England. If a Castro or Lumumba were in power in Pretoria, one can be sure that South Africa's ports would be closed in sympathy with the revolutionary Arab nations. Indeed suppose the

Hay From Pastures

Got surplus grass in your pastures? Many who fertilized well in early summer do.

It is better to cut this surplus grass for hay, than it is to let it stand and mature. As long as the mature grass is standing, it will make no more growth this summer.

Even in cutting hay, do not cut too close to the ground. Leave enough cover to prevent the hot sun from drying up and injuring the stubble.

Keep your permanent pasture grasses well managed and the old growth down. This way they will make good production. Cows produce well on tender, fast growing permanent grasses, not on tough, maturing grasses.

Soil Acidity

A recent survey showed that 40 percent of soils in the hills area and 37 per cent of the delta soils have a pH of below 5.5. Yield potential for all crops is reduced when the pH is below

5.5. For legume crops, including soybeans, the pH should be maintained above 6.0.

Liming the soils that need lime will correct soil acidity and make for higher yields and higher profits.

The only way to know how much lime is needed by your soils is to have a soils test made. See your local county agent for instructions on taking good soils samples, soil boxes, mailing cartons, and information sheets.

Seed For Fall

Now is a good time to book your seed needs for fall planting. This will give your seed dealer time to get the seed and have them on hand when you need them.

Select Gulf or Magnolia ryegrass seed. These varieties have become very popular for both early and late plantings and for planting in mixtures with wheat or oats.

For white clover Louisiana S-1 and Regal have given good results. Book your needs now of these, plus any vetch or wild winter peas you will need.

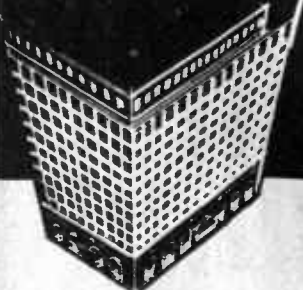

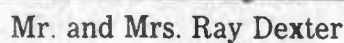

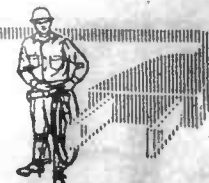
