Dennis Will Have System Providing 172,800 Gallons Upon Completion

A \$207,000 loan to a group of 174 farm and rural families in Tishomingo County to develop a rural water system has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration, reports State Director T. B. Fatherree.

This loan will enable the Dennis Water Association, Inc., to construct a domestic water system which will consist of a well, tank, and distribution system.

Construction of the project will provide 3,201 man days of labor for engineers, well drillers, operators of ditch digging

equipment and so forth. As many local people as possible will be employed in the construction of the water system which will be capable of delivering 172,800 gallons a day when completed.

Funds for the insured loan were provided by The Bank of Belmont. Under the insured loan program, the Farmers Home Administration makes and services the loan and guarantees repayment of the money borrowed along with interest.

The system will improve living conditions in the local community and will encourage industry and home building. It is estimated that 770 people in private businesses, churches, and homes will benefit.

Previously the community had suffered from lack of water which will be solved by the system to be installed. The Farmers Home Administration loan is to be repaid over a period of 40 years.

Officers of the Association are: Monroe Pounds, President; T. F. Lindsey, Vice President; Mrs. Pat Stephens, Secretary; and Charles Monroe, Treasurer; all of Dennis.

Rural water system loans are available to organizations operating on a non-profit basis, such as non-profit corporations and water supply districts. Small rural towns and other rural political subdivisions are also eligible.

These loans are made only when adequate credit at reasonable rates and terms are not otherwise available.

"All members of the Rescue Squad will contribute to the success of this event in some way. We invite you to stop by the stand any time throughout the day for a real feast, the old fashioned way," added L. D. Phifer, president.

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GEORGE WALLACE AND
LOUISE DAY HICKS

For the first time, now, there is a yardstick against which a person can measure George Wallace's potential as a candidate for the presidency.

I refer to the recent mayoralty election in Boston.

There, you may recall, a righteously indignant, 48-year-old grandmother named Louise Day Hicks, two weeks ago, led the field of 10 candidates by polling 33 per cent of the total vote.

Mrs. Hicks, in November, will face the runner up to decide who will be mayor of Bean Town. My Boston spies tell me that Mrs. Hicks, in November, will poll between 45 per cent and 53 per cent of the vote — depending upon how well the colored people deport themselves between now and election day. But that is another story; I have in mind drawing a parallel between this lady's political fortunes and those of George Wallace.

Mrs. Hicks made her name in Boston politics by opposing the indiscriminate race mixing of public-school children ("You know where I stand on that"). And to all intents and purposes, that is precisely the area in which George Wallace came to prominence.

Because of her expressed conviction, Mrs. Hicks has been labeled a "bigot" who has brought "Massachusetts face to face with mediocrity and medievalism" (Washington Post, Sept. 28). And except for the word, Massachusetts, that bit of smear might just as well have been written about the former governor of Alabama as about Mrs. Hicks.

That this lady lawyer, daughter of a judge, is not a mediocrity and that her views, in fact, are as honest and as fair as a public scale makes no impression on the St. Vitus Left. She opposes the indiscriminate bussing of school children — White to Black, Black to White — and that is enough for The Establishment: The Establishment has decreed that Mrs. Hicks is to be the target for gutter journalism and so she is. The lady, as Wallace, is on the receiving end of every dead cat in their bag.

That sort of extremism is to be expected, one supposes, for Mrs. Hicks, no less than Wallace, poses a terrible threat to the Left. If she were to win in Boston, her

win would mark a major reversal — a catastrophe, really — for the morbid marxists who are leading this nation into chaos. That is why they damn this cultured woman, the reason they damn George Wallace.

But that is the dark side of the political moon. There is another side, the bright side — from George Wallace's point of view.

Mrs. Hicks, in November, will be against a single opponent. If it were possible for her to enjoy the luxury of a three-horse November race, even her most bitter egalitarian opponents concede she would be elected. She would because she would post an overpowering plurality, if not a majority.

And that is why George Wallace can win the presidency, because he will be, for a certainty, in a three-horse race and, under that circumstance, a plurality will win the presidency. Such wins, as a matter of fact, are quite common. The last President elected by way of a plurality was Jack Kennedy, in 1960, and before him, Harry Truman, in 1948.

This political parallel between Louise Day Hicks and George Wallace actually favors Wallace; Mrs. Hicks has a harder row to hoe than has the Little Judge. That is so because Mrs. Hicks must wage her campaign in a totally hostile official atmosphere, in the backyard of the Kennedys, in the home of Harvard college, in a State with but three per cent Negro population. If she has a newspaper or an elected official in her corner, I have yet to hear of one. Wallace, on the other hand, has great areas of sympathy from which to draw.

Even so, Mrs. Hicks, against this phalanx of opposition and as one among 10, drew 33 per cent of the vote and, in the run-off, is conceded 45 per cent. People are that fed up.

George Wallace may do as well. That he may is certainly within the realm of possibility. If so, if he does, he will be the next President of the United States. Coming events, they tell me, cast their shadow before them.

Pollo Drops Off

Law Vs. Irresponsibles

Addressing the International Association of Police Chiefs in September, President Johnson spoke out concerning the riots that the nation has suffered this summer. "Much can explain," he said, "but nothing can justify the riots of 1967." He pointed out that "they damage the respect and the accommodation among men on which civilized society ultimately depends and without which there can be no progress toward social justice."

The public can be thankful that Mr. Johnson at last had firm words for the rioters, but Americans cannot ignore the fact that the condemnation comes very late. Moreover, Mr. Johnson's words would be more meaningful if the Justice Department and other agencies of the federal government had been advised to take the same line.

It happens, however, that the Justice Department, under Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark, has taken a very soft line toward the rioters and others who preach strife or engage in civil disobedience. When Stokely Carmichael was raising the roof earlier this summer, triggering violence around the country, Mr. Clark and his associates apparently couldn't find a law to uncover his un-American activities.

When the South was going through some turmoil a decade ago, the Justice Department always seemed able to find some obscure post-Civil War statute that effectively shut up people the Department didn't favor. Now that the Black Power movement is busy burning cities and causing riots, the Justice Department is strangely helpless.

Many Americans may conclude that Mr. Johnson's speech to the police chiefs is only the smallest of beginnings. What is needed is for the President to set about creating a wholly new atmosphere regarding law and law enforcement. The police need a good word not once every four years but on a continuing basis. The White House needs to let it be known that no group of Americans, no minority in our country, is above the law or exempt from its provisions.

The riots in Newark and Detroit, for example, resulted in losses totaling many millions of dollars. The rioters achieved as much destruction as an enemy of the U. S might have achieved with aerial bombardment. Blocks of stores and homes were gutted. Millions of dollars in salaries and profits went up in smoke. Therefore, it is the duty of the President to make it crystal clear that those who burn and loot are enemies of the American people.

The President of the United States also owes it to the people to exert leadership in upholding law and order. This means, for example, that the President should not hesitate to challenge those organizations which foster strife and disorder and give encouragement to civil disobedience. This kind of leadership has to be exercised, not only with respect to the wild Black Power groups that masquerade as respectable — even religious — organizations.

One such organization is the National Council of Churches, which at its recent meeting in

Atlanta gave its endorsement to the marches in Milwaukee that have plunged that great middle Western city into strife and disrupted its community and business life.

It is profoundly shocking that the National Council of Churches should lend its weight to the agitators who have spattered Milwaukee with violence. The NCC's endorsement of the Milwaukee street demonstrations and of their leader, the Rev. James E. Groppi, is one of the most reckless actions that organization has ever undertaken. Mayor Henry W. Maier of Milwaukee, a liberal, has denounced Father Groppi in these terms: "Groppi is irresponsible. He is a man of violence, not a man of peace. Groppi's kind of stage-managed events are doing long-term damage to the city."

Mayor Maier's denunciation should be extended to the national supporters of Rev. Groppi, specifically the NCC. President Johnson, too, owes it to the law-abiding people of this nation to denounce not only the Father Groppis and Rap Browns but the NCC and other organizations that lend their influence to guerrilla warfare in the streets of America.

Unless the irresponsibles are called to account by the President and all the leaders of the nation, the anarchists will step up their activity and truly try to tear America apart during 1968.

Life on Wheels

Ever think of becoming a nomad, twentieth century style? No? Well, neither did I until I took a gander at the latest mobile homes on the market. We always called it a "trailer" when I was a bit younger. But now it's a "mobile home," and I can see why.

Houses on wheels — that's what they are. My wife and I looked over a series of models, and we still can't get over the shock of seeing the progress that's been made. Of course the "small" models are still around — ten feet wide, and up to thirty-four feet long.

Most people seem to be going for those that are twelve by sixty-five. Roomy, comfortable, easy to drive, and not too hard to park.

But the models that leave you bug-eyed are the "expandos" that look long and lean on the highway, but sprout into small houses in a mobile home camp. Wings, mechanically controlled, can be added on both sides of the expando, each wing big enough to hold three rooms.

Presto, change-o, and the proud owner has a new study, dinette, and four bedrooms, or whatever arrangement he fancies.

Enough Space

And these are real rooms. A man can have himself a pretty fair study with enough space for bookshelves, camping equipment, or an art collection. The lady of the mobile home has a kitchen equipped with modern appliances. No more roughing it except for those who prefer it that way.

What about cost? The models I've seen run the price range from about three thousand dollars to more than twenty thousand. Park rental rates are anywhere from \$35 to \$120 a month, depending on the facilities they offer.

Where to live? The twentieth century nomad has plenty of choices when he looks through the directory that both names and grades the mobile home camps. Look for the stars — one for the minimum accommodations, five for the maximum, with a gold star for those that are really great.

If you like cheap living and

mobility (although you can stay put if you want to), these homes on wheels might fill the bill. Around five million Americans say they do.

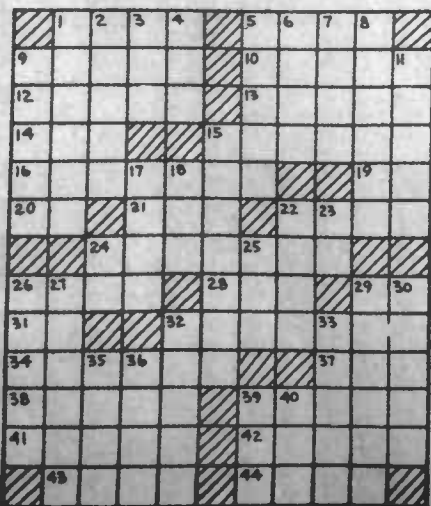
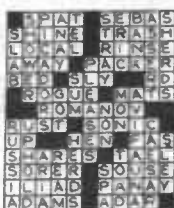

Street Improvements Take Shape In Iuka

Residents of the city of Iuka are now getting the benefits of new street markers which have been placed at the corners of each street throughout the city limits.

According to R. K. "Diddler" Thorne, alderman and superintendent of streets, over 100 signs of modern design and heavy, durable construction have been placed at each corner. "This job has just recently been completed and already we are receiving reports of what a help they are in giving directions. Even postal employees have reported that the number of calls asking for certain street addresses have greatly decreased since the signs have gone up," Mr. Thorne stated.

"The marking of streets with the new signs took a little longer than it ordinarily would have but over \$200 were saved by using the method we did. It was decided to have the city employees do the work rather than contract the job out. This way it was much more economical," the alderman said.

"This is a much better situation and during the years to come we will see the value of these street signs," he added.

Right now work is being completed on sealing certain streets which had received extra wear since work was done in this same phase last year. This street work is a continuation of that previous program.

"The purpose of resealing these streets at this time is to prevent cracking during the freezing weather this winter. When the streets crack the water runs underneath. Then with the freezing and thawing the cracks are more prevalent and the streets are finally in a bad condition," Mr. Thorne explained.

A number of streets were sealed completely during this recent program. They include all of Wilmoth, Pearl, Mill and North Main Street. Others receiving only a portion sealed are Rowena, Eastport, a portion of Fulton, part of S. Main and portions of S. Fulton, Pike St. and Indian Street.

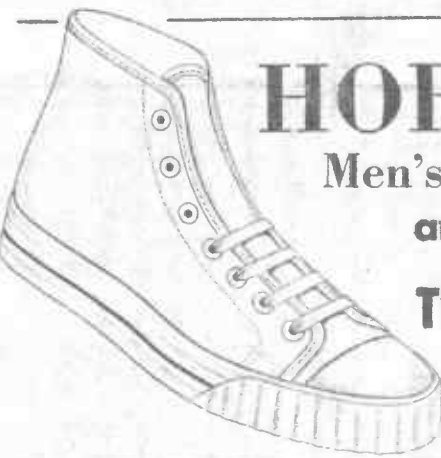

Winter Hog Management

The big problem with winter hog management is changing weather — hot days and cold nights. Hogs do much better when temperatures are held constant.

Cold floors, especially concrete, are rough on young pigs. Be sure to bed your floors well. Shavings, two to four inches deep, are good. If shavings are not available, use straw or other material.

Knock out drafts. Keep floors dry. Be sure not to wet little pigs.

Cotton

Use of harvest aid chemicals (defoliant) on cotton can have a number of advantages, quality-wise.

Boll rot in rank growth is reduced improving color and grade, fiber strength is maintained after defoliation.

Cotton dries more quickly on the stalk resulting in less mois-

ture and green-leaf trash in seed cotton arriving at the gin yard. This reduces need for excessive drying and cleaning. It helps preserve fiber strength.

Winter Lawns

To make an established lawn pretty and green all winter, mow closely and by Mid-October overseed with ryegrass, creeping red fescue, bentgrass or bluegrass.

Seeding rates are ryegrass 5 to 10 pounds per 1,000 square feet; 5 pounds fescue; or 2 lbs. of either bentgrass or bluegrass.

Fertilize with 25 pounds of 13-13-13 per 1,000 square feet. Using a garden rake will move the seed into contact with the soil. If possible it is best to cover seed lightly with topsoil.

Fertilize often enough during winter to maintain green color. Mow at two-inch height during the winter and lower mowing height in March.

Livestock Insects

Right now is a good time to re-treat your homemade back rubbers or sack dusters to help keep lice from building up on your beef cattle. Be sure to use only recommended materials and follow all label directions.

J. G. Martin, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Mississippi urges employers of domestic help who file Form 942 to use the preaddressed return furnished them.

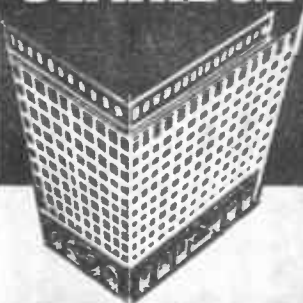

The court was selected by members of the Chieftain Football Team earlier this week.

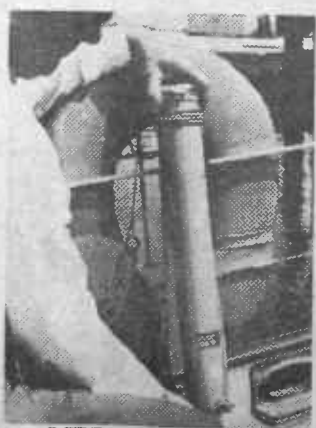

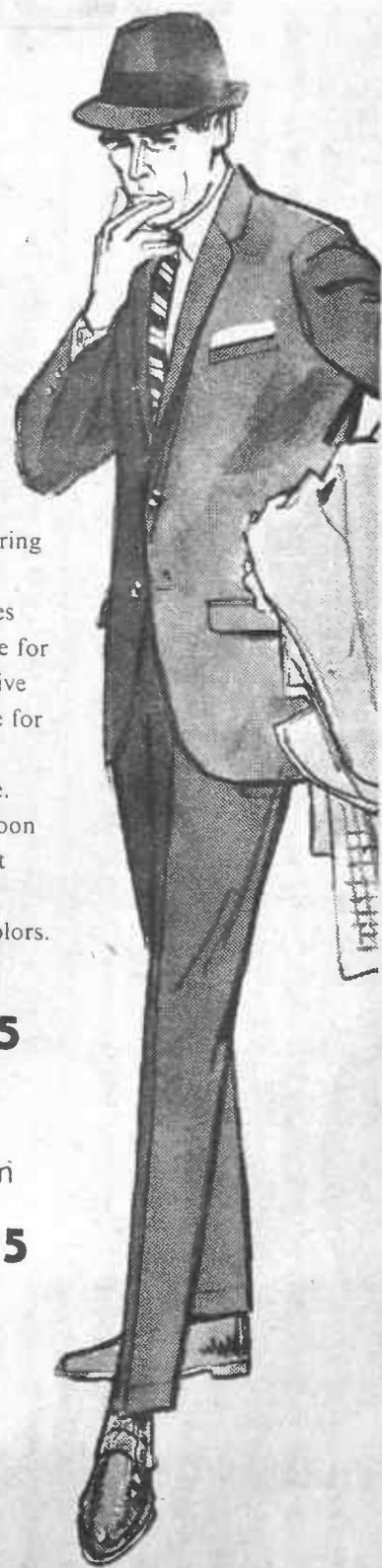

to be helpful and do one's best; provide fun and exciting new things to do; and prepare boys to become Boy Scouts.

Highlights of the improvements include a new and different experience for Cub Scouts in their 10th year (Webelos Scout program), a new leadership position of Den Leader coach in Cub Scout packs, revision of achievements and electives in the advancement program so that the 8-year-old Wolf and 9-year-old Bear advancement patterns are no longer so similar, recognition through registration of assistant Den Mothers, and provision for a boy to enter Cub Scouting any time after he is 8 years of age or in the third grade.

The Webelos Scout program was described as "a most dramatic and significant improvement." The 10-year-old's advancement program is based on 15 hobby and vocational subjects called "activity badge areas," although the requirements for the Webelos Award remain basically the same. The Webelos den leader will be a man, and meetings will be held weekly in the early evening or on Saturday morning. There will be a broader outdoor program than for the younger Cub Scouts but not including the rugged activities reserved for Boy Scouts.

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Cub Scouts To See Major Change In Program Of 10-Year Old Age Group

Major improvements in the Cub Scout program of the Boy Scouts of America go into effect this month after a 5-year study, and the revisions are expected to increase Cub Scouting's natural appeal for boys and provide more help for volunteer leaders.

"The study findings brought out very clearly the vitality and soundness of the Cub Scout program," Jimmy Petersen, Scout Executive told the Executive Board of the Yocona Council, Boy Scouts of America, this week. "There is evidence of genuine enthusiasm for the program on the part of boys, leaders, and parents."

The Cub Scout program was formally launched in 1930, and the last major changes were made in 1952. There are now over 2 million Cub Scouts in the United States.

Training in the improved Cub Scout program will be given to all Cub Scout pack leaders during the coming month.

One of the early steps before starting the series of studies and surveys was to prepare a

"statement of purpose" related to Cub Scouting for the present day.

"The Cub Scout study Committee wanted a yardstick to measure Cub Scouting's outcomes and to provide leaders of Cub Scout packs with criteria for judging their work," Mr. Petersen said.

The purposes of Cub Scouting were listed: to influence the development of character and encourage spiritual growth; develop habits and attitudes of good citizenship; encourage good sportsmanship and pride in growing strong in mind and body; improve understanding within the family; strengthen the ability to get along with other boys and respect other people; foster a sense of personal achievement by developing new interests and skills; show how

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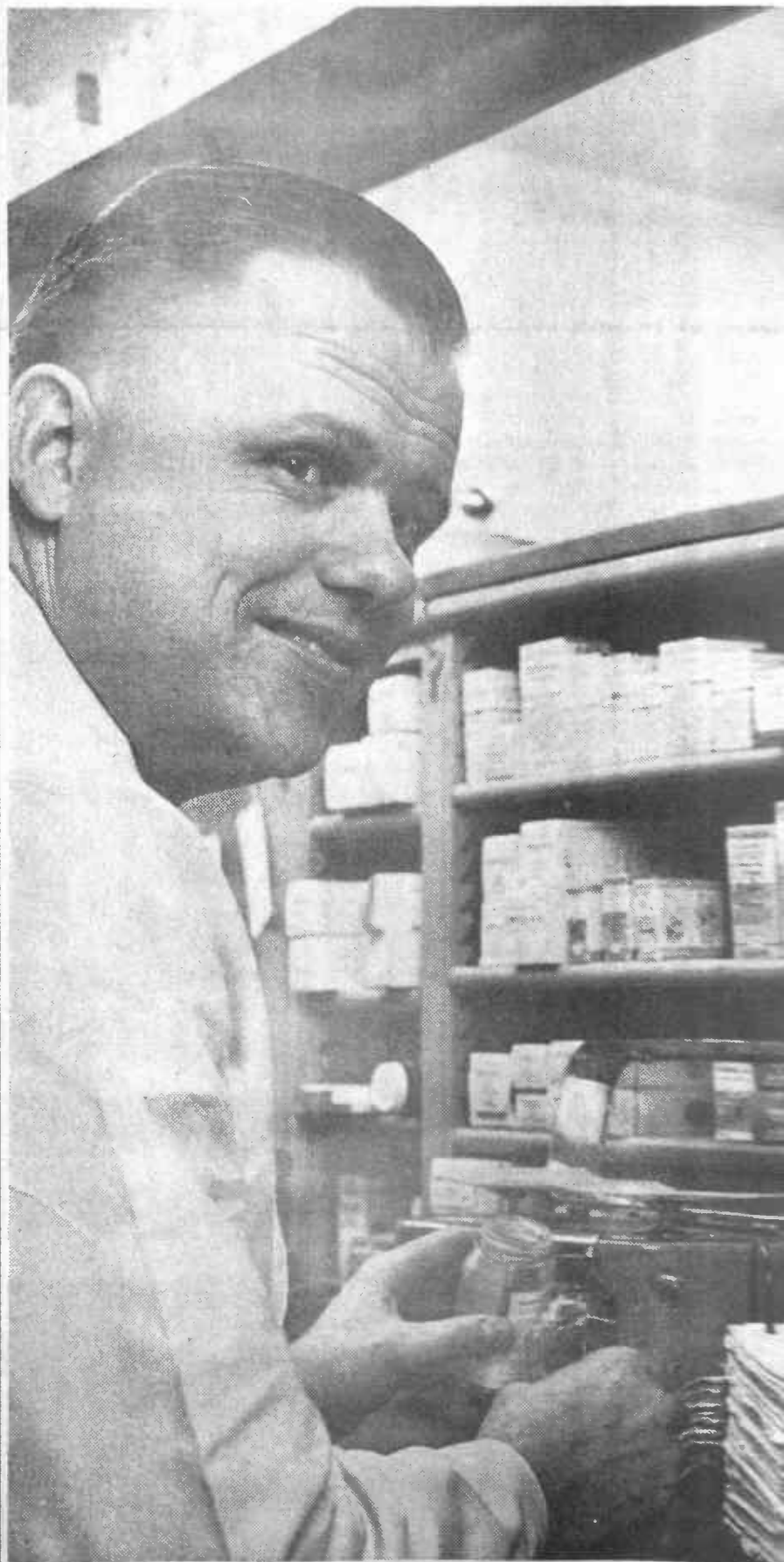

VFW & American Legion Supper

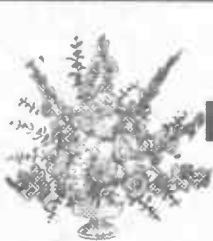
