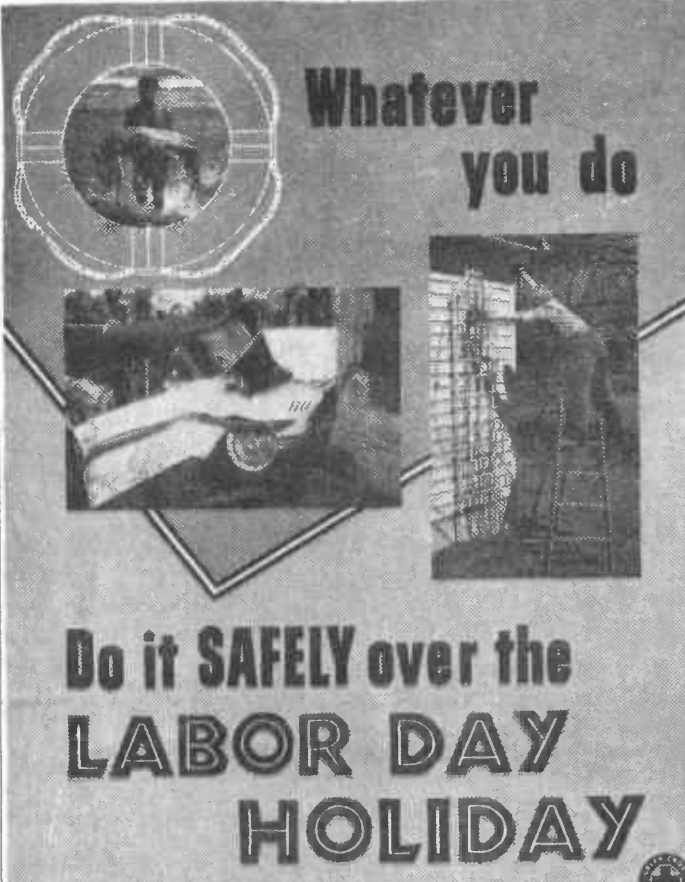

Iuka School Opens Under Court Order

Iuka School opens today
(Thursday) with an increase in
the Negro students attending,
an integrated faculty, and a
number of changes in the posi-
tions of the school faculty.

According to a statement by
Bobby Burress, new superinten-
dent, the school is operating
this year under a court order
which states that the faculty
will be integrated. The school
officials have complied by this
order. The former minister of
the Iuka Baptist Church also
noted that the number of Neg-
ro students attending the Iuka
center this year was increased
due to the fact that the Carter
School was now closed and due
to the fact that transportation
was unable to be provided for
those high school students who
previously attended Basom Hi
School in Corinth. These stu-
dents are attending Iuka School
this year.

In addition to Bobby Burress,
who is filling the position vacan-

ted by the retirement of H. L.
Shook, school principals include
Joe E. Brown, high school, and
Eugene Tension, new elemen-
tary school principal. This post
was filled last year by Mrs.
Louis Johnston. W. E. Ludlam
has returned as guidance coun-
selor.

Ledbetter, Wilson Are Contestants In Suit Claiming Irregularities

Petition Denied

The Tishomingo County Dem-
ocratic Executive Committee, in
a hearing held Wednesday af-
ternoon in the county court-
house, denied a petition to de-
clare the August 8th First Pri-
mary election held in certain
precincts as being "null and
void."

The contestants in the case,
Eddie Ledbetter and Whit Wil-
son, were both candidates for
sheriff and tax collector. Botn
were losers in the August 8th
primary; Ledbetter receiving a
vote of 321 and Wilson polling
1169.

The hearing Wednesday came
after a previous request by Led-
better for an inspection of the
ballot boxes. This request was
granted by the Committee and
the inspection was made on
Monday, August 21, following
the election. Making the inspec-
tion were Ledbetter with his at-
torneys, James Godwin and Joe
Ray Langston under the surveil-
lance of Circuit Court Clerk L.
E. Robinson.

Most of the purported docu-
mentary proof in Ledbetter's
and Wilson's petition was ob-
tained in the inspection granted
Ledbetter.

Some of the irregularities in
particular was the failure of
election holders to require vot-
ers to sign their names in their
own handwriting. Precincts in
which this discrepancy was not-
ed were West Iuka M-Z, West Iu-
ka A-L, North Iuka A-L, North
Iuka M-Z, South Iuka A-L, South
Iuka M-Z, Dennis and Cotton
Springs.

Another discrepancy claimed
was the locking and barring of
the door to the room in which
counting of the ballots was
done, thus refusing to proceed
in fair and full view of the vot-
ing public and refusing the
candidates or their representa-
tives of the right to inspect the
ballots as they were counted.
Precincts in which this discrep-
ancy was claimed are West Iu-
ka M-Z, West Iuka A-L, North
Iuka A-L, North Iuka M-Z, South
Iuka A-L, South Iuka M-Z, Den-
nis, and Burnsville.

Also at the Burnsville A-L
box, the petitioners claim that a
discrepancy exists due to the
fact that, in many instances,
several names are in the same
handwriting. This claim of ir-
regularity is also made for
Burnsville K-Z, West Burnsville,
North Burnsville, Coles Mill
Sharp, Holcut, Spring Hill Rut-
ledge, West Tishomingo, Pa-
den, Belmont A-L, Belmont M-Z,
East Belmont, and Golden.

Seven local voters were ex-
amined as witnesses in the hear-
ing held Wednesday afternoon.
Among them were Mack Goode
who votes in the North Iuka A-
L precinct. Mr. Goode testified
that in the August 8th primary
he did not sign his name at any
time, before or after he got his
ballot to vote. Upon question-
ing he further testified that,
during the counting of the bal-
lots, he attempted to gain on-
trance to the room where the
tabulations were being made

but could not get in because
the door was locked. He testi-
fied that he observed one oth-
er person attempt to go into
the room and that this person
also failed to get in. Another
witness examined was Mary
Helen Goode, wife of Mack
Goode. Her testimony was simi-
lar to that of her husband's
with the additional information
that she marked her ballot with
an ordinary lead pencil. Peti-
tioners claim that rules for
voting stipulate that all ballots
be marked with ink or indelible
pencil.

Another witness examined
was William W. Cooper who
votes at the West Iuka A-L box.
He stated that he did not see a
registration book in which to
sign his name. Another witness,
M. L. (Larry) Pardue of Dennis
testified that he tried to get in
the Dennis precinct room to
observe the counting but could
not get in because the door was
locked. Will P. Pruitt of South
Iuka M-Z testified that someone
wrote his name in the registra-
tion book before he got a bal-
lot to vote. Another witness,
Paul Marlar of the Burnsville
K-Z box gave similar testimony
to that of the other witnesses.

All witnesses examined testi-
fied, upon questioning, that
they each signed their own
names in the Second primary
held on Tuesday, August 29th.

Kell Milligan, a candidate for
First District Supervisor, testi-
fied that he could not get into
the room where votes were be-
ing counted at the box where
he voted, West Iuka A-J.

Attorneys for the contestants
state that, if only those ballots
were counted wherein no dis-
crepancies exist, Mr. Wilson
would have been in the Second
Primary runoff instead of Mr.
Cutshall. Approximate totals in
the First Primary in the Sher-
iff's race would have been: Cut-
shall 685; Wilson 697; and Pat-
terson 816.

In its action Wednesday af-
ternoon, the county Democratic
Executive Committee refused
Mr. Wilson the right to partici-
pate in the petition to declare
the First Primary Election held
on August 8th as null and void
because he did not participate
in the request for an inspection
of the boxes as did Mr. Ledbet-
ter within 12 days following the
election.

Complete refusal of the peti-
tion to declare null and void the
First Primary Election held on
Tuesday, August 8th was made
due to the fact that Mr. Ledbet-
ter's vote could not have been
changed in a sufficient degree
to place him in a runoff posi-
tion.

Attorneys for the petitioners,
in arguing their case, cited pre-
vious suits of a similar nature
in which the State Supreme
Court had ordered new elec-
tions. If further action is taken,
it will have to be through the
Circuit courts, and if another
election is held it will be upon
the order of the courts.

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HOW TO BE HAPPY

However true it may be, it is pure brag when a man says he is happy, though married. Certainly it is not a sign of wisdom; some things are better kept to one's self.

SENSING THE NEWS

NO PLACE FOR DRONES

The peril of a drone society subsidized by productive, tax-paying citizens, is a peril the Congress and the people always should bear in mind.

Happily, U. S. Rep. Wilbur D. Mills (D-Ark) chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, is both aware of the peril and outspoken in warning the public about it.

Opening the debate in the House August 17 on a proposed increase in social security benefit, Congressman Mills strongly defended his committee's plan to tighten regulations on federal financial assistance to programs for aiding parents with dependent children.

"The American people," he declared, "want us to be certain that money is spent under this legislation to promote the public well-being. Is it in the public interest for welfare to become a way of life?"

Many Americans may not realize that welfare is a way of life to one element in our population. Rep. Mills pointed out that "we are caring for the 3rd consecutive generation" of reliefers. Obviously, this kind of dependence has to be stopped.

In an effort to curb such welfare careerism, Congressman Mills' committee wants the states to meet certain requirements by creating work and training programs so that unemployed parents must submit to a test of their ability to hold down a job.

If the Congress does not start requiring welfare recipients to take available jobs, public resentment is bound to mushroom. As Rep. Mills expressed it, "Some day there is going to be a revolution or a riot if the taxpayers can ever get organized. If ever I heard a good argument against a tax increase it is that giveaway programs be pared to the bone."

Congressman Mills' comments are refreshing and timely, especially in view of the outpouring of liberal demands for additional welfare programs for residents of urban "ghettos." The liberal rhetoric is interesting and revealing. It is full of insistence on government's obligation to create jobs for riotous slum dwellers, but there is no mention of the so-called "disadvantaged" citizen's duty to take a job when it is offered.

People who have followed development of the government anti-poverty programs are aware of the fact that these federal projects often are involved in training people with a powerful disinclination to work. It frequently happens that the recipient of government aid gets off one program only to ask to be placed on another program. For many of them, a job is the last thing they want.

Actually, much of the talk about a job shortage is sheer nonsense. The classified advertising pages of American newspapers contain innumerable job descriptions. Yet many of those who are loitering on street corners in the mornings and evenings aren't interested in these employment opportunities. They are the people U. S. Sen. Byrd of West Virginia recently described as being unwilling to "hit a lick at a snake."

Yet if Big Government is to give handouts to some citizens,

those citizens should be required to take whatever employment is available. They shouldn't be allowed to wait around for the job that involves the bare minimum of effort.

In Western Europe, migrants from Greece, Spain, Portugal, Italy and other comparatively poor countries travel to the industrial cities of Germany and France to seek employment. They take what is available, which generally is hard, heavy work. They don't complain, however, or say that the host countries have a social obligation to put an economic cushion under them.

Unfortunately, this attitude does not prevail among the migrants to American cities. Sociologists, politically-minded preachers and liberal editors have spent more than a decade telling these migrants that Society owes them a living. It is not surprising, therefore, that the United States has a new class of idlers, who believe that idleness at public expense is a civil right.

Congress and the taxpaying public will have to work overtime and talk tough to get this notion out of the minds of the would-be drones.



From Mrs. H. R. Weinberg, Stoddard, Wisconsin: My memory goes back to the hand pump in the cistern on sub-zero winter mornings.

The first task was to light a corncob fire in the kitchen wood range to melt the ice in the copper tea kettle so water could be used to melt that in the pump to get water for the horses, milk cows and chickens before we even thought of making the early morning cup of coffee in the old black coffee pot that always stood on the back corner of the range.

With coffee, we enjoyed thick slices of toasted homemade bread, toasted in a wire toaster held over the hole made by removing one of the big stove lids as soon as the hickory sticks added to the fire were burning well.

After chores, breakfast was more coffee, side pork and, if the hens hadn't quit laying because of the cold, eggs. Hash-browned potatoes, corn meal mush also helped prepare the men for a long morning of sawing and chopping trees to provide fuel supply. The wood was hauled down by heavy log chains hooked to whiffle-trees of the big bay team, sawed into stove lengths and hand split so the cycle could continue.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Dr. Garrett, recently I read in a national magazine that Negro school children, after seven months of reading instruction, had a "rate of gain" on IQ tests that was well "above the national norm." I thought a person's IQ was constant. How is such a "gain" possible? Is it possible?

A: It is possible but highly improbable. Note the following: 1) Many group intelligence tests do not yield a constant IQ. The results from such tests are not "IQs" but merely scores. Scores tend to increase with age and higher academic achievement. This, probably, is all that was meant. 2) Tests so constructed as to yield a constant IQ (Stanford-Binet or Wechsler Scale for Children) give an IQ of 100 for the average school child, regardless of his age. Children may, upon retest, measure slightly higher or lower than before (e.g., 4 to 5 points) owing solely to the error of measurement in all measuring instruments. Retarded and bright children, of course, have IQs lower or higher than 100, which is a sort of national norm. 3) Several standard group tests are geared to give constant IQs, close to those obtained from Stanford-Binet. The Lorge-Thorndike and Otis tests are examples.

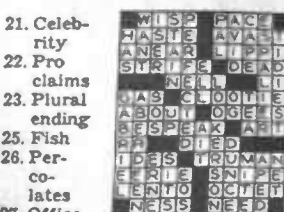

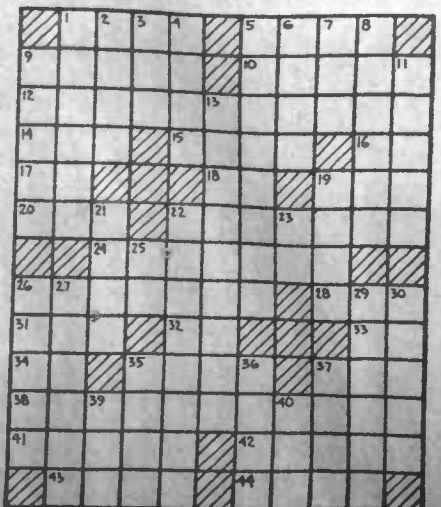
CROSSWORD PUZZLE

Social Security Checks Will Bear Earlier Dates

Social Security beneficiaries who normally find their monthly checks in their mailbox on the 3rd of the month will no longer have to wait until the next day when the 3rd falls on a national holiday or a Sunday. Hugh Tigrett, District Manager of Social Security in Tupelo, said this week that starting with the upcoming Labor Day weekend, social security checks will bear an earlier date and will be delivered on the previous mail-service day whenever the 3rd falls on a Saturday or a holiday. In September of this year, the 3rd is on a Sunday.

"Most beneficiaries," he said, "will receive their social security checks on Saturday, September 2, instead of on Tuesday, September 5, as would have been the case under the old procedure." Social Security checks are normally released on the 3rd of the month under an agreement to stagger the receipt of monthly checks going out from various Federal agencies, so that post offices, the Treasury Department, and local banks will not be overburdened at any one time of the month.

Explaining the reason for the change, Tigrett said, "Since these monthly checks are the main source of income for many beneficiaries, even a few days' delay could be serious,

and this new procedure will eliminate any possible delay." The new procedure will be used for the second time in December when the 3rd again falls on a Sunday.

Get Safety Habit Begin Now For Labor Holiday

Motorists in the Magnolia State are urged to apply four driving tips to make their Labor Day weekend trip a safer and more pleasant one.

The suggestions are given by John D. Wise, Jr., president, Mississippi Automobile Dealers Association, as part of a safe driving campaign sponsored by the Auto Dealers Traffic Safety Council.

The four point plan is as follows:

1. Have the family car safety-checked bumper to bumper. A safe drive demands a car kept in safe driving condition.
2. Lock all doors from the inside before you drive. This helps keep you and your passengers in, and other people out. Lock the doors from the outside when you park, to protect both the car and its contents from theft.
3. Buckle all safety belts be-

4. Stay alert. On long trips, take frequent rest breaks to guard against fatigue, drowsiness, and lack of attention.

Motorists are cautioned against taking short drives around town for granted. Studies have shown that 80% of all traffic accidents happen within 25 miles of the driver's home and 75% of all traffic deaths occur

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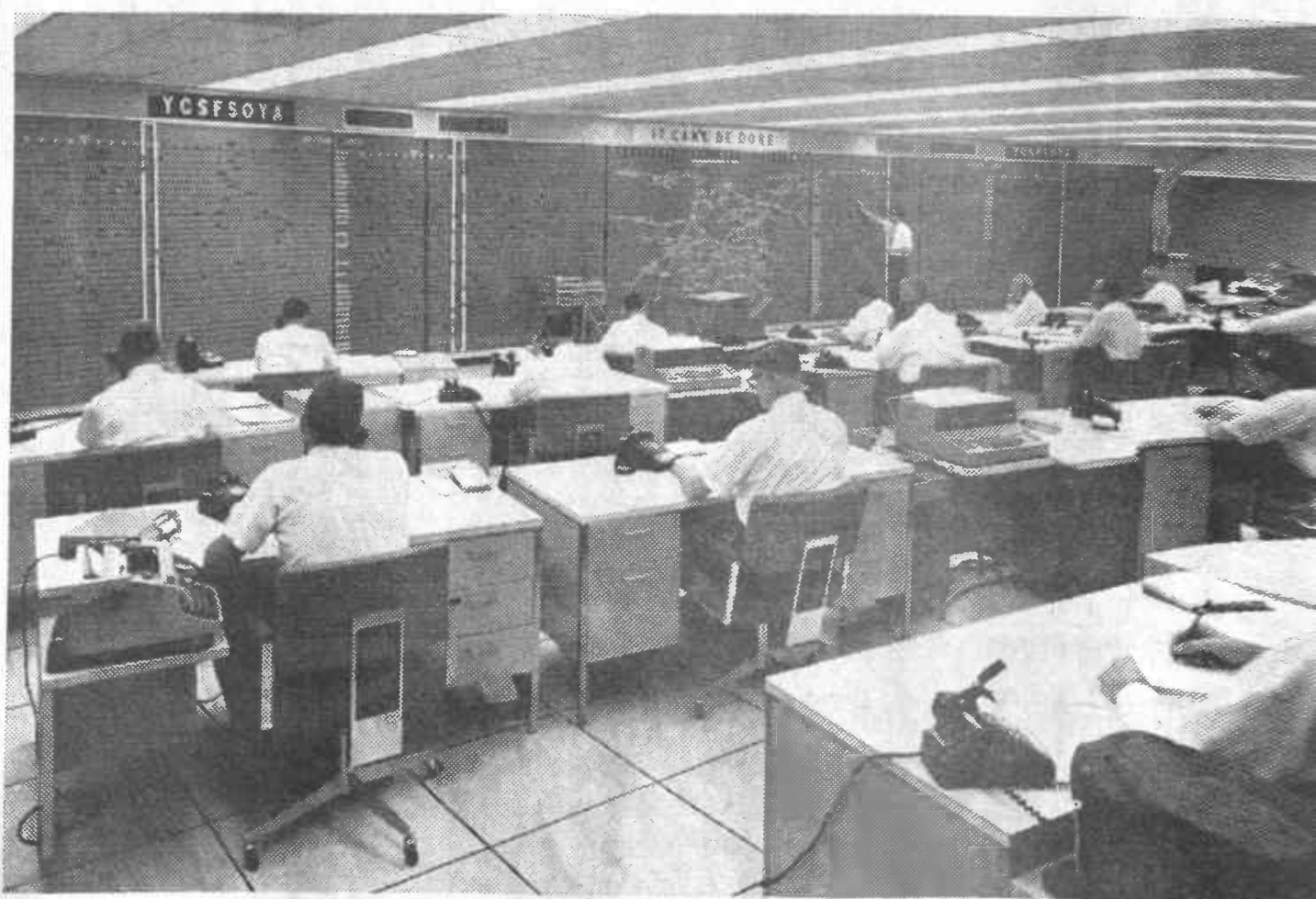

Credit Available For Community Rec. Centers

Credit for financing well planned community backed outdoor recreation centers is available in Tishomingo County through the Farmers Home Administration supervised loan program.

Hays Woods, the agency's county supervisor, with offices at Iuka, this week described some of the various kinds of projects that have been financed by Farmers Home Administration loans in rural areas. He said these loans are proving to be one of America's most effective rural areas development tools. Some communities have been able to attract new industry because of their new recreation projects.

Community recreation projects financed by Farmers Home Administration includes fishing and boating and swimming facilities; sports, camping and picnicking; vacation farms; travel trailer parks; vacation cabins and cottages; hunting preserves; and golf courses.

"Rural communities," he said "that can boast a new swimming pool, an attractive public park, a golf course or other such recreation facility have a very important asset in the competition to attract new businesses and industry."

"One rural community in

North Carolina that built a golf course, swimming pools and tennis courts, attracted two industries that now employ 500 people. The plant managers have frankly stated that they selected the community because of the recreation facilities it provided their employees," he pointed out.

Any group who applies to the Farmers Home Administration for credit assistance will have available to them the knowledge that the agency has gained financing approximately 1,100 recreation projects throughout the country.

Complete information on loans to community groups for recreation purposes along with details about technical assistance in developing the project can be obtained from Hays Woods at his office located next door to the Post Office behind the ASCS office.

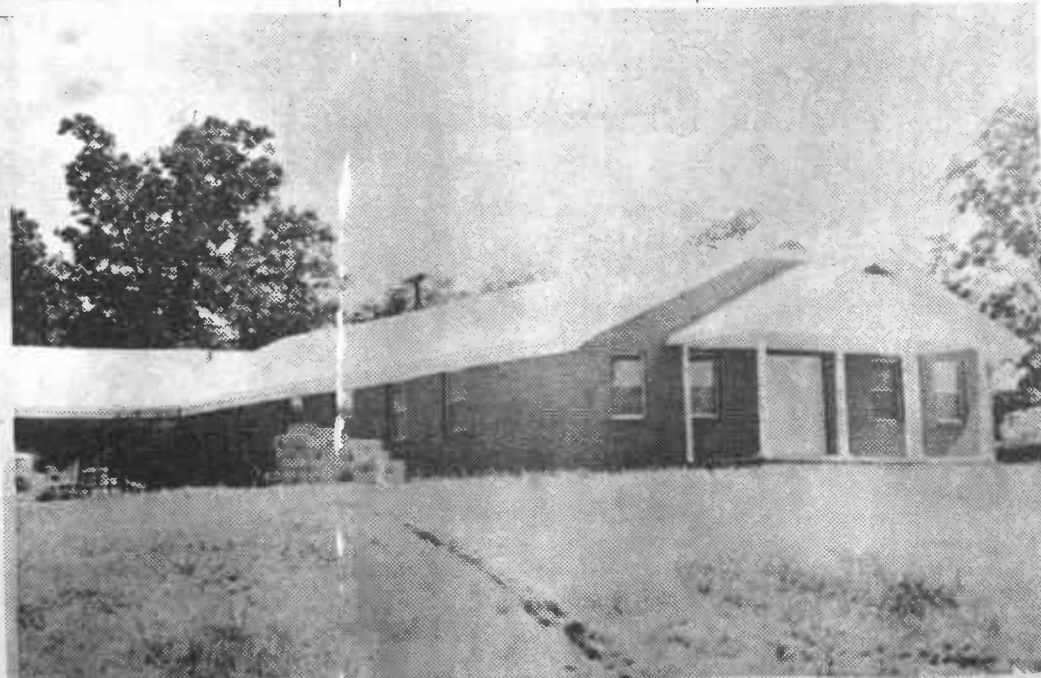

"Go Sunday" To Be Observed By Methodist Churches In Area

Approximately 100 Methodist churches in the New Albany District of the Methodist Church will observe "GO SUNDAY" this coming Sunday, September 3. The churches are located in the geographical area including Benton, Tippah, Alcorn, Prentiss, Union, and Tishomingo counties in Northeast Mississippi.
