Attorneys for Whit Wilson and Eddie Ledbet-
ter state that a petition is being prepared that will
eventually bring the controversial First Primary
election before a special court. The controversy
has grown out of an earlier request by Eddie Led-
better to inspect the ballots that were cast in the
First Primary held on August 8th. Tishomingo
county is the only area involved and the only race
involved is that of sheriff and tax collector.

Ledbetter and Wilson were losers in that elec-
tion, Wilson receiving 1169 votes and Ledbetter
polling 321. George Cutshall and Pat Patterson
were in the runoff, Cutshall led in the first election
and came through to win in the second.

Attorneys for the petitioners state that Cut-
shall and Patterson will probably be named de-
fendants in a suit claiming that irregularities exist-
ed in holding the election in question. They say
that fraud is not claimed in any instance in the
case. Irregularities such as the voter not signing
his name and the counting of ballots behind locked
doors are included in the litigation.

Attorneys for Ledbetter and Wilson further
state that a new petition is being prepared that
will be filed with Circuit Court Clerk L. E. Rob-
inson in Iuka. Included in the petition will be a
request that the Circuit Court Clerk notify the
Chief Justice of the Mississippi Supreme Court
who will appoint a special judge to hear the case.
The judge to be appointed probably will not re-
side in this district, thus assuring greater freedom
from possible political pressure.

The attorneys also say that the new petition
should be in the hands of the Tishomingo County
Circuit Court Clerk at an early date and that a
special court should be established and a trial un-
derway by September 25, this year.

locked doors.

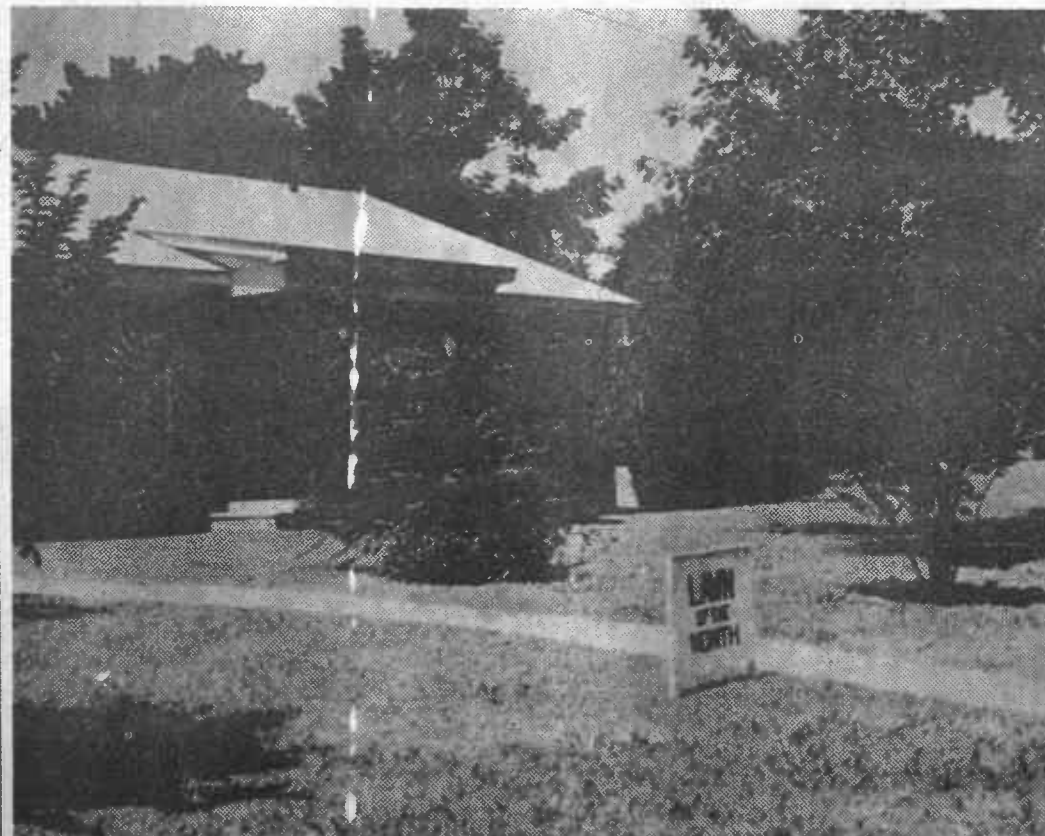
Attorneys for Ledbetter and
Wilson state that, if only those
ballots were counted in which
no irregularities are claimed,
Mr. Wilson would have been in
the Second Primary runoff in-
stead of Mr. Cutshall. Discount-
ing or invalidating those bal-
lots claimed voted in error, ap-
proximate totals in the First
Primary in the sheriff's race
would have been Cutshall 685;
Wilson 697; and Patterson, 816.

In the first hearing held on
Wednesday, Aug. 30th, the
County Democratic Executive
Committee denied a petition of
Ledbetter and Wilson to de-
clare the Aug. 8th election null
and void on the grounds that
Wilson did not participate in
an inspection of the ballots
within 12 days after the elec-
tion and because Ledbetter's to-
tal vote would not have been
changed in a sufficient degree
to place him in a runoff pos-
ition for the second primary.

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THE RISE OF THE
INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS

As with all basic changes within a nation, the Civil Rights revolution has its spin-offs, unlooked for developments that, in themselves and in the long run, may prove more significant than the parent that gave them birth.

Such a development is the burgeoning independent school movement now sweeping the country.

It isn't easy to get definitive figures on the growth of these schools. They are multiplying too fast for that; growing like Topsy, if you will forgive the phrase.

Moreover, the national news media - with the public-school hierarchy in mind - is not prone to publicize their shining advent.

Yet, there they are, independent schools are popping up everywhere, like roses sprung from a dung hill.

The reason is apparent: White parents throughout the nation do not want their children to attend checkerboard schools. It makes no difference whether they are resident of New York, Alabama, or Kalamazoo, when classroom integration passes a given point - 15 per cent or less - White children begin their silent exodus.

The development is welcome for had the Johnson-Humphrey administration not fostered the lawlessness of civil disobedience, the public-school systems would have rocked us right into casebook socialism. The schooling of our children, until Civil Rights came along, had been made both free and easy to the point that most parents sent their youngsters to public schools gratefully and, one must add, thoughtlessly. They simply assumed their young ones were being educated and let it go at that. It was this, the permissive, assumptive attitude on the part of parents that opened the way for the hierarchy to demote the learning process to a secondary position and to make their ideology - the preachment of "brotherhood", the canard that all-men-are-equal - the first order of business.

And it is understandable, how they got away with it. So long as there was no competitive force - nothing against which to measure the effectiveness of the public schools - parents, by and large, had no way of realizing precisely what was going on.

But when the system evolved, as it inevitably had to evolve, into a system based upon the lowest common denominator, and when that denominator became identified by the emotional flag of race, parents who cared about their children's education awoke with a start and began doing something about the situation.

Thus the rise of the independent schools.

It may not be fair to cite one organization above others as being principally responsible for the care and feeding of this healthy woods colt but, even so, one organization above others stands out.

I write of the Citizens Councils.

The Citizens Councils, without a lot of bombast and fofooraw, have been at work, principally in the South, East and West, advising distraught parents how to go about establishing a local independent school. Their success, as I imply, has been startling. Take their work, for instance, in Jackson, Mississippi. In Jackson, the first of the Council's independent schools was opened three years ago, in the fall of 1964. On opening day, it had but 22 pupils in six elementary grades established in a private home. The next year, in 1965, it had 110 pupils in 12 grades, and a graduating class of four - one of whom was a National Merit Scholarship Finalist. This summer, the independent schools of Jackson enrolled in their summer program 11 per cent of all summer-school pupils. That is Jackson. As to the State, the State of Mississippi has more than 70 such schools - thanks to the Citizens Councils.

These independent schools are opening in every section of the nation, without geographical limits. They open in direct proportion to the press of racial integration and everywhere they open, they flourish. South Carolina has between 45 and 50. So it goes. And the movement is about to drive the public-school hierarchy out of its equalitarian mind. They had the world by the tail, these equalitarians, and along came Civil Rights. Now the people are awakening.

Both systems cannot continue, not indefinitely. One must go. And as more and more parents come to realize that two thirds of all State tax money goes to support a system dedicated not to learning but to ideology, it seems apparent which will be the loser. David and Goliath are met again; people, particularly parents, are getting progressively tired of being duped, put upon, not getting their money's worth.

Every father and every mother owes a debt of gratitude to the likes of the Citizens Councils and to the thousands of other individuals and organizations all across the nation that are leading the way back to learning. No doubt of it, and if you will permit a soupçon of cynicism, a debt is owed to the Civil-Rights movement as well.

American Textile Industry
In Danger

While the exotic new industries associated with electronics and space age metallurgy receive much public attention and consideration, some of the most important basic industries of the country are accorded second class treatment by the federal government and are more or less ignored by the public.

The textile industry, unfortunately, is one of these basic industries which continually gets a raw deal. For years, American textile companies have had to wrestle with unfair competition from Japanese mills which have modern equipment purchased with U. S. aid funds.

Sad to say, the State Department's disinterest in the fate of the U. S. textile industry is not the only problem afflicting this form of American enterprise. There is another serious threat against the prosperity and well-being of an industry which is a major employer, especially in the Southern States. This threat is a union takeover which, if accomplished, surely would render the industry uneconomic to the point where it could not compete against foreign textile concerns. The result of such a failure to compete would be damage to major investments in textile plants and the loss of thousands of jobs. The reactionary attitude of union leaders is evidenced by their desire for a law to restrict the making of synthetics which are among America's modern marvels.

The union war against the textile industry has been going on for a long time. A fresh offense is under way, however. It is being led by the Industrial Union Department of the AFL-CIO and the Textile Workers of America. One company has been selected as the prime target - J. P. Stevens & Co., which gives employment to 44,000 persons at 51 plants in the two Carolinas. The union organization in charge of the new offensive already has reportedly spent in excess of \$1.5 million to carry out its mission.

Walter Wingo, associate editor of "Nation's Business," recently pointed out that "union bosses are angry because the firm's (J. P. Stevens) employees have consistently voted against joining the Textile Workers Union of America, AFL-CIO." Robert T. Stevens, president of the J. P. Stevens mills, recently told a House Labor Subcommittee that "the crime of which we are accused is that our 44,000 employees have not indicated a desire to join any union." He charged that the head of the TWUA "brazenly demands that free speech be silenced, and that our employees be delivered, willing or not, into the keeping of the union by government decree."

The pressure, to be sure, is not only from the union coalition. It comes in even more menacing form from the National Labor Relations Board. Anyone who has ever attended a NLRB hearing and seen one of the agency's trial examiners in action surely knows that free enterprise is the victim of anti-business bias. The businessman just can't win when he comes before the NLRB, which is oriented toward the aims of Big Unionism.

It is easy for liberal critics to

dismiss the textile industry as a low-pay industry. Obviously, companies engaged in the manufacture of cloth - and facing competition from Asian textile firms - are not in a position to pay wages comparable to what is offered in the aircraft industry, for example. It is a fact of economic life that some industries, producing high-cost items for a developing market are in a better position to pay top wages than are firms in less lucrative fields.

The unionization of the textile industry in the South would reduce these companies' overall economic health. Investors would be scared away. In the long run, unionization of the Southern textile industry would prove to be a great breakthrough, not for the employees of the U. S. textile firms, but for the Japanese and Hong Kong firms. Unionization, in short, seems nicely calculated to put the American textile industry out of business by forcing them into an unprofitable position.

Group Endeavor

Emmanuel Nelson of Phoenix, Arizona, is a man you might keep in mind if you're thinking of starting a retirement business. He's a prime example of the fact that it's not a bad idea as long as you have the knowledge, the product and the public demand.

But Emmanuel Nelson has more than that - a desire to help other retirees add to their income. He put all this together in 1961, and came up with a plan for a senior handicraft center in Phoenix to take advantage of the artists who lived in and

around the city. Also, to take advantage of the local demand for art work.

Getting retirees together wasn't too hard, although at first they had to hold their displays in public places, even on the sidewalks, because they had no display room.

Then M.B. Goldman agreed to let them have a store as their headquarters, which was enough to set them up in business. By collecting five dollars a year in dues from the members (who number over a hundred by now), the center gained needed capital for a start.

On Display

Here's how the system works. Each artist puts a price tag on his own work - whether painting, sculpture, ceramics, tapestry, or anything else. This is placed on display at the center, and, if sold, brings him seventy-five percent of the price, with the rest going to the store.

The happy thing about this arrangement is that a senior citizen in this group can both do something creative with his time, and make a little money for doing it. No one, far as I know, has become rich from the Phoenix experiment, but many have been able to pay their way more comfortably. A few dollars now and then can make all the difference.

Some individuals have shown real talent. Buyers have learned to keep an eye on this handicraft center because of the fine art objects to be had there. An occasional piece turns up that seems worth more than the price, and likely to increase in value with time - an old master or an antique in the making.

This is not a charity display. It's art.

It's also psychology. Every member of the center knows that he is wanted, has a right to be there, and can count on a warm welcome whenever he brings in a piece for exhibition. There is a strong communal spirit in the setting up of displays, a profound sense of achievement in seeing a customer examine, evaluate, and finally purchase one's work.

Better than therapy.

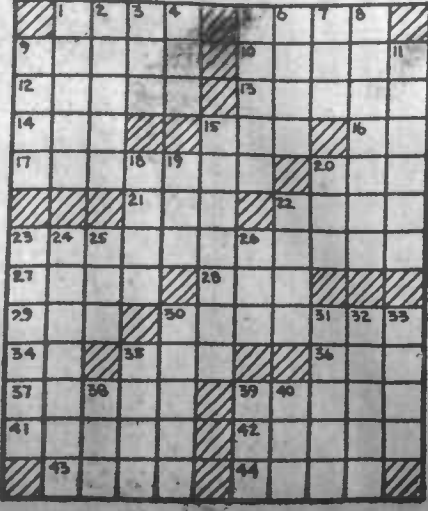

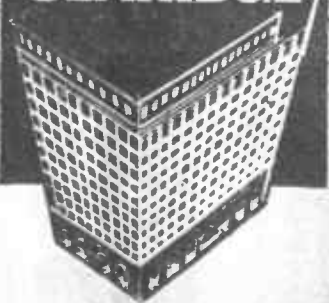

School Children Need To Know Safety Rule

Parents should pay particular attention to instructing their school-age children in a few basic safety rules which are offered by the Mississippi Highway Patrol. Officials of the Department of Public Safety have released the following rules in conjunction with the beginning

1. Do not play in the street or highway on the way to and from school. Traffic is usually heaviest at these times of the day.
2. If walking, learn the safest way to and from school. Be sure to stay on those streets which have the least traffic.
3. Always cross the street or road at intersections, preferably those where there is a stoplight or a marked crosswalk.
4. Children who ride busses should obey the driver at all times. They should not stick their arms out of the windows, run up and down the aisles of the bus, throw trash or paper out the bus windows, or make any excessive noise that would interfere with the driver's safe operation of the bus.
5. Children should realize that they are going to and from school during some of the peak traffic periods of the day. They should understand that they have a responsibility to be "safe pedestrians" just as motorists have a responsibility to be "safe drivers."

Conservation Project Is Now Approved In Area

Approval of a Resource Conservation and Development Project covering 21 northeast Mississippi counties was announced today by W. L. Heard, Jackson, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

The project is sponsored by the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District and the Soil Conservation Districts of the involved counties.

Many Federal and State agencies, as well as local organizations cooperated in preparing the application for USDA assistance. The application sets forth pressing needs of the area, along with proposals to meet these needs.

Under consideration are: Conservation land treatment of more than 4 million acres; Construction of flood prevention and control projects to pro-

tect 2 million acres now subject to recurring damage;

Installation of water systems and sewage disposal systems in communities which need them;

Development of outdoor recreational facilities in all 21 counties;

Creation of adequate processing plants and local markets for farm and timber products.

Mr. Heard said: "The RC&D project plan can be made broad enough to cover almost every type of economic and resource development needed in the area. Many agencies and interests outside USDA will undoubtedly contribute to the accomplishment of the final plan which will be worked out in cooperation with the local people."

Counties included in the project area are Chickasaw, Monroe, Clay, Lowndes, Lee, Itawamba, Alcorn, Prentiss, Tishomingo, Lauderdale, Kemper, Noxubee, Union, Tippah, Pontotoc, Webster, Choctaw, Winston, Oktibbeha, Benton, and Marshall.

Home Economist's Notes

The deep glossy purple egg-plants you see in your garden and the grocery stores are not only tasty but eye-appealing. You will find you can use them for a variety of occasions and in many different ways.

When You Cook Eggplant

You should remember several points when you cook egg-plant:

* It may become very watery.

You may get rid of the excess moisture by salting and drain-ing on a rack before using egg-plant in unthickened recipes. Or you may stack the sliced egg-plant, cover with a plate and place a weight on top of the plant to squeeze out the mois-ture.

* Eggplant discolors quickly

once you slice it. To slow disco-lation, rub or sprinkle with lemon juice.

Since eggplant is easy to dis-color, cook in pottery, glass, stainless steel or enamel cook-ware.

Eggplant en Casserole

Wash a medium-sized egg-plant and 4 medium-sized toma-toes. Peel and cut them into 1/2-inch thick slices. Melt 1/4 cup margarine or salad oil in a skil-let. Add one small chopped onion and one small chopped green pepper. Cook until the onion is golden brown, then re-move onion and pepper from the fat. Saute the eggplant slices in the flavorful fat until they are lightly browned on

both sides.

Arrange alternate layers of sliced eggplant and tomatoes in a casserole. Sprinkle each layer with sauteed onion and pepper. Season. Add a pinch or two or dried oregano or basil. Cover the casserole.

Bake in a 375 degree oven until the eggplant is tender, a-bout 45 minutes. When tender, sprinkle with about 1/2-cup grated American or Parmesan cheese. Place under broiler un-till the cheese melts and browns.

Baked Stuffed Eggplant

1 large eggplant, 2 cups chop-ped cooked meat, 1 cup fresh or canned tomatoes, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1 egg, beaten. 1 teaspoon sugar, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup cooked rice, 1 tea-spoon salt, paprika and black pepper, and 1/2 cup buttered crumbs.

Cut eggplant in halves length wise and scoop out pulp, leaving

shells about 1/4-inch thick. Place shells in cold water. Com-bine chopped eggplant pulp with meat, tomato, onion, egg, sugar, rice, butter and season-ing. Heat until boiling hot. Drain shells and fill with hot mixture. Sprinkle bread crumbs over top and bake 1 hour in a moderate oven (350 degrees) F. Serves 5.

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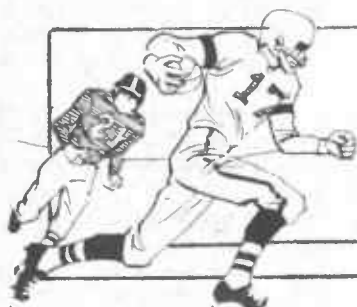

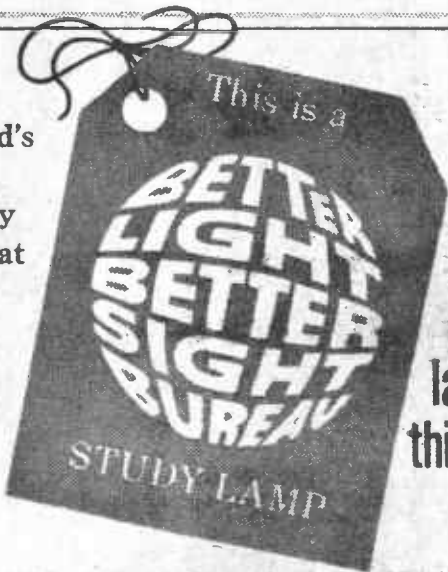
