Speed Limit Set By City Board; New Library Tax Levy Is Made

Action taken recently by the mayor and board of aldermen of the city of Iuka has been the passing of ordinances establishing a speed limit within the town and the levying of a tax for a new library.

The speed limit will be 25 miles per hour throughout the city except in areas where otherwise designated. This action was necessary, officials state due to the current disregard for speed regulations and to tighten up the traffic laws.

A tax levy of one mill has been ordered by the city board. This levy will be used to pay

the city's share of construction of a new library and to help maintain and operate the library.

Among other actions of the city board is the determination to enforce the city's curfew law. Also, beginning Oct. 1, the City will discontinue the service of picking up brush. Lack of employees to do the job and a lack of funds is given as the reason for discontinuing this pickup service.

The City Curfew Law

Youngsters under 21 — and parents — are reminded that the City of Iuka has a curfew law which prohibits any person under 21 years of age from being on the streets after 11 p.m. and before 5 a.m.

Only exception to this law is for the young people to be with a chaperoned group such as church, school, or a civic group. The Ordinance setting up the curfew law was passed by Iuka Board of Aldermen and went into effect July 5, 1960. In recent years, officials state, enforcement of the law has been lax. However, beginning "as of now," they say, the law will be strictly enforced.

Persons caught violating the curfew shall be charged with a misdemeanor and shall be prosecuted accordingly. Parents, let this be a warning to you to herd the youngsters in before 11 p.m.

Chieftains Scalped Tachie Team Friday

The Iuka Chieftains tromped over the Mantachie High School team Friday night for a 43-0 victory to open their 1967 season. Coach Grady Ferguson was a proud man when he stepped off the field, both of his varsity squad and of his second string team which "really did a fine job. I'm well pleased and I think that they did better than anybody expected," he said.

For the first game of the year the Chieftains racked up 7 touchdowns and 1 conversion to wallop the Mantachie line.

Fullback Windell Jourdan made the first TD of the game with a 17 yard run. This started a line of action that wouldn't stop for the Chieftains as halfback Ronnie Brown added up two touchdowns: one, an end run in the 2nd quarter and another in the 3rd quarter. Guard Sidney Robinson did some fine work in Friday night's game on a punt return going for a 25 yard touchdown and tallying

the only extra point scored.

Halfback Larry Cutshall intercepted 2 passes and ran one back at the end of the 2nd half for his touchdown putting the score at 24-0 in time for the halftime activities.

Eddie Gross, quarterback, did some fancy futility throughout the game and took a touchdown for his record at the end of the 3rd quarter. Halfback Steve Wilson took off from the 7 yard line in the 2nd quarter to make his touchdown for the Chieftains.

Iuka scored on 3 plays of the game. The home team made a total of 14 first downs, gained 216 yards and lost only 14, with 20 yards made in passing.

The Mantachie squad had 4 first downs, gained 76 yards and lost 35.

"It means a lot to the team and to the coaches to win the first game of the season, especially, with a good win like ours Friday night," the Coach said.

"Right now we're getting ready for this week's game with Mooreville on their field. The kickoff will be Friday night at 8 o'clock and we invite the fans to travel down to give the Chieftain's the support they deserve — equal to the fine turnout and good spirit displayed in Friday night's game," he added.

The 1967 Chieftain Squad boasts 27 members with nine seniors, 13 juniors, 3 sophomores and 2 freshmen.

Coach Ferguson is assisted by Bryson Mann and Kenneth McClain.

5th Dist. Bond Issue Passes

\$50,000 Assured For Expansion Of Winfield Mfg. At Golden

Voters in the Fifth District firmly endorsed an expansion program of the Winfield Manufacturing plant at Golden Tuesday when they passed a bond issue 805 votes to 37.

Bonds in an amount of \$50,000 will be issued to expand the plant that is already employing several hundred. Employment is expected to increase with the plant expansion.

Thirty percent of the qualified voters of the district were

required to go to the polls and cast ballots and of those voting, 60% were required to favor the proposition. Since there are 2102 registered electors in the Fifth district, a calculation shows that over 40% cast ballots with less than .05 of 1% voting against the issue.

Postmaster Dickie Lomenick reported today that Postal Services Day, September 21, will highlight those services offered to the community by the local post office.

On Postal Services Day, letter carriers will begin delivering to every house-holder a kit of eight postal cards which can be mailed back to the post office to obtain the Zip Codes for "zipless" addresses.

Each completed card will be sent to the post office which services the address needing a Zip Code. There the proper five digit number will be added before the form is returned to the sender. No postage will be needed on the cards.

The Postmaster General reports that many postmasters informed the Department that Zip-A-List project was an important aspect in making Christmas mailers aware of the importance of using the codes on their holiday mail

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THE "UNKNOWN" CAUSE
OF THESE RACE RIOTS

In a recent piece, one of our more "conservative" writers confessed his ignorance as to the cause of race riots. He wrote: "What we have learned from the summer is that we don't actually know the causes of riots."

A person must assume that was an editorial "we" he used — it was John Chamberlain — for the cause of these nation-rending disturbances is both known and documented. Moreover, there are those who are doing their very best to get the truth to the people. Not too successfully, it must be confessed, for there are none, so the saying has it, so blind as those who will not see — the quoted "conservative" writer among them.

Here is the answer: There are significant differences between the races, deep-down meaningful differences that make it impossible for the two to live equally, that is, intermixed, amicably, the same. There are all sorts of differences, differences in customs, in outlook, in desire — the list is virtually endless. But they all have their root in a single cause: The mental processes of the races are different: What is of importance to one is of less importance or of no importance to the other.

Because this is so, the races can no more live identically, that is, equally, than can two mis-gaited horses pull together. As to which of the two is the superior race, that is a matter of opinion. It depends upon the things you, as an individual, value — your aspirations, your ideals, what is of importance to you.

Thus it is with races and to deny this fact is to deny the root cause of the riots. Moreover, you may take it as fact, it is the appreciation of these differences that has The Black Caucus calling for apartheid. Negroes, these Negroes know, cannot compete with White people, not in a White culture. They cannot any more than White people can compete with Blacks in a Black culture, no more than a Percheron can race with a Thoroughbred, no more than a Thoroughbred can do the draft work of a Percheron.

As I say, all this is known to those who have demanded hard answers, who will not settle for the glib, self-quoting equalitarian "authorities" who — if it served their purpose — would argue that the very noses of our faces are the same.

They are cute, these ideologues, and effective. They have convinced the American people, conservative writers among them, that a person who argues the merit of racial purity is somehow a villain.

Villain or saint, those who do carry the burden are not faltering. They persist. And as the truth shall be known, the truth —

mind you — the truth shall set us free.

Would you know the truth? There is a book — Carleton Putnam's new "Race and Reality", sequel to his "Race and Reason" — that has it all, the facts as well as the means employed by the Liberal Establishment to deny them.

Putnam is no fervid, intemperate writer. He is as cool and as clinical a fact pounder as an eighth-generation Yankee can be; as demanding as an avenging angel.

Some years ago, this retired airlines executive got fed up with the cant and deceit of those who have, in the interim, disrupted our nation. So, he began to dig. As a result, Putnam made himself the nation's best informed individual on all facets of the issue known as "race". True enough, there are professionals in the area of their specialty who know their limited field better than does Putnam. But there is no man in America so well informed in all areas as this law-trained intellectual. He has used his hard-bought knowledge to expose the deceivers.

Your bookstore probably has Putnam's new book — "Race and Reality" — but if it does not, you may obtain a copy by sending \$4.50 to The National Putnam Letters Committee, Suite 708, 1725 K St. N.W., Washington, D.C. It is worth the money.

The Black Caucus is right, of course. Negroes caught in a White culture can do better living socially separate lives. The tragedy lies in that it is these people — the trouble-bent, radical Left who comprise The Black Caucus — having learned the truth, have stolen the play from the Liberals who — being in power — might have solved our mutual problem. But the Liberals didn't, they won't, and they never will seek the truth for the truth isn't in them, only ideology. As a consequence, the future of this country is dark, and that's a pity.

We'd been selling corn and hogs, but now we had to eat 'em ourselves. Looked like we'd eat 'em till doomsday, which appeared to be just around the corner. (They said it was prosperity, but it sure seemed more like doomsday to me.)

Well, this friend of mine was from the town. Had no idea what life was like on the farm. Used to lie awake calculating how he could lick the depression by investing his money in some kind of agriculture.

Finally he decided that his best bet was chickens. All he needed was a chicken farm up for sale, and that wasn't hard to find. I could have told him about twenty-odd in my part of the state.

Pretty soon, full of enthusiasm, he surveyed his new property, the source, he expected, of his coming wealth. What actually came was the cold gray dawn.

Chicken Every Meal

He gathered dozens of eggs, every day, and they remained stacked in buckets until most of them became overripe. His chicks hatched all right, giving him more mouths to feed. Broilers weren't selling. Before long he and his family were doing what we were doing — eating their own product. Chicken every meal.

But he was lucky. Managed to unload the place about a year later. Lost money (and an appetite for chicken) on the deal, but at least he managed to get

back to town.

We both staggered through the depression, and prosperity really did return. When I see him nowadays, I josh him about that chicken farm. He shakes his head, and replies: "I took a rat hole for a cornucopia." Says the moral is never to go into a business you don't understand. Before you invest your hard-earned dollars, look around for the reasons why you shouldn't invest.

I say "amen" to that. It's a moral I preach every chance I get.

Incidentally, his kids still don't like chicken.

LBJ AND THE RIOTS

Looking back at the disastrous Detroit riot, Americans properly may be dismayed at President Johnson's highly political reaction to the disorders. Whereas the White House in the past as been quick to send federal troops into Southern states at the earliest opportunity, Mr. Johnson delayed and delayed sending soldiers into strife-torn Detroit. The delays persisted despite pleas by Republican Gov. George Romney of Michigan and the Democratic mayor of Detroit.

When the troops finally were dispatched into the city (and they constituted only a fraction of the massive force President Kennedy used to overwhelm the small town of Oxford, Miss., in 1962) he employed a nationwide television address to explain his extreme reluctance to employ federal troops.

Under the circumstances, this explanation seemed peculiar. If there ever was an occasion for federal assistance, this was it. The troops were requested by state and local authorities. The havoc being committed in Detroit was equal to what an external enemy of the United States might achieve in a massive bombing raid.

Mr. Johnson apparently was trying to get off the hook with "civil rights" groups. But the vast majority of the American people are not politically-minded "civil rights" activists. They are people who expect the President to assist the states in upholding Mr. Johnson needed to say in his television address was that he intended to prevent Detroit and other American cities from being turned into jungles. There was no valid reason, as "The Charlotte News" has said, for the President to react "half apologetically to each link in the chain of disaster." The President of the United States does not need to expain himself to "civil rights" organizations when American cities are under siege.

In the aftermath of the riot-

ing, Mr. Johnson has asked the country to pray for domestic peace. He also has appointed an investigative commission to inquire into the cause of the riots.

Prayer certainly is in order as a proper avenue to reconciliation. On the other hand, Americans cannot overlook the fact that the liberal clergy is partly to blame for the disorders now shaking this nation. In recent years, hundreds of liberal priests, ministers and rabbis have given their endorsement to civil disobedience and to protect movements which trample on municipal and state laws. In Selma, Ala., there was an invasion of clergymen from the North. One wonders: where were these clerical voices of "conscience" when the rioting broke out in Detroit and other cities? How is it that Martin Luther King didn't invade the streets of Detroit to call for non-violence? There is a distinct smell of hypocrisy in this situation.

As for the presidential investigative commission, no doubt the members, according to their lights' will search for answers. It would be a mistake, however, to expect much of the commission. In general, the members share the social outlook which has prevailed in places of power in the last generation. That is to say, they believe that uplifting of backward people and the ending of public discipline problems can be solved by massive

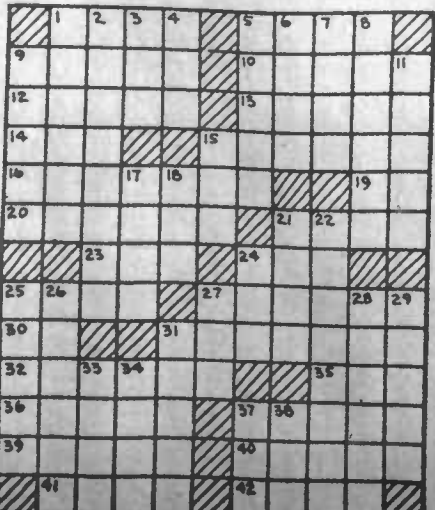

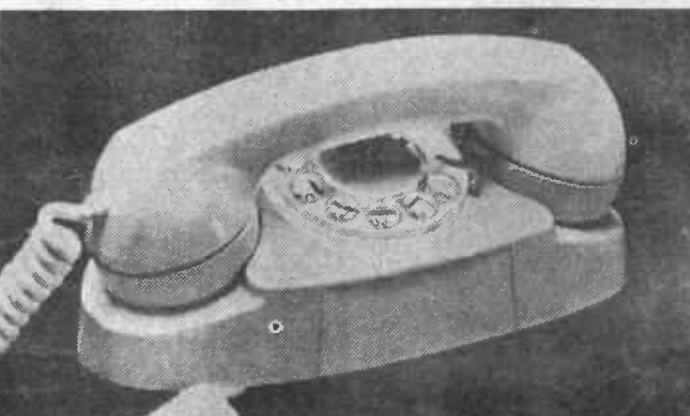

Investigation Started In Reynolds Blast Where 4 Were Killed

Investigation began Tuesday morning to determine the cause of an explosion at the Listerhill plant of the Aluminum Co. late Tuesday night which killed four persons and critically injured 11 others. At least 40 others were injured with lesser injuries.

The explosion came at 11:27 p.m. The time factor was in holding down the victims. It occurred during shift change and only a few persons were in the plant.

The plant employs 100 persons on a three-shift basis.

Marvin J. Bullock of Sheffield, Ala., 51, of Sheffield Creekmore, 52, of Burnsville, 39, and John B. Daily, 41, of Burnsville. Critically injured were J. Rithmore, 41, of Burnsville.

Although a number of county men work in the plant, none are being involved or the explosion.

Estimates of damage to the casting house and

nearby facilities began at one million dollars, but the plant's public relations director, Bob Holloway, said, "There is no way to really estimate damage and with something like this it's hard to tell."

Work continued in all departments of the plant Tuesday and clean-up and rebuilding began Tuesday afternoon. The damaged area is sheltered under one roof and covers an area from 200 to 300 feet long and at least 50 feet wide.

The plant is the largest aluminum producing factory in the United States. The accident was the first major one in the company's 25-year history.

Herman Sockwell, a foreman at the plant, was in the parking lot next to the building when the roof "went up like a can." He said the deafening roar — the sound was heard 10 miles away — was followed by a "sickening silence."

The lack of lighting and the jumble of wreckage hampered rescue and emergency crews and it was not until about 12:30 a.m. Tuesday that the last ambulance left.

One employee aptly described the scene. "It looks as if a bomb hit there."

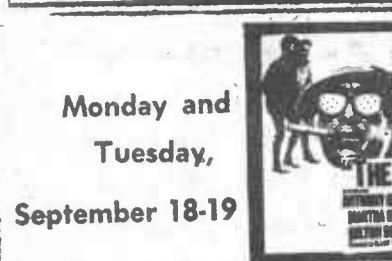

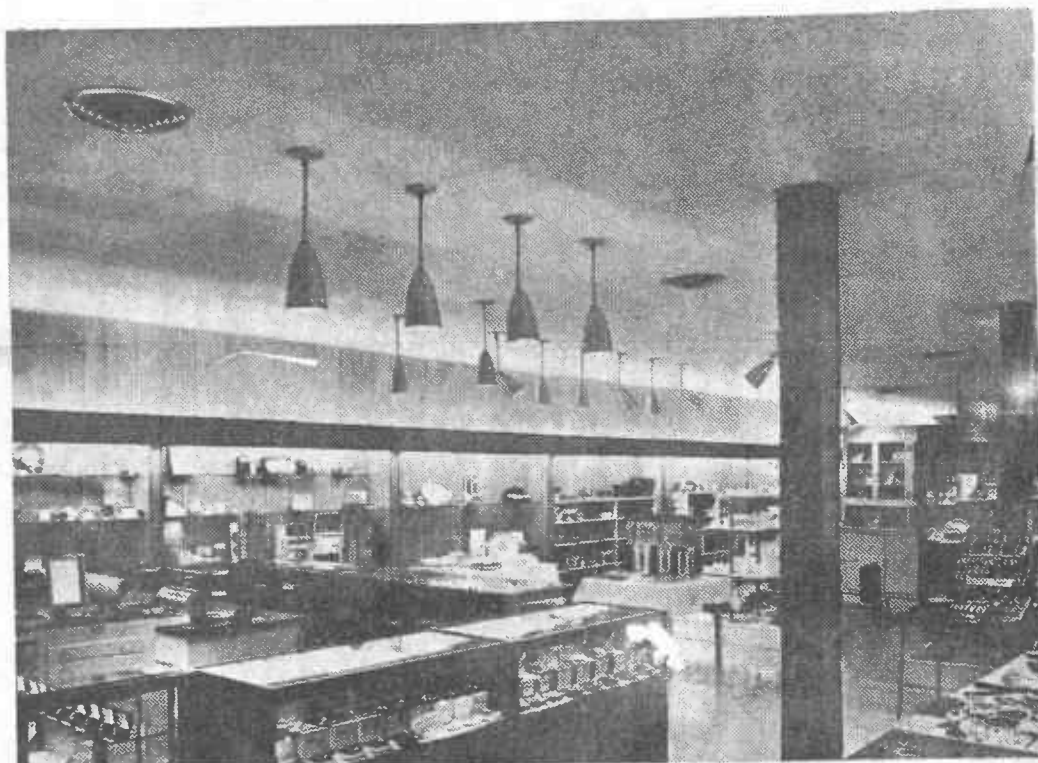

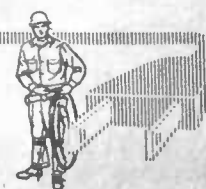
