Albert Clifton (Bert) Hayes had just recently joined the Marines. He attended school at Iuka High. His younger brother, Bobby Ray Hayes, Jr., was a student at Burnsville School.

The boys leave their mother, Mrs. Pearlina Nunley Hayes of Iuka; 1 brother, Delbert Hayes, Iuka; 1 sister, Shirley Rossignol of Iuka; their maternal grandfather, Roy Nunley of Iuka; and their paternal grandfather, Ted Hayes of Gallion.

Funeral services for the father and sons were held at 11 a.m. under the direction of Rev. L. H. Brazell, at the Tabernacle Baptist Church in Carrollton, Ga., on July 31. Funeral services were held in Iuka at the Church of Christ on August 1, at 4:30 p.m. under the direction of James A. Jones. Interment was in Memorial Gardens. Bobby Ray Hayes, Sr., was buried with full Navy honors. His son, Bert, was buried with Marine Honors.

South Iuka Precincts Will Vote At Armory Now

The Tishomingo County Election Committee announces this week the names of election holders who will serve at the various precincts in the county for the 1st Primary Election on August 8.

P. L. "Jess" Oaks, committee member, states that all voters at the South Iuka boxes A to L and M to Z will report to the National Guard Armory. This was a decision made by the committee.

"Both of these boxes have here-to-fore been placed at the

county courthouse along with the North Iuka boxes," he said. "However, due to the increased number of voters, and the lack of space at the courthouse, the South Iuka boxes have been moved to the Armory on Highway 72-E," he added. It was concluded that at the Armory voters would have more room, more privacy, and plenty of parking space. With the rearrangement, like conditions will be afforded for the remaining boxes at the courthouse.

The polls throughout the county will open promptly at 7 o'clock Tuesday morning and will close at 6 o'clock. All qualified voters are urged to go to the polls, August 8, and take advantage of this American privilege.

Three weeks following the 1st Primary Election, the 2nd primary Election will be held on August 29. Candidates in the 1st election will be reduced to only 2 contenders in each race with the deciding factor being the 2nd primary.

Experienced news gatherers will be at the telephones to take the tallies and keep a record at the newspaper office. In turn they will report the tallies to WVOM Radio and to the operators at the Jaycee Election Board where they will be displayed.

Everyone who is interested in the results of the election is invited to come in to town on Tuesday night, bring pad and pencils for personal tallying and enjoy the lively music between reports which will be played over the public address system from WVOM Radio Studio.

Election Return Boards will also be conducted in downtown Tishomingo and in downtown Belmont.

All my life, because I refuse to rule out the possibility of Little People, I have been subjected to thin, supercilious grins. I just say I ain't sure, and for such scientific detachment I get that down-the-nose business.

Well, let 'em smirk: Take what happened to me last week.

I have a place on an inlet of the Chesapeake Bay, a modest place I bought last fall, a nice, comfortable place with an incomparable view. There is nothing within a mile of Doneraile but me, my ladies, and the wild life. Except for the occasional, professional fishermen who glide by my point, there is nothing to disturb my idyllic, week-end, sedentary sprawl.

Or there wasn't.

You see, everybody I know has a boat. Boats, boats, boats are all I hear, like boots, boots, boots. I get it verbally and I get it by mail. "There you sit, Big John, bird watching. Why don't you get a boat?"

Well, a person can take only so much of such challenging propaganda. Why not a boat?

Why not, indeed! I am as good a sailor as any of those guys. After all, my brother is an admiral. So, after perusing catalogues, visiting shipyards, and after listening to more salty talk than Columbus endured, I bought me one.

Goodbye ladies, goodbye wild-life, goodbye sprawl. Here comes Chichester.

I got me a styrofoam, nine-foot sailer - \$89 and 55 pounds, mast, sail, and all. I named it *The Beautiful Pea Green Boat*.

In time, there came the day of launching.

To that point I had never given a thought to my Irish ancestry, nor to the Little People. But see what happened.

Take it from the top: I put one foot onto that accursed thing and never got the second one set - Wham! Into the drink; something had capsized me craft, and the girls and Mamma watching.

Never mind. I got her a-right, hoisted sail and took off, helped no end by an off-shore breeze. But what a crazy craft. Turn the tiller as I would, instead of going forward, like a good boat should, the thing kept going sideways and, in a bit, there loomed the gaping mouth of my inlet, and beyond that, the bay - and you know what comes after the bay.

I pulled in the sail - I know about avasting the sail - but all that did was spin the fool thing a full 180 degrees, and we still kept going sideways, deepwater bound.

From the beginning, I had heard Mamma shouting - her voice carried like Gabriel's trumpet - but I had thought her cries nothing more than the lament of a dutiful wife in the process of witnessing her husband go down to the sea in ships. Eventually,

though, as is generally the case, her message got through: "The board, you dolt, the board!"

Board? What board? Oh, the centerboard. Oh!

I rammed that thing home with a crunch and, as though a spell were broken, *The Beautiful Pea Green Boat* straightened up and began sailing as a lady should.

There. Nothing to it. I hope you landlubbers are taking notice, now. Laughing at your poor father, laughing when you should have been wringing your hands.

As I tacked - that means going not quite where you want to go - past my place. I thought to put on the dog, light a cigarette from my waterproof. Nonchalance, you know.

I never struck the match. Something, while I was thus otherwise engaged, swung the boom and it cracked me right between the ears.

Back into the drink. It was after I had crawled back aboard the second time - I had a line lashed around my middle, just like Chichester - that I began to wonder. The suspicion didn't just come to me. It came as I was engaged in coordinating the tiller, the wind, me and the sail. It was then that the centerboard popped up. That pop got me thinking.

You see? The same "something" that had tipped *Pea Green* in the first place, the same something that had swung that boom, that same something was at work again, pushing up that centerboard as fast as I pushed it down.

Now, I know what is the conventional thing to believe. I'm not stupid, you know. I know to what others attribute such goings-on. And if the capsizing at the launching were the whole of it, I would concede I might have misplaced my weight on that ceremonial occasion. And if that business with the boom, if such-like were the only mystery, I wouldn't argue with my unimaginative, pragmatic friends.

But what of that centerboard, huh? Every time I pushed it down, it popped back. Not once; a dozen times. Who was doing the pushing? The crabs? The fishes? Playful dolphin? Or the Little People?

You take your choice, I've got mine.

I have been thinking about my maritime problems ever since they began - I do want to sail - and I may have come upon a solution to these esoteric developments. Grandma Mc used to say that you can appease the Little People. Well, the sail is white. Perhaps it should be green, kelly green. And that name I gave my ship: Shouldn't it be changed to *Leprechaun*?

Grandma also had an amulet, a sort of ju-ju bag. I wonder where that is. I'm going to get barnacled if it is the last thing I do.

PANAMA - ANOTHER CUBA

Though the United States rightly wants to be a good neighbor to the Latin republics in his hemisphere, it should never indulge in appeasement of countries in this hemisphere by sacrificing sovereign rights and imperiling the security of the Americas.

Unhappily, it seems that the Johnson administration may indulge in the ultimate appeasement of Panama with regard to the canal and canal zone. On the President's desk, at last report, were draft treaties covering the strategic waterway and the zone which the United States has held since 1903. According to reliable reports, the draft treaties involve a surrender of U. S. sovereignty over Panama Canal and the canal zone.

In the light of what has happened in the Caribbean and elsewhere in the world - principally at Suez, a U. S. backdown on the Panama Canal issue could be fatal to the best interests of the United States and other countries in this hemisphere.

Since the communists came to power in Russia, their propaganda has hammered at U. S. control of the Panama Canal. The communists understand that the U. S. would suffer a terrible blow if the inter-oceanic canal were lost. They recognize how much the communist world has gained by the ousting of the British from the Suez Canal, and they hope for a similar success in the Panamanian isthmus.

U. S. sovereign rights over the canal and canal zone were

confirmed in a solemn treaty signed by Panama and ratified by the United States. No Panamanian government can take away from the United States the authority it rightfully possesses under this treaty. Only the U. S. Senate can abandon the rights enjoyed by the United States, and this it should never do, no matter how much the President may plead.

The U. S. is in the wrong course with respect to Panama. Since the 1950s, there have been many riots and threats of riot against U. S. citizens living in the Isthmus. These riots have been organized to bring pressure against the United States to relinquish its rightful authority in the zone. They constitute political blackmail of the United States.

Several administrations have erred in handling the problem. They have bowed to pressure from the blackmailers. As always is the case in blackmail, concessions have resulted in fresh demands. One can be sure that new Panama Canal treaties would result in another wave of demands on the U. S. The truth is that appeasement does not pay.

The idea of sharing control of the Panama Canal with the Panamanians is an absurdity. Panama is one of the most unstable countries in Latin America. It simply isn't a fit partner for the U. S. in an operation of immense importance to all the maritime and trading nations of the world. Responsible Latins should understand this as well as U. S. citizens. Chile and Pe-

ru, for example, are utterly dependant on efficient operation of the Panama Canal. Yet no one could offer any evidence supporting the view that Panama has the technical competence and political stability essential to the management of the Panama Canal.

It would be a mistake, of course, to regard the furor over the Panama Canal simply as a case of Panamanian nationalism. Behind the commotion are the ambitions of the Soviet Union and its Caribbean satellite, Red Cuba. Since Fidel Castro first grabbed power in Havana, he has been interested in sparking revolution in Panama - revolution aimed at seizure of the strategic waterway. It is reasonable to suppose that the recent discussions between Castro and Premier Alexei Kosygin of Russia involved the Panama Canal question.

If the Panamanians were given control of the Panama canal, through a giveaway of U. S. sovereign rights, one can be sure that the real controlling force in the canal operation and in the hemispheric crossroads would be the Soviet Union. The Russians have a global design for control of strategic waterways. In this design, the Panama Canal is a key feature. It is imperative, therefore, that an aroused U. S. public declare itself utterly opposed to any sell-out of the national interest in new Panama treaties.

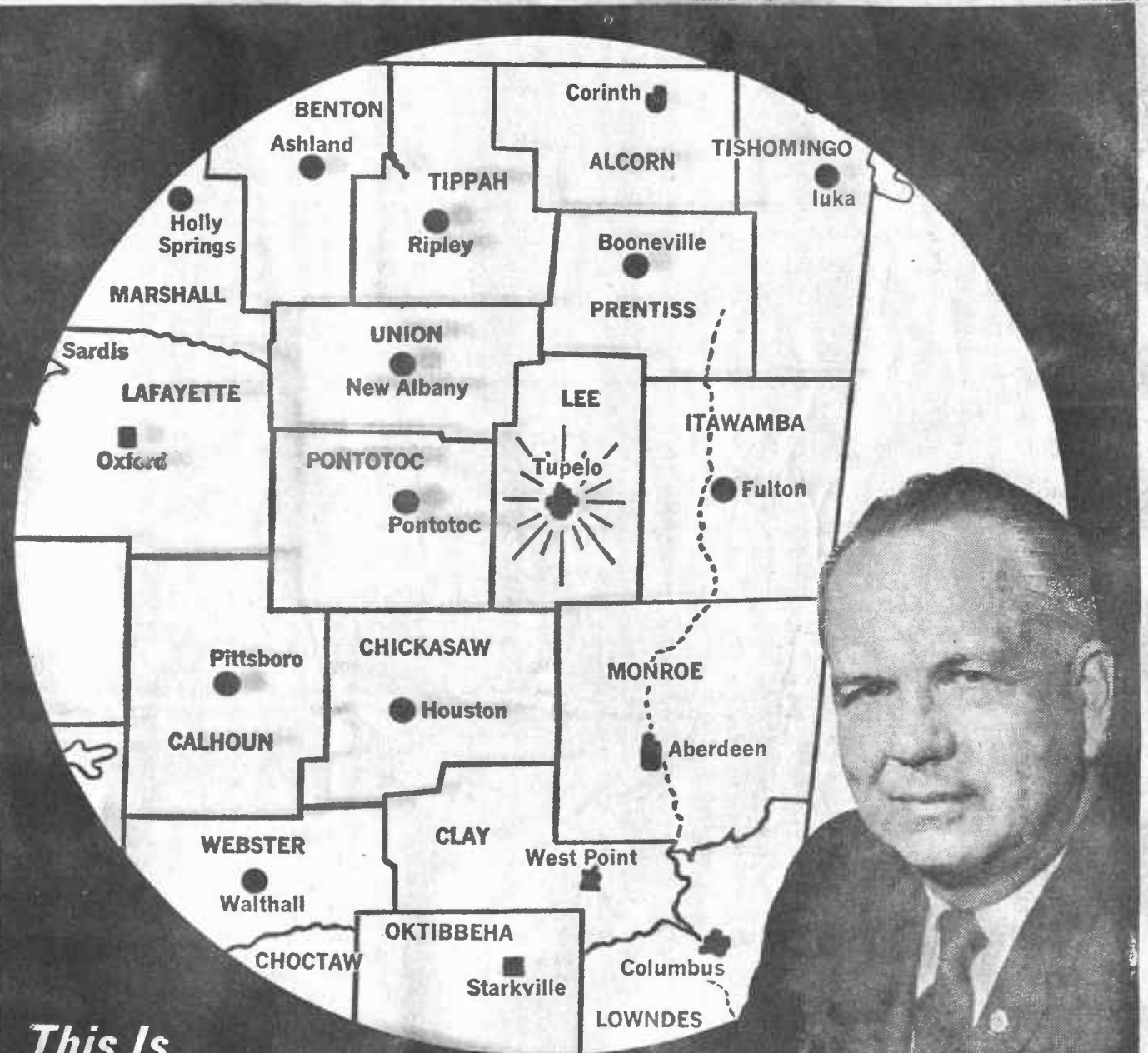

Back To School--- Health Exam A Must

School days are almost here again for millions of American youngsters.

With the approach of the fall term, the American Medical Association reminds parents once again that there are health and safety considerations that are important in preparing the small fry for another nine months of studies.

The A.M.A. recommends a thorough health examination for 5- and 6-year-olds who are starting school for the first time. Your phy-

sician will know what to do. His examination will cover all aspects of your child's health, and will encompass hearing (to make certain he can hear the teacher) and vision (to make sure he can see the blackboard). It is better if this examination can be made, and booster immunization given, a few weeks before school starts.



School boards in some communities require a health exam for beginning students. Many schools also require certain immunizations against infectious disease. Your doctor will know of the requirements in your neighborhood.

Most doctors feel that four or five thorough examinations during the school years are sufficient for healthy youngsters. These usually are spaced at the start of the first school year, about the fourth grade, about the seventh grade, at the ninth or tenth grade, and upon graduation. And, of course, if any untoward symptoms arise

at any time, a visit to the doctor is in order. A thorough examination also is important if the child is participating in school athletics. The doctor should be told that junior is going out for football, so that he can look for any health problems that might be heightened by rough, contact sports.

In the excitement of the first few days of school, the smaller child may forget all of the safety

Popular Sundae Now Converts to Tempting Pastry

Chocolate Sundaes have always been among the most popular of the ice cream desserts. Have you ever wondered just how this would convert into another type of dessert, like pie? With test kitchen magic, the ice cream of the sundae becomes a smooth, velvety custard that goes into a pastry shell. The topping is still whipped cream and grated chocolate takes over for chocolate sauce.

To assure both tenderness and

flakiness in the pie crust, use lard, advises home economist, Reba Staggs. Measure ice water carefully with a tablespoon and do not add more than the maximum amount (four tablespoons) for this recipe.

Chocolate Sundae Pie Pastry

1 cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 to 6 tablespoons lard
2 to 4 tablespoons cold water
Mix flour and salt. Cut lard into flour until crumbs are about the size of small peas. Add cold water, a little at a time, mixing quickly and evenly through flour with a fork until dough just holds in a ball. Use as little water as possible. Roll to about 1/8 inch thickness and line a 9-inch pie pan, allowing 1/2 inch pie crust to extend over edge.

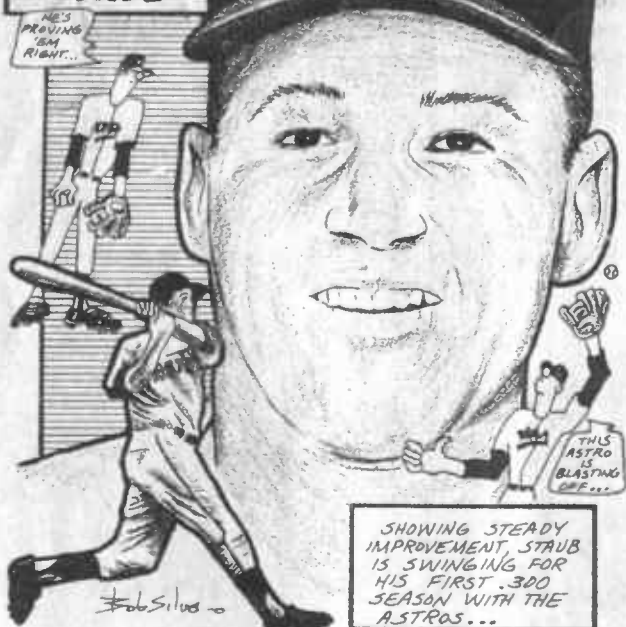
Crimp edges.

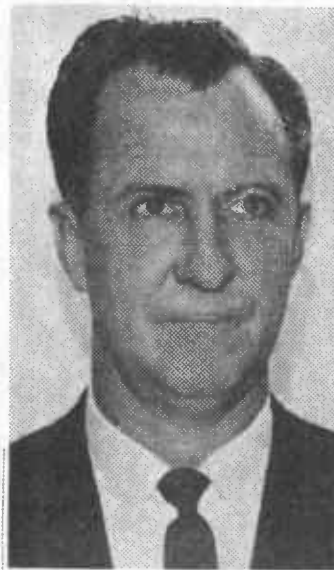

Italy Inspires Still Another Kind of Hash

Most hash is made with potatoes, unless it's a Texas variety which has rice, of course. But if it's inspired by Italy, the hash will have macaroni.

Since macaroni and cheese are such favorites, they will certainly continue to be when beef joins the team, adding a complete protein to the dish.

Leftover beef to be ground for this dish can come from the last of a roast cooked on the rotisserie or Sunday's roast cooked in the oven. It might be from a pot-roast or just ground beef which has been cooked, says Reba Staggs, meat authority.

Italian Beef Hash

2 cups ground cooked beef
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup meat stock or water
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Salt and pepper
½ cup macaroni, cooked
¾ cup grated American cheese

Melt butter or margarine in a saucepan and blend in flour. Gradually add meat stock or water and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Add Worcestershire sauce and season with salt and pepper. Combine ground beef, cooked macaroni and white sauce and pour into a greased 1-quart casserole. Sprinkle with grated cheese and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 30 minutes. 4 servings.

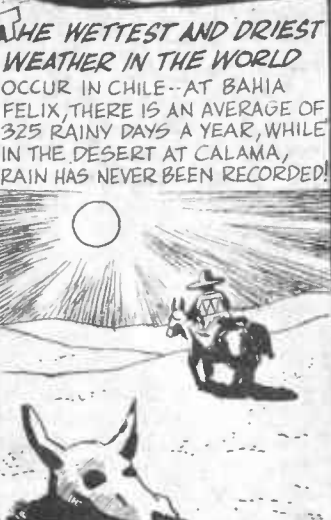

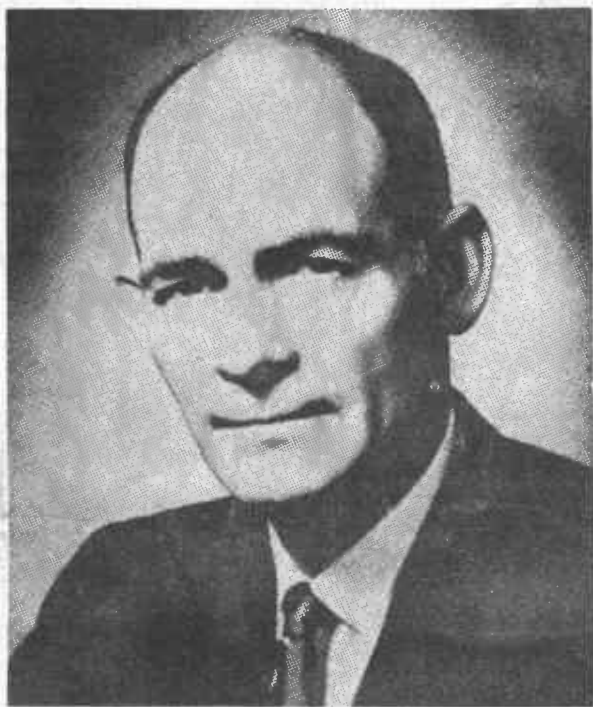

110 NYC Enrollees Train Under Program

The Neighborhood Youth Corps was established in accordance with the provisions of Title I-B of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. The Tishomingo County program began in January, 1965, and is currently operating along with 10 other Northeast Mississippi Counties through the Community Development, Inc., Office, Corinth, Miss.

A local office is maintained in the County Courthouse in Iuka. Mrs. Yvonne Long is County Director. A maximum number of 30 out-of-school enrollees and 80 in school enrollees have been currently employed in the county in public and non-profit institutions only. These enrollees receive special training as well as gainful employment. For example, enrollees who are assigned to Tishomingo County Hospital work a maximum 30 hours per week, and receive an additional 5 hours special training in class type lectures and clinical observation.

Some enrollees have received valuable training in automotive mechanics in maintaining the school buses in the vocational shop at Iuka high school, under the supervision of Hoyt Phillips.

Other enrollees have participated in painting school build-

ings, landscaping and care of City and State parks, play ground and football field maintenance, municipal, county and school office clerical assistance, and various other types of training.

The program schedule consists of three phases: in-school, out of school and summer programs. Out of school enrollees may work up to 30 hours per week. In school enrollees may work up to 30 hours per week during the summer school vacation, but only 10 hours per week while actively attending school. Beginning in September, in-school enrollees will be allowed to work 8 hours per week. Out of school enrollees must attend special basic education classes one day each week which are also held in the Courthouse. Mrs. Eleanor Ray, New Albany, Mississippi, is the teacher. Enrollees are then tested and grouped according to achievement, which enables those who desire to continue further studies which will prepare them for the General Education Development Test (GED). Enrollees who pass this test are entitled to a High School Equivalency Certificate from the State Department of Education, which provides the same equal employment opportunities as high school grad-

uates, and for college entrance credit requirements. During the last nine month period, three

enrollees have completed classroom work and passed the GED Test.

Basically, objectives of the Program are to discourage and prevent school drop-outs. For

this reason, in-school enrollees are helped financially to stay in school. However, the out-of-school program is designed to help and to encourage those drop-outs, who for various reasons were forced to leave school, to re-enroll in school or to help them secure further academic or vocational training.

In an effort to impress out of school enrollees with the need for a continuing education, the social development of their personalities, and for spiritual guidance, a special program was planned for the Class recently. A panel of speakers comprised of professional, business and religious leaders of the area stressed the importance of a continuing education. Practically ever speaker pointed out that their academic education had been interrupted at one time or another, but not terminated; that education is a continuous process.

8. Intensification of vocational and technical education in our school system, beginning with practical arts in the Junior High School, continuing with a comprehensive vocational program in the High Schools and with a High School program in the Junior College.

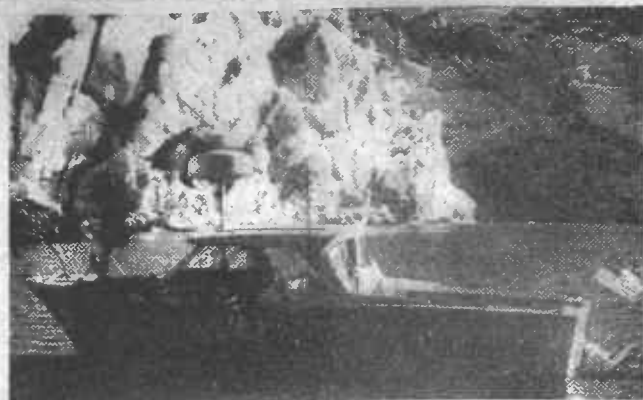

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. Veal round steak. Sometimes it's called veal cutlet.

Q. Where does it come from? How is it identified?

A. It comes from the leg section of the calf, which is the young beef cattle. Veal round has the same muscle and bone structure as beef, but it's much smaller in size, with little or no marbling. The lean is the characteristic light pink with texture that's very fine and almost velvety.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. By braising or pan-frying. Though tender, it cannot be broiled because of a lack of fat. It also has considerable connective tissue, and the delicate flavor needs a cooking method which will develop it. Sauces which are rich and colorful are excellent with veal. For braising, a liquid such as tomato juice or sauce is excellent since it intensifies both color and flavor of the veal. For pan-frying, veal is often coated with an egg-bread crumb mixture so it does not dry out during the cooking process. Whether braised or pan-fried, the cooking of veal should be slow.

Grated Apples Give Moistness To Fruit Bread

Bits of apple give wonderful flavor and texture to a loaf of quick bread. Their flavor mingles with that of sugar, flour, cinnamon and butter or margarine which contributes the crumbly topping to this home-baked loaf.

Combining the lard with sugar, then eggs and milk, explains Reba Staggs, home economist, is easy. Only one-fourth cup lard is needed in this recipe to give richness as well as tenderness to the bread.

Thinly sliced, Apple Crumb Bread will be popular at a special luncheon with a meaty salad as the main dish. When spread with softened cream cheese it will make delightful sandwiches for tea or as a snack for the school-age set.

Apple Crumb Bread

2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup melted lard
1 cup sugar

2 eggs, beaten
2 tablespoons milk
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup grated unpeeled tart apples
1/4 cup chopped nuts
3 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

Line the bottom of a 9 x 5-inch loaf pan with double thickness of waxed paper. Sift together 2 cups flour, baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Combine the lard, 1 cup sugar, eggs and milk. Mix well. Add the vanilla, apples and nuts. Add sifted ingredients, stirring only until dry ingredients are moistened. Pour into loaf pan and let stand 30 minutes. Combine 2 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, cinnamon and butter or margarine. Sprinkle mixture over batter. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) 55 to 60 minutes or until done.

*If glass loaf dish is used, reduce oven temperature to 325° F.

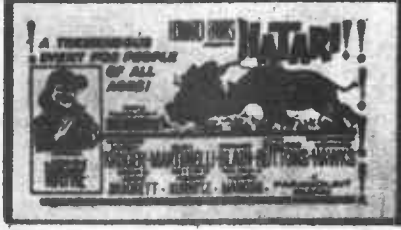

Hang Sew Center on Door

NEED a sewing center? Have a closet? With a minimum of effort and cost, you can have a handy sew-door that's hidden when not in use. Cost of the materials is less than \$25.

This handy device consists of four easily-built parts: (1) A let-down working surface hinged to the top of a (2) narrow cabinet in which a portable sewing machine and supplies are stored, (3) a framed Peg-Board panel fastened to the wall for hanging "work," and (4) another perforated hardboard panel serv-

ing as a table leg when the table is down.



Colorful Casseroles

Mix 2 packages (9 ounces) frozen thawed green beans with a can of celery or mushroom soup and place in a casserole. Top with 6 browned pork chops. Bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven 45 minutes.

Turkey takes on stroganoff style when it's cut and layered in a casserole with green pepper, chopped onion, cut in strips, cooked fine noodles and condensed cream of mushroom soup mixed with dairy sour cream.

Place Spanish rice from cans or use the instant product in a casserole, layered with smoked sausage links or frankfurters. Heat through in the oven.

Try creamed mixed vegetables with sliced ham or Canadian-style bacon in a casserole

combo. Dust the top with paprika or grated Cheddar cheese.

Ever tried tuna and salmon together? Layer in a casserole with white sauce and mushrooms, cooked macaroni or noodles and green peas.

Helen's Favorite Party Fruit Punch (24 servings)

- 3 cups water
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 can (46 ounces) pineapple juice
- 1-1/2 cups orange juice
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- 3 bananas, ripe, mashed
- 3 quarts gingerale
- 1 quart orange or lemon sherbet

Boil sugar and water 3 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in fruit juices and bananas. Pour into 4 freezer trays; freeze until firm. To serve let stand at room temperature 20 minutes, then scoop into punch bowl or glasses, add gingerale and top with sherbet scoops.

Ground Beef for Freezer

When you're stocking up on ground beef in the freezer, have it packaged in two ways. Some of it should be in patty form so it can be cooked, without lengthy thawing, as hamburgers in quick time. The remainder should be packaged in amounts to suit other needs of the family, like 1 1/2 to 2 pounds for meat loaves, spaghetti or pizza sauces.

For meat loaves the ground beef will need to be thawed, preferably in the refrigerator. For sauces and mixtures that call for browning the meat, it may be started in its frozen state.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Garrett, what is meant by "equality of opportunity" as we hear it. My teacher says no race comparisons can be made unless opportunities are equal but she seems to go beyond the use of the phrase and into wondering.

My teacher means that all men must have the same opportunity, then, obviously she doesn't know what she is talking about. For, opportunities are never equal. The task is not equal to an intelligent boy and a dull boy. A 100-yard dash is not equal to two youngsters, one strong and swift, and the other a weakling. Opportunities are suited to the abilities of men, that is all that may, in equity, be expected. A poorly trained man should be given the chance to do a job suitable to his talents, there being such a thing as a job. The bright, highly-trained man should be given the opportunity of holding a job equally suited to his talents, a far better job.

Orange, Onion Slices Season Pork Tenderloin

It's not always a tomato sauce or olive combination that contributes Spanish style to a meat dish. Sometimes orange and onion slices will do it. That's the case in these pork tenderloin patties.

Pork tenderloin is a tapering muscle from the loin section. To make the patties, the meat is cut and flattened, explains meat expert, Reba Staggs. Ten-

derloin is, of course, a very tender cut but braising is advised to develop the flavor in this recipe.

Breading the patties with egg and cracker crumbs adds flavor and helps to retain the shape. Since tenderloin is very lean, this method also helps the meat retain its juiciness.

Production Records

To protect his investment, it is considerable, a modern farmer must use every means to improve his management techniques. One of these is production records.

A complete record of production per field unit or animal unit allows intelligent planning and efficiency for future production.

For row crop production, a



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?

A. Pork boned and tied loin roast.

Q. Where does it come from? How is it identified?

A. It comes from the loin section. The retailer prepares this roast by cutting a whole pork loin into two pieces of equal length. They are boned, shaped and tied together. The roast usually weighs from four to six pounds.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. By roasting. This means placing the roast on a rack in an open pan or on a rotisserie rod. It should cook at moderate temperature (350° F.) until the roast meat thermometer registers 170° F. This will take 3½ to 4½ hours, allowing 35 to 40 minutes per pound for roasting. The newer temperature of 170° F. has been recently determined by university research. It's applicable to all pork loin roasts. If desired, the roast may be brushed with a glaze during the last 20 to 30 minutes of cooking time.

Calorie Trimming?

If one of your resolutions has you trimming your calories, consider the low-calorie content of variety meats, to help make the diet interesting.

Three and one-half ounces of cooked beef heart or kidney or liver (or pork liver) yield less than 200 calories, but they give a big nutrition wallop in the form of protein, vitamins and minerals.

complete record would include a map of numbered fields, type land preparation, planting densities and patterns, fertilization rates and kinds of fertilizer, cultivation and dates, herbicide and pesticide applications and harvest yields.

It would be a good idea to also include a record of rainfall and temperatures. Information of this type allows planning for

the future to be based on factual past performances.

Livestock farmers would want to include such information as hay, feed grain, silage and pasture production. He would need rate of grain of milk production records.

Several desirable record programs are available for livestock farmers. These include DHIA for the dairyman, and Beef Cattle Performance Test-

ing. For more information on these, see your County Agent.

Pasture Management

Lots of folks are wondering if it is too soon to put out fertilizer for fall growth of clover and other legumes. The answer is, No!

Too much fertilizer is spread too late in the fall rather than too early in the summer.

Those who put out fertilizer now on permanent pastures will

be the ones who have the best grass and clover pastures this fall and early next spring.

Many fertilizer companies now offer a spreading service. If notified in time, they will be glad to spread fertilizer on any permanent pasture.

Farmers who failed to put lime where needed last month are reminded that any month is a good time to apply lime to any area that needs it.

Overweight Children— Obesity Makes Them Victims Of Hazards

That plump, healthy, happy youngster may grow up to be a fat, unhealthy, unhappy older child, and later into a fat adult who is prey to all of the physical ailments that are a part of obesity.

Faulty eating habits started in early childhood often are the cause



of overweight adults in later life, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

All too many mothers, with the best of intentions, nag their small fry into eating more than they want to eat. The healthy, fat baby who remains chubby as he grows into pre-school and first grade years becomes less attractive as an individual. And the habit of eating more calories than necessary is likely to remain the rest of his life.

The parent is not the one to decide whether the child should lose weight, how he should lose it, or whether he should continue to remain "pleasingly plump."

Today's Health. The doctor should be consulted.

If it is your doctor's counsel, here are some tips to help your youngster lose weight.

• Weigh once a week and keep track of the weight. Use the same scale and wear approximately the same clothing.

• It isn't necessary to cut out all desserts and snacks, as long as their calorie count is included in the daily total. Fresh fruits are good for snacks.

• Keep a supply of raw carrots, radishes, celery sticks, and pickles for more snacking. Tomato juice or clear bouillon can serve for drinks.

• Cut out rich salad dressings; instead use vinegar and lemon juice.

• Trim fat from meat; take it easy on the butter; substitute skim milk for whole milk. But be sure to get sufficient Vitamin A from fruit and vegetables.

The most important factor in helping the obese child to reduce poundage is to handle it naturally. Don't make a point of telling the child he is on a reducing diet. Just serve the meals naturally and as a matter of course. Avoid nagging the child about his diet. It will only make him rebellious and more inclined to snack on the sly.

Pick a Lamb Chop

There are several varieties of lamb chops from which to choose. Rib and loin chops come from the center section while arm or blade chops come from the shoulder portion and sirloin chops are cut from the sirloin section next to leg steaks.

All five varieties are tender. They may be prepared by broiling or panbroiling, depending upon the thickness of the chop. Those less than an inch thick are usually cooked by panbroiling. Shoulder chops, either blade or arm types, are often prepared by braising since this gives a variety of flavors and seasonings.

Forestry

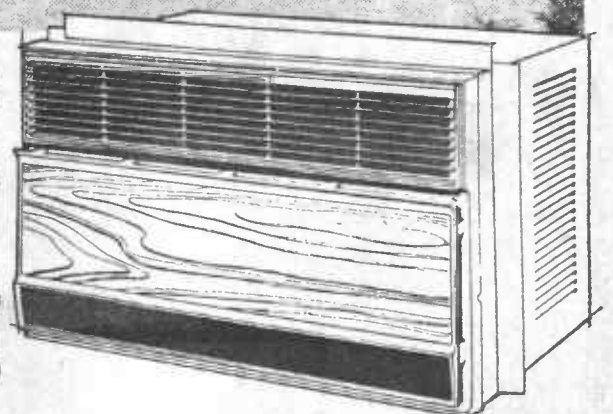

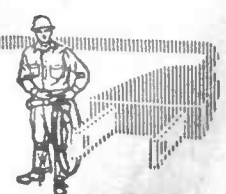

Pretty grim picture, isn't it? But is it true to life? The man who thinks so may tend to become depressed by thinking of himself as a watch running down as time passes, or a mountain stream petering out in the dry sands. He may even become neurotic because he isn't in demand on the job any more.

Useful yesterday, useless today. How many men have that pattern running through their minds right now, as they sit on the sofa during what used to be working hours and gaze out the window without seeing a thing?

Fact is, there's no reason to feel like that. The psychologists who have studied the problem say that retirement is nothing to be afraid of. Cover Story

To cover or not to cover may be a question sometimes when it comes to meat cookery. If it's a tender cut to be roasted, the rule is not to cover. Simply place the meat on a rack in an open, shallow pan. No moisture is added, of course!

Less-tender cuts of meat are the ones cooked by moist heat cookery. That means adding moisture and covering, please. These include blade and arm cuts, round steak, brisket, Boston or English cuts, oxtails, pork hocks and shanks.

If there is sometimes a doubt as to whether a cut is tender or less-tender, as in sirloin tip or rump roasts, the meat should be braised, as in a pot-roast. Only when these cuts are of high quality should they be roasted.
