Three Districts Have Supervisor's Race

With only five days remain-
ing, political battles are being
waged right down to the final
wire for some county and state
offices. And not to be forgotten
are the races for supervisor in
the First, Second and Fourth
districts. Political observers are
predicting some of the tightest
contests in the county for many
years.

Statewide, in the race for gov-
ernor, First Primary leader Wil-
liam Winter is being met head-
on by Congressman John Bell
Williams, this race offering a
whirlwind campaign by both
candidates in their efforts to
lure votes cast for the losing
candidates in the first election.

Winners in the Second Pri-
mary will go into the general
election in November, some of
them to face statewide Repub-
lican opposition.

In the race for Lt.-Gov., Char-
les Sullivan of Clarksdale was
easy winner over a field of six,
including Gov. Paul B. Johnson.
Winning a close race with John-

son for second position was Roy
Black of Nettleton. Black poll-
ed an unusually high vote in
Tishomingo county in the first
election and is expected to re-
peat his performance again next
Tuesday. However, outcome of
this election in the state is still
anyone's guess.

Locally, the races for sheriff,
circuit clerk and superinten-
dent of education are affording
plenty of speculation with all
predicted to be close.

In the runoff for Sheriff, Pat-
terson and Cutshall are the op-
ponents while Robinson and
Lamar Rutherford are seeking
the circuit clerk's job. Robinson
is running for reelection. B. L.
Mercer, incumbent, is opposed
by Melvin Phifer in the contest
for superintendent of education.
Phifer led Mercer and Cleston
Scruggs in the first primary.

In the race for state senator,
Cecil L. Sumners, asking for
re-election, is opposed by Mil-
ton H. Grisham of Prentiss
county. Sumners led Grisham
and Cooper G. Henderson in the
first primary. Tishomingo, Ita-
wamba and Prentiss counties
comprise senatorial district No.
5.

In the race for representative
Post No. 2 for Alcorn and Tish-
omingo Counties, J. O. "Click"
Clark is opposed by W. A. Ste-
vens of Corinth. Stevens led the
ticket in the First. Clyde Burns
of Corinth won the legislative
seat for Post No. 1 in the first
primary.

Only race in the First Dis-
trict is that for supervisor in
which Herbert Biggs, asking for
re-election, is faced by Carl
Hendrix. In the Second district
Russell Bonds, asking for re-
election, is opposed by Gerald
Parsons for supervisor. Ray
Jourdan and John W. Bonds are
in the contest for justice of the
peace while Ray D. Glidewell
and Jim Moore are in the run-
off for constable in the Second
district.

Justice of the peace is the
only office in a contest in the
Third district. Those in that run
off are W. E. (Jimmy) Bailey
and Mrs. Hazel Parsons.

A stiff contest is underway in
the Fourth district where Wood-
row Black and M. R. Whitehead
are seeking the office of super-
visor. Both these men are new-
comers to politics. Also in the
Fourth district is the race for
Justice of the peace in which
Henry Marlar is pitted against
J. W. Southward.

In the Fifth district, only con-
test is between Richard J. Cleve-
land and H. C. Pounders who
are seeking the job of constab-
le.

Polls throughout the county
will open at 7 a.m. and will
close at 6 p.m. No poll tax re-
ceipt is required.

Counting is expected to be
much faster this time due to a
shorter ballot. Returns will be
broadcast by WVOM Radio an-
nouncers over a public address
system in Jaybird park where
the Iuka JC's will be operating
the election board. Everyone is
invited to the election party in
Iuka to catch the county and
state returns as they come in.

Court In Session; Grand Jury Report Is Released

The August term of Tisho-
mingo County Circuit Court got
underway Monday with the se-
lection and the convening of a
grand jury to hear cases for
possible indictment and to make
necessary inspections of certain
public places and factories. D.
P. Adams of Iuka served as jury
foreman.

The Grand Jury examined 15
witnesses and returned 12 true
bills. Court will continue thru
next week with Judge N. S.
Sweat, Jr., presiding.

Among other things noted by
the Grand Jury was the report
of the unusual filthy conditions
that exists in the county jail
and the filthiness amongst the
prisoners.

The Grand Jury report in ver-
batim follows:

"NOW Comes your grand
jury for the August, 1967, term
of Circuit Court of Tishomingo
County, Mississippi, and begs
leave to submit its final report.

"We have been in session two
days, have examined 15 witness-
es, and have returned into open
court 12 true bills.

"We have examined by com-
mittee the county home, county
jail, all factories of the county,
the tax collector's books and
the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home to
be in good condition and its in-
mates properly provided for and
looked after.

"We notice that previous
grand juries have reported the
deplorable condition of the
county jail. We reiterate this
same finding for we observed
it is in need of interior paint-

ing; there are no screens on the
windows; the commodores are in
need of repair; there are no fire
extinguishers or first aid kits;
the prisoners are filthy and
show no evidence of being re-
quired to attend to personal hy-
giene; but most of all the thing
that concerns us is the general
filth that abounds in the place.
Although a new jail is needed
and is recommended, and if ex-
tensive renovations are not eco-
nomically practical, certainly
there would be little or no ex-
pense involved in requiring the
prisoners to use soap and water
and give the entire interior of
the jail an extensive cleaning.
We also believe the prisoners
should be required to do gen-
eral maintenance work for the
county.

"We further believe that sui-
table toilet facilities could be
provided for the courthouse
without an undue expenditure.
We strongly recommend that
this be done immediately for
the present toilets are not real-
ly suitable for human use.

"We find all the factories of
the county to be in good, safe
condition, equipped properly
with exit doors opening out-
wardly as required by law, ex-
cept for the furniture factory at
Paden where some doors open
inwardly. It is recommended
this be changed immediately for
the protection of the workers.

"We find that the tax collec-
tor's books and the county audi-
tor's books appear to be neat,
well kept and in balance.

"AND, NOW, having conclu-
ded our labors, we respectfully

request to be finally discharg-
ed.

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HOW TO END THESE RIOTS

Now, I see, the pots and kettles that go to make up the Federal congress are accusing each other of being responsible for the race riots plaguing our land. And for the first time in memory, I agree with both: They are responsible. But that is all the truth there is in them, not a single solitary one of these morally-bankrupt, nation-destroying, debased politicians is willing to face the consequences of his acts.

I except such congressional stalwarts as Mississippi's Tom Abernethy who, upon a recent day, laid it on these malfactors. Tom Abernethy told them:

"Both sides, both political parties, and the members thereof, have been in a bidding contest around here (Congress) for about 14 years, in an attempt to curry favor with these people, and you know it."

But Tom Abernethy's time was limited, so he had no opportunity to get to the root of it, why this frightening situation has come upon us, and what to do about it.

If you are wondering why and what, then read this:

The very essence of Communism (socialism) is wrapped in a single line: "All men are equal except as others (society) makes them unequal".

That is the heart of Communist doctrine. What's more, it is the verbatim heart of every administration since 1933: the policies of the Johnson administration, in direct line back to the advent of Franklin Roosevelt, every one — including the stupid Eisenhower administration — in that they have accepted that doctrine, have been fellow-travelling the road with Communism.

It is that simple. These riots have grown out of the misbelief that "society" is responsible for the ills that individuals know, not the individuals, themselves. And that is Communism, its philosophy. And it is this cardinal precept that has given us not only the riots but every welfare program we have known: That our society owes something, anything, everything to everyone — foreign and domestic — who lays claim. And now that the limit to giving proves not enough, poof! And away goes your home. Poof! And away goes your business — up in flames.

And don't go pointing your nose at the benighted Negro, not him alone. If you support any of these things, if you have your child in a public school, say, you are as guilty as the concocter of a Molotov firebomb. The difference between the two of you is one of degree, nothing more; you are an advocate of socialism, a demanding beggar, too. And that you do support the principle of society being responsible for your needs, in that you do levy upon the public-school system, that act of yours typifies why we are riding the maelstrom, downward. You have temporized with principle. Face the truth: You have no more moral right to lay claim against the public purse for the education of your child than others have to levy for the price of their child's shoes. The principle is the same.

And that you have not, are not willing to face that fact, honestly, is precisely why we are having these riots. What makes you think you have a right, though your shoes be shined, that is denied to barefoot others?

This nation was founded upon this principle: The individual is master of his own fate; that is the meaning of personal liberty. He has his rights and he has his individual responsibilities. And he can no more claim one, while shirking the other, than he can expect a crop without planting.

You think that reads like a pious platitude, do you, one that has no immediate meaning to you? Then, you think again. The violation of this principle has given us the fire this time. And if we continue to avoid it — individual responsibility — continue to play footsie with Communist doctrine so long as it "benefits" us, the perfumed, all the while denying "benefits", even outlandish, extortionate "benefits" to others, this nation — as Stokely Carmichael predicts — will collapse. Under socialism, it will. That

is as certain as God is in heaven.

We will either cleanse our souls, cleanse our legislative halls and political pulpits, and return to the Old Time Religion — men stand or fall by their own strength and trust in God — or we are doomed.

There is no halfway house on the road to Socialism, no limbo, no purgatory. Only hell.

From Mrs. Melvina Nordfelt, Ceres, California: I remember when I was a teenager. Saturday morning meant wash day.

Water was pumped with a hand pump and the boiler was filled by bucket. A fire was built in the outside brick fireplace to heat the water. It was dipped from the boiler into the wash tub sitting on a homemade bench and the song of the washboard began. It didn't take long to learn how to rub bar soap on the grimy spots and rub the material — not your knuckles — against the board. White things were left to boil over the fire, stirred by an old broom stick.

Another tub for rinsing was placed under the pump and clothes rinsed while the water ran over them and off to irrigate the garden. Stained clothing was laid on a patch of green grass to bleach.

In the afternoon, the hand irons with removable handles were heated on the wood or kerosene stove and the clothes were pressed. Wax bread paper was placed on the end of the ironing board to run the iron over to make it glide easier and to remove any black which might leave a streak on the clothes.

THE TRAGIC TRUTH

In the Middle Ages, the churches of Europe offered a sanctuary. Men and women who were pursued by ruthless robber barons could enter a church and find safety before an altar. Tragically, however, some churches in our time have offered sanctuary to those who foment hatred and stir strife in American communities.

"The Memphis Commercial Appeal" warned recently that "the church is a sanctuary for those in trouble and need, but not for hate-filled teachers of race war."

This editorial comment was prompted by a shocking situation disclosed in the great Southern educational center of Nashville, Tenn. Testimony given by a Nashville police official before a congressional investigating committee (looking into the cause of big city riots this summer) included the charge that Office of Economic Opportunity funds were going into a "liberation school" in Nashville held at St. Anselm's Chapel, a Episcopal Student Center. The police official termed the school a "hate-white" school.

It was first denied that the "liberation school" was a "hate-white" school or that it was involved with federal anti-poverty money. Later, however, the Rev. J. Paschall Davis, chairman of the Metropolitan Action Committee in Nashville, admitted that links existed. He told the congressional committee that a leader of Nashville's Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee apparently ran the school; that this same individual drove a station wagon leased by the local OEO agency, and that this individual also was on a "proposed payroll"; moreover, that the OEO was paying the house rent of some of the teachers in the school.

After these disclosures were made, the bishops of the Episcopal Diocese of Tennessee ejected the "hate-white" school from the Episcopal Church where it was housed. They said that the "liberation school," which had pictures of insurrec-

tionist Stokely Carmichael on its walls, taught material "contrary to our Christian heritage."

Ejection of this school from a church was certainly necessary. Unfortunately, this one action will not put an end to the use of churches for hurtful political purposes. Many denominational and inter-denominational organizations are deeply involved in political movements destructive of genuine peace and good will.

In Washington, D. C., for instance, H. Rap Brown, who was arrested on a charge of inciting a riot at Cambridge, Md., was later given a chance to make an inflammatory speech in a church. And in Rochester, N. Y., which has been the scene of brutal pressure against the Eastman Kodak Co., church organizations have been active in supporting the main agitation organization known as FIGHT.

The truth is that many churches, or individual leaders within the churches, have been busy sowing the seeds of civil disobedience and violence. Several years ago, hundreds of clergymen participated in a mammoth march on Washington. This march established a precedent for other and wilder forms of mass protest and mass turmoil. In the last decade, hundreds of clergymen have gone out of their way to invade peaceful communities and to get themselves arrested for trespass. They have engaged in sit-ins, lie-ins, and kneel-ins. They have contributed to the clouds of strife which now hang over America and darken our national future.

Other church leaders — many of them joined together in the National Council of Churches — have lobbied for the admission of Red China — the symbol of international violence and aggression — to the United Nations. Many churchmen have joined in appeals for the use of force against Rhodesia and the Republic of South Africa, because those states refused to bow before the winds of change

—winds of savagery sweeping across the African continent.

The World Council of Churches has criticized the United States for defending the cause of freedom in Southeast Asia. At the same time, the WCC has opened its doors to "clergymen" from Iron Curtain countries, where the churches are virtual departments of the ruling regimes.

me... for I was a stranger and ye took me not in, I was hungry and ye fed me not, I was sick and in prison and ye visited me not."

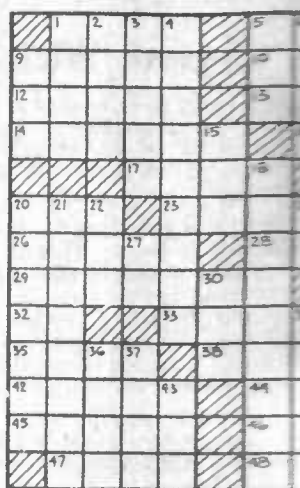

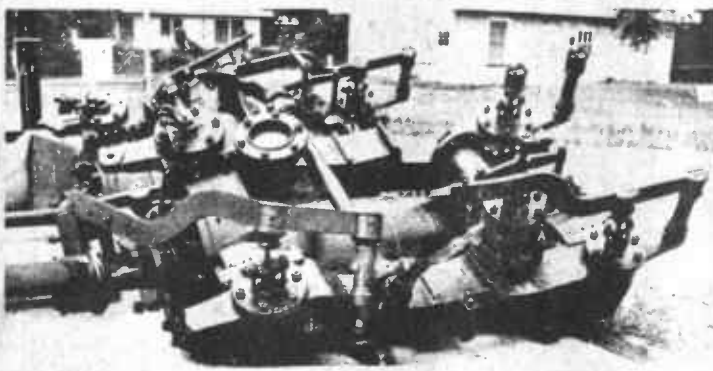

1 cup water

Combine ground beef, ½ cup
bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon

Hearing Better

Could be considered a piece of good luck when you reach the stage where you have to cup a hand behind an ear to pick up the wail of an ambulance siren or the blare of rock-'n-roll from an unwelcome nearby radio.

Then again, a hearing aid lets you have the best of both worlds. You can tune in on the sounds you want to hear, like the conversation of good friends; you can tune out when the going gets tough, like having the town bore camped at your elbow.

Anyway, it's consoling thought — instant hearing, instant deafness, depending on the circumstances.

One thing's for sure, total deafness is a misfortune second only to blindness among the defects of the senses. And since your hearing is almost bound to diminish, and perhaps to disappear, if you live long enough, you ought to give some attention to this possibility well in advance.

The first problem is the condition of your auditory apparatus. When it begins to give you trouble — when you realize that you're straining to catch sounds you used to pick up without effort — see your doctor. He'll probably send you to an otologist, if you want a ten-dollar word for an ear specialist.

You'll probably come away with a prescription for a hearing aid. If so, don't worry about it. Nowadays hearing aids are both effective and inconspicuous.

Buy Carefully — Just be sure you know what you're doing before you buy one. Don't be taken in by the salesman who implies he's with some medical group or governmental agency. Refuse retreads offered as new, special models that are touted as superior to those advertised, rental contracts you haven't read down to the last line of fine print.

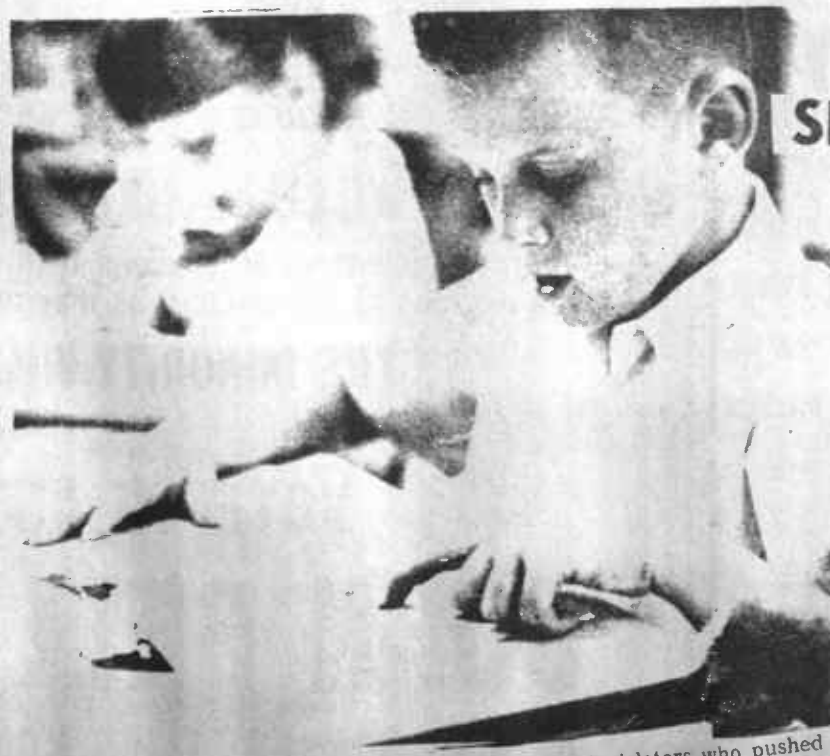

COUNTY AGENT'S NOTES

Mississippi's position as one of the nation's leading cow-calf states gives us a real stake in the future of the American Beef Industry.

Every cattleman knows, for the past several years, things have not been rosy. In spite of a record amount of high quality beef furnished the American public at bargain prices, consumers have shown little evidence they appreciate the cheap beef, and the Federal government has demonstrated no sympathy for the depressed condition of our industry.

Realizing at last no outsider is coming to the rescue, Mississippi cattlemen are replacing our present negative program: 50% poor-mouthing and 50% cursing everyone in sight, with a three point positive program: (1) place beef and its production story before the consumer; (2) represent the cattleman more forcibly at the national law-making level; (3) strengthen the industry at home with an organized program of promotion, education, and research.

Mississippi Beef Council Organized
Responsible for this positive action program is a thirteen man organization representing every phase of Mississippi beef production and marketing. This organization, "The Mississippi Beef Council," is made up as follows: 7 producers, 3 auction market representatives, 1 order buyer, 1 packer, and 1 Farm Bureau representative.

It takes money to transfer thought into action and first action of the beef council was setting up a sound system to let the industry furnish its own finances for its own program. The decision was: A 10c per head deduction at time of sale on all

cattle moving out of the producer or feeder hands is by far the fairest method of letting those with the biggest investment in the industry make the biggest contribution to its survival.

To make bookkeeping chores at collecting agencies as light as possible, deductions will be made on all producer or feeder-owned cattle sold. Those who do not wish to participate in the program will have their collections refunded direct from the beef council office upon filling out a simple request form available at all collecting markets and mailing the form with covering sales sheet attached, to the Beef Council Office within 30 days of sale date.

If Mississippi Cattlemen endorse the program as enthusiastically as their friend in Alabama, Louisiana and Florida, there will be few refund requests.

After much thought the Mississippi Beef Council decided upon this as the most effective formula expenditure of collections:

A. 30% of the National Livestock & Meat Board's Beef Industry Council for promotion of Beef at the national level.

B. 20% to the American National Cattlemen's Association, the organization that represents beef cattle people in national legislative matters.

C. 50% for beef industry development in Mississippi covering:

1. All forms of direct promotion;
2. Education including youth programs;
3. Research on problems of specific importance to Mississippi cattlemen;
4. Legislative programs;
5. Program administration.

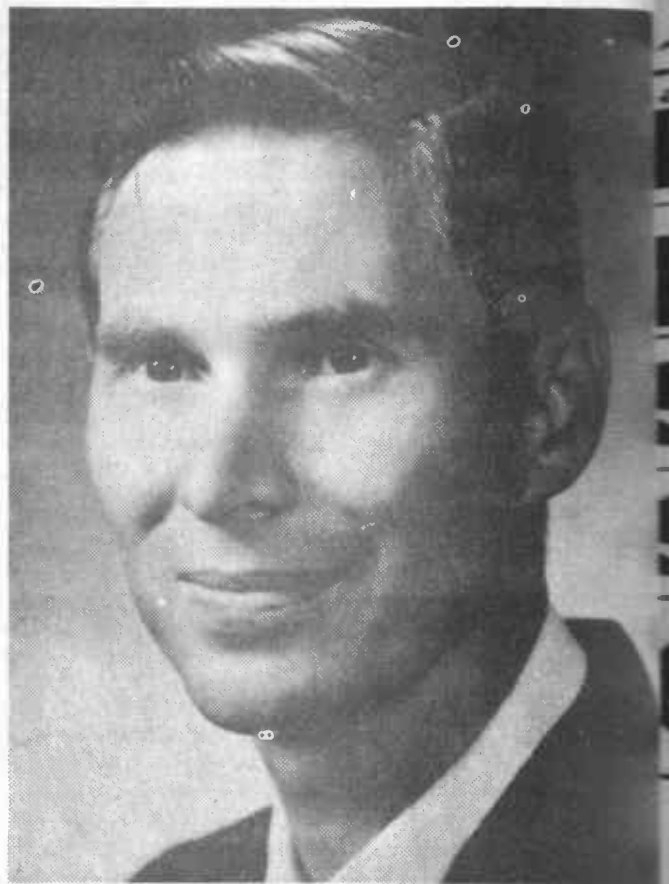

I received my Bachelor of Science and Master of Education degrees at Mississippi State University and, currently, I am working part time toward the Doctor of Education Degree there also. I have taught night classes for Mississippi State University during the past three years; having completed one class this Spring at Tishomingo School Center. I am a member of the Tishomingo County Teachers Association; the Mississippi Educational Association; the National Education Association and the National Association of Secondary School Administrators.

I will be fair to all the children, and all school centers, in Tishomingo County, and I will work for the betterment of all school centers as they are now located and as they now exist. I will work with and co-operate with all principals, teachers, bus drivers, janitors, and other school personnel as well as the county school board members. I believe in the future of our schools, and I will co-operate and work with our people to secure finances for new and expanded educational programs for our children. I believe that our exceptional children deserve immediate attention and an adequate program to meet the needs of those who are not provided for in school centers now. I especially feel that those exceptional children who because of various handicaps, cannot attend regular academic classes should be provided adequate facilities. I will work to provide a vocational-technical educational program center for our school system which is vitally needed for those students who, by choice or, who are unable, to go to college. State and Federal funds are now available for this. We should work for this, and I promise to do so.

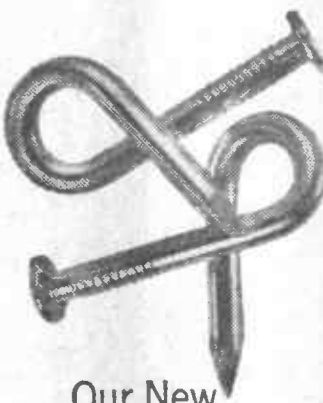
While moving through the extremely dense jungle, Company B was taken under intense enemy fire by automatic weapons.

"The 1st platoon, which was the point platoon, received the majority of the enemy fire. The call for a medic came over the radio so Specialist Floyd, traveling with the 2nd platoon, dropped his gear except for his aid bag, and raced to the 1st platoon's location. Without regard for his own life or the intense enemy fire, Sp-4 Floyd moved from man to man giving aid and reassurance to the wounded.

"Braving enemy fire, Sp-4 Floyd, on several occasions, moved to within 15 meters of an enemy machine gun position to evacuate the wounded. Thru his devotion and efforts, the wounded were quickly evacuated and serious casualties were kept at a minimum.

This outstanding display of a resiveness, devotion to duty, and personal bravery is in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army."

Area Residents Get Advantage Of "Zip-A-List"

During the latter half of September, each of the nation's 66 million households will receive a unique kit of postal cards which can be used to obtain ZIP CODES for personal mailing needs, according to the Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien.

The specially designed kit will consist of 9 cards. Eight will carry a message encouraging the use of ZIP CODE on one side and spaces for the address to be "zipped" and the return address of the sender on the other side.

The 9th card will include in-

structions. The cards in the kit will be joined in an accordion fold with perforations between each segment. A 10th card will remind the recipient of his own ZIP CODE. This card will not be attached to the kit and is a revised version of the local Zip CODE reminder notice distributed twice a year.

The expanded project will find the kit of cards being delivered with only one address to be entered on each card for ZIP coding. This card will then go through the mails in the same manner as a regular postal card. It will be separated out of the mail stream at the post office which serves the "zip-less" address. There a clerk will stamp in the proper code and "return to sender." The card will then go back the same route to the mailer, who

will enter the code into a personal mailing list.

No postage will be needed to send the cards through the mails. Extra copies of the Zip-A-List kits will be available at the local post office. "The Zip-A-List project is the most dramatic aspect of our continuing campaign to make ZIP CODES readily available to the public," noted Harold T. Lomenick, Iuka Postmaster.

C. D. Officials Plan Meeting September 5

Representatives from the State Civil Defense Office in Jackson were in Tishomingo County Tuesday, Aug. 15, to discuss with county and municipal officials, the Civil Defense County Unit System. J. S. South met with the group, and plans were made to meet Sept. 5 at 1 P.M. in Iuka with all board members.

The County Unit System is the method by which the entire county works together to provide its citizens with knowledge and protection against the possibility of nuclear attack on this nation or widespread natural disaster.

The intent of the program is for each county and/or municipality to provide itself with a local Civil Defense director appointed by local officials. This local director would then make himself available to the State Civil Defense Office to complete procedures for a council to be legally established in his county or municipality.

Civil Defense at the local level provides "Mississippians with an opportunity to protect themselves and their interests in periods of serious emergency.

Those wishing to know more about the program are invited to get in touch with their local officials or the Mississippi Civil Defense Council in Jackson.

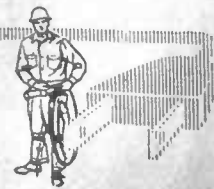

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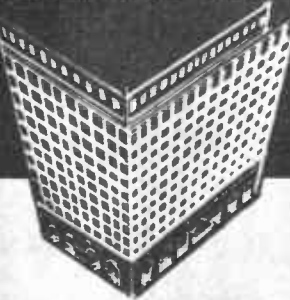

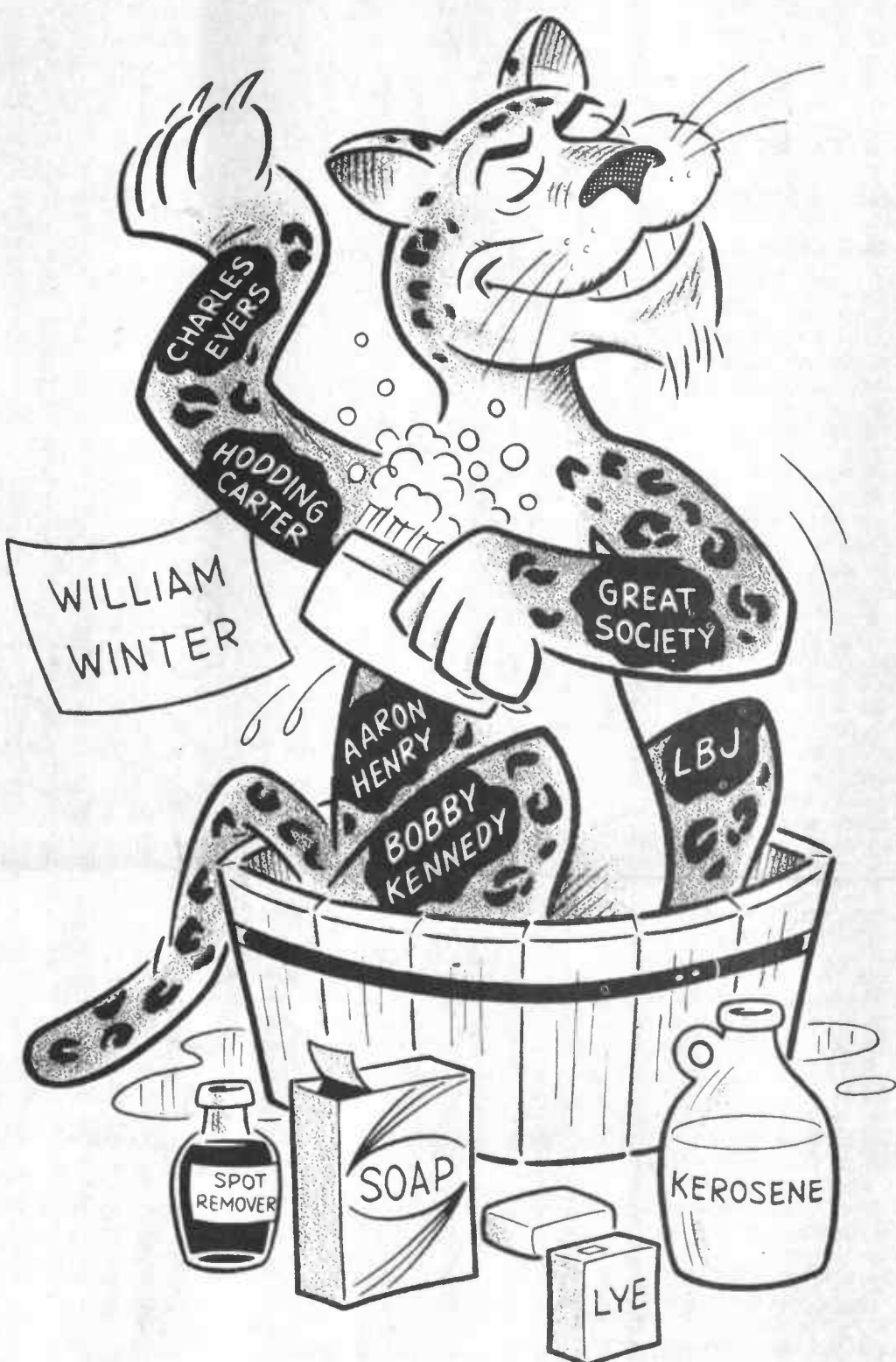
