The suit was filed Sept. 12 by
attorneys Joe Ray Langston
and James N. Goodwin, both of
Booneville, on behalf of Wilson
and Eddie Ledbetter, another
candidate.

Named as contestees are
George William Cutshall and
Aubrey 'Pat' Patterson, candi-
dates in the Aug. 29 runoff el-
ection. Cutshall, Iuka mayor,
won the post.

The suit charges ballots rep-
resenting more than one-third
of the total vote should be
thrown out because of irregulari-
ties, and that the election
"could not be said to represent
the will of the voters."

Had the ballots been voided,
Attorney Langston said, the
results would have given Cut-
shall 685 votes, Wilson 697 and
Patterson 816 votes.

An Answer To A Vidette Article Titled "A Regrettable Situation"

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was hand-
ed to the Editor of this newspaper as a reply to our
editorial in last week's issue of The Vidette. In our
belief in fair and open discussion, we present the
article as it is written. Contributor's name withheld
but may be had upon request.)

There appeared an article in the September 14, 1967, issue
of The Vidette titled, "A Regrettable Situation."

This article was indeed expected and it is obvious from read-
ing the article that it is the beginning of a campaign to intimi-
date and bias the opinion of the average working citizen who
feels that his vote should be protected by the simple laws and
rules set out by the State of Mississippi. It was also expected
and has already come to pass, that those of the average working
citizen will be persecuted and ridiculed for having the courage of
their convictions and fighting for what they believe to be right
through the Courts, in a lawful manner.

The power structure, money boys and silk stocking crowd
will use every available means, from threat of job to loan fore-
closure, to quiet the voices of the poor people and average work-
ing man who feels that his vote and those of his children or
grandchildren should be protected and safeguarded regardless of
the car he drives or price home in which he lives.

It is also perfectly obvious that the article is a political move
to have the election holders feel that their integrity and honesty
are being questioned. This is not the case at all! The average
citizen behind this movement fully believes the election holders
followed the only procedure they knew and we feel that if they
had been advised of the proper procedure we know the election
would have been held according to law.

The article in the Vidette states it is difficult to perform ac-
cording to the law and hard to please everyone; to that we say
that it is a very simple law to have a voter sign his name when
voting so that no person could ever be voted unless he marked
the ballot himself, and the law is equally simple where it says
that the calling and counting of the votes when the polls are
closed should be in fair and full view of the voting public and
candidates and not behind closed or locked doors. These two laws
were not passed for the counties of the State of Mississippi to
displease or please any voter or group, but merely to insure the
safeguard of a vote cast by the average man who does not under-
stand how the rich and powerful operate.

If a poor man can't ask that an election be held according
to the law of his state, then how could we ask that any other law
in our state be upheld. Jesus Christ lost his life for bucking the
power structure and silk stocking crowd of his day and some of
those involved in this request for fair play have already felt the
sting of intimidation and discrimination from the silk stocking
crowd.

If wife of one of the parties involved was told not to come
back to work at a factory. Is it just a coincidence that one of
the persons of the power structure owns a sizeable portion of that
factory? We don't think so.

For the man or woman who works in the factory, the fields,
the clerk in the store, the service station attendant, the fisher-
man or those unable to work, we honestly and sincerely desire
and hope that this project will provide you with the security at
the polls you deserve and that your vote for the candidate of
your choice will be protected according to the laws of the State
of Mississippi.

Enrollments Of Students Increase At All Centers

Total enrollment of students
in school throughout Tishomin-
go County has reached 3,309

and will continue to grow dur-
ing the next few weeks as late
enrollees register.

The breakdown begins with
Iuka Separate School where
Supt. Bobby Burress quotes a
total of 1,108 now in class. This
is 108 students more than at
this time last year.

"Eugene Tennison, elementa-
ry school principal, has reported
that there are 596 students
enrolled in grades 1-6 to date.
This, coupled with Joe E.
Brown's, high school principal,
report of 513 for grades 7-12,
gives us our total thusfar," the
superintendent said. "We are
using every available space to
take care of the students this
year. It is interesting to note
that the freshman class has the
largest group with 124 mem-
bers. In four years this will be
the largest class ever to gradu-
ate from Iuka School," he add-
ed.

The faculty at Iuka School in-
cludes 43 members among
which are the new teachers,
Coach Grady Ferguson, Stanley
Smith, Ronnie Gamble, Kayren
Smith, Eva Ford, Bobbie Sue
Finch, Teresa Burch and Edna
Williams, as well as Mr. Tenni-
son.

County Schools

Added to the Iuka Separate
School enrollment figure are
those of the county schools. At
Burnsville, principal Melvin
Phifer states that 796 pupils are
enrolled both in high school and
elementary school combined. At
Tishomingo, R. C. Strickland,
principal, reports that 615 stu-
dents are enrolled while Bel-
mont School has a total figure
of 790, according to W. W. Gris-
ham, principal.

This makes a total of 2201 en-
rolled this year in the county
schools as compared to the 2134
last year.

Supt. of Education B. L. Mer-

cer noted that this year, eighty-
seven regular teachers are em-
ployed in the county school sys-
tem, 12 of which are working
under the provisions of Title I,
along with 3 teacher's aids.

Funds Allotted For A Library

Dr. Kelly Segars, chairman of
the Iuka library committee, re-
ports that federal funds have
been allotted to help pay for
the construction of a new libra-
ry building in Iuka.

The building is expected to
cost about \$40,000.00 with the
federal allocation being \$24,000
and the city's share \$16,000.00.
During recent action of the Iu-
ka board of aldermen, a 1-mill
levy was made to pay the city's

part of the construction and to
help maintain and operate the
library.

Probable location of the new
library building will be in Min-
eral Springs park, Dr. Segars
said. "We have that land avail-
able," he said, "and may have
to use it due to high cost of real
estate, and the availability of
any other appropriate site."

Location of the building
would be north of the Youth
Center, facing west in the park.

The chairman said that only
two cities have been approved
by the State Library Commis-
sion for new construction and
they are Corinth and Iuka.
There are a total of 16 com-
munities that have applications
in for building funds.

Starting date of construction
in Iuka will depend upon the
availability of funds that are to
be furnished by the city, Dr. Se-
gars said.

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GEORGE WALLACE: THE "X" FACTOR

I tell you, George Wallace has got 'em hopping. The professional politicians, as the lowly semipros, are going out of their chicanery minds trying to figure which party will be "hurt" most by his candidacy. On a recent day, no less an otherwise-sensible newspaper than The Richmond (Va.) Times-Dispatch published an editorial entitled, "Wallace The Wrecker".

What the T-D argued, and it is typical, was this: If only George Wallace would go away, the Republicans this time — and finally — could beat the Democrats.

How myopic can you get? Who gives a tinker's dam about the Republicans, per se? A lessening number of people, I can tell you, as a lessening number care about the Democrats, per se. This was pointed up for me by a young lady of tender years: "What is this emotional attachment for the Republicans and Democrats", she asked, rhetorically, I am sure, for she closed her question with this disclaimer, "They don't mean anything to me".

And that is why George Wallace is sailing with fair winds. He means something to people. He argues for the right of local self government, and what the Republican party stands for is beyond me. I couldn't care less — if it must be one or the other — whether George Romney, Nelson Rockefeller or LBJ were president.

And the question comes, "What of Reagan?" And here's the answer: Reagan is the only man — the only man — in the Republican corral who stands a ghost of a chance of being elected in 1968. And his chance of success depends upon the candidacy of George Wallace.

What's more, the sooner Republicans get in some deep thinking to realize their only hope is embodied in Reagan by way of Wallace, the better off they will be.

Here, I will spell it out for Ray Bliss & Co.: Suppose for a moment Reagan is awarded the top spot on the Republican ticket in 1968.

Hold that thought for a moment, then turn to Wallace.

George Wallace, at this time, so the kept pollsters report, has in his corner about 15 per cent of the general electorate. Think a moment and you will realize that nearly all Wallace supporters are not only Democrats, they are a particular kind of Democrat, they are union-type people, blue-collar Democrats, those who went to the mat with the rioters, who, now, silently, implacably resist the press for integration. Such people are the heart of George Wallace's support. Moreover, they would no more vote

for a Republican than they would vote for Right-to-Work. The name as the phrase, is anathema to them.

Fifteen per cent of the general electorate means, at least, 25 per cent of the Democrats. Right? Give 25 per cent of the Democratic vote to Wallace and there isn't a State in the nation the Sons of the Wild Jackass can carry. In every one of them the Republican vote would surpass the Democratic vote — so long as Wallace is in there as a third force.

The certainty is this: With Wallace a candidate, the Democrats cannot win in 1968.

Therefore, with Reagan as the Republican nominee, the Republicans may win — by default. But let the Republicans nominate anyone other than Reagan, say a poseur with a liberal stripe, and they will insure the election of George Wallace. That is because it is not only blue-collar Democrats who are fed up. Conservative Republicans are fed up, too.

In a three-horse race, it should not be forgotten, it takes but 34 per cent of the vote to win. And when a person recalls that George Wallace, in the face of lace-curtain catcalls, in the pre-riot year of 1964, got to 42 per cent of the Democratic vote — that of the Maryland primary — his latent strength begins to take on its true significance.

George Wallace is the X factor in this upcoming campaign, no doubt of it, and however fashionable it may be for the political savants to downgrade his strength, watch him go. And go he will — you may put that on the wall, but save space for the hide of a donkey and an elephant.

AND NOW STRIKES!

As though the country didn't have enough trouble with riots and disturbances of almost every kind, the nation now is confronted with a rash of hurtful strikes. They range from automobile factories to public school classrooms.

The news of a strike in the auto capital seems doubly distressing in view of what Detroit has gone through this past summer. One would think that the leadership of the United Automobile Workers would have thought twice before calling a strike that would further injure the economic well-being of Detroit. The strike shows that one should never count on union leadership to demonstrate any sense of responsibility to the public.

A strike on automobile assembly lines is particularly bad at the time when new models are supposed to be moving to showrooms throughout the nation. The union leaders may tell the union membership that management is feeling the pressure, but ill effects of such a strike are felt throughout the nation and by all types of working people — railroaders, mechanics, salesmen and others. As is the case with all big strikes, the ultimate victim is the general public.

A strike represents a non-recoverable loss for community and nation. It is a period of non-productivity in which everybody suffers but the union bosses who generally are well insulated with comfortable union salaries. The fat salaries of union bosses aren't cut when union members are told to go on strike against their employers.

Moreover, with the U. S. economy in an uncertain state, this country can't afford a big auto strike. In an auto strike, all of allied and subsidiary industries are affected. Suppliers of steel, glass, and special parts can't market their products. This means production cutbacks in these industries, with wage losses for the employees affected.

The rash of strikes by teachers is another type of situation, but an equally hurtful one. More than half a million school children already have had their new year's schooling affected by teacher boycotts, resignations or other extreme forms of pay protest.

No one questions that most teachers should be financially upgraded, though teaching like other tasks certainly should be judged on a merit scale. But the cities and counties of America can't suddenly hike wages by huge amounts. The demands for tax dollars are endless, and teacher wage increases have to take their place with other public needs.

As a matter of fact, the states have been trying to raise teacher pay. Florida, where teacher protests have been rampant in recent days, is one of the states that has provided more state aid for teachers. Yet this has not deterred the teacher-protestors. It should be appreciated by the public that some of the loudest demands for strike action have come in communities where the pay scale is highest. In Detroit again, the school board offered \$6,500 a year as a salary for beginning teachers — certainly

fair by any standard. Yet the teachers federation in that city rejected the offer.

It is very distressing to find teachers, who are supposed to be true educators and responsible citizens, using the protest methods one might expect of a waterfront dispute. What are parents to think of teachers who abandon their classrooms — and abandon the educational needs of children — in order to force a wage settlement on a school board?

For years, teacher organizations have been stating that they are truly professional organizations. These organizations expressed profound shock and indignation in the 1950s when, in a time of social turmoil, some communities said it might be necessary to close schools rather than have them become political battlegrounds. Yet now these teacher organizations smile on teacher strikes or related forms of harsh community pressure. The needs of youth seem forgotten in the frenzy of organizing wage agitation efforts. The calmness and social perspective one expects of teachers is absent from those who threaten boycott or resignation.

To be sure, thousands of teachers are providing traditional loyal service to community and students. These, too, are injured in the public eye by the minority of teacher-protestors.

FAMILY POT LUCK

After browning and braising veal chops, cook until tender. When they're done, blend dairy sour cream with the cooking liquids left in the pan. Sprinkle generously with paprika before serving this sauce with the chops and buttered noodles.

A cake is likely to fall if too much sugar or fat or baking powder or liquid is used. Undermixing or insufficient baking, too low an oven temperature or moving a cake during baking before it has "set" also may cause a cake to fall and be soggy.

Honey may be used, measure for measure, in place of sugar in preparing puddings, custards, pie fillings, baked apples, candied and "sweet-sour" vegetables, salad dressings and cinnamon toast.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Dr. Garrett, my child continually complains about his teacher. In reading to the class, he says, she reads without expression and without emphasis — that is his complaint as I interpret it. In any event, he has grown lethargic, with a distinct dislike for both his teacher and his school. What can be done about this?

A: Criticism of a teacher by a student may come from so many motives that it is wise to check such stories very carefully. Children who are failing, or who have been reprimanded, or who haven't made preparation will often "transfer" their troubles to the teacher. It is possible, of course, that the teacher is at fault — but don't jump to that conclusion prematurely.

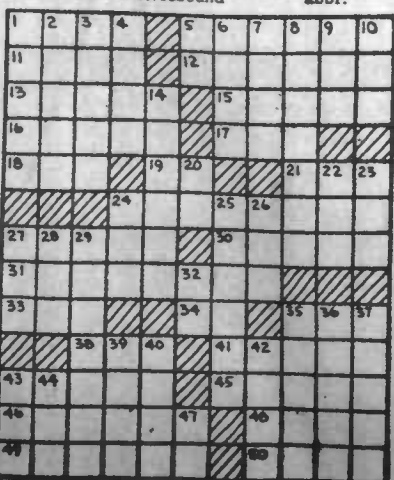

Management Of Warm Southern Lawns
Lawns not to be over-mowed. Test to determine nutrient needs.
Out September 15, depending on soil test, apply three pounds of phosphate and 3 lbs. of potash per 1,000 square feet, if needed lime. Example: 0-20-20 or equivalent.
Mowing height 1 1/4 inch normal.
Mow and manicure before September 15, depending on soil test, apply three pounds of phosphate and 3 lbs. of potash plus any needed lime. Example: 0-20-20 or equivalent.
Mow 1-15, mow closely, remove clippings.
Broadcast (1) 3 to 5 pounds of grass, bentgrass, or crested fescue, (2) a mixture of grasses, or (3) 10 lbs. of grass per 1,000 square feet to insure seed contact.
Address with 1/8 inch of soil available.
Apply 1 pound of nitrogen per acre, December and February apply or much nitrogen needed for green color.
Mow at 1 1/2 to 2 inch height in March, lower mowing and don't apply nitrogen. Permanent grass is active.
Broadleaf weeds can be post-emergence with 1 pound per acre of 2,4-D.
Mow Lawns To Be Tinted color.
Mow as "Existing Lawns be Overseeded."
Remove clippings and spray with colorants December 1, or any time after dormant grass. Divide recommended amount of spray in half and make two applications in a circular direction.
Temporary Winter Lawns
Test to determine nutrient needs.
Shape lawn to desired form.
Apply lime, phosphate, and potash as needed.
Prepare seedbed and seed 10 pounds of rye grain, or ryegrass per 1,000 sq. ft. and cultipack or roll.
Apply 1 pound of nitrogen per month or as needed for green color.
Mow at 2 to 2 1/2 inches.

Electric Bills Much Less For Past Year
Total electric bills of consumers served by distributors of TVA power were about \$269 million less in the past fiscal year than they would have been for the same amounts of electricity at average rates throughout the United States, TVA has calculated.
TVA power is distributed locally by 160 municipal, cooperative and privately-owned electric systems. They serve nearly two million ultimate consumers.
On residential power bills the savings in fiscal year 1967 totaled \$137 million, an average of \$80 per customer for the year. The fiscal year ended June 30.
Each year since 1939, TVA has computed the difference between actual bills of TVA power users and the higher cost at U. S. average rates. The 28-year total is nearly \$2-1/2 billion.
This coming year the savings are expected to be less because

of a recent TVA power rate increase. However, the electric rates in this area still are generally well below national averages, the agency said.

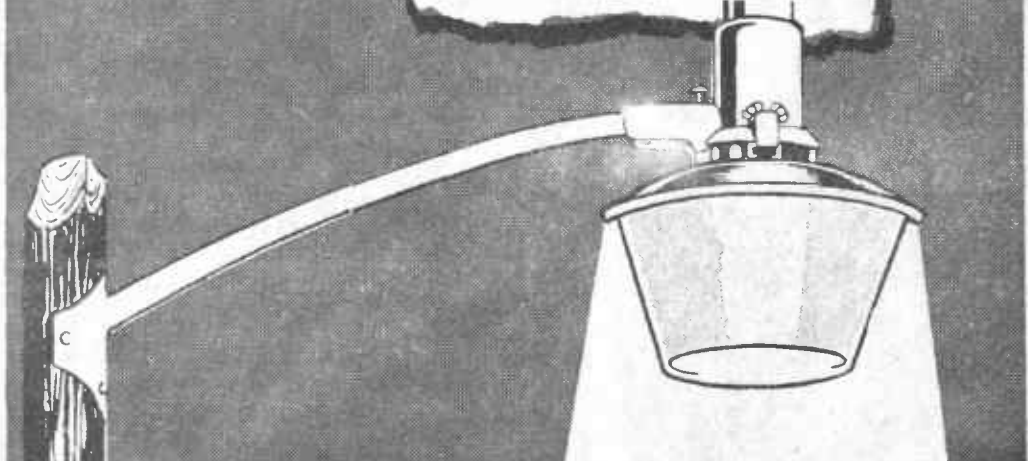

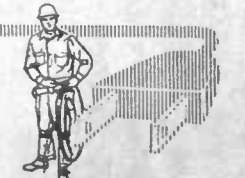

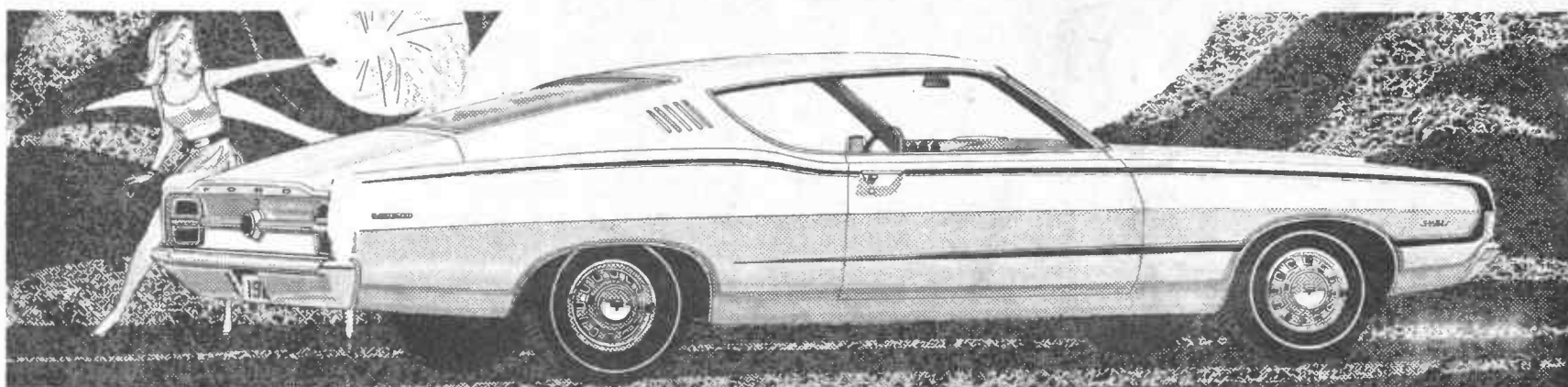
