## Bloodmobile Be In Iuka

Bloodmobile will be in Iuka on Monday, August 21, from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M., at the National Guard Armory. July 1st was the beginning of the new fiscal year for the bloodmobile. Iuka County used 700 bloodmobiles which will have been replaced before July of next year. There will be four drawing the year for the bloodmobile to be obtained.

## Football Practice

John Bryson Mann states that Iuka High School football practice starts today, August 10. All team hopefuls & members are urged to be present for the work. Practice will be held twice daily, each morning around 8 A.M. and each afternoon around 4 P.M. The group will be in the practice field before school.

## Iuka Public Schools

Burruss, superintendent of the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School, urges parents to complete their children's health records before the registration date.

Every year every student must be immunized. Certificate, he said, "regardless of student's age, grade, or record." This applies to students attending school at Iuka from grades 1-12.

Certificate certifies that child has been immunized against Diphtheria, Tetanus, Polio. Certificates are issued by the Board of Trustees of the school. It is valid for the school year, ending in the spring of 1968. Prior to the school the following year, the immunization status of the child must be re-evaluated by the physician or the county health department and a new certificate issued.

It is imperative that every child attending school have a certificate to present at registration," the superintendent said. "This is a state requirement and must be met before student may enter school. All students who have not already seen to the matter must do so at once."

According to Mrs. Bryson Mann, secretary, the first school bus drivers' meeting will be August 30, at 7 P.M. The bus drivers and faculty will be in the school building. Grades 1-6 and 10-12 will be in the gymnasium. Grades 7-9 will be in the cafeteria. Labor Day will be a holiday observed as the day after tomorrow. In grades 7-12 return to school on September 5, for the first day of school. The cafeteria will be open on this day. Details concerning the registration of school will be given



**IN RUNOFF** — State Treasurer William Winter will oppose veteran Congressman John Bell Williams in the runoff for Governor following one of the most dramatic democratic primaries in the turbulent political history of Mississippi. The biggest surprise has been the crushing defeat of former Governor Ross Barnett, who served as Chief Executive from 1960-64. Barnett ran 4th in the 7-man field. A second major political upset is a distinct possibility as State Representative Roy Black has edged

ahead of incumbent Governor Paul Johnson in Mississippi's race for Lieutenant Governor. Attorney Charles Sullivan of Clarksdale, a veteran campaigner, is holding a steady sizeable lead in the race. Black has moved a few thousand votes ahead of Johnson

## Bus Drivers School Date Is Aug. 21

The annual School Bus Driver's School has been scheduled in two sessions for August 21-26, according to Bobby Burruss, Iuka High School superintendent.

Instructor for the school will be John W. Shelton of Tupelo. "We urge all drivers, substitutes and all persons who might be interested in driving a school bus to attend this training school," he said. The school will be conducted August 21-23 at the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School beginning at 8 o'clock in Classroom 16 of the high school building. The second school will be held at Tishomingo High School, August 24-26, under the supervision of R. C. Strickland, principal. Mr. Shelton will conduct the class. Applicants may attend either school.

"This year new drivers will be issued certificates after completing the regular 20-hour course. Former licensed drivers holding certificates may renew them if they complete the work of the first day and the third morning," Mr. Burruss stated. It is compulsory that each applicant have a current driver's license.

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LOGICAL SOLUTION TO  
CIVIL-RIGHTS TROUBLES

There is a way to resolve the conflict grown out of this bloody civil-rights insurrection. At least I think there is.

In essence, The Synon Plan is based upon a more equitable distribution of the races. That is, arrange it so that each State would have a proportionate share of the Negro population. That is the plan, essentially, but there is more to it than that.

To begin, I would suggest that the Federal government — since it is so almighty smart in telling us the percentage of Negroes unemployed in the country — I would suggest it undertake a jobs-available listing. The breakdown would be by State, then by county, then by locality, and would cover every type of employment from corporation president to floor sweeper.

Then, using the latest census as guide, those areas with a disproportionate number of Negroes would be listed as "distressed", and thereafter they would be eligible for "race relief". Contrariwise, States with less than their fair share of Negroes would be listed as "race-opportunity areas".

Once a State had been classified as "distressed", it would be circularized with the jobs-available lists. In addition, the Federal government would announce its willingness to underwrite the expenses of any individual or family who wished to migrate. Moreover, the government would guarantee to pay for a 12-month period the living expenses of the migrants.

Take a few illustrations to see how it would work (all figures are from the 1960 Federal census):

First, a distressed area. Mississippi, say. Mississippi has a total population of 2,178,141. Of this number, 915,743, or more than 40 per cent, are Negroes. Now, since Negroes constitute about 11 per cent of our total population — a rising 11 per cent — for Mississippi to have no more than its fair share of Negroes, it should export 676,148.

Where to? Well, to Iowa, for one place. Iowa has a total population of 2,757,537. The 1960 census enrolled but 25,354 Iowa Negroes, less than one per cent. Thus, Iowa would become a race-opportunity area with room for 275,753 of Mississippi's Negroes.

Take Vermont: Vermont, in 1960, had a population of 389,881, of whom 519 were Negroes. That is slightly more than one-tenth of one per cent. For Vermont to have its fair share, it should import 42,367 Negroes.

Or its neighbor, New Hampshire: New Hampshire is home to 606,921 people, of whom 1,903 are listed as Negroes. That is about three-tenths of one per cent of the total population.

Consequently, New Hampshire, to acquire its fair share, should import 64,858 Negroes.

Or Massachusetts. Massachusetts is a race-opportunity area if ever there was one, the home of the Kennedys. The Bay State, in 1960, had a total population of 5,148,578 people. At that time, it had 111,842 Negroes; two per cent. To achieve its proportionate share, it should import another 454,501. In doing so it would, in effect, remove Mississippi from the distressed-area roll: a real neighborly gesture.

There are just any number of such States that could be labeled race-opportunity areas. Both Dakotas come to mind.

I would go further. By the use of Federal funds within individual States — and the Federal government has grown to be a past master at this — it could relocate ghetto Negroes all over a given State. It might, for instance, post throughout Harlem the jobs to be had in upstate New York. Then, by going through the relief rolls it could advise its "clients" as to where the work was to be had and what the financial inducements were to move. It could also inform said "clients" of the penalty — no more charity — if the move were not made.

How about that? I think it would work.

Sure, but does it have any chance of adoption? Not a chance.

Why not? Because such as Lyndon Johnson and Bobby Kennedy, having induced these poor people to come to the ghettos, now have them locked in a bloc vote. And by prodding them, by tantalizing them, by continually telling them others are responsible for their plight, the Negroes vote as Johnson-Kennedy would have them — swing the State for them, as a matter of fact — and so perpetuate their cynical selves in office.

The truth is, the Johnson-Kennedy cabal are waxing fat on Negro misery; they have a vested interest in it. Therefore, any proposal that has merit, i.e., that actually promises to alleviate conditions — disperse Negroes — and thus weaken their domination over colored people, that sort of thing is blown down with a very quiet but forceful wind.

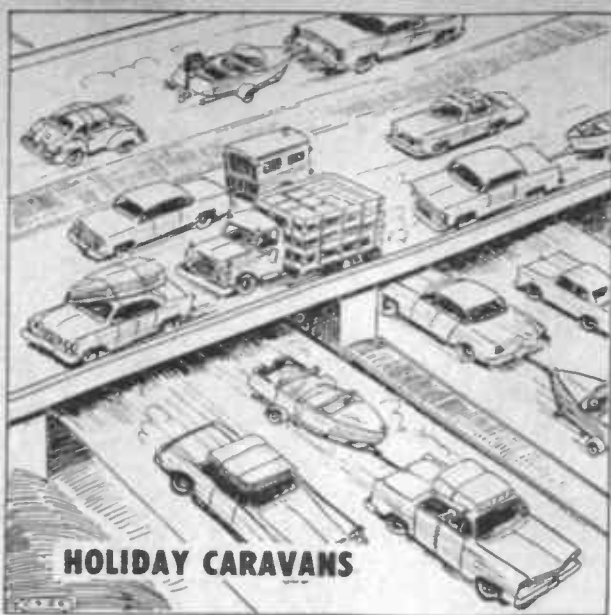

'Black Power' Revolution

The nightmare of rioting and pillaging which has overwhelmed Detroit and other American cities is the end result of more than a decade of encouragement of anarchy by American liberals.

As this column warned for several years, the repeated glib praise of "revolution" by liberal leaders in the United States — clergymen and professors as well as politicians in the Northeast — has turned into a horror story of bloodshed and savagery.

The idea that one group of Americans possesses an unrestricted right to break local laws, to demonstrate and to engage in civil disobedience is at the root of the terrorism striking many cities in this land.

Behind the criminal insurrection in Detroit and elsewhere are liberal counsels of appalling moral irresponsibility. The rioters, looters and arsonists have been encouraged in recent years to believe that they were above the law. When disturbances took place in Southern communities, for example hundreds of clerical carpetbaggers descended on these towns and cities to condemn the law enforcement authorities. Now, the shoe is on the other foot. The hometowns of the liberal clergy and liberal professors are engulfed in the smoke of armed rebellion against lawful government. Southerners cannot be used as scapegoats.

Conservative Americans saw the insurrection coming over the last few years. Mob violence, excused by the liberals, grew each year. The first big national disaster of this sort took place in the Watts district of Los Angeles. Rioters and looters at work in that outbreak never were treated with sufficient severity.

The liberals, which have enjoyed massive support from churches and charitable foundations, have been slow to learn a lesson. Only days before the Detroit rioting broke out, there was the notorious "black power" conference in Newark, N. J., another city scared by anarchist rebels. The chairman of the conference, it turned out, was the executive director of the Department of Urban Work of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark. He used the Cathedral House of the diocese for news conferences.

It is to be hoped that the liberal clergy and the so-called "intellectuals," who bear such a heavy responsibility for the outbreak of anarchism, will admit their errors. At the minimum, these must be compelled to acknowledge the face of savagery in Detroit, Newark and elsewhere in this riot-torn land. The ordinary citizen certainly will have no difficulty tracing the moral rights and wrongs of the situation.

Decent people don't riot simply because they have a job that pays \$1 an hour, instead of \$1.50 an hour. They don't loot stores — stealing liquor and television sets — because the apartment they live in was built in the 1920's or earlier. Millions of people with low income are determined to be good citizens, to obey the laws, and to respect property belonging to others.

History tells us that some

people have little or no capacity for lawful, respectable behavior, that the savage sometimes is right below the skin. No amount of sociological gobbledey gook can cover up the facts of jungle-like behavior evidenced in the Detroit rioting, for example. If this kind of behavior is what our country is confronting with, then the civilized people of Michigan and other states have to employ sufficiently strong police and population control methods to prevent cities becoming jungles. It won't suffice to pay blackmail by means of anti-poverty programs. Detroit, for that matter, had one of the biggest anti-poverty programs in the nation. It didn't prevent rioting and looting.

The riots of this tragic summer point up the truth that "law and order" will have to be the watchwords of responsible Americans in the year ahead. The presidential election campaign should be keyed to civic security, for decent citizens must have security in their homes, businesses and communities. The ordeal by urban terrorism must be ended. The rule of liberal fallacies, with respect to policing, housing and welfare, must be shattered by realistic, respectable citizens determined that this land, which we wouldn't give back to the Indians, won't fall into the hands of urban savages bent on murder, theft and destruction.

Q: Dr. Garrett, isn't segregation demeaning to the individual?

A: It depends. All of us are limited in what we can do and where we can go. Sometimes such limitations turn on our appearance, on our clothes, our money, our religion, or our character — on a hundred things. Most people accept such limitations to their activities because they know they are reasonable. Social groupings of those of like kind and interests is natural behavior. In the barnyard, even fowls set up a "pecking order" — one hen pecks all others, and one is pecked by all. So men form clubs, communities, societies because they are more comfortable where diversity is less. Communities are enlargements of family groups. Only the dissatisfied — and often undesirable — want to intrude where they are unwanted.

A Sad Case

Speaking of retirement — met an old school friend of mine the other day, Josh Larkin. Hardly knew the guy, he'd changed so much in the two years since I last crossed his path. Thin, cross-looking, hollow, he looked about ten years older than his actual age, which I knew for a fact to be 67. Yet he didn't look sick, just kind of dismal.

I wondered what was wrong. Last time I'd talked with Josh he'd been so full of life. Had just decided to hand over the management of his prosperous hardware store to his son — and enjoy a well-earned rest.

"Just think," Josh had said, beaming: "No more late hours; no more stocktaking headaches; no more unreasonable customers. I won't know what to do with myself." And he laughed.

Transpired he was right —

about not knowing what to do with himself. A few months at home, as he now dolefully explained, and he was back at the store, offering to help.

Missed all the bustle too much. Couldn't get used to being around the house all day.

So he worked part-time in the store for a while. But he could see, though his son didn't say so, that he wasn't needed there any more. And maybe he had been too ready with advice. Young people seemed to resent that nowadays. Anyway, said Josh, he'd quit again. Just as well, because he hadn't been keeping too well, had lost weight (as I could see) and felt tired all the time.

As soon as I heard this tale of woe I was convinced that Josh was suffering from exactly the kind of reaction I described last week: retirement depression. As he was such an old friend I told him so. And I urged him to see his doctor. This kind of depression can become pretty serious if you don't get professional help. You can end up thinking you're no use to anyone, withdrawing into a world of your own.

So the first thing to do when you're ready to retire — and this can't be repeated too often — is to arrange a new life for yourself. Don't let yourself fall into a rut through lack of preparation. Or if this has already happened, take steps to climb out of it. It isn't enough to tell yourself that now you'll have time to do as you like. You have to have firm plans.

And if you're not quite sure how to go about the whole business — this column wants to help.



From Florence Hill, Corvallis, Montana: "I read the memories of Mrs. Grace Underwood of Wolf, Kentucky and was very interested. I remember when we were in the South. We children walked to school. We wore high top boots with buckle tops. The boys had two buckles, the girls had one.

On Saturdays and Sundays, my mother made candy and my sister and I sold it. Mother also made pillow slips, which we sold for \$1 a pair. This is what we lived on. Later, mother baked bread and took in washing. She baked bread for the whole town and sold it for 10c a loaf. It was a small town, about 175 people. This was in 1900. We lived in Mexico, which is New Mexico now.

There was plenty of "wide, open spaces." Children didn't stray far from the house because of the danger of stampedes — plenty of longhorn cattle about in those days.

My grandfather was born in Kentucky, although I never knew exactly what part of the state.

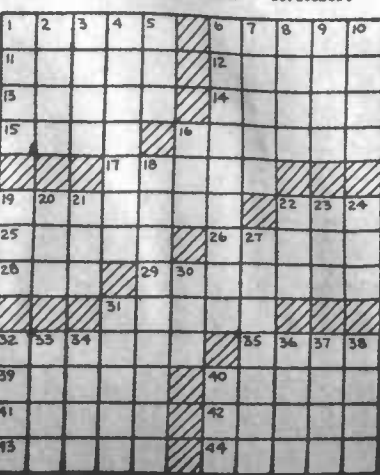
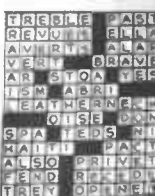

## Birth Certificates Take Time; Applications Should Be Made Now

If you are going to need a birth certificate in the next two months, don't delay in making application.

This applies particularly to parents of beginner school children who will need a birth certificate to show proof of age for school admission.

"Our mail is already getting heavier as the annual 'school rush' begins," said Miss Margaret E. Rice, who directs the filing and certification of Mississippi's vital records.

"Normally it takes three to four days to handle a request for a certificate. First a search has to be made for it among over six million vital records on file. Then it has to be photocopied and the seal attached.

Also we have to account for the fee," explained Miss Rice.

During the peak months of August and September as the mail gets heavier and heavier, a backlog of requests piles up at the State Board of Health's vital records offices.

In making application for a birth certificate, Miss Rice urges that complete information be furnished and that a fee of \$2.00 be enclosed for each copy requested.

"Each day from 25 to 50 requests for certificates are returned to the senders because of lack of information, misinformation or failure to enclose

the required fee," stated Miss Rice.

The following information should be furnished in requesting a birth certificate:

1. Name of individual (as given at time of birth)
2. Date of birth
3. Place of birth (county)
4. Father's name
5. Mother's maiden name

Blanks are making requests are available from any county

health department.

However, a request for a birth certificate may be in letter form provided full and complete information is given and the required fee is enclosed.

Requests should be addressed to the State Board of Health, P. O. Box 1700, Jackson, Mississippi 39205.

Telephone requests for birth certificates are not accepted, according to Miss Rice.

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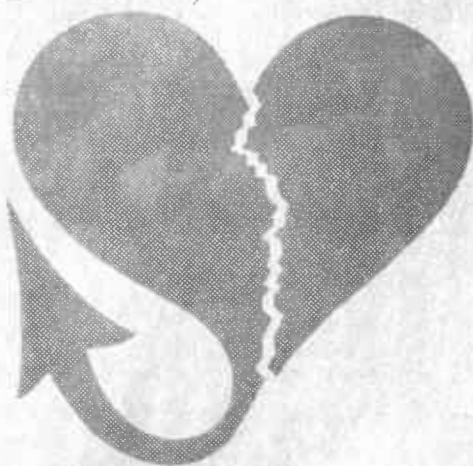

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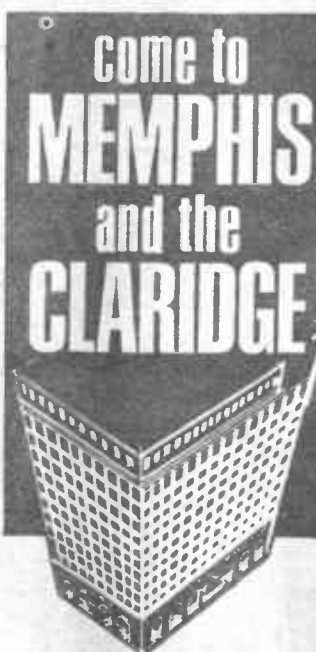

**Cotton**  
Cotton should be "the little things that count" this year in your production.

Little things often pay big dividends for the time and money involved. A good example is the preparation for the cotton picker. Cotton fields can still be in good shape if the area contains tall grass. This will reduce profits for the cotton picker.

Adequate control of grass is essential. Rows, plow, scrape, clip and herbicides. Keep grass under control.

**Pastures**  
This is a good time to plan for winter grazing. One of the available mixtures is wheat and grass. Book or buy seed of one of the new varieties of grass. You will get a lot of growth with either Gulf Stream or ryegrass than you get with common ryegrass. The land where winter wheat will be planted every year or so from now until then. This will pay off in grazing during the fall and winter.

**Soybeans**  
Soybeans are heavily

infested with cocklebur. 2,4-DB may be the answer.

Use 2/10th pound of 2,4-DB in 10 gallons of water from two weeks before early bloom to mid-bloom. Best control is obtained if this material is applied after cocklebur plants have elongated and are equally as tall as the beans.

For a good cocklebur kill, both the beans and the cockleburs must be in a vigorous growing condition. Some soybean injury usually occurs after use of 2,4-DB but the injury usually disappears within a week after treatment.

#### Prevent Summer Slump

Lack of feed, not heat, causes summer slump in milk production. Here are some things you can do to prevent the slump:

Feed high quality stored forage when pastures quality goes down. Adjust your grain feeding as pasture quality changes. Keep the distance short between feed, water and shade. Let cattle graze during the cool part of the day. Control flies. Remember cool water and salt are the cheapest milk making feeds.

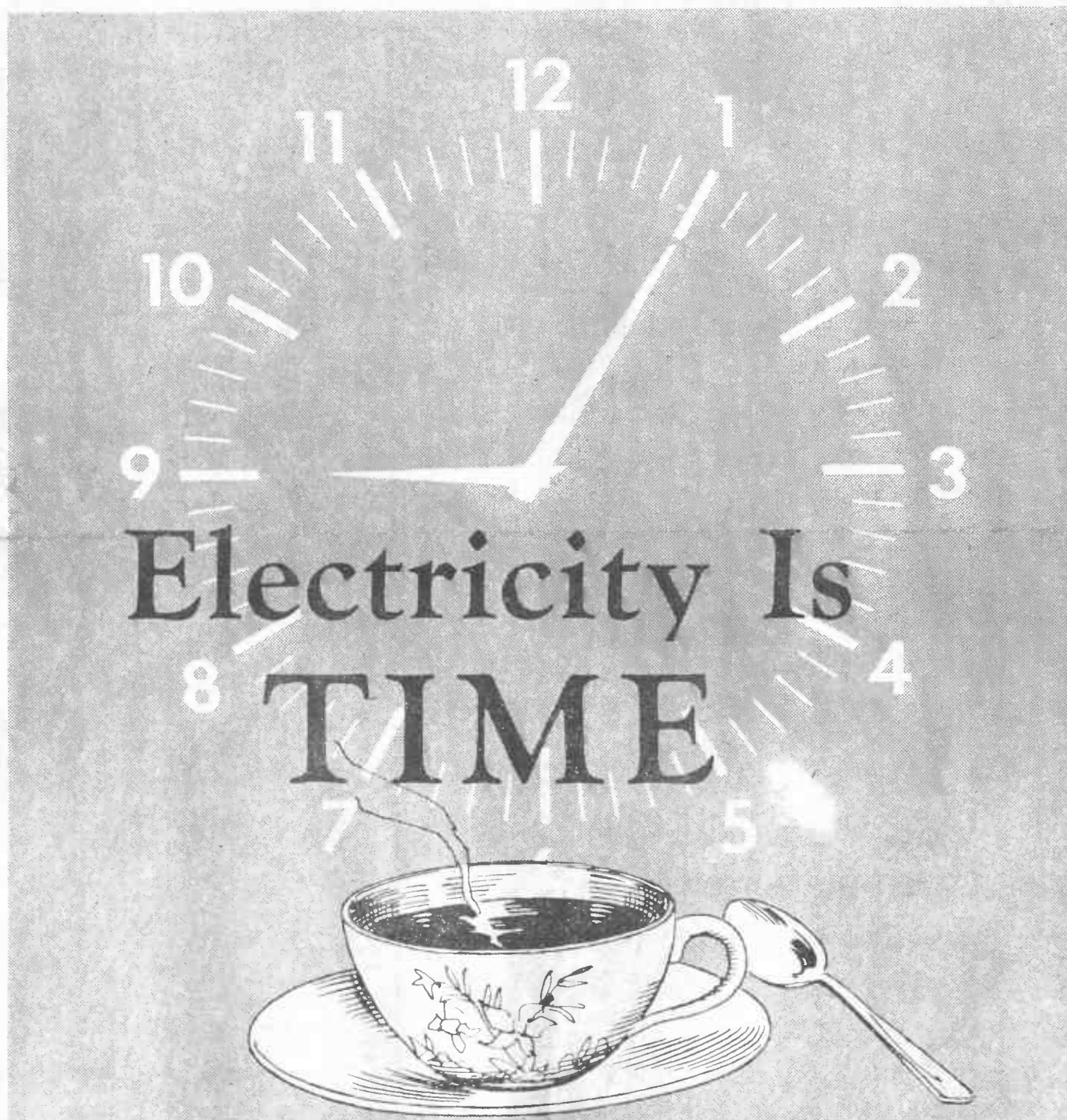

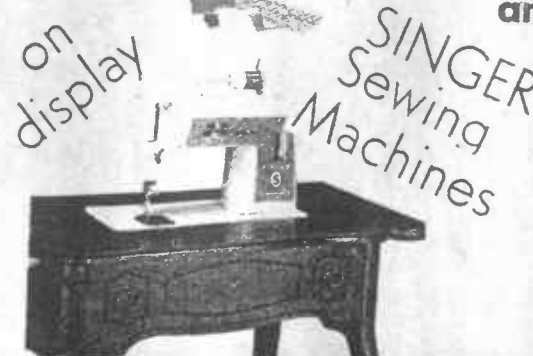

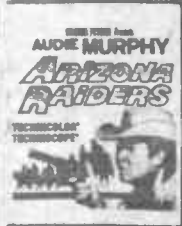

## "Whatsoever Things"

Strange sometimes are the answers children give to some of the serious questions we ask them. Up in Sheffield Lake, Ohio, Mrs. Patricia Wehner asked her class of third graders at Forestlawn Elementary School a serious question. "What do you think" she asked, "would most help bring peace to the world?" She got many and varied answers.

One of her pupils said that she "Would stop people from copying." Another thought it would help to bring peace if we would say "peace and thank you." You can tell that pupil has had some good training at home. Another thought it would aid the cause of peace to "share your toys."

Some pupils gave a few answers nearer the solution. One said, "Don't holler at anyone."

I guess it might help if we put that suggestion to practice. Another said, "I would be kind to the President." And I imagine that the President would appreciate that. Still another said, "I would try to help sick people in other lands." We are grateful to the Creator for this young mind that is already thinking of being a servant to fellowmen. One child let her homework show by answering, "I would try to look beautiful for my husband."

One of the students was getting near the answer when he answered, "I would try to keep the white man and colored man from fighting each other." There are a lot of people who are trying their best to do exactly that. One child said that it would help most to bring peace to the world by controlling weapons. "I wouldn't sell guns," said the pupil. Evidently this child thought guns were the cause of the trouble in the world. And I guess that there are many of us who would agree. If we could destroy the weapons, not sell guns, it would do most to bring peace to the

world. That's what we say.

And we are wrong. Absolutely wrong. And if this is our solution to the problem then it shows that our thoughts about the problem just doesn't go deep enough. Guns do not cause the problems of the world. It is the people who carry the guns, and shoot the guns, and force others to carry guns and shoot them, that cause the problems in the world. And if we humans did not have guns with which to fight, we would find a suitable substitute.

You see, the unrest in the world is not caused by guns but by humans. One third grader evidently knew this for the student wrote this answer — "I would tell others about Jesus." Don't laugh at that student. He is nearer the solution than many world leaders. In a real sense, in a true sense, that is the only solution to the problem of world peace. The Carpenter, you see, will change men. And men are going to have to change if we are to ever know peace.
