'Pork Barrell' Money Distributed To Towns In County And Area

Towns and city governments in the state have received their "pork barrell" allotment from the state revolving fund as established by the Legislature in 1958.

Sums received in the county were: Iuka, \$1,049.42; Belmont, \$470.41; Burnsville, \$217.19; Tishomingo, \$216.67; and Paducah, \$69.96.

Sums received by surrounding cities were: Fulton, \$890.70;

Baldwyn, \$1,056.20; Booneville, \$1,816.90; Corinth, \$5,979.61; Tupelo, \$8,991.08; Rienzi, \$195.78; Ripley, \$1,392.96; and Nettleton, \$725.19.

The biennial contribution to municipalities is \$1,500,000, the money to be released in two payments, \$1,000,000 being given in one year and \$500,000 the following year. This is a half-million dollar year for the state's municipalities.

When Tishomingo Countians go to the polls next Tuesday in the November general election they will find only one Republican candidate on the ballot. That will be the name of Rubel L. Phillips who is making his second try for the governor's chair as a Republican.

Postal Service Change

Effective Saturday, November 4, changes are being put into effect at the Iuka Post Office. These changes are being made on the outgoing and incoming mails and also the collection service from business and residential areas of our city.

On this date only one truck (Star Route) will serve Iuka. This truck will make a round trip from Tupelo each day. (Hot Shot Line)

It will start at Tupelo at 5:20 in the morning and come to Iuka by way of Rienzi, Corinth, Glen and Burnsville, arriving in Iuka at 7:40 A.M. The mail truck will leave Iuka at 5:05 in the afternoon, returning to Tupelo by the same route, arriving there at 7:00 P.M.

Postmaster Harold T. Lomenick reports that changes will have to be made in the collection service at the Post Office at Iuka. The City Carriers will collect mail as usual on their delivery rounds. A final collection will be made from all residential collection boxes beginning at 3:30 P.M. A final collection will be made from the business section boxes starting at 4:30 P.M. Mr. Lomenick stated that this new service insures that all mail received in the Post Office before 5 P.M. any day, Sundays and holidays included, will be sent on its way and will be delivered the next day.

Chieftains Play Tonight; Winners Over Seminoles

The Iuka Chieftains left the field Friday night with 40 Seminole scalps and their seventh big win of the 1967 football season. Final score: Chieftains 40, Smithville, 0.

Tonight, Thursday, the Chieftains meet the Ramblers of Randolph. This will probably prove to be a stepping stone game to the big conference attraction between the Chieftains and the Saltillo Tigers on November 10, here. Regardless, the Chieftains under the direction of Coach Grady Ferguson, are expected to give their all in power-packed playing and sportsmanship to make it a good game for fans. Make plans to follow the Chieftains on their winning route and see this game tonight when they take on the Randolph Ramblers. Last year's score in this match was 32-7 in favor of the home team, if this is to give any foresight to the outcome — barring upset.

In last week's game our halfback Ronnie Brown led the Chieftains in scoring with three touchdowns to his credit against the Seminoles. Quarterback Robbie Grisham scored two TD's and halfback Steve Wilson kept one for his own. Barney Hudson, end, kicked the three extra

points to finish the scoreboard work.

In the first quarter, it looked like the game was going to be a defensive battle but line-backer Fred Rutherford intercepted the first pass of the game. Chieftains caught a case of the fumbles while Smithville did the recovering. Larry Cuthshall, leader in interceptions in the Highland Conference, picked off another one to give the ball back to Iuka. Grisham made a good run around the end but the Seminoles defense held to take over.

Smithville found yards hard to come by against the Chieftains and once again Iuka got the ball. Grisham and Brown made 2 fine runs.

With 3:05 left in the first quarter, Grisham went into the endzone with a TD, to make it Iuka 6 and Smithville 0. The extra point attempted by Barney Hudson was no good.

Gary Bowling returned the kickoff for about 20 yards but the Chieftain defense was too much and Hudson picked off Iuka's third pass of the quarter to set up for a touchdown. With 20 seconds left in the 1st quarter, Ronnie Brown went 3 yards for the TD. Hudson's attempt for the extra point was good and the score at the end of the 1st was Iuka 13 to Smithville's 0.

In the second quarter, Gary Bowling hit Edsel Carpenter with a pass. Carpenter made a great catch. Iuka's defense held the Seminoles and gained possession of the ball. Brown and Grisham again carried.

The Chieftains fumbled and lost the ball to the opposition. Bowling hit his teammate Melvin McKinny for a long gain. Jimmy Smith intercepted Bowling's pass to give the ball back to Iuka. Fullback Wendell Jourdan made a good run and Smithville's defense held as they gained possession of the ball again.

Smith intercepted another pass to give the ball back to Iuka and set up another touchdown. Robby Grisham got off to Ronnie Brown with a good pass leading to Brown's touchdown. Hudson's extra point did not count and the score was 19-0 for the hometown. The seminoles couldn't find their spunk and the Chieftains took over the ball. Terry Collins picked off a Grisham pass for Smithville to end the first half with the Chieftains leading, 19-0.

In the third quarter both teams traded the ball off twice before Robbie Grisham went 15 yards for a touchdown with 6:08 left in the quarter. Hudson's extra point was good. The score stood 26-0 in favor of Iuka. Both teams played a good defensive game the rest of the quarter. At the end of the 3rd quarter, the score was 26-0 in favor of the mighty Chieftains.

In the final quarter, Fast Eddie Gross opened the quarter with a touchdown pass to Steve

Wilson with 11:49 left in the game. Hudson made the extra point with a good kick putting the score at 33-0. Iuka's defense held Smithville and got the ball back. Wendell Jourdan broke loose and raced 40 yards before he was brought down. With 8:11 left in the game, Brown went into the endzone with his third TD of the game. The extra point was made by Hudson.

Final score in the Seminole-Chieftain game was Iuka 40 and Smithville 0. Both teams played an outstanding game. Tackle Gary Lomenick and Jimmy Smith led the charge on defense.

The Chieftains will be trying for their 8th win of the season tonight (Thursday) at Randolph.

140 Attend Meeting For Riverport On Lake

Approximately 140 influential political and industrial leaders were in attendance for the discussion and inspection of the proposed riverport on Yellow Creek last Wednesday. The group met at Coleman park lodge at 1:30 and went on a boat tour of the proposed site.

A discussion of the industrial and economic potential resulting from a riverport for this area was given by M. I. Foster, chief of TVA Navigation development. Mr Foster told the group that an estimated \$105,000 annually could be expected in transfer charges for fifteen existing industries in the area which would be using the proposed port facilities on Yellow Creek.

With the construction of a 15-mile rail spur from the port to connect with the Southern Railway near Burnsville, fifteen hundred acres of potential industrial land would be opened up in addition to 760 acres in the vicinity of the port site.

"It is estimated that this area could attract industry employing upwards of 2,200 persons and providing annual payrolls of \$15 million," Mr. Foster said. "These new industries would generate at least as much revenue for the port as the 15 existing industries," he said.

Tom Herrin of the Miss. Research and Development Center outlines obstacles this area must face now that 20 counties have been added to the Appalachian program.

The Yellow Creek port is one project that does not require waiting for the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway, Herrin emphasized. "We have already made arrangements to coordinate our work with the TVA,"

he said.

Congressman Jamie Whitten was principal after-dinner speaker at the banquet held Wednesday night. Unable to attend in person because of pressing duties in Washington, Congressman Whitten spoke to the group via telephone amplification. In his remarks, Congressman Whitten said, "We must build bridges and roads and transportation facilities here to make our country strong. However involved we are in the world, it is more imperative that we look after our own country," he said.

W. C. Hamilton of Iuka, executive director of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, served as master of ceremonies

for the afternoon meeting. Thompson Pounds of Pontotoc, executive secretary of the Tombigbee River Valley Water Management District, gave a summary of work that has been done on the Yellow Creek Riverport.

Frozen Ground Meat

Freeze ground meat just as it comes from the retailer, minus any seasoning. Freezing tends to intensify seasonings, so it's best to add this just before the meat is to be cooked, during or following cooking.

Ground meat is frequently frozen in one, one and one-half or two pound packages but it's a good idea to have a few ground meat patties packaged individually for quick 'burgers' for the one or two needed on short notice.

Patties will separate easily if a layer of wrapping paper separates each one. They're easily cooked from the frozen state, if a slight increase in cooking time is allowed.

Home Economist's Notes

The weather, store displays, papers and magazines and the children's conversations are taking on a holiday air. Even the plentiful foods list is topped by a traditional holiday favorite — turkey.

Whether you buy your turkey early, or a few days before the holiday, be sure you look at more than the price. Look for the inspection and grading tag. Consider the size turkey you need for the number of folks who will be at your table for the turkey dinner.

Most all of us know that American poultry is processed under close Federal supervision. But we sometimes get a bit confused between poultry inspection & grading. These are 2 different operations, done by different people, for different purposes.

Poultry inspection is an examination of the bird during slaughter and processing to insure that it is wholesome and suitable for people to eat.

Poultry grading is an examination of the bird during processing to determine its quality. Grading is available to packers on a voluntary basis. It is not required. About half of all poultry sold is federally graded.

The three grades are Grade A, Grade B and Grade C. Grade

A turkeys are top quality. Grade A and Grade C turkey are good turkeys, too. They allow several defects such as slight skin bruises and crooked breastbone. A Grade C bird may be poorly fleshed and lack covering fat in addition to defects allowed for Grade B birds.

You will have a choice of large, medium-size and small turkeys. If you will serve from 4 to 10 people, a turkey from 4 to 8 pounds is large enough. 10 to 20 people, 8 to 12 pounds; 20 to 30 people, 12 to 16 pounds.

Other Plentiful Foods

Other foods on the plentiful foods list for November are grape juice, pork, potatoes, broiler-fryers and dry split peas.

Teach Child To Mind

No one likes a child who "runs wild." You like to be proud of what your children do. Every mother and father wants their children to obey them. This is important because you must take care of them and keep them safe.

In telling children what to do, you are teaching them to do the right thing. This means you need to be sure they understand what you want. As they grow older, they need to know why you want them to do it also.

Make it easier for your child

to do what you want him to then to disobey. Are you always saying "stop that" instead of telling him what to do.

Parents should set limits for children of any age. They need the security your limits give. When your rules are reasonable and understood, your child will mind you. Use limits and love.

Mrs. Hilda Hill, instructor in argumentation and debate at Northeast, will accompany the group.

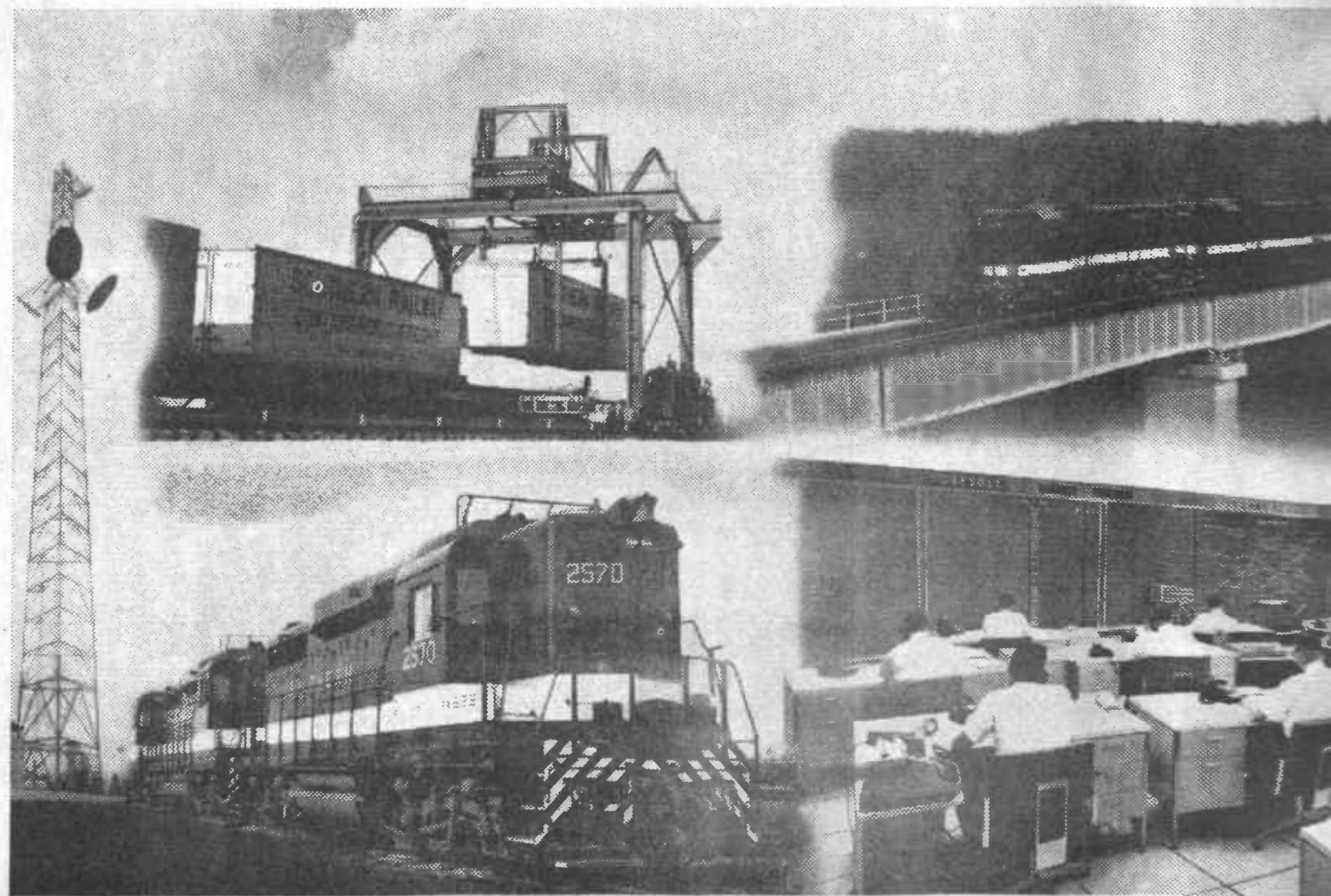

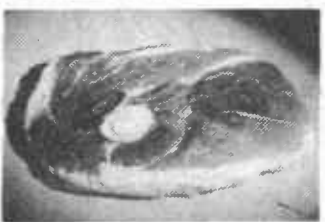

- Q. What's the name of this meat cut?
A. Pork arm steak.
- Q. Where does it come from? How is it identified?
A. It comes from the shoulder section of pork and is sometimes referred to as a shoulder steak. The cut is distinguished by a round bone or arm bone, which gives the cut its name. It is this bone which makes this steak different from that with the blade bone which is long and slender.

- Q. How is it prepared?
A. By braising or broiling. For braising, the pork arm steak is browned first in its own fat or in lard or drippings. The drippings are then poured off and a small amount of liquid is added.

Pork steaks may be broiled indoors or out, provided temperature is kept moderate. When cut ½ inch thick, the total broiling time is 35 to 40 minutes.
