Joint Meeting Of State Agencies Will Be Wed., Oct. 25, Coleman Park

A & I Directors, Tenn.-Tombigbee Directors, Water Management Directors, TVA Officials & Others Will Discuss River Port

A combined meeting of several state agencies will be held Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 25, at J. P. Coleman Park lodge.

Among the committees to be represented are the Board of Directors of the Miss. Agricultural and Industrial Board, The Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Board of Directors, TVA officials, members of the Board of Directors of the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District, and others.

The Board of Directors of The Yellow Creek Watershed Authority will serve as host to the meeting.

Delegates and directors of the various groups will convene at 2:30 p.m., and at 3:30, a joint meeting of the various agencies will be held aboard a boat for a discussion of the proposed Northeast Mississippi Riverport located on Yellow Creek in the back waters of Pickwick lake. An inspection of the proposed site will be made from the boat, and TVA officials will give a report of their environmental feasibility study that was authorized by Congress. Maps and other information will be studied.

At 6:30, a reception will be held in the downstairs dining room of the lodge and at 7:30 a banquet will be held in the upper dining room.

Congressman Jamie Whitten will be the banquet speaker. Other state leaders and dignitaries who have been invited include Congressman John Bell Williams, who is also Democratic nominee for Governor; Lieut.-Gov. Elect Charlie Sullivan, the State Park Board and Staff, State Senators and Representatives, Boards of Supervisors, Mayors, and others.

Governor Paul B. Johnson is expected to be present and serve in his official capacity as chairman of the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Industrial Board.

The proposed riverport on Yellow Creek is located where the Tenn.-Tombigbee waterway will join Pickwick lake and thus connect the Tennessee River in Tishomingo County with the Gulf of Mexico at Mobile, Ala.

Deer Season For Long Bows And Arrows Opens

Tishomingo County Game Wardens E. C. Holland and Jesse Grisham remind local hunters that open season for long bows and arrows on deer goes into effect this Friday, Oct. 20, and continues through November 4. Other portion of the split season with bow and arrow is Nov. 6-19.

One deer of either sex will be the bag limit. No dogs will be allowed and crossbows, sidearms and all firearms are prohibited while hunting deer during archery season.

Open deer season when firearms and dogs may be used will be Nov. 20-28, and Dec. 26 thru Jan. 7 in Tishomingo and Itawamba counties.

During the same dates the season will be open in Alcorn and Prentiss counties west of highway 45, but dogs will not be allowed in those areas.

"That's right" agreed Jack, looking slightly harassed. "Let me tell you the problem. John Jr. here, and Nancy, want us to move in with them. Plenty of room for all of us they say, and they'll be right on top if we want someone to talk to, break a leg, or whatever. We can save money too, spend it on that trip we've always wanted."

"I must admit I appreciate their wanting us, and I know Jean fancies herself in the role of live-in baby sitter — she just dotes on those three grandchildren of ours — but somehow I'm not sure it would work. I've always believed parents and their married children shouldn't live together. What do you think Gerald?"

From Mrs. Chester Konkol, Wisconsin Rapids, Wis.: "I also have many memories of my childhood. The butchering, curing and smoking meat and sausage making was a lengthy process. The animals were slaughtered when the weather became freezing. Meat was cut up and ground by hand. The men sawed, help cut the meat and make the sausage. The women and children cut the lard for rendering."

Meat was roasted and fried and put into crocks, rendered lard poured over it and the crock placed in the basement, where it kept well 6 to 9 months. Some meat was cut into chunks and packed in snow in a large wooden barrel with a wash tub on top of it. This was placed by a north side bedroom window, so our folks would hear at night if some animals tried to tip it over to get the meat.

Making sausage was a big deal. Meat was all ground in a hand grinder and mixed in a wash tub for hours. It was then put into casings which had been cleaned, scraped and otherwise made ready. It was a very distasteful job.

The sausage was put into foot long pieces. Each morning it was taken to the smoke house for smoking; each night taken into the house so it would not freeze.

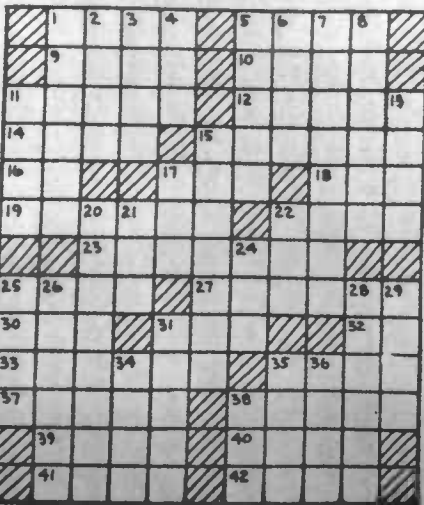

SENSING THE NEWS

Gov. Romney Off Base

In an era of myth-making about how slums are created, responsible American leaders have to be very careful that they do not try to brainwash their fellow citizens and aren't brainwashed themselves when they talk to the supposed "leaders" of so-called community action groups in the slums.

Gov. George Romney (R-Mich.) in a speech before the National Conference of Editorial Writers in Nashville in early October, was less than careful in these respects. The Governor had just returned from a nationwide tour of slum hotspots, including the Watts district of Los Angeles, and Harlem in New York City. The message he gave the country's editorial writers seemed to suggest an effort at brainwashing, and strongly indicated that he himself had been brainwashed on the "poverty" issue while touring the country.

In the first place, Gov. Romney discussed the slum hotspots in terms that are hardly in accord with the realities demonstrated in the long, hot, riot-torn summer of 1967. The picture he painted was of people in these areas having been betrayed by their own society and eager for constructive action. Specifically, Gov. Romney declared: "Their hopes have been raised only to be dashed. They feel they have been tricked. . . They seek escape from dependency. . . they want to turn the American dream from a mocking delusion into a reality."

Informed Americans may properly reply that Mr. Romney can't support his case. How can slum dwellers be tricked if the Great Society is spending billions of dollars for their uplift. How can their hopes be dashed when they are the recipients of financial assistance programs unprecedented in the history of the nation and when public officials bend over backward to appease rioters and looters, at the cost of the security and well being of responsible citizens. And how can the Governor argue that many of the slum dwellers want to escape dependency when their spokesmen are demanding that the country spend billions of dollars to further improve the area in which they live.

Many informed citizens believe that the truth is far from what Gov. Romney declared it to be. They hold that the United States is coddling the indolent, promoting dependency, listening to people who threaten blackmail against our society if a reward is not handed over by Congress and the cities.

Gov. Romney also declared that a "strategy for a New America" begins with "equal law enforcement." But the responsible public isn't likely to be taken in on this score. There is unequal law enforcement in many cities today in that the demonstration leader, the mugger, the street rioter, the sit-in specialist and the looter often enjoy a kind of privileged sanctuary in our cities. They get away with misdeeds and civil disobedience that other citizens would not be permitted, if they so desired. By all means, let's have equal law enforcement, and let's start by cracking down on the "Black Power" extremists, the professional agitators and those who, like Rap Brown,

threaten destruction of the land of the free.

Obviously, Gov. Romney did not make as thorough a study of the urban "ghetto" groups as he should have done. For example, he told the editorial writers that in Rochester, N. Y. a "ghetto" organization known as FIGHT has "launched a bold, cooperative effort to guarantee job training and employment." What he didn't tell the editorial writers, though many of them knew it, was that FIGHT has waged virtually guerrilla war against Rochester's leading employer, the Eastman Kodak Co., and invaded that company's annual meeting. The company was required, because of the pressure tactics used by FIGHT, to request massive state police protection at a corporate meeting.

The country certainly has a problem in the big city problems, and everyone can agree with Gov. Romney's words about the importance of self-help and better education. But the up grading of slum dwellers must be done in the right spirit and by the right methods, otherwise disaster will result.

The country cannot be expected to help people in the slums if a gun is pointed at society's head by angry young street radicals. Law and order must prevail. The authority and wisdom of the nation's established business and civic leadership must be upheld. It is nonsense to say that street corner leaders can better direct community efforts than people of demonstrated capacity.

Dinner Delights

Use your favorite recipe for Newburg sauce, then add equal amounts of shrimp and crabmeat to it. Now, make thin pancakes, small. Place a spoonful of Newburg mixture in each pancake and roll. Serve with remaining sauce from a chafing dish for an entree that will really turn on any buffet guest.

Broccoli makes an interesting vegetable for a special dinner when you serve it with white sauce to which has been added crumbled bacon.

A quick dessert for the dinners at which may-be-they-want-one, maybe-they-don't: cover rusks in a shallow pan with some cream. Then top with raspberry preserves, whipped cream and vanilla wafers. Let chill until serving time.

Mushrooms take to creaming (white sauce) like birds take to the sky. Serve with squares of spinach souffle if you want to be fancy; or, in patty shells or toast.

For sweet potatoes with style use canned ones, mixed with butter, brown sugar, sliced, unpeeled apples and pineapple. Cook by turning in a skillet until apples are soft.

Turn tomatoes into tempters by heating 1 can (16 ounces) with 1/3 cup chili sauce and 1 tablespoon butter.

Oyster Pie

(Makes 1 9-inch pie)
Pastry for 2 9-inch crusts
12 ounces oysters with liquid
1/3 cup butter
Black pepper to taste
1 cup half milk, half cream

Line pastry plate with rather thick bottom crust. Pour cleaned oysters in shell, cover with bits of butter and season with pepper. Cover with top crust which has a circle cut out of middle. Place in hot (400 degree F.) oven. Pour in milk-cream through center. Bake 30 minutes.



A RUNNING MATE FOR GEORGE WALLACE

An editor friend of mine, an expatriate Alabamian as a matter of fact, writes, so: "Governor Wallace has never been drawn out on (who will be his running mate) and is studiously non-committal when asked. Further, this has been a curious oversight on the part of those who have written so voluminously on the Wallace candidacy. It is a matter of some importance."

Now, that is a curious flag to raise since there are no vice-presidential candidates anywhere, on any ticket; people don't run for vice-presidential nominations.

Even so, I propose to take up my friend's challenge:

The blunt truth of the matter is this: The value of second spot on Wallace's team is problematical, at best. This is why: The most probable outcome of the upcoming three-horse race is that the election will be decided by the House of Representatives. That is so because it is not likely, with Wallace in the race, either of the two major parties or Wallace will win a majority in the Electoral College.

If none does, the House must decide between the three candidates having the highest number of such votes (XII Amendment). Said another way, if no nominee gets a majority Electoral-College vote, the House will be called upon to decide by majority vote (one State, one vote) between the Republican, the Democrat, and Wallace.

That's one thing. But see how the vice president will be selected under such a circumstance. The Senate selects the vice president but not from the top three vice-

presidential nominees — from but the top two. That means, if the Wallace-Whoosis ticket trails the other two slates, Wallace's running mate will be automatically excluded from consideration by the Senate.

And since that is the way the morning line has it — Wallace to show — the second spot on his ticket is not as enticing as second spot on the other tickets. And that, in turn, may account for the dearth of speculation as to who will join with the new St. George.

Whether it does or not, I can assure you Governor Wallace doesn't hold with any of that reasoning. Wallace understands how he can win a majority vote in the Electoral College and he means to do it, if neither party comes up with a candidate he can live with — a most unlikely happening.

Who, then, will he tap? And being tapped, who would respond?

I have heard the Little Judge say there is no reason why a woman should not be a candidate for "high office". But I am inclined to think he was twitting the "liberal press" when he said it.

Who, then?

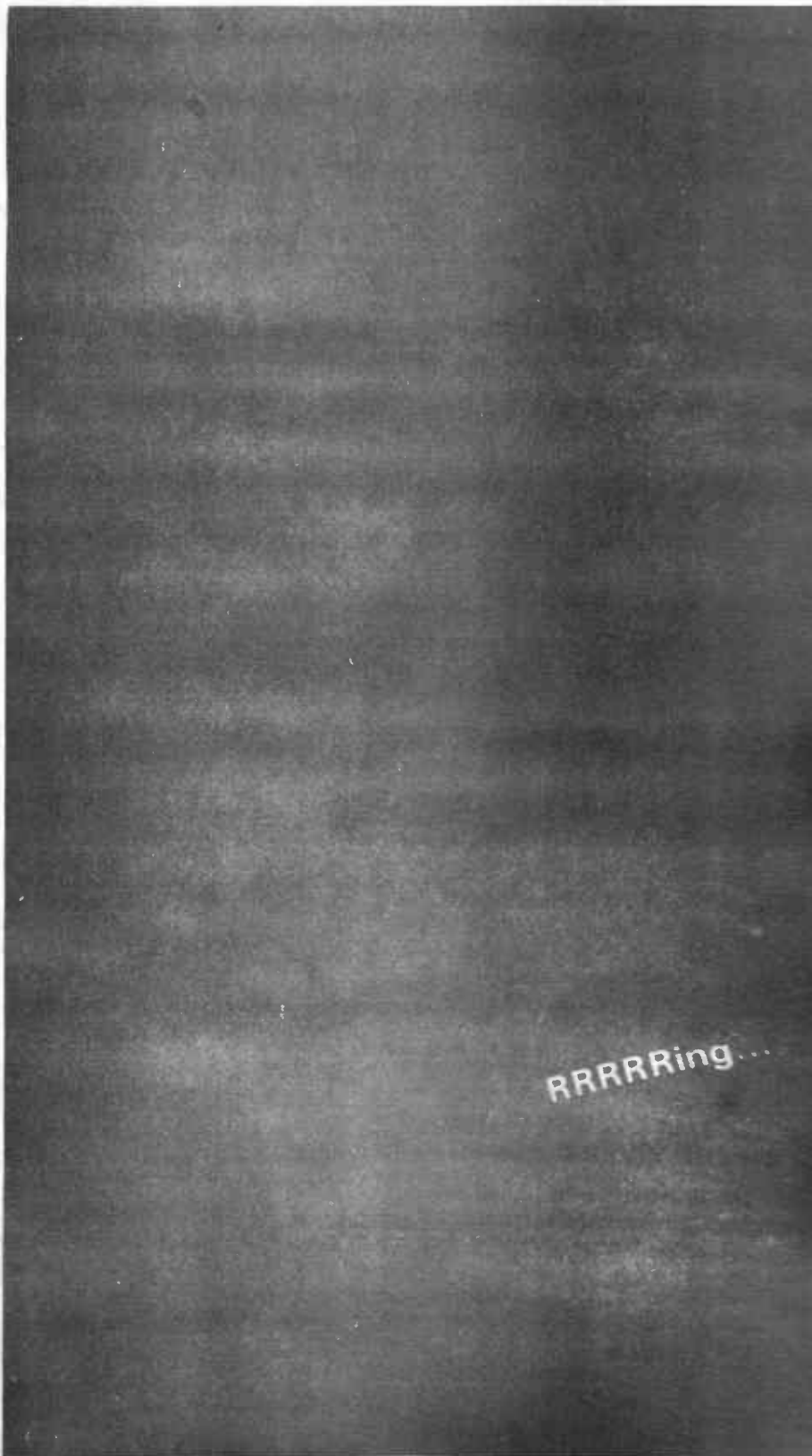

Cotton Harvest Underway, Says Classing Office

The cotton harvest is finally underway in most sections of North Mississippi, reports Marcus P. Talbot, Jr., Officer-in-Charge of the USDA Cotton Division Classing Office, Consumer and Marketing Service, in Memphis. Defoliation became general, and machine pickers entered the fields in many sections. Recent light frosts helped hasten the maturity of some cotton, but many fields are still in full bloom. With continued good weather the harvest should become general within the next two weeks.

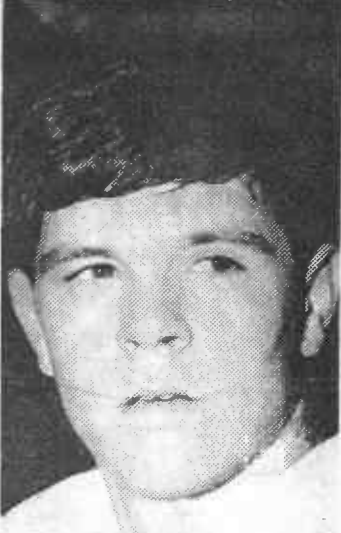
The quality of early ginnings is good. Grades are primarily Middling and Strict Middling with staples of 1-1/16 and 1-3/32 inches. The average micronaire reading of samples classed is 4.4 — well within the premium range.

Interest in new crop cotton is high on country markets. Actual sales are slow, however, due to the lack of ginning volume. A few sales were reported at prices from 28.00 to 29.50c per pound. Cottonseed prices to farmers ranged from \$55.00 to \$60.00 per ton.

According to the October 1st cotton report issued by the Crop Reporting Board of the Statistical Reporting Service, Mississippi's 1967 cotton production is estimated to be 1,175,000 bales. This represents a 25,000 bale increase in the estimate since the September 1st report.

"Much Ado About Ecu" Is Nothing To Iuka Chiefs

The Iuka Chieftains made 5 in a row Friday night by downing the Ecu Tigers 26-6, giving the Tigers a sound whack for their 13-0 skinnin' they gave the Chieftains last year.

Ronnie Brown, a halfback, led Iuka's scoring with two touchdowns. Quarterback Robby Grisham and fullback Wendell Jourdan each had a touchdown apiece.

Halfback Steve Wilson broke loose and raced for 40 yards before he was stopped from behind. With 9:07 left in the third quarter, Brown went 18 yards for his second touchdown of the game. Steve Wilson went into the end zone with the extra point to make the score 19 for the hometeam and still 0 for the visitors.

Ecu started to move late in the period, on a pass from quarterback Mike Montgomery to wingback David Haddock for the touchdown. With 3:36 left in the third quarter, the conversion was no good.

Tommy Duke for Ecu intercepted a Grisham pass but Iuka's defense was too much as Greg Byrom intercepted an Ecu pass to give the ball to the home team. Fullback Wendell Jourdan raced for 17 yards for Iuka's second TD of the quarter. Barney Hudson kicked the

extra point to make the score Iuka 26 to Ecu's 6, as the quarter ended.

In the final quarter, both teams played a good defensive game as neither team could move the ball. Jimmy Smith intercepted a pass and raced 65 yards for a TD only to have it called back. (Jimmy played a good defensive game.) With 7 seconds left in the game, Larry Cutshall, who leads the Highland Conference in interception, picked off another pass to put the ball back in the hands of the Chieftains and the ballgame ended.

Notice To The Owners Of HOUSE TRAILER IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY

We call your attention to the following laws regarding the assessment and collection of taxes on house trailers. We expect your cooperation . . . and call your attention to that all taxes on house trailers which are not paid before November 30th will be considered delinquent.

H. B. NO. 747 — LAWS OF 1962

Before a registration certificate for a house trailer may be issued by the sheriff, he shall have collected all ad valorem taxes due under this act for the current fiscal year on the vehicle, plus a registration fee of two dollars and fifty (\$2.50) cents. In issuing the registration labels, the sheriff shall begin with the lowest numbered label and corresponding number assigned to his county. The sheriff shall also at the proper places on the labels, in with indelible ink (ballpoint pen) the number of his county, and the length, in feet, of the trailer.

After all taxes imposed by this act have been paid on a house trailer, the label shall be attached to the subject vehicle by the taxpayer on the outside of the vehicle near the right hand corner of the drawbar end of the trailer, after such portion has been cleaned and dried. The failure to display a registration label on a house trailer as defined in this act shall be prima facie evidence that the taxes imposed by this act have not been paid.

All such house trailers shall be registered not later than November each year or the first day of the then current year — such registration may also be made earlier during the month of November if it is desired to do so.

Taxes due at any time during a month shall be calculated as of the first day of the month.

Any person who buys a house trailer from a dealer or causes one to be brought into this State after the beginning of the fiscal year will be required to pay ad valorem taxes on the vehicle for only the remaining portion of the fiscal year. The registration fee will not be prorated however. The owner of a house trailer brought into this state, on which the taxes have been paid in another, shall have 30 days in which to pay such taxes in this state. If the taxes are not paid, the taxes shall be calculated, however, as of the first day of the month in which the trailer was brought into this State.

If the sheriff has been directed to collect ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles for a municipality then he shall also collect for such municipality ad valorem taxes imposed by this act.

The assessed value of house trailers, for the proper years, as shown by the assessment schedule authorized by Chapter 588, Laws of 1958, shall be used in assessing and collecting the taxes imposed by this act. No taxing agency may either reduce or increase the assessed value of house trailers from that shown by the aforesaid assessment schedule in collecting ad valorem taxes under authority of this act.

In issuing a road and bridge privilege license for a house trailer after the tax imposed by this act has already been paid, the payment of additional ad valorem taxes for such year shall not be required.

H. B. NO. 761—LAWS OF 1964

A house trailer located on land which is owned by the same person owning and occupying the said house trailer shall also be exempt from the taxes authorized by this act if the wheels of said house trailer have been detached and the trailer is placed on a concrete type foundation. Such trailers shall be assessed and taxed along with the land as other property is assessed and taxed.

Squirrel, Rabbit Hunting Seasons

Squirrel and rabbit season opened October 14 in Zone III. The squirrel season closes in this zone January 7, 1968, and the rabbit season closes February 18, 1968, in Zone III. Zone III includes all that part of Mississippi south of Highway 84.

The season also opens for geese on October 14, and runs through November 12, opens again on November 29 and runs through January 7, 1968. The season is split to take advantage of the earlier passage of blue and snow geese. They should begin arriving on the way to their wintering grounds in Louisiana by mid-October. Best early goose hunting is usually along the sand bars of the Mississippi River.

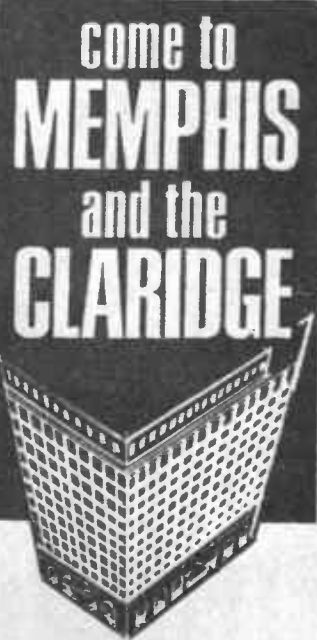

Pimiento Peppers For 1968

An agreement has been made with the Pomona Products Company of Griffin, Ga., to produce pimiento pepper on a commercial basis in Tishomingo County next year, according to P. B. Stricklen, county agent.

into between the grower and into between the grower and the company stating the guaranteed price of \$110 per ton will be paid and the company will purchase all pimientos produced according to the contract.

"The production of pimiento pepper will fit right in with the production of cucumber," stated the county agent. "Cucumbers will start producing and be ready to market by June 1 and continue producing until July 15 or 20. Pimiento pepper is ready to start marketing August 1 and will continue production until a killing frost around October 20 to November 1," he explained.

"Pimiento pepper is picked once a week and carried to the grading shed and then on to the canning plant. One person can pick one acre of pimiento each week during the marketing season," Mr. Stricklen added.

Average production on pimiento should be from 2 to 4 tons per acre and higher in some cases.

A meeting of all farmers in the county who are interested in growing pimiento pepper will be held around the first of November. Representative of the Pomona Products Company will be at this meeting to explain the program in detail and sign contracts for the next year's production. The company wants at least 100 acres of pimiento in Tishomingo County.

"We are fortunate to become affiliated with this reliable company and to have the opportunity of producing another crop that follows right behind the marketing of cucumbers," stated Mr. Stricklen.

"New cash crops added, such as cucumbers, pimientos, and other crops, throughout the state, will help us to reach the goal of 1.5 by '75 which means an income of 1½ billion dollars from agriculture per year by the year 1975. Our present yearly income from agriculture in the state is approximately \$1 billion," he concluded.

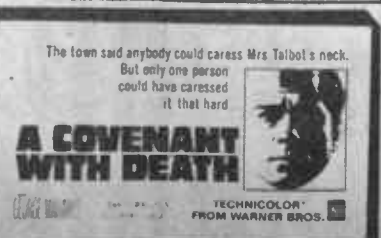

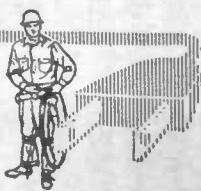
