First Primary Brings Out Record Vote In County

Approximately seven thou-
and, one hundred and six voters
cast ballots in the August 8th
First Primary election. This fi-
gure, when compared with the
approximately 5006 in the First
Primary in 1963, shows a tre-
mendous increase in voter
strength in the county. Accord-
ing to the election commission,
there are 9377 qualified voters.

This year's First Primary
gave only one county candidate
a majority over his opponents.
That was Robert D. Sims in the
race for re-election as Chancery
court clerk. Sims polled 3933
votes to Belue's 2419 and Bish-
op's 683.

Runoff races in the county in-

clude, for sheriff, Cutshall with
1372 votes, versus Patterson
with 1241. Next highest was
Whit Wilson with 1169. Candi-
dates eliminated were Dawson,
Hall, Ledbetter, Medley, Pen-
nington, Thorne, Yarber and
Shoffner.

In the Circuit Clerk's race,
L. E. (Gene) Robinson, with 2480
votes, is faced by Lamar Ruth-
erford with 1994. Candidates el-
minated in this race were Rye
and Wigginton.

In the race for superintendent
of education, a run-off is in pro-
gress between Phifer with 3188
votes, and Mercer with 2862.
Cleston Scruggs was eliminated

with 1109 votes.

In the First District campaign
for Supervisor, Herbert Biggs,
seeking re-election, is opposed
by Carl Hendrix. Biggs polled
824 votes while Hendrix got
639 — a difference of 185 votes.
W. A. (Albert) Rhodes won his
election for justice of the peace
over two opponents with 1131
votes. Votes for his opponents
were: Yarber 776 and
Brown 312. In the First District
constable race, Bob Waters won
re-election over two opponents
with 1175 votes, compared to
Wilson with 441, Skinner with
331 and Yarbrough with 251.

Approximately 2198 people
cast ballots in the First District.

In the Second district races,
for Supervisor, Russell Bonds
goes into the second primary
with Gerald Parsons. Bonds re-
ceived 630 votes while Parsons
got 354. Others eliminated in
this race were Cummings and
Cresap. Second District justice
of the peace has got Ray Jour-
dan with 337 votes opposed by
J. W. Bonds with 293. Those
eliminated in this race were
M. J. Jane Marlar, Joe Meyers,
and Charles Bray. In the race
for second district constable,
Ray Glidewell with 604 votes
is opposed by Jim Moore with
462. Pete Thornton was the
candidate eliminated in this
race.

Approximately 1360 people
cast ballots in the Second Dis-
trict.

In the Third District, A. C.
Ryan won easy re-election over
his single opponent. The votes
were, Ryan 631; Wood 138. In
the justice of the peace race,
Jimmy Bailey with 274 votes is
opposed by Mrs. Hazel Parsons
with 188. Candidates eliminated
were Bill Davis, and Wayne Hel-
ton. In the race for constable,
J. F. McAnally was easy victor
with 478 votes over Lester Bry-
ant with 232. There is no run-off
in this constable race.

Approximately 767 people
cast ballots in the Third Dis-
trict.

In the Fourth District, for su-
pervisor, Woodrow Black with
301 votes will face M. R. White-
head who got 299 votes. Those
eliminated were Carlos Ingram,
Robert Buchanan, W. W. South-
ward and Audie House. In the
race for justice of the peace,
J. W. Southward with 318 votes
is opposed by Henry Marlar
with 285. Candidates eliminated
were Floyd Ware and Victor
Crane. There were no candi-
dates for constable.

Approximately 1015 people
cast ballots in the Fourth Dis-
trict.

In the Fifth District the race
for Supervisor brought forth
possibly the biggest upset of
the election in the county. Vet-
eran Supervisor Steve South-
ward was defeated by Leon Cook,
the votes being, for Cook 871, and
South 827. J. Calvin Long won
re-election for justice of the
peace over Earnest Boyd with
921 votes to 742. In Fifth Dis-
trict race for constable, Richard
J. Cleveland got 767 votes and
will be opposed in the run-off
by H. C. Pounders with 446
votes. Those eliminated in this
race were T. R. Hutcherson and
Larry Pardue.

Approximately 1698 people
cast ballots in the Fifth District.

Meyers' total was unchanged
after the re-count.

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ON RACE RIOTS: CAUSE AND CURE

There is this that may be said of race riots: If the equalitarians who now control our country remain in power, the lives of us all will become more and more chaotic. Lyndon Johnson, given the chance, will destroy this republic. And don't talk to me of Republicans; there is not a Republican on the national scene who has an understanding of the problem. Or having it, reacts as should an honest man.

That is to be expected; the Republican attitude, I mean. Theirs is the same as is held by most of us, an attitude built upon a single premise: All men are equal. And, dammit, all men are not equal. Men are different; races are different; and if we do not come to grips with that fundamental fact — overthrow these equalitarians — we will know a worsening situation, ending in national collapse.

That is the way we are heading, into oblivion. As an indicator, read the Department of Labor's well-meant (?) unemployment summaries. In all of them there runs a central thread: The races are equal — nothing else is even considered.

I have in hand one such summary, published last March. It will serve as a model.

The unemployment rate among Negro slum dwellers, it goes, is 10 per cent or more, as opposed to four per cent, nationally. Then it says, unemployment on the part of Negro individuals "is primarily a story of inferior education, no skills, police and garnishment records, discrimination, fatherless children, dope addiction, helplessness."

No doubt.

It says, six of 10 applicants lack skill; one in five is poorly motivated; 15 per cent are heavy drinkers.

Now, the recurring reason given as to the cause of this total situation — false as that reason is — is the only clear note struck: This situation prevails, so we are told and retold, because of racial discrimination, that White people mistreat Negro people, invidiously discriminate against them; "we" do not give the Negro a chance.

And that is the lie of the century. Hitler, in all his fancy, never dreamed of one so big.

People are coming to realize the monstrous nature of the charge but because they don't know what to do about it, because the equalitarians keep the truth larded over, the rotten mess that is Lyndon Johnson's integration policy lies soggy in its own deceptive context, its rot permeating every element of our cultural and political life.

Read again those facts on Negro unemployment and while you read, consider the possibility that there are, in truth, meaningful differences between the races, characteristics of one race that make it impossible for the other ever to compete successfully. In that frame, they take on a different nuance, don't they?

Suppose for a moment it is true that races are unequal — i.e. different — that the talents and shortcomings of each race follow divergent paths. And suppose both races are caught up in a common culture, a culture cut to the measurement and standards of one but not of the other. Should it surprise you, then, when the "alien" race does not do as well as the race that created the environment? Does it surprise you when a duck on a pond out-swims a chicken; both are birds, you know, and in that sense, equal. And are you aiding the chicken when you keep throwing him back into the water with instructions to swim like a duck? Or are you, bit by bit, drowning the benighted, confused critter?

Face the truth: Until the Negro race was exposed to the White race, the Negro's cultural history — by White standards — was a 5,000-year blank. Negroes had not domesticated an animal; they had not learned the principal of the wheel; the extent of their architecture was mud huts; they had no written language; no system of mensuration; and their idea of agriculture consisted of digging a hole in the ground and dropping in a seed; cannibalism was a common practice and, in Africa, remains just that, a common practice.

Now, then. None of this necessarily makes the White race superior to the Negro race. You may think it does — by your standards. But "superior" and "inferior" are relative words, matters of opinion. However that may be, these particularities certainly do make the races different, that is, unequal, as an apple and an orange are different and unequal.

And if you take mud-hut people and pit them in competition with those who create cathedral spires, and lay down rules according to "cathedral" standards, what would you expect?

Wouldn't you expect unemployment to be at least 10 per cent, crime to be rampant, drunkenness rife, and bastardy the normal thing. Ultimately riots? I would.

There is a line from a song that seems apropos: "Give a man a horse he can ride."

Do so and our race troubles will level off. Fail to do so and we will have Watts, Newark, Detroit and way stations.

Common Sense on Slums

In proposing a domestic Marshall Plan to rid the nation of slums and slum problems, including guerrilla war in the streets of America, Vice President Hubert Humphrey ignores human and economic realities. Disasters such as the terrible riot in Detroit cannot be stopped by vastly increasing public spending. Slums cannot be eliminated by federal expenditures, for buildings don't make slums; people make slums.

Indeed one of the lessons of the Detroit tragedy is that anti-poverty programs don't constitute insurance for American cities against the ravages of rioters, looters and arsonists.

Detroit had king-size anti-poverty programs in operation when the rioting broke out. Street revolutionaries, who destroyed approximately half a billion dollars worth of property, were not inhibited in their terrorism by government handouts.

Unfortunately, the liberals still rely on public spending as a cure-all. Like the Bourbon kings of old, they yearn nothing and forget nothing. After the initial shock of the rioting, they are back at the old stand, calling for more public spending to prevent further outbreaks. "The New York Times," for example, speaks of "the urban poor condemned to the slums."

It sees huge outlays of cash as the avenue to municipal peace. These are fallacies. In the first place, no American is "condemned" to a slum. He may live in one, but he can escape by hard work. No country in the world offers such economic opportunity or social mobility for people on the bottom still of life. The history of America is the history of hard-working people who get ahead. Generations of Americans have started with nothing, and made a comfortable place for themselves in their communities.

Why is it that one group of Americans in today's cities seem to be stalled? It is not a lack of opportunity. Never before has there been so much free education. Jobs are abundant. But education and job opportunities

are useless if there is no will to learn and no desire to work, if government teaches one group that it is entitled to an endless variety of handouts and special privileges. This is what Big Government has been preaching in recent years. This is the philosophy of the liberals.

It is not surprising, therefore, that one group now apparently believes that it has no obligation to pull itself up by its own bootstraps, that this is a duty of government or social assistance agencies. And as government, in the last analysis, really is unable to uplift a people to the level of self-reliant citizens, the handout-happy people become resentful and bitter. They feed on the emotional diet dished out by communists and fellow-travelers.

The liberal doctrine of social "revolution" in a few years has been translated into an imagined right to riot and loot. Those who have been taught that they are poor because Society let them down are now rapidly gaining the idea that they don't have to pay for goods — that all they need do is throw a brick through a plateglass window and reach in and grab a color TV set.

The classical definition of this situation is Anarchy. Civilized societies have to arm themselves against this situation — literally as well as in terms of political understanding. Thus the first step for restoration of decency in America's cities is a massive strengthening of the law enforcement agencies and the laws under which they operate.

Before the blight of slums can be removed, slum-dwellers must acquire a new outlook. They must regain the respect for law that has been eroded in recent years. The best way to rebuild such respect is by full and prompt prosecution of promoters of insurrection such as Stokely Carmichael, former head of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee.

Carmichael showed his true colors when he surfaced in Havana, threatened vengeance against the President of the United States, and described Chinese Communist Dictator Mao Tse-tung as his "idol."

Carmichael and other apostles of urban terrorism must be brought to justice. Rioters must be made to understand that social and economic advances can only be made within the framework of law and order. If respect for law and belief in hard work are recreated in the hearts of disorderly citizens, then — and only then — will it be possible to eliminate slums.

Those of us who have reached retirement age may think we can turn our backs on what's going on. But we're kidding ourselves. Events concern us too.

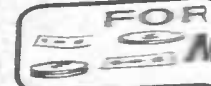

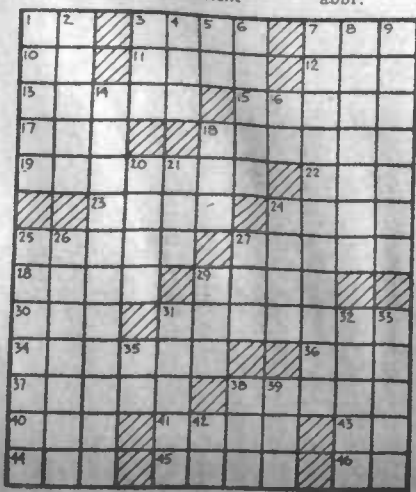

Plan now to plant Fescue and Ladino or Regal Clover in late August or early September for permanent winter grazing.

Fescue pastures, properly managed, will furnish good grazing year after year without replanting. Any annual, like rye grass, wheat, or oats has to be planted every year. Fescue is a perennial plant and comes up each year from the roots.

Like any pasture grass, Fescue requires proper fertilization (Nitrogen is a necessity) and good management.

Fescue will grow on hill land but does best on well drained good bottom soil. It is a good grazing as well as a good soil and water conserving crop.

Herbicides

You have to take the bitter with the sweet. Chemical weed control has saved many dollars in expense and has boosted yields. But there are some precautions and restrictions on uses of these materials

Lots of farmers have always planted winter grazing following harvest of corn or sorghum silage. Generally, the silage was harvested in August and the grazing planted in September.

But, where simazine, atrazine, karmex, or propazine were used for weed control in the silage crop, a wait of one year is necessary before planting winter grazing. This is because the chemical will kill or seriously damage the winter grazing. Some of these herbicides call for an 18-month waiting period.

Where lorox was used as a post-emergence treatment on the silage crop, a four month waiting period is recommended. If 2,4-D was used, there is no waiting period.

Check with the local county agent for detailed information.

Beef Check-Off Program

September 4 is the kick-off date for the Mississippi Beef Council's 10 cents a head check-off on all cattle sold by producers and feeders in Mississippi.

The voluntary program is designed to organize and carry out a balanced Mississippi beef promotion, education, and research effort.

The 10 cents will be withheld by cooperating marketing agencies. Any seller not wanting to participate in the program may request that his 10 cents a head be returned. It will be done without delay.

Half of the monies collected in the check-off program will remain in Mississippi to be used in advertising, research, and legislative programs. The National Livestock and Meat Boards beef promotion division will receive three cents out of each 10 cents, and the American National Cattlemen's Association, two cents.

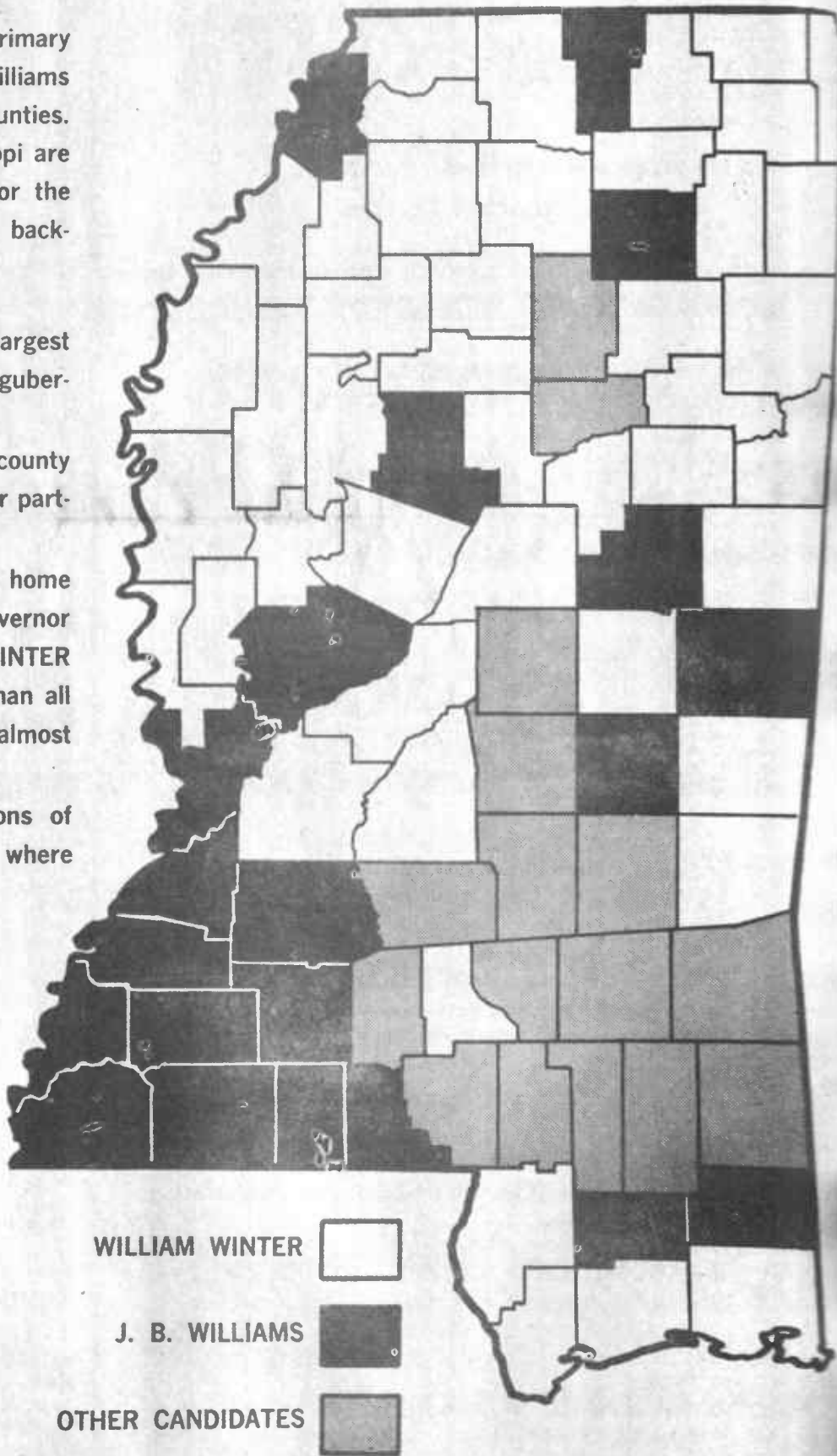

Maybe all these figures about the heart impressed you. They should. But there is something still more impressing about the heart than its statistical report. And that is what happens to a person when his heart comes into contact with its Creator.

Home Economist's Notes

Are you keeping the temperature in your home freezer low enough to insure safe, high quality foods? The storage temperature should be zero or below.

A recent survey of urban and farm homemakers with home freezers showed that only about one out of three of the farm freezers and one out of four of the urban freezers had thermometers. About a third of the freezers registered temperatures higher than zero when checked.

Accent Appearance

Don't just tell teenagers that good nutrition is good for them. Tell them good nutrition will help them look good.

That's the advice of Dr. Evelyn Spindler, U. S. Department of Agriculture Extension nutritionist. She says convincing teenagers of the relationship between appearance and diet can often motivate them to improve their eating habits.

Shiny hair, dry skin, good posture and correct weight all are influenced by good nutrition.

Work Away Pounds

Are you anxious to lose weight?

Increase your daily activity. Take a brisk walk. Work around the yard. Take up bowling or another sport.

Nutritionists say time spent in moderate activity instead of reading, watching television or playing cards can help to take off extra pounds.

Suppose you are an overweight woman who eats just enough to maintain her weight. You can lose about 9 pounds in a year by substituting daily an hour of activities such as light gardening or a brisk walk for an hour of activities you do while sitting.

If you spend another hour in active recreation instead of sitting, you'll lose another 15 lbs. a year. This totals about 24 pounds — without a change in diet.

Skillet Chuck Roast — To serve chuck roast in summer without heating your house, cook in an electric skillet on the porch or patio.

Blue Cheese Toasties — For 10 servings, cut a long, pound loaf of French bread into 20 equal-sized slices. Spread mixture of a cup of blue cheese salad dressing and ½ cup finely-chopped green pepper over the slices.

Place them on a cookie sheet and heat in a hot oven (400 degrees F) for 8 minutes, or until bubbly and slightly browned. Try with a tossed green salad.

Save Meat Bits — Individual gelatin salads are a hearty luncheon main course when they are made with meat. Grind or dice cooked meat — beef, ham, veal, bologna, or any cold cut — and add it to a basic aspic recipe. Spoon the mixture into individual molds and chill. Unmold the salads on lettuce leaves and top with mayonnaise or other salad dressing.

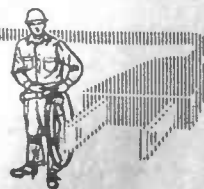

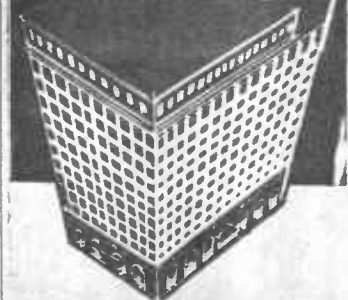
