When my lady nodded her head and said it was time we sold our core-city home, I agreed, though it was a mystery to me where we would light.

We lit here, in a place we call Doneraile, six acres of Virginia's Northern Neck. And if ever on God's green earth there was a heaven, this is it. I had no idea there was such peace, beauty, and kindly people.

Ours is a point of land — a half mile from anyone — like a thumb, and our home is where the thumbnail would be. Around us laps the water of an inlet from the bay. A gray fox traipsed across the lawn this morning and nearly ran General Beauregard out of his canine mind.

It is yet too early for the geese and ducks but they will be coming soon, I'm told, flocks of them, to settle and cackle the night away and, then, at daylight — with that terrible whir — will wheel to a lesser place.

The deer drink at my overflow and there is a coon that spends half his time up my telephone pole. What attracts that coon, I don't know.

Each Sunday morning, I have come to notice, a blue schooner glides past my door looking like nothing so much as a church-bound, nineteenth-century lady; quiet, minding her own business. Porpoises bob along on occasion, schools of them, so close you can tell the color of their bright eyes, into our inlet and out, as on promenade. And as the sun and breeze go down, these quiet October evenings, the world around us turns to scarlet. And in a bit, the stars, hanging heavy like grapes in great clusters, shiver until a man thinks surely they will fall. And a bell buoy bangs away.

I sit awed by it all, ignorant but learning, and loving it as I have never loved nature before. Rabbits, being rabbits, are everywhere. And there is a groundhog aching for trouble, sitting in my field, wriggling his nose at Beau.

Each low tide, properly caparisoned fishermen troll past my point, seeking the rockfish that abound, disdainful of the large,

luscious crabs to be had for the dipping.

I envy these knowledgeable people and since I know a spate of their jargon — "Any luck?" — we exchange pleasantries — "Two" — and they think I am one of the brethren. Me, the bluffer, who wouldn't know a rockfish from a cod. But I will next year, God willing; I'm going to get me a boat, and a hook, and a line, and a straw hat with feather, just like theirs.

My home is something more than 100 years old. How much older, nobody seems to know. What now serves as my parlor once was a general store, legend has it, and the half-bath just beyond, was the postoffice. But that, as I say, was once upon a time, when Doneraile served as a steamboat landing, long before no-rut roads, gasoline buggies, and eight-dollar shirts.

Ours is an undiscovered bit of America, by-passed by everything for nearly 200 years. Richard Lee, known as The Immigrant — the first of the Lees of Virginia — lived directly opposite, across the inlet. Washington's mother was born just a mile trot up the road, and Washington, himself, not much farther along. And nothing much has happened since. And nothing will, if I have my way. The flag I fly has but 13 stars — and that's a plenty.

The only touch of modernity I shall add will be a sign I mean to erect. On it I shall print, in large letters, "Hunters Will Be Shot".

SENSING THE NEWS

Reports from Geneva that the United States and the Soviet Union are near agreement on a draft treaty for banning the spread of atomic weapons are more likely to confuse and mislead the American people than mark a solid gain for the cause of peace and freedom.

The draft treaty reportedly would bar the five nuclear powers from transferring nuclear weapons to nations that do not have them. It also would prevent the nuclear powers from assisting other nations in the production of nuclear weapons.

It is impossible to see what the U. S. would gain from such an agreement, though it is obvious that the U. S. would lose an important measure of freedom. One of the loopholes in the NATO defenses in Europe is that the West Germans, who provide the bulk of the ground forces under the alliance, are without nuclear weapons for self-defense. They face nuclear-armed Russian troops in Central Europe. The draft treaty would keep the Germans in a secondary position forever, which has been a longtime goal of the Soviet Union.

The draft treaty is all the more futile because of the announcement by the French that they will not pay any attention to it.

The real trouble with the treaty is that it diverts attention from the truly serious situation involving atomic defenses for the United States. The United States, by agreeing to end atmospheric testing of nuclear weapons, is behind the Russians in testing large-scale weapons. The Russians have considerably more experience in testing super-weapons, which apparently have been designed to knock out American missile installations. The Russians, also, while agreeing to the peaceful uses of space, have developed an orbital bomb known as SCRAP — a weapon for which the U. S. has no opposite number. Indeed, one of Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's first moves in the Pentagon was to scrap the military's plans for space weapons.

The draft treaty on nuclear weapons also diverts attention from the problem of the Red Chinese atomic capability and from the consequent need for an anti-ballistic missile system. Mr. McNamara is fiddling on this question, asking for more and more "studies" while the Soviets deploy such a defensive system around their key cities. It is known that the Soviet Union has maintained its rapid production of nuclear materials, while the Johnson administration has curtailed this production. At the same time, the overall destructive force of atomic weapons in the Soviet arsenal is growing, while the U. S. nuclear force is remaining constant. This summer, the last of 41 missile-firing Polaris submarines was commissioned, and the administration has no plans for additional expansion of this undersea fleet.

In summary, the Soviets' atomic weapons program is getting stronger all the time, while Mr. McNamara refuses to push for technological innovation in the defense field. In time this failure will leave the American people dangerously exposed to the threat of Soviet atomic aggression.

The Johnson administration is striving to get an agreement with the Soviet Union. But of what value is a treaty with the USSR? The Soviets, in their almost 50 years in power, have never paid any attention to international agreements when it did not suit their purposes.

For more than 20 years, moreover, the U. S. has been trying to arrange for joint inspection of atomic research sites in this country and the USSR, and the Russians have persisted during these two decades in refusing to let Americans have a look at what they are doing. The secrecy of Russia under Kossygin is the same as in Russia under Stalin. The Russian Bear has not changed his nature with the passage of time.

Liberals insist on saying that the cold war is ended, but that's a cruel joke on the 500,000 Americans fighting in Vietnam. That war is continuing because of the massive Soviet airlift to Haiphong and because of Russian air defense missiles and anti-aircraft artillery made available to North Vietnam. If that isn't evidence of cold war — or hot war — it is hard to see what the Great Society dreamers want as evidence.

It would be comforting if the Johnson administration tried to regain American atomic supremacy in the military field, instead of indulging in wishful thinking about the Soviets becoming peace-lovers who will sign treaties ending all threat of aggression. But such realism isn't characteristic of Washington these days.

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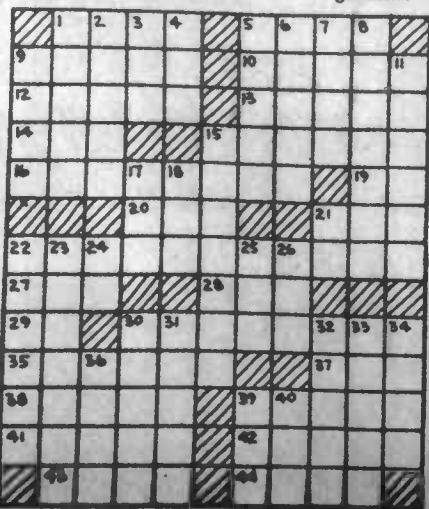

The student library assistants of Iuka High School met Thursday, October 19, in the school library, to organize a Library Club.

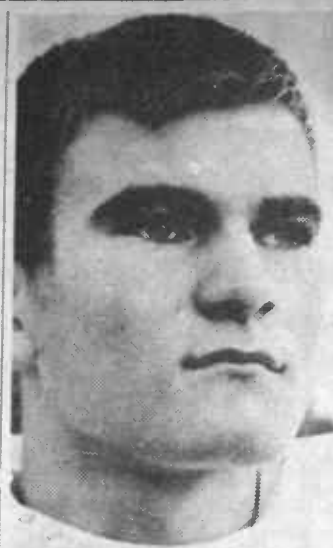

Local Banker Sites Help Given State's Farmers

Mississippi banks were providing farmers with more credit and other financial services than any other lenders at the beginning of this year, according to R. A. McRee, Jr., President of the Iuka Guaranty Bank, who represents the Mississippi Bankers Association as Tishomingo County Agricultural Key Banker. During 1966, the banks maintained their leadership in agricultural credit services.

Based on the 26th annual farm lending summary of the Agricultural Committee of The American Bankers Association, Mr. McRee reported that at the beginning of the year, Mississippi banks were helping farmers with \$176 million in loans, 13% more than a year previous. This total included \$86 million in production loans and \$90 million in farm mortgages. At the same time, \$166 million in farm loans was held by life insurance companies; \$85 million by the Federal Land Banks; \$49 million by Production Credit Associations; and \$19 million in non real estate loans, plus \$15 million in real estate loans by the Farmers Home Administration. About 56 per cent of the production credit extended by lending institutions to Mississippi farmers came from banks.

Mr. McRee said that "bankers in Mississippi are conscious of the large capital investments required in agriculture today and are making a concerted effort through improved lending programs to meet these changing credit demands of the state's farmers."

The increased use of credit by farmers, according to Mr. McRee, has been accompanied by a substantial gain in the total assets of farm families. Therefore, in the aggregate, the equity position of farmers, contrary to public opinion, is being maintained at a satisfactory level. Nationally, farm families have \$228 billion of their own funds invested in agriculture. This represents 83 per cent of the total capital requirements of farmers.

Mr. McRee stressed the importance of farmers and bankers working closely together to improve farm financial arrangements. He reported that nine out of 10 insured banks throughout the county had agricultural loans outstanding, with nearly 97 per cent of the banks in Mississippi extending credit to farm people.

Halloween Safety For All Trick - Or - Treaters

Halloween fun ends in tragedy for many families each year because of carelessness or lack of foresight, a spokesman for the State Board of Health said as the night for hobgoblins and witches neared.

Thoughtful parents can make their children's Halloween safe and pleasant by proper precautions and careful instruction, according to Dr. Frank M. Wiygul, a well-known pediatrician who recently became director of Public Health Education.

A "safety briefing session," he said, should be held with the children before they go out on a trick-or-treat adventure. Boundary limits should be clearly understood. Children should be warned to cross streets only at regular crossings and not to run between parked cars, across yards or through vacant lots. They should be cautioned, also, about accepting any overtures from strangers.

The public health official pointed out that in the excitement of Halloween fun, children often forget safety rules. For that reason, he cautions parents

to keep the very young under the constant supervision of an adult or a responsible older child.

"Young trick-or-treaters are often involved in accidents because of their costumes — masks that limit vision, dark colors difficult for motorists to see, lighted jack-o-lanterns that ignite clothing," Dr. Wiygul stated.

For safe costumes, the following suggestions are offered to parents:

—Provide flameproof costumes that are light colored — they're easier to see at night.

—Use reflecting tape, liquid, or bands on children's costumes, capes, jack-o-lanterns, broomsticks, and hats.

—Make sure the outfits aren't tripping hazards, and that they won't catch on bushes, hedges, or fences.

—Paint false faces on children. Masks are dangerous because they restrict vision and provide a danger of suffocation. Use cosmetics and burnt cork to give children a goblin effect.

—Don't allow the child to use

candles or torches. If he carries a lantern, make sure it's lighted by flashlight batteries.

—Don't let the child carry a knife, sword, or other sharp instrument — make a dummy one.

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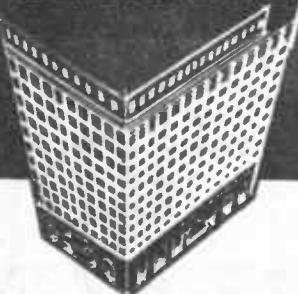

Home Economist's Notes

Homemakers, you will soon be finding such exotic sounding products as cocoa-flavored cheese, cherry-flavored milk and desserts made from butter-milk at your grocery store.

For those members of your family who should drink butter-milk, but don't like it, you can soon give them a choice of coconut cream, banana cream, cherry or pineapple flavored butter-milk. This buttermilk dessert looks like a custard and has about the same consistency.

These new products are being developed to give you more variety in dairy products.

Padding Adds to Carpet Life

The padding you select to go with your carpet can prolong the life of your carpet as much as 50 percent.

You may have a choice of a 32-ounce pad, a 40-ounce pad or a 50-ounce pad. The 32-ounce pad is thin. The 40-ounce pad is medium and adequate for most carpets. The 50-ounce pad is available, but may be expensive.

Along with the weight of the pad, you will also want to consider the various materials from which it may be made.

For example, felted pads are made of animal hair, jute or a

combination of these materials. The higher percentage of hair in the felted pad, the more resilient you will find it.

The felted pad costs less than some, but is usually adequate for most carpets. The weight is important.

Rubber pads are more expensive. They will not absorb moisture, but may hold moisture. They are mothproof, mildew-proof and non-allergic. The rubber may break down after a period of time, especially where it is exposed to gas or heat.

Rubberized felt is a good compromise between rubber and felt.

Utherane, a rubber substitute, is the newest type carpet pad. Such a pad is harder to install than other pads. It seems to withstand wear, but has not been tested thoroughly.

Choose the Right Pan

The pan you use to bake your cookies, cake or casserole can make a big difference in its success or failure.

A pan with high sides prevents browning. One too large interferes with heat circulation. If your recipe gives the size pan for cooking the dish, these measurements are given for the top

inside dimension.

There is no one material best for all your cooking purposes. For pies, you want to use a pan that absorbs heat quickly and holds it. This will help set bottom crust and prevent soggy-ness. Glass is good.

For cakes, use pans that absorb heat moderately. If the pan reflects too much heat, your cake will have crusty sides and an overbrowned bottom and sides.

Flowers

Lots of folks wait until spring to plant certain flower seeds that really should be planted in the fall.

Here are a few annuals that should be seeded now for next spring's flowers: feverfew, gailardia, Queen Anne's Lace, pinks, strawflowers, calendula, larkspur, calliopsis, poppy, phlox, sweet pea, snapdragon and verbena.

Some perennials to plant now include sweetwilliam, forget-me-not, hollyhock, fox-glove, delphinium, candytuft, canterbury bells, viola, and snow-in-the-summer.

It is time right now to plant your pansies. Early setting of these plants will result in earlier blossoms.

It is also a good time now to plant such bulbs as daffodils, lilies, hyacinths, narcissus and dutch iris.

Stalk Shredding

Shredding stalks after harvest
on lots of land will help hold
down erosion during the winter.

On land that is too steep to
plow in the fall, shredding the
stalks will provide a mulch and
help hold the soil.

Shredding also removes much
of the food that could harbor
insects through the winter.

Fertilizing Clover Pastures

If you have not already ap-
plied lime, phosphorus and pot-
ash to clover pastures, do so as
soon as possible.

For good clover use enough
lime to bring the pH of the soil
to 6.5. Then apply at least 100
pounds each of phosphorus and
potash to the acre.

If you are seeding clover, be
sure to prepare a good seedbed
and that you inoculate the clov-
er seed.

Quality Cotton

Inadequate spray coverage ap-
pears to be the most frequent
cause of poor defoliation. If you
are using airplanes, use 5 to 8
gallons of total spray per acre.
Airplane nozzles that product
relatively large droplets will
give best spray penetration into
plant foliage.

With large plants it may be

necessary to use split applica-
tions — a pint of phosphate or
a gallon of chlorate followed by
a similar application a week la-
ter.

With ground sprayers use K*
series flood nozzles and 20 to 25
pounds pressure, or flat-fan her-
bicide nozzles like 8001 or equi-
valent and 40 pounds pressure.

The most complete coverage
with phosphate defoliants has
been obtained with either X6
or X12 tips over row and middle
and 90 pounds pressure instead
of 40 pounds. The higher pres-
sure increases total gallons per
acre by 50 percent, but insures
more thorough wetting of leaves.
X12 tips are preferred over X6
tips in windy weather.
