Co. Teams Will Play In Tourney

Coach Billy Tidwell of Tishomingo, states that county teams will be seeing plenty of court action as the Tishomingo Invitational Tournament opens tonight (Thursday) at the Tishomingo gymnasium.

The first game gets underway at 6 o'clock for a 3-game series. On Friday and Saturday nights the games will begin at 7 o'clock for 2-game dockets. Admission has been set at 75¢ for adults and 50¢ for students.

Nice trophies will be awarded to the winning boys team and the winning girls team. Officials for the tournament will be Lynn Nash and Eddie Martindale.

The bracket for the tournament is given below. Other games set for the early part of next week include one at Iuka on Tuesday night with the A's and B's seeing action with the Tishomingo teams in the Iuka gymnasium. Also on December 5, the same night, Burnsville will travel to the south end of the county where Belmont will be the host team, keeping the competition inside the county.

To Employ Men Only, Operation Starts In '68

Public announcement is made today that a new manufacturing plant employing all men will locate in the Town of Belmont. Name of the firm is Kaydee Metal Co., Incorporated, of Chicago, Illinois.

Principal owner of the firm is Sol Rubin. Items to be manufactured are metal legs and parts for dinette suites, and metal parts for office furniture. Metal parts of other types of furniture including couches, swivel chairs and other pieces will also be manufactured when the demand arises.

The Kaydee Metal Co. plant will be located on an industrial site north of Belmont and east of the I. C. railroad. The firm will be situated in a new

preabricated building consisting of 60,000 square floor feet with four loading and unloading bays. Cost for construction of the building will be paid for with the issue of \$400,000.00 in revenue bonds which means that repaid by the company on the building will be used to retire the bonds.

Belmont Mayor Zeke Clark stated that no taxes will be increased to pay for the bonds as the rent money will do that. Certain types of machinery will be included in the bond issue.

Mr. Rubin states that all men will be employed in the new plant and all will be employed from the local area. Only ones to come to Belmont from the Chicago location are Mr. Rubin and two employees, a head machinist and a tool and die man.

Mayor Clark states that it is hoped that 125 men will be employed within the first 6 months. "Initial employment is expected

to be slow," he said, due to the fact that the entire manufacturing plant will have to be moved a portion at a time in order to keep up production. After all the plant is in operation in Belmont employment should increase," he said. Mr. Rubin said that he could employ up to 400 by working three shifts 24 hours a day.

Construction on the building is expected to be started by the First of March with the first manufacturing to be done by May One.

"We're mighty glad to get this new industry," Mayor Clark said. "When we first heard about this company, we didn't think Belmont had much of a chance. But we just got in there and did our best and convinced them that Belmont is the place for them," he said.

Mr. Clark made two trips to Chicago to investigate the company. On the first trip he was accompanied by Billy Martin and Bob Yarber, and on the second trip, Fifth District Supervisor Steve South went with him.

Mr. Rubin stated that there are only five firms in the nation similar to the one he owns and operates. He further stated that he chose Belmont and north-east Mississippi because of the central location in relation to manufacturing firms that use his products. Another important factor in his decision to move to Tishomingo county was the beautiful Pickwick lake area.

He stated that he has been operating under adverse conditions in Chicago with his manufacturing process located in 3 different buildings, none of them close together. He indicated that he will be real happy to get to Tishomingo county.

Smith To Address Group

Monday night, December 4 Senator-elect Theodore Smith of Corinth, will be the guest speaker at the Iuka Lions Club.

Sen-elect Smith was born in Alcorn County and is a graduate of Mississippi State University where he majored in government and economics. During his 25-year service career in the U. S. Air Force, Smith attained the rank of Colonel, and saw action in WWII, the Korean War and in Vietnam. Prior to joining the Air Force, the Corinthian served as a member of the House of Representatives.

Being a man of world travels, the guest speaker will relate his impression of how our resources actually stack up in other countries. He also plans to express views on this area's economic opportunities.

Theodore Smith has just recently been elected to serve in the Alcorn-Tippah senatorial seat.

DADDYBIRD, RIOTS AND THE UNEMPLOYED

You will recall, last summer, after pillaging black hordes put the torch to a great portion of Detroit, Lyndon Johnson ordered an "official" study made as to the reason for such untoward gay spirits.

The agencies given the order have come up with the precise report a person would expect. They have done it up brown, you might say.

What a calloused old fraud is Daddybird.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics, with an assist from the Census Bureau, put the report together. It says, on the one hand, the Negro's economic situation has improved significantly, but on the other hand, no, it is worse. Gobbledegook. But just what caused the riots isn't told, not straight out.

One of the implied causes lies in that "no", in the failure of some Negroes to rise on the economic ladder. In plain language, riots are due in some part to the rate of unemployment among Negroes.

Well, now. You know which Negroes are out of work, I take it; those who can't find "anything" to do.

Why do you suppose that is? The daily newspapers carry reams of help-wanted ads, yet, there the Negroes sit — hundreds of thousands of them — weltered in non-enterprise catalepsy.

Why? The superficial answer is simple and admitted: The unemployed Negro is not qualified to perform the needed services; that is, he doesn't have the training, the know-how.

That, as I say, is admitted. The rub comes when the question is asked, but why isn't he qualified?

Integrationists give any of a number of reasons in response to that query. But why, in fact, isn't the Negro trained? Lord knows the opportunity for training is there.

If you press, you get a thin-lipped answer: Because Negroes are invidiously discriminated against, that's why, or, being trained, they are still invidiously discriminated against.

And that is poppycock.

Here is the truth and don't you forget it: The average IQ of Negroes — that is, their potential — is 80 (that of Whites, 100). A Negro of average IQ has intelligence enough to take him through

the Seventh grade, no further. Half the Negroes can go no further, academically, than the Fifth grade. Only one in 100 has an IQ of 110, the IQ needed to do satisfactory college-level work; one in 100. That's why. That is the root reason for their not being trained, as it is the reason for the persistent high rate of school dropouts, for the dismal failure of these socialist experiments in "human engineering."

It is also the reason the Negro, historically, has remained on the lowest level of the economic ladder, at all times, everywhere in the world. The principal reason in any event. And it remains, today, the principal reason he can't find "anything" to do in the U.S.A. It is the nature of things.

The Liberals, as is their way, decided to override nature. They decided, through fiat, to make the Negro the White man's economic equal. So, among other measures, they enacted the minimum-wage law. Remember? Everybody was to be paid a "living" wage, Comrade.

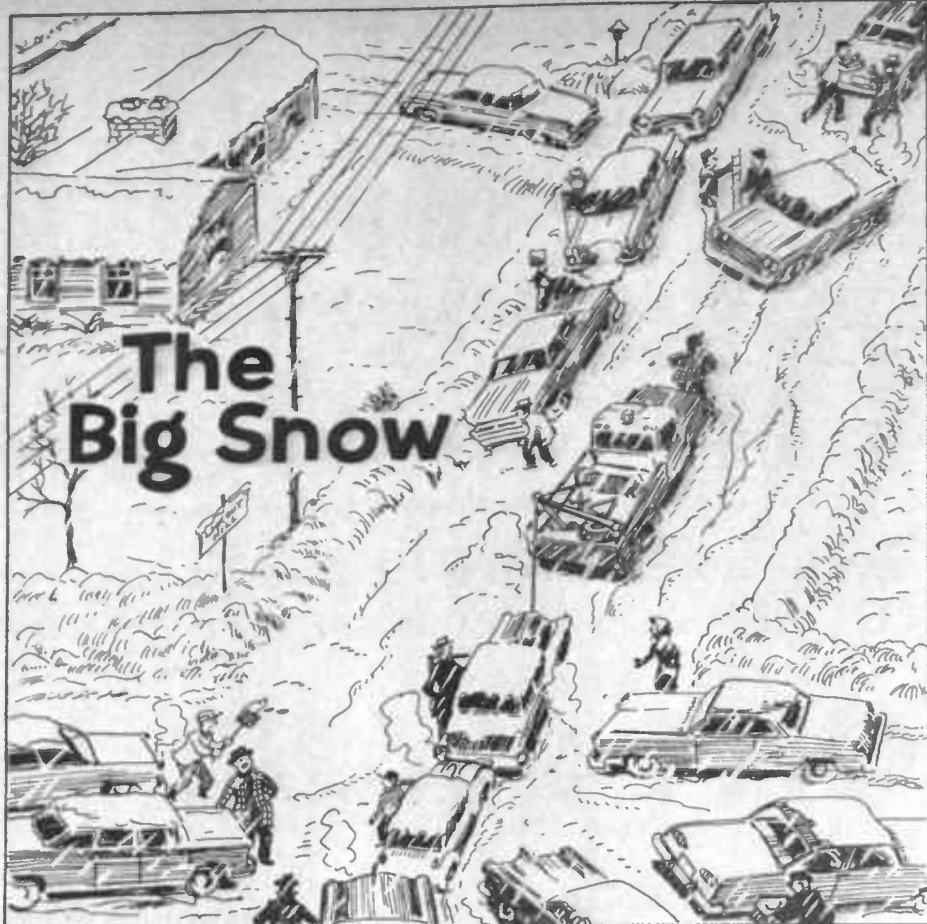
And what happened? This happened: Where once we had a man to cut the grass and do the garden, now Pappa rides the range on a power mower and — excuse it, please — the flowers go to pot. Where once we had elevator operators, now we have push buttons.

Where once we sent our linen to the laundry, now we have laundromats. The helper is gone from the delivery van. Indeed, the van, itself, is almost extinct. In general, the grinning face that once gave the filip to life has disappeared along with yesterday's goodwill.

To top off this stupid law, such people as still go to government employment offices seeking work as laborers or domestics, seeking such work as they can do profitably — to themselves and to the potential employer — such people are discouraged.

"Why don't you seek something more uplifting?" they are asked. And the poor souls turn away, sick in their hearts, knowing they are not "qualified" to do other than once they did — and never can be.

And so the army of unemployed, stultified, Negroes grows, and grows, and grows, and Detroit burns, baby, burns.

A MORAL BREAKDOWN

In pondering the case of the unwashed, drug-taking hippies of New York and San Francisco, respectable Americans ask what it is that lies behind this disturbing phenomenon. No nation in history has "had it so good," as the politicians say. This is supposed to be the "Great Society," to use the slogan of the Johnson administration. Yet there is disturbing evidence of serious moral deterioration in some areas of our national life.

The hippies certainly should be carefully scrutinized, for they are the part of the iceberg that appears above water. Below the surface are other shocking developments.

The hippies can be classed as dropouts from a society that in the past has been built around personal enterprise and self-reliance. They say that they only want to live their lives as they please. And they think this is a reasonable request. It isn't reasonable, of course, for society is still saddled with the hippies and the mess they make — no matter what they say. If a hippie becomes ill, a public hospital will care for him. If his room catches on fire, firemen will rescue him.

The truth is that the hippie wants to drop out of society only to a degree. He doesn't want to be stripped of all the protections of our free society. Certainly, he wants to be exempt from military service while other citizens take the risks for him.

If communism conquered America, there wouldn't be any hippies. The Russians would pack them off to concentration camps or force them to work in the forests or mines along with decent citizens.

Let's look more closely at the hippies and the impact of their way of life. Part of the hippie movement is a contempt for the decencies. The hippie world is a world of obscenity. Foul words, used in public, are characteristic of those who detest what they call the "square world," meaning the world of hard-working, responsible citizens.

One can see that the hippie attitudes are spreading, especially insofar as obscenity is concerned. In recent years, the motion picture industry has let down the standards of decency. Nudity is on the increase in films. Foul words are uttered in motion pictures supposedly produced for respectable people. The racks of paper back books at drug stores, airports and other public places are filled with books that belong to the literature of the gutter. Sadism and perversion has become the standard fare of the legitimate theater.

A generation ago, pornographic literature was not permitted in the United States. A few dealers in gutter literature smuggled it into the country from Paris. Nowadays, the production and sale of pornographic literature has become a colossal industry. The young people of America are being daily exposed to the offerings of the smut peddlers.

The late Mayor Jimmy Walker of New York City said that no one was ever corrupted by a book, but that would be hard to

assert these days. Americans are being fed a diet of literary and filmed filth that is unprecedented in history. Neither the federal courts nor the Justice Department are especially concerned about this tide of dirt.

Once before in history there was a tidal wave of pornography. It was in ancient Rome, at the time when caesarism was rampant and the liberties and the decencies of the Roman people were being eroded. Americans would do well to review the history of that period. The United States is not immune to moral subversion, and that seems to be what is taking place in America today.

The hippies are only one manifestation of a moral breakdown that is spreading at an alarming rate. Big Government's denial to the people of self-reliance helps bring about the conditions in which the hippie attitude develops. The federal government is engaging in the same kind of bread and circuses performance that the Roman emperors gave so many centuries ago. The integrity and personal responsibility of individuals is being undermined, and as this process takes place there is a softening and weakening of character that leads to grave moral excess.

The hippie phenomenon, the spread of pornography and the tyranny of the state — all are related to the evils of a permissive society that is abandoning high standards in personal and family life and in citizenship as well.

FAMILY POT LUCK

Here's a seasonal treat: serve macaroni with a cream of mushroom soup with extra mushrooms and slivers of ham. Top with Parmesan cheese and heat in the oven.

You can give meringues a party appearance by tinting them with food coloring.

Season ground beef with salt, garlic salt, prepared mustard, Worcestershire sauce and catsup. Spread on 'burger buns and broil for a few minutes, then serve.

Place cooked spinach in a casserole, top with salmon mixture made as for meat loaf, sprinkle with grated cheese and bake, using a hot (450 degrees F.) oven for 15 minutes.

Helen's Favorite: Apple Gingerbread

(Serves 6)

2 1/2 cups canned applesauce
1/2 cup sugar
1 package gingerbread mix

Whipped cream

Grated orange rind

Combine applesauce and sugar; heat to boiling; remove from heat and pour into an 8x8x2-inch pan or skillet. Prepare gingerbread according to directions. Pour over applesauce. Bake in a moderate (350 degree F.) oven for 30 to 40 minutes or until gingerbread is baked. Serve with whipped cream sprinkled with grated orange rind.

What to Expect of your School

Education is probably one of the most talked about subjects of the day. Everyone recognizes that an education is necessary in order to live a productive and useful life. In fact, your child's future depends, to a large extent, on the kind of education he is getting today.

Most citizens try in some fashion to rate or evaluate their schools. How about yours? Citizens who are determined to find out what is right about their schools and what might be done to improve them can do a tremendous amount of good—if they know what to look for and where to find it. They can do serious harm if they approach the job unprepared, charged with hostility, or armed with misinformation.

First, you should fix in your mind what you expect the school to do for your child. We are dealing here with the purposes or goals of education.

The best-known and most widely accepted set of purposes of American education is known as the "Seven Cardinal Principles of Education." These principles were first expressed in 1918 by a Commission appointed by the National Ed-

ucation Association. About 50 years later, in a 1966 survey conducted by the NEA, American teachers returned an overwhelming verdict in favor of the principles, and the statement is still considered a valid measuring stick against which to check school curriculum and activities. The "Seven Cardinal Principles" call upon the schools to seek these objectives:

Health, Command of Fundamental Processes (including the three R's), Worthy Home membership, Vocational Competence, Effective Citizenship, Worthy Use of Leisure Time, Ethical Character.

Another way of looking at the goals of education was stated in 1938 by the Educational Policies Commission of the NEA and the American Association of School Administrators under these four headings:

Self-Realization, Human Relationship, Economic Efficiency, Civic Responsibility.

In 1961, the Educational Policies Commission proposed still another approach to school objectives. The Commission's new proposal holds that the "central purpose" of education should be the development of

rational thinking, for rational thinking is essential in the achievement of all other purposes of education. And all educational activities should be carried out in ways that develop the thinking process.

Keep these objectives in mind as you appraise your child's school. Ask keep your mind open. It is easy for us to let our opinions be prejudiced by what we hear or read, whether or not it stems from a responsible source. There are several misconceptions that will cloud or make invalid our appraisal of the schools. May we discuss a few of these now for your consideration?

First, we hear that age-old expression, "The way I was taught is the best way." It is natural for us to cherish memories of the past and also to resist change. Some people express shock when the children report that they watched T.V. in school or read words on a machine. They often say, "that's not how it was done in my day," intimating that their schools were superior. We should keep in mind that many of the new techniques and methods are used because research has shown that they are more effective.

Often we hear criticism of the school staff if the school does not measure up to expectations. This is unfair and completely wrong in most instances. Usually the school administrators and

teachers are aware of the schools' weaknesses, but are unable to do anything about it because of limited funds. Most trained educators know how to carry on an excellent educational program, but it is almost impossible when you need teaching supplies and equipment along with additional space and smaller classes. A point to consider as you analyze your school is whether or not the school district is supporting the school to an acceptable degree. In some school districts, the conservative attitude of local citizens prevents the school staff from trying new approaches. Schoolteachers as a whole are dedicated people. This is especially true in Mississippi where the starting salary is only \$700 a year above what the Federal Government considers a poverty level. We should be grateful for the teachers that remain in the state, since there is currently a shortage of over 171,000 teachers in the United States alone.

Education is a rich topic for newspapers, magazines and books because of its importance to the public. Therefore, each year a great deal is written about the accomplishments and failings of the public schools. This is often upsetting to parents and immediately they say, "I know it's true because I read it."

When material like this is published, we should try to determine if it is facts or just someone's opinions. If opinions, whose are they? Does it come from someone qualified to judge the schools or from someone with an axe to grind? It is easy to build an emotion-packed story that arouses the public by using generalizations without basing it on any proof whatsoever. In so doing, hostility or resentment is developed on the part of the reader. Whenever a story about the schools worry you, seek answers in the school itself. Make an appointment with the principal or other appropriate staff member. The school staff not only welcomes the opportunity but is eager to tell the community all about the schools. We will continue next week with more misconceptions and then will discuss exactly what to look for.

County Agent's Notes

GET READY FOR NEXT YEAR

Now, at harvest time, is a real good time to take a close look at each crop and each field to see if you have any special problem area that did not produce as it should.

When you find such areas, make a map of them, either mentally or on paper. Take soil samples and have them analyzed. You might also take a soil prob or shovel to see if a plow pan exists.

Now is also an excellent time to observe pot holes and poor drainage, either surface drainage or internal drainage.

After checking your problem fields, you may find that you need to chisel plow or subsoil or do some ditching to improve the drainage or apply more lime and fertilizer, or maybe a combination of all of these.

DAIRY NOTES

Want to be sure that you always have better dairy cows. You can't always be sure by selling your poor cows and trying to buy the better animals... often the ones you buy are not any better than the ones you sell.

The one sure way to have bet-

ter cows is to breed and raise your own.

For raising cows with more milk power, you must have a sire that will upgrade your herd. Often such a bull is far too expensive for most dairymen to buy and own.

Services of the best bulls can be obtained through artificial breeding. Artificial breedings give you the opportunity to raise better cows.

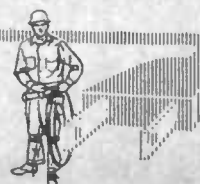

Don't Overload Washer
or Dryer

When you are washing permanent press items, be especially careful not to overload your washer or dryer. The reason is to keep wrinkles to a minimum. Judge the load by bulk, not pounds. For a top-loading machine, add items loosely until they come to the top of the agitator. If yours is a front-loading machine, fill the drum halfway. Be sure you place garments in the washer so that badly soiled portions are exposed toward the outside of the tub. Turn slacks and pleated skirts inside out to protect the creased edges. A normal washer load is a normal dryer load. Small loads dry faster. Add a large dry turkish towel to the dryer to assure proper tumbling.
