Over \$25 Thousand Paid County Farmers

Tishomingo County farmers
received a total of \$25,359.49
from the market of cucumbers
for 1967 with up to \$700 gross
per acre. This announcement is
made by the county extension
office.

"Out of 7 counties in north-
east Mississippi participating,
Tishomingo County was the lea-
ding cucumber producer for
any one county," county agent
P. B. Stricklen said.

"This was a new crop for us
and some farmers were hesitant
about participating in the pro-
gram. However, those that did
grow cucumbers were well
pleased with the money receiv-
ed for their labor," he added.

During the sign-up period last
spring, farmers contracted to
plant approximately 140 acres
of cucumbers in the county. Due
to adverse weather conditions
during and after planting time,
less than 100 acres were actual-
ly market. It is on this acreage
that the figures are based.

"Atkins Pickle Company is
pleased with the production of

cucumbers in the county and
state that they will be looking
forward to having additional
acres in the county next year."
Mr. Stricklen went on. The
company representative stated
that a farmer meeting will be
held the last of February or
early March at which time far-
mers may sign contracts for
the coming year. It was also
noted that cucumbers planted
next year will be of the new hy-
brid variety which should in-
crease the production even
more.

"Two or three people can
produce and gather an acre of
cucumber," the county agent ex-
plained. "The production is
ideal for families with children,
since the harvesting of cucum-
bers begins around June 1 and
ends around July 15-20 during
the school vacation."

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PLOWING GROUND FOR DICTATORSHIP

Some editors, like some anything else, are lazy. Some are incompetent. And some, on occasion, are pressed too hard to perform their essential function, that of writing what they think.

As a consequence of these human characteristics, there has come into being a clutch of syndicates that sell canned editorials. Generally, editors subscribe to them more for inspiration than anything else but, on occasion, when the content of the offering coincides with the editor's views, they are run, verbatim.

One such faceless piece, distributed by an outfit known as The Newspaper Enterprise Association, and titled, "Statistics in Black And White", recently appeared in the Charlottesville (Va.) Progress. It was a scurrilous attack on a booklet written by Dr. Henry E. Garrett, Professor Emeritus of Psychology, Columbia University, himself a resident of Charlottesville.

Dr. Garrett's booklet, "The Relative Intelligence of Whites and Negroes", was based on the results of 50 years of testing by the Armed Forces. The tests, as Dr. Garrett disclosed, prove that Negroes trail Whites in the ability to cope with such tests. Intellectually, Negroes overlap the White average by but 12 per cent.

See what the nameless editorialist made of that: "To Garrett", he wrote, "this overlap is another proof of Negro inferiority, for if the races were equal, he (Garrett) says, the overlap would be 50 per cent. The two curves would be identical".

As indeed they would be. But see the editorialist's conclusion.

"However", he went on, "the fact that there is any overlap at all (whether 1 per cent or 49 per cent) renders the whole philosophy of racism untenable".

Now, that conclusion is so completely false it could be grounded, I felt on reading it, in only one of two things, either ignorance or malice.

I went to some pains to determine which and much to my relief found it was the former, ignorance. I located the person who wrote it — somebody out in Cleveland — and questioned him at length. He is ignorant, all right.

See how he goes on: "What the segregationists really want is total segregation of the races on the basis of skin color alone".

I also questioned the editor of the Charlottesville Progress as to the substance of the canned editorial he ran. He said he agreed with it, "generally".

Well, now.

In the first place, Dr. Garrett has never said the Negro race is inferior to the White race. Dr. Garrett is a scientist, a front-rank scientist, and is neither lazy, in-

competent, or harrassed. He says, as he proves, the races are different. But whether their differences mark the superiority of one race over the other, Dr. Garrett leaves where they belong, in the realm of opinion.

Indubitably, the races are different and, indubitably, as 50 years of testing by the Armed Forces proves, the intellectual capacity of Negroes — particularly in the area of abstract thought — is not the equal of Whites. That is not deniable; there are the figures, the Armed-Forces figures, undeviating after 50 years. Even the editorialist admits Dr. Garrett's statistics are above dispute.

What, then, was his complaint and what was it the editor of the Progress tacitly approved? When I asked the author what was troubling him, he said: "The rabid segregationists will latch on to Dr. Garrett's figures as a rationalization and cover for blind prejudice".

The inescapable inference in that statement — read it again — being that Dr. Garrett should not have published his findings.

I asked Dr. Garrett about that and he had a prompt rebuttal: "It is the duty of the scientist to tell what he finds and believes to be true, whether its effect upon society will be good or bad. If one conceals facts that may lead to evil, the corollary is certain: facts that lead to good, likewise, will be concealed".

In the end, I was left with the distinct impression that what the editorialist was approaching and what the editor approved was the advocacy of censorship, suppression, book burning. Glory be!

As it happened, I had just finished reading an article in "Perspectives in Biology and Medicine", by Dr. Dwight J. Ingle, Professor of Physiology, Medical School, University of Chicago. Dr. Ingle's piece appeared in the Vol. X, No. 4, Summer 1967 edition. It was most interesting.

"When all Negroes are told that their problems are caused solely by racial discrimination", Dr. Ingle wrote, "and that none are inherent within themselves, the ensuing hatred, frustration behavior — largely negative and destructive — and reverse racism become forms of social malignancy. Is the dogma which has fostered it true or false?"

That is the question, Mr. Editor, are there true, meaningful differences between the races, or aren't there?

Dr. Garrett proves there are and to urge denial of expression, even "generally", even by inference, upon such an eminent person is to expose in yourself a latent streak of bigotry that does little credit to either the author of the thought or to the belt of transmission. To do so is to plow the ground for dictatorship.



The Cost of Mobility —

If you've decided to have a fling at life on the open road, with your faithful spouse beside you, that gleam in your eye probably means that there's a mobile home in your future. That's fine by me. I've got quite a few friends among the nomads of the highway. And I know how much they like the life.

So I'm not going to try to talk you out of it. I'd just like to say that since you'll be spending money whatever you do, wherever you go, it's smart to figure out how much before you have to reach for your wallet. Bear in mind that the states have different laws — about license plates, to mention an obvious example.

Mobile home owners I've talked to, agree it's better to pay at one fell swoop, if you have the wherewithal. Buying on time

always pushes costs upward, what with the interest added to the principal. Don't forget that you don't escape from some of the bills you're accustomed to — insurance, taxes, utilities.

Varying Costs —

SENSING THE NEWS

Ian Smith and The State Department

In throwing up a barrier of red tape against Prime Minister Ian Smith of Rhodesia, who has been invited to speak at the University of Virginia, the U. S. State Department has given evidence concerning the Johnson administration's fear of Mr. Smith's effectiveness.

The invitation to Prime Minister Smith came from the highly respected University of Virginia Law Forum. Mr. Smith accepted with the understanding that he would face critical as well as sympathetic questions. He was not afraid of close questioning. The State Department apparently is afraid, however. It reached into its legal grab-bag and came up with the statement that Mr. Smith could not be admitted without a valid legal travel document from the British Foreign Office.

Obviously, Britain's socialist government hasn't the slightest intention of facilitating a trip to America by Mr. Ian Smith, no more than an earlier British government would have given Patrick Henry a chance to state the American colonists' case elsewhere in the world. The hard-line socialists in Britain are still insisting that the Rhodesian government must be brought down — even though Rhodesia shortly will celebrate its second anniversary of independence and is widening its commercial contacts with the world, over British and U. N. objections.

Ironically, if Mr. Ian Smith were a communist or a leader of a black revolutionary state in Africa he no doubt would easily get permission to enter the U. S. and, most probably, would be given an all-expenses-paid tour of the country. The State Department has managed in the past to find sufficient reasons to admit such anti-American leaders as Sukarno of Indonesia, Ben Bella of Algeria, and even Fidel Castro. Red tape was never allowed to prevent their admission to the land of the free.

Nowadays, one hears much a-

bout international understanding and the right of dissent, but the State Department does not want Americans to understand too much about Rhodesian realities. It is opposed to giving a platform to a statesman who will dissent from the orthodox liberal view of contemporary Africa.

It is tragic that the American people are not given a better view of what is going on in Africa, for their security is involved in developments in and around that continent. Recently, for example, the ABC network put on a lengthy program about Africa, with Gregory Peck as narrator, which distorted the situation in Southern Africa. Using all the tricks of the Ed Murrow school of televised propaganda, the producers of the show showed South Africa in terms of bearded old men nodding as they listened to patriotic speeches. In analyzing Portuguese Africa, the camera moved in for a close-up of a strand of barbed wire. The over-all effort was to convey to viewers a bleak and grim picture of the parts of Africa where European leadership exists.

The televised report did not explain that the European areas including Rhodesia, are the areas where all the people have vastly greater educational and economic opportunities than the people in black Africa. Nor did the report tell of the hospital facilities that Rhodesia and South Africa have provided for the black Africans — facilities unequalled elsewhere in Africa.

These distortions, which are commonplace in this country, are especially unfortunate because southern Africa is one of the most rapidly developing areas in the world. Economists now are discussing the likelihood of an economic union of the Republic of South Africa, Rhodesia, and the Portuguese provinces of Angola and Mozambique — a union that would give all the people of these lands enormous advantage ov-

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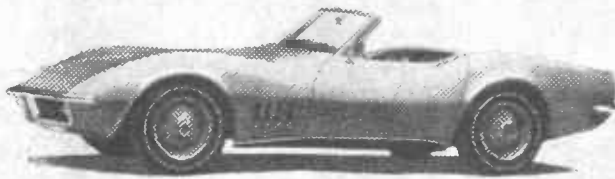

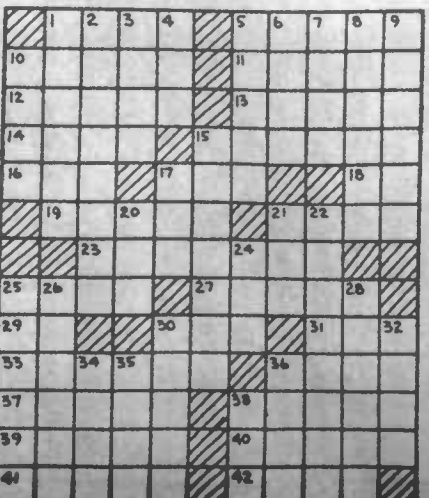

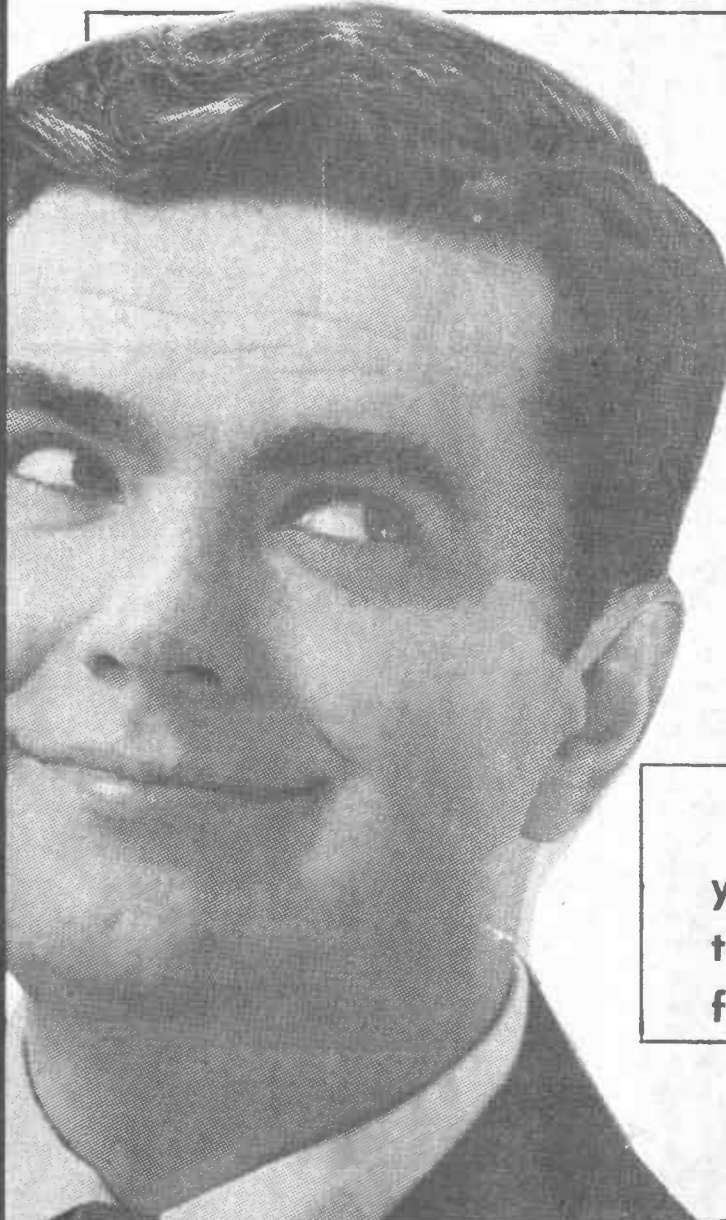

Creek bottoms near Burnsville. Equipment in this picture is a 2-pan Carryall, 2 bulldozers and a land plane. It represents upwards of a \$100,000 investment and is being used to shape the land

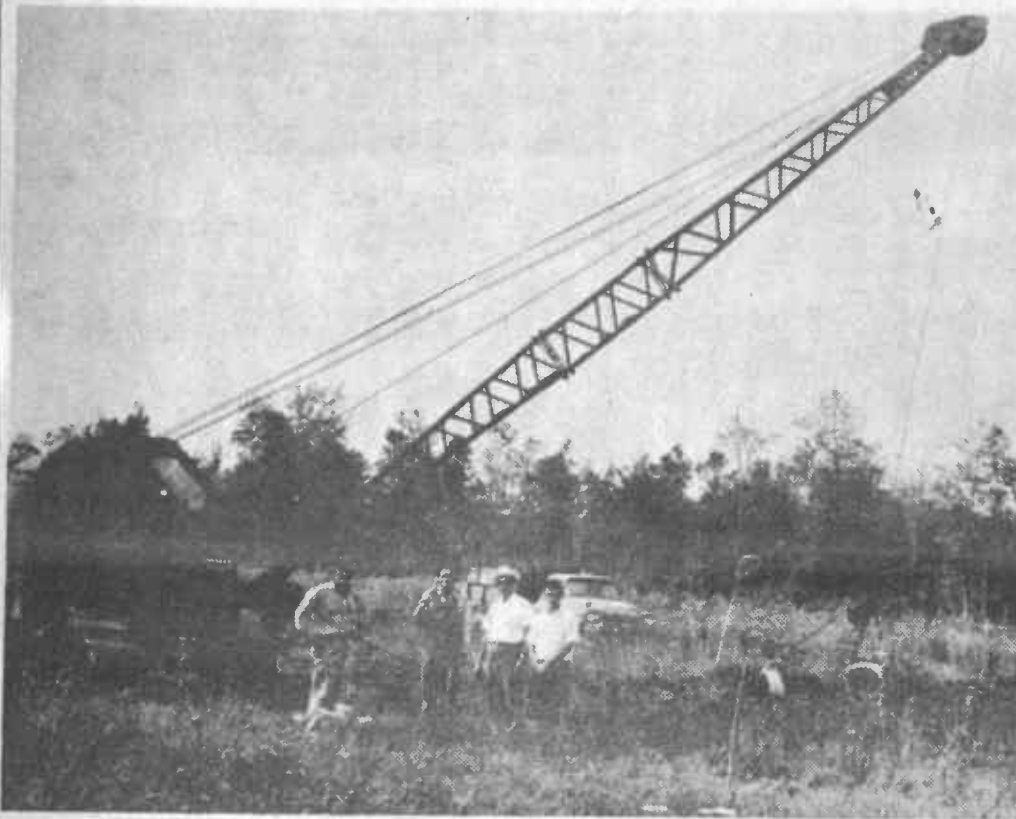
so that water will gradually flow off and will allow crops to grow without becoming drowned out. Also the land will be on such a gradual slope that it can be irrigated during dry weather.

farm on Yellow Creek. Upon completion, this 90-acre field will look smooth as a floor with only a very slight slope

that will not be noticeable to the eye but will allow for proper drainage of surface water.

done by the Soil Conservation Service whose job it is to determine the feasibility and recommend the necessary action to reclaim land for the greatest advantages to the farmer.

200 ACRES OF RECLAIMED LAND — Last year this wide expanse of 200 acres was soggy rawfish land that was worthless except for maybe goats. Now, thanks to individual ingenuity on the part of Frank Brinkley, the owner,

and the Soil Conservation Service, it will be highly productive. Mr. Brinkley states that two crops each year will be harvested — one crop of wheat and one crop of soybeans. The farm is located near Walker's Switch on Yellow

Home Economist's Notes

"Can I alter permanent press garments?" Many of you have asked. The answer to this is that there is not any way to remove the lines of an item once it has received the press treatment.

For this reason, check carefully for proper fitting before you buy permanent press items. Clothes not only can't be let out but the seams won't press flat when taken in.

You may shorten hems and sleeves as you normally would.

To shorten slacks, follow these directions for best results:

1. Turn down cuffs. With pinking shears cut off above stitching line. Set aside.
2. Measure inseam length. Cut off desired amount at bottom.
3. Place cuffs inside legs of slacks.
4. Match seams and creases carefully. Then sew.
5. Turn up cuffs. Tack at seam.

Light Housekeeping

To clean light bulbs, and lamps, first turn off the lamps and unplug cords. Let bulbs and glassware cool. If there is no switch for a fixture, unscrew the fuse and turn off the circuit breaker that controls it. Never wash a lamp fixture that is still connected.

Cleaners made for windows and mirrors work well on bulbs and fixtures. Remove bulbs, fluorescent tubes and diffuser units and clean separately. It's wise to have a helper take breakable parts as they are removed.

Serve Fruit — Many Ways

If someone said, "List all the different ways you can use fruit in menus," how many ways would you have on your list?

At first you might say 'orange juice for breakfast' and 'apple pie for dessert.' But as you think a few minutes, you will realize that there are many more ways to serve fruit from breakfast to supper to snack time.

Besides juices, for breakfast, you can have fruit whole, sliced or chunked, canned, frozen or fresh. Another time you can serve dried fruit stewed.

Fruit is ideal for snack time, since it is high in water content and, therefore, low in calories.

For lunch or dinner, use fresh or processed fruit or juices as appetizers, accompaniments to the main course or desserts. Used with cheese, fruit makes a hearty main course for lunch.

Fresh fruit makes a good dessert, served on individual fruit plates with a fruit fork and knife.

All of us like cookies. The children for an after school snack, Mom with her afternoon coffee, and Dad for a "bite of something sweet" after supper.

Your family's favorite cookie may be a soft, cake-like cookie or a crisp thin cookie.

The softer cake-like cookies have a higher proportion of liquid, including egg and flour. Crispy, thinner cookies have a higher proportion of sugar and shortening. All cookies are essentially little cakes, made from

recipes calling for less liquid and usually less sugar.

Two Types of Cookie Dough

As you try cookie recipes, you will find the doughs are of 2 types. One is a soft dough that you use to make drop and bar cookies. The other is a stiff dough from which you make refrigerator, rolled or molded cookies.

If you are making cookies, avoid as much as possible rolling additional flour from the board into the dough. When you beat the flour into the dough, you get a more tender product because the flour becomes coated with shortening. Flour you pick up from a bread board or rolling pin does not receive the tenderizing effect of the shortening.

When you harden cookie dough in the refrigerator, you avoid the problem of trying to roll out the dough with a little bit of flour. You can slice dough for refrigerator cookies rather than roll out and cut it.

Chewy Brownies

½ cup enriched self-rising corn meal,
½ cup sifted enriched self-rising flour
2 squares (1 oz. each) un-

sweetened chocolate,
1/3 cup butter or margarine,
1 1/4 cups firmly-packed light brown sugar,
2 eggs, beaten,
2 teaspoons vanilla extract,
1 cup chopped nuts.

Combine corn meal and flour. Melt chocolate and butter or margarine in top of double boiler over hot water. Remove from heat and blend in eggs, brown sugar, vanilla and nuts. Stir in corn meal mixture until thoroughly blended. Spread in well-greased 9-inch square pan. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 35 to 40 minutes, or until cookies spring back when lightly touched. Remove pan to wire rack and cool completely before cutting into bars.

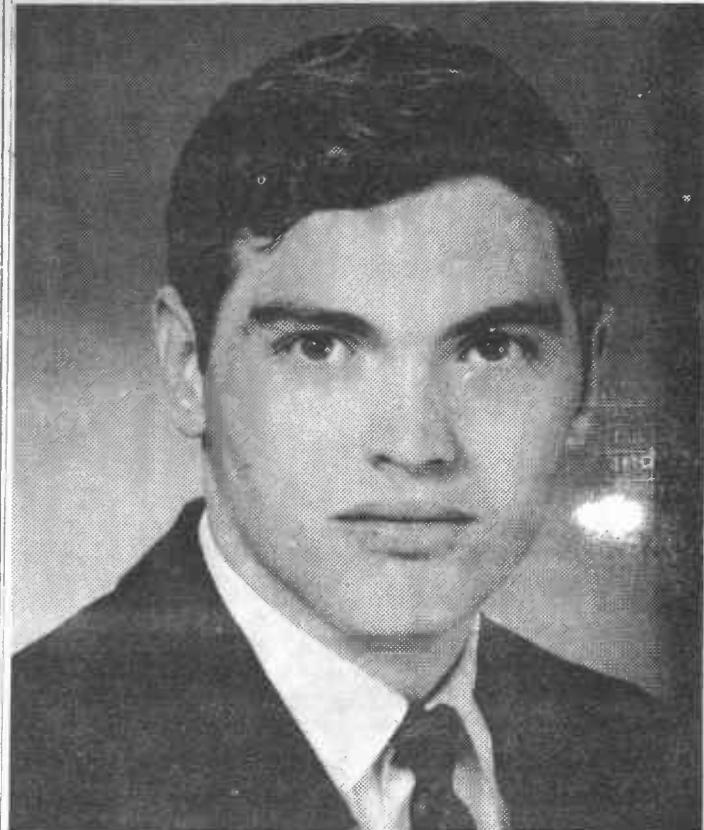

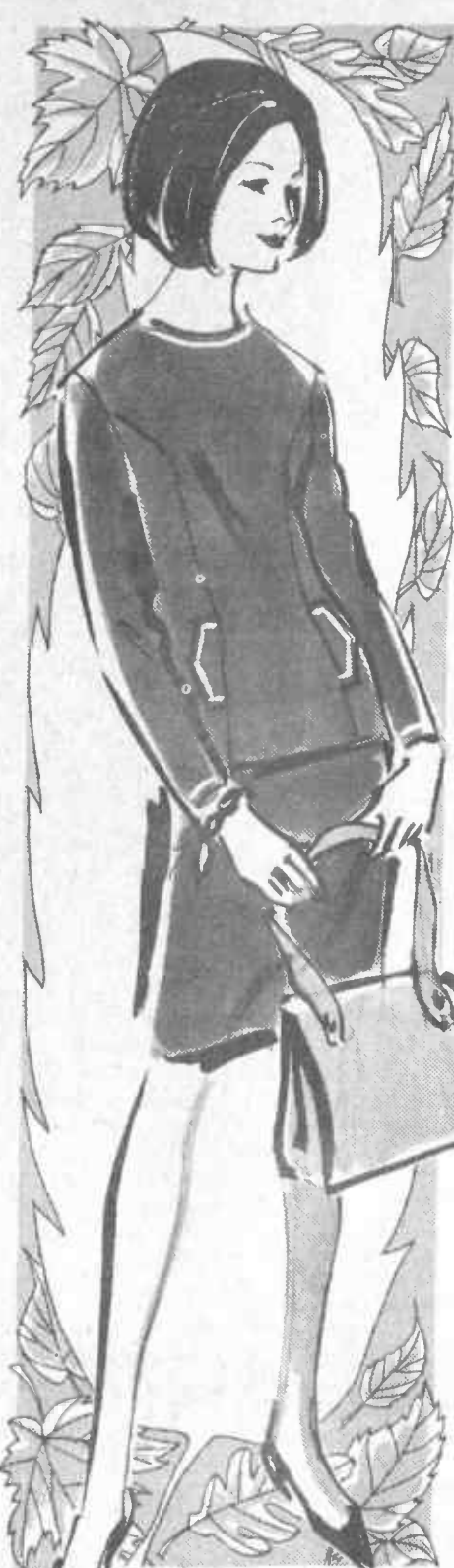
The Mississippi Forestry Commission is now purchasing mature Loblolly pine cones, according to Commission Forester B. K. Killebrew.

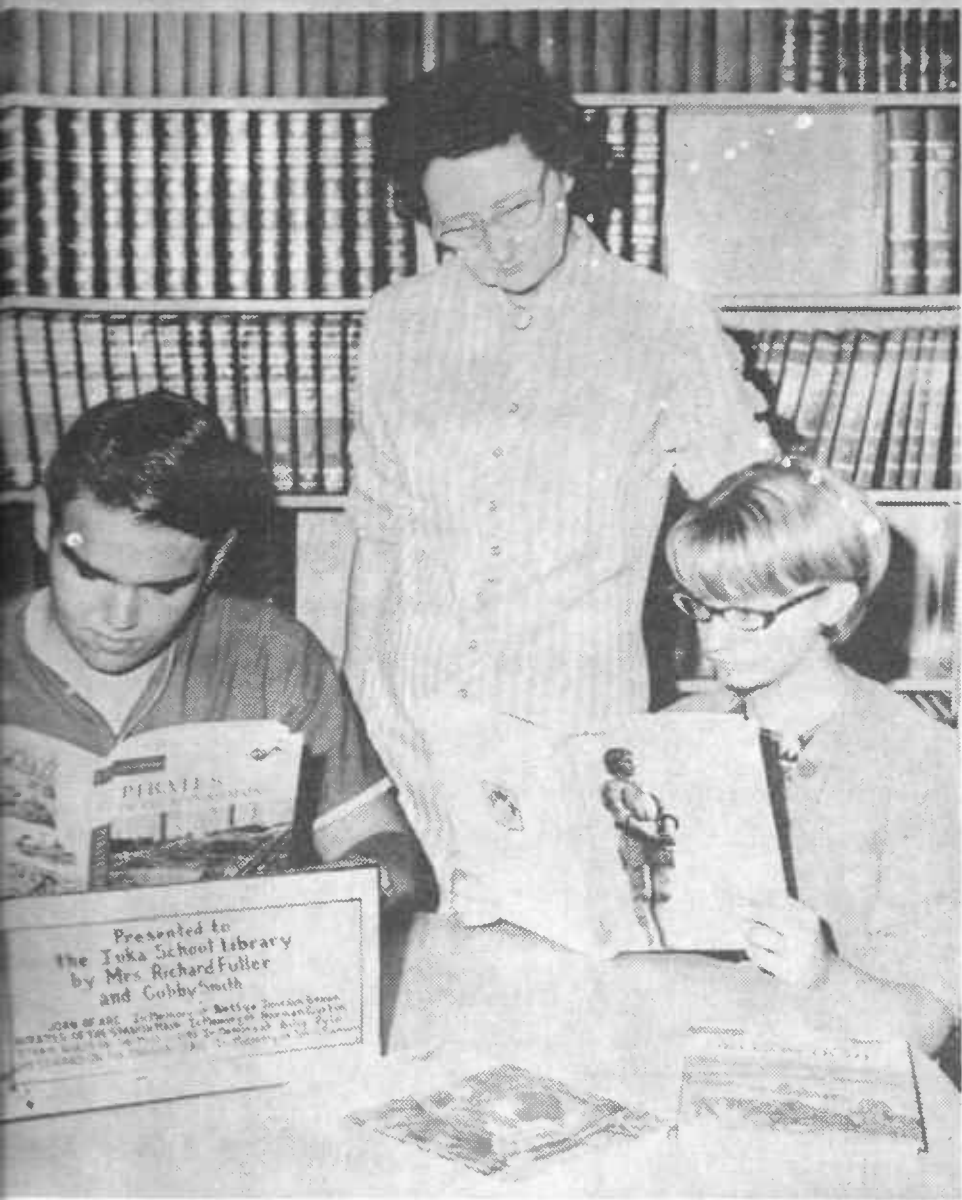

Sandwich Hearties

Make tuna salad according to your favorite recipe, adding to it 1/4 pound cubed, American cheese. Split hamburger buns, scoop out and spread with butter, then fill with tuna mixture. Wrap in foil, place on a shallow pan and bake in a moderate (350° F.) 15 minutes.

Cole slaw with sliced corned beef makes an excellent sandwich with crusty hard rolls which are split. Hot slaw and meat may also be used with French-fried onion rings as a garnish for the open-faced style.

Use your favorite Sloppy Joe mixture or ground beef browned and mixed with pizza sauce. Spoon onto split French bread, top with strips of sliced mozzarella cheese and bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven about 20 minutes.

Here's a sandwich meal, indeed! Top large slices of rye bread with sliced chicken or turkey, ham, lettuce and Thousand Island dressing. Arrange strips of Swiss cheese on top. Serve with pickled beet slices and raw onion rings.

Brown bulk pork sausage in skillet, adding some chopped mushrooms. Serve this atop toasted English muffins with poached egg for a really savory sandwich.

AUTO OWNERS:

1968 Automobile License Plates will be on sale at the Sheriff's Office during the month of October, but should not be placed on the vehicle until November 1.

You are required to have the following information when you buy a Tag: Make, Year Model, Body Type, Motor Or Serial Number, And from whom the Automobile was purchased. In order to receive the proper Tax Exemptions in the State of Mississippi is necessary for you to have a Mississippi License Plate on your Automobile.

If you are a resident citizen of Mississippi even though you work in an adjoining state, you are required by law to purchase Mississippi Tags as Mississippi has a reciprocal agreement with adjoining States for owner of motor vehicles in either State to purchase License Plates in the State where they live and then permitting the owner to use the automobile in commuting to and from work.

If you do not have the required information in regard to the description of your Automobile, the clerks in the Sheriff's Office will be glad to help you in any way they can to secure sufficient information to purchase a tag.

Dairy Notes

Even traces of some chemi-cals in milk can keep you from selling your milk. Federal law prohibits pesticide residues in milk and milk products.

To keep your milk free from pesticide residues, here are a few suggestions:

Do not graze out cotton fields. Make sure that the hay and silage you feed does not contain pesticides.

Use only recommended pesti-cides and read and follow all restrictions listed on the label. Do not feed whole cottonseed.

Do not store pesticides in the milk room or feed room.

Be sure to wait the required time before grazing or harvest-ing treated crops. Follow all di-rections on labels to the letter.

On mastitis-treated cows, do not sell milk for six milking or 72 hours after treatments.

It has been estimated that the average soybean grower can gain \$15 an acre by holding harvesting losses to 5 percent or less.

Nearly half of the harvesting losses result from shatter. To reduce shatter losses, give special attention to the combine header. Cutter bar height con-trol is critical. Keep the knife close to the ground under the pods.

Speed is another factor. Pro-bably you should never exceed three miles an hour; slower if beans are not standing well or are podded low. At higher speeds, plants slip along the knife surface before cutting.

This slippage causes beans to be freed or pods to be pulled into the cutting zone.

Improper adjustment is an-other cause of shatter losses. The best book on combine ad-justment is the operator's man-ual. Keep it with the machine. Make one adjustment at a time, check it. Then go to the next.

Quality Cotton

Keep the quality in cotton. The right kinds should bring real good prices this year. De-foliate cotton when it is ready — not before. Pick the cotton dry and keep it dry. Make sure your turnrows are clean. For details on quality cotton, see your county agent.
