In Tuesday's general election
balloting, Tishomingo County

STORMING THE PENTAGON

The horde of anti-Vietnam demonstrators that invaded the nation's capital Oct. 21 and attempted to storm the Pentagon could have been visitors from another planet. To those who saw the demonstrators close up, the mob of protestors was indeed a strange and disturbing sight. Many of the male marchers had long hair and were attired in beatnik or hippie costumes. In the line of march were individuals with Viet Cong flags or buttons proclaiming their hatred of the United States. One of the march leaders openly termed the President of the United States the real "enemy."

Those Americans who remember their history may have had a recollection of the so-called bonus army, another mob of protestors that invaded Washington a generation ago. At that time, the U.S. government was not confused about its rights and responsibilities to all the people of this nation. Under the command of Gen. Douglas MacArthur, troops promptly cleared the bonus army out of Washington.

Unfortunately, the present administration lacks the same clear grasp of rights and responsibilities. In an excess of tolerance, it permitted the demonstrators to swarm across government property, to carry their Viet Cong flags up to the Lincoln Memorial, and, in a variety of ways, to paralyze large areas of the nation's capital.

No one has yet calculated the final cost of the anti-Vietnam demonstration — to the taxpayers, that is. But it was necessary to bring soldiers to Washington from as far away as California.

There should be no misunderstanding of the meaning of the Oct. 21 demonstration around the Pentagon. It was a dry run, which enabled the communists to test their ability to disrupt the capital of the United States. The various leftwing and pro-

revolutionary groups taking part in the Washington march are increasingly open in admitting their goal is revolution in the United States. The abortive effort to get a large number of demonstrators inside the Pentagon, nerve center of America's armed force, revealed the seriousness of the revolutionary danger. The assault group of demonstrators, which initially overran a thin line of defending marshals and soldiers at entrance No. 7 to the Pentagon, were using railroad flares in a regular assault operation.

Americans will be foolish if they imagine that the demonstration outside the Pentagon is the last such threat that will be posed directly against the U. S. government. All the evidence points to the fact that it is just the beginning.

What the public needs to appreciate is that the anti-Vietnam demonstrators — at least the leaders and planners of the assaults on the government — are conducting war from within. They are working hand-in-hand with Ho Chi Minh in North Vietnam and his Russian supporters. It is noteworthy that Ho Chi Minh sent a message of sympathy to the demonstrators in Washington. Around the world, communist front groups conducted coordinated sympathy marches.

The kind of excessive tolerance that the administration engaged in Saturday, in dealing with the demonstrators, only plays into the hands of the communists and their allies. If they believe that the U. S. government will be soft on insurrectionaries, then they will push all ministration was under no necessity to use the soft approach. The Constitution guarantees freedom of peaceful assembly, but the demonstration was anything but peaceful. Moreover, no one has the right to exercise "peaceful assembly" at any point one pleases. Specifically,



no one, under the law, is allowed to trespass on government property or to deny the right of other citizens to use the highways for normal travel.

Unless anarchy is to spread in this country, the federal government is going to have to come down hard on Ho Chi Minh's allies in this country. Indeed the nation has to recognize that there is an enemy within—that disloyalty is a fact and has to be dealt with sternly. The press has an obligation to present, before demonstrations take place, the pro-communist character of the groups involved. The types of organizations engaged in the Washington demonstrations and storming of the Pentagon have the objective of destroying American society and our nation's strength.



Heartening Advice

I've just been reading what Dr. Paul Dudley White has to say about the causes and prevention of heart trouble. You must have heard tell of Dr. White, the Boston specialist. Seems as if he's had more famous patients than you can shake a stick at — including Dwight D. Eisenhower.

If you have any questions about the way your heart's liable to act up in the later years, Dr. White's a good man to listen to. His advice is — well, heartening, in every sense of the word. It's about your heart. And it's most encouraging.

Dr. White begins by pointing out that the heart is a fist-sized pump that beats about 100,000 times a day. Remarkable pump, as you might imagine, and if anything happens to it, you're in trouble. More and more Americans are finding themselves in deep trouble every year.

Why? According to Dr. White, a number of causes appear to be involved in the development of heart trouble.

Why Overweight?

One obvious thing is excess weight, which puts a strain on the circulatory system because the heart has to send more blood to more pounds of flesh. After all, what happens when you overload any pump? And there are just too many Americans overweight because they overeat.

The eating problem is complicated by cholesterol, or fat in the blood, the precise effect of which is not completely understood. Dr. White, like most of his colleagues, believes that the less saturated fats you absorb, the better.

Nervous tension is a different problem, perhaps directly affecting the heart, perhaps indirectly by causing an eating compulsion that causes obesity. Cigarettes? That's a thorny question, but Dr. White does advise his patients to quit smoking. Coffee and liquor? Not so dangerous, but if you have any heart trouble at all, it would be wise to drop them.

Is heredity or environment the key factor? No one knows, although they're working on it. But it does seem that if your family has no history of heart attacks, you have a better chance of escaping one yourself.

Okay — but what to do about it? Dr. White suggests regular medical checkups so you can know where you stand. Follow

FOR THE FAMILY MANAGER

ITEM: If you bleach during laundering, follow directions carefully, measure accurately and rinse thoroughly after bleaching.

ITEM: Research indicates that the smallest room that would accommodate twin beds plus the usual pieces of bedroom furniture would be 15 feet 8 inches by 10 feet 4 inches.

ITEM: Before you sign an installment contract, be sure you know under what conditions the item can be repossessed.

ITEM: Before painting, remove the hardware from doors and cabinets and loosen wall or ceiling electric fixtures. This way you don't have to slow down painting to avoid getting smears on the metal.

Businessmen Concerned As Lawlessness Rises

Business and industrial leaders are far more concerned with crime, rioting and disregard for law and order than with any other single issue facing the nation, according to results of a survey just completed by the Southern States Industrial Council.

The SSIC polled the executives of 2,500 small, medium and large companies — most of them in the 16 Southern states from Texas to Maryland, but with a substantial number in other sections — which make

up its membership. The business executives were furnished a list of 22 national issues and are asked to rate the issues in order of concern to them. Thirty-three percent of the members responded.

Crime and lawlessness were named by 46% of the respondents as the issue of paramount concern to them. It received more than twice as many mentions as any other issue on the list.

Tied for second place, with 20% naming them as issues demanding priority attention, were "using all appropriate means to win the war in Vietnam" and stopping "war on poverty legislation and welfare spending by the federal government."

In third place, also tied with

18% each, were "growth of the economy" and "halting Court's incursions into private area."

Other issues named in descending order of rating included:

Reform of the National Labor Relations Board — 17%

Putting laws on the books to control trusts and monopolies — 16%

Right to work — 15%

External Communism — 14%

Communist peace and racial issues — 13%

Federal tax — 12%

(Percentages are based on more than 100 respondents gave first place to one issue.)

For And About Teenage



THE WEEK'S LETTER: "My girlfriend and I have been good friends for a year now. We haven't had one fight or argument. Last month we both found out that she is 14 months older than I am. It doesn't seem to bother her but I have been talking to other people and they say I should be older than she. It didn't bother me until everybody said I should be older. What do you think?"

OUR REPLY: How old are you? This is something we would want to know before giving you a full opinion. If you are both well into your teen years, the difference in age is relatively unimportant. Where adults are concerned, a two-year age difference is hardly something to talk about.

When you are a teenager, age is important as a rule, at least as far as boys when boys are either too young or too old, etc., to give a good opinion. Of course, as a teenager, if you are a two-year difference, one way or the other, it makes no difference.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER?

Q: Dr. Garrett, can a pupil's memory be improved by intensive practice?

A: Not permanently. Bright children have been given special daily practice, at age five, in memorizing words and numbers. At first, the improvement was phenomenal. But when practice ended and the youngsters were left alone, the special memory feats faded rapidly until the children again memorized at the rate and speed normal for their age and intelligence. A child cannot learn permanently at a stage above his maturity level.

Q: Dr. Garrett, what answer do you have for classroom rowdiness?

A: If special provision were made for slow-witted students, and for those with bad heredity; and if, in addition, parents could be induced to treat their children fairly but firmly, many behavior problems would disappear. To change the schools to where standards are set up and maintained, where a child has to work hard (but not beyond his intellectual capacity), and where the teacher demands courtesy (doesn't beg for it), will require some doing. Perhaps the best immediate hope is the private independent school.

Real Disposer

The laser beam could well be the garbage disposer of the future. It won't grind, mulch or burn; it will simply disintegrate any substance placed in its path.

Clear Drains

If you pour hot water down your kitchen and bathroom drains once a day, you can usually prevent clogging. The hot water dissolves grease that otherwise might tend to accumulate inside the pipe.

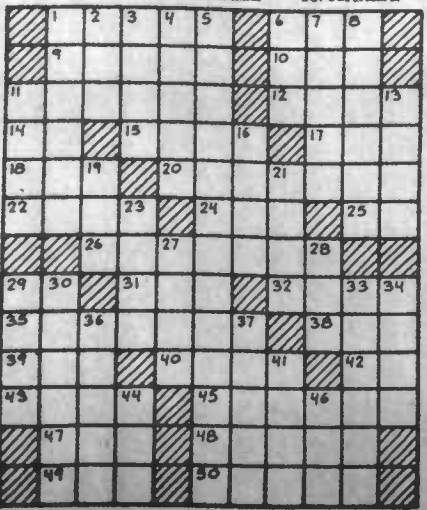

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

National Education Week . . .

Week, November 5-11, is an important milestone in the history of the land, and we are joining hands in a united effort to meet the increasing needs of our educational way.

One of the fundamental themes of the American Education Week is to acquaint not only parents, but all citizens, with the community with the aims and needs of our schools.

Our theme is "How Your Schools" and attention to the importance of a school system will enable all students to the maximum of capacity. Each day will be a specific area of the week follows: "Shaping the Future of the Young"; "Providing Learning Opportunities"; "Meeting the Challenge of Change"; "Providing Quality Teaching"; "Stimulating Long Learning"; "Developing Vocational Competence"; "Enriching Learning."

Week will begin with a PTA meeting on Friday, November 6, at 7:00 p.m. with the emphasis on the theme of the week, special programs will be to stimulate interest in our educational and re-awaken an awareness of our ever present problems that lie ahead.

It grew out of a discovery during the war, that too much

of the American population was illiterate and physically unfit.

Since 1922 this annual observance has been co-sponsored by the U. S. Office of Education and in 1938 the National Congress of Parents and Teachers became the 45th co-sponsor.

I'm afraid it is like too many of our other freedoms and privileges, it's taken far too lightly, forgive me! Education is and should be regarded in a most serious way, our most precious and priceless pursuit. Each day should be respected as an additional opportunity to gain new insights and bits of wisdom that could remove doubt and suspicion and rekindle those sparks for light and information.

When we consider our position and dilemma, educationally, the picture doesn't appear too bright. According to all statistics and information, on a national basis, we Mississippians rank last in every area. This is both alarming and embarrassing, but it should arouse each of us to overcome these weaknesses and attempt in some bold way, to conquer this plight.

Many suggestions have been offered and much study and time has been spent to make at least a meager beginning to alleviate these tragic conditions. To say the least, it will be a lengthy and expensive endeavor, but I would personally be among the first to recommend the step forward as our best investment in the future of our boys & girls.

We would be among the first to defend our own system and program, but hasten to agree that we have our weaknesses and area for improvement. In a simple and brief analysis, we have far too many failures and

entirely too many of our young people dropping out of school. This clearly means that we are attempting to fit the students into our outmoded curriculum. It is my humble opinion and respectful feeling that our program is meeting the needs of our college bound and possible talented youngsters, but this percentage is far too few.

With the consideration and attention being given to these conditions nationally, it is my confident and optimistic view that immediate and positive changes will be developing. Your cooperation and support of this important phase of our present day challenge is urged and solicited.

May I personally, on behalf of our fine staff, student body, and community, invite each of you to make a special visit to your school, and especially participate in all activities that concern and include your children. They somehow understand and appreciate your individual interest and contact and in most instances, they respond in a most encouraging way.

This could seem anticlimactic or even contradictory, but let me state briefly some positive points and area of success that all of us can point to with pride and a sense of accomplishment.

We have one of the finest and most loyal faculties and staff in the entire world. They are all well qualified and efficient in their particular fields and everyone seems to be giving their very best each day. Each one could easily fit into any system of our state or nation and possibly earn many additional dollars, but they chose to remain faithful and dedicated to their task and I feel, possibly in a selfish way, they are all doing an outstanding job. If you feel the same as I do, then why not let them know how much you do appreciate their many efforts and sacrifices. It will require little time and even effort, but it will be most rewarding and inspiring to everyone concerned.

Informative Book Is Now Available For Public Use

New information designed to bring increased income and better living to all the people of Tishomingo County has just been published in a 90 page booklet, according to Lester Skinner, chairman of the Tishomingo County Development Council. The booklet was printed through the facilities of the State Extension Department.

This Tishomingo County Development Plan is a complete study of economic and human resources, together with recommendations by local leaders for future developments. It was prepared by men and women throughout the county, repre-

sented agricultural businesses and professions under the organizational and educational leadership of the Tishomingo County Extension Staff with assistance from the county TAP and other state and Federal agencies.

"This long-time plan will help our people see how we can continue to improve our industry, agriculture, public facilities and other aspects of good living," Mr. Skinner said.

"Copies will also be used to help attract businessmen outside the county who are seeking desirable locations for new manufacturing plants, agricultural

development, or other opportunities," he said. "It will also be useful to students and others studying our county."

The development plan contains detailed information about the county's population, labor force, and natural resources such as industrial clays, oil and gas, forestry, and water. Other sections include government, medical facilities, education, churches, communications, power, and recreation.

Because the county development plan is a large and relatively expensive publication, the number of copies available is limited. All who wish to see it, or perhaps request copies for definite purposes, may inquire at the local Cooperative Extension Service offices in the Tishomingo County Farmers Improvement Association Building in Iuka.

"I wish to publicly express my personal appreciation and that of all our people to the individuals, organizations, and agencies who volunteered time and effort to make this development plan possible," Mr. Skinner declared.

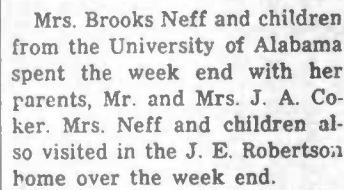

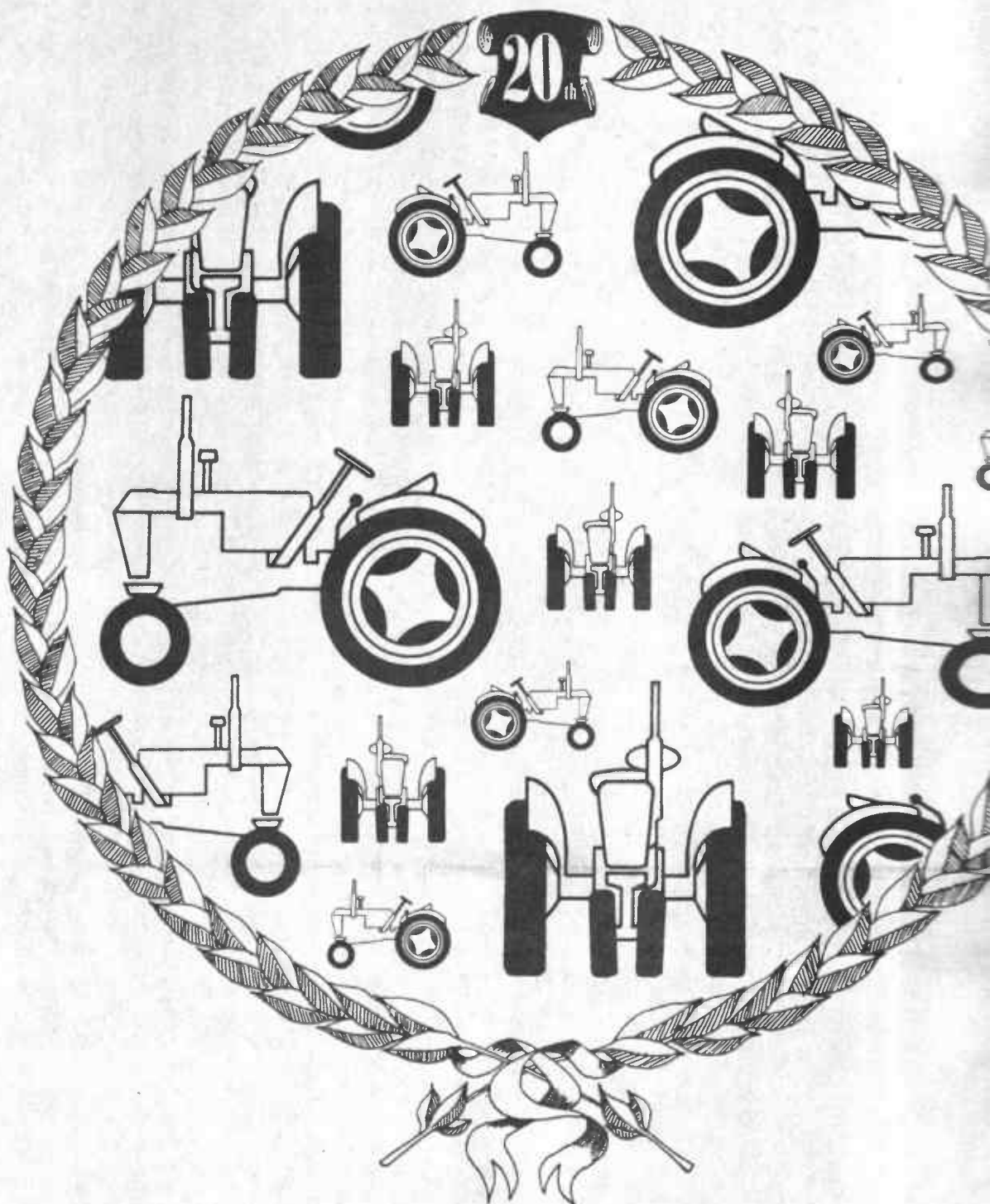

Cotton Harvest On Increase

Cotton harvesting was on the increase in North Mississippi last week, reports Marcus P. Talbot, Jr., Officer in Charge of the USDA Cotton Division Classing Office, Consumer and Marketing Service in Memphis.

Quality of ginnings was somewhat lower than the previous week. There was a substantial increase in the number of Strict Low Middling grades. More than 90 percent of last week's samples were Strict Low Middling or better with staples of 1-1/16 inches and longer. Micronaire readings were mostly in the premium range.

Demand is strong for cotton on country markets. Shippers and direct mill buyers showed increased interest as more new crop cotton became available. Farmers are selling freely at prices offered in some sections and in other sections they continue to hold for higher prices. Prices received by farmers ranged from \$30 to \$40 above support prices. Cottonseed prices to the farmers were mostly \$55 to \$60 per ton.
