There are 9,377 qualified voters in Tishomingo County who are eligible to cast a ballot in the August 8 Democratic primary elections, just a scant ten days away.

L. E. (Gene) Robinson, circuit clerk, states that this figure is the result of an official count taken from the poll books of the now 26 precincts in Tishomingo County following the July 7 deadline for registration.

This is an increase of 3,207 qualified voters over the 6,170 figure reported qualified to cast ballots in the 1963 primary elections.

The supervisor's district having the largest number of voters is the 7-precinct First District with 2,935 qualified electors.

The largest box in this district is the Iuka M-Z box which has 607 voters. The second largest box is in the 4th District, the West Tishomingo precinct which has 604 voters listed.

Other district totals include 1,847 in the 2nd District; 1112 in the 3rd District; 1331 in the 4th District; and 2152 in the 5th District.

A complete breakdown of Tishomingo County's qualified voters by precincts, other than those already mentioned, show in the 1st District, Iuka A-L, 503; W. Iuka, A-J, 487; K-Z, 436; N. Iuka, A-K, 407; L-Z, 435; Salem, 60.

In the 2nd District, Burnsville, A-J, 249; K-Z, 250; West Burnsville, 464; N. Burnsville, 480; Coles Mill, 366; Sharp, 32.

In the 3rd District, Spring Hill has 382; Holcut, A-Mc, 294; N-Z, 222; Rutledge, 214; 4th District: Tishomingo, 471, West Tishomingo, 604; and Paden, 256.

The 5th District shows Belmont, A-L, 447; M-Z, 458; East Belmont, 315; Golden 456; Cotton Springs, 96; and Dennis, 330.

Voters will report to their respective precincts on Tuesday August 8, to cast ballots which will include the names of over 70 candidates for various county offices, in addition to the State and District office candidates.

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SENATOR TOWER AND THURGOOD MARSHALL

The editor of one of my favorite newspapers, J. C. Phillips of the Borger (Tex.) *News-Herald*, recently wrote an open letter to one of my favorite United States senators, John G. Tower.

Editor Phillips wanted to know, in effect, why John Tower wasn't screaming his objections to the nomination of the NAACP lawyer, Thurgood Marshall, to a seat on the Supreme Court.

Now, John Tower is very well qualified to speak for himself and, along with Editor Phillips, I shall await with great interest Senator Tower's words and deeds as they pertain to this particular nomination.

Having said that, permit an observation or two that might contain the answer to Editor Phillip's question.

First off, John Tower is one of the five best senators in the congress. He is absolutely without fear, is extraordinarily intelligent, loves Texas with a sentiment that approaches the maudlin, and, in the main, votes right.

He has a fault: He has locked himself into the Republican party. He is a "ball player", is the way politicians put it, meaning that he may be expected to go along with party policy. Moreover, one begins to suspect, John Tower is lying in the weeds so far as the Republican vice-presidential nomination is concerned. And, so far as the party is concerned, he is a very valuable asset in that respect. Tower is the only gold-braided Republican in the land whom Southern people would listen to vis-a-vis George Wallace. It isn't likely the party will overlook that fact, once Wallace announces and the Republicans begin looking for some meaningful person to fill the second slot.

And if John Tower were to accept that nomination and if he were to take to the stump in opposition to George Wallace, probabilities are it would destroy Tower, not Wallace.

Unlike Tower, Wallace is not locked in to party; he is locked in to the proposition that White and Negroes live more amicably, equally, but apart. Wallace doesn't believe you can rub White and Black noses and achieve anything like social tranquility. He says so, right out. And so far as I can tell, that is the only material difference in the public posture of the two, Wallace speaks out for social segregation of the races.

Now, John Tower was not elected by Republicans, whatever the myth. He was elected by dis-

sident Democrats. Those same dissident people, with rare exception, are Wallace all the way. So, if John Tower has his sights on the Republican vice-presidential nomination, you may look for no loud noises from him re Thurgood Marshall. Sure as shooting, the Republican party will not oppose the confirmation and, being a ball player with hope of being put on the first team, Tower in all likelihood will issue some equivocal statement, nothing more, and hope to let it go at that.

And if that day comes, it will be one of the saddest I will have known in politics. For, in doing so, John Tower will have cut his umbilical cord; he will have chosen the national scene rather than Texas as his base. He will have made the classic political mistake: He will have forgotten where he came from, from whence springs his strength. He will learn, thereafter, that Texas conservatism is as unforgiving as it is strong. It will choke out Tower's political life. The only thing that could save him would be election as vice president, a most unlikely occurrence since, as a winning force in presidential elections, the Republican party is dead.

It is not conceivable that John Tower does not realize this. As I imply, he is brilliant — and I don't use that word in connection with politicians, not very often. That being so, and the choice being his, what John Tower does as it pertains to Thurgood Marshall will be done after careful consideration. He will either remain a Texan, that is, clobber the NAACP mouthpiece, or he will become a calculating gambler, risking everything on a single throw of the dice, the Republican vice-presidential nomination.

If I were to hazard a guess as to Tower's ultimate decision — this presupposes of course that he is considering the situation as outlined — I would guess he will remain what he has been all the days of his life, a Texan.

A person who has Tower's well being at heart would suggest that decision. John Tower is young, still very young and, if he gives himself a chance, he will — to return to the original metaphor — go to bat many times in the years to come and against pitching more to his liking than this. Being a political "ball player" is, in most instances, the way to get along. The trick lies in not striking out.

THE LESSON OF NEWARK

These past several days in Newark, N. J., running from July 12 to July 17, 1967, saw rioting, arson, looting and murder almost unparalleled in the history of American cities. A UPI story on Saturday morning, July 15th, said, "Gov. Richard J. Hughes declared a state of emergency, and roaming bands of Negroes battled police and the state militia."

The story proceeded to say, "In declaring the state of emergency, Hughes called the situation 'very dangerous' and deteriorating. Hughes said earlier the rioting and widespread looting 'can only be classified as open rebellion — just like wartime.'"

The story that morning went on to say, "Democratic Gov. Richard J. Hughes said a third of the city was under seige, cordoned off by police and National Guardsmen and in the grip of what he termed 'criminal insurrection.' He declared it a disaster area, in an attempt to enforce rules to quell the lawlessness."

"... Street mobs built up in size before sundown after a wild daylong orgy of looting, and police sharpshooters duelled with rooftop snipers."

Gov. Hughes went on to say, "This amounts to criminal insurrection against society. . . . There is no order to shoot and kill but police have the authority to defend themselves."

It was right here, perhaps, that Gov. Hughes made his worst mistake. Looting has traditionally been recognized as one of the worst crimes that can be committed, because those engaged in looting are not only breaking secular and religious law by stealing, they are at the same time through mob rule preying upon the misfortunes that have befallen others.

It has been traditional in this country, therefore — where the rights of individuals are protected — for the mayors of the cities and the governor of the state to give the police and the militia orders that when they find looting taking place, they are to shoot first and ask questions later. This order would apply regardless of race—black or white — and it is to be believed that such an order is more likely to prevent looting and stop looting than any other order that might be given.

But what happened in the case of Newark? The Saturday morning story went on to say, "Looters moved openly and defiantly in and out of smashed and burned stores, beneath the gaze of the governor. The Governor said he was appalled by the bizarre holiday air of the indefatigable looters — surging gangs of laughing men, women and children. They hauled food, clothing and furniture from smashed stores."

The story said that Hughes invoked the state's emergency defense law which "permits him in a civilian role to lay down any rules needed to protect life and property in an area of natural or man-made disaster. It differs from martial law, which would grant Hughes similar power, but in his role as 'commander-in-chief of the National Guard. It was understood that Hughes considered the civilian measure less likely

to further inflame Newark Negroes."

It is this attitude of hesitancy, this attitude of fear on the part of city and state rulers that enables them to look on with equanimity while looters "laughingly" steal the property that belongs to the store owners and their stockholders. This attitude cannot continue in any city or in any state of the union if we are to remain a nation that respects law and order. In other words, if we are to remain a civilized nation, law and order must be observed by all people alike.

Only to the extent that the mayors of our cities and the governors of our states have learned their lesson from what happened in Newark, N. J., can we be said to have made any progress toward a more peaceful and a more just nation.

We have since survived World War II and a number of lesser wars and skirmishes.

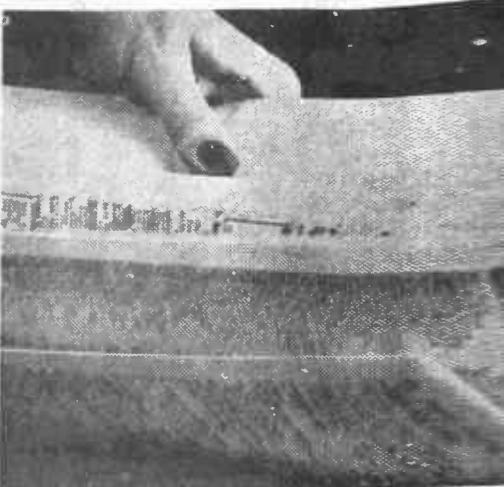

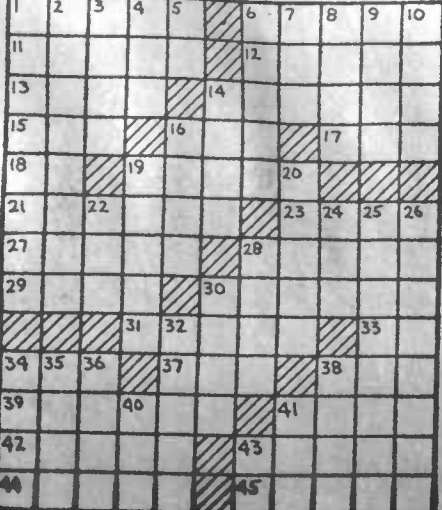

Breeding Helps Cubed Beef Steak Retain Moisture

Coatings on fried foods help keep them deliciously moist. This is especially true when the meat used is a beef cubed steak which is a very lean cut.

These steaks are cut one-fourth to one-half inch thick. They're mechanically tenderized, explains Reba Staggs, meat expert, which means they're put through a special machine.

Breaded Cubed Beef Steaks

4 cubed beef steaks
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
½ cup cracker crumbs
1 beaten egg
3 tablespoons lard or drippings
Combine salt, pepper and cracker crumbs. Dip cubed steaks in egg and then in cracker mix-

ture. Melt lard or drippings in frying-pan. Add cubed steaks, cover closely, and cook slowly for 20 minutes. Turn and continue cooking for another 20 minutes or until done. 4 servings.

Panbroiling

Steaks and chops too thin for regular broiling may be panbroiled. Pour the fat off as soon as it accumulates in the frying-pan or the meat will be fried

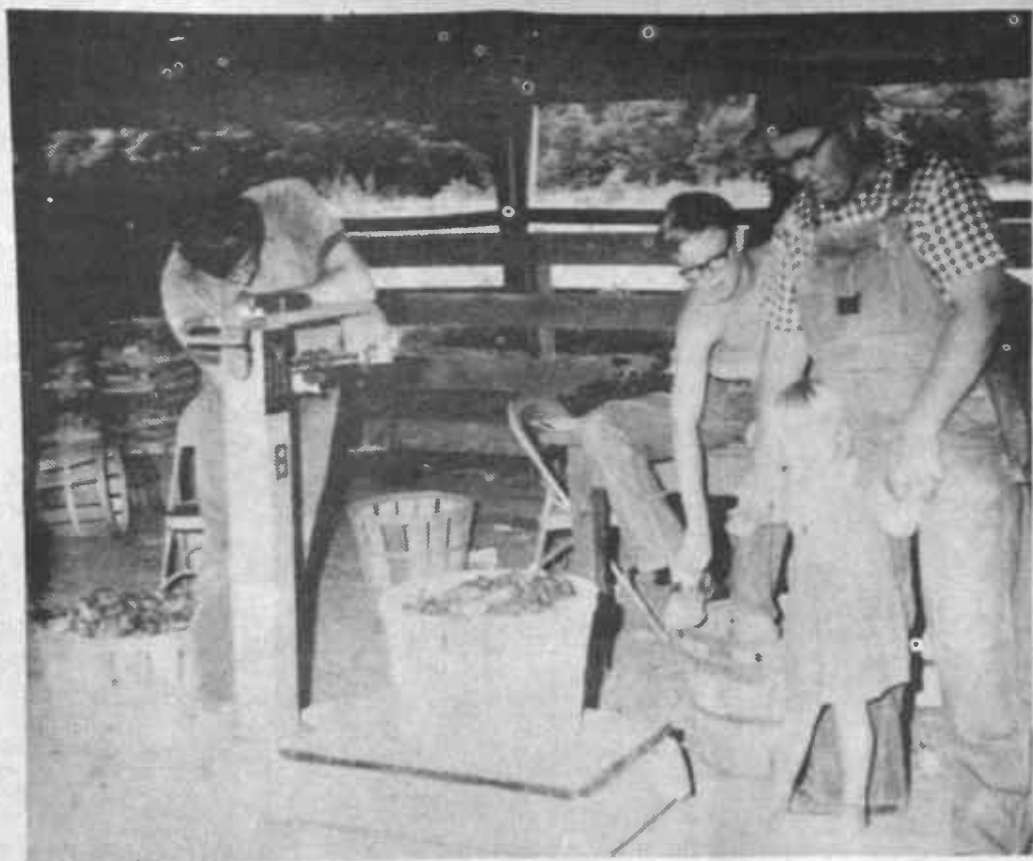

DOLLARS IN CUKES — To date, Tishomingo County farmers have been paid a total of \$24,000.00 for cucumbers under a program instigated by the local County Extension workers. Farmers in the county have received up to \$700 per acre in return for high quality cucumbers which have been purchased by the Atkins Pickle Company. In the above photos, Tommy Stricklen, manager of the cucumber shed in the north end of the county, weighs the bushels of cucumbers and records the amount to determine the amount for which the check for the day's gathering should be written. The entire transaction is carried on at the cucumber shed from sorting and grading to weighing and the issuance of checks. The last step is the arrival of the trucks, bottom photo, which transport the cucumbers to the factories where pickles are made. Seventy-eight acres have been marketed in Tishomingo under the combined efforts of the two cucumber sheds located in Luka, and the one in Belmont at the Belmont Gin to take care of the south end of the County. Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. Beef tip sirloin butt steak.

Q. Where does it come from? How is it identified?

A. It comes from the hindquarter of beef, specifically the section known as the tip or knuckle. This is right next to the sirloin section, as well as below the round or leg. The steaks are boneless and the fat follows a pattern similar to that of round steak in that most of it is in the edging.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. By broiling if the meat is of high quality. This means using a dry heat method as is used for steaks from the short loin or sirloin sections.

This steak is also and broiled. It is to use for cutting to be used for kabob broiled out-of-door grill. If it's cut to broiling is the method. If there's any doubt the quality, use the heat method (broiling).

Dressing with Meat

Meat doesn't always pocket cut if you want a dressing or stuffing. Call it dressing and alongside a roast. Cook chops or patties topped with a mound of dressing.

Hog Outlook

The outlook for pork produc-
tion is rather bright in Missis-
sippi even though there may be
a slight decrease in prices.

It now looks as if we will
have 11 percent more sows far-
rowing June through Novem-
ber than we did last year. In
the United States, as a whole,
indications are that there will
be three percent fewer sows
farrowing during this period.
This brightens our outlook.

Orcard Notes

Some timely summer remin-
ders to fruit growers include:
Continue summer training of
young trees by removing suck-
ers and excess branches.

Keep your epcan trees free
from grass and weeds in a six-
foot diameter area around the
tree. Water thoroughly as is
needed.

Remove badly damaged or
dead branches, limbs and trees
to prevent shothole borers from
attacking other trees.

Be sure to brace new grafts
on topworked pecan trees to
prevent wind damage.

Spray trunks of peach trees
with DDT, dieldrin or thiodan
around August 1, and again Sep-
tember 1 and October 1 to con-
trol peach tree borers. Follow
directions in the Mississippi
Spray Calendar, available free
from your local county agent.

Ticks On Dogs

Ticks on dogs are causing
problems throughout the state.
This can be serious as the
ticks sometimes cause a paral-
ysis that is severe on dogs. They,
if the dog is allowed in the
home, can infest your home.

This can be almost intolerable.

To get rid of ticks on dogs,
you can dust with 10 percent
DDT, 5 percent malathion of 5
percent sevin. Repeat dusting
as needed. You can also dip
the dogs. Make the dip by mix-
ing a cupful of 50 percent DDT
wetable powder to three gal-
lons of water; or use three ta-
blespoonfull of 25 percent wet-
table lindane powder to three
gallons of water.

These dripping solutions can
also be used as sprays for the
lawn and infested dog quarters.
Fresh bedding should be put in
dogs quarters following treat-
ment.

Social Security

Nearing 65 years of age? If
so, it would be a good idea to
check with your local social se-
curity people ahead of time.

Peach Tree Borer

August 1 is the time to make
the first application of DDT,
Thiodan, or Dieldrin to your
peach trees for borer control.
Additional applications should
be made September 1 and again
October 1. Check the Mississip-
pi Spray Calendar for specific
instructions. It is available free
from your local county agent.

Dairy Management

Help stamp out Bang's dis-
ease with calfhoo vaccination.
Calves must be vaccinated when
they are between three and 18
months old. This means that
calves born after December,
1966, and trough April, 1967,
should be vaccinated now. If
you have heifer calves that fall
into this category, call your
veterinarian now so that you
get on his schedule.

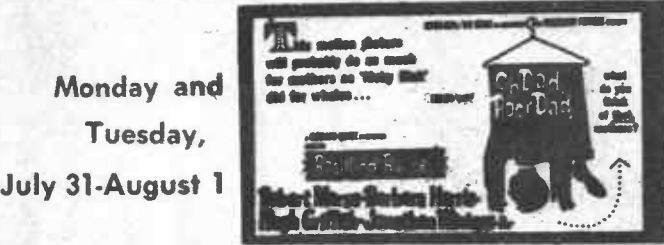

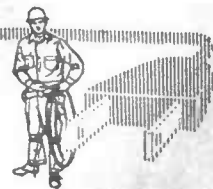

You have probably been hearing and reading about the increased soybean acreage in Mississippi and the added dollars this crop adds to the state's economy.

But have you realized you used this produce extensively in your everyday life? Soybean oil is an ingredient of mayonnaise, margarine candies, frozen desserts, sandwich spreads, salad and cooking oils and high-protein, low-fat liquid diet foods.

Soybean oil also goes into non-food products. Soaps and shaving creams; paints, varnishes and lacquers; pharmaceuticals and vitamins; leather dressings and linoleum—these and dozens of other often-used

Read the Label

Yes, read the directions for using a pesticide before you buy the product. It is better to take the time to read directions while you are at the store than to get home and find you've bought a product you can't use safely in your home. Check the label to find out whether the pest you want to get rid of is listed.

To make a bed — without moving it out from the wall — allow 22 inches at either side and at the foot.

When You Buy Shoes

When you shop for shoes, put your big foot forward. It's the best foot for measuring, since this helps get a better fit. A shoe should fit comfortably when you buy it.

The difference between one shoe size and the next is a mere 1/16 of an inch.

Foot measurements often vary according to the time of day. During the afternoon the foot is about midpoint in size. This is the best time to shop for shoes.

As shoe styles change, so do sizes. If you change from a sed-

entary job to an active one, your shoe size may change. When fitting shoes, try on both shoes and see if you can walk on a hard surfaced floor. Your walking will be chiefly on hard surfaces, and this helps judge comfort. Try a combination last if you need a snugger heel fit.

Clean Foliage Plants. Soap and water will do the trick of keeping your foliage plants clean and bright. Just don't get the soapy water on the soil. Roasted Corn-on-the-cob. Next time you have a picnic or a back-yard cookout, try corn-on-the-cob roasted over the coals. One way to prepare the ears is to peel back the shucks with cut detachable them, and remove the silks. Pull the shucks back over the kernels and secure with a piece of shuck or string. Soak the ears in water for about 10 minutes and grill over hot coals for 15 to 20 minutes.

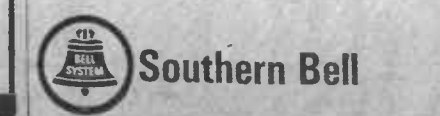

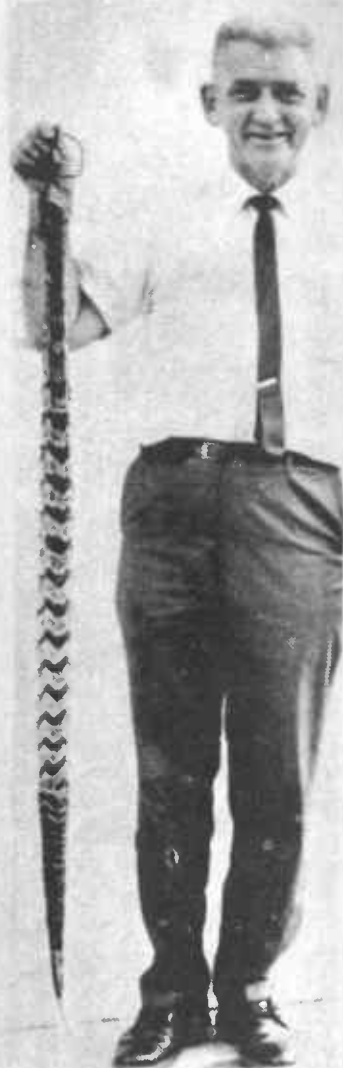

Skin Diving---

You're Under Unusual Stress Underwater

Skin diving enthusiasts are gaining thousands of new recruits each summer. Thousands of Americans of all ages and both sexes are



spending summer weekends exploring lakes and streams from the vantage of the fishes.

From the medical standpoint, physicians say that diving makes demands on the body which are unlike those met above the surface.

Navigating under water is heavy exertion and those with respiratory problems or heart and blood vessel disease should not attempt it, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. Diving is ruled out for those with perforated ear drums. Ear plugs are for surface swimming only and should not be used for diving because of water pressure. The depth changes also require that sinuses and ears be in good shape to equalize the pressure.

Asking your doctor to evaluate your fitness for diving is a precaution that will pay dividends. Along with good health, the potential diver should be a better than average swimmer. A moderately skilled swimmer can dive with SCUBA equipment, but in an emergency the swimming skills born of long practice and good physical conditioning may mean the difference between survival and death.

Never dive alone, the AMA

advises. Use a buddy system and be certain that your buddy is competent and trustworthy. Learn to use artificial respiration and see that your buddy knows it. Plan your dives. Know where you're going, how deep and how long you can stay under. Work out a system of underwater communication signals for emergencies. Never dive when you are overly tired, have a cold or are just not feeling well.

Use quick release buckles on weight belts or SCUBA harness. You may need to cut loose and surface quickly. Don't indulge in horseplay and take needless risks. Watch out for boats while in the water. The power boat skipper may not know you're there.

Watch your depth. Pressures

mount rapidly as you descend. Don't hold your breath while ascending. Air will expand inside your lungs and should be allowed to bubble out as you are coming up.

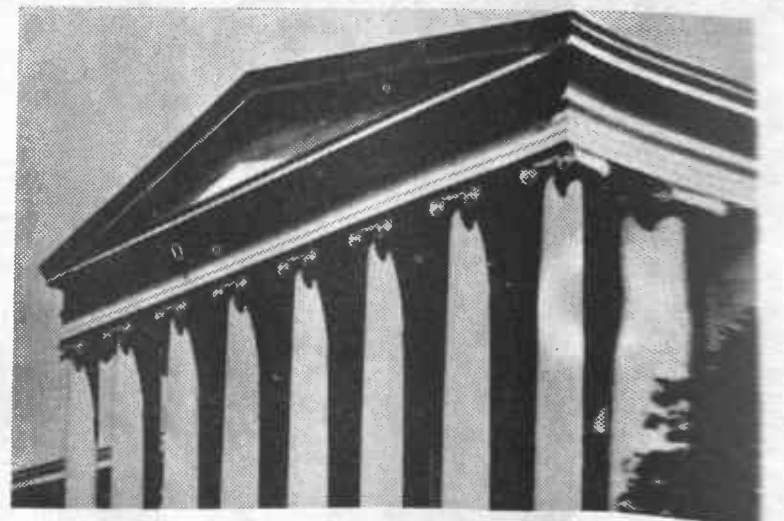

Notes Of County Home Economist

by Nellie R. Horton

You have probably been
hearing and reading about the
increased soybean acreage in
Mississippi and the added dol-
lar; this crop adds to the state's
economy.

But have you realized you
used this produce extensively
in your everyday life? Soybean
oil is an ingredient of mayon-
naise, margarine, candies, froz-
zen desserts, sandwich spreads,
salad and cooking oils and high-
protein, low-fat liquid diet
foods.

Soybean oil also goes into
non-food products. Soaps and
shaving creams; paints, varn-
ishes and lacquers; pharmaceu-
ticals and vitamins; leather
dressings and linoleum —these
and dozens of other often-used

Read the Label
Yes, read the directions for
using a pesticide before you
buy the product. It is better to
take the time to read directions
while you are at the store than
to get home and find you've
bought a product you can't use
safely in your home. Check the
label to find out whether the
pest you want to get rid of is
listed.

To make a bed — without
moving it out from the wall —
allow 22 inches at either side
and at the foot.

When You Buy Shoes
When you shop for shoes,
put your big foot forward. It's
the best foot for measuring,
since this helps get a better
fit. A shoe should fit comforta-
bly when you buy it.

The difference between one
shoe size and the next is a mere
1/16 of an inch.

Foot measurements often vary
according to the time of day.
During the afternoon the foot
is about midpoint in size. This
is the best time to shop for
shoes.

As shoe styles change, so do
sizes. If you change from a sed-

entary job to an active one,
your shoe size may change.
When fitting shoes, try on both
shoes and see if you can walk
on a hard surfaced floor. Your
walking will be chiefly on hard
surfaces, and this helps judge
comfort. Try a combination last
if you need a snugger heel fit.

the soapy water on the soil.

Roasted Corn-on-the-cob Next
time you have a picnic or a
back-yard cookout, try corn-on-
the-cob roasted over the coals.
One way to prepare the ears
is to peel back the shucks with-
out detaching them, and remove
the silks. Pull the shucks back
over the kernels and secure
with a piece of shuck or string.
Soak the ears in water for about
30 minutes and grill over hot
coals for 15 to 20 minutes.

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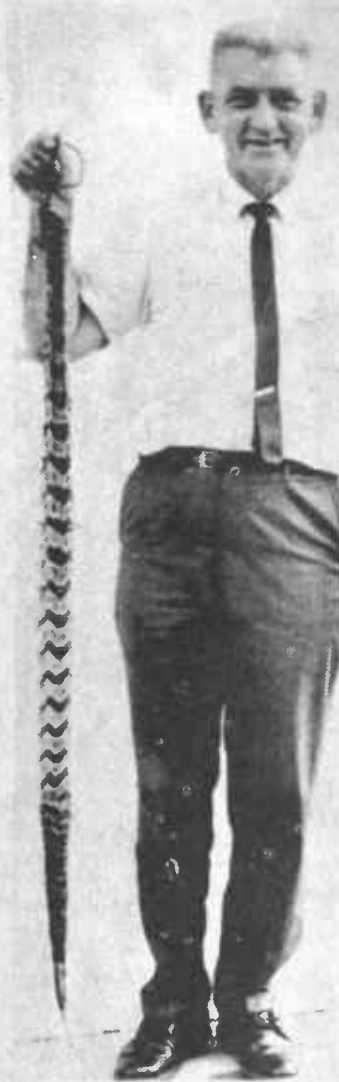

Skin Diving--- You're Under Unusual Stress Underwater

Skin diving enthusiasts are gaining thousands of new recruits each summer. Thousands of Americans of all ages and both sexes are



spending summer weekends exploring lakes and streams from the vantage of the fishes.

From the medical standpoint, physicians say that diving makes demands on the body which are unlike those met above the surface.

Navigating under water is heavy exertion and those with respiratory problems or heart and blood vessel disease should not attempt it, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. Diving is ruled out for those with perforated ear drums. Ear plugs are for surface swimming only and should not be used for diving because of water pressure. The depth changes also require that sinuses and ears be in good shape to equalize the pressure.

Asking your doctor to evaluate your fitness for diving is a precaution that will pay dividends. Along with good health, the potential diver should be a better than average swimmer. A moderately skilled swimmer can dive with SCUBA equipment, but in an emergency the swimming skills born of long practice and good physical conditioning may mean the difference between survival and death.

Never dive alone, the AMA

advises. Use a buddy system and be certain that your buddy is competent and trustworthy. Learn to use artificial respiration and see that your buddy knows it. Plan your dives. Know where you're going, how deep and how long you can stay under. Work out a system of underwater communication signals for emergencies. Never dive when you are overly tired, have a cold or are just not feeling well.

Use quick release buckles on weight belts or SCUBA harness. You may need to cut loose and surface quickly. Don't indulge in horseplay and take needless risks. Watch out for boats while in the water. The power boat skipper may not know you're there.

Watch your depth Pressures

mount rapidly as you descend. Don't hold your breath while ascending. Air will expand inside your lungs and should be allowed to bubble out as you are coming up.
