Special Court Denies Petition On 1st Primary

Failure To Notify All Parties Concerned Is Reason

The petition to disqualify bal-
lots cast in some of the pre-
cincts in the First Primary elec-
tion was denied by Judge Mar-
shall Perry in a special hearing
held Tuesday.

The Circuit Court hearing was
brought about by a suit filed by
Whit Wilson and Eddie Ledbetter,
two of the eleven candi-
dates in the sheriff's race in
which George Cutshall and Pat
Patterson were winners.

Litigants in the hearing were
Wilson and Ledbetter, the con-
testants, and Cutshall and Pat-
terson, the contestees.

Attorneys for Cutshall and
Patterson argued that because
their clients were not given pro-
per notice of a hearing before
the Tishomingo County Demo-
cratic Executive Committee
held on August 30, their rights
were completely denied. With-
out sufficient notice, the attor-
neys said, the contestees did not

have an opportunity to defend
their positions.

Judge Perry, in making his
decision, said notification of all
parties was inherent and neces-
sary.

The suit charged that ballots
representing more than one-
third of the total vote cast in
the county in the sheriff's race
should be thrown out because of
irregularities and that the elec-
tion could not be said to repre-
sent the will of the voters. It
also asked that a new primary
be ordered or that Wilson, 3rd
man in the race, be declared a
runoff nominee instead of Cut-
shall.

In commenting on the deci-
sion, attorneys for Wilson and
Ledbetter said that an amended
petition may be filed for a new
hearing before the Tishomingo
County Executive Committee, or
that they may go before the
State Supreme Court for a re-

view of the petition denied by
Judge Perry. "Or we may be out
of court," they said.

Representing the contestants
Wilson and Ledbetter are Joe
Langstone and James Godwin of
Booneville and attorneys for
Cutshall and Patterson are
James Price and Bob Khrohn of
Corinth.

Sitting in on the hearing were
the three Tishomingo county
election commissioners, Mrs. T.
A. Clark, Charles Bostick and
Leonard Rushing. A large num-
ber of witnesses had been sum-
moned for both sides including
a handwriting expert from Mem-
phis. None of the witnesses were
examined. However, in an out-
of-court conference with attor-
neys, P. L. Oaks, secretary of
the Democratic executive com-
mittee, said that no notice was
served on Cutshall or Patter-
son concerning the hearing be-
fore the committee on Aug. 30.

Tour For Farmers Today

A tour over in Colbert Coun-

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THE GREATEST OF THESE WAS CHARITY

The whole world, it seems to me, is caught up in this deplorable welterism. Certainly the world I know, or know about, is caught in its toils and what the ultimate outcome will be, Lord only knows.

How it came upon us is something for the philosophers to determine. It is my own horseback opinion, welterism, as we know it, today, had its birth in the terrible bloodletting of 1914-1918, and was given great impetus between 1939-1945. Those two holocausts destroyed England, is what they did, the anchor of the civilized world, and this world of ours has not recovered from that loss. Nor is it apt to.

It might be argued that the church — religion, generally — and not the culture of a particular nation has been the world's anchor. It might be so argued, but not very effectively. True, that has been religion's posture, as it is its posture, but I have come to doubt the validity of its claim. Truth is, the religious are abettors of this descent into darkness. They have lost their virility, their ability to stand for the right against all odds; religion is no longer a stanchion to tie to. As a result, the well of affection once held for those of the cloth, for those who renounce the things of this world, is becoming, instead, a dry hole of contempt. The lions of the gospel are no more. The temple is falling down.

Even so, there are those who are caught in this decline of religion for whom I have the greatest sympathy; my heart aches for them. I write of the nuns.

Let me go back a bit. I was taught that God created me, endowed me with a soul of which I am the keeper. That if I lived a blameless, or relatively blameless life, kept my sinning to a minimum, repented for those sins I did commit, when I shucked this vale I would go to heaven, there to live in eternal happiness.

I believed what I was taught. I believe it yet — with certain modifications of my own devising. I was taught the meaning of faith, hope, and charity and that the greatest of these is charity. And that, too, I still believe — with no modifications. And, I venture, that — all of it — is what nuns believe. They do, that is, with subtle refinements beyond my ken — the greatest of these is charity.

Certainly, charity, selfless work, selfless giving, is the basis for the nunneries all over the world. And the parochial schools we know, operated by these dedicated women, are manifestations of their charitable nature. And, having had some experience with them, I know that nuns, by and large, have been gloriously happy in their work, laying up their

treasures for the inevitable time when they, too, along with the likes of me, will stand before the seat of judgment.

No longer. Their work has been taken from them. Charity, the act of giving with love, is passe. In its place is welterism, the antithesis of charity. Welterism turns on the art of taking, not giving.

How this tragedy has come about is easily explained. Instead of fighting the devil — socialism — the church temporized. In the name of charity, in the name of Christ, in the name of brotherhood, the religious hierarchy — the most of them — joined the Marxist parade. Now their hands are as deeply embedded in the federal treasury as they can get them; the church is scrambling for dollars in competition with the official elements of our Welfare State. And the charity that once was, the hard scramble the nuns once knew, is no more. Now, by government edicts that are unopposed by the religious, it has become the "right" of the poor to demand their substance, their "minimum" this and that.

Don't misunderstand. The nuns, themselves, are still wearing it out, making it do — the nuns occupy the bottom rung of the discriminatory, religious totem pole. Their scramble is harder than ever. It is that their sources of money have withered until, now, they find themselves hard put to balance even their cupboard-bare budgets.

"Give to the poor? With all this relief business? Not likely." So, being caught, the nuns have evolved as inevitably they had to evolve, they too have become practitioners in the art of taking and they are as clumsy at it as a bear cub poking at a bee hive.

It isn't in their nature to exist, so. They are not bureaucrats. They are women dedicated to God Almighty, to good works. And to make of them unpaid social workers, dependent even in part upon government, is contrary to their make up. Their calling has lost its soul.

"In my class," a nun told me, recently, "there were thirty-four novitiates. In this year's class, there were but three."

Cardinal Cushing, on a recent day, had a word to say: "This country is rotting from within and losing the battle against communism." He should know.

So, the inmost light goes out. May God forgive us.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Dr. Garrett, what do you think of the plan to bus Negro children from their own neighborhood to White schools in order to establish racial "balance"?

A: Very little. The colored children are uprooted from their neighborhood, taken across the city, and allowed to sit in classes with White children. At the end of the school day, they are bussed back home. There is no "integration", only disruption. Moreover, there is no assurance that "integration", willy-nilly, is good for either White or Black. The concept of racial "balance", if carried to an extreme, could demand sex balancing, age balancing, ability balancing, etc.

The next step, of course, will be the bussing of White children into Negro areas. Whose child shall go; yours?

Rampant Fanaticism

Looking back at the National Conference for New Politics held in Chicago early this fall, Americans can see in this strange and terrible gathering the unleashing of the forces of unreason (to put it mildly) in our society.

The meeting, originally designed to unite all the radical elements in the nation and opening with an address by the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., quickly disintegrated into a condition of anarchy and total fanaticism.

Actually, the National Conference for New Politics should be viewed as another link in a lengthy chain of ugly events in this nation. The ancestral sources of this meeting, so to speak, include the San Francisco riot against the House Committee on Un-American Activities, the sit-ins conducted against the war in Vietnam, and this past summer's urban riots. The conference, like these other events, was riddled with communists and fellow-travelers.

What we can see in the Chicago conference is the development of radical fanaticism into a mania that is profoundly dangerous to the Republic. Indeed the conference should be equated with the beer hall gatherings of Adolf Hitler and his cohorts in the 1920s. Like the early Nazis, the leftwingers in Chicago want to destroy the nation in which they live.

A fascinating development inside the conference was the emergence of the so-called Black Caucus. This group was successful in imposing on the conference at large its twisted version of the national and international realities. The liberals in the conference who had some reservations about the most irrational statements of the caucus were overwhelmed. In the last analysis, they meekly surrendered to the general mania.

"The New Leader Magazine," a liberal journal, quoted the remarks of some of the confer-

ence participants who were confronted with the Black Caucus positions. "We owe them an endorsement," the New Leader quoted Herman Cole, whom it described as "a pastor and peace candidate for the Buffalo, N. Y., City Council." The magazine also quoted Dr. Bertam Garskof of Ann Arbor, Michigan, as saying: "To create revolution . . . anything goes."

The statements adopted by the conference are unrivaled in American history for their total departure from reason. The group accepted, for example, the position of the Black Caucus that "white civilizing committees be established in all white communities to civilize and humanize the savage and beast-like character that runs rampant throughout America."

Hard-core leftists positions were embraced by the conference. For instance, James Foreman, secretary to the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee, insisted upon unanimous support for condemnation of South Africa and for a boycott of 1968 General Motors automobiles. When one delegate protested the abandonment of parliamentary rules, the presiding officer shouted: "Yes, I'm the dictator."

It should not be imagined that this wild conference in Chicago is an isolated development. The protest marches in Milwaukee, Wisconsin — coming after the Chicago meeting — have a logical connection. Fanaticism, once unleashed, is known to spread in epidemic form. Thus, in Milwaukee, a gang of protestors — political hoodlums — invaded the mayor's office and ripped it to pieces. The mayor, in what seems a tragic miscalculation, instructed the police to stand by and let the protestors destroy furniture and carve on paneling. The fact is that radical hoodlum elements, if they discover they can get away with one act of violence, will engage

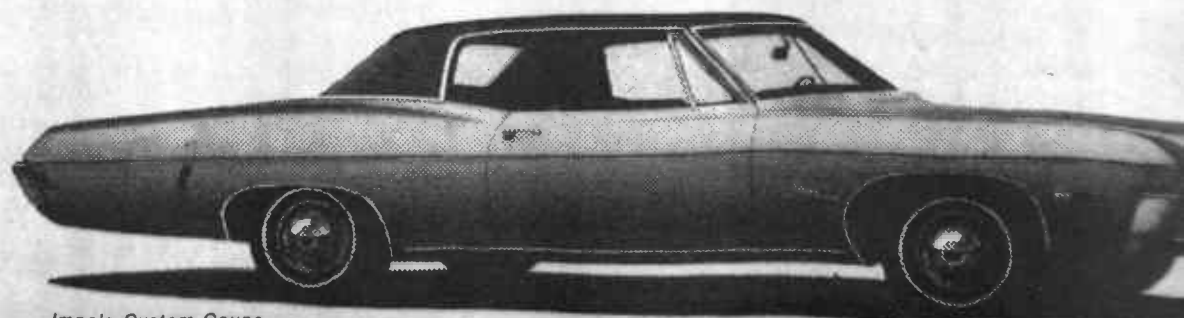

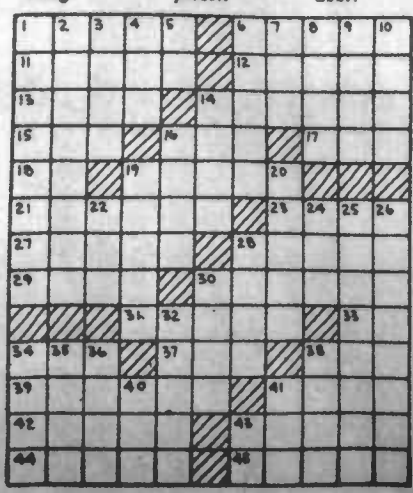

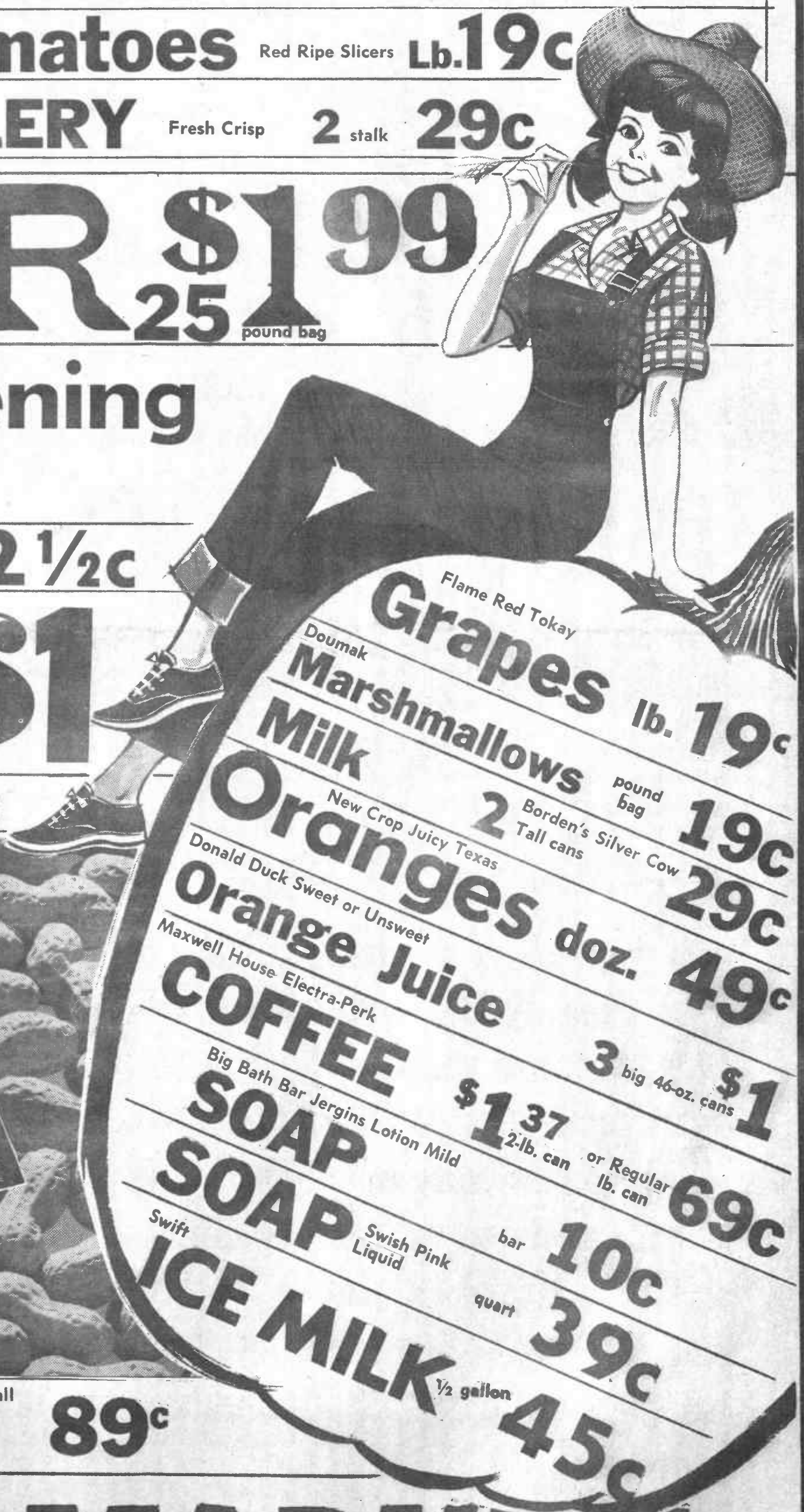

AUTO OWNERS:

1968 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi, it is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate for your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for the owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

Soybean Harvesting and Storage

It is not uncommon to see 4 or 5 bushels of soybeans per acre left in the fields following harvest. This is money out of your pocket.

Gathering unit, or combining, losses account for a large share of the wasted beans. Some of these are: Shatter losses — bean pods that are knocked off the stalk or pods shattered by physical impact with the machinery. Stubble Loss — this is caused by the combine set too high.

Lodging loss — beans remaining on stalks that lodged and were not picked up by the combine header. Stalk loss — beans that remain in pods on the stalks that were cut but not delivered to the harvester. Cylinder loss — unthreshed beans remaining in the pods that pass through the combine. Separation loss — beans that are threshed but were discharged from the combine separator.

Combine adjustment is a big factor in good harvesting of soybeans. Saving of just one bushel of beans per acre this year would mean an extra \$5 million, based on the support price of beans.

The best source of information on combine adjustment is the operator's manual provided by the combine manufacturer.

Cotton Defoliation

Good defoliation done at the proper time will help retain the quality of cotton. But too early defoliation will result in lower yields and lower quality.

If your cotton is mature — when 65 percent is open and the remainder of the bolls mature, then it is time to think about getting the leaves off the plants.

On green, immature leaves and second growth the organophosphate defoliants, Def and Folex, are recommended. Chlorates work well on mature cotton where the leaves are yellow or red-tinged.

Use of desiccants should be limited to "last resort" efforts in removing leaves. If a desiccant is to be used, make sure that the cotton is at least 90% open. Apply the desiccant on a schedule that will permit harvesting within three or four days of application.

Broomsedge Removal

Now is a good time to plow

up broomsedge areas. Apply lime and fertilizer and seed to ryegrass, cereals or combinations. Be sure to use a good high rate of fertilizer.

No. of Beneficiaries Increased In County

The first social security monthly disability benefits were paid out 10 years ago to a total of 149,850 disabled people throughout the country. In the 10-year period 1957 to 1967, the number of disability beneficiaries in the nation has risen to 1,097,190.

According to Hugh Tigrett, social security district manager in Tupelo, "In the same period, the number of disability beneficiaries in Tishomingo county has risen from 3 to 305. The amount of benefits paid each year has also risen from \$3,336 in 1957 to \$235,308 in 1967."

The average amount of monthly benefits today is \$98 for a disabled worker; \$52 for a disabled child; and \$215 for a disabled worker, his wife, and one or more children.

Unlike retirement benefits and medicare, which are for people 65 and over, disability

benefits can be paid at any age under 65 as long as the worker has worked long enough under social security to be insured. Generally, he is insured if he has credit for 5 years work in the 10-year period preceding his disability.

At the present time, 56 million workers and their wives and children — or 87 percent of the nation's population under 65 — are protected against loss of income should the wage earner become disabled.

"From the start," Tigrett said, "vocational rehabilitation of disabled workers has also been a concern of the social security disability program."

Actually, the name of every person who files a claim for disability benefits is referred to the appropriate State rehabilitation agency. If his chances for rehabilitation look good, the

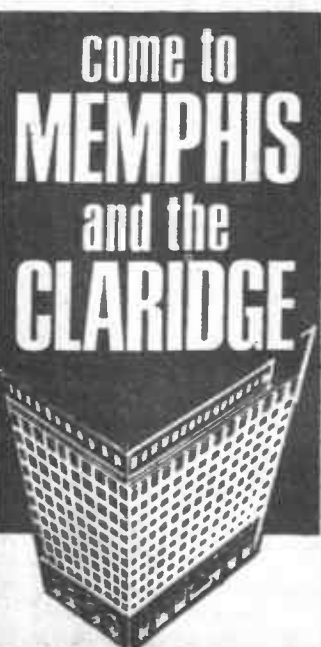
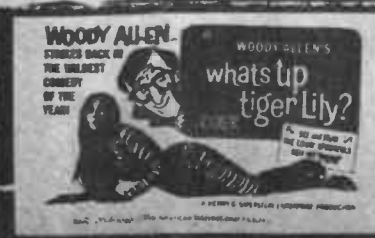

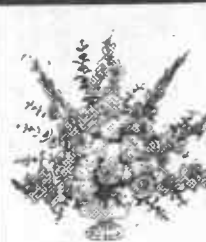
