Chieftains, Rams Major Attractions In Sweet Potato Bowl

most sporting event of the year will be this Saturday when the Iuka Chieftains and Vardaman Rams in the Sweet Potato Bowl game will make their first appearance in a bowl event.

Grady Ferguson and Bryson Mann have been several weeks shaping up for this spot, which begins with a game at 8 o'clock at the High School Stadium.

Sweet Potato Bowl is being promoted by the Vardaman and Iuka crops. According to the Vardaman Bowl game

will be a major attraction for everyone.

Pregame ceremonies will feature the Vardaman Marching Band and the crowning of the 1968 Sweet Potato Queen, Dianne Bryant. The entire halftime has been set aside for the Iuka High School Marching Band. Chester Cox, director, states that the halftime show will feature precision drills and their own special renditions of the selections from "The Sound of Music."

The kickoff will put two former rivals in the Tombigbee Conference together again after both Iuka and Vardaman have left to play in the Highland Conference and the Big Black

Conference, respectively.

Coach Phil Flynn leads the Rams, the only team to score against N. Carrollton this year: the team that went undefeated with 428 points of their own, giving up only the 7 to Vardaman.

The loss to N. Carrollton was their only defeat this year, placing the Vardaman Rams 2nd in the Big Black Conference, after being the winners of this division for the past two years.

In the Tombigbee Conference, Vardaman tied Calhoun City. Coach Ferguson's team for 7 years, with a final score of 19-19.

"One thing's for certain — there will be a huge crowd and

several scouts there because of the interest in our two teams," Coach Ferguson said. "We want to see as many Iuka fans among this number as possible. Most of all we want to make as good an impression as possible in the first bowl game so that maybe next year we'll get another bid," he added.

Trophies will be awarded at the end of the game to the Best Lineman and the Best Back as well as the big trophy to the winning team.

The Chieftains will have to keep their eyes peeled for the fast action of Quarterback Terry Allen. Allen holds the Big Black Conference record for completing 15 out of 21 passes in the Maben Game for 303

yards and 3 TD's. Allen has a knack for throwing to his ends: Ted Ward and Dewayne Winter and makes good use of it.

The team's leading scorer is Billy Skinner with 84 points and Danny Tedder with 54 points. Tedder is equipped with a talented toe that can boot a 28 yard field goal.

The Rams scored 207 points this year and gave up 137. Their star defensive player is Kenny Hardin, another good man to watch. The team ended with a 7-2-1 record. This will be Vardaman's 5th bowl game.

Larry Cutshall, 150 pound Iuka junior, holds the Highland Conference record for the most passes intercepted with 12 to

his count, and will be of major importance to the Chieftains on Saturday night.

"Our two strongest backs on offense are Ronnie Brown, junior, with 75 points to his record, and Steve Wilson, senior, with 63 points. We've got one boy, Jimmy Smith, who's versatile in both offensive and defensive action. We'll be playing him a good bit along with Larry Cutshall who is an outstanding back on defense," Coach Ferguson related.

"So far we've got an average of 27.7 points per game and only 7.3 given up on defense to other teams," he said.

"Our best boys in the defen-

sive lineup include Barney Hudson, 188 pounds, Kenneth Smith, 165 pounds, and Fred Rutherford, 155 pounds. All 3 boys are seniors and play end, center and guard, respectively. Barney kicks off and has an average of 51.5 yards. He could be our ace in the hole," Coach added.

"I'd like to take this time to tell everyone how much I appreciate the help they've given me in my first coaching year at Iuka. It's meant a lot to me and speaking for myself, Coach Mann, and the Chieftain Squad, I'd like to add that we're going to give everything we've got Saturday night to win this game for you!"

Alertness Of Groceryman Aids In Catching Thieves

The series of burglaries that has besieged Iuka businesses for the past two months was brought to an end this week with the capture of four Alabama men. One man has admitted to breaking into and burglarizing 12 buildings.

In Tishomingo county jail are Gary Watson, 20 years old of Barton, Bobby Harold Fountain, 17, of Florence, Billy Ray Fountain, 19, and Bobby Joe Fountain, 24, both of Cherokee. Watson, a two-time loser with terms in Alabama's Kilby prison, admits to 12 separate charges of breaking, entering and burglarizing buildings in Iuka. His closest accomplice, Bobby Harold Fountain, admits to 3 charges of breaking and entering.

In a preliminary hearing Wednesday morning, Watson was bound over to the Tishomingo County Grand Jury and bail was set at \$5,000.00. Bobby Harold Fountain had bail set at \$2,500 and was bound over to the grand jury. Billy Ray and Bobby Joe Fountain were likewise bound over to the grand jury with bails set at \$500.00 each. All are in jail pending securing of bonds.

Watson claims credit for the

burglaries. His statement corroborates the statements of all the Fountains that Billy Ray and Bobby Joe had nothing to do with the breakins. They furnished the transportation to Iuka, according to their stories.

The first conclusive leads to breaking the series of burglaries came Monday night when Herman Gann, owner and operator of Gann's Liberty super markets here in Iuka, found prowlers at his store on highway 25-south. Gann shot at the intruders who took flight into the weeds and undergrowth along Indian Creek that flows near the shopping center.

While Mr. Gann was chasing the burglars, Mrs. Gann was calling the police. The law fanned out in the area and flushed and captured Bobby Harold Fountain. Search continued for the other prowler.

In the meantime, Watson (the other burglar at Gann's supermarket) worked his way across the highway and climbed up on the roof of the Johnny Smith grocery and watched the lawmen as they continued the search for him in the weeds. Tiring of his condition and getting colder because he got wet

when he waded the creek, according to Watson, he jumped down off the Smith roof, worked his way up highway 72 to the Health Department building where he proceeded to break out a window and went inside. At the Health Department he took two transistor radios and about \$21.00 in cash.

After this break-in Monday night, Watson made his way back toward Cherokee, stopping at the Hilltop cafe at the state line. Later, officers caught him about two miles this side of Cherokee.

According to Judge Albert Rhodes, before whom the temporary hearing was held, Watson is in serious trouble. Bobby Harold Fountain is also in bad trouble but not as serious as that of Watson. Less serious charges are against Billy Ray Fountain and Bobby Joe Fountain. Bonds were made lighter on condition the last two named cooperate in giving evidence before the grand jury that will meet the first Monday in January.

Businesses to which Watson and Bobby Harold Fountain admit entering or attempting to enter are McBride's meat plant, the Iuka school, and Liberty Supermarket.

Additional businesses which Watson admits to burglarizing are the Health department, the school, W. S. Brown & Co. (\$607 in one haul), Iuka Building Supply, Parson service station, Bugg service station, Mill Creek Marine Hardware and a first attempt at Liberty supermarket on highway 25.

Officers estimate that in excess of \$826.00 was taken from all the businesses these men admit to burglarizing.

Other places that have been broken into which these men claim they did not do are the Power Association office, Yellow Creek Watershed office, WVOM Radio station, Sam Curtis service station and Claude Curtis cafe.

It is well to note here that through the ingenuity of Herman Gann, this group of thieves has been brought before the law. Upon being alerted the police and sheriff's department took over and proceeded with the catches. People of the area should be grateful to the man who manages to be at the right place at the right time.

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HOWE, NOW, AND THE SECOND FIDDLE

Imagine a new-born youngster. There is within that brand-new child the potential — whatever it may be — to run 100 yards in a given number of seconds. But if that child is not trained properly he will never reach that potential. And however well trained he is, he will never surpass it. That is IQ: Potential.

In Ethel Barrymore's words, "That's all there is; there isn't any more".

Now, then, two items:

The first relates to that world wonder, U. S. Education Commissioner Harold Howe. The second drops a bit in the scale of things, having to do with the wife of a Howe assistant.

Howe says American colleges are "sorting-out institutions serving the 'haves' and ignoring the 'have-nots'". What he wants of them is a more flexible system of judging the calibre of prospective students so that a greater number of "disadvantaged" pupils can get under the academic tent.

In plain English, Howe argues that American colleges and universities should, willy-nilly, change their standards so that more Negroes may qualify for admission.

"If a student comes from a deprived background", he says, "the college (should) read into his record and learn to identify his talent and ability even though his test scores do not show (talent and ability) in conventional ways".

Well, sir, Howe's thesis is inescapable: There is no marked difference in the native ability of races. Moreover, his argument runs, if the tests educators have evolved over the years demonstrate this to be a foolish thesis, then, those tests should be jettisoned and some unidentified "reading into" should replace them. A sort of swami act is called for, a rebirth, as it were; come one, come all.

Let me give you a fact:

It takes an IQ of 110 to do acceptable college work. Only one Negro — vis-a-vis 30 Whites — in 100 has such an IQ. (Source: Garrett, Henry E., *Testing For Teachers*, American Book Co., 1965, p. 58).

That being so, the only way for Howe's proposal to be made a reality is to lower the standards of our colleges and universities to

something approaching the level of Negro colleges.

And that leads to Item Two: Mrs. Joseph Froomkin, who uses the pen name, Maya Pines, is the wife of one of Howe's assistants. Mrs. Froomkin has written a book, *Revolution In Education*, in which she says: "It is actually possible to raise a child's intelligence by 20 points, as a conservative estimate".

If that were so, and if by "intelligence," Mrs. Froomkin means IQ (Intelligence Quotient), Commissioner Howe's thesis would be on solid ground.

But it is not true. There is no way under the sun to raise anyone's IQ, not by a tittle, not legitimately. One's ability, yes; one's potential, no. And potential is what is meant by IQ.

Now, that fact is such common knowledge among educators that Mrs. Froomkin, you will notice, avoids the letters IQ; she says intelligence. And what she means by that is anybody's guess.

If she refers to learning or knowledge, certainly a person's intelligence can be increased by 20 per cent, particularly if the person is an ignorant to begin with.

But that isn't what Mrs. Froomkin's words lead one to believe. The lady is no fool; she is a professional educator involved in this Headstart shenanigan, and is acutely aware — or should be — of the difference between intelligence and intelligence quotient.

Why, then, write that way?

A person would have to guess at that, too. But it is striking that her statement rounds out the boss's argument: If, by an improved environment a person's IQ can be increased, then, there can be no reason for maintaining college standards.

Ah, but if it is not possible — and it is not possible — to increase a person's potential, then, the argument falls.

But no matter. These people, first, are ideologues and only secondarily educators, therefore, they argue and write to fit their ideology. If, in the doing, the truth is shrouded, that's the way it will have to be.

Thus, the art of learning is being made an unfunny joke.

INFLATION: THE CRUELEST TAX

While talking out of one side of its mouth about the need for economies, the Johnson administration constantly promotes costly programs that add to the fires of inflation in this country.

This inflation, resulting from federal action, is worse than any tax load the government has placed on the people. Inflation is the cruelest tax, for it hits hardest the people who are least able to pay it. Inflation robs the people, and they often do not realize what is happening.

Senator John J. Williams of Delaware, a watchdog of the U. S. Treasury, recently spoke out in vigorous manner concerning inflation and its causes. Charging the White House with displaying little, if any, concern with the tremendous deficits it has consistently built up for the past five years, Senator Williams said: "Not only has the administration been encouraging the expansion of new spending schemes which were initiated by its Great Society Bureaucracy, but the White House has consistently been urging substantially increased expenditures on its own initiative."

The Senator pointed out, by way of example, that the Johnson administration is recommending a social security bill which would pump over \$6 billion extra cash into the economy in calendar year 1968. Only \$1.3 billion of this would be covered by revenue raised during the year. Under the White House plan, the payroll taxes to pay for the other \$5 billion would not go into effect until after the 1968 presidential election.

This sort of federal spending is presented by the administration as a generous gesture to the people. What is ignored is that the government hasn't any money to give away but that which has been extracted from the taxpayers.

The liberals in Washington will reply that wages will rise in 1968. So they may. But the other side of the coin is that the cost of living also is rising. The lesson of history is that costs outrun wage hikes in an inflationary situation.

People are going to be hurt because of the Johnson's administration's refusal to clamp down on nonessential federal spending. Thus it is tremendously important that Americans — factory and farm workers, white collar and blue collar employees and small business — realize that they are tossed on a treadmill when the White House allows inflation to proceed.

The average American housewife knows the score. She knows that inflation means

higher grocery prices — higher prices indeed for every item used in running a household and keeping a family together.

The truth is that inflation cuts deepest into the budgets of citizens with moderate income. They haven't any investments that they can revise as a check against inflationary trends. While the government says it is conferring a boon on "the people," there are deeper and deeper social security cuts in take-home pay and higher prices on essential items for home and children.

Retired persons are especially vulnerable to the cruel tax of inflation. Senator Williams declared on this point:

"Millions of our retired citizens, who are living on fixed incomes, social security, government and private pensions, life insurance policies, savings accounts, and so forth, have been pauperized as a result of this deliberately planned Johnson inflation represented by the increased cost of living, or the diminishing purchasing power of the dollar."

What the country needs, to be sure, is a bona fide reduction in expenditures, not any claptrap about turning the lights off in the White House. Cuts in spending are needed all along the line. Yet even the most modest efforts to curb spending creates a storm among the liberals. Thus when some Congressmen sought to deny a wage hike to employees of the Office of Economic Opportunity, the boondoggling "war on poverty" agency, there was a hue and cry in protest.

The American people already are paying for years of fiscal mismanagement by the Johnson administration. The domestic and international giveaways, which have proved to be futile as genuine solutions to real problems, have robbed the American people of needed resources. These programs have caused a swift and dangerous inflation. Only determined braking action by Congress will relieve the American people of the inflation that is the cruelest tax upon their productivity and well-being.

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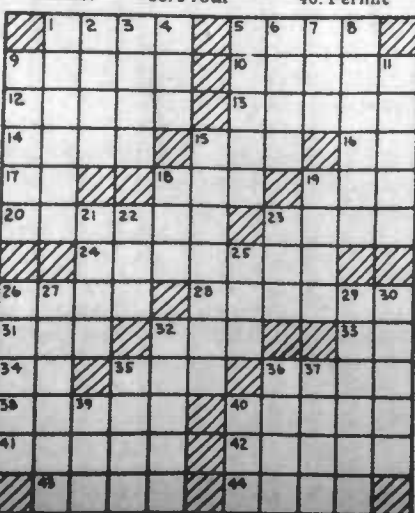

Belmont Attendance Center . . .

FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

by W. W. Grisham

The best way to evaluate your school and its program is to take a realistic approach and investigation of your library and the available reading and reference material.

Last week, in our weekly interview on WVOM in Iuka, we had as our guest your Librarian here at the Belmont Attendance Center. She, of course, is Mrs. Vaudie Marshall, who is originally from Belmont, and is quite naturally, a well qualified person in every respect. She was graduated from MSCW in Columbus, Mississippi with a BA degree in English. She continued her professional training and preparation in Library Science at Florence State College, Florence, Alabama; University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, Alabama; and University of Mississippi, Oxford; and then received a Master's Degree in Secondary Education at Auburn University, Auburn, Alabama. She has had a number of years experience as an English instructor and as librarian. These qualifications and background certainly place her in a respected position as a leader and a person responsible for our fine library and its facilities.

In an annual report and inventory made to the State Department of Education in Jackson, Mississippi, for accreditation purposes and repeated in our radio report, we presently have approximately 3000 books on our shelves in all categories. At present we have an order placed to add to the existing collection that exceeds \$1000.00.

In the area of dictionaries, four unabridged, twenty abridged, two biographical, one synonyms and antonyms and one rare Rofet's Thesaurus are on the shelves. Truly, any definition or pronunciation, diocritical marking and reference can be found within this collection. Included in the reference area, and readily accessible to all students, are six Atlases, seven sets of Encyclopedias and thirty-one additional and specifically selected reference books for any area or subject.

In the Elementary division of our fine school are 1582 library books distributed throughout the six grades. These books are in our classroom, under the direct supervision and direction of the classroom teacher. Also included in this area are six sets of Childcraft, one Science Library, one Children's Hour, one Wonder World of Science and fifteen sets of up-to-date and Modern Encyclopedias. This assures each classroom of at least two appropriate sets per room. This should easily guarantee the needed books and reading material to every child, in every grade, throughout the entire enrollment.

Naturally we are studying and analyzing our needs and weaknesses daily and adjusting

wherever and whenever means and support provides.

The high school central library has an area of 3,330 square feet, with a seating capacity of ninety students. Fortunately, the facility is never fully occupied — with a maximum of sixty five one period and as few as nineteen on another. The department includes two annex divisions, which include our collection of thirty five weekly and monthly magazines and an art section, and a work room to make necessary repairs to books and store magazines.

We certainly are quite proud of our library, but definitely are not complacent. Plans are already underway to add a new circulation desk, some additional shelves for our ever-increasing number of books, a new filing cabinet, and minor equipment to supplement the present inventory.

In the immediate future, we hope to add the latest feature to our offering micro film. It is recognized as the most economic and suitable method of building a permanent collection of back file periodicals. Storage space is definitely saved; it costs less than binding and is certainly easier to study and use. Also expected is a more adequate audio-visual department for the entire school. Experts agree that 70 to 90 per cent of our learning comes thru vision.

Mrs. Marshall and I extend to all of you a cordial welcome to come visit your school and particularly its nice library with its facilities at your earliest convenience.

Julienne-Style Meats

When a recipe calls for meat cut in julienne-style, place several slices together on a chopping board; cut through them all at one time to save precious minutes in food preparation.

Vitamin Retention

Pan-frying is an excellent method of retaining vitamins at a high level. One reason is that the cooking process is relatively short. Another reason is that fat rather than water is used in the preparation. Some of the vitamins are water-soluble which means that they dissolve away when water is used in the

Pan-frying is a good method for the thinner cuts of meat as well as for the one or two serving portions which must be prepared. Use it for petite or breakfast steaks, smoked or fresh pork chops, any of the different varieties of lamb chops or ham.

Breading Meats

To make breading cling to meats, dip the meat first in flour, then in the egg and finally in bread crumb mixture.

Quick Supper Ideas

Liver sausage can be mashed with a fork, seasoned with a bit of finely chopped onion and horseradish, then mixed with corn flakes. Shape into patties and wrap in bacon. Place on a rack in broiling pan. Broil 5

minutes on each side until bacon becomes crisp. This is delightful served with hot, fluffy rice (instant variety) and an asparagus salad.

Canned baked beans and pork will heat quickly for a snappy supper right in a saucepan. Add some canned Vienna-style sausages, drained, to the beans if you like this to be meaty.

Place a layer of instant mashed or leftover potatoes between two slices of canned luncheon meat and heat in a 350°F. oven 20 minutes for a quick meat-potato "sandwich."

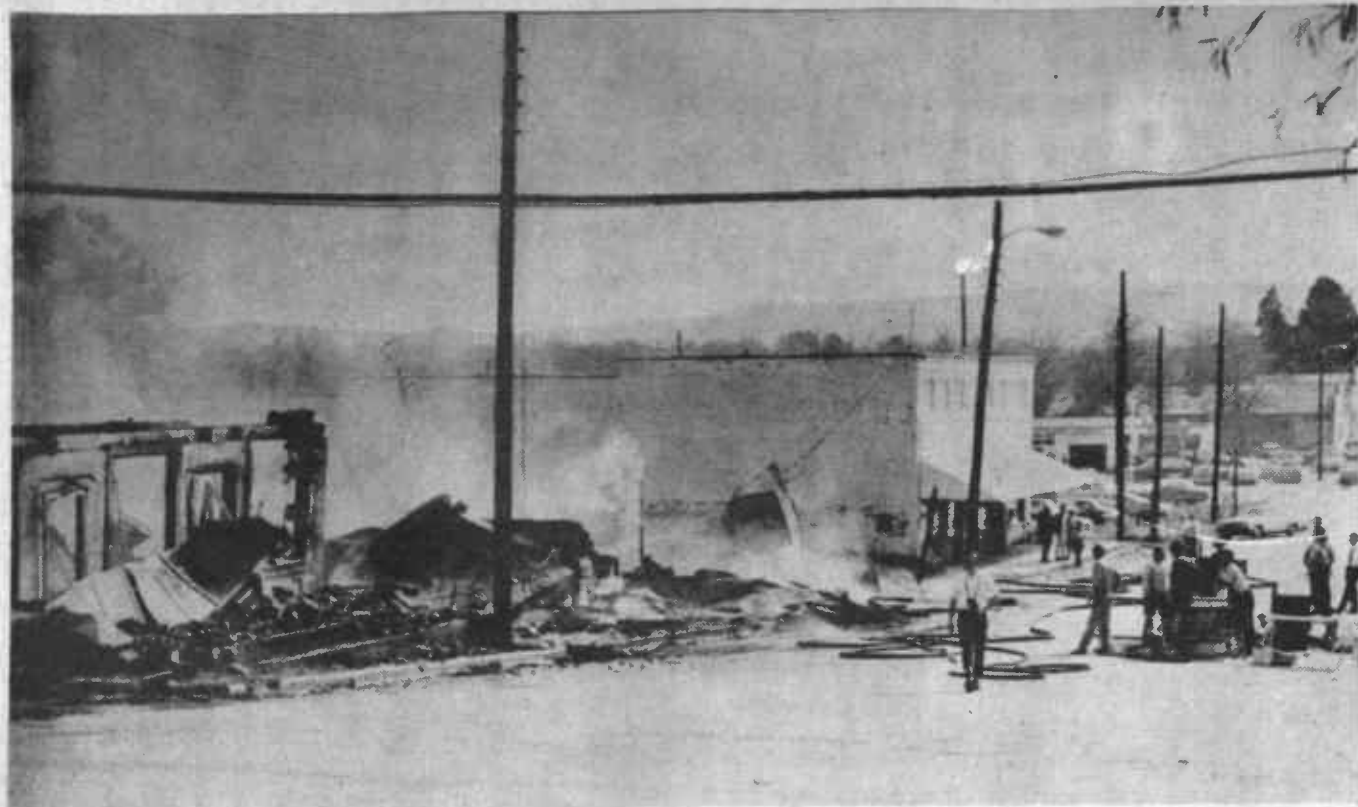

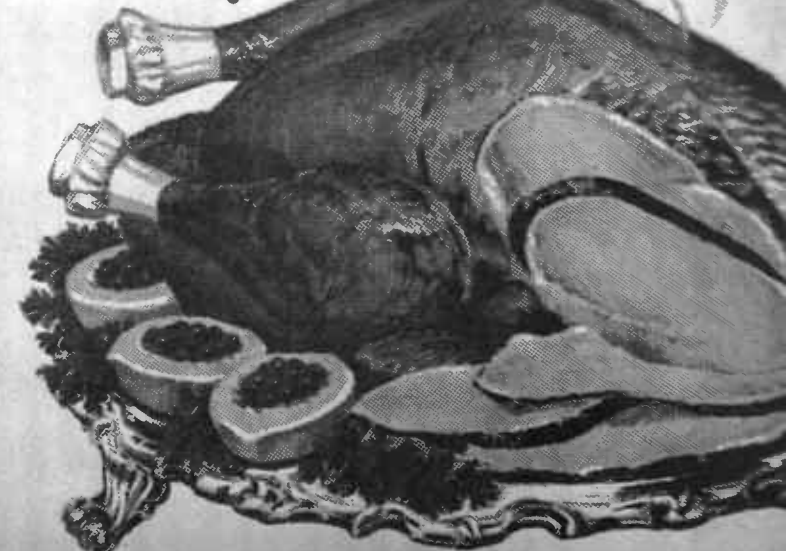

Dog Without Bark Likes Yodeling For His Masters

Have you heard the latest? "George and Lucille have a dog that doesn't bark!" — That's the latest and it's true.

George and Lucille Page are the owners of a unique breed of dog, a Basenji with a pedigree a mile long. His name is Wejam's Star Gazer. His sire is Ch. Miacor's Zuchil. His dam is Bobels Leprechaun of Bojac, both ribbon winning animals. Wejam's Star Gazer is just affectionately "Star" and the true delight of his masters as both George and Lucille can attest.

The Basenji is a small, lean, fast dog, primarily owned in this country for show, although Basenji Field Trials are being organized and more and more are using them as hunting dogs.

The males weigh about 24 pounds and average 17 inches in height. The predominant color of the male is black with white and tan markings. Most of the females are red with white and tan markings. They average 20 pounds and stand 16 inches high.

George and Lucille purchased Star from Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Gamble of Arlington, Tennessee. According to reports, this particular breed is so rare in these parts that the owners must be individually suited and matched with the Basenji before the breeders will allow the sale to be transacted.

There are only a few known handlers of the Basenji dogs in the state of Mississippi including some in Meridian, Biloxi, and Pascagoula in addition to those in nearby Memphis.

The Basenji is an African dog and is one of the oldest known species of dog on record. Pictures and carvings in stone have been found in Pharaoh's tombs in Egypt, and one painting dating many years before the birth of Christ shows a number of Basenjis in a scene with one of the rulers of that time.

In a recent edition of "The Basenji" magazine, this information is related, "... The Masai hunters of Africa use the fast, silent dogs as bait to taunt the Lions out of their dens. The hunters, armed with spears and wooden shields, go out in groups of ten, accompanied by four dogs which lead the hunt. ...

"When hunting lions, the Masai send the dogs ahead to look out for the game. The hunters form a human horseshoe, and squat low in the grass next to the bush where the lion's lair is located. The lion, unsuspecting of the trap, is teased by the dogs and is drawn in anger from his protective cover to pursue the dogs. The dogs, in turn, lead the lion into the human horseshoe. Then the Masai stand up, yelling and making a terrific to-do to confuse the lion. The circle is then closed and each man drives his spear into the lion by throwing it from a distance."

Not having the wildlife game as found in Africa, the Basenjis in our country have been found to be highly proficient in hunting rabbit and squirrel.

On one occasion a hunter, with one of his Basenjis was scouting for squirrels when the

Basenji found the trail on the ground and with the surety of an old Coon Hound, proceeded to unravel it and rear up on a big Jack oak, native to Missouri. After looking and waiting for a while, it was believed that the squirrel had traveled the branches to other trees. Both Basenji and hunter were sitting on the ground when the little 'Senji took off at a dead run and began to circle a tree about 30 feet away. As the squirrel moved to watch the dog, the hunter spotted the game and bagged him. "Whether the Basenji heard or scented the squirrel, I know not, for they are adept at both as well as having good vision. I, myself, have seen them discern a movement two hundred feet away, and at a dead run give chase," the hunter related in the Basenji publication.

"We know for a fact that the Basenji is a smart dog because of some of the things our Star has done," George Page said, as he began the story of "Star, the Teacher."

"Just after we brought Star home, the little Basenji struck up a strong friendship with the Anderton children's tabby cat. Earlier, I had designed a small swinging door on the glassed in

back porch that the Basenji could operate himself," he went on. "Star could be seen outside begging the cat to come inside the back porch through the little door. He coaxed and teased and even would run back and forth through the door to show the cat how to use it but the cat just sat and watched. Finally, Star developed a plan to get the cat in himself. He would run through the door fast enough to make it swing big so that he could catch it and hold it open for the cat to come through. After about 2 weeks the cat caught on to the idea and now uses the door himself." (As a matter of fact, the fat cat was sitting on the back porch washing his face and waiting for Star when the photographer went 'round back to see the Basenji's house entrance.)

"An amusing sight is to be in the kitchen when I'm cooking and see Star and the cat. They jump up on my dryer on the back porch and peep through the kitchen door to watch," Lucille added. "I've never known another type of dog to be so clean. The Basenji acts like a cat in cleaning himself and he has absolutely no doggy odor. ... and those almond shaped

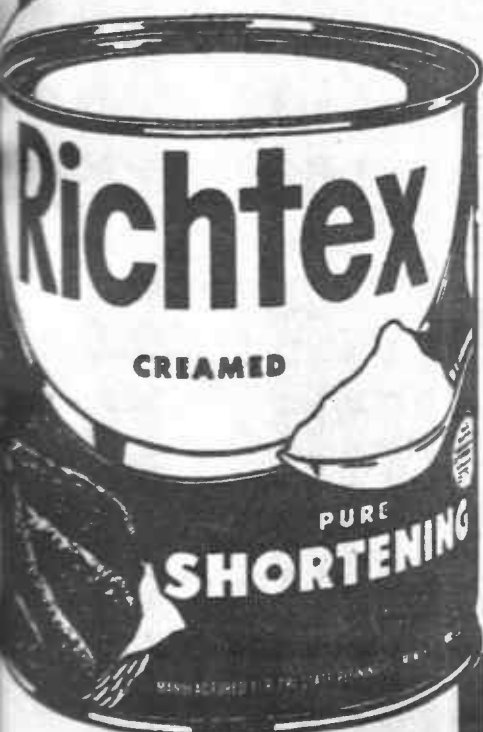

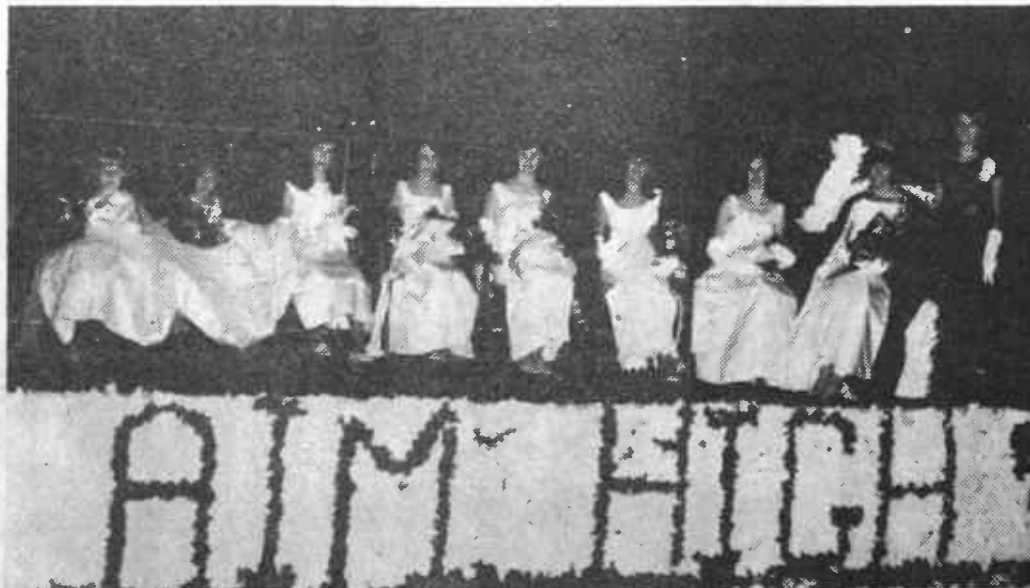

Water System Funds

L. E. Skinner, president of the Midway-Pleasant Hill Water Association, states that a certificate of public convenience and necessity has been granted to construct a \$147,000 FHA-financed water system for the association. This announcement is made jointly with the Mississippi Public Service Commission.

This will be Tishomingo County's third non-profit water system and will bring the state's total to 230 at an investment of approximately 37 million dollars, according to the Commission chairman, D. W. Snyder.

The basic plan layout of this water system will consist of approximately 92,000 feet of water main lines that will interconnect 130 families in a 16 sq. mile area. This system will differ from the majority of other systems in that the association will purchase water from the town of Iuka and will, therefore, have no producing water well of its own.

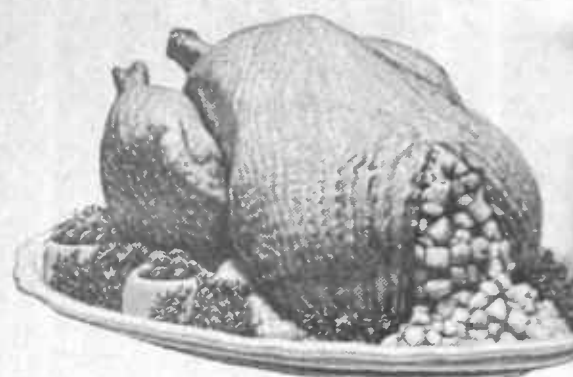
