Burnsville Water Bonds Election To Be Dec. 15

Voters of the Town of Burns-
ville will go to the polls on Fri-
day, December 15, to cast bal-
lots on an additional \$10,000 to
pay for certain costs in the ex-
pansion and improvement of
the town's waterworks system.

Earlier this year, a bond elec-
tion in the amount of \$127,000
was passed to pay for the build-
ing of the water system. Esti-
mated construction costs by the
engineer, T. O. Mabry, were
low and the expense ran up to
\$138,000. Other additional ex-
pense was a treatment plant
that was necessary due to the
fact that the water supply was
not good.

To pay for the water treat-
ment plant, application was
made to the Department of Hou-
sing and Urban Development
for an additional loan of \$10,000
in order for there to be enough
funds available to construct the
project as originally planned
plus the treatment plant.

The current \$10,000 bond is-
sue is the loan which was au-
thorized by the Department of
Housing and Urban Develop-
ment and it was made in order
that the treatment plant could
be constructed. These bonds are
revenue bonds just like the first
bonds that were authorized in
the amount of \$127,000. The
system must pay for the bonds

if the bonds are to be paid, and
property and the general credit
of the Town of Burnsville is not
pledged for the payment of the
bonds.

The additional indebtedness
of \$10,000 has already been in-
curred by the Burnsville Town
Board and if voters at the elec-
tion do not authorize the issua-
nce of the bonds, then the
Town will have to resort to its
general credit to raise the mon-
ey.

"In all probability, the Town
will have to raise its assessed
valuation and levy additional
taxes to pay the debt if the
bond election is not passed," a
spokesman for the town said.

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GROWING SUPPORT FOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS

Anyone who carries a lonely torch is grateful for even the least encouragement. So, when forces of significance express similar sentiments, the torch bearer is apt to come unbought, his gratitude is that great.

My reference is to an expressed personal attitude on the concept of public schools. I'm again it. I think our public-school systems are the work of the devil, are casebook socialism, and are doomed to eternal malfunction, student torment, and ultimate chaos.

And now comes support for my opinion from two highly-placed sources.

Admiral Ben Moreell, founder of the Seabees of World War II, and chairman-founder of Americans for Constitutional Action, writes to say that over the past 30 years he has worn out a dozen sets of larynx carrying the same argument.

Thank you, sir. Glad to be in your navy.

I must confess, though, I find no surprise in Ben Moreell's letter. Had I given it a thought, I would have surmised his attitude since I opine from principle and principle is the pole star of the Admiral's life.

But Barron's! Glory be. Barron's, you may know, is the most respected of the nation's business and financial weeklies. And to find it elaborating the public-school systems is surprising. Yet, that is just what it is doing. Recently, it ran a lead piece with the head, "Harmful Monopoly", and subheaded, "The Public School System Should Be Broken Up".

How true. And how commendable of Barron's to go outside its immediate purview to touch on so tender a subject.

I can't do better than to quote the heart of its article:

"Public education in this country...has come perilously close to failure. Nor, despite the strident claims of teachers' unions, is money the answer. Measured either in dollars or as a percentage of the gross national product, the U.S. in recent years has vastly expanded its outlays on schools without noticeable gains in knowledge. Although New York City spends more per pupil than virtually any other metropolis, everyone who can afford to, from the

Mayor to the local boycott leader, sends his children to private school. What's basically wrong is that most people have no such freedom of choice. By and large education remains a state monopoly, which, like most establishments of the kind, tends increasingly to be run less for the benefit of the citizen than for that of the staff. Lacking effective competition, public schools have become a privileged sanctuary for mediocrity, where seniority, not ability, governs pay and advancement. Bureaucracy does well to get a passing grade in life adjustment; only a system of merits and demerits, risks and rewards, can hope to achieve excellence". Amen.

Whenever I write on the subject of public schools, inevitably I get a letter from some parent who nervously accuses me—what-ever the actual words put down—of trying to "destroy education". Not likely. I could do with a bit more of it myself. What I want to achieve is a system of education built around individual initiative. Being unable to have that, I would accept Barron's tacit solution:

"(A) tiny group of scholars who oppose collectivism...urge a switch from public to private schools...Under (their) scheme the state would continue to enforce standards and school attendance through some kind of voucher system, it would also finance universal schooling. However...parents would be free to patronize privately owned and operated schools of their own choice".

That proposal is not perfect by any means but, if effected, it would result in a system better than the system we have, one that would be inestimably better than the system in the offing.

I refer to a system in the offing because of U.S. Commissioner of Education Harold Howe, II. He tells us the government, by the fall of 1969, will have destroyed the South's traditional dual public-school system. Howe urges in its stead something he calls educational parks and I call circus tents.

So, there is hope for my lonely crusade. It isn't likely parents will send their children to a circus—not for academic purposes.

EDUCATIONAL COMPETITION

Bearing in mind the threatened mass strike of Florida school teachers if the Governor doesn't seek greatly enlarged funds for pay raises, the taxpayers should appreciate the danger that lies in the public school monopoly of education.

Americans, who have become aware of the menace posed by union monopolies in many areas of national life, generally do not realize that publicly-run schools form a monopoly in the education field in many parts of the country. "Barron's Financial Weekly" recently performed a public service by pointing out this monopolistic condition and citing the evils that result from it.

One of the reasons that a number of U. S. communities are having trouble with teacher strikes and boycotts is that the public school monopoly has been taken for granted. It is widely assumed that the present way of spending public funds for elementary and high school education is the only way to spend them. This is not the case however. Practical alternatives exist and simply await exploration by progressive communities.

In considering the public school monopoly, the meaning of the term should be understood in the specific situation. It means that in most American communities parents of moderate income don't have an option in choosing a school for their children. Either the children go to public school or they don't get an education. Church schools are few, except in a limited number of areas, and private schools often are prohibitively expensive except for parents with very good incomes.

It is no wonder, then, that the administrators and teachers in public schools—no matter how good and sincere they may be—feel that they enjoy a monopoly.

If there were only one company in the United States manufacturing automobiles, the administrators of that company understandably would have a high and mighty attitude toward the people who wanted to obtain automobiles. They would have a take-it or leave-it attitude. Basically, that is the trouble with the educational bureaucracy in this country. They believe that the public doesn't have any redress, and, as a matter of hard fact, it doesn't in most instances. If a parent isn't satisfied with public schooling, he can't get anything better without heavy financial sacrifice.

Yet this shouldn't be the case. The taxpayers should have options in schooling arrangements. Consider how much better American automobiles are because

there is competition among manufacturers. Consider, too, how much better the public schools would be if other types of schools had more support from school patrons.

"Barron's Financial Weekly," in discussing the need for competition in the elementary and high school education field, cited the possibility of public assistance to parents so that they could make their own choice of the schools they wanted their children to attend. In effect, the parents would receive a stated amount in public funds, and then would assign those school funds to the school of their choice.

This principle is a familiar and accepted one on the level of higher education. The G. I. Bill of Rights worked this way after World War II, and is working that way today for veterans of the Vietnam war. The veteran student has been financially assisted, but he has freedom of choice in the college he attends.

Several years ago, a few Southern states tried to enact similar legislation under the tuition grant program. Again, the idea was to give parents freedom of choice. The plan had little success at the time because of fierce national and pressure group opposition. The pressure for forced integration was very strong, and the states didn't have adequate opportunity to make the case for tuition grants in a climate of calm and fairness.

Now, however, the time may be approaching for a fresh attempt to establish tuition scholarships as a basic principle of American education. As the ed-

ucation monopoly gets more and more out of hand, with teacher strikes and boycotts growing in number and frequency, the public may be ready to break up this monopoly and let parents make their own decisions as to where they want to send their children, using funds the taxpayers have supplied.

A tuition scholarship plan, in truth, would help, not hurt, the public schools for it would supply the vital ingredient of competition that is now absent from the educational scene.

WHAT IS THE ANSWER

A: Eminent scholars have rarely had training in teaching methods and are as helpless as an eminent scholar who is asked to diagnose a probable cause. Knowledge is never a substitute for training. The scholar is often interested only in the regard teaching as a waste of time.

CHANGE

Never underestimate your ability to change the world in which you live. You can do it if you try.

Among the great population of this country, only a few individuals in each field of endeavor achieve national fame. A few men in politics, science, religion and other activities become known around the world. Some indelibly inscribe their names in the pages of history.

Yet there is something to be achieved by the average individual. Each of us has some effect on the world in which we live. It matters not if one never travels more than a hundred miles from the spot where he was born. He can change the world—at least, that small part of it in which he lives.

You can change the world with a smile. You can do it with a good deed. A helping hand. A kind word. A visit to a sick friend.

You can do it because it takes, sometimes, a little effort. Extend this effort and you have brought about a change. Something good was done, that would never have been done, had not you set forth to do it.

It is a small thing. Yet, if enough of us worked at it, we could change more and more little parts of the world. We might even start a chain reaction.

Postal Patrons Must Have Correct Address

Postmasters urge the postal patrons of Tishomingo County to be sure to use the correct address on their letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

Millions of letters and packages going overseas have been delayed because they were insufficiently addressed. One of the biggest problems has been the failure of persons to include the very important 5-digit APO or FPO number in the military address. Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

Of the more than 9 million

pieces of mail delayed in delivery last year, 3½ million pieces failed to include this important number. Improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper addresses.

As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 per cent over 4 million pounds above last year every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid delivery to its destination.

Listed are 4 essential elements to an overseas military address: 1. Serviceman's identity — grade, full name, service number; 2. His military unit, complete; 3. Gateway postoffice, New York, San Francisco or Seattle; 4. APO or FPO, a 5-digit number; when any of these elements is missing, the letter or package will be delayed in delivery.

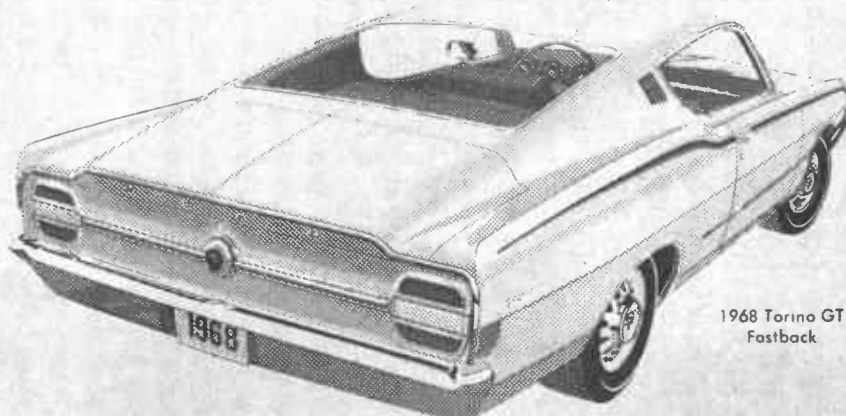

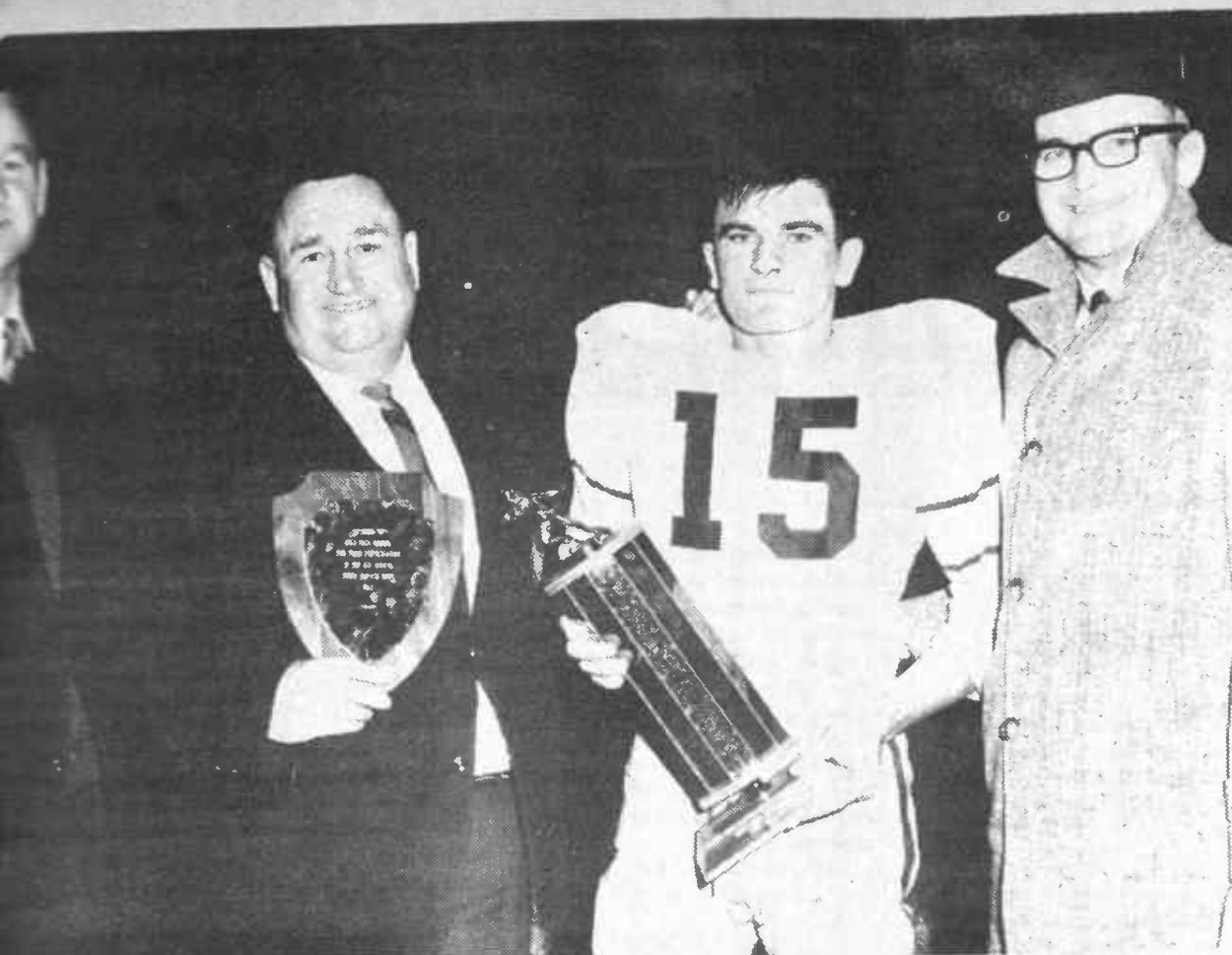

'68 Cotton Quotas Up For Farmer's Vote; By Mail

Cotton growers again this year will vote by mail on Marketing Quotas for their 1968 Upland Cotton Crop. Ballots will be mailed to each cotton farmer by November 27. The deadline for returning the voted ballots to the ASCS Office will be December 8. "All producers who shared in the 1967 Cotton Crop, or its proceeds, and owners and operators of allotment farms where no cotton was planted will be eligible to vote," E. N. Allen, ASCS office manager, stated.

In discussing the upcoming election, Mr. Allen gave the following facts for farmers:

The basic choices of the vote — First: If at least two-thirds of the growers, who vote in the Referendum, approve of quotas (that is vote YES) the quotas and acreage diversion program will be in effect for the 1968 Upland Cotton Crop. Price Support Loans will be available at a rate of 20.25 cents per pound for Middling 1-inch cotton. Marketing Quota penalties will apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm. In addition the 1968 Program will provide Diversion Payments (at 10 7/8 cents per pound on the farm's projected yield for the basic diversion — 5 percent of the farm allotment and 6 cents per pound for additional — Voluntary — Di-

version of up to 30 percent of the farm allotment) and Price Support Payment of 12.24 cents per pound for the acreage planted within the farm's Domestic Allotment (65 percent of the farm's Effective Allotment) to farmers who divert cotton acreage.

Second — On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers who vote oppose the Quotas (vote no) there will be no quotas, no Diversion Program providing price support payments will be made to farmers at all. Farmers will only receive 50 percent of parity if they plant within their allotment.

Mr. Allen stresses the importance of each cotton farmer casting a ballot in the upcoming Referendum.

Allotments

1968 Allotments and Yields will be mailed to the farmers on November 17, 1967. Take special note of these allotments and yields and if you have any questions and need any explanation, be sure to visit the ASC Office within the time limit on this notice.

Skip-Row Planting

Skip-row planting of cotton for 1968 will be permitted. There is a change in this program this year. You will be allowed to plant in skip-row pat-

terns like we did in 1965. For example: — Plant 2 rows and skip 1 row. It will count 66 2/3 percent cotton and 33 1/3 percent idle. Plant 2 rows and skip 2 rows will count 50 percent cotton and 50 percent idle. Plant 4 rows and skip 4 rows will be 50 percent cotton and 50 percent idle. NOTE: The 4 row skip-row pattern is the only one that you can divert the 4 idle rows. Any strip that can be diverted must be 4 rows wide.

Feed Grain Program

There will be a Feed Grain Program for the 1968 Program Year. As of this date, no information has been received as to payment rates and yields. "We have been informed that our Feed Grain Program will be a better Program this year over last year," Mr. Allen said.

For further information, you are invited to visit the ASCS Office in Iuka.
