kogee, Okla., and Rita Moore, Tulsa, Okla., were charged with the \$30,000 burglary in May of the People's Bank and Trust Co., of Tupelo. They were also charged with conspiracy in the June burglary of the Holmes Bank and Trust Co., in West, Mississippi. State charges pending include possession of concealed weapons, illegal liquor, burglary tools, narcotics and stolen money. The couple must also face charges in Tishomingo County courts of possessing burglary tools, narcotics, and concealed weapons. Sheriff James Bishop revealed that the extensive investigation began June 23 after local officers received reports of disturbance in the Goat Island area. Since this time it was disclosed that with the assistance of skin divers, a bank safe and safety deposit boxes were discovered some 20-feet off shore at Goat Island near where the articles had been pushed off the bluff.

Coach Resigns From Staff After 6 Years

Richard Thorne, football coach at Iuka High School, has resigned his post after 6 years in this coaching position.

According to Coach Thorne, he will be employed at Pebblebrook High School, Mableton, Ga., near Atlanta, as backfield coach. He and his family will make their home in nearby

Smyrna, Ga., and are making preparations to move within the next few weeks.

The Pebblebrook School has an enrollment of 1500 students in high school alone. With a coaching staff of three, the team boasted 94 members out for the fall session in 1966. The season's football practice begins on August 14 this year.

Coach Thorne related his reason for leaving as better opportunities for himself and for his family. This summer he is working on his Master's degree at Georgia Tech which is situated near Mableton.

Coach Thorne came to Iuka from Red Bay in 1960 and built a most impressive record in football here. During the past four consecutive years, Iuka High School has won 35 games and lost only 5. During this time, the Iuka team won 2 Highland Conference Championships. During Coach Thorne's first year at IHS, the home team won only 3 games. The second year, 8 games were played and Iuka won 3, tied 1, and lost 4. The third year the team made progress as hard work began to show in a 5 to 5 record. By 1965 IHS was undefeated for the entire season and named Highland Conference Champs.

Coach Thorne has been in football for 21 years. During the 7 years he coached here in Iuka, he also served as science teacher. He holds a Master of Arts degree in Junior College teaching under a new program at Mississippi State University. Coach Thorne noted that the prospects for Iuka this fall lead him to believe that Iuka will have one of the better ball clubs in the conference.

DENNIS WATER SYSTEM RECEIVES "GO - AHEAD"

Dennis Water Association of Tishomingo County has received the go-ahead from the Public Service Commission to construct on a \$194,000 system when ready. This information received Commission Chairman D. Snyder of Eupora. Snyder stated that upon completion

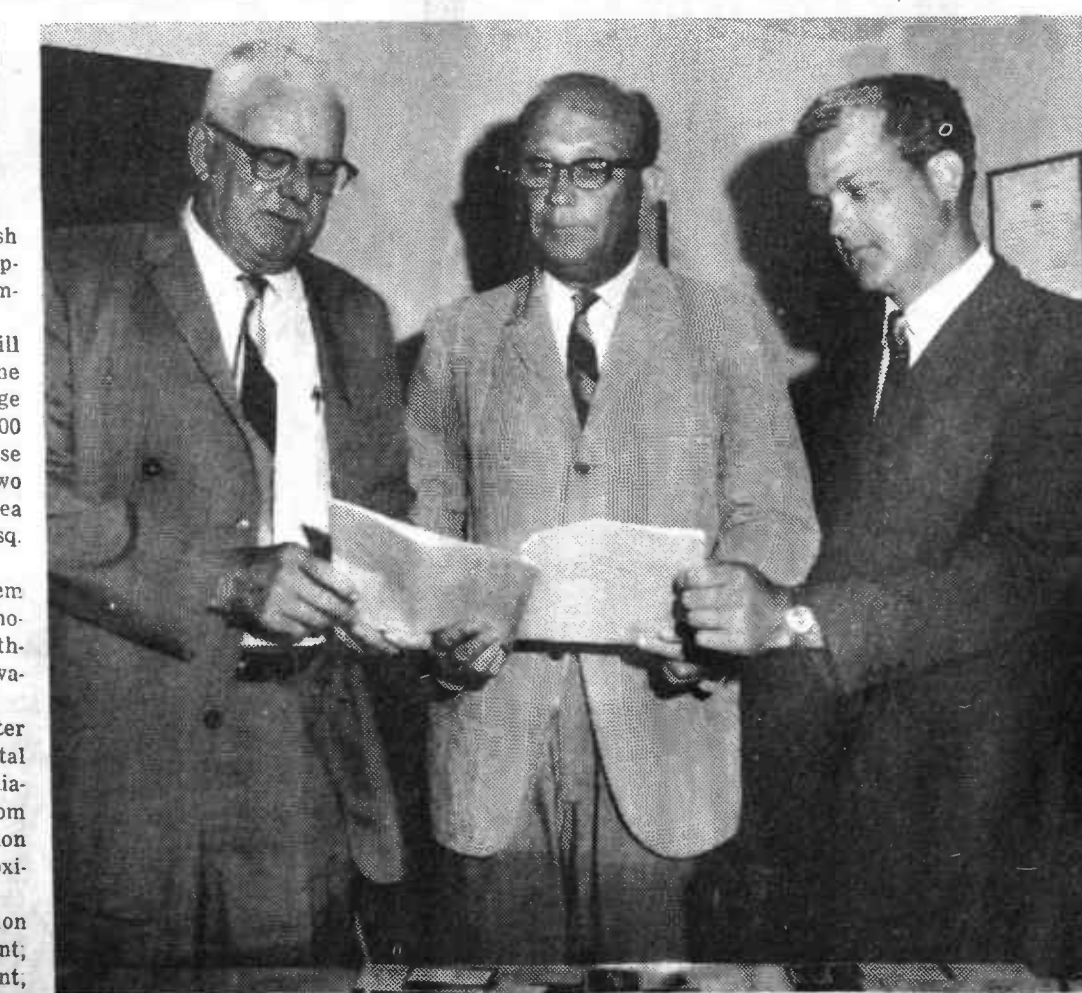
this water system would furnish a modern water supply of approximately 180 customer-members.

The basic water plant will consist of two wells, one 100,000 gallon elevated storage tank and approximately 96,000 feet of water main lines. These lines will vary in size from two to six inches. The overall area consumes approximately 9 sq. miles.

Snyder stated that the system will be designed to accommodate up to a 50% growth without the addition of another water well or storage facilities.

Certification of this water system brings the state's total to 237 non-profit water associations holding certificates from the Public Service Commission at an investment of approximately \$35,295,000.00.

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VIRGINIA TURNCOATS

Let me tell you of a tragedy that has taken place in my home town, Richmond, a political tragedy. It may be of interest as a harbinger of things to come where you live.

On July 11, Richmond's Democrats nominated a Negro as one of its eight candidates for a seat in the historic Virginia House of Delegates, the oldest legislative body in the world. The nominee's name is Dr. Ferguson Reid, but his nomination is not the tragedy. Fact is, as an individual, Dr. Reid, by anyone's lights, is well qualified to become a member of the Virginia legislature. The tragedy lies in the "support" he received from six erstwhile Byrd organization, middle-management people.

It isn't as though their support were needed. Dr. Reid tore out a nomination for himself two years ago and missed being elected — if you will forgive the phrase — by a shade. Since then, with gathering speed, Richmond has been turning black — it is now nearly 50 per cent colored — so, Reid, this time out, and as the vote disclosed, was a shoo-in. He needed the support of the Turncoat Six in the same degree he needs leprosy.

Why, then, did these products of Harry Byrd's once-upon-a-time, massive-resistance organization affix their names to a letter of endorsement for a Negro?

The answer to that gives one a sinking feeling.

Yet, it is inescapable: They did so, at whatever cost, in an effort to maintain their dominant political position — as cynical and shameful a bit of political hypocrisy as a person can imagine. They sent the word to Lyndon: "Richmond is ripe to be taken and we are the boys to do it."

One can only hope, if Dr. Reid manages to win in November, he will laugh in their collective faces. By their unneeded endorsement they dirtied his otherwise clean campaign. They dirtied him, is what they did, and in doing so lost for themselves, in one degree or another, the position of respect their names carried in this faltering community. And in doing so, they lowered by a cubit the self respect of other members of the subjective thing known as the Byrd organization.

For all of its local aspects, this is not a local story. Rather, it is a local manifestation of a Southwide malaise.

Months ago, now, I did two pieces on the methods being used to destroy the South's Southernness. I reported that

the Johnson Administration, by the use of tax money, is either rewarding or not rewarding localities, depending upon how well they comply with Great Society edicts. I pointed out that the Administration uses the banks, preferably, as its sounding board. If the power structure of a Southern community indicates its willingness to become an "All-America" city, to go along, the money flows through local banks. Otherwise, things are not so good. There are ways.

Now, those who make up the central core of power within a community — that is, those who control local purse strings — rarely, if ever, allow themselves to be publicly identified with political shenanigans. They have minions for that sort of thing. Such are these six, "rising" young Virginians, all of name and position, sons, in some instances, of people who, over the years, were Byrd stalwarts. When Richmond people — that is Byrd people — see such names as theirs appended to a letter endorsing a candidate, they are prone to accept that candidate.

Such was the means devised, in my town, to indicate the willingness of Richmond's power structure to sing along with Lyndon: Endorse a Negro. Some such thing will be turning up where you live.

If there is a tear to be shed for the shambles that is Conservatism in Virginia, shed it for the goat in this development, shed it for the man Harry Byrd, so long as he lived, relied upon, the man who "raised" these six, the chairman of the local Democratic central committee, a man named J. Clifford Miller. All six turncoats were his proteges, his top lieutenants, those he hoped would stand as he has stood, those he hoped would carry on when he, as Byrd himself, went out of the picture.

They repaid his confidence, his years of honing, by keeping their design from him; their coats were turned before he knew it. Now, he sits along, chagrined, bearing the brunt, the public onus, of something beyond his control.

You might watch for that, too, where you live. It is all part of a package, a despicable package.

A GOAL FOR YOUTH

As respectable citizens concern themselves with the problem of the "beatnik" and "hippie" element in the nation — young people who divorce themselves from community and national responsibility, it is well to bear in mind the words of a distinguished leader who has had wide experience in molding youngsters for service to country.

The leader referred to is Lt. Gen. Victor H. Krulak, USMC, commanding general of the Fleet Marine Force Pacific. Gen. Krulak recently said of the former "beatniks" who have come under his command:

"As to their beards and long hair and sweatshirts that will stand up by themselves, I have no concern about that because that's very superficial.

"Many of the same boys who are distinguishing themselves in the highest order of heroism in Vietnam today once had long hair, dirty sweatshirts and sandals. It doesn't take very long to give them a haircut and a bath.

"The important thing, tho, is to give them something to aim for — a target, an objective. Once you do that, you will have no more trouble with them. I have no concern whatever about their ugly appearance, repulsive though it is to me, because I know it is superficial."

The counsel given by Gen. Krulak makes a great deal of sense — youth must have a goal. The Marine Corps, like the other armed services, gives youngsters a goal — something to aim for when they are in uniform. But it also is important that everything in a youngster's bringing up contribute to a vision of a full, rich, responsible life as a citizen.

Unfortunately, young people are not always provided with a worthy goal or with the right examples. The three branches of the U. S. Government should play a prominent part in furnishing young Americans with examples of what is good, but these branches in recent years often have provided disastrous illustrations for action.

President Cleveland once said that the people should support the government, and that government should not support the people. But recent administrations, under the influence of "liberal" ideas, have taken a contrary position. They have played down the concept of self-reliance and personal independence. It is no wonder, therefore, that the "beatniks" and "hippies" have flourished of late.

The Great Society of the Johnson administration, for instance, utterly fails to give youth a proper goal toward which they can strive. Indeed the Great Society, continuing the social concepts of the Kennedy New Frontier, teaches young people that government owes them a living. The Rent-care program, which involves a government rent subsidy, is a horrible example of government in action in the worst way. Young people, noting this and similar programs, learn the lesson that Big Government will make up for the failure of individuals and will carry along those who have no inclination

to do their part in the community.

In the past, young Americans had held out to them a vision of a society in which everyone was expected to carry part of the load. Youngsters knew from their very early years that they had to work hard to get ahead. Now, however, it is very difficult for youngsters to get jobs. Lawmakers have created rules whereby employers may not offer jobs to youngsters in their early teens. If they do so, the employers are subject to fines or imprisonment.

The fantastic truth is that the "liberal" administrations have been anti-work. They have promoted welfare programs at enormous expense, often without requiring that the recipients engage in any work for the community. Indeed the federal aid-to-dependent children program has caused many unwed mothers to make a career of illegitimacy. The War on Poverty has offered comfortable nests to people who otherwise would have to go to work for private employers.

Is it any wonder, therefore, that the nation has a "beatnik" problem? Of course it isn't. The "liberal" leaders of our country have failed the young people of America. Instead of giving them the goal of independence through hard work, they are providing them with the goal of becoming a drone at public expense. Clearly, it is time for a change.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Dr. Garrett, what causes a child to be difficult? Tell me something about this.

A: Bad heredity may cause the untoward behavior that makes a child "difficult". When it accompanies low intelligence — it doesn't always do so — we have stupid, irresponsible behavior. When high intelligence or normal intelligence is accompanied by antisocial personality traits, we have the leaders in delinquent activities — petty thieves, embryonic criminals. Children of this sort are hard to handle; there is no certain way and no certain remedy. Counseling, friendliness from admired teachers, attention from a coach will often aid such children.

Even in a normal child, poor home training — or no home training — will usually lead to bad manners, rudeness, lack of behavior standards. Again, the child without religious training may have no standards of right and wrong. Trained teachers with a modicum of patience can work wonders with these children. Often they "catch on" quickly. Tactful discussions with parent groups also pay off.

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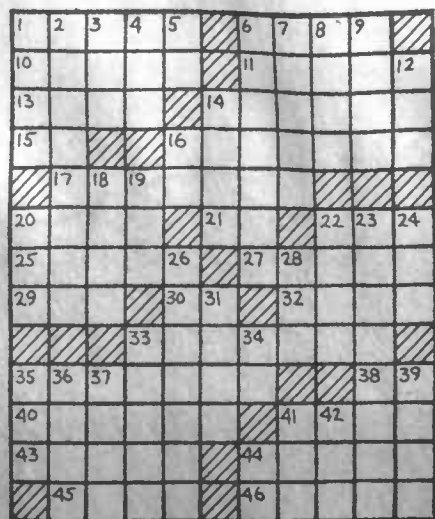

The Midway Rural Community Club met June 27 at the Community Center for its regular meeting.

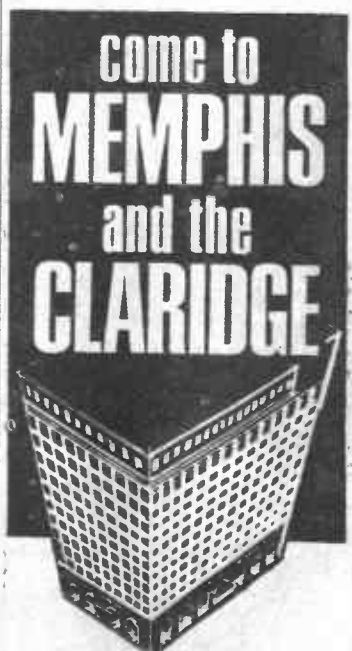
L. E. Skinner, president, called the meeting to order and presented A. C. Ryan, who gave the devotional.

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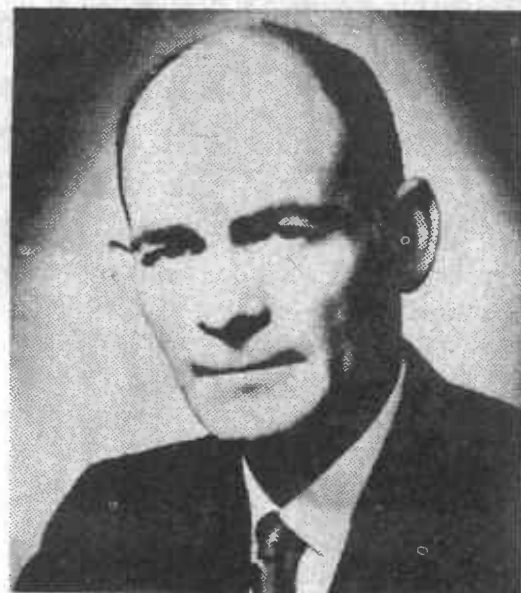

"Uncle Joe" Recalls Early County Events

Joe P. Davis, a quick-witted, spry southern gentleman of ninety, has recently returned to his home in Dawson, Texas, after a visit here with relatives. Mr. Davis was a house guest in the home of Mrs. C. C. Biggs, a niece.

In the late 1800's, Ben Davis and his family, including his son, Joe, lived on what is now the Roe Adams Place. Joe's grandfather, Reuben Davis, lived on what is now the Clayton Parnell Place. On his mother's side, his grandfather, Wesley

Smith, lived on the new Lowery Dean place. At that time, one of Joe's older brothers, George, taught school at Jacinto, when it was the county seat of the Old State of Tishomingo.

In relating events of the years, "Uncle Joe," as he is affectionately called, told of his brother, Albert Wiley Davis (father of Mrs. C. C. Biggs) who first adapted the idea of the screw press in making cotton into bales in this area. He also made the first cotton plan-

ter used in this section of the country.

An older brother, Frank Davis, established the Harmony Church. At that time it was a rough log building, and was on the Frank Smith place at New Salem.

In 1891, Joe Davis, then just a young man, left here with his father and family and several brothers and their families for Dawson, Texas, in search of more land.

This began a colorful life for the former Tishomingo County man with occupations as a farmer, running a grocery and the funeral and undertaking business through WWI, and then taking a hand in the ginning business, finally ending with working as a plumber.

Uncle Joe Davis was the first Mayor of the town of Dawson. He was elected to the office 4 different terms, thereafter. He served as Justice of the Peace around 20 years, and helped to build and is a charter member of the 1st Methodist Church there. He served as choir director of the church and has been singing in the choir for over 70 years. In addition to his work in the community, Uncle Joe enjoys playing the organ, piano, saxophone and banjo.

One thing the old gentleman enjoyed having his listeners marvel over was the fact that he had never had anything stronger to drink than grape juice and he's never smoked a cigarette. In all of his 90 years he's only had the doctor with him one time for illness. "Probably the one thing that's caused me more trouble has been the corn on my little toe," he laughed, adding that he wouldn't know what it would be like to have a headache!

Uncle Joe has three sons, all living in Texas, and all born on the same day of the month. They are L. C., Hubert C. and Roy C.

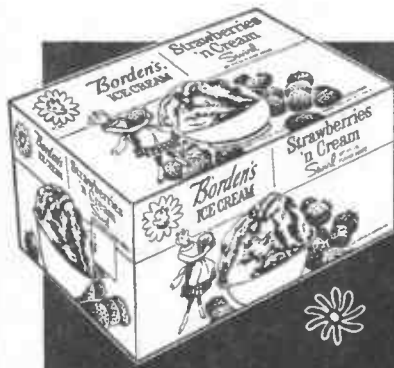

Motorcycle Operation Has Regulations Too

A word of warning about some aspects of summer fun has been issued by General T. B. Birdsong, Commissioner of Public Safety. Parents of motorcycle riders should pay particular attention to legal requirements for the operation of cycles and other motor driven vehicles.

"The same requirements that regulate automobile drivers apply to the operation of motorcycles," he said. These requirements include a driver license for the operator, a license tag, and the annual motor vehicle inspection from a licensed inspection station," he added. By law a person is required to be at least fifteen years of age to obtain a driver license. The state financial responsibility laws also apply in any accident in which a motorcycle is involved and there is injury or property damage in the amount of fifty dollars or more.

"The summer vacation season

usually brings an increased use of motorcycles on the streets and highways of Mississippi," stated Patrol Chief A. D. Morgan. "Law enforcement officers are charged with the responsibility of enforcing these license requirements in addition to the other laws applying to traffic in the state," he concluded.

Order Pine Seedlings Now From Forester

The Mississippi Forestry Commission expects to have the following species of tree seedlings available for distribution this year to Mississippi landowners: Loblolly, slash, longleaf, and shortleaf pines, yellow poplar, sweet gum and cottonwood (cuttings); small amounts of sycamore, bald cypress, black locust, green ash, tupelo gum, red cedar and catalpa.

The normal period for receiving orders is from July 1 to October 15. Normally the nurserymen will start shipping pine seedlings in December (generally, about the 15th), and hardwood species January 15th.

The prices per 1,000 seedlings are:

First 1,000 per landownership — no charge

Above 1,000—\$4.50 per thousand

Delivery charge —\$.35 per thousand or \$.20 per 500 (hardwood species only).

According to B. K. Killebrew, Area Forester, when seedlings are to be picked up, no delivery charge will be made. Each landownership may receive 1,000 seedlings free by paying delivery charge. Land owned jointly by two or more persons is eligible for only 1,000 free seedlings. Landowners owning property in more than one county are eligible for only 1,000 free seedlings.

Place your orders early to insure delivery. To place your orders, contact your Area Forester or an employee of the Mississippi Forestry Commission, he added.

4. Hiring of trained personnel to assist farmers in proper control and fertilization of catfish farms.
5. Intensification of a coordinated program to control and eradicate fire ants in our state.
6. Continuation of the provisions under the present law whereby livestock is not on the ad valorem tax roll.
7. Retention of the policy under which most of the farm machinery used in the production of raw agricultural commodities does not come under the ad valorem or sales tax laws.
8. Exemption of future legislation from the ad valorem or sales tax of some items of machinery, such as combines and cotton pickers, that do not now get this allowance.
9. Continuation of the present treatment under the sales tax laws as now given for fertilizer, seed, feed, and insecticides and extension of this allowance to include tax charges that are possibly being made to farmers for the storing, cleaning, handling and processing of grain and other planting seed owned by them.

"Whatsoever Things"

Strange, indeed, are some of the methods man has taken to find forgiveness. Take the case of Gopal, a Hindu Fakir in Pakistan. He made his hands useless by wearing tight metal bracelets on his arms, making them immovable. And he did it, he said, to atone for all the sins committed by human hands!

Another strange method of finding forgiveness is that of the Lawran Monastery in Mongolia. Each year a monk is designated as "The Devil" and he must vanish from the area forever, supposedly bearing all the sins of the community!

Francis Phyle, a Swiss soldier, was so upset over killing a man in a duel that he lived in a cave of the Burr Woods of New Jersey for 24 years — without ever building a fire for warmth or meals. And all this was to atone for what he considered a murder.

Then there is the monastery built to atone for a murder. King Henry II of England built it in Chamille, France in 1178 in the belief it will expiate the murder of Thomas a Becket if it sands for 1000 years!

Another strange method of finding forgiveness is the case of Sheik Muhammad bin Isa of Kajgaon, India. He sat with his eyes tightly shut for 12 years to atone for turning his back upon a mosque for a single instant!

Perhaps the strangest method ever taken of finding forgiveness was that of a man named Andrana of Madura in Southern India. To atone for an act of disrespect to his teacher, he walked from his home to the holy town of Badriwath and back — a distance of 3,200 miles! He made the entire journey to Badrinath by falling to the ground, rising and then falling again. And on the return trip, he never once sat or reclined for a period of four years!

These I have mentioned are some of the strangest methods of searching for forgiveness on record. But may I share with you the surest method of finding forgiveness on record. A Carpenter gave it to us. Here is what He said, "Forgive, and you will be forgiven." Six little words that tell us how to find

what so many have searched for so long. "Forgive, and you shall be forgiven." Forgiveness doesn't come, you see, by doing some strange or awful act to atone for our mistake. Forgiveness comes when we forgive. No matter what we may perform to find it, we will never experience it until we practice it. "Forgive, and you will be forgiven."

The greatest Example of living by this rule was the Man Who gave it. Although He needed no forgiveness Himself, He hung by His limbs on a crude, cruel cross and uttered an eternal prayer to the One Who is able to forgive all. "Father, forgive them," He said. "They know not what they do." And they didn't. But He did. And that is the reason He said, "Forgive, and you will be forgiven."

We will never find forgiveness through any other method except forgiving.

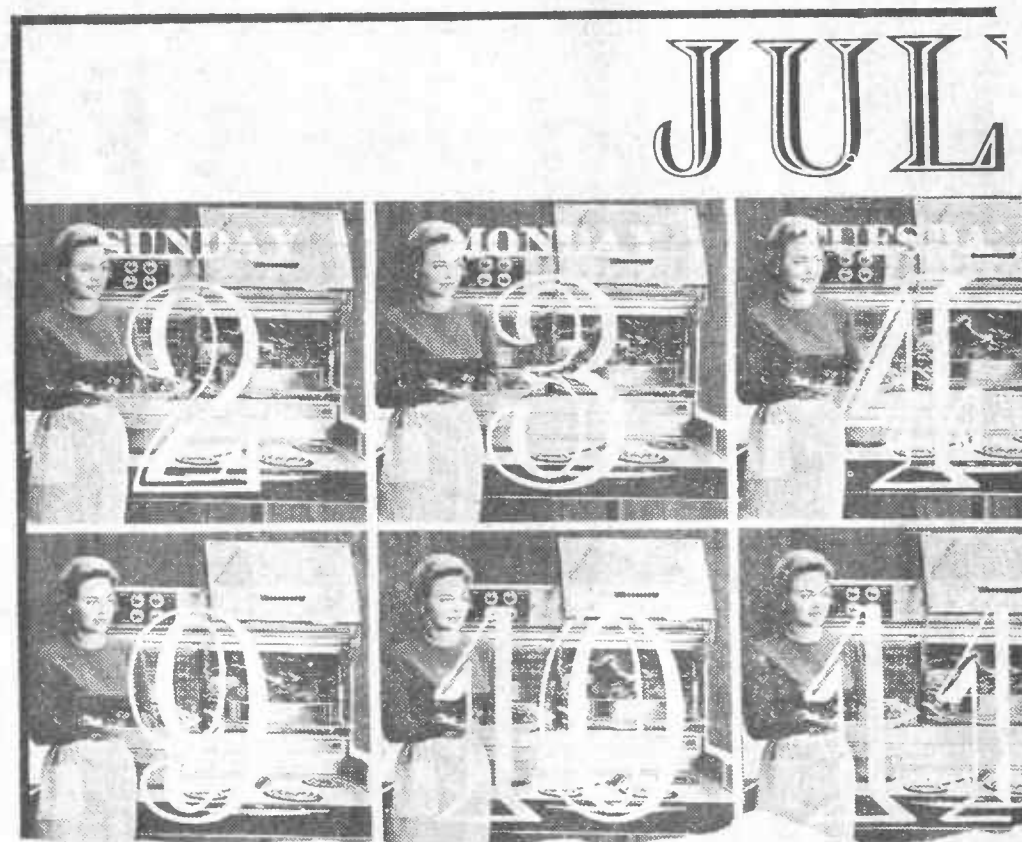

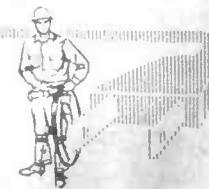
